1. PRESIDENT:

2. Second bill . . . Senate Bills on 2nd reading. 62. Senator  
3. Rock.

4. SECRETARY:

5. Senate Bill No. 62.

6. (Secretary reads title of bill)

7. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Any . . . any amendments from the Floor?

10. SECRETARY:

11. Amendment No. 1 offered by Senators Netsch and Hickey.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Netsch.

14. SENATOR NETSCH:

15. Mr. President, this is an amendment that I think everyone  
16. more or less expects by now, which Senator Hickey and I are  
17. offering. What it would do is to recast the definition of  
18. claimants who are eligible to file for this additional grant.  
19. It does not change the Circuit Breaker part of the basic statute  
20. in any respect, but it eliminates that provision which excludes  
21. the additional grant or prohibits the additional grant to  
22. people who, for example, live in Chicago in Senior Citizen  
23. Housing Projects and other subsidized housing. In Chicago  
24. alone, and there are many such projects in other cities in the  
25. State of Illinois, that is, nine thousand one hundred and fifty  
26. senior citizens. All of whom are in the very lowest economic  
27. brackets or they would not be eligible for those projects to  
28. begin with. The fact that they do not pay property tax or  
29. do not live in projects that pay property tax is totally ir-  
30. relevant because, as the Lt. Governor said and as the sponsor  
31. of the bill has said, this is sales tax relief not property  
32. tax relief. To me, it is absolutely unconscionable to deny  
33. this form of relief, if it is to be granted at all, to a large

1. number of people, who are the most needy of all senior citizens.  
2. This bill would remedy that basic defect in the bill.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Hickey.

5. SENATOR HICKEY:

6. I'd like to say Mr. President, that I think that many senior  
7. citizens in this State do not realize the omission of people  
8. living in public housing, in this bill. In Rockford, and there  
9. are lots of public housing developments in places outside of  
10. Chicago, Senator Netsch. I saw the little yellow postcards  
11. that came from the Lt. Governor's office signed by people  
12. living in public housing who had faith in the fact that this  
13. would help them. I'm still not sure that they are aware that  
14. Senate Bill 62, as it is now constituted, would not, without  
15. this amendment, so as far as I'm concerned, this is simply a  
16. matter of clarification and of coverage which was originally  
17. intended. I'd like to add that I had after twenty-seven fifteen  
18. that still not . . .

19. PRESIDENT:

20. May we have the attention and Mr. Sergeant at Arms, remove  
21. the persons in the back, we can't hear from back there. There's  
22. a lady outside.

23. SENATOR HICKEY:

24. I'd like to say that as soon as this Session began, when the  
25. Governor had not yet acted on HB 2715, I had prepared a similar,  
26. an amendatory bill, similar to the one which is before you now,  
27. is Amendment 1 to Senate Bill 62, so immediately we could put  
28. that into this Body and give the kind of coverage which I think  
29. most people thought was in the original bill. I can't imagine  
30. that anybody in this Body would be opposed to this amendment,  
31. whether they're for or against Senate Bill 62, and I earnestly  
32. implore your favorable consideration. Thank you.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Knuppel.

2. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

3. We oughtn't to have sales tax on food and drugs for anybody.

4. I sponsored such a concept in the Constitution. It's reprehensible.

5. It's the most regressive tax there is. I'd have to support this

6. amendment because it broadens the bill.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Yes, Senator?

9. SENATOR SOMMER:

10. Senator Netsch.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Sommer. Senator Sommer desires to ask a question.

13. Will you yield?

14. SENATOR SOMMER:

15. Thank you, Senator Netsch. Is your amendment the one that

16. deletes line 32 and 33?

17. SENATOR NETSCH:

18. Yes, that is correct.

19. SENATOR SOMMER:

20. I have a question, perhaps you can't address yourself to this,

21. but perhaps you can. In your amendment, and so also in the bill

22. the word disabled is used and how do you define that?

23. SENATOR NETSCH:

24. How do I define it?

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Sommer, I think she does not understand what you are

27. saying. Would you repeat your question?

28. SENATOR SOMMER:

29. I think I have the answer, Senator Netsch. Thank you.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Got the answer before you got the question, that's pretty

32. good. Senator Wooten.

33. SENATOR WOOTEN:

1.           Simply to follow up on the questions I ask in the Committee  
2. of the Whole, I join with Lt. Governor Hartigan in urging people  
3. to send in postcards. It's one of the ironies that I . . . I, myself,  
4. do not understand that most of the people who responded in our  
5. area were not eligible. It was an oversight on my part, and  
6. looking at the bill originally, and I hope that we can correct  
7. that now, because I . . . I feel that we certainly have a fair  
8. number in my community, as many of you have in yours, and  
9. since this will not change Senate Bill 63, the amount will stay  
10. the same and will broaden this to include all senior citizens.  
11. I, certainly, heartily endorse the adoption of this amendment.

12. PRESIDENT:

13.           Senator Berning.

14. SENATOR BERNING:

15.           May I ask the sponsor of the amendment a question?

16. PRESIDENT:

17.           Senator Berning desires to ask a question. Will you  
18. yield?

19. SENATOR BERNING:

20.           Is it your interpretation of this amendment that and I'm  
21. quoting you, public housing, but does that also include rest-  
22. homes or nursing homes?

23. SENATOR NETSCH:

24.           That was not a . . . an issue in this particular form of  
25. the bill. That . . .yeah . . . Senator Rock is also answering  
26. behind my . . . over my shoulder. Under the Circuit Breaker  
27. as it . . . as it exists right now and exclusive of the bill  
28. we are acting on right now, with certain qualifications, the  
29. people who live in nursing homes or retirement homes are eligible  
30. for the Circuit Breakers, so they were not excluded under Senate  
31. Bill 62. It was only the people who lived, in some circumstance,  
32. under which they were not charged with paying any property tax.  
33. And that would be people in subsidized housing, the senior citizen

1. projects or elderly people who lived with their families and  
2. certain other categories of that sort. The nursing home residents  
3. were eligible and remain eligible.

4. SENATOR BERNING:

5. Thank you.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Any further discussion? Senator Rock.

8. SENATOR ROCK:

9. Thank you, Mr. President. This is the same concept that was  
10. discussed back in November when Senate . . . when HB 2715 was  
11. under discussion. This is not, obviously, an objection to the  
12. current bill it . . . it is rather an expansion of the program.  
13. And it . . . and it covers about four to five percent of those,  
14. otherwise eligible, and I have no objection. I would urge the  
15. adoption of Amendment No. 1.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. The question is, shall Amendment 1 . . . No 1 be adopted?  
18. All in favor say Aye. Opposed. The Ayes have it. Amendment  
19. No. 1 is adopted. Any further amendments?

