15. Well, Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege for the  
16. purpose of an announcement since we've had this break. I have in  
17. my desk the Senate schedule which is a revised schedule which...which  
18. relates to...it's a revised schedule which relates to our activities  
19. commencing Monday, June 2nd and taking us through Friday, June 13th,  
20. which is the final day to get the House Bills out of committee. It  
21. is necessarily revised because when we took account of the bills that  
22. are here, we must necessarily change the plan we had. At the present  
23. time, as of May 24th, there were seven hundred and ninety-two bills

16. some quality in the passage of bills. I, for one, and speaking only  
17. for one, don't want to be any part of addressing ourselves to numbers  
18. of bills just because there are numbers. I think that this Senate  
19. is going to have to form itself into a deliberative body that we  
20. have been considered to be, perhaps set up a Committee on Rules to  
21. do something with some of these bills, but for goodness sake, fellows,  
22. I don't think the membership in this Senate is going to dedicate  
23. themselves to eighteen hours a day just to handle bills in the mag-  
24. nitude of the bills regardless of quality, quantity I'm not so dis-  
25. turbed about. And I'm only speaking for one Senator.

28. SENATOR CLARKE:

29. Mr. President, I have conveyed my views to both Senator Partee  
30. and Speaker Redmond, but I'd just like to comment, as I said before  
31. about three weeks ago, that I am far more concerned with the quality  
32. of what we legislate down here than I am with the quantity, and I  
33. want to second the remarks of Senator Graham, that last week when the

1. American...or Chicago Heart Association was down here and offered an  
2. opportunity, only about twenty-six of the fifty-nine Senators went  
3. in and had their blood pressure taken, and I think that's a shame  
4. when they offer that kind of opportunity. I think it's most impor-  
5. tant that we look at the caliber of these...this legislation rather  
6. than having to address ourselves to the quantity of all of the bills  
7. that anyone of a hundred and seventy-seven or two hundred and thirty-  
8. five members of this Legislature introduced. I don't feel I have  
9. that kind of responsibility and I'm going to vote No on a lot of  
10. these bills.

10. a Class A misdemeanor. Now, previously, those guilty of dog fight  
11. promotion were guilty of a petty offense. This bill makes the  
12. penalty a Class A misdemeanor for the first offense and a Class 4  
13. Felony for any subsequent offense. I might point out that we did  
14. have Senate Bill, I believe it was 173, sponsored by Senator Hynes,  
15. I believe, did...did pass this Body. This bill is a very similar  
16. bill. I'd be glad to answer any questions relating to the bill, and  
17. I would ask for a favorable roll call.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Is there any further discussion? The question is shall House  
20. Bill 54 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The  
21. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We're on 3rd reading,  
22. Gentlemen. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this  
23. question, the Ayes are 41, the Nays are none, 2 Voting Present.  
24. House Bill 54 having received a constitutional majority is declared  
25. passed. House Bill 59, Senator Knuppel. Read the bill.

32. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

33. This...this bill allows one or more counties to go together...



1. it's two or more counties to go together and pool their resources  
2. for a jail. In downstate Illinois where we have small communities,  
3. the expense of maintaining a jail is sometimes an exorbitant thing  
4. when a criminal is going to be in jail for a...an extensive period  
5. of time. I know that, for example, in a small county, they may have  
6. as many as only five hundred and some total jail days in a year.  
7. They have to maintain a jailer twenty-four hours a day, a cook  
8. and all the rest of the facilities. This will allow the counties  
9. under the new Constitution to combine these facilities and to save  
10. some money for the counties. It's good legislation for small counties.  
11. PRESIDENT:

12. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate...shall  
13. House Bill 59 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Opposed Nay. The  
14. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this

16. House Bill 59 having received a constitutional majority is declared  
17. passed. House Bill 80, Senator Berning. For what purpose does  
18. Senator Hynes arise?

19. SENATOR HYNES:

20. Mr. President, I was off the Floor when House Bill 54 was  
21. called, and I would like the record to reflect that I supported the  
22. bill and would have voted Aye had I been on the Floor.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. The record will so show.

25. SECRETARY:

26. House Bill 80.

27. (Secretary reads title of bill)

28. 3rd reading of the bill.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Berning.

