23. Senator Glass and I have gone around and around on backdoor
24. referendum, and trying to resolve the whole question of new junior
25. college districts. It appears, in this particular piece of legisla-
26. tion, he has...has been extremely reasonable. It applies only to
27. those districts that are newly created. We've allowed a backdoor
28. referendum in those districts that are created by annexation or by
29. the board. This is if it's a wholly, newly, created district, it
30. would allow them the same option as the other two...types of dis-
31. tricts that are created, and I would support this legislation.

13. SENATOR ROCK:
14. I...I think that bill will appear on the Calendar tomorrow
15. morning. That might be the more appropriate time to make that
16. motion. Then we can hear it tomorrow afternoon.
17. PRESIDENT:
18. Senator Wooten.
19. SENATOR WOOTEN:
20. Mr. President, I think I misunderstood something. I...I'm
21. trying to recall my schedule on committies. It seems to me they're
22. spread out over four days. Have they been reorganized into three
23. days? I'm...I'm afraid I...I don't understand the reference to three
24. days.
25. PRESIDENT:
26. The schedule has not been altered. They are the same days
27. that they were before, in the sequential order that we had them
28. originally. So they've not changed.
29. SENATOR WOOTEN:
30. My question is...
31. PRESIDENT:
32. If you had those on four separate days, it may well have been
33. that you were having a particular committee on more than one day

1. during the...course of the week.

2. SENATOR WOOTEN:

3. No. I...not to my...best of my...I have four committies,
4. and I meet once every four days, as I recall the schedule.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Yes. Well...

7. SENATOR WOOTEN:

8. That...that's why...

9. PRESIDENT:

10. ...that is correct. That is correct, what you are saying.

11. SENATOR WOOTEN:

12. So, I just wanted to know where we go...

13. PRESIDENT:

14. But there are committies...there are committies which meet a
15. great deal less frequently than others. Those which meet less
16. frequently are, perhaps, on that fourth day. We will have the new
17. committee schedule or...or, rather, a schedule here tomorrow so
18. that you can have it before you. In terms of one, two, three or
19. four days. Yes.

20. SENATOR WOOTEN:

21. All right. I...I suppose the simplest thing is just to get out
22. some schedule, but I was thinking in terms of Finance which meets on
23. the morning of the second day, and I wondered where next Tuesday's
24. meeting goes. If it becomes a Wednesday or a Thursday...

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Well, here...

27. SENATOR WOOTEN:

28. ...meeting.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. In as...inasmuch as the first day next week will be Wednesday
31. then the second day, necessarily, would be Thursday. That would be
32. the...the date of that meeting, instead of...

33. SENATOR WOOTEN:

1. But that schedules us with the fourth day, Saturday, and that's
2. what...

3. PRESIDENT:

4. That would mean that there wouldn't be any committee hearings...

5. SENATOR WOOTEN:

6. Okay.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. ...on that day because Saturday is a Perfunctory Session for
9. the introduction of bills only. Senator Rock.

10. SENATOR ROCK:

11. Well, I...I think we're getting our...our weeks mixed up. Now,
12. the reason I asked or one of the reasons I asked for that kind of an
13. announcement is that those committies that were scheduled to meet
14. on Monday afternoon...

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Just one minute, Senator Rock. Senator Wooten, Senator Rock
17. is giving you an explanation to your matter.

18. SENATOR ROCK:

19. ...those committies that were scheduled to meet on Monday after-
20. noon, Tuesday morning and Tuesday afternoon will now, of necessity,
21. have to make some kind of an adjustment, and I would just alert those
22. committee chairmen. The number of bills are piling up everyday. We
23. should, in fact, have a meeting of every committee next week, and I
24. would hope that with the possible exception of Executive Appointments
25. which has already been deferred until the 21st, that during that
26. three day period, every committee will meet and will attempt to
27. accomodate the membership and the...and the Floor schedule.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Would it be in the...would it be the desire of the membership
30. that a chart be drawn for presentation tomorrow morning which would
31. indicate to each member when the particular committies met next
32. week, a week commencing on Wednesday? Senator Donnewald.

33. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

1. Yes, Mr. President. This is the appropriate time, the Director
2. of the Department of Agriculture requested to say that the barbecue
3. for tomorrow evening has been canceled and has been rescheduled for
4. Wednesday, May the 14th.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. And what's taking its place instead, Senator Donnewald?

7. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

8. I have no idea.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Davidson.

11. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

12. Mr. President and members of the Senate, if I could have your
13. attention for just one minute. All of you got a notice from myself
14. in relation to the Governor's Prayer Breakfast and your reservation.
15. You have had a second reservation laid on your desk. I need to
16. know from you, either to myself or to my secretary or to the Chamber
17. of Commerce office no later than Thursday of this week, your reserva-
18. tion and your money in hand. We've been holding two tickets at
19. each table in the forefront of the hall so you'll be down where the
20. action is and be scattered around. We release these tickets as of
21. Thursday evening, and I urge all of you who are going to go to let
22. us know so you can get a ticket. Otherwise, next week you take your
23. chances back in the far end of the room. Thank you.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Merritt.

26. SENATOR MERRITT:

27. Mr. President and members of the Senate, while we're on the...

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Just...just one minute, Senator. Just one minute. Now, if the
30. members desire conferences with non-Senators, please just step off
31. the Floor so we can have some order, please. Senator Merritt.

32. SENATOR MERRITT:

33. Mr. President and members of the Senate, while we're on that

1. subject of schedules. You were kind enough, previously, to give us
2. schedules that have now been adjusted for next week through the week
3. of the 21st of April. I wonder in order that we can accomodate our-
4. selves best, both here in Springfield and back in our offices at
5. home, if we could get the schedule beyond that at an early date?

6. PRESIDENT:

7. As has been my custom, Senator, you will have that. You will
8. have that in ample time to make preparations for all those things
9. that are near and dear to you. Senator Mitchler.

10. SENATOR MITCHLER:

11. Mr. President and members of the Senate, I would like to re-
12. mind the Senators that the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Department of
13. Illinois is sponsoring their annual dinner for the legislative mem-
14. bers in Springfield tonight, April 8th, at the Holiday Inn East.
15. Cocktails start at 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m., and dinner will be served
16. at 7:00 p.m. The Senators and Representatives do not need a ticket.
17. You are guests of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Department of
18. Illinois, and Bob McMahon, the Department Commander and Frank Rice,
19. the Department Legislative Director would like a fine attendance
20. to meet the members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars from throughout
21. the State who will be in attendance to greet and meet with you.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Rock.

24. SENATOR ROCK:

25. Thank you, Mr. President. I wonder if we might now move to the
26. order of...

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Rock, continue.

29. SENATOR ROCK:

30. Thank you. I...I wonder in...in partial answer, at least, to
31. Senator Merritt's question with respect to the remaining part of the
32. month. The Senate has adopted a rule as an amendment to Senate Rule
33. 5 which calls for the final day for passage of Senate Bills in committee

1. for May 2nd. So, I would fully expect that from the week of April
2. 26th to May 2nd, we will be in all five days and will have to adjust
3. the committee schedules depending upon how many bills are in each
4. committee and how long they will have to meet. In that respect,
5. Mr. President, I'm advised that there is a Message from the House
6. which contains House Joint Resolution No. 30, and I would ask that
7. that be read, and that that matter be considered right now.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Is there a Message here from the House? Message from the
10. House.

11. SECRETARY:

12. A Message from...A Message from the House by Mr. O'Brien, Clerk.

13. Mr. President - I am directed to inform the Senate that
14. the House of Representatives has adopted the following Preamble
15. and Joint Resolution, in the adoption of which I am instructed to
16. ask the concurrence of the Senate, to-wit:

17. House Joint Resolution No. 30.

18. Would you like this read, Senator Rock?

19. PRESIDENT:

20. It's on the members desk. Has the Resolution been placed on
21. the members desk? Thank you. Senator Rock. For what purpose does
22. Senator Netsch arise?

