the kind of youngster with the...with the spirit of individuality 10.

and the spirit of self-sufficiency that gave him the intestinal 11.

fortitude to train himself, to find work. He is a working man, 12.

a man who gets around on his own even though he's confined to 13.

a wheelchair or public transportation. Very recently the young 14.

man was found very badly beaten. It's a hideous thing to 15.

contemplate, but is in the hospital at this present time and 16.

in very serious condition. This resolution is from the Senate and 17.

it commends the kind of spirit exemplified by this young man 18.

and is expressing this Senate's interest in the citizens of 19.

the State of Illinois who having this kind of handicap did 20.

persevere. I would like to have all Senators join in this 21.

resolution. I would ask for suspension of the rules for the 22.

immediate adoption. 23.

PRESIDENT: 24.

SENATOR MITCHLER: 13.

Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate, Willard 14. Ice, I believe, has distinguished himself as an outstanding 15. individual although totally blind to be one that is perhaps 16. the most knowledgeable person of legal matters in his field. 17. And he is retiring. In fact, he has retired as of the first 18. of year from over forty years of work with the State of 19. Illinois. And it's only befitting that this resolution be 20. introduced in the Illinois State Senate acknowledging his 21. good work and expressing appreciation. In...in the absence of Senator 22. Davidson who was the chief sponsor of this resolution, I would ask 23. for immediate suspension of the rules and consideration of 24.

the resolution. 25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

Senator Mitchler moves for the suspension of the...

SENATOR PARTEE:

I just didn't want the moment to go by without having an 30. opportunity to join Senator Mitchler in espousing the cause 31. that's represented by this resolution. I suppose it would be 32. difficult for me not to say that these two resolutions in tandem 33.

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suggest something to me that I think America needs to consider ı. a great deal more. The first resolution is offered by Senator New-2. house related to a young man who was born with a mental handicap of 3. water on the brain with an enlarged head who despite that kind 4. of a handicap became a person who was to be thought of and was 5. indeed a useful citizen and was subjected to the kind of situation 6. to which he was subjected in terms of an assault. And now this 7. resolution of Senator Mitchler's relates to a man who was born 8. bereft of the ability to see which is a very, very devastating 9. kind of thing, and I think most of us who have had our sight 10. all these years have perhaps not really realized how valuable 11. it is. But I think that what's undergirding both of these 12. resolutions in terms of what its is meaningful to all of us 13. is the fact these two men being born with handicaps of a 14. very serious nature were nonetheless motivated to make a 15. contribution to this great country in which they find them-16. selves as citizens. And Willard Ice certainly is a person 17. who though blind has many talents. He's an outstanding pianist, 18. among other things, and is an outstanding lawyer and particularly 19. in the field of his chosen endeavor matters relating to revenue and 20. the Revenue Code. I certainly want to add my words of praise, 21. ecomiums and accolades to Willard Ice and for him as he 22. goes out into the real world as a practicing lawyer all of the 23. good luck and good fortune that God could give him, so I 24. just wanted to say that I, too, wanted to join in this resolution 25. as being one of those persons who had this to say about him. 26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD) 27. Senator Mitchler moves for the suspension of the rules and 28. the immediate consideration of the resolution. All those in 29. favor indicate by saying Aye.