31. SENATOR BERNING:

32. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. House  
33. Bill 80 seeks to resolve a problem that confronts very few municipi-

1. palities, and it would allow a municipality in townships or road  
2. districts in which there is presently a prohibition against the sale  
3. of liquor and to eliminate such prohibition within the corporate  
4. limits of the municipality after a referendum. Currently a prohibi-  
5. tion against the sale of liquor may be enforced in any municipality  
6. or any township after a referendum by the electorate, and the  
7. statutes are unclear on the question of whether a township may  
8. enforce a prohibition, such a prohibition, within a municipality. This  
9. bill would clarify the law in relation to...to the repeal of the  
10. prohibition in those municipalities in dry townships. Ladies and  
11. Gentlemen, the only instance I really know where this applies is in  
12. my own township and my own village, many years ago, concurrently,  
13. the village and the township voted to go dry. Now, the Village of  
14. Deerfield would like to, by referendum at least, make the effort to  
15. go...allow the sale of liquor without affecting the township provi-  
16. sion in the unincorporated area. If there's any question, I'll  
17. attempt to respond. I would appreciate a favorable roll call.

18. PRESIDENT:

19.        Any further discussion? The question is shall House Bill 80  
20. pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed Nay. The voting is  
21. open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question,  
22. the Ayes are 39, the Nays are 2, 2 Voting Present. House Bill 80  
23. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed. House  
24. Bill 91, Senator Berning. Hold. House Bill 114, Senators Knuppel  
25. and Johns. House Bill 118, Senator Knuppel. Read the bill.

26. SECRETARY:

30. PRESIDENT:

31.        Senator Knuppel.

32. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

33.        Senate Bill 118 does just exactly what it says it will do, and

1. that...that is to require that when a notice is required to be  
2. published that it be within the municipality where there...where  
3. there is a publication rather than in some other part of the county,  
4. so that the real requirements of notice will be served. The purpose  
5. of requiring notice is to put it where people will see it and not  
6. to hide it in some other newspaper in some other county. This bill  
7. was amended to leave out Cook County where you have your law...law,  
8. whatever that is, your lawyer's thing where they publish all notices.  
9. PRESIDENT:

10. Any further discussion? The question is shall House Bill 118  
11. pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Opposed Nay. The voting is open.  
12. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question, the  
13. Ayes are 47, the Nays are none, none Voting Present. House Bill 118  
14. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed. House  
15. Bill 158, Senator Knuppel. House Bill 173, Senator Rock. Read the  
16. bill.

17. SECRETARY:

18. House Bill 173.

19. (Secretary reads title of bill)

20. 3rd reading of the bill.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator Rock.

23. SENATOR ROCK:

24. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.  
25. House Bill 173 is an...amendment to the Unemployment Compensation  
26. Act, suggested and supported by the Office of Unemployment Comp. In  
27. those instances where there has, in fact, been erroneous payment and  
28. the Department is allowed to recoup those amounts erroneously paid. It  
29. was felt that it works a hardship to recoup a hundred percent. So,  
30. this bill provides that no more than fifty percent of the individual's  
31. weekly benefit can be recouped at one time. The bill has the unani-  
32. mous support of the Illinois Manufacturers Association and the State  
33. Chamber of Commerce and the Office of Unemployment Comp. I know of no

1. objection. I would seek a favorable roll call.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Any further discussion? The question is shall House Bill 173

4. pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed Nay. The voting is

5. open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question,

6. the Ayes are 49, the Nays are none, none Voting Present. House

7. Bill 173 having received a constitutional majority is declared passed.

8. House Bill 192, Senator Don A. Moore.

9. SECRETARY:

10. House Bill 192.

11. (Secretary reads title of bill)

12. 3rd reading of the bill.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Don Moore.

15. SENATOR MOORE:

16. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. House Bill

17. 192 increases the death benefits payable in the event a National

18. Guardsman or a Naval Militiaman is killed while on active duty, from

19. the present ten thousand to twenty thousand. This brings the death

20. benefit in conformity with the death paid to firemen and policemen

21. while killed in performing their duties. It has the approval of the

22. Election Laws Commission. I'd appreciate a favorable roll call.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Buzbee is recognized.

25. SENATOR BUZBEE:

26. A question of the sponsor.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. He indicates he'll yield.

29. SENATOR BUZBEE:

30. Does this pertain just to...while they're on active duty in the...

31. in...for the State of Illinois or is it...then if Federal called up,

32. would they also receive this?

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Moore, Don Moore.