23. SENATOR NETSCH:

24. To direct a question about Senate Joint Resolution 30.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. To Senator Rock I take it.

27. SENATOR NETSCH:

28. House Joint Resolution 30.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. He indicates he'll yield.

31. SENATOR NETSCH:

32. Does it also include the section on suspension of temporary
33. rules?

1. PRESIDENT:

2. What was the question?

3. SENATOR NETSCH:

4. Is part of the...of House Joint Resolution 30, the part on the
5. second page that deals with suspension of rules.

6. SENATOR ROCK:

7. Yes, the...the resolution is as passed out. It's a substitute
8. House Joint Resolution No. 30 sponsored by Representative Hart which
9. passed the House, and what it does is embody the schedule which we
10. have already adopted as the...an amendment to Senate Rule 5, and it
11. in effect locks the House into the same schedule that the Senate has
12. already adopted. Section 2 does, in fact, allow for suspension of
13. these joint...temporary joint rules, and...and it requires the
14. affirmative roll call vote of three-fifths of the members elected to
15. each House.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Netsch. Just a moment. Would you gentlemen here move
18. your conference off the Floor. Senator Netsch.

19. SENATOR NETSCH:

20. I would like to call attention to one effect of that part of
21. House Joint Resolution 30. If I read it correctly, at the present
22. time, it would lock in for some considerable period of time the
23. three-fifths vote requirement that is now in our temporary rules
24. having to do with, if I may mention the subject, ratification of
25. Federal Constitutional Amendments. I...I think if you read it, Mr.
26. President, that is exactly what it does do.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Netsch, Senator Rock wants to answer the question.

29. SENATOR NETSCH:

30. I...I would like an answer. Thank you.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. And these are joint rules that you are alluding to now, not the
33. Senate Rules at all. Senator Rock.

1. SENATOR ROCK:

2. Yes, I think the...you know, that we can probably quibble about
3. the wordage but it does, in fact, the caption is suspension of joint
4. rules, and the paragraph does refer to these temporary rules which
5. I read to mean these temporary joint rules. And the further reso-
6. lution clause says that these temporary joint rules shall be super-
7. ceded and this Joint Resolution shall be repealed upon the adoption
8. of permanent joint rules which I hope we will get to shortly.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Netsch.

11. SENATOR NETSCH:

12. Then I have your assurance that the suspension provision that
13. is in this House Joint Resolution refers only...requires a three-
14. fifths vote only with respect to suspension of these joint rules
15. that are reflected in here, and not to any other rules that the
16. Senate is abiding by under its own provisions and procedures at the
17. present time. Is that correct?

18. PRESIDENT:

19. That is correct for the reason that that is what it says. Any
20. further discussion on this question? Senator Glass.

21. SENATOR GLASS:

22. Mr. President, just a question of Senator Rock who made reference
23. to the fact that he hoped that we would get to the joint rules soon,
24. and I wondered if there is any timetable as to when we can expect
25. to act on those.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Rock.

28. SENATOR ROCK:

29. Well, there have been members of...of both the Senate and the
30. House who have been meeting in conference, members of the Senate
31. Rules and House Rules Committee, and I would expect that their work
32. product would be before us, hopefully, by the end of the month.
33. Now, we're still quibbling about certain aspects of it, but I would

1. expect by the end of the month. I would move, Mr. President, that
2. we...for the suspension of the rules for the immediate consideration
3. of House Joint Resolution No. 30.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. You heard the motion. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed. The
6. rules are suspended. Senator Rock now moves for the immediate con-
7. sideration and adoption of this resolution. All in favor will say
8. Aye. Opposed. The resolution is adopted. Introduction of bills.
9. Senator Harris.

10. SENATOR HARRIS:

11. Well...

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Pardon me. Senator Harris, could you hold it just one moment.
14. Senator Soper has been giving me the friendly wave. Senator Soper.