20. SECRETARY:

21. Amendment No. 2 offered by Senator Netsch.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Netsch.

24. SENATOR NETSCH:

25. Mr. President, Amendment No. 2 is not just simply a filling  
26. up one small gap in the bill, it is filling up a fairly major  
27. gap in the bill. What it is directed to, is the, my premise,  
28. that senior citizens are, indeed, entitled to a form of sales  
29. tax relief. But, that the basic reason why they are, at this point  
30. in time, also, makes it necessary or at least desirable, that that  
31. form of sales tax relief be extended to others who are in exactly  
32. the same economic circumstances, in terms of their income bracket.  
33. This bill would extend the . . . the same form of tax relief,

1. which is in Senate Bill 62, to everyone in the State. It  
2. would not confine it simply to those who are over sixty-five  
3. or disabled. Now, the first question, obviously, that arises  
4. is how much would this cost? I think Mr. Hovey of the Bureau  
5. of the Budget, anticipated me this morning by indicating that  
6. figure, and I will repeat it for you now. On the basis of  
7. one hundred percent participation of everyone who might be  
8. eligible for this form of . . . of ostensible sales tax  
9. relief on an annualized basis, the cost would be one hundred,  
10. forty-seven million dollars. That would be contrasted with  
11. the fifty million dollar figure that represents one hundred  
12. percent participation on an annualized basis for Senate Bill  
13. 62 without the amendment. Now, obviously, there is a difference  
14. in cost between fifty million and a hundred and forty-seven  
15. million. My own feeling is that what we really are about right  
16. now, what we ought to be about, is not just an immediate and  
17. even temporary answer, response to the high cost of inflation,  
18. which heaven knows is a serious enough problem for senior citizens  
19. and also for families that are in the same low income bracket, but,  
20. I think, we also, as long as we have got this kind of thing in  
21. front of us, we ought to recognize that what we really need to  
22. do is to make a permanent form of tax relief available in this  
23. . . . in this State, recognizing that we still have a tough  
24. tax structure with a flat rate income tax, high property taxes  
25. and a flat across the board five percent sales tax. We have  
26. needed to do this for a long time, many of you were sponsors  
27. or co-sponsors of legislation that took this form of approach  
28. in the last Session and, unfortunately, it all got bogged down.  
29. It seems to me that we ought to . . . to seize this opportunity,  
30. if we are going to do anything about tax relief at all, and say,  
31. by golly, it's time to start redoing the structure so that people  
32. in the lowest income brackets, in this State, do get some relief  
33. from our tough tax structure. This is a device that is intended

1. to respond to that need. If you tell me that the Governor has  
2. already vetoed a thirty-four million dollar, which actually turns  
3. out to be a fifty million dollar form of tax relief on the ground  
4. that the State does not have the funds, my response would be,  
5. right. He's already vetoed that one. I don't have any reason to  
6. think that he is going to be any more likely to veto one that does,  
7. indeed, also direct itself to the other problem that he raised  
8. in that Message, and that was that it was not generally applicable  
9. to all citizens of the State. So, it seems to me, that this  
10. addresses itself, at least, to one of the objections in that  
11. Message. And the fact that we don't know what the Governor is  
12. going to do with any of these forms of tax relief is, I'm afraid,  
13. just a circumstance . . . that the budget has not come in, we  
14. have not heard the Revenue estimates, and we don't really know  
15. where we are. But, I would suggest that this endangers that no  
16. more than the original bill because, at least, it corrects one  
17. of the problems raised in that Message. I . . . I believe it  
18. is the right thing to do, I think that what is absolutely right  
19. for senior citizens is, indeed, also right for those people who  
20. have children, and an awful lot of kids to feed, when the highest  
21. part of the inflationary rate is attributable to food right now.  
22. I think it is just and right, I think it makes a . . . a bill a much  
23. better bill, and I would, obviously, urge that people vote for it.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Rock.

26. SENATOR ROCK:

27. Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in opposition to Amendment  
28. No. 2. The program, indeed, probably does have some merit down  
29. the road. I would strongly urge Senator Netsch to introduce a  
30. bill, which will then be assigned to the Revenue Committee, and  
31. which will handle this problem. I would not, however, urge the  
32. adoption of Amendment No. 2 to this bill. If, in fact, as we have  
33. heard from Director Hovey and . . . and certainly, the Governor

1. himself, that he has trouble finding thirty-four million dollars  
2. for this program which I sponsor. He will certainly have con-  
3. sternation finding a hundred and forty-seven million. For that  
4. reason, if. . . if. . . if only that reason, I would urge the  
5. nonadoption or the defeat of Amendment No. 2.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Buzbee.

8. SENATOR BUZBEE:

9. Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, I rise in support  
10. of Amendment No. 2 for one reason and one reason only. Every day  
11. in my district office in Carbondale, I told my secretary the other  
12. day, we're going to be seeing more and more of this as recession  
13. gets worse and worse, unemployment rises and so forth. But, every  
14. day I have people coming into my office saying - the Public Aid  
15. people tell me that we're not eligible for aid, I can't find a  
16. job or I've got x amount of income, which happens to be a very  
17. small amount, and they just simply cannot get by. Sometimes  
18. these people are senior citizens, at other times, they are a  
19. forty year old head of a household with two or three children.  
20. So what I'm really saying is, Mr. President and members of the  
21. Senate, is that senior citizens in this day and age are having  
22. it very tough, but they're not the only ones. And I think this  
23. amendment would broaden tax relief to that lower middle income  
24. or just the lower income persons to the point where there would  
25. be more people eligible. There would be more people who are able  
26. to get some relief from their taxes. I don't know what a . . .  
27. what we're going to be able to do at the State level, overall,  
28. to help the unemployment picture or to help the underemployment  
29. picture, which is probably almost as bad in my area as un-  
30. employment is, but I think this is the beginning, this is a start  
31. to broaden this base of tax relief for more than just seniors  
32. to include everybody who has a limited amount of income. Thank  
33. you.



1. PRESIDENT:

2. The Chair has recognized Senator Knuppel, Senator Soper,  
3. Senator Carroll and Senator Hynes, all on this motion. Senator  
4. Knuppel.

5. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

6. I agree with Senator Rock. These people have asked for a  
7. bill similar to this. I've introduced one for each of the last  
8. two Sessions. I assume, now, that these people who generally  
9. speak with the Governor and for the Governor, with his support,  
10. the old Senate Bill 118 and 119, that I introduced two Sessions  
11. ago, will go right on through, just like the slide . . . are agreed  
12. that at least I'll count on eight votes on this side of the aisle.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Soper.

15. SENATOR SOPER:

16. Mr. President and members of the Senate, I rise to oppose  
17. this amendment. We're going to give senior citizens a relief  
18. that we desire to give them. I don't think we ought to get this  
19. all fuzzed and mixed up with the proposition of a . . . of this  
20. tax burden that we say we have on people who can't afford to pay  
21. sales tax. When we can't afford to relieve the whole sales tax  
22. of a hundred and forty-seven million dollars, if you want to have  
23. no taxes at all, I'd suggest that we just put through a bill and  
24. nobody pay any taxes, that's about as responsible as this amendment.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Carroll. Senator Carroll.