2. SENATOR MOORE:

3. It amends Section 3 which reads as follows - that the claim  
4. therefor is made within one year of the date of the death of a  
5. guardsman or militiaman. Compensation in the amount of twenty thou-  
6. sand shall be paid to the person designated by the guardsman or  
7. militiaman killed while on duty. I think it applies whether it's in  
8. Illinois or out, either way, Senator.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Buzbee.

11. SENATOR BUZBEE:

12. I would just point out that when they're in Federal Service,  
13. of course, they have the...the Federal Group Insurance. I've for-  
14. gotten the exact name of it, but for about three dollars a month,  
15. they are also covered for twenty thousand dollars of life insurance  
16. while they're in Federal Service. So, we're talking about potential  
17. forty thousand dollars here then for State Guardsmen while they're  
18. in Federal Service.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Don Moore. Any further discussion? The question is  
21. shall House Bill 192 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed  
22. Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the  
23. record. On this question, the Ayes are 46, the Nays are none, none  
24. Voting Present. House Bill 192 having received a constitutional  
25. majority is declared passed. House Bill 218, Senator Wooten.  
26. Read the bill.

27. SECRETARY:

28. House Bill 218.

29. (Secretary reads title of bill)

30. 3rd reading of the bill.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Senator Wooten.

33. SENATOR WOOTEN:

1. Mr. President and colleagues, Representative Shea's bill is  
2. identical to Senate Bill 24 with one exception. The scholarships  
3. may be taken at private colleges, however, we may not spend more for  
4. that than we would at a comparable community college, and I think  
5. that we went through this rather thoroughly the first time around.  
6. If there are any further questions, I'll be glad to answer them.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Shapiro.

9. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

10. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, just a  
11. few brief comments because this bill has been discussed before and  
12. passed out favorably. I do oppose the bill. It is practically the  
13. same as the other bill, other than it does include private colleges.  
14. The cost is greater, about three hundred thousand dollars a year. It  
15. does not provide for any administrative or overhead costs that the  
16. Scholarship Commission may have. I oppose it on the basis that I  
17. think our middle income families and students who deserve help should  
18. not have to join the National Guard in order to get a scholarship.  
19. This gives the National Guardsmen a greater benefit than those veterans  
20. that we give scholarships to, in that it allows him to go to college  
21. four full years. In other words, he can go as a part-time student or  
22. a full-time student, take as long as he can, whereas a veteran has  
23. four...four calendar years in which to complete his education, and I  
24. would urge a defeat of the bill.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Any further discussion? Senator Glass.

27. SENATOR GLASS:

28. A question to the sponsor, Mr. President.

29. PRESIDENT.

30. He indicates he'll yield.

31. SENATOR GLASS:

32. Senator Wooten, it was my recollection that Senator Sommer's  
33. amendment added to your bill, put it in the same form as this one,

1. that is that there was a grant also for private colleges but with a...  
2. with a cap on it. Is that correct?

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Wooten.

5. SENATOR WOOTEN:

6. The bill as it came from the House, Senator, had that provision  
7. in it, and we did adopt Senator Sommer's amendment saying this would  
8. only apply to enlisted men.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Any further discussion? The question is shall House Bill...  
11. pardon me, Senator Berning. Do you desire recognition?

12. SENATOR BERNING:

13. Thank you, Mr. President. I, too, would like to echo the state-  
14. ments of Senator Shapiro. This is opening it up again, and adding  
15. to the financial costs that the State must assume. I would say that  
16. this is a measure, in spite of its laudable intent for a very special  
17. group of people, is not warranted and we ought to reject it.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Any further discussion? Senator Buzbee.

20. SENATOR BUZBEE:

21. I thought it was a bad bill before, and I think it's a worse  
22. one now.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Nimrod.

25. SENATOR NIMROD:

26. Mr. President, a question from the sponsor. I just wanted to  
27. confirm whether or not this does apply to part-time students.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Wooten.

30. SENATOR WOOTEN:

31. A guardsman may exercise his option under this bill to go part-  
32. time or full-time.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Mitchler.