15. SENATOR SOPER:

16. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. Senate
17. Bill 64 was posted for hearing in Judiciary about two weeks ago
18. and was continued because all bills were continued. Now, I see
19. that it hasn't been posted again. I'd like to have it put back
20. so we can hear it this Thursday in Judiciary. I don't find Senator
21. Daley here. I tried to talk to him about it, and I know he's not
22. opposed to having it heard. I think it was inadvertently left...
23. left off the list. I'd like to have it put back on and if it
24. takes a motion, I'll make the motion and be put...put on for hear-
25. ing on...on this Thursday at the regular time the committee meets.

26. PRESIDNET:

27. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Harris.

28. SENATOR HARRIS:

29. I wanted to inquire. Senator Weaver will have an announcement
30. in just a few minutes. How much more business do we have before
31. us?

32. PRESIDENT:

33. It is...it is de minimis. We have a...

1. SENATOR HARRIS:
2. Okay.
3. PRESIDENT:
4. ...few resolutions and...
5. SENATOR HARRIS:
6. Okay.
7. PRESIDENT:
8. ...then we can let the rest of the bills be read in the
9. absence of the membership.
10. SENATOR HARRIS:
11. That...that was the point. I thought maybe we ought to get
12. the work done that needs our presence and then get to introduction
13. of bills as the last measure and we could have, I'm sure, consent
14. to recess as far as the Republicans are concerned and proceed with
15. that order of business.
16. PRESIDENT:
17. That...that's the procedure contemplated. Do we have leave to
18. move to the order of resolutions? Leave is granted. Resolutions.
19. SECRETARY:
20. Senate Resolution 46 introduced by Senator Demuzio. It's
21. congratulatory.
22. SENATOR DEMUZIO:
23. Mr. President and members of the Senate, this is a congratulatory
24. resolution, and it's recognizing Grace Wiggins of Palmyra who has
25. been chosen as the first lady in the...in the State of Illinois and
26. the eleventh in the United States among a hundred and fifty thousand
27. volunteer workers nominated in...in competition sponsored by the
28. National Center for Voluntary Action in Washington. And I would ask
29. for...
30. PRESIDENT:
31. Senator Demuzio moves for the suspension of the rules for the
32. immediate consideration and adoption of this resolution. All in favor
33. say Aye. Opposed. The resolution is under consideration. Senator
34. Demuzio now moves for the immediate adoption of this resolution. All in

1. favor will say Aye. Opposed will say Nay. The resolution is
2. adopted.

3. SECRETARY:

4. Senate Resolution 47 introduced by Senators Welsh, Mitchler
5. and all members. It's congratulatory.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Mitchler.

8. SENATOR MITCHLER:

9. This is a congratulatory resolution, Mr. President and members
10. of the Senate, for Grace Osborn who is a resident of Oak Park,
11. Illinois, and she was elected National President of the American
12. Veterans of World War II Auxiliary at the 28th Annual National
13. Convention in 1974. Grace Osborn, together with the National
14. Commander of the AMVETS, were in Springfield today and hosted at
15. a luncheon this noon. And, inasmuch as Grace Osborn is a resident
16. of Oak Park, I would ask leave of the Senate to have Senator Welsh as
17. ...shown as the lead sponsor on this Senate resolution. I would ask
18. for suspension of the rules and immediate consideration and adoption
19. of the resolution.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Mitchler moves for the immediate...for the suspension
22. of the rules for the immediate consideration of this resolution.
23. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The rules are suspended.
24. Senator Mitchler now moves for the immediate adoption of this
25. resolution. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The resolution
26. is adopted.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Senate Resolution 48 introduced by Senator Mitchler and all
29. Senators. Congratulatory.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Mitchler. We're in the two hundred series, now, are
32. we, Senator? Senator Mitchler.

