23.	SENATOR GRAHAM:
24.	On the Fourth Special Session?
25.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
26.	Right.
27.	SENATOR GRAHAM:
28.	I move that we approve the Journal of November 8th,
29.	Fourth Special Session of the 78th General Assembly on
30.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
31.	All in favor signify by saying aye. Opposed nay.

23.	Senator Schaffer.
24.	SENATOR SCHAFFER:
25.	Senator Partee there's a copy of the two amendments
26.	I'm about to present headed in your direction. As you'll
27.	recall SB 1 deals with the optionalconsolidation of
28.	County Board elections. SB number 2 in this Session has
29.	to do with filing dates. The second bill was drafted under
30.	the assumption that this legislation would be acted on
31.	prior to the closing of filing which closed in most of the
32.	counties yesterday. This amendment would put SB 1 in

31.	It is not. Your assumption is correct.
32.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
33.	Is there further discussion? All in favor of the

2.	aye. Opposed nay. The motion carried. The amendment is

6.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
7.	Any further amendments? The Amendment No. 1 was
8.	adopted Senator Donnewald. Senator Schaffer.
9.	SENATOR SCHAFFER:
10.	Senator Donnewald, why don't you wait until you see
11.	Amendment No. 2. Amendment No. 1 really doesn't have any
12.	effect on the issue that you are primarily concerned with.
13.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
14.	Senator Donnewald.
15.	SENATOR DONNEWALD:
16.	In the event that this is adopted, would this
17.	preclude any other persons from filing for officebefore
18.	before December 17th.
19.	PRESIDING OFFICER OSENATOR WEAVER):
20.	Senator Schaffer.
21.	SENATOR SCHAFFER:
22.	Yes, it wouldit would basically say those people
23.	who have filed and filing hasday has opened and closed,

32.	It's closed for the February date, all I'm doing
33.	doing is validating these filings that have already

9.	Amendment No. 2 accomplished one thing. It puts a

.2.	this piece of legislation effective in only one election
.3.	year, 1974. After the election next year it's back to the
4.	drawing board, the question is open again.

18.	Senator Schaffer I'd like to ask a question if I

29.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
30.	Senator Dougherty.
31.	SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

3.	effect and if the law passes, it still takes effect.

7.	Does this apply only to thethe February primary.
8.	Can those who desire to run in a March primary, can they
9.	still file? That's my question.
.0.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
1.	Senator Schaffer.
.2.	SENATOR DOUGHERTY:
.3.	Only as an independent.
4.	SENATOR SCHAFFER:
L5.	I'm sorry Senator. I apologize. I missed the intent
L6.	of your question. This has no effect on the regular March
17.	primary for any other offices.
18.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
19.	Any further discussion? Senator Schaffer moves
20.	the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to SB 1, all in favor
21.	signify by saying aye. Opposed nay. Motion is adopted.
22.	Any further amendments?
23.	SECRETARY:
24.	Amendment No. 3 by Senator Donnewald.
25.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
26.	Senator Donnewald.
27.	SENATOR DONNEWALD:
28.	Well, Mr. President and Members of the Body I think
29.	last night we had a very, very thorough discussion about
30.	a bill that would have been mandatory and that the Governor
31.	indicated that he would in fact sign Now, I'm not
32.	presenting that amendment. I don't suppose that the
33.	Chair's position has changed. I do however Mr. President

1.	Members of the Senate propose Amendment No. 3 in this
2.	particular bill. Amendment No. 3 is the optional
3.	amendment and it provides the County Board may provide
4.	by ordinance or resolution for the election of its
5.	members in the April of 1974 and thereafter, one-half of
6.	the County Board members shall be elected in November
7.	of every other even numbered year, beginning in '76,
8.	should the County Board fail to pass an ordinance or a
9.	resolution calling for the April election of '74, the
10.	members shall stand for election in November of '74
11.	and thereafter. One-half of the members shall be
12.	elected in November of every other even numbered year
13.	beginning 19and 76. The political impactthe political
14.	impact of this 2ndor this 3rd amendment is to provide
15.	the Republicans with an out for the 1974 election.
16.	Nevertheless the County Board may take affirmative
17.	action to retain the April election in '74, there-
18.	after whether they take affirmative action or not
19.	all County Board elections will be held in November.
20.	I would ask for a favorable roll call on this amendment.
21.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
22.	Is there any discussion? The question is shall
23.	Senator Schaffer.
24.	SENATOR SCHAFFER:
25.	Well, I just wanted to say that this is in violation
26.	I think of the call of the Special Session and contrary
27.	to the wishes of the sponsor.
28.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR'WEAVER):
29.	Senator Partee.
30.	SENATOR PARTEE:
31.	Well, I just wanted to say that I think Senator
32.	Donnewald is to be complimented for proposing what is