27. SENATOR CARROLL:

28. Thank you, Mr. President. I, too, rise to oppose this  
29. amendment. I think what I see happening here is, though maybe  
30. unintentional, an attempt to scuttle a very worthwhile and  
31. necessary program. Many of us have worked long and hard for  
32. Senior Citizen Tax Relief. Many of us, in addition to that,  
33. have those people within our districts who are of the income

1. levels, in general, that they too need some type of a relief.  
2. We know that. When we read a Governor's Message that vetoes  
3. a piece of legislation that may have been as much as thirty-  
4. four million, probably as low as twenty million, in expenses  
5. to our State and see people trying to tack on a program of a  
6. hundred and fifty million, I think they're just inviting him  
7. to use that pen to veto once again. These programs that are  
8. proposed now do have quite a bit of merit and if we can afford  
9. them, we need to help that segment of our society. However,  
10. I would think that an appropriate and responsible approach  
11. would be to offer separate legislation, not to allow the Governor  
12. to use this ruse to veto this essential Senior Citizens Tax  
13. Relief. I would ask the sponsor to withdraw the amendment  
14. and offer it as a separate piece of legislation so that we can  
15. get about our business.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Hynes.

18. SENATOR HYNES:

19. Mr. President, the comment has been made that . . . the  
20. present Senate Bill 62 does not provide needed tax relief across  
21. the board. That is obviously true, it is not intended to do that.  
22. It is an effort to provide relief for a specific class of persons,  
23. namely the senior citizens of this State, individuals that I think  
24. are entitled to that kind of consideration and relief. The same  
25. commentary that followed the offering of this amendment could have  
26. been made with respect to the Circuit Breaker Law that is already on  
27. the books, and in numerous other programs that are in operation. But,  
28. I think the . . . the point is that we are dealing with a program for  
29. senior citizens and that's what it should remain. This amendment  
30. will cost a minimum of one hundred million dollars, and, in fact,  
31. will bring about the defeat of this bill. We know, at this point,  
32. that the State is in a fiscal position to afford this program as  
33. originally introduced. We knew that in December when we passed it,

1. we know it now. We've had testimony to that effect. We cannot,  
2. at this early stage in the Session, pass an additional one  
3. hundred million dollars of tax relief without getting the latest  
4. and most accurate projections, as to State Revenue, without seeing  
5. what other new programs are going to be introduced. We have not  
6. yet seen the Governor's Budget Message. We know that the existing  
7. program in Senate Bill 62 is within the capability of the State.  
8. I'd like to make one further point, and I. . . I'd like to reduce  
9. it to simple terms because very often legislative procedure tends  
10. to obfuscate what is really happening. It tends to mislead the  
11. average person who is not familiar with what is going on. To  
12. reduce it to its simplest terms, a vote in favor of this amendment  
13. is a vote to kill Senior Citizens Tax Relief for this Session,  
14. and it's that simple, no other explanation has any substance at  
15. all. A vote in favor of this amendment will bring about the  
16. ultimate defeat of this proposal in this General Assembly. So,  
17. I would urge every member of this Body to vote No, on this  
18. amendment.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Wooten.

21. SENATOR WOOTEN:

22. I really want to respond to some allegations which have been  
23. made, since I intend to support this amendment. I am amazed that  
24. people can look into other people's minds and read their motivations  
25. that clearly. It seems to me that not only the operations of this  
26. process, but human life, itself, admits of far more complexities  
27. than that. If you persist in taking a simpleminded approach to  
28. life, I believe that your solutions will always be on that level.  
29. The reason that I am supporting this, without, I must confess,  
30. much hope of success is because I suspect that by addressing  
31. this matter now, and there have been good arguments seduced to  
32. dire. . . to addressing it now, I feel that we are not going  
33. to have an opportunity to address the subject of tax relief

1. realistically at any point in the 79th General Assembly. As-  
2. I have said before, I feel that the economics that we face in  
3. '75 are going to, in a large measure, preclude any opportunity  
4. to deal with any kind of tax relief realistically. This seems  
5. an opportunity to make a good try at it. I certainly accept  
6. that I may be wrong in my judgements, but I think the least I can  
7. request and insist on from my colleagues is the same courtesy I  
8. extend them, and that is, that thy judgements are the product of  
9. my own thinking.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Graham.

12. SENATOR GRAHAM:

13. Mr. President and members, I think the obvious is clear.  
14. I'm surprised that the Governor and the sponsor didn't realize that  
15. we would realize what they're up to. You know, this reminds me  
16. of the television program that has a tape that after they get  
17. their instructions, it self-destructs. That's what this amendment  
18. does. If we adopt it, it self-destructs. The only thing it does  
19. is destruct this bill. I urge our people on this side of the aisle  
20. to give this the decent burial that it so rightly deserves.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Any further discussion? Senator Johns.

23. SENATOR JOHNS:

24. Mr. President, I think an element's been admitted here that  
25. is not really relevant. I don't think the Governor had any part  
26. in this, but I do have some questions about Amendment 2. If you  
27. remember, Comptroller Lindberg said that the ability to pay for  
28. the Senior Citizens Act, which we propose here today, hinges on our  
29. action on all other legislation, on our priorities, on all other  
30. bills - that's one of the most important things to remember. Mr.  
31. Crabb, in his testimony, stated that part of the senior citizens  
32. problems that is always overlooked and which is why I can't buy  
33. Amendment No. 2, is the fact that senior citizens cannot be and

1. are not included in the job market. They cannot go out and find  
2. jobs as people can in these other categories in Amendment No. 2,  
3. and that's why I would oppose Amendment No. 2. Thank you.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Vadalabene.

6. SENATOR VADALABENE:

7. Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I  
8. wholeheartedly agree with those who are opposing this amendment.  
9. The time to act is now. The legislation for the senior citizens  
10. has been going around this legislature for over two years. If  
11. there's . . . other types of legislation that they want to add  
12. onto this bill, like Senator Rock said to Senator Netsch, introduce  
13. your own legislation. Let's take care of the senior citizens now  
14. and beat this amendment. Thank you, Mr. President.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Netsch may close the debate.

17. SENATOR NETSCH:

18. Mr. President, the kind of argument that I just heard from  
19. several Senators is exactly the kind of argument that I . . .  
20. suspected might occur, and I want to label it for what it is - phony.  
21. There is no attempt, whatsoever, to kill the concept of Senior  
22. Citizen Tax Relief by proposing this kind of an amendment. I fully  
23. expected someone would make that argument, I resent it and I deny it,  
24. but I am not going to let that stand on the record, and I will,  
25. therefore, withdraw the amendment, but I want to add one thing and  
26. this is just as real as that other comment. If this bill goes  
27. through, in this form, without any recognition of the kind of  
28. tax relief needed by other people, I feel just as strongly that  
29. that, for all time, at least in this next Session, will kill any  
30. possibility of tax relief for other people than the senior citizens  
31. and I think that is very unfair. I'll withdraw the amendment.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator Netsch asks for leave to withdraw the amendment. Is

1. leave granted? Leave. Any further amendments? 3rd reading.