2. SENATOR MITCHLER:

3. I didn't intend to speak on this, Mr. President and members of  
4. the Senate, but we passed a very similar bill out of this Body. You  
5. want to realize that these National Guardsmen are your first line of  
6. defense, and when you put an investment into these young men and women  
7. by providing an education for them, you're investing in the future  
8. of the country. And I believe that an investment in those who are  
9. willing to serve in the military in the National Guard, the men and  
10. women that do so, so honorably, certainly should be given this educa-  
11. tional opportunity, and the fact that you're extending this into the  
12. private school sector, the private colleges and universities, is good  
13. because they do have seats available, and these colleges that are  
14. private are located near to where the National Guardsmen and Guards-  
15. women are located, and that they can avail themselves to the oppor-  
16. tunity to go to school. Nothing has been better than the GI Bill that  
17. has done so much to educate so many, and I know many of you in this  
18. very room attended universities and colleges under the GI Bill and  
19. I think that we should extend this to the National Guardsmen during  
20. the peace time that we're experiencing now. I'd urge a favorable  
21. vote on this bill.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Any further discussion? Senator Bell.

24. SENATOR BELL:

25. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I...I feel very strongly in  
26. reference to the point that Senator Mitchler has made, and so I'm  
27. not going to amplify on those, but many of you have heard of the con-  
28. cept of...of VOLAR, that's Volunteer Army Concept, that is the concept  
29. today that...that, in fact, does provide our...our first line of...of  
30. defense. I think that this particular bill will continue to strengthen  
31. the position of the reserve capacity, the minuteman capacity that is  
32. being so relied upon by the United States, and that the State of Illi-  
33. nois through its National Guard plays a principal role in that



1. particular capacity. There has to be, in my humble opinion, some way  
2. to encourage young men to step forward and to shoulder those arms  
3. on a state-wide basis to supply the necessary military power not only  
4. to this nation but the response to the needs of the civic communities,  
5. and the various flood projects and much of the good work that goes on.  
6. Quite frankly, Gentlemen, there is very little enticement in many,  
7. many ways to cause young men and young women to want at this day and  
8. time to serve their country. I think this is a good bill. I think  
9. it's something that will encourage young people to step forth and to  
10. assume this obligation, and I would certainly solicit your support  
11. for Senator Wooten's bill.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Wooten may close the debate.

14. SENATOR WOOTEN:

15. Just to answer briefly three misstatements from Senator Shapiro,  
16. this will not cost more than Senate Bill 24. It does not really give  
17. a preference to those who are in the National Guard. They must work  
18. their way through, and middle class kids are not required to do this,  
19. but given the facts of life, Gentlemen, this may be the one real oppor-  
20. tunity they have to work their way through school, and I ask for a  
21. favorable roll call.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. The question is shall House Bill 218 pass. Those in favor will  
24. vote Aye. Opposed Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?  
25. Take the record. On this question, the Ayes are 37, the Nays are 11,

25. Senator Rock.
26. SENATOR ROCK:
27. A question of the sponsor, if he will yield, Mr. President.
28. PRESIDENT:
29. He'll...he indicates he'll yield.
30. SENATOR ROCK:
31. Senator, our file indicates that there was to be an amendment
32. with respect to liability or possible liability. Is that...I...I just
33. don't have a copy of it.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Shapiro.

3. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

4. Senator Rock, we placed the amendment on there, and it includes  
5. in the cost, insurance premiums.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Any further discussion? The question is shall House Bill 224  
8. pass. Those in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The voting is open.  
9. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the  
10. Ayes are 38, the Nays are none, 1 Voting Present. House Bill 224  
11. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed. House  
12. Bill 228, Senator Rock. Read the bill.

13. SECRETARY:

14. House Bill 2...228.

15. (Secretary reads title of bill)

16. 3rd reading of the bill.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Rock.

19. SENATOR ROCK:

20. Thank you...thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen  
21. of the Senate. House Bill 228 in the Senate is an amendment to the  
22. School Code, and what it does is clarify the right of teachers or  
23. certified personnel to maintain discipline on the school grounds.  
24. Apparently there had been some questions as to whether or not the exist-  
25. ing provision in the law appertained only to the school building  
26. itself. This makes it clear that it applies also to the school grounds  
27. adjacent to the school. I know of no opposition. I would urge a  
28. favorable vote.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. The question is shall House Bill 228 pass. Those in favor will  
31. vote Aye. Opposed Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who  
32. wish? Take the record. On this question, the Ayes are 47, the Nays  
33. are none, none Voting Present. House Bill 228 having received a

1. constitutional majority is declared passed. House Bill 271, Senator  
2. Egan.

3. SECRETARY:

4. House Bill 271.

5. (Secretary reads title of bill)

6. 3rd reading of the bill.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Egan.

9. SENATOR EGAN:

10. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. Senate  
11. Bill 271 creates the Rape Victim Emergency Treatment Act, a piece of  
12. legislation which is long overdue. This bill requires hospitals to  
13. furnish emergency hospital service to rape victims in accordance with  
14. rules and regulations adopted by the Department of Public Health. The  
15. minimum requirements that...that are established are governed by the  
16. Department of Public Aid. The bill originally had some objection  
17. from private hospitals, some of which are in my district. Those hos-  
18. pitals have been satisfied by an amendment to the bill. I know of  
19. no opposition to this legislation. I know it passed the House with  
20. a very substantial vote, and I would ask for your favorable considera-  
21. tion.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Bell is recognized.

24. SENATOR BELL:

25. Thank you, Mr. President. I might point out that the Senate  
26. took action in reference to Senate Bill 470, which was almost identical  
27. legislation as to Senate...or House Bill 271. I think the signifi-  
28. cant difference here, Senator Egan, between what we passed out of the  
29. Senate and what has come over to us from the House, is the fact that  
30. Senate Bill 470, which did essentially the same thing, did not in any  
31. way call for State financing or State monetary commitment of any par-  
32. ticular sort. As I understand it under House Bill 271, that in fact  
33. is now the case. Members of the Senate, I subscribe to you that this

1. is an essential difference between these two bills, and the bill  
2. that we passed out from the Senate does the same thing. It says  
3. that the State is in no way responsible for funding these treatment  
4. centers. House Bill 271, in fact, does incur a State monetary obli-  
5. gation. I'm not against the bill. I was the principal sponsor of  
6. House...or Senate Bill 470, but I think that this is an essential  
7. difference. I think that the costs should be borne by the communities  
8. involved, by those specific hospitals that have been designated, and  
9. I don't believe the State of Illinois should be called on to provide  
10. the monetary costs necessary. So where normally I would support this  
11. bill, this is an essential difference and one in which I cannot  
12. support it, and so I will vote Present on this bill. — — —

13. PRESIDENT:

14. For what purpose does Senator Rock arise?

15. SENATOR ROCK:

16. Well, Mr. President, I apologize to the sponsor and to the  
17. members of the Senate. I did, in fact, have an amendment ready for  
18. this bill, an amendment identical to the one upon...I placed upon  
19. Senator Bell's bill, and I would at this time request of the sponsor  
20. that he ask leave to call it back to 2nd for the purpose of that  
21. amendment.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Egan.

24. SENATOR EGAN:

25. If I may, Mr. President, I would ask to take it out of the record,  
26. return it to the order of 2nd reading for the purposes of amendment.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Take it out of the record. Is there leave? Leave is granted.  
29. 2nd reading. Senator Egan. Senator Rock, rather.

30. SENATOR ROCK:

31. Thank you, Ladies and Gentlemen...Mr. President and Ladies and  
32. Gentlemen of the Senate. Amendment No. 1 is identical to that which  
33. I placed on Senator Bell's bill, and it merely adds a new section, and

1. the section reads - nothing in this Act shall be construed to  
2. require a hospital to provide any services which relate to an  
3. abortion. That's all it does. We want to make it quite plain  
4. that we are not requiring or suggesting to hospitals that while  
5. we're mandating emergency treatment for rape victims, it has  
6. nothing whatever to do with an abortion. I would urge its a-  
7. doption.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Wooten.

10. SENATOR WOOTEN:

11. Senator Rock, just a...a question that occurred to me when  
12. this came up before. How narrowly are you construing the term  
13. abortion? It seems to me that one of the regular treatments in  
14. a rape victim would be at their request the application of a sperm-  
15. icide or something which would have that effect. Would that be  
16. ruled out with this amendment?

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Rock.

19. SENATOR ROCK:

20. No, no it would not.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. The question is shall Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 271 be  
23. adopted. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it.  
24. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? 3rd reading.  
25. Now, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I think it is now 2:30.  
26. There are three committees set to start at 2:30, so I think we can  
27. not go farther today. There...I'll ask if there are some...unless  
28. there are some motions. The Chair has a motion with reference to  
29. Senate...House Joint Resolution 18, which is a Motion for...in Writing  
30. which should appear on Page 24 which is not on the Calendar but which  
31. is set for today. The Chair moves that that motion be continued for  
32. hearing Until June 17th. Is there leave? Leave is granted. One final  
33. bill that we'll...we've...we'll just finish Senator Egan's bill and  
then we'll go to our committee hearings. Read the bill a third time.