a reasonable compromise to what has proved to be a very

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vexing problem. Now it's sort of obvious to all of us 1. that you on that side of the aisle do not want to face 2. the electorate in November of next year, even if it means ٦. saving money for your counties. I'm suggesting to you 4. that this compromise amendment is a reasonable one which 5. makes it permissive next year. So each County Board can 6. by its own judgement determine whether to have a con-7. solidation of elections next year or whether not to have 8. a consolidation of elections next year. But thereafter 9. in the year that follows and thereafter it would be 10. mandatory. Now, we passed a mandatory bill...a permissive 11. bill here. The Governor vetoed it and made it...and made 12. it mandatory. It cameback. You did not like the mandatory 13. bit. Here is a chançe, a decent honorable compromise 14. which would permit permissive selection next year. Mr... 15. could I have some order Mr. Chairman?... where we could 16. have a permissive situation next year with each county 17. making its own choice and mandatory thereafter. That 18. to me is an honorable compromise and I...I think this is 19. 20. a very fine amendment.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

22. Any further discussion? Senator Donnewald may close23. debate.

SENATOR DONNEWALD:

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Yes Mr. President. Very briefly, I have the commitment from the Governor that in the event this amendment is adopted to this particular piece of legislation it will in fact become law. This particular method and manner is the only way that it will become law. If we adopt this amendment we have I think somewhere between ten or fifteen days in which to make it through the House and to the Governor's desk. And ultimately saving counties throughout the State many, many millions of dollars. I request a favorable roll

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PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER): 2.

For what purpose does Senator Harris arise? 3. 4.

SENATOR HARRIS:

5. Well, Mr. President I want a ruling from the Chair.

6. We went through this issue last night. This amendment

10. request a ruling of the Chair whether this is...this

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

14. Senator Partee.

15. SENATOR PARTEE:

> I have a parliamentary inquirv and that is must an amendment to a bill pending have in its language only language which relates to the specific subject matter of a call. Now let me explain what I'm saying. If you have to in an amendment to a...a bill pending have only language which fits close and connectically to the subject of a call. I... I just don't think we've

ever had that kind of a situtation, and that's the

question I ask.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Partee, where an amendment is to a bill is outside the call or the scope of the call, then it will not be acceptable to the... I think we're talking about basically because of the mandatory provisions in the amendment that it is outside the scope of the call of this Fourth Special Session. ... has asked for that ruling and that's the ruling that I, the Chair is giving.

The amendment is out of order. ...and it is so stated

1. ruling. Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

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Well, I...I did not hear how you had ruled when I sought recongition, but I have just now heard you say that you...you do rule that Amendment No. 3 does not come within the scope of the call.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

That is correct.

SENATOR CARROLL:

It seems to me yesterday that whoever sat in the .

Chair as the Presiding Officer ruled that the word

permit meant that it could not be mandatory and had

to be permissive. Today they're saying that it can't

be permissive, if in being permissive you're letting

them opt out. Are we going to get a definition of

words, are we going to get a definition of phrases,

can we learn how this Senate is going to operate as

an organization of rule, as an organization of

definition of words. This bill to me gives them an

option. It says it is permissive, not mandatory that

they can opt out if they want to tell their voters

they're willing to waste the money. That's the issue.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Mr. President, let me read the key paragraph of this amendment. If the County Board fails to pass an ordinance or resolution calling for the election of its members on the first Tuesday in April of 1974 - listen to this - the members shall be elected on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of '74 and thereafter, one-half of the County Board members shall be elected on the first Tuesday after the first Monday

in November of every other even numbered year...beginning
 in '76. Now that is a mandate that the elections shall be
 consolidated after of '74 and that is not within the scope
 of the call and the Chair's ruling is appropriate and he's
 done an excellent job.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Wooten.

SENATOR WOOTEN:

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I respect...Mr. President and colleagues I respectfully beg to differ. That because there is an option stated, there is no rational way you can construct the flow of the language to conclude that there is not permission... obtainable. As long as an option exists in the language it meets any rational test of the English language. If the call was poorly drafted, that's not our problem. I do not think we should try to cover up perhaps inadequate language of a call. If it is not what you intended, I think that's too bad, but this clearly meets any rational test. It gives an option. If it gives an option then there is an element of permission in it and that is very simple. Where it proceeds from that is not material. If the option is in there it's permissive.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

Senator Soper.