33. SENATOR MITCHLER:

1. Mr. President and members of the Senate, this is a congratulatory
2. resolution for Essley B. Burdine of Decatur, Georgia, who was
3. elected the National Commander of the American Veterans of World
4. War II at the 30th Annual Convention held in Hollywood, Florida
5. in 1974. I would ask that all Senators join in sponsorship of this
6. resolution. Ask for suspension of the rules, immediate con-
7. sideration and adoption of the resolution.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Mitchler moves for the suspension of the rules for the
10. immediate consideration of this resolution. All in favor will say
11. Aye. Opposed. The rules are suspended. Senator Mitchler now moves
12. for the immediate consideration of this resolution. All in favor
13. will say Aye. Opposed Nay. And please add all the Georgia Senators,
14. also. Resolution is adopted.

15. SECRETARY:

16. Senate Resolution 49 introduced by Senator Bell. It's proclaiming
17. the week of April the 6th as Life Insurance Week.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Did you say wife insurance or life insturance? Senator Bell.

20. SENATOR BELL:

21. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. As the Secretary mentioned, this
22. is the week of Life Insurance Week, nationally, and I...might ask,
23. Mr. President, that the Secretary read the resolution for the
24. immediate consideration and suspension of the rules for the adoption
25. of the resolution.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. I have objection to that. Senator Harris is anxious to get
28. somewhere, and this will be in the Journal when printed. If you
29. insist on its being read, we'll do that. But I think your party
30. is anxious to leave the Floor for another purpose. But if you
31. want it read...

32. SENATOR BELL:

33. Well...

1. PRESIDENT:
2. ...and incur the wrath of all of them, we'll read it.

3. SENATOR BELL:
4. ...if I could...if I could get to it then first thing tomorrow,
5. I guess.

6. PRESIDENT:
7. Take it out of the record.

8. SECRETARY:
9. Senate Resolution 49 introduced by Senators Egan and Glass,
10. and it's congratulatory.

11. PRESIDENT:
12. Senator Egan.

13. SENATOR EGAN:
14. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. This is
15. a congratulatory resolution congratulating the Northbrook Spirit
16. Blues who won the American Hockey Illinois State Championship on
17. March 16. I would ask leave for the suspension of the rules for
18. the immediate adoption of the resolution.

19. PRESIDENT:
20. The motion is for the suspension of the rules for the immediate
21. consideration of this resolution. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed
22. Nay. The rules are suspended. Senator Egan now moves for the
23. immediate adoption of this resolution. All in favor will say Aye.
24. Opposed Nay. The resolution is adopted. Is any further business
25. to come before the Senate? Senator Weaver.

26. SENATOR WEAVER:
27. Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to request a Republican
28. Caucus in Room 400 immediately after adjournment.

29. PRESIDENT:
30. Any other announcements. Has the Chair leave to read into
31. the record the bills remaining for introduction? So that the
32. Secretary and his staff can proceed with them tonight with the
33. understanding that at the close of the reading of these bills,

1. the Senate will then stand in adjournment until 11:00 o'clock
2. tomorrow morning. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator
3. Harris.

4. SENATOR HARRIS:
5. Yeah, I just want to emphasize the announcement...

6. PRESIDENT:
7. Just...just one minute, Senator.

8. SENATOR HARRIS:
9. Yeah.

10. PRESIDENT:
11. Gentlemen, we will be through here in just a moment. There are
12. things you'll be asking that are taking place now. Would we just have
13. some order, please. We will be through in just a moment, and you may
14. continue your conversations ad infinitum. Senator Harris. No...no,
15. go ahead. I...

16. SENATOR HARRIS:
17. Well, I was just a little fearful that some of the members may
18. not have heard Senator Weaver's announcement. We are going to have
19. a Republican caucus immediately. The President has sought leave of
20. the Senate to proceed with the...matter of introduction of bills
21. after which those remaining could adjourn. In the meantime, the Re-
22. publicans will recess for a caucus in Room...(Machine cut-off).

23. PRESIDENT:
24. We will return to the order of introduction of bills. The Body
25. will have the understanding that at the conclusion of the reading of
26. these bills, the Senate will recess and stand in adjournment until
27. 11:00 o'clock tomorrow morning. Introduction of bills.

28. SECRETARY:
