1 Third reading. 526, Senator Graham. Senator Graham, for what...
2 Senator Graham.

3 SENATOR GRAHAM:

4 Mr. President and members of the...Mr. President and members
5 of the Senate. In the Committee on Elections last week we adopted
6 an amendment. After the joint staff had scrutinized this amend-
7 ment we found it to be technically incorrect, I, therefore, insofar,
8 insomuch as the primary date is being moved up, it makes it more
9 technically incorrect. I am asking then that amendment adopted...
10 adopted in the committee be Tabled and I want to submit another
11 amendment which is correct.

12 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

13 Alright. Read the bill. 526, Mr. Secretary.

14 SECRETARY:

15 House Bill 526.

16 (Secretary reads title of bill)

17 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Elections and

25 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

26 Senator Graham.

27 SENATOR GRAHAM:

28 Actually, this amendment does... is simply this. Since the
29 primary date is going to be moved up, it looks as though, and
30 insofar as our original amendment had...

31 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

32 Hold it. Can we have some order? This is a very significant
33 amendment. Senator Graham.

1 SENATOR GRAHAM:

2 had...precluded people that signed primary petitions from
3 circulating or any other petitions of any other party. This
4 amendment would simply do this. It amends a sentence which will
5 prohibit an individual from circulating or certifying petitions
6 of candidates of another party and will provide further that
7 Independents, Republicans and Democrats will all file on the
8 same date and I move its adoption.

9 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

10 Senator Graham moves the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to
11 House Bill 526. Senator Wooten. Senator Wooten.

12 SENATOR WOOTEN:

13 ...Is the filing on the same date the provision that was in
14 the original amendment, Senator?

15 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

16 Senator Graham:

17 SENATOR GRAHAM:

18 The original amendment had some technically incorrect lang-
19 uage. We find that there is no longer...the provision is no
20 longer necessary which prohibits and prevents individuals who
21 voted in the primary from signing petitions for Independents be-
22 cause the primary...the moving of the primary date will preclude
23 that necessity. This only states that they shall not sign or
24 circulate petitions for more than one party and that they all
25 file on the same date.

26 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

27 Senator Wooten.

28 SENATOR WOOTEN:

29 I just wondered...I didn't recall that that was something that
30 we had discussed on the filing of the same date and all that, but,
31 in other words, we're dealing with the substance of what we dis-
32 cussed and the amendment, we're just making it technically correct.
33 Is that it?

34 SENATOR GRAHAM:

1 And putting it in conformity with what we assume will be the
2 law with regard to the change of the primary date.

3 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

4 Any further discussion? Senator Graham moves the adoption
5 of Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 526. All those in favor signify
6 by saying Aye. All those opposed. The Ayes have it. The amend-
7 ment is adopted. Any further amendments? 3rd reading. 532,
8 Senator Kosinski, 532. Is Senator Berning on the Floor? Senator
9 Kosinski, Senator Berning is not on the Floor. He does have an
10 amendment...he does have an amendment. Can we...wait till he
11 gets back? We'll get back to it. O.K. 537, Senator Bell, 537.

12 SECRETARY:

13 House Bill 537.

14 (Secretary reads title of bill)

15 1st...or 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

16 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

17 Any amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. 542, 554, Senator
18 Graham. Yes, 554, Mr. Secretary.

19 SECRETARY:

20 House Bill 554.

21 (Secretary reads title of bill)

22 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

23 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

24 Any amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. 582, Senator
25 Palmer. 600, Senator Weaver. House Bill 600.

26 SECRETARY:

27 House Bill 600.

28 (Secretary reads title of bill)

29 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Local Government
30 offers one amendment.

31 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

32 Senator Weaver.

33 SENATOR WEAVER:

34 Move its adoption.

1 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

2 Senator Weaver moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House
3 Bill 600. All those in favor signify by say Aye. All those
4 opposed. The Ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. Any further
5 amendments? 3rd reading. We'll go back now to Senate Bill...I
6 mean House Bill 532, Mr. Secretary.

7 SECRETARY:

8 House Bill 532.

9 (Secretary reads title of bill)

10 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments. One Floor
11 Amendment offered by Senator Shapiro.

12 PRESIDENT:

13 Senator Shapiro.

14 SENATOR SHAPIRO:

15 Mr. President, this amendment...is an agreed one and it merely
16 inserts a date of July 1st, 1975, on which the...the annuity shall
17 be based rather than current salary. I would urge its adoption.

18 PRESIDENT:

19 Any further discussion? Senator Shapiro moves the adoption of
20 Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 532. All in favor say Aye. Opposed
21 Nay. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? 3rd
22 reading. House Bill 601, Senator Weaver. Read the bill.

23 SECRETARY:

24 House Bill 601.

25 (Secretary reads title of bill)

26 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Local Government
27 offers one amendment.

28 PRESIDENT:

29 Senator Weaver.

30 SENATOR WEAVER:

31 I move its adoption.

32 PRESIDENT:

33 Senator Wooten.

1 SENATOR WOOTEN:

2 ...If I may, Senator, just a matter of course, even though
3 no one may be listening, could you just...just give us a hint to
4 what it's about?

5 PRESIDENT:

6 Just a moment. One moment. Senator Weaver may explain the
7 amendment.

8 SENATOR WEAVER:

9 This is the Home Rule Amendment on this and also on 600,
10 Senator Wooten, the Home Rule Amendment.

11 PRESIDENT:

12 Any further discussion? Senator Weaver moves the Adoption of
13 Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 601. Those in favor will say Aye.
14 Opposed Nay. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?
15 3rd reading. Senator Weaver.

16 SENATOR WEAVER:

17 There should be one Floor Amendment on the Secretary's Desk.
18 It merely capitalizes the word "notice".

19 PRESIDENT:

20 Leave is granted...granted to remove...return the bill from
21 3rd reading back to 2nd for the purpose of an overlooked amend-
22 ment, Amendment No. 2. Senator Weaver moves the adoption of Amend-
23 ment No. 2 to House Bill 601. Those in favor will say Aye. Opposed
24 Nay. The Ayes have it. Amendment No. 2 is adopted. Any further
25 amendments? 3rd reading. House Bill 623, Senator Savickas.
26 Read the bill.

27 SECRETARY:

28 House Bill 623.

29 (Secretary reads title of bill)

30 2nd reading of the bill, no committee amendments.

31 PRESIDENT:

32 Any amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. House Bill 650.
33 Senator Hickey. Read the bill.

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1 SECRETARY:

2 House Bill 650.

3 (Secretary reads title of bill)

4 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments. Two Floor
5 Amendments. One offered by Senator Hall. No. 1 offered by
6 Senator Harber Hall, No. 2 by Senator Hickey.

7 PRESIDENT:

8 Amendment No. 1. Senator Harber Hall. Just a moment.

9 Just a moment. May we have some order, please? Senator Har-
10 ber Hall's recognized.

11 SNEATOR HARBER HALL:

12 Mr. Speaker. This amendment to the strikebreaker's bill
13 includes professional pickets, as included in the prohibition.
14 I think in previous General Assemblies we've always tried to
15 include professional pickets along with strikebreakers, on a
16 matter of equity and last year, as a matter of fact, the Labor
17 and Commerce Committee did agree to pass this bill from the
18 Committee so long as it included professional pickets into the
19 prohibition. So I think it's a good amendment and I would
20 move adoption.

21 PRESIDENT:

22 Senator Savickas.

23 SENATOR SAVICKAS:

24 By professional pickets, Senator, do you mean recognized
25 union employees, people that are international organizers, that...

26 PRESIDENT:

27 Just one moment, just one moment. One moment. Now. This
28 is one of the most important questions that ever come before this
29 Body. When you go home they'll be asking about it and you'll say,
30 I didn't know it was there. Now, let's be in our seats, please.
31 Senator Savickas.

32 SENATOR SAVICKAS:

33 Well, Mr. President, I'd like to ask the sponsor a question.

34 PRESIDENT:

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1 He indicates he'll yield.

2 SENATOR SAVICKAS:

3 Senator, by professional picket, do you mean someone that is
4 employed by a union that is...hired as an organizer and in many
5 cases hired to perform informational pickets to let the people know
6 union policies? Is this what you're trying to prevent a union from
7 using their own people even though they are not employed immediately
8 in this particular concern from picketing?

9 PRESIDENT:

10 Senator Harber Hall.

11 SENATOR HARBER HALL:

12 Yes, I would point out that it would be the employer that would
13 be...would be failing or not required to hire anyone who was paid
14 as a member of an organization with the responsibility to coordinate,
15 organize and call for strikes. I think the...if there's any mis-
16 understanding in the phraseology, it's no more so with this amend-
17 ment than it is with the bill itself as regarding strikebreakers.

18 PRESIDENT:

19 Senator Savickas.

20 SENATOR SAVICKAS:

21 Well, I would beg to differ with Senator Hall. In many cases
22 the unions when they have international organizers, these organizers
23 travel throughout the country for the...for the benefit of the union
24 for the organizational possibilities for informational picket lines,
25 they are performing a vital function to the unions on behalf of all
26 of the employees and, to prevent them from using...since they are
27 registered and registered as organizers as professional informers
28 with the unions and with the government, I think that this would
29 impair any...any unions' ability to negotiate to organize and I would
30 ask that our members oppose this amendment.

31 PRESIDENT:

32 Senator Wooten.

33 SENATOR WOOTEN:

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1 Mr. President, also in opposition to the amendment, I point
2 out that the language of the amendment is "any person or group of
3 persons commonly regarded as professional pickets". I'm not a lawyer,
4 but I am sure that that will provide much employment and action
5 for lawyers since it is rather imprecise language. I would urge
6 that we defeat this amendment.

7 PRESIDENT:

8 Senator Hickey.

9 SENATOR HICKEY:

10 Thank...thank you, Mr. President and Senators. I would...I rise to
11 oppose this amendment as I have said to Senator Hall. Could we
12 have some order?

13 PRESIDENT:

14 Senator Morris, would you be in your seat? Would the gentle-
15 man move to the side? The lady can't hear.

16 SENATOR HICKEY:

17 I can't hear myself.

18 PRESIDENT:

19 I can understand that. Senator Hickey.

20 SENATOR HICKEY:

21 As...as I have already said to Senator Hall, I feel that this
22 introduces an alien matter into a bill which is designed to talk
23 about strikebreakers and I think that if he wants this kind of
24 legislation before the Assembly, he should introduce a bill say-
25 ing so, and have it...have it debated on its own merits as a
26 separate subject, and I...I would urge all of the people on both
27 sides of the aisle to resist the amendment.

28 PRESIDENT:

29 Any further discussion? Senator Harber Hall...Senator Graham.

30 SENATOR GRAHAM:

31 Well...I think that Senator Hall is trying to do something here
32 which is fairly important to a lot of people. Now, the organized
33 strikebreaker in many areas are those knowing to be those type of

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1 people. Inject into a labor dispute, the kind of an environment and
2 the kind of muscle that is not conducive to good living, wherever it
3 happens. I think that Senator Hall's intention here is to protect
4 our various areas from that type of...of...engagement by those who
5 do this professionally, regardless of how much disaster they cause
6 in a neighborhood or an area when they come in and I think that...
7 we'd be...we'd do well to support this...the amendment that's offer-
8 ed by Senator Harber Hall.

9 PRESIDENT:

10 Senator Fawell.

11 SENATOR FAWELL:

12 Well...briefly, I wanted to respond to Senator Hickey's comments
13 that this was not relevant. As I read the bill, and I'm no expert
14 in this area of labor disputes, but the definition of professional
15 strikebreaker is, "that any person or persons who repeatedly, habit-
16 ually offer themselves for employment on a temporary basis" other
17 words, you're bringing in outsiders, and I can concur with the logic of...
18 of...of that type of a...of a definition. It...it isn't very solid,
19 but it is about as good as I suppose one can get. On the other hand,
20 Senator Hall is coming right back and saying, alright, we ought not
21 to have outsiders insofar as the union is concerned, too, and we're
22 not talking about union organizers, people who are employed perma-
23 nently on the basis of being an organizer for the union, we're talk-
24 ing about professional pickets, the people who are brought in here
25 and their only job is to put the signs on their shoulders and march
26 back and forth and they do this from, I suppose, plant to plant.
27 What's fair is fair. I...I don't suppose that anybody is going to
28 change their minds on this.

29 PRESIDENT:

30 Well, just a minute. Could we have some order, please? Now,
31 if the conversation at the back here is about finished, I'd ask
32 the members to be in their seat and bid adieu to your friends.

33 Senator Fawell.

34 SENATOR FAWELL:

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1 Thank you, Mr. President. I...I guess what I'm really saying
2 is that...that at least, I think, give us credit for having some-
3 thing that's relevant. You may disagree, and I...I'm sure the
4 union has some very sterotyped ideas here just as business has
5 sterotyped ideas but the relevancy is just glaring. I don't see
6 how anyone can say that there is not relevancy involved here.

7 PRESIDENT:

8 Senator Glass.

9 SENATOR GLASS:

10 Thank you, Mr. President. I would...would just briefly comment
11 in support of this bill and remind the membership that a similar
12 bill was, in fact, passed by this Body the last Session. It...it
13 does what I consider equity, because if we're going to penalize
14 the professional strikebreaker...certainly the professional
15 picketer employed for that purpose ought to be circumscribed as
16 well. I think it's a good amendment.

17 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

18 Senator Hall is recognized. You may close the debate.

19 SENATOR HALL:

20 You mean close?

21 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

22 Yes, Sir.

23 SENATOR HARBER HALL:

24 No other...no other's talking on the question. Well, I'm
25 glad we had some discussion on this this morning because it is the
26 topic of many editorials and interest throughout the State. I think
27 when we introduce a bill that provides particular strength to
28 one side of bargaining rights and limits it to the other side, that
29 it is not a really what we want to do. We want to aid in the
30 total program of negotiation, I hope that's what we want to do.
31 In referring to a Chicago Tribune editorial of today, it says,
32 the writing for the majority, Justice Powell said that the immunity
33 from antitrust laws granted to labor under the Clayton Act of 1914
34 and...several later laws was limited to dealings between a union

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and Remedy
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1 and the company with which it was negotiating to allow a union to
2 force a stranger or third party to engage in a boycott, he said,
3 would be to grant union an almost unlimited organizational weapon
4 and that's what we're trying to do with Senator Hickey's Bill. We
5 want to give them a weapon without the other side a proportionate
6 affect. I am merely saying, if we're going to prohibit hiring
7 strikebreakers then we ought to prohibit the hiring of pickets them-
8 selves. There are such things, I presume, without being an author-
9 ity on it, and I certainly am the first to recognize that, I pre-
10 sume there are people who in the interest of the union are paid and
11 do travel from one company to another. I merely say they should not
12 be hired and be out on the picket line. Now, if you think they
13 should, then vote against my amendment. I suggest it's a fair and
14 equitable way to treat this bill; it pertains to the bill; it's a
15 matter at issue with the bill, and I solicit your support for this
16 amendment.

17 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

18 Senator Hall moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House
19 Bill 650. All those in favor say Aye. All those opposed say Nay.
20 Noes have it. Okay. The Clerk will...I mean no. All...Amendment
21 No. 1 to House Bill 650. All those in favor vote Aye. All those
22 opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
23 Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 28...25, and Nays
24 are 33. The amendment is defeated. Any further amendments from
25 the Floor? Senator Soper wishes to verify the roll call. No?
26 You changed your mind? You withdraw your request? Alright. Amend-
27 ment No. 2 by Senator Hickey. Senator Hickey. For what purpose
28 does Senator Sommer arise?

29 SENATOR SOMMER:

30 Mr. President and fellow Senators. This is a point of personal
31 privilege. Standing in the back there, with his back to us, is
32 former Representative J. Norman Shade who is down here to visit
33 and some of you served with him many years ago.

34 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

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1 Senator Chew is recognized. What's your purpose, Senator
2 Chew?

3 SENATOR CHEW:

4 I'd like to ask permission to waive the six day notice...

5 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

6 I think you're out of...

7 SENATOR CHEW:

8 ruling...

9 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

10 ...order here because the Chair has recognized Senator Hickey
11 for another amendment, Senator Chew, can you...

12 SENATOR CHEW:

13 Go right...

14 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

15 ...can you hold that just for awhile.

16 SENATOR CHEW:

17 Sure.

18 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

19 Okay. Senator Hickey.

20 SENATOR HICKEY:

21 Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment No. 2 restores to the bill
22 something which was taken out of the original, I think because of
23 some awkward language. But to me is a very essential part of the
24 bill, and I would think would appeal both to...to people on both sides
25 of the aisle. The original sponsor agrees that this should be put
26 back in. Let me...let me read it. I think that even Senator Hall
27 will be very much interested in this amendment.

28 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

29 Senator Hickey, just a moment, just a moment. Gentlemen. Now
30 you're starting to increase in tempo in your conversation out there,
31 so, let's hold it down and give this Lady a chance to explain her
32 amendment. Okay, Senator Hickey.

33 SENATOR HICKEY:

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1. It...it restores this language, "This Act shall not apply to any
2. bona fide permanent replacement who is hired while a strike or
3. lockout is in progress but who is not hired solely for the duration
4. of a strike with the intention of leaving that employment upon
5. termination of the strike", that is permanent employees still may
6. be hired during the strike and...both the sponsor and I agree that
7. it was unfortunate that that was taken out originally and this
8. restores it and I would ask for a favorable roll call.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

10. Any questions? Senator Graham. The Chair recognizes Senator
11. Graham.

12. SENATOR GRAHAM:

13. I...I feel that...Senator Hickey has a meritorious amendment
14. here, and we support it.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

16. Okay, discussion? No further...Senator Hickey moves the adoption
17. of Amendment No. 2 to the House Bill 650. All those in favor say Aye.
18. All those opposed say Nay. The amendment is adopted. Any further
19. amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. Senator Chew is recognized.

20. SENATOR CHEW:

21. I'd like permission to waive the six day rule on notification
22. of bills to committee and hear 1594 in...Committee on Transportation
23. today.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

25. Senator Chew, the...the rule has already been given leave, so
26. you have that.

27. SENATOR CHEW:

28. 1594 will be heard today.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

30. 1594.

31. SENATOR CHEW:

32. Thank you.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

I would suggest you advise the Secretary of that committee.

32 is here. Alright, Senate Bills on 2nd reading. Senate Bill 471,
33 Senator Bruce. Yes, Senator Bruce is recognized.

1 SENATOR BRUCE:

2 Yes, Mr. President. I wonder if I would have leave to go out
3 of the order to go 472 then 471; it makes a little more sense.

4 PRESIDENT:

5 Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senate Bill 472 is under
6 consideration. Senator Bruce.

7 SECRETARY:

8 Senate Bill 472.

9 (Secretary reads title of bill)

10 2nd reading of the bill. One Committee Amendment offered by
11 Appropriations.

12 SENATOR BRUCE:

13 Mr. President.

14 PRESIDENT:

15 Senator Bruce.

16 SENATOR BRUCE:

17 Yes, Mr. President. There is a Committee Amendment No. 1
18 which I would now move to Table in lieu of Amendment No. 2 which
19 makes various other changes in the legislation. I move to Table
20 Committee Amendment No. 1.

21 PRESIDENT:

22 Senator Bruce moves to Table Amendment No. 1...Committee
23 Amendment No. 1. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The
24 Ayes have it. Committee Amendment No. 1 is Tabled. Senator Bruce
25 is recognized on Senate Amendment No. 2. Senator Bruce.

26 SENATOR BRUCE:

27 Yes, Mr. President. This is a supplemental appropriation to
28 the community colleges throughout the State of Illinois. Amendment
29 No. 2 will raise the amount in the bill as 5.7...raises that to
30 10.1 million dollars. I would move the adoption of Amendment No. 2.

31 PRESIDENT:

32 Any discussion? We must have a copy.

33 SENATOR BRUCE:

1 I put it down there yesterday, Ken.

2 PRESIDENT:

3 Any discussion on Committee Amendment No. 2? Senator Weaver.

4 SENATOR WEAVER:

5 A question, Senator Bruce. Senator Bruce, I thought that the
6 need was for sixteen million dollars...to meet the formula...

7 PRESIDENT:

8 Senator Bruce.

9 SENATOR BRUCE:

10 Yes, Senator Weaver, there was discussion of sixteen million
11 dollars. The discussion fell through at sixteen million; the ap-
12 proval of everybody, including the Illinois Community College
13 Trustees Association, the Illinois Community College Board, the
14 Illinois Board of Higher Education, have all agreed that 10.1
15 million is a more reasonable figure.

16 SENATOR WEAVER:

17 Well...are we not going to live up to our commitments made
18 last year on the formula?

19 PRESIDENT:

20 Senator Bruce.

21 SENATOR BRUCE:

22 Well, if you would notice in 471, there is an additional four
23 million dollars, for summer term, this summer, and so if you com-
24 bine the 10.1 and 4 million next year, you're very close to the
25 sixteen million dollars that you're discussing. The money, though,
26 would be distributed over two years, rather than one year. We
27 split the summer term beginning in June of '75 and put it in the
28 Fiscal '76 appropriation.

29 PRESIDENT:

30 Senator Hickey.

31 SENATOR HICKEY:

32 Mr. President, I want to support Senator Weaver's position on
33 this. While Senator Bruce says it adds up to the same amount of

1 money, what we're doing by this is negating the formula itself,
2 and I think we need to decide whether we want a formula for...for
3 community colleges or whether we don't, and while I guess at this
4 point, the 10 million may be all that's possible and it's...it's
5 additionally helpful that that other money is coming in, it isn't
6 coming the right way. If we have a formula, just as we have for
7 the common school fund, we have a formula for the community col-
8 leges, and we should honor it. Their enrollment has gone way up
9 this year due to the poor economic conditions in the State, and
10 they should have all that money. Now, they're going to get it,
11 but as a matter of principle, I think that it is...it is not a
12 good thing for us to ignore the formula itself. I will support the
13 motion because at this point, I guess that's all we can do, but I
14 think this is a very serious problem that we realize...we need to
15 realize...

16 PRESIDENT:

17 Just a minute, just a minute, just a minute. Just a minute.
18 Will the members be in their seats? We...we just can't hear. You
19 know it's a very simple thing. I wish you had been here when the
20 Youth Legislature was here. You could hear everybody and everybody
21 was nice. Now, you can finish, Senator. Senator Shapiro.

22 SENATOR SHAPIRO:

23 I...Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I
24 just want to go on record as pointing out that what we are doing
25 here, even though I realize that this is a so-called compromise be-
26 tween the Junior College Board, the Board of Higher Education, and
27 the Governor, that we are reducing the amount of funds required for
28 full funding of the flat grants to our Junior Colleges throughout
29 the State, and in addition, we are perpetuating a built-in defi-
30 ciency that will be coming back to us next Spring, and I want to go
31 on record as saying that even though I am going to go along with
32 this so-called compromise that in no way will it prevent me and I
33 hope, every other member of this Senate, from supporting the defi-
34 ciency that will surely come next Spring because of the action that

1 we are taking here today on 471 and 472.

2 PRESIDENT:

3 Any further discussion? Senator Morris.

4 SENATOR MORRIS.

5 I...I would just like to reiterate what I said the other day about
6 the community colleges in Illinois. I, as Senator Hickey, will sup-
7 port this amendment, but I think that...that we are going to have
8 to start thinking of what our priorities are in this State. It was
9 the Legislature, through action, which created the Community Col-
10 lege System, and is forcing people to join the Community College
11 System. I, for one, happen to believe it is an excellent concept,
12 but I think we ought to consider full funding the community colleges.
13 In Lake County alone, we have 7200 people attending the Community
14 College in our county, it's becoming the major education institution for
15 Northeastern Illinois, since we don't have a State University near
16 by, and I would very much, like Senator Bruce and others who are
17 going to handle appropriations such as this in the future, to con-
18 sider full funding the community college formula. We gave five or
19 six million dollars to the private schools without blinking an eye,
20 but once again we are going to short the community colleges. Re-
21 member the community colleges are creatures we created, and I would
22 like you to think about possibly giving full funding to this Junior
23 College appropriation.

24 PRESIDENT:

25 Any further discussion? Senator Bruce has moves the adoption
26 of Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 472. All in favor will say Aye.
27 Opposed Nay. A roll call has been indicated. All in favor of the
28 adoption of Amendment No. 2 will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay.
29 The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On
30 this question the Ayes are 40, the Nays are 9 with 1 Voting Present.
31 The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments? 3rd reading.
32 Oh, pardon me, yes, 3rd reading. Senate Bill 471, Senator Bruce.
33 Senator Coulson, I hope you appreciate this roll call. The elec-
34 tronic voting is a lot faster. Senator Bruce, 471.

1 SECRETARY:

2 Senate Bill 471.

3 (Secretary reads title of bill)

4 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations
5 offers one amendment.

6 PRESIDENT:

7 Senator Bruce.

8 SENATOR BRUCE:

9 Yes, Mr. President. I would move the adoption of the Com-
10 mittee Amendment No. 1. It sets the appropriation on a sliding
11 scale as I mentioned, there's four million eight hundred ninety-
12 six thousand dollars at a rate of nineteen twenty for summer
13 school, we then go to twenty-one seventy for programs...for vo-
14 cational programs and a seventeen sixty-one formula FTE for non-
15 vocational programs. I would move the adoption of the amendment.

16 PRESIDENT:

17 Any further discussion? Senator Bruce moves the adoption of
18 Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 471. Those in favor will say Aye.
19 Opposed, Nay. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?
20 3rd reading. Will the members be in their seats? Senate Bills on
21 3rd reading. Senate Bill 347, Senator Hynes. For what purpose
22 does Senator Bell arise?

23 SENATOR BELL:

24 I had...a bill on 2nd reading, Senate Bill 2nd reading, and
25 I wanted to do something with before...before we went to Senate...
26 Senate Bills on 3rd reading.

27 PRESIDENT:

28 Fine, I beg your pardon, Senator. Is there leave to return to
29 the order of 2nd reading? Leave is granted. Senate Bill 615 on
30 2nd reading, Senator Bell.

31 SENATOR BELL:

32 Mr. President, I would like to move Senate Bill 615...

33 PRESIDENT:

1 One moment, one moment, Senator. For what purpose does
2 Senator Morris arise?

3 SENATOR MORRIS:

4 On a point of order, I do not believe we can act on Senate
5 Bill 615. I believe Senate Bill 615 is now a Committee Bill and
6 it's improperly listed on the Calendar.

7 PRESIDENT:

8 The motion, I think, is going to re-refer 615 to Committee,
9 Senator.

10 SENATOR MORRIS:

11 Okay.

12 PRESIDENT:

13 Senator Bell.

14 SENATOR BELL:

15 Thank you, Mr. President, that is true. I do want to make that
16 appropriate motion to refer 615 back to the Committee on Insurance
17 and Licensing, be held in Committee.

18 PRESIDENT:

19 Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Bell.

20 SENATOR BELL:

21 Oh, fine, that takes care of it. Thank you, Mr. President.

22 PRESIDENT:

23 For what purpose does Senator Knuppel arise?

24 SENATOR KNUPPEL:

25 While we're on this order of business, I'd like to have leave
26 to suspend the rules and waive the posting and notice on House
27 Bill 1672, 73, 74 and 75 so they may be heard in Executive.

28 PRESIDENT:

29 It is not necessary, Senator. We have waived the rules on all...

30 SENATOR KNUPPEL:

31 Alright.

32 PRESIDENT:

33 Bills until the 13th of June; so the motion isn't necessary.

1. For what purpose does Senator Johns arise?

2. SENATOR JOHNS:

3. Mr. President, I was asking you to call Senate Bill 426; it's

4. very important...

5. PRESIDENT:

6. We'll get to it, Senator, just as soon as we finish 2nd

7. reading bills.

8. SENATOR JOHNS:

9. Thank you, Sir.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senate Bill 1500, Senator Lane. The strong man, strong man. I

12. thought Knuppel would beat you to that. Senator, that's called

13. malicious mischief in some places.

14. SECRETARY:

15. Senate Bill 1500...

16. PRESIDENT:

17. One moment, for what purpose does Senator Morris arise?

18. SENATOR MORRIS:

19. I think that at this point, the good Senator from Cook County

20. should be removed from the Floor for the destruction of State

21. property, and I am sure it would help move this bill much easier also.

22. SECRETARY:

23. Senate Bill 1500

24. (Secretary reads title of bill)

25. 2nd reading of the bill. No Committee amendments.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Lane.

28. SENATOR LANE:

29. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I would like to make a

30. brief statement. This bill represents our best chance to pass a no-

31. fault bill this Session. Senate Bill 1500 is realistic and offers a

32. good package of benefits. No bill is going to make everybody happy,

33. but the Senate Insurance Committee has tried to put together a reason-

1 able and equitable compromise that work efficiently throughout the
2 State.

3 PRESIDENT:

4 Just a minute, Senator. It just cannot be that the duly elected
5 officials of the State Senate who have gone through the hills, valleys,
6 and prairies and told them how intelligent you were, could not sit
7 here and keep some order. It just...it just reaches the breaking
8 point, it's just difficult. Everybody contributes a little bit, and
9 when you get in the aggregate, it's impossible. Now, would you clear
10 out the aisles, Mr. Sergeant-at-Arms. Mr. Sergeant-at-Arms, clear
11 out this aisle, please. Clear out this aisle over here, please and
12 will the staff find seats if they are available? Senator Lane.

13 SENATOR LANE:

14 Yes, Sir, thank you. The no-fault concept will be new to Illinois
15 insofar as bodily injury claims are concerned, but keep in mind that we
16 already have in this State a no-fault system which we call by another
17 name; that is automobile collision and comprehensive coverages now
18 exist and now do pay for losses on a no-fault basis. This is not
19 a radical concept. We are extending no-fault to cover bodily injury
20 cases. Here is a brief summary of the most important features of
21 the bill. Senate Bill 1500 guarantees payment for loss due for auto-
22 mobile and bodily injury to all persons injured regardless of who...
23 who is to blame in an accident, medical and hospital benefits are
24 covered up to twenty-five thousand dollars, funeral benefits are
25 added up to fifteen hundred per person, loss of income benefits are
26 included up to three hundred dollars per week for a year, and in the
27 event of death, these income benefits are available to survivors.
28 Loss of services benefits are included and optional additional no-
29 fault benefits for higher amounts of insurance must be offered by the
30 insurance company. Mr. President, these benefits are available
31 through no-fault insurance to all persons injured in motor vehicle
32 accidents; whereas, under the liability system, about one-half of the
33 people injured in automobile accidents collect no benefits. Now let's

1 talk about the threshold. The threshold is the heart of any good
2 no-fault bill and will, no doubt, be at the center of any debate on
3 this bill. In plain English, what a threshold means, is that there
4 can't be a lawsuit for pain and suffering for a motor vehicle ac-
5 cident unless there has been death, dismemberment, or medical and
6 hospital expenses in excess of two thousand dollars. Thank you, Mr.
7 President, members of the Senate.

8 PRESIDENT:

9 Any further discussion? Senator Donnewald. I notice you're
10 popping your fingers; you must have been in a discotheque. Senator
11 Donnewald.

12 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

13 Yes, Mr. President, I would ask of the Chair, this bill, as I
14 understand it, is a committee bill. Is that correct?

15 PRESIDENT:

16 That is correct, Senator.

17 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

18 And Mr. President, did it have the vote of the committee in the
19 committee to make it a committee bill to comply with the joint rules
20 of the Senate and House? Can the sponsor answer that? I would
21 direct that to him.

22 PRESIDENT:

23 Senator Lane.

24 SENATOR LANE:

25 Yes, Senator. It was 7 to 2, 7 in favor, 2 against.

26 PRESIDENT:

27 Senator Donnewald.

28 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

29 I'm sorry, I didn't quite hear.

30 SENATOR LANE:

31 It passed Committee, 7 votes for, 2 against.

32 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

33 Passed committee as a committee bill.

1 SENATOR LANE:

2 Yes, Senator, 7 to 2.

3 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

4 When...when...

5 SENATOR LANE:

6 And that was as a committee bill.

7 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

8 When was it heard as a committee bill?

9 PRESIDENT:

10 For what purpose does Senator Harris arise?

11 SENATOR HARRIS:

12 Well, I would like to respond to the perfectly legitimate
13 questions that Senator Donnewald has raised. There were two actions
14 taken by the committee last Wednesday morning, a week ago yesterday.
15 We acted on a subcommittee report and adopted that subcommittee re-
16 port. That subcommittee report was in connection with a study of
17 1391, that was a Senate Bill. The committee adopted the subcommittee
18 report which was ultimately, insofar as the subcommittee action is
19 concerned, a recommended amendment to that bill, which then was acted
20 upon by a majority of the committee. Following that action, I made
21 the motion, being fully aware of our rules that Senate Bills had to
22 be acted upon in this Body by the 23rd of May, and mindful that the
23 deadline schedule does not apply to bills introduced by a majority of
24 the members of a standing committee. That's one of the exceptions to
25 the joint rules deadline schedule. I then made the motion essentially
26 in this form, Senator Donnewald. I'm...I'm just going on memory here,
27 but this motion was made subsequent to the adoption of the subcommittee
28 report. I moved then that the Committee on Insurance and Licensed
29 Activities introduce a committee bill embodying the recommendations
30 of the subcommittee. That motion carried by a roll call vote of 7
31 to 2. I cannot recite from memory precisely who those seven votes
32 were, but I know that the records of the committee will demonstrate
33 that there were seven Aye votes, which, of course, is a majority

1 of the committee. We then, through the efforts of the staff,
2 prepared in bill form a committee bill which has been introduced
3 and is now before us on the order of 2nd reading in the form of
4 Senate Bill 1500 introduced by the Senate Committee on Insurance
5 and Licensed Activities.

6 PRESIDENT:

7 Senator Donnewald.

8 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

9 Well, Mr. President. I...I followed this rather closely and...
10 and really it came out not as committee bill, and really was not,
11 this particular bill was not, voted on as committee bill, as I under-
12 stand it, and I would move you, Mr. President, that...this Senate
13 Bill 1500 be re-referred to that committee and then voted on by
14 those committee members as a committee bill whether they want to
15 be...whether it is to be a committee bill or not.

16 PRESIDENT:

17 Senator Nudelman, for what purpose do you arise?

18 SENATOR NUDELMAN:

19 Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen. I was a member...I am
20 a member of the Insurance Committee. I was present on the day this
21 bill was voted on. At one point in time, there were six votes to
22 report this out as a committee bill. With some trepidation, I made
23 myself the seventh, so that, in fact, this is a committee bill, and
24 this is the bill that we passed out of the committee.

25 PRESIDENT:

26 Any further discussion? Senator Lane may continue. No, no, I
27 asked for any further discussion on the bill. Well, there is an
28 amendment, I think. Senator Donnewald.

29 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

30 (machine cut off)

31 PRESIDENT:

32 Well, Senator, I think the motion is out of order. The fact is...

33 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

1 If I've got thirty votes, it isn't.

2 PRESIDENT:

3 Well, you could get thirty votes if it is called. The Senator...
4 Senator Bruce.

5 SENATOR BRUCE:

6 A motion to recommit is in order at any time a bill is on the
7 Calendar. I would ask that you would consult with your parliamen-
8 tarian; the motion is always in order to recommit a bill to commit-
9 tee, from 1st reading, 2nd reading and 3rd reading.

10 PRESIDENT:

11 For what purpose does Senator Harris arise?

12 SENATOR HARRIS:

13 Well, Mr. President, I would just point out that a majority of
14 the committee has acted on this specific piece of legislation, and
15 dilatory tactics are not in order, and I think it is perfectly with-
16 in the purview of the Presiding Officer to rule on the face of the
17 evidence before us, and that is, that a majority of the committee
18 has recommended this bill, and the Chair has ruled that a motion to
19 recommit is out of order, and I presume that that ruling is based
20 on the fact that it obviously would be a waste of time. It...it...
21 and I certainly would support the ruling of Chair that it's not in
22 order based on the determination that it is dilatory.

23 PRESIDENT:

24 Any further discussion? Senator Egan.

25 SENATOR EGAN:

26 Yes, Mr. President. May I inquire just simply please, of the
27 sponsor...

28 PRESIDENT:

29 Just a moment, just a minute. Let's have some order, please?

30 SENATOR EGAN:

31 My question is a very simple one, and that is, have the members
32 of the Committee on Insurance had an opportunity to make a motion in
33 any way in the committee to amend this bill? Have there been amendments

1 proposed for this bill in the Insurance Committee, is my question?

2 PRESIDENT:

3 Senator Lane.

4 SENATOR LANE:

5 On Senate Bill 1391, there was one major amendment, which, more
6 or less, gutted the bill, and came up with a compromise bill, and
7 1391 then turned out to be Senate Bill 1500, a committee bill, of
8 which I am the spokesman for the committee.

9 PRESIDENT:

10 Senator Egan.

11 SENATOR EGAN:

12 Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate. In the delib-
13 eration of a bill, shouldn't we give the committee an opportunity
14 to hear proposed amendments?

15 PRESIDENT:

16 Of course, the bill is on 2nd reading...

17 SENATOR EGAN:

18 It's on 2nd reading having never been before the committee
19 in its form for which the committee could propose amendments.

20 PRESIDENT:

21 Senator, I think you misunderstood Senator Lane. He said
22 the bill was originally House Bill 1391 which bill was amended
23 substantially in the committee. The bill in its amended form is,
24 in fact, as he said, Senate Bill 1500, so the committee did, in
25 fact, address itself to amendments to the original bill, and the
26 bill on the Calendar now is a product of the committee's amendment,
27 Senator Harris.

28 SENATOR HARRIS:

29 I would point out as a recital of the activity in the committee
30 this further action. Following the adoption of the subcommittee
31 report, the subcommittee report did have motorcycle coverage in-
32 cluded. Following that, we did remove from coverage...

33 PRESIDENT:

1 Just a moment, Senator. For what purpose does Senator Bruce
2 arise?

3 SENATOR BRUCE:

4 Well...point of order. I really don't care what happens to
5 this bill today, but I would like to know what the orderly pro-
6 cedure of this Body is going to be. Now, under Rule 43, a motion
7 to recommit has been made. Under Rule 44, it says it takes pre-
8 cedence over everything else before this Body. Now, I don't care
9 about 1500, but we're going to have a lot of trouble in the next
10 three or four weeks over people who want to recommit bills. Now, we
11 are not on subcommittee reports and motorcycles being included or
12 not included in this bill. I want to know whether Senator Donnewald's
13 motion to recommit has been ruled out of order and if the Chair has
14 made the ruling that Rule 43 is not in effect? That's all I want.

15 PRESIDENT:

16 Well, I'm not going to persevere this question any further.
17 There is a motion made. There has been a motion made to recommit.
18 I originally said that the motion was out of order. I would say, at
19 this point, because I think on the face of the motion in light of
20 the offerings made by the members of the committee, it is quite ap-
21 parent and obvious that it is a dilatory tatic. The fact of the mat-
22 ter is, the motion is in order in terms of its being a Rule 43. So
23 we'll take it, we won't persevere the question further, we'll just
24 simply take a vote on Senator Donnewald's motion. The motion being
25 to recommit Senate Bill 1500 to the committee. Now, the only pur-
26 pose of the committee is dilatory...of the motion is dilatory because
27 if the motion goes back to the committee, ostensibly, it will come
28 out with the same vote, 7 to 2. If that's the way we want it...that's
29 the way you want it, that's the way it will be. Now, the motion is
30 to recommit Senate Bill 1500. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed
31 will vote Nay. For what purpose does Senator Savickas arise?

32 SENATOR SAVICKAS:

33 If I want to support Senator Lane, I will vote no, is that correct?

1 PRESIDENT:

2 That's correct.

3 SENATOR SAVICKAS:

4 Thank you.

5 PRESIDENT:

6 The question is, shall...Senator Rock.

7 SENATOR ROCK:

8 Well, I take exception, frankly, to the comments of the Chair
9 that the motion is merely dilatory. There are, I am reliably
10 informed, approximately seventeen substantive amendments that will
11 be offered, and I think the committee should well address them-
12 selves to those amendments; so the motion is not dilatory, and I
13 think it is in order and should be supported by an Aye vote.

14 PRESIDENT:

15 Well, I...I would say, Senator, that the importance of the mat-
16 ter would indicate to me that the amendments would be best address-
17 ed by the Body. The bill is on 2nd reading and hopefully the entire
18 Body would address themselves to it. For what purpose does Senator
19 Carroll arise?

20 SENATOR CARROLL:

21 In all due respect to the President, Mr. President? Under the
22 rules of order, if the President wishes to debate the motion, he
23 must come down and become a member. If you want to make rulings,
24 make rulings; if you wish to debate, relinquish the Chair.

25 PRESIDENT:

26 I appreciate your..I appreciate your comments, Senator. Senator
27 Knuppel.

28 SENATOR KNUPPEL:

29 Well, I...my personal opinion is this. We're caught in the throes
30 of a deadline here. If there is as many as seventeen amendments, I...
31 I agree with Senator Rock. This is a debatable motion; I think we
32 should be heard; I think the matter should be rereferred because I
33 am handling about one hundred fifty bills myself here, House and

1 Senate, and I didn't even know this thing was up; I've not even
2 had a chance to look at it; it's here on 2nd reading and I think
3 the committee should do their job if there are seventeen amend-
4 ments and that's where it should go.

5 PRESIDENT:

6 Senator Morris.

7 SENATOR MORRIS:

8 Well, I am somewhat confused by this whole fiasco, and that's
9 what this is. This bill sat in committee; I'm a member of that
10 committee; it came to the point where amendments could have been
11 offered; members of the committee had an opportunity to offer amend-
12 ments; Senator Lane offered one major amendment, which rewrote part
13 of the bill; if there are seventeen amendments to be offered, I
14 question where they were the day we met in committee. It was noti-
15 fied that that bill was going to be considered that day; no one
16 showed up with those amendments; now, all of a sudden, today we're
17 told there are seventeen amendments that we, on the committee, should
18 consider. I am a member of the committee and I am perfectly happy to
19 consider those right now on the Floor of the Senate. I think that
20 to send it back to committee and force that committee to meet again
21 on this next week is nothing but a complete delay. Let's deal with
22 those seventeen amendments, right now. Apparently, they must be
23 printed. Somebody is waving a big packet of papers around. Let's
24 debate them and let's vote them up or down, right now. I'm not plan-
25 ning to go back to Waukegan until tomorrow night and I'll stay here
26 till Hell freezes over, but let's solve the problem.

27 PRESIDENT:

28 Sor what purpose does Senator Lemke arise?

29 SENATOR LEMKE:

30 I'm sorry about the amendments. I..on that date that the bill
31 was up for subcommittee and so forth, I was on personal business, very
32 important personal business in Chicago and was unable to get there, and
33 had I been there, I would have offered these amendments because...I

1 think as the bill stands now, the bill is unconstitutional, it dis-
2 criminate against the poor, and I am not...I'm not going to debate
3 it any further, and I think that we should consider it a motion.

4 PRESIDENT:

5 Senator Daley, what purpose do you arise?

6 SENATOR DALEY:

7 Mr. President, fellow Senators. Let's get on and vote upon this
8 motion and, of course, we're behind our schedule; we don't want to
9 ruin our record; it's already 10:35 or 10:40.

10 PRESIDENT:

11 Senator Romano.

12 SENATOR ROMANO:

13 Is a substitute motion in order?

14 PRESIDENT:

15 It is.

16 SENATOR ROMANO:

17 I move to lay Senator Rock's motion on the Table.

18 PRESIDENT:

19 No, Senator Donnewald's motion to recommit.

20 SENATOR ROMANO:

21 Or...both of them.

22 PRESIDENT:

23 The motion is not debatable. Senator Romano moves to lay
24 Senator Donnewald's motion to recommit on the Table. All in favor
25 will vote Aye. Opposed Nay. The voting is open. Pardon. Parlia-
26 mentary inquiry. Senator Rock.

27 SENATOR ROCK:

28 How many votes are required for the motion to Table to prevail?

29 PRESIDENT:

30 A majority of those voting. Senator Harris.

31 SENATOR HARRIS:

32 Parliamentary inquiry. Parliamentary inquiry. If I wanted to
33 support Senator Lane, how would I vote?

1 PRESIDENT:

2 You would vote Aye.

3 SENATOR HARRIS:

4 Thank you.

5 PRESIDENT:

6 The voting is open. It's not on the roll call. Have all voted
7 who wish? Take the record. On this question, the Ayes are 38, the
8 Nays are 16. Senator Romano's motion to lay upon the Table the mo-
9 tion to recommit passed...passes. For what purpose does Senator
10 Buzbee arise?

11 SENATOR BUZBEE:

12 I have a point of Parliamentary inquiry, Mr. President. What
13 is the Senate's rules concerning lobbyists sitting on the Floor?

14 PRESIDENT: *

15 They're not entitled to sit on the Floor, Senator.

16 SENATOR BUZBEE:

17 Well, I...am just wondering, I see some gentlemen on the Floor
18 that I don't believe are members of either the Democratic or Re-
19 publican staff, and I just wondered what the rules are as to...

20 PRESIDENT:

21 Well, it used to...first of all, you said lobbyists and now you
22 say not members of the staff...

23 SENATOR BUZBEE:

24 Well, what are...what is the Senate's rules concerning nonmem-
25 bers of staff...or...or House members or Senate members, so forth?

26 PRESIDENT:

27 It has been a rule of flexibility. Rule 2. It's a rule of
28 flexibility where members desire to bring persons on the...on the
29 Floor to answer questions or to give them information as debate
30 proceeds, we've been rather liberal about that in the interest of
31 bringing expertise to the debate.

32 SENATOR BUZBEE:

1 Thank you. Then I understand that at anytime I can bring
2 anybody on the Floor to help me in...in Floor debate. Is that right?

3 PRESIDENT:

4 Including the President of SIU when you have his appropriation.

5 SENATOR BUZBEE:

6 Thank you. I'll have him here. I'll have him here.

7 PRESIDENT:

8 Senator Donnewald.

9 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

10 Mr. President. It's...the hour is now 10:45 and I want...we do
11 have many, many bills in Executive. What is, what is the schedule?

12 PRESIDENT:

13 The schedule is...the schedule, taking yesterday as a precedent,
14 is to finish the necessary business here before we go to committee.

15 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

16 Well...

17 PRESIDENT:

18 Senator Romano.

19 SENATOR ROMANO:

20 Mr. President. A corrected committee report on this has been
21 filed with the Secretary of Senate.

22 PRESIDENT:

23 Senator Bell, for what purpose do you arise?

24 SENATOR BELL:

25 Yes, a point of inquiry, Mr. President. ...Are...are we ready
26 to move on to the next Senate Bill on 2nd reading or are we...

27 PRESIDENT:

28 We certainly desire to. There are some amendments to...to be
29 offered to House Bill...Senate Bill 1500. The posture of the Sen-
30 ate now is on Senate Bill 1500 as offered by the Committee on In-
31 surance and Licensed Activities with Senator Lane as the lead spon-
32 sor. We have several amendments to be dealt with. Senator Lemke.

33 SENATOR LEMKE:

1 If the rules of the Senate are that an expert can come on the
2 Floor and help a member, I would like the record to reflect the name
3 of that member, his...his economic interest, and if he, as the rest
4 of these Senators and Representatives in the House, have filed a
5 statement of economic interest with the Secretary of State.

6 PRESIDENT:

7 Senator, you certainly have the right to ask of any member of
8 the Senate who the person is who is with him. There's not any ques-
9 tion about that, and I don't think there would be any hesitancy to
10 tell you. Now, Amendment No. 1 is offered by Senator McCarthy and
11 Senator McCarthy is recognized. Amendment No. 1. Just a moment
12 now, just a moment.

13 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

14 Read the amendment...before it...before that...

15 PRESIDENT:

16 For what purpose does Senator Carroll snap his fingers?

17 SENATOR CARROLL:

18 I snap my fingers to seek recognition because of some of the
19 confusion that seems to be going on the Floor since there are so
20 many other than staff people now allowed on the Floor, but I would,
21 Mr. President, move the agenda. The agenda calls, as scheduled, for
22 10:30 committee. The hour of 10:30 having passed, as recognized by
23 the Chair, the agenda must be met without unanimous consent of the
24 members; I would move the agenda under our rules and Robert's Rules...

25 PRESIDENT:

26 Our rules...

27 SENATOR CARROLL:

28 If the Parliamentarian would like to check, I would suggest he
29 read...

30 PRESIDENT:

31 Just a minute...

32 SENATOR CARROLL:

33 Rule...Rule 4 on daily order.

1 PRESIDENT:

2 Just a minute...just a minute. Now, we are just in a state of
3 disorder and I would just like to go out of the regular order of
4 business for a minute to say something to you. I want to read you
5 something. I think we need it. Slow me down, Lord. Ease the
6 pounding of my heart by the quieting of my mind. Steady my hurried
7 pace with a vision of the eternal reach of time. Give me, amidst
8 the confusion of my day, the calmness of the everlasting hills.
9 Break the tensions of my nerves and muscles with the soothing music
10 of the singing streams that live in my memory. Teach me the art of
11 taking minute vacations, of slowing down to look at a flower, to
12 chat with a friend or to pat a dog, to read a few lines from a good
13 book. Let me look upward into the branches of the towering oak and
14 know...and know that it grew great and strong because it grew slowly
15 and well. Slow me down, Lord, and inspire me to send my roots deep
16 into the soil of life's enduring values. We are on Senate Bills on
17 2nd reading. Senate Bill 1500, Amendment No. 1, Senator McCarthy.
18 Senator McCarthy. For what purpose does Senator Knuppel arise?

19 SENATOR KNUPPEL:

20 On a matter of personal privilege...

21 PRESIDENT:

22 State your point.

23 SENATOR KNUPPEL:

24 That was all very beautiful, but I feel and I say this personally,
25 I have nothing at stake one way or another in this bill, but I think
26 that the predilections of the President, from the way he has he ruled
27 and...and the things he has said from the Chair, that in all fairness,
28 and I believe with you, that in all fairness he should come back to
29 his seat, and I'm sincere about this, and let somebody else who is
30 impartial preside at this time, because I think your position, with
31 respect to this bill, has been pretty thoroughly exhibited, and...and
32 I buy just what you said. I think that is beautiful, and I think we
33 all should abide by it, and I think the thing he should do is do ex-
34 actly the same thing he has asked us to do.

1 PRESIDENT:

2 Will Senator Knuppel come to the Chair and preside? Senator
3 Knuppel.

4 SENATOR KNUPPEL:

5 Because of my heart condition, I will not, but I think somebody
6 else should.

7 PRESIDENT:

8 You are the only one I trust. Senator McCarthy. Senator
9 McCarthy is recognized on Amendment No. 1.

10 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

11 ...Mr. President, Mr. President, Mr. President.

12 PRESIDENT:

13 Senator McCarthy.

14 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

15 Yes, Mr. President. I appreciate you recognizing me. I...I rise
16 to place a motion before the Body. The motion, ultimately, is to re-
17 fer this bill to the Committee on Judiciary. Before placing the mo-
18 tion, I would like to state the reason why. There were a number of
19 bills dealing with tort liability that have been introduced in this
20 Session of the Legislature and I have no quarrel with the Committee on
21 Assignment of Bills where I serve as Vice-Chairman. Inasmuch as those
22 bills were initially referred to the Committee on Insurance and Li-
23 censed Activities, because we know, as a matter of fact, that the In-
24 surance industry, the insurance industry and the rates they charge and
25 the formulation for the rates are a facet of this total problem of dis-
26 ruption of common law tort liability, and Senator Donnewald threw his
27 motion to recommit the bill to the Committee on Insurance has failed.
28 Senator Nudelman, I think, indicated that a majority of the committee
29 had ruled sending out this Bill 1500, that insofar as one segment of
30 the people in the State of Illinois are concerned, that is the insur-
31 ance companies insofar as their ratings, the rates will charge the ex-
32 clusions, the forms of the policies are concerned, this was an agree-
33 able bill to the Committee on Insurance and Licensed Activities, but
34 the scope of the subject matter of this legislation affects far more

1 than just the insurance companies in the State of Illinois, eleven
2 million people in the State of Illinois, I don't know the precise
3 figures, but I presume there are some six to seven million people who
4 are licensed to operate vehicles in the State of Illinois, six to
5 seven million people who do operate vehicles who are subject them-
6 selves to tort liability and redress of that tort liability which
7 has been a descent from the common law. This matter of interruption,
8 a radical change of tort liability, as we have known it, is a matter
9 that should be considered by the Judiciary Committee, and it has not
10 been. I don't add to the persuasion of this motion the fact that I
11 was the sponsor of 1019, which is the plaintiff's lawyers bill on no-
12 fault. I just merely address the Chair and make the motion and would
13 ask support of this Body that this subject matter that affects the
14 people, the six to seven million drivers, the people who are involved
15 in this tort liability that they get a run by, a fair hearing, on their
16 aspects of this legislation before the Judiciary Committee. Mr. Chair-
17 man, at this time, I move that Senate Bill 1500 be referred to the
18 Committee on Judiciary.

19 PRESIDENT:

20 Senator Daley.

21 SENATOR DALEY:

22 Mr. President, fellow Senators. Today is June 5th. This is a
23 committee bill; as I understand it they've had it for two weeks in the
24 committee, there was an opportunity to place amendments on the com-
25 mittee. It would be different if it was May 1st; I would enjoy having
26 this bill in the Judiciary Committee. I believe it is too late. I
27 think we should proceed with it and I think the bill should stay in In-
28 surance and should be on this Floor right now. I object to that motion.

29 PRESIDENT:

30 Senator Soper.

31 SENATOR SOPER:

32 Mr. President, I now move that Senator McCarthy's motion lie on
33 the Table.

1 PRESIDENT:

2 Senator McCarthy. The motion is not debatable, Senator. For
3 what purpose do you arise?

4 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

5 Well, I arise because I was illuminated by the Chairman of the
6 Committee on Judiciary. He has indicated that he does not wish to
7 take jurisdiction of this matter and so, therefore, if the Chairman
8 of the Committee does not want to take it, there's no point in me
9 persisting that motion. I withdraw it.

10 PRESIDENT:

11 Thank you, Senator. Amendment No. 1 has not yet been discussed.
12 We've discussed everything but Amendment No. 1 which is offered by
13 Senator McCarthy. Do you desire to explain the Amendment, Senator?

14 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

15 Well, I wonder if the President would indicate to me, if he
16 would and I think it may help this process, if he could ascertain
17 from the Secretary how many amendments are on the Desk?

18 PRESIDENT:

19 Secretary says he has only one amendment on the Desk.

20 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

21 Well, there was...there was some talk that...

22 PRESIDENT:

23 Seventeen were eluded to; the Secretary says he has one. Do you
24 desire to proceed with this amendment, Senator? Let me get an answer
25 to this question, if I may, first.

26 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

27 ...Yes, I desire to proceed after...the disposition of...of...of
28 ...of...primary motions that are pending and Senator Carroll I know
29 had one.

30 PRESIDENT:

31 There are no primary motions pending. We have no such motion in
32 our rules as a motion to move the agenda, Senator. Senator Carroll.

33 SENATOR CARROLL:

1 I...Mr. President, I did make that motion about fifteen minutes
2 ago and I referred your Parliamentarian to both Rule 4 and to Robert's
3 Rules. Rule 4, excuse me, gives us the daily order of business and
4 says when the time for adjournment in the daily session comes, then
5 whatever order of business you were on, you go to as priority order
6 of business the next day. The time for adjournment has come and
7 passed; if it doesn't say specifically that you can move the agenda,
8 I, then, refer you to Robert's Rules which does so state. However, even
9 in Rule 4, it talks about the time for adjournment and whenever the
10 Senate is engaged in consideration of a bill, resolution, amendment
11 or other item of business at the time of the adjournment of the daily
12 session, that item...

13 PRESIDENT:

14 But we haven't adjourned, Senator.

15 SENATOR CARROLL:

16 ...of business...daily order. However, our daily call, calls
17 for adjournment at 10:30 to go into committee. That is the set order
18 of business as set by the Senate and has been the daily order and set
19 by the Calendar as the daily order of business as required under our
20 rules. I, then, refer you to Robert's which talks about a call for the
21 moving of the agenda. The agenda of the day calls for committee at
22 10:30. This is a preprinted agenda and has been adopted by this Body.
23 I would, therefore, again move the agenda and suggest to you that we
24 are in committee right now.

25 PRESIDENT:

26 The Parliamentarian...

27 SENATOR CARROLL:

28 And to remind the Chair that the Chair has made that motion on
29 several occasions himself...during the last Session when he was not
30 the Chair.

31 PRESIDENT:

32 The Parliamentarian advises me that there is no motion to move the
33 agenda. A proper motion would be, if you desire, to move to adjourn.

1 If that is what you desire to do, the Chair would recognize that
2 motion and would take a roll call on that motion. Senator Carroll.

3 SENATOR CARROLL:

4 Mr. Chairman...Mr. President, I did not make a motion to ad-
5 journ; I did make a motion...

6 PRESIDENT:

7 I'm aware of that.

8 SENATOR CARROLL:

9 ...to follow the call of the day. The call of the orders of the
10 day require committee action at this time.

11 PRESIDENT:

12 Senator Carroll, just yesterday, when we were involved in busi-
13 ness we went past the hour of 10:30. We do that on many occasions
14 when the Senate is engaged in Floor debate on subjects. So that's...
15 it's...it's a rule...it's...it's something we do everyday and when we
16 finish the Chairmen then stand and say that their committees which
17 were scheduled for an appointed hour will meet either 10 minutes or
18 15 minutes or a designated hour after adjournment. That's the custom,
19 here. Senator Knuppel.

20 SENATOR KNUPPEL:

21 We're going to rupture this whole thing if we don't because we
22 have got a schedule to keep. This bill is on 2nd reading and it's
23 got till June 30th to get out of here. I move we adjourn and recon-
24 vene tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

25 PRESIDENT:

26 A motion to adjourn has been made. It is a nondebatable motion.
27 The question is shall the Senate adjourn? Those in favor will vote
28 Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who
29 wish? Take the record. The question...on this question, the Ayes
30 are 21, the Nays are 32, with none Voting Present. The motion to
31 adjourn fails. We revert to the order of Senate Bill 1500 on 2nd
32 reading, Amendment No. 1 by Senator McCarthy. Senator McCarthy is
33 recognized. You're recognized, Senator and your time is running.

1 SENATOR MCCARTHY;

2 Well, I...I'm...I'm recognized, Sir, but I have no heard the
3 amendment.

4 PRESIDENT:

5 It is your amendment; I thought you desired to explain it.

6 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

7 Well...I...I will explain it...

8 PRESIDENT:

9 Do...do you desire that the Secretary read it, is that what
10 you mean?

11 SENATOR MECARTHY:

12 Yes,...

13 PRESIDENT:

14 Oh, certainly.

15 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

16 ...I would like to hear the amendment.

17 PRESIDENT:

18 Oh, you want the amendment read? How many pages is it, Mr.
19 Secretary? It is five pages, and it is, of course, not dilatory;
20 I'm sure that your explanation would be better, but go right ahead.
21 Read the amendment. You want the amendment read, is that right,
22 Senator? Thank you. For what purpose does Senator Harris arise?

23 SENATOR HARRIS:

24 Well...Mr. President, I just want to point out for the benefit of
25 the membership that Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 1500 is, in fact...

26 PRESIDENT:

27 One moment, please. For what purpose do you arise, Senator?

28 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

29 I rise on a point of order.

30 PRESIDENT:

31 What is your point, Senator?

32 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

33 The point of order is that Amendment No. 1 is not before this

1 Body until it's read and I resent Senator Harris attempting to
2 characterize and debate it, at this point.

3 PRESIDENT:

4 Senator, I would hope that you would not become excited. The
5 fact of the matter is, the fact of the matter is, the very fact of
6 the matter is, there is no rule which mandates the reading of amend-
7 ments. For your information, the rule provides that the amendment
8 must be printed if five members demand it. There is nothing in our
9 rules that mandates the reading of an amendment. I was being overly
10 courteous to do so...but...

11 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

12 Well...

13 PRESIDENT:

14 ...there is nothing in the rules that mandates it.

15 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

16 Mr. President, I understand that, and Senator Carroll indicated
17 to me he wanted to get recognition to have the amendment printed which
18 would force a postponement of this for one day. Now, there's no point
19 and I don't want to be the one that by having a friendly type of de-
20 mand for an amendment being printed that this would postpone it by one
21 day, but you know and I know, that the rules are flexible enough to
22 where this matter can be postponed. The reason I'm asking this amend-
23 ment be read and I'll interrupt it at any time and so that I can assem-
24 ble...assemble quickly for this Body some of the cogent features of the
25 amendment. The facts of the matter are, that this amendment...that
26 this amendment is a aggregate reproduction of Senate Bill 1019 which
27 has laid dormant in the Committee and my recollection is...has become
28 hazy on the subject matter and that was the purpose for which I asked
29 that the amendment be read, so that I could grasp and recapture the
30 salient features of the amendment, Sir.

31 PRESIDENT:

32 Senator Knuppel.

33 SENATOR KNUPPEL:

1 Well, I don't have a copy of this amendment, do I?

2 PRESIDENT:

3 I can't answer that. I don't know.

4 SENATOR KNUPPEL:

5 Well, I don't have it on my desk and really I think that we're
6 talking about no-fault insurance which is one of the most important
7 concepts of the people of the State of Illinois have come forward
8 with in the last ten years. I, as a lawyer and as a practicing at-
9 torney with insurance matters feel it ought to have the amendment
10 so that I can vote intelligently on it and I don't have it.

11 PRESIDENT:

12 Senator Harris.

13 SENATOR HARRIS:

14 Well, Mr. President, I was just going to point out that I have
15 a copy of this amendment on my desk. I think we all know that the
16 Pages distribute amendments. Sometimes, some of us get them covered
17 up with other things, but I have a copy on my desk and that was the
18 point that I was going to make in regard to Senator McCarthy's re-
19 quest to have the amendment read and, as a matter of fact, regularly,
20 repeatedly, we do not have amendments read particularly when they
21 are five pages long and I would call attention to the fact, that
22 Senator McCarthy said his amendment was, in fact, an embodiment of
23 Senate 1019 which lay dormant in the Committee. That is not an ac-
24 curate recital of the experience of the Insurance and Licensed Ac-
25 tivities Committee. Senate Bill 1019 was also referred to subcom-
26 mittee that Senator Lane Chaired and there were hearings of the sub-
27 committee, three different hearings on all of the bills referred to
28 that subcommittee. The subcommittee ultimately with a majority vote
29 made its recommendation to the full committee and the subcommittee
30 determined not to take action or recommend further action on Senate
31 Bill 1019; so it was, in fact, not lying dormant, but it was under
32 consideration actively by the subcommittee. Now, you know, I couldn't
33 agree more, Senator McCarthy has stated here and Senator Knuppel
34 has stated that this is an important matter. Of course, it is,

1 and we ought to as mature and experienced members of this Body
2 proceed with what we have done in the past and that is, give each
3 other the opportunity on the appropriate order of business to con-
4 sider amendments in the fashion in which we usually do. Now, if...
5 if Senator McCarthy wants to put his request for having the amend-
6 ment read to a consideration of the Body and determine whether a
7 majority want to proceed in that fashion, I think we can dispose of
8 it that way. Otherwise, I think Senator McCarthy should be extended
9 the time under the rules to explain his amendment and get a determi-
10 nation of a majority of the membership of the Body.

11 PRESIDENT:

12 For what Senator...for what purpose does Senator Morris arise?

13 SENATOR MORRIS:

14 I think I have a solution to this whole problem. I think what
15 we ought to do is move this bill to 3rd reading today and we can
16 always bring it back for amendments once the people that have these
17 seventeen amendments have an opportunity to have them printed and
18 have them distributed; but since we're worried about the deadlines, I
19 think it would be very appropriate to just now move this bill
20 to 3rd reading and I'm sure Senator Lane would bring it back so they
21 could get their amendments printed and distributed and then, at least,
22 we'll be able to act on it in one day and not have to have delaying
23 tactics everyday. So, if there is a possibility to make such a mo-
24 tion, I would make a motion that we move the bill to 3rd reading.

25 PRESIDENT:

26 Senator Palmer.

27 SENATOR PALMER:

28 Yes. President, I would like to make a motion that we postpone
29 debate on this bill and all amendments till tomorrow. I would like
30 a roll call on that.

31 PRESIDENT:

32 That is in order. The motion...any further discussion on this
33 motion. The motion is that the Senate postpone consideration on the...

1 on House...on Senate Bill 1500 until tomorrow. For what purpose
2 does Senator Soper arise?

3 SENATOR SOPER:

4 I move to lie that motion on the Table.

5 PRESIDENT:

6 Senator Soper moves to Table that motion. That motion is not
7 debatable. The question is shall the motion be Tabled? Those in
8 favor, siding with Senator Soper, will vote Aye. Those in...opposed,
9 siding with Senator Palmer, will vote No. The voting is open. Have
10 all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question, the Ayes are
11 30, the Nays are 23. Senator Palmer's motion to reconsider...to
12 postpone consideration is Tabled. Senator Lane.

13 SENATOR LANE:

14 Mr. President, I think we ought to move the bill on to 3rd reading.

15 PRESIDENT:

16 Senator Knuppel, what purpose do you arise?

17 SENATOR KNUPPEL:

18 Well, personal privilege as much as anything. I haven't been
19 here a great length of time, but when...but when a situation gets into
20 this type of...of a thing, we are going to blow the whole June 30th
21 deadline because we got bills in committees that are going to have
22 be reset; they're going to go over to next week; we're not going to
23 be able to meet the deadline; we're going to have a lot of angry people,
24 and if we just leave the thing as Senator Palmer suggested, adjourn
25 now and come back to this in a couple of days when these things have
26 been printed, maybe some people can get together; there can be some
27 compromises and we can move. Now, this bill is no more important,
28 although it is important.....than many other bills on this agenda and,
29 therefore, I'm going to renew my motion and it can be made at any time
30 with intervening business, that we adjourn and go to committees the
31 way we're supposed to do and we'll come back to this thing. Maybe
32 some compromises can be achieved. I want to see that bill or that
33 amendment before I vote on it.

1 PRESIDENT:

2 For what purpose does Senator Harris arise?

3 SENATOR KNUPPEL:

4 Motion to adjourn.

5 PRESIDENT:

6 For what purpose did you arise, Senator Harris?

7 SENATOR HARRIS:

8 Well, I would like to request Senator Knuppel to withhold his
9 motion because I recognize that it is in order and it's not debatable.
10 Just momentarily, see if we can't accomodate each other and get some-
11 thing worked out here. I...I assume by his motion that he has with-
12 drawn his motion, momentarily. It seems to me that Senator Morris
13 made a sound suggestion and I certainly want to join in giving those
14 who oppose either the principles involved in a no-fault bill for Illi-
15 nois or specifics within that question ample opportunity for their day
16 here on this Floor. Now, I would suggest, likewise, that we all recog-
17 nize that we are moving toward a real time limitation to finish up all
18 of the rest of our business and...

19 PRESIDENT:

20 For what purpose does Senator Bruce arise?

21 SENATOR BRUCE:

22 I was very patient last time when Senator Harris spoke five min-
23 utes about an amendment that was not before this Body, but I'm afraid,
24 Senator Harris, that my patience has now come to an end. I ask the
25 Chair on what point is Senator Harris is speaking, at what point in
26 debate are we, what is the Senate about? We have wandered around
27 here for twenty minutes. Senator McCarthy has a motion. I've sought
28 recognition from the Chair for over five minutes and seen other people
29 recognized. I want a point of order on what order of business we are
30 presently on and whether Senator Harris' comments are germane.

31 PRESIDENT:

32 The point...the posture of the Senate, at the moment, is on the
33

1 adoption of Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 1500 as offered by
2 Senator McCarthy. Senator McCarthy spoke to that amendment. The...

3 SENATOR BRUCE:

4 Senator McCarthy has not spoken on the amendment...

5 PRESIDENT:

6 Well...he was...

7 SENATOR BRUCE:

8 We were on the question on whether he was going to be recognized...

9 PRESIDENT:

10 ...recognized to speak to the amendment and he said that the amend-
11 ment was setting forth that it was a bill which he had drafted, which
12 bill is now an amendment to the...to 1500 and then we got diverted by
13 questions about it being read and several other diversions, but that
14 is where we were. Senator Bruce.

15 SENATOR BRUCE:

16 Then if your ruling is we are on the order of amendments and
17 Senator McCarthy's offered amendment pursuant to Rule 19 and I don't
18 know whether I'll be joined by anyone else or not, I personally will
19 not vote on this bill without having a chance to have read the amend-
20 ment. Pursuant to Rule 19 I move, as one Senator and if I am joined
21 by four others, I understand that Rule 19 will be in effect. I ask
22 that this amendment be printed and distributed.

23 PRESIDENT:

24 You mean 15, Senate Rule 15.

25 SENATOR BRUCE:

26 Well...

27 PRESIDENT:

28 Let me just...

29 SENATOR BRUCE:

30 We've not printed the book, so I will stand with either 15 or
31 19. The requirement is the same in either book. It's five Senators
32 to request that an amendment be printed and distributed and if I am
33 joined by four others, I think that rule would be operative.

1 PRESIDENT:

2 That is exactly correct, Senator. Amendments on 2nd reading,
3 except amendments striking out an emergency provision, may be offer-
4 ed at the conclusion of the 2nd reading and shall be printed when
5 adopted and shall be filed in their proper order immediately follow-
6 ing the printed copy of the bill on each Senator's desk one day be-
7 fore such amended bill shall be read a 3rd time. When requested
8 by five or more members, amendments shall be printed and placed upon
9 the desk of each Senator before the amendments may be voted upon on
10 the order of 2nd reading. So you are asking that under Rule 15 and
11 you are joined by four other members, that the amendment be printed
12 prior to the time it is voted upon, is that correct? Fine. I think
13 no one has any quarrel with that. The amendment is here on the Sec-
14 retary's Desk. They will be printed and there will not be a vote
15 taken on them before they are printed and on the desks of the members.
16 Senator Bruce.

17 SENATOR BRUCE:

18 Am...am I to understand by that ruling, Mr. President, the bill
19 will not go off the order of 2nd reading until such time as that
20 amendment is voted on.

21 PRESIDENT:

22 Depending on the...depending on the Body. We have had the custom
23 of moving a bill to 3rd reading with the understanding that the bill
24 would be returned for the purpose of amendments.

25 SENATOR BRUCE:

26 Well...

27 PRESIDENT:

28 At this juncture, it would save a legislative day. That...is the
29 only reason that...the motion...

30 SENATOR BRUCE:

31 Well, I...I would think that would be within the domain of Senator
32 McCarthy. I am not the author of the amendment, but the rule has al-
33 ways been that if the sponsor of the amendment and the sponsor of the
34 bill moves the bill...

1 PRESIDENT:

2 Well, that's implicit in what I said. Both the sponsor of the
3 bill and the person sponsoring the amendment would have to make that
4 agreement. Senator McCarthy, what is your pleasure with reference
5 to that suggestion?

6 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

7 My position, Mr. President, is...my...is that the bill should
8 proceed in its orderly fashion. That is that the amendment should
9 be considered on 2nd reading where it is now.

10 PRESIDENT:

11 Well, Senator, that is, of course, implicit, and I would not like
12 the record to reflect that there is anything other than orderliness
13 about the handling of this or any other bill. The question was, do
14 you object to the bill going to 3rd reading with the understanding
15 from its principal sponsor, Senator Lane, that it will be returned
16 tomorrow to the order of 2nd reading for the offering of your amend-
17 ment?

18 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

19 Well...let me answer your question...let me answer your question
20 this way. There are, I am told, and believe to the effect a number of
21 amendments and the question should not be addressed to me, I think it
22 should be addressed to the Body, because...I suppose there is...there
23 is some sort of a motion that can be made, but I will not make that
24 motion, and will, in fact, will object it, to move this bill to 3rd
25 reading without the consideration of the amendments.

26 PRESIDENT:

27 Senator Harris.

28 SENATOR HARRIS:

29 Well, Mr. President, the point that I was about to make when
30 Senator Bruce was granted recognition was, that I was just going to
31 make reference to what we have repeatedly done this Session and that
32 is, as an understanding that we are under some severe time pressures,
33 that we, in fact, and Senator Lane has agreed to do so, advance the

1 bill to 3rd reading with the clear understanding that it will be
2 recalled to 2nd, and then I wanted to state that we have all of
3 the amendments, not just Senator McCarthy's amendment, but all of
4 them that are on the Secretary's Desk be reproduced as we have been
5 doing this entire Session and be available for consideration by the
6 entire membership when the bill is recalled to 2nd reading tomorrow,
7 debate all of the amendments and then make a determination of what
8 a majority attitude on each question is. That seems to be, to be
9 the most orderly and reasonable procedure to follow.

10 PRESIDENT:

11 Senator Wooten.

12 SENATOR WOOTEN:

13 Mr. President. On a point of personal privilege directed to
14 Senator McCarthy as one who supports Senator McCarthy's position by
15 and large in this matter. I would urge you to follow this procedure.
16 The legislative day, I don't believe, is that important to the matter,
17 and I'm...I think that the procedure that was first outlined by
18 Senator Morris and mentioned, also by Senator Harris, is one that I
19 can endorse. I don't believe it's worth the fight just to have the
20 delay of a legislative day and if we are guaranteed a full and ample
21 hearing tomorrow, it seems to me both sides are amply satisfied; I
22 think it is a good compromise. I would urge you to accept it.

23 PRESIDENT:

24 Senator Hickey.

25 SENATOR HICKEY:

26 Mr. President, and fellow Senators. In all this parliamentary
27 pot pourri, there's one question I haven't found the answer to and
28 it seems to me a fairly simple...should be a fairly simple one. Why
29 have we not had these amendments put on our desks now? Why have the
30 sponsors of the amendments not given them to us already when they
31 wanted to introduce them today? I wondered if the sponsors of the
32 amendments could explain that to me.

33 PRESIDENT:

1 Senator McCarthy.

2 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

3 ...The answer to that question is the amendments were not handed
4 to me until the bill was called, so I didn't even have the amendments.

5 PRESIDENT:

6 Well, let me...let me. Senator Hickey.

7 SENATOR HICKEY:

8 I...I...thought it was Senator McCarthy's amendment. I don't
9 understand that. If...if he has never seen it, perhaps he hasn't
10 read it either. I wonder if he really wants to sponsor it.

11 PRESIDENT:

12 Senator Netsch.

13 SENATOR NETSCH:

14 Whatever might have been done in terms of a time schedule, assuming
15 we can resolve the question of whether we stay on 2nd or move to 3rd,
16 and I think the later would make more sense, may be specifically re-
17 quest all sponsors of all amendments to get them to the Desk today
18 so that they will be printed and made available to us and whenever we
19 get back to this, which presumably will be in some form tomorrow, we
20 have had an opportunity to see the amendments. That includes the
21 printed bill as well.

22 PRESIDENT:

23 One moment. Will the members be in their seats? The Chair would
24 like to...to remind the Body that we dealt with a bill the other day
25 that went to 3rd reading and was returned for twenty-two amendments.
26 Now, sometimes we get so involved in parliamentary procedure that we
27 forget what is rather basic called common sense. Now, the fact of
28 the matter is, if this bill goes on 3rd reading and is brought back
29 to 2nd reading tomorrow, all amendments can be offered, debated, voted
30 up or down. Now, all amendments will be voted up or down. The fact
31 of the matter is, if you would just listen to and follow closely, if
32 every day this bill was called on 2nd reading, someone would say: I have
33 another amendment and then five members would say we want it printed,

1 it would be a deferral of another day. That could happen for thirty
2 days and the Legislature would be out without ever having addressed
3 the subject matter. I think common sense dictates that we not follow
4 that kind of a procedure. Now, the suggestion has been made that the
5 bill either remain on 2nd reading or go to 3rd reading with the under-
6 standing that it will be returned tomorrow where all amendments will
7 be offered, all amendments will be debated, the bill will then go to
8 3rd reading and subsequent to that time the bill will be voted up or
9 down. Senator Lane.

10 SENATOR LANE:

11 Yes Sir, Mr. President. In order to expedite the actions of this
12 Body, I move that we move the bill on to the 3rd reading with the stipu-
13 lation that we'll bring it back to 2nd tomorrow for amendments.

14 PRESIDENT:

15 Senator McCarthy is the...only amendment on the Desk and he is
16 recognized.

17 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

18 I...I raise a...an objection, of course, to that motion because
19 it is in violation of the rules. Now, let me state this to the Presi-
20 dent and to the members of this Body because...I understand...what's
21 desired here. I think there...it is desired by the majority of the
22 Insurance and Licensed Activities if the bill passed as it lays on the
23 Secretary's Desk and...the parliamentary maneuvers that can be exer-
24 cised must not necessarily be exercised in all situations. I'm rather
25 persuaded by Senator Wooten arising on a point of order...as that he
26 is in a same position as am I insofar as the amendment that has been
27 designated No. 1 is concerned. I don't, however, Mr. President, wish
28 to foreclose the activities of any of the other persons who may be
29 prospective offerors of this amendment; so I will do this, unilaterally,
30 on proposed Amendment No. 1. I will on proposed Amendment No. 1 with-
31 draw that amendment with the clear understanding that if the bill is
32 advanced, that it be brought back to 2nd reading again for the purpose
33 of considering Amendment No. 1. Now, that is as far as I am able to go.

1 PRESIDENT:

2 Senator...

3 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

4 So, if I have that assurance from Senator Lane, Senator Lane,
5 I will, at this time, withdraw Amendment No. 1 and I will then re-
6 offer it...when the bill is called back for 2nd reading for the
7 purposes of amendments.

8 PRESIDENT:

9 Senator McCarthy has withdrawn Amendment No. 1. Amendment No.
10 1 then loses its identity as Amendment No. 1. Amendment No. 1 now
11 by Senator Donnewald. Senator Donnewald.

12 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

13 Well, of course,...if the bill is moved to the order of 3rd
14 reading with the understanding that all, I say all, amendments will
15 be considered, I...I...I am ready to move on with the other business
16 of the Senate...

17 PRESIDENT:

18 Will Senator Lane...

19 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

20 ...but...I...I don't...I speak only for myself and I would...

21 PRESIDENT:

22 Senator Lane has indicated that he will move the bill to 3rd
23 reading with the explicit understanding that the bill will be returned
24 to the order of 2nd reading tomorrow for the offering of any amend-
25 ments that the Body desires...and I would suggest that those amend-
26 ments be printed tomorrow, will be printed and on the member's desks
27 by tomorrow, otherwise they won't be heard. Senator Bruce.