1. SECRETARY:
2. House Bill 271.
3. (Secretary reads title of bill)
4. 3rd reading of the bill.
5. PRESIDENT:
6. The question is shall House Bill 271 pass. Those in favor will
7. vote Aye. Opposed Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
8. Take the record. On this question, the Ayes are 38, the Nays are
9. none, 4 Voting Present. House Bill 271 having received a constitu-
10. tional majority is declared passed. Senator Schaffer is recognized.
11. Senator Schaffer.
12. SENATOR SCHAFFER:
13. On a point of personal privilege.
14. PRESIDENT:
15. State your point.
16. SENATOR SCHAFFER:
17. We have had a little drawing up at the President's podium a
18. moment ago to see who goes up in the balloon, and we did...it was
19. on the up and up, and Senator Partee did the honors, and...and the
20. name of the Senator who was drawn to go up in the balloon is none
21. other than Senator Morris.
22. PRESIDENT:
23. Purely accidental.
24. SENATOR SCHAFFER:
25. With Senator...with Senator Knuppel on standby.
26. PRESIDENT:
27. Purely accidental also. Senator Weaver is recognized.
28. SENATOR WEAVER:
29. Mr. President, I would ask leave of the Senate to be shown as
30. the principal sponsor of House Bill 600 and 601. I talked to Senator
31. Dougherty and he agrees.
32. PRESIDENT:
33. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Soper.

1. SENATOR SOPER:

2. Yes, I would advise Senator Morris, if anybody gives you a pack-  
3. age, don't open it up when you're in the...in the balloon.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Morris.

6. SENATOR MORRIS:

7. Well, I'll feel safe going up in that hot air balloon since I  
8. know that with the full House and the full Senate here today, there  
9. ought to be plenty of hot air to keep it full.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Philip.

12. SENATOR PHILIP:

13. Thank you, Mr. President. I have an announcement to make. I'd  
14. like to remember...remind the members...

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Just...just a minute, now. Let's have some order so you can  
17. hear these announcements. You'll be asking...

18. SENATOR PHILIP:

19. Yes, the Senate-House baseball game is tonight at 6:00 o'clock.  
20. I would hope the Senate members will be out at the field at 5:30.  
21. It's at Sixth and Ash. Also, I'd like to make the announcement, we've  
22. ...we've got the great privilege of having Steve Schickell with WGN TV  
23. is going to be our announcer, so let's get out there and give the  
24. team some support.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Newhouse, did you seek recognition? Senator Weaver.

27. SENATOR WEAVER:

28. Mr. ...Mr. President, I have spoken to Senator Donnewald in the  
29. assignment of bills. He...

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Just a minute. Just a minute. Just a minute. We're going to be  
32. here a couple of minutes. What he's talking about now, you'll be ask-  
33. ing somebody in three minutes. Senator Weaver.

1. SENATOR WEAVER:

2. I would just ask leave to have House Bill 1109 taken from  
3. Executive and...assigned...reassigned to Local Government. I've  
4. talked to Senator Donnewald about it, and he...he agrees.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Buzbee, did you  
7. seek recognition? Any further announcements? Any further business  
8. to come...Senator Nimrod.

9. SENATOR NIMROD:

10. Mr. President, just a point of personal privilege. My seat-  
11. mate...

12. PRESIDENT:

13. State your point.

14. SENATOR NIMROD:

15. ...My seatmate here to my left, this gift that was on his  
16. desk here was received from his three secretaries, and that was for  
17. his birthday yesterday. I thought we might recognize James as being  
18. twenty-nine today, Senator Philip.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Philip is now twenty-nine, very good. Not true. Any  
21. further announcements? Any further business to come before the Senate?  
22. Senator Rock. The Senate will stand adjourned until 9:00 o'clock  
23. tomorrow morning. Just a minute. Just a minute. The committees  
24. ...you're right, get me the Calendar. The Chair just announced that  
25. the Session will commence tomorrow morning at 9:00. That is an error  
26. because there are committee hearings in the morning at 8:00. The  
27. Senate will adjourn until 10:00 o'clock tomorrow morning.