2. SECRETARY:

3. No.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. . . . moment. Senator Harris.

6. SENATOR HARRIS:

7. Well, I just want to make certain that the understanding that

8. Senator Rock and I discussed last week, in which he and I have

9. discussed privately, so that there's no misunderstanding by the

10. Senate. The bill will be recalled to 2nd reading tomorrow for

11. consideration of any serious amendment, and we can have an appro-

12. priate discussion on it at that time. That . . . that is correct,

13. I believe.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Yeah. So the record's clear, we . . . we understand this,

16. and I'll take Amendment No. 2 out of the record, and you now have

17. another amendment?

18. SECRETARY:

19. Amendment . . . Amend . . . Amendment No. 2 . . . .

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Here comes another Amendment No. 2.

22. SECRETARY:

23. Amendment No. 2 by Senator Nimrod.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Nimrod.

26. SENATOR NIMROD:

27. Mr. President, it's my understanding after having presented

28. the amendment to the sponsor that he wants to study this, and we . . .

29. he will call the bill back tomorrow for consideration, being as

30. there was some question that was brought up about it, and . . .

31. and then, we can go ahead and do it at that time. Now, it will

32. then withhold the amendment until tomorrow, if that understanding

33. is clear.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Rock.

3. SENATOR ROCK:

4. Well, I did indicate to Senator Nimrod that I did have a firm  
5. agreement with Senator Harris that prior to calling the bill for  
6. passage, I would, in fact, call it back to 2nd reading to consider  
7. his amendment. If Senator Nimrod wishes to proceed at this time,  
8. however, I am prepared to, as I indicated, resist your amendment.  
9. I can resist it today or tomorrow or whenever.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Nimrod, your pleasure. Which . . . which day do you  
12. prefer to be resisted?

13. SENATOR NIMROD:

14. Well, I only . . . presentation is this is that I think there  
15. is some serious question about it, and I understood the sponsor  
16. wanted some additonal time. And I would be happy to wait until  
17. tomorrow so that he has a chance to study the amendment, and  
18. understand it's ramifications because there really is an unfair,  
19. what we are doing discriminating against the homeowners of senior  
20. citizens. And really I . . . I think it's an oversight in the  
21. preparation of the bill, and I would hope that we would wait until  
22. tomorrow and if you'd like to do it today, I'm just as willing  
23. to do it today, but the . . . the circumstances of the evidence  
24. doesn't change.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Rock, Senator Nimrod has indicated he would prefer  
27. to wait until tomorrow. If that is the . . . thats . . . if there's  
28. no objection there, . . . we'll just withdraw it and . . . and  
29. re-present it tomorrow. Unless . . . unless it's going to be  
30. argued today, then there's no sense in filing it today. We'll  
31. withdraw it, and we'll file it tomorrow when . . . at the next  
32. hearing. Let the records show the amend. . . amendment is  
33. withdrawn, the bill goes to 3rd reading, with the understanding

1. that the bill will come back from 3rd reading to 2nd reading  
2. for this and Senator Harris' amendment. Yes, Senator Nimrod.

3. SENATOR NIMROD:

4. Mr. President, I'm . . . I'm sorry that I'm not sure what  
5. time that will come up. I am going to the funeral tomorrow for  
6. Representative Juckett, and it might come up while I'm not here  
7. and maybe under those circumstances, unless someone else will  
8. present or do something, I think I'd better present it today.  
9. Are we in Session for tomorrow?

10. PRESIDENT:

11. That . . .

12. SENATOR NIMROD:

13. I would hope that we could not be in Session tomorrow, so  
14. that we could all have a chance to go to the funeral of one of  
15. our colleagues, but . . . or else hold a Session late enough so  
16. that we can fly back to . . . to Springfield to be a part of this.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Well, that just hasn't been finalized in terms of a decision  
19. yet, but a lot of that . . . lot of that depends on what . . .  
20. what we do here today. So do . . . so, if you desire, we can go  
21. with your amendment today, if not . . . Amendment No. 2. Senator  
22. Nimrod. For what purpose does Senator Soper arise?

23. SENATOR SOPER:

24. Well, we're talking about Senate Bill 62, aren't we?

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Yes, we are.

27. SENATOR SOPER:

28. The amendment I have here is to amendment . . . amendment to  
29. Senate Bill 63. Now, we're not on 63, we're on 62. Is this your  
30. amendment, Senator Nimrod, amends sixty . . . thirty-five million  
31. to sixty-nine million, is that your amendment?

32. PRESIDENT:

33. No, I think you have the wrong one, Senator.



1. SENATOR SOPER:

2. Oh, I don't have the amendment. I don't know what we're  
3. talking about.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Well, that'll happen again, but they'll bring you the right  
6. one. Senator Nimrod.

7. SENATOR NIMROD:

8. Yeah . . . we might . . . I might ask that's it a very  
9. short amendment as is . . . so if there is a clarification,  
10. I might ask the Secretary might read the amendment, and might  
11. not have to pass it around, but if you do want copies, we'll  
12. have some made.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Amendment No. 2.

15. (Secretary reads Amendment No. 2)

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Nimrod.

18. SENATOR NIMROD:

19. Now, Mr. President and fellow Senators, what this basically  
20. does is to remove that part that increases for renters from  
21. twenty-five to thirty percent. Now, what I would like to do is  
22. to call our attention to a fact that what we are doing here, under  
23. this present bill, is that we have included, as a part of this  
24. renters, is a part of a substitute program which was presented  
25. last time, and only half of that program was adopted. What we are,  
26. in fact, doing is taking that provision from the Senate Bill 81,  
27. which is in now, and you are putting it into this program. What has  
28. happened is that you are not just calling this Sales Tax Relief,  
29. the . . . you are taking the Sales Tax Relief or the amounts to be  
30. given to the senior citizens, then, in addition to that, you are  
31. giving the renters an increased amount, and that was to make up  
32. for the Homestead Exemption, which was being increased in the . . .  
33. and the Circuit Breaker was being increased in the previous bill.

1. But, you are not increasing the Circuit Breaker, so you should  
2. not be increasing the rental allowance, and discriminating against  
3. the homeowners. Now, there's one other problem that this would  
4. present is that the forms for this program, which you're trying  
5. to pass here today, have already gone out to the senior citizens,  
6. and, in fact, we would have to then administer new forms and cause  
7. a great deal of administrative expense for no reason at all, and  
8. this . . . this part of the bill is in Senate Bill 81, and it's  
9. rightly a part of that and that's where this ought to remain  
10. rather than give a double . . . double reduction or a double  
11. advantage to those people who rent and not do the same for those  
12. who own their home or own their property. So, all I'm saying is  
13. that this part, which was added to 2715 last time, was a part of  
14. a substitute program and really should not be a part of this so-  
15. called Sales Tax Relief that you're giving to them. What we're  
16. doing, and again let me call your attention to it, is giving  
17. the renter double the amount of the reduction and not to the  
18. homeowner, and I don't believe that was the original intent.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

20. Senate . . . what's . . . state your point, Senator Buzbee.

21. SENATOR BUZBEE:

22. I'm . . . Mr. President, I'm confused. I cannot find any  
23. amendment that comes anywhere close to what Senator Nimrod's  
24. talking about on my desk.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

26. Is the amendment passed out, Senator?

27. SENATOR NIMROD:

28. Mr. President, I think before we started, I said that it  
29. was a short amendment, and if the Secretary would like to read  
30. it for everyone, he could read it, and we'd explain . . . if they  
31. wanted the copies, we'd be happy to distribute them. But, he  
32. does not have it because they were not distributed, and we will  
33. do it, if that's what he so chooses.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

2. Senator Rock.

3. SENATOR ROCK:

4. Thank you, Mr. President. This is Amendment No. 2, Mr.  
5. Secretary? Thank you. I rise in opposition to this second  
6. Amendment No. 2, and I wish to explain the background and  
7. history and the reason for my opposition, and I hope Senator  
8. Soper is aware back there in the back row. As House Bill 2715,  
9. which was the bill we acted upon last Session, came over from the  
10. House, this provision increasing the renters allow . . . or the  
11. rental increase from twenty-five to thirty percent was not, in  
12. fact, included. It was, however, included at the request of  
13. certain members of the Republican side of the aisle who felt that  
14. this would be a more equitable approach. It was pointed out  
15. to me then, and I will point out to you now that six out of  
16. every seven dollars that is awarded under the Homestead or the  
17. Circuit Breaker is paid to homeowners, in spite of the fact,  
18. as was pointed out to me, that forty-five percent of all seniors  
19. are, in fact, renters. I was persuaded by that argument by  
20. Senator Soper in particular. We have a lot of renters in our  
21. particular districts, and I think the idea was, as amended, to  
22. make the program as equitable as possible for everybody. And  
23. I think an attempt, at this point, to delete that provision is  
24. a self-destruct and I would urge opposition to Amendment No. 2.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

26. Senator Rock moves that Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 62 . . .  
27. oh . . . Senator Nimrod may close the debate of it. Senator . . .  
28. just a moment, Senator. I . . . I see that there is further  
29. debate. Senator Glass.

30. SENATOR GLASS:

31. Well, thank you, Mr. President. I wanted to help . . .  
32. see if I could get some clarification on this amendment and  
33. see if I understand Senator Nimrod's reasoning. Now, as I

1. understand it, looking at the bill on the first page, all  
2. the amendment would do in line 10 would be to change thirty  
3. percent back to twenty-five percent. Is that correct?

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

5. Senator Nimrod.

6. SENATOR NIMROD:

7. That's correct, Senator Glass.

8. SENATOR GLASS:

9. And then your explanation of it is that without providing  
10. that, those who are renters would be getting a double tax benefit.  
11. Is that right? They . . . they have this benefit under the  
12. Senior Citizens and Disabled Persons Property Tax Relief Act  
13. already, and now, they're . . . they're getting it again in this  
14. connection.

15. SENATOR NIMROD:

16. That's . . . that's correct, Senator Glass. They would be  
17. getting it, only the renters would be getting it and not the  
18. homeowners.

19. SENATOR GLASS:

20. Well, I . . . I'd appreciate your response to Senator Rock's  
21. point, because it doesn't seem to make sense to me, that is, if there  
22. are, in fact, fewer renters benefiting from this program because  
23. they don't know about it, I don't see why it would help to leave  
24. this at thirty percent. You would be benefiting those few that  
25. made the claim for relief, they would be getting thirty percent,  
26. but if the problem is getting the renters to apply, I don't . . .  
27. I don't see how this would . . . would help that problem, and it  
28. seems to me what you're doing is . . . is reasonable. I . . . I  
29. think it's hard to . . . to understand without having the other  
30. bill before us.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

32. Senator Nimrod, do you . . . do you wish to close the debate?

33. SENATOR NIMROD:

1. Yes, Mr. President, I would. What we are saying . . .

2. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

3. Just . . . just a moment, Senator. I failed . . . I failed  
4. to recognize Senator Soper. Would you wish to address the Body?

5. SENATOR SOPER:

6. Yes, Mr. President, thank you very much. Senator Nimrod,  
7. you're a very good friend of mine, but I have to oppose this  
8. amendment. We've discussed this thing, we've gone through this thing  
9. and . . . and I think this . . . this amendment would defeat . . .  
10. defeat the aid that would be given to renters, and we found out  
11. through experience, as Senator Rock explained, that the renters  
12. were getting the short end of this stick, and the homeowners,  
13. that we should bring them up to the amount that the homeowners  
14. would . . . would get, and I think it's . . . it's a bad amendment,  
15. and I think it should be defeated.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

17. Is there further debate? Senator Nimrod may close the debate.

18. SENATOR NIMROD:

19. Mr. President and fellow Senators, I do want to again em-  
20. phasize the fact that this item that we are adding in here is  
21. we are causing an inequity. And the reason that, I believe,  
22. Senator Soper originally entered this bill, this amendment was  
23. to take care of the substitute bill, which was being presented.  
24. Only a half of this was accepted. What we are doing is doing  
25. two things here. We are not only giving this so-called sales  
26. tax reduction to all the . . . all the senior citizens on their  
27. income, but then we are also taking the renters and giving them  
28. an additional five percent. And that would amount to what the  
29. Circuit Breaker would be increasing it from fifteen hundred to  
30. . . . to three thousand. So what you're doing, in fact, is  
31. giving the renters an additional hundred dollars. Now, that's  
32. not fair. That's not even the issue that was discussed. If  
33. we are going to increase the Circuit Breaker, and we are going

1. to increase the Homestead Exemption, then we are being consistent.  
2. But you're doing it to part of the people, not all of them. I  
3. don't have any objections to . . . to giving these allowances  
4. because they're already in the same provisions in 81 . . . Senate  
5. Bill 81, which is be . . . is going to be before this group. But  
6. this is not the place to increase it. It's going to cost an  
7. additional six million dollars we're giving to renters, and  
8. if we suddenly find ourselves giving to one group and not the  
9. other. The reason, and of course, the other program is your  
10. forms are already out, you're going to cause a great deal of  
11. administrative programs. This can be accomplished without  
12. having this program, and certainly we should not be passing  
13. discriminatory legislation.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

15. Senator Nimrod moves the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to  
16. Senate Bill 62. All those in favor say Aye. All those Opposed.  
17. The . . . the Noes have it. Is there a request for a roll call?  
18. He is joined by another, I see. The . . . the question is on  
19. the adoption of Amendment No. 2 of Senate Bill 62, shall Amendment  
20. No. 2 be adopted? Those in favor vote Aye. Those Opposed, No.  
21. The voting is open. All voted who wish? Take the record. On that  
22. roll call, the Ayes are eleven, the Noes are thirty-six. The  
23. amendment fails. 3rd reading. Are there further amendments?  
24. Senator Rock.

25. SENATOR ROCK:

26. I am also requesting that Senate Bill 63 be moved to the  
27. order of 3rd reading. I have the same understanding with Senator  
28. Harris that I will, in fact, call it back prior to calling it  
29. for passage.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

31. Is there objection to that? 3rd reading. Secretary will  
32. read the bill. For what purpose does Senator Netsch arise?

33. SENATOR NETSCH:

1. Just to save my conscience. Could I just let the . . .  
2. the transcript record show, I tried to vote No on that amendment.  
3. And my key was not in here and it did not record.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

5. We'll . . . we'll record you . . . we'll make a note of that,  
6. Senator.

7. SECRETARY:

8. Senate . . . Senate Bill No. 63.

9. (Secretary reads title of bill)

10. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments. One Floor  
11. amendment offered by Senator Harris.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWLAD):

13. Senator Harris.

14. SENATOR HARRIS:

15. Well, it . . . I . . . if Senator Rock has had an opportunity  
16. to evaluate it, you would prefer to wait until tomorrow, would you  
17. not? Yes. Okay. Tommorrow.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

19. Well, you . . . you would withdraw that from the present  
20. time, and then, when it's called back, you would then introduce it,  
21. Senator, is that . . .

22. SENATOR HARRIS:

23. That . . . that's correct.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWLAD):

25. That's the understand . . . The Amendment's withdrawn. 3rd  
26. reading. Senate Bills on 3rd reading. Senator Bruce. That's  
27. Senate Bill 17.

28. SENATOR BRUCE:

29. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I would ask  
30. that you briefly follow with me or I would ask that Senate Bill  
31. 17 be recalled to the order of 2nd . . . 2nd reading for the  
32. purpose of an amendment.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

1. Senator . . . Senator Bruce moves to call Senate Bill  
2. 17 to the . . . suspend the rules and recall Senate Bill 17  
3. to the order of 2nd reading. Is there objection? So ordered.  
4. 2nd reading. Senator Bruce.

5. SENATOR BRUCE:

6. Yes, as introduced, Senate Bill 17 creates the Capitol  
7. Development Board Contributory Trust Fund. The amendment will  
8. change, significantly, the bill as introduced. The bill, as  
9. introduced, included all State Agencies and Universities. The  
10. amendment will make four . . . five significant changes. First  
11. of all, it excludes all units of State Government, including  
12. Senior Public Universities from the bill. It stipulates that  
13. funds may not be required from local districts more than thirty  
14. days before the estimated pay out dates. Thirdly, there is a  
15. requirement that Trust Fund proceeds be expended only for the  
16. actual contract let. Fourth, that Builders Risk Insurance  
17. proceeds be used solely to restore the damaged building of project  
18. involved, and fifth, that any funds received as reimbursement  
19. from Federal sources for construction of buildings be deposited  
20. in the Capitol Development Fund. Not the Contributory Trust Fund,  
21. but in the Capitol Bond Development Fund, itself. Now, the  
22. significant changes, I have mentioned, the bill, now, will make  
23. statutory. . . .

24. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

25. Just a moment, Senator. Would the gentlemen over in the  
26. corner, please hold it down a little?

27. SENATOR BRUCE:

28. If there are questions about Amendment No. 2, I would answer  
29. them, otherwise, I would move for the adoption of Amendment No. 2.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

31. Is there further discussion? Senator Rock. He's out of  
32. place, but . . .

33. SENATOR ROCK:



1. I'm out of place is right. I would urge the adoption  
2. of this amendment. It strikes everything after the Enacting  
3. Clause, and in effect writes a new bill. The only request I  
4. would have, Senators, that we hold it until the next day, don't  
5. try not to call it for passage. I . . . I . . . the amendment  
6. is a good one in my judgement and the . . . and the amendment  
7. should be adopted.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

9. Senator Bruce.

10. SENATOR BRUCE:

11. Well, in answer to Senator Rock, the only difficulty is,  
12. Senator Rock, that the statute requires that we reinstitute this  
13. fund within thirty days of the Sine Die Adjournment of the  
14. Legislature. That day runs out the 7th of this month, February  
15. the 7th. That is why the bill, and I apologize, that's why the  
16. bill did not go to committee. It's a significant piece of  
17. legislation. If we hold it one more day, we lose a day in the  
18. House, and I would just as soon get it over there and have their  
19. committee started on it so they could hear it next week and get  
20. it out. The Comptroller has agreed not to close out this fund  
21. and put it in the General Revenue Fund, which will cause us undue  
22. grief with all the school districts.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

24. Is there further discussion? Senator Berning.

25. SENATOR BERNING:

26. Just a point of clarification. I thought I understood  
27. Senator Rock to say that the amendment strikes everything after  
28. the Enacting Clause, and according to what I . . . I'm sorry.  
29. There appear to be several amendments and I have the wrong one.  
30. Where are the rest of them?

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

32. Senator Bruce.

33. SENATOR BRUCE:

1. I think, Senator, you probably have Amendment No. 2 in front  
2. of you, at this point.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

4. Senator Bruce moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 2  
5. to Senate Bill 17. All those in favor say Aye. All those  
6. Opposed. The Ayes have it. Amendment's adopted. 3rd reading.  
7. Oh, strike . . .

8. SECRETARY:

9. Amendment No. 3 offered by Senator Shapiro.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

11. Senator Shapiro.

12. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

13. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,  
14. Amendment No. 3 to Senate Bill 17 tightens up the bill a little  
15. bit further and makes it . . . puts it in much better shape  
16. for our local school districts. It requires that the CDB spend  
17. their share of the construction's funds first prior to the local  
18. districts submitting their funds to the Trust Fund for expenditures.  
19. This will allow local school districts to earn interest longer,  
20. it will help them in the money crunch that most of them are going  
21. through. There will be a small loss in interest earned to the  
22. State of Illinois, but I . . . many of us happen to feel that this  
23. extra interest earned could better accrue to local school districts  
24. than to the State, and I would urge adoption of the amendment.  
25. We have specifically excluded junior college districts from the  
26. provisions of this amendment. And the reason for doing that is  
27. that many of the junior colleges throughout the State have already  
28. entered into agreements or contracts with the CDB that their funds  
29. be spent first, and we didn't want to restrict them from that op-  
30. tion if that's what they choose. So, I would urge adoption of the  
31. amendment, Mr. President.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

33. Senator Glass.

1. SENATOR GLASS:

2. Thank you, Mr. President. I would like to second Senator  
3. Shapiro's comments. I think this is an opportunity for us to  
4. speak in somewhat of a small but important way in favor of our  
5. local school districts. The money that comes from local taxes  
6. that is taken by the CDB early in the construction period and  
7. they hold and have earned interest for them, that just simply  
8. isn't equitable. The local districts, it seems to me, are en-  
9. titled to interest on that money and as Senator Shapiro says,  
10. if it must be deposited, then . . . then let that happen to insure  
11. that it will be there, but the interest earned in fairness ought  
12. to accrue to the benefit of the local district. So, I hope  
13. we'll adopt this amendment.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR DONNEWALD):

15. Senator Bruce.

16. SENATOR BRUCE:

17. Mr. President, I rise in opposition to Amendment No. 3.  
18. I will admit that it certainly has some appeal to it for local  
19. districts. There's not a local district in the State of Illinois  
20. that would not like to keep the money until the project is com-  
21. pleted. However, it does create problems for the State of Illinois  
22. that are unique to them and not to local districts. First of all,  
23. the amendment, and as the bill presently stands, no district in the  
24. State of Illinois will lose more interest than thirty days. I will  
25. admit that the Capitol Development Board has from time to time re-  
26. quested money too early from local contributory districts. But that  
27. has been solved by Amendment No. 2 which states that they cannot  
28. request money more than thirty days before anticipated use. If we  
29. reverse the field, and say that the State will pay its seventy-five  
30. percent share first, and then, the twenty-five percent share, it means  
31. several things. First of all, the State of Illinois will lose  
32. more than two million, seven hundred thousand dollars in interest  
33. in this year. If the Governor's Capitol Program, as proposed, is

1. in effect, we would lose many times that much. The fund has  
2. had as much as nineteen million dollars in it last year. It  
3. presently has four point four million. The difficulty in  
4. bonded construction is that the State, if we say that they will  
5. provide their seventy-five percent first, they will have to sell  
6. the bonds and pay interest on those bonds, whereas, the local  
7. districts may be just contributing local revenue and no bonds  
8. outstanding. They will lose interest for a maximum of thirty  
9. days. The State of Illinois, having issued bonds for the total  
10. construction costs, will lose interest, perhaps, over the entire  
11. period, two to three years in construction. Good bond management  
12. requires that we issue the bonds in small amounts, we use the  
13. twenty-five percent that the local district puts up for site  
14. development, site surveys and architectural fees. If we  
15. put those up and the local district decides not to accept the  
16. bid, not to go ahead with the building, who is going to pay  
17. for those out-of-pocket costs of the State of Illinois. For  
18. all those reasons, the basic sense of fairness. The State of  
19. Illinois is going to pay seventy-five percent of the cost of the  
20. building. I don't think it's asking too much that the local  
21. district come up with their twenty-five percent in the front  
22. end.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

24. Senator Harris. Senator Harris.

25. SENATOR HARRIS:

26. Well, I just want to join in this discussion. What Senator  
27. Bruce had to say is largely just fine, except that in the last  
28. two years, we've had the development of almost arbitrary regulations  
29. out of CDB that did not exist before. And as a result of their  
30. procedural requirements, progress on construction has been delayed  
31. significantly. And I . . . there isn't a one of us that hasn't  
32. been contacted by a local district or a community college district  
33. and expressed to us their extreme frustration. Now, in that period

1. of time, cost exscalations . . . escalations have eaten up whatever  
2. the States earnings are, and I just think that there is some real  
3. value here. We've got an opportunity to do something about it now  
4. and bully for the fact that the State does earn the money on it's  
5. share . . . I mean on . . . on proceeds that it does not immediately  
6. need, but as a . . . as a recognition of the problem that is  
7. resulted from this Capitol Development Board's activities. We've  
8. got an opportunity here to provide for some corrective action to  
9. make up for the delays that have resulted. And I would encourage  
10. the membership, the entire membership to support Senator Shapiro  
11. in this motion that . . . in . . . in this amendment which provides  
12. that the State's share shall be used first. And we all know that  
13. the local districts who exist on property taxes have got far  
14. greater problems about raising their revenues than the State does  
15. which lives primarily on the income and sales tax product, and  
16. they are moving along in a progressive fashion. I think this  
17. amendment makes sense and all of us can easily accept its  
18. principal and provide some relief and not great relief, at that,  
19. but just require the State to get its money up front. I think  
20. it makes sense.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

22. Senator Latherow.

23. SENATOR LATHEROW:

24. Well, Mr. President, I, too, would like to join in support  
25. of this amendment. I have reference to a resolution that I had  
26. in before this Assembly last year concerning a community college  
27. in my district that has waited for years, and I mean that, literally  
28. years for proper action from CDB, and I think it would have been  
29. a . . . would have been a disgrace if this amendment could not be  
30. in effect for that particular occasion.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

32. Senator Hynes.

33. SENATOR HYNES:

1. I wonder if someone could . . . it . . . it may have been  
2. answered, I probably missed it. Could I be given the exact  
3. annual cost of this amendment to the State?

4. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

5. Senator Shapiro, will you yield?

6. SENATOR HYNES:

7. . . . or what the projected cost is?

8. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

9. Senator, indicates he will yield. Senator Shapiro.

10. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

11. Senator Hynes, I really don't think we could come up  
12. with a cost estimate, but I would say that considering a years  
13. CDB bond issue for elementary and secondary and unit schools of  
14. a hundred million the cost to the State in lost interest income,  
15. I could . . . would say would probably amount to two to three  
16. million dollars, considering that the money is going out, it's  
17. not held for the . . . for the full year. I don't think it's  
18. a significant amount of money and I think if the benefits of that  
19. interest lost to the State, which would accrue to the local districts  
20. could benefit them much greater. You also have to take into con-  
21. sideration that the according to the way the Grant Index works  
22. on Capitol construction that the local share in many instances  
23. is as high as eighty percent, whereas the States is only twenty  
24. percent and the local share can go as high as eighty-eight percent  
25. on the grant program, if the local district requires certain  
26. options.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

28. Senator Hynes.

29. SENATOR HYNES:

30. Well, I have a couple of questions. First of all, and if this  
31. is not correct, Senator, perhaps you could enlighten me. The amendment  
32. offered by Senator Bruce, I think removes one of the objections that  
33. have previously existed, namely that the Board would be asking for

1. the money far in advance of the time it would need it. There is  
2. still the problem existing of overly technical requirements on  
3. the part of the Board which delay construction and thereby cost  
4. interest dollars to the local districts. Is . . . is that a  
5. correct assessment of it . . . the . . . the amendment does remove  
6. part of the problem that Senator Harris referred to?

7. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

8. Senator Shapiro.

9. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

10. Senator Hynes, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, even though  
11. we have the thirty day restriction in there in which the Capitol  
12. Development Board cannot call in local share any further in advance  
13. than thirty days, once that money is called in the interest earned,  
14. the interest lost on that particular amount of money is lost for  
15. the entire construction period, which could go a year or year and  
16. a half. So you just can't say they're going to lose thirty days  
17. interest. They could lose a year, a year and a half, two years  
18. interest . . .