SENATOR SOPER:

Mr. President, I would suggest that there's not appeal from the ruling of the Chair, that we continue on with our business. If there are no other amendments to SB l in this Session, then we move it to 3rd reading and go on with our business. We could be here all night and listen to a lot of people. We've got a lot of important business here besides this.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER): ı. 2. I have recognized two other speakers and we'll move on. 3. Senator Buzbee. 4. SENATOR BUZBEE: 5. Thank you Mr. President. A point of parliamentary 6. inquiry. Mr. President, am I to interpret your ruling to 7. mean tht if any amendment that's offered to any bill is not specifically within the purview of the call of the Special 8. 9. Session then that amendment would be out of order? 10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER): 11. Yeah, I think you have to rule on these independently, 12. but this particular amendment... 13. SENATOR BUZBEE: 14. That's not my question Mr. President... 15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER): 16.you understand what the situation is. 17. SENATOR BUZBEE: 18. Well, I just suggest Mr. President that we perhaps 19. ought to have the Parliamentarian or somebody go back 20. through all of the legislation we've considered in the 21. five Special Sessions and check each amendment to see if 22. that amendment is within the purview of the call. 23. not we have done an unconsitutional thing according to 24. your ruling. 25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER): 26. Senator Dougherty. 27. SENATOR DOUGHERTY: 28. ... I would respectfully suggest Mr. President since you the ruling of the repealer in Amendment No. 2 is 29. Senator Schaffer's, since it is a mandatory repealer that 30. 31. too is not within the purview of the call. Give me a ruling 32. on that one will you please.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

1.	amendments? You're asking whether Amendment No. 2
2.	was within the call? Yes. Amendment is not substantively
3.	mandatoryfurther amendments? 3rd reading.
4.	Senator Buzbee.
5.	SENATOR BUZBEE:
6.	Parliamentary inquiry Mr. President. I didn't under-
7.	stand your last ruling on Amendment No. 2. Would you
8.	please say that againand give me the reasoning, if you
9.	don't mind.
10.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
11.	Amendment No. 2 does not impose a substantive mandate.
12.	That is the ruling. Senator Graham.
13.	SENATOR GRAHAM:
14.	Mr. President on point of personal privilege perhaps,
15.	if we are serious about the things that the press says
16.	we are supposed to be serious about, RTA and campaign
17.	disclosure, gentlemen, do you want those things or don't
18.	you? Or do you want to have a filibuster or don't you?
19.	Or do we move ahead or don't we? I say we move ahead.
20.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
21.	SB 5, Senator Clarke. Senator, your appeal is
22.	not timely, we've gone on to other business. I gave
23.	several of you plenty of help Senator Knuppel, he
24.	has plenty of opportunity to make that appeal.
25.	SECRETARY:
26.	SB
27.	PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
28.	Senator Knuppel Senator Knuppel, will you please
29.	be in order? Senator Mohr.
30.	SENATOR HOWARD MOHR:
31.	MrMr. President, I wouldI would suggestI
32.	would suggest that when members of this Body get up that
33.	you recognize them and call them by name, so the people

- 1. in the galleries know who's doing the talking.
- 2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):
 - Senator Partee. Senator Partee is recognized, Senator Knuppel.
- 4. SENATOR PARTEE:

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- 5. I stood here waiting for recognition, and finally we 6.
- got it now. Senator Donnewald is not asked for something 7.
- out of space, it's nothing unusual about a motion to appeal 8.
- the ruling of the Chair. To deny him that rather fundamental 9.
- right I think is...exhibits the kind of highhandedness that 10.
- this Senate should shrink from. I don't think we ought to 11.
- be highhanded. He's appealing the ruling of the Chair and 12.
- I think he's entitled to that and I think you should give 13.
- him that, that motion. You may have your votes, but he has 14.
- the right to appeal from the ruling of the Chair and I think 15.
- if we don't get that motion I think we're going to have a
- 16. real problem here.

PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR WEAVER):

- 18. Senator Partee, if you'll back up just a minute, I
- 19.
- indicated to Senator Soper, that there were two others 20.
- who had made...asked for recognition. And I recognized
- Senator Dougherty and Senator Buzbee and this I try to
- be fair about. ...gone to other business. No motion was
- 23. made, Senator. Senator Partee.
- 24. SENATOR PARTEE:
- 25. Let me get the record straight. You did not say to 26.
- Senator Soper that there were two other persons who wanted 27.
- recognition. You in fact said to him there were two other
- 28. persons you were going to recognize. At that time Senator
- Buzbee was standing, Senator Dougherty was standing, I 30. was standing, Senator Donnewald was standing. I was waving.
- 31. I wondered if you really meant you were only going to
- 32. recognize two people. The fact is that you only did
- 33. recognize two people when the rest of us were standing,

and I wass seeking recongition. We didn't have the

opportunity to make the motion. He's entitled to a