19. SENATOR HYNES:

20. . . . no . . . that . . . that was my point, that this  
21. removes part of the problem, the thirty day requirement, the other  
22. part is, delays in construction. Well, the question that I have in  
23. my mind, with respect to this amendment, is simply this; that the  
24. two to three million dollar item is approximately twenty-five  
25. percent of the cost of annual amortization of a substantial  
26. amount of bonding authority, almost a hundred million dollars,  
27. I think, and I just wonder whether that money would not be better  
28. spent in broadening the program so that more districts could  
29. participate. We had the problem in the last Session of the . . .  
30. the bonds that were not authorized or rather that were . . . were  
31. eliminated from the . . . the budget, and we're going to be facing  
32. that again. That is the only question I have. I . . . I, frankly,  
33. would prefer to see this bill on the books without this amendment, and

1. then take a look at, perhaps, a separate bill with the amendment.  
2. I . . . I do not have a hard position on it because I was not  
3. anticipating this amendment, but I do have some . . . some  
4. problems with it.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

6. Is there further discussion? Senator Shapiro may close  
7. the debate.

8. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

9. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, again,  
10. I want to reaffirm all the positive comments made concerning  
11. this amendment, and as was pointed out . . . out, it does lead  
12. to the loss of a considerable amount of interest monies that could  
13. be earned by the local school district, and also take into con-  
14. sideration that there are a lot of start-up costs, initial costs in the  
15. form of architect's fees, site development, site purchase and  
16. the interest lost on that particular amount of money can extend for  
17. a long period of time, and in closing, I would urge approval of  
18. Amendment No. 3 to Senate Bill 17.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

4. Senator Clarke.

5. SENATOR CLARKE:

6. Mr. President, I just spoke to the President of the Senate.  
7. This is a resolution, joint resolution that re-creates the Property  
8. Tax Subcommittee that is, for the last two years, been studying  
9. this subject, of both the House and Senate Revenue Committees. One  
10. of the recommendations of that group is to . . . we got to do a lot  
11. more work. We're going to be coming in with legislation, and this  
12. is to re-create the committee. It's the identical resolution as  
13. two years ago except the dates have been changed. I'd like to  
14. ask for suspension of the rules so that we could have immediate  
15. consideration of the amendment in contact.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

17. Senator Partee.

18. SENATOR PARTEE:

19. Mr. President and members of the Senate, they . . . a lot of  
20. questions have been asked about the schedule and . . .

21. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

22. Senator . . . Senator, excuse me. Senator Clarke was asking  
23. for the immediate consideration of a resolution creating the joint  
24. property tax study information.

25. SENATOR PARTEE:

26. Oh, absolutely.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

28. Okay. Surely. All those in favor of suspension of the rules  
29. indicate by saying Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes have it. The  
30. rules are suspended. Senator Clarke now moves for the immediate  
31. consideration and adoption of Senate . . . Senate Joint Resolution  
32. No. 7. Any discussion? All those in favor of the adoption of this  
33. resolution indicate by saying Aye. All those Opposed. The Ayes

1. have it. Senate Joint Resolution No. 7 is adopted. Senator Partee.

2. SENATOR PARTEE:

3. Now, Mr. President and members of the Senate, there have been a  
4. large number of questions asked, and I felt we may be able to clear  
5. the . . . the air by some explanations in terms of our schedule.  
6. Our schedule had been, what we thought, inflexible but because of  
7. the House situation, we find ourselves having to change it. Now,  
8. the House had said to me last week that they were, on tomorrow, going  
9. to make their committee appointments and assignments. In the intervening  
10. period, one of their members, a young man named Representative Juckett,  
11. just forty-two years of age, passed and as a consequence, it is  
12. my understanding, that they are not meeting at all this week, which  
13. means that they will not be appointing their committee structures

16. will be coming back on the thirteenth, the thirteenth, the day after

18. presentation of the State of the State Message. We'll be here on  
19. the thirteenth and the fourteenth, and after that, we will tell you then  
20. when we'll be back next, but the chances are there will be very  
21. few meetings after the fourteenth before the twenty-fifth of the  
22. month because several of our members will be somewhere else. Well,  
23. I guess . . . you know, you heard about that. Now, so we will be  
24. here tomorrow, and then, we'll be back on the thirteenth at ten o'clock.  
25. The Session tomorrow will start at eleven o'clock. This is to ac-  
26. commodate something that's been requested.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

28. Senator Regner, for what purpose do you arise?

29. SENATOR REGNER:

30. Yes, Mr. President. I'd like to make two announcements and  
31. they both . . . revolve around the House scheduling, and that  
32. is that the Legislative Information Systems Committee scheduled for  
33. tomorrow morning will be cancelled. There'll be further notification

1. of the next meeting of that because we won't have any House members.  
2. And the same holds true for the State Property Insurance Study  
3. Commission which was to meet tomorrow evening, but due to not having  
4. any House members down here, that'll be cancelled also and then  
5. rescheduled at a later date.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

7. Any further announcements. Senators Dougherty or Johns, do  
8. you wish to announce concerning your committees? Senator Dougherty.

9. SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

10. There will be a meeting of the Committee on Local Government  
11. at 2:30 this afternoon in Room 400.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

13. Senator Johns.

14. SENATOR JOHNS:

15. Mr. President, members. There'll be a meeting of the Executive  
16. at 2:30, Room 212.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

18. Senator Harris.

19. SENATOR HARRIS:

20. There will be a Republican Caucus tomorrow morning at 9:00  
21. a.m. in Room M-1. Republican Caucus at 9:00 in Room M-1.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

23. We . . . we do wish to indicate to the . . . your member-  
24. ship, particularly, that we will. . . we are intending to start  
25. immediately at 11:00 o'clock. Senator Bell.

26. SENATOR BELL:

27. Yes, Senator Mohr, Minority Spokesman of Transportation  
28. Committee, is not here on the Floor right now, but I, as a member  
29. of that committee, he has asked for the minority members of that  
30. committee to meet in his office, and I'd like to remind said  
31. members of that committee of that fact. Thank you.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

12. SENATOR BERNING:

13. Point of clarification. Do I understand that there will be

14. no Session on the days of the 18th, 19th and 20th?

15. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

16. Senator ParTEE. The question was will . . . will there or

17. will there not be Sessions on the days of the 18th, 19th and 20th

18. of February?

19. SENATOR PARTEE:

20. Senator, I can't . . . answer your question absolutely

21. directly because I would have to have knowledge of the posture

22. of the House at that time. Assuming all things will go as we

23. expect them to go, it's entirely possible that on the 18th, 19th

24. and 20th we will not have regular meetings of the House or Senate.

25. It is also possible, however, that there will be joint committees

26. of Appropriations meeting during one of those three days on another

27. subject. I . . . I can't tell you precisely.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER (SENATOR ROCK):

29. Any further announcements? Will the members please be in