28 SENATOR BRUCE:

29 Just...just a question of the Chair. If we do adopt amendments
30 tomorrow on this very important piece of legislation, is it the Chair's
31 intention to move this bill on the order of 3rd reading for final pass-
32 age tomorrow, having not had a chance to reassemble the bill in its
33 amended form?

1 . PRESIDENT:

2 That would be out of the Chair's control. That would be up to
3 the sponsor if he desired to try to move it...

4 SENATOR BRUCE:

5 Well...well...I...would...would ask the sponsor then that ques-
6 tion; whether or not he intends to move the bill on final passage
7 tomorrow when the members have not had a chance to check all the
8 amendments and have a chance to read the bill in it's amended form?
9 It's a very important piece of legislation over which there is some
10 controversy about committee debate.

11 PRESIDENT:

12 He indicates that he would hold it till members had a chance to
13 read it; I...the Chair would strongly recommend that it be held to
14 another day next week for final passage so the...

15 SENATOR BRUCE:

16 Thank...

17 PRESIDENT:

18 ...members could be familiar with the amendments.

19 SENATOR BRUCE:

20 Thank you, Mr. President.

21 PRESIDENT:

22 Surely. Senator Donnewald.

23 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

24 Well, Mr. President. My Amendment No. 2...I would...

25 PRESIDENT:

26 It's now Amendment No. 1....

27 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

28 Now...I...I want to address myself to that. I want to withdraw
29 that amendment, now, in order that we have the right sequence in
30 our series of amendments that will be offered today and be on the
31 desk of the members tomorrow.

32 PRESIDENT:

33 Senator Donnewald...seeks leave.

1 SENATOR DONNEWALD:

2 I with...

3 PRESIDENT:

4 ...to move proposed Amendment No. 2. Is there leave? Leave is
5 granted. Senator Graham.

6 SENATOR GRAHAM:

7 Mr...Mr. President and members of the Senate. We have spent
8 enough time on this parliamentary quibbling to have printed the amend-
9 ments, in the finest type available, read all the Journals on the
10 Desk and had lunch. Now, there's some of us in the Senate who have
11 no real deep interests in this legislation only to consider the major-
12 ity of the Senate insofar as their responsibilities of the people
13 are concerned. I might suggest to the principals, who seem to have
14 a greater interest than I, one way or other, that perhaps tomorrow
15 we get on with the business. I think we've had our parliamentary
16 bickering for the time and if there is an interest in passing this
17 bill, I could remind them that tomorrow is Friday and there are peo-
18 ple that are going to get tired of a continuation of this if we are
19 going to address ourselves to this bill and I hope we get on with it.

20 PRESIDENT:

21 Is there leave to move to the order of the Secretary's Desk? Oh,
22 pardon me. You read the bill a 2nd time. 3rd reading. Now, Senate
23 Bill 1500 is now on 3rd reading pursuant to the...explicit agreement
24 that it will be brought back tomorrow for the purpose of all amendments,
25 and will be held for final passage until the following week. Senator
26 Bruce.

27 SENATOR BRUCE:

28 Yes, on the Secretary's Desk, Mr. President, I have a Conference
29 Committee Report that I would like to move to adopt today if...it
30 meets with the approval of the Chair.

31 PRESIDENT:

32 ...Alright, what is the number? We'll get to it, Senator.

33 SENATOR BRUCE:

1 House Bill 1090.

2 PRESIDENT:

3 Alright, now on...on the order of the Secretary's Desk, Senate
4 Bill 426, Senator Johns.

5 SENATOR JOHNS:

6 Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
7 This is a bill for the Department of Agriculture. It...It...has...
8 House...four House Bill, I mean four House Amendments. I concur with
9 all the amendments and I ask that you concur with me and I would like
10 a favorable vote on this House...I mean Senate Bill 426. Have any
11 questions, I'd be glad to try to answer them concerning the four amend-
12 ments, but both sides of the aisle now agree on these four amendments.

13 PRESIDENT:

14 Any questions? Senator Soper.

15 SENATOR SOPER:

16 Now...we are in a turmoil here...I...

17 PRESIDENT:

18 Just a minute, Senator. Just a minute, Senator.

19 SENATOR SOPER:

20 Mr. President.

21 PRESIDENT:

22 Senator Philip and the fine gentlemen, Senator Philip and the fine
23 gentlemen, would you move off to...and over here Senator Palmer and
24 his lovely group...could we have some order here...we...we have some
25 very important business. I'd like you to hear it. Senator Soper.

26 SENATOR SOPER:

27 Now, this is for final passage. That whole bill may be changed
28 with four amendments on it. I'd like to see the amendments and I'd
29 like to see that bill and I don't want a...I don't want a short...
30 explanation of something that may be vital in this thing. I don't know
31 ...what this bill does. I move that we adjourn till tomorrow and if
32 you've got any amendments like this, let's get them over here. Every-
33 body wants explanations and I want some explanation.

1 PRESIDENT:

2 Senator Johns.

3 SENATOR JOHNS:

4 Mr. President, I'm amenable to whatever is right to make the
5 bill right; this is a bill that...the committees have concurred in
6 the agreements of the amendments and I...I anticipate no...they're
7 all right as far as we know, with both sides of the aisle. They have
8 been worked over, hashed over; this is...I...think what's happening
9 here is, we're getting some fallout from previous discussions.

10 PRESIDENT:

11 Senator Wooten.

12 SENATOR WOOTEN:

13 Mr. President, an inquiry. I am not clear as to what our rules
14 state regarding...concurrences and Conference Committee Reports and
15 so on. I...I believe, as I recall, they're to be printed in the
16 Calendar which they are being done, but are we not also to have a
17 printed copy on our desk as a matter of form. We are not? Well, what
18 is the requirement then? They to be printed in the Calendar and
19 that's it?

20 PRESIDENT:

21 The rule is that the...the bill and the amendment must lay on
22 the Secretary's Desk for one day before action is taken on it. I am
23 not aware of a rule that requires its printing. The custom and usage
24 has been for the...the member handling the bill to answer all questions
25 and make explanations of it. Those members who manifest a different
26 interest can come down, read the bill and the amendments; that's al-
27 ways been the rule.

28 SENATOR WOOTEN:

29 That's alright. It rests with the individual member's initiative
30 on that point then? Alright, I just wanted to be clear as to what
31 the rules were. Thank you.

32 PRESIDENT:

1 Senator Course.

2 SENATOR COURSE:

3 Yes, Mr. President. Senate Bill 1500 will appear on the order
4 of 3rd reading tomorrow, is that correct?

5 PRESIDENT:

6 That's correct, Senator.

7 SENATOR COURSE:

8 When will that bill be called? Immediately, or...or are we
9 going to start at...the beginning with...Senate Bills on 3rd reading?

10 PRESIDENT:

11 Senate Bills on 2nd reading will be called before Senate Bills
12 on 3rd reading.

13 SENATOR COURSE:

14 What about House Bills? 1500, it's on 3rd reading.

15 PRESIDENT:

16 It will be by...it will be brought back into the record by motion
17 of the sponsor to remove it from the order of 3rd reading to the order
18 of 2nd reading for amendments.

19 SENATOR COURSE:

20 Well, it's my understanding that you...you're going to keep all
21 the Senate Bills on 3rd reading on 3rd reading before you...and call
22 House Bill...or Senate Bill 1500 first. Is that correct? Call it
23 back to the order of 3rd reading...2nd reading.

24 PRESIDENT:

25 We...we...we will get to Senate Bills on 2nd reading prior to
26 Senate Bills on 3rd reading. At a point during the 2nd reading, I
27 would assume, that the sponsor would make a motion to remove 1500
28 from the order of 3rd back to the order of 2nd for an amendment.
29 Even if there is then intervening business, the bill would not be
30 called because we have already said it would be held till next week
31 until all members had an opportunity to read those amendments. So,
32 it won't be heard tomorrow. Senator Chew, what purpose do you arise?

33 SENATOR CHEW?

1 I see on the Calendar, which I think is a mistake, a committee
2 hearing at 2:30. The Committee hearing on Transportation is 1:30,
3 not 2:30...and I want to announce that so the members of the com-
4 mittee will be at 1:30.

5 PRESIDENT:

6 Alright, now, we're still on the...uno momento. We are still on
7 the order of bills on the Secretary's Desk. We are addressing Senate
8 Bill 426. Senator Johns has moved for the concurrence of the...House
9 Amendments No. 1, 2, 3 and 4. Senator Soper has raised the question
10 with reference to not having seen the amendments. Do you desire to
11 ask questions of the sponsor? Senator Soper.

12 SENATOR SOPER:

13 Well, I find from Senator Weaver that he has looked over the
14 amendments...and that he's okayed them and that's all right with me;
15 I'll...I trust his judgment. I withdraw my objection and move the
16 adoption.

17 PRESIDENT:

18 The question is, shall the Senate concur in Amendments 1, 2,
19 3 and 4 to Senate Bill 426. Those in favor, vote Aye. Those opposed,
20 vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the
21 record. On that question, the Ayes are 49, the Nays are none, with
22 none Voting Present. The Senate concurs in Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4
23 to Senate Bill 426 and Senate Bill 426 having received the required
24 constitutional majority is declared passed. House Bill 1090 on the
25 Secretary's Desk, Senator Bruce.

26 SENATOR BRUCE:

27 Yes, Mr. President, this is the transfer of funds previously
28 appropriated to the Illinois Law Enforcement Commission. I believe the
29 leadership and the members of the Appropriations Committee, Senator
30 Weaver, Senator Mohr have all signed the report. It relates to two
31 items, the ISPERN Radio System would be continued with additional
32 purchase of radios; there was also a thirty-eight thousand dollar
33 transfer out of the Personnel line item, thirty thousand of which was

1 transferred to Contractual Services, eight thousand of which was
2 transferred to Telecommunications; that is the only change presently
3 contained in the bill; it has been signed by all ten members of
4 the Conference Committee and I would now move, Mr. President, that we
5 adopt the Conference Committee Report on House Bill 1090.

6 PRESIDENT:

7 Any further discussion? Senator Buzbee.

8 SENATOR BUZBEE:

9 Parliamentary inquiry, Mr. President. You said House Bill 1090
10 on the Secretary's Desk and nowhere on the Calendar do I see anything
11 about that.

12 PRESIDENT:

13 No, no, it's a Conference Committee Report.

14 SENATOR BUZBEE:

15 Well...

16 PRESIDENT:

17 But it is on the Secretary's Desk...

18 SENATOR BUZBEE:

19 Alright, let me...let me...make an inquiry here then. Now, we're...
20 we're beginning to start with the Conference Committee Reports coming
21 back...I have...not questioning Senator Bruce's explanation of the bill
22 or anything, but this is final passage stage and one of the biggest
23 criticisms that I heard over the past two and half years that I have
24 been here, is the fact that we vote on Conference Committee Reports
25 without knowing what the heck is contained in them and is there
26 some way that we will have a method...of getting a copy of the report
27 on each member's desk or something where we know what we're voting on.

28 PRESIDENT:

29 Senator Bruce.

30 SENATOR BRUCE:

31 Yes.

32 SENATOR BUZBEE:

33 Well...

1 PRESIDENT:

2 You...you say you don't...you're not questioning his integrity,
3 but you just want in the future a copy of the Conference Committee
4 Report. Now, let me just this to you. The Conference Committee
5 Report is always on the Secretary's Desk. Are you asking that all
6 Conference Committee Reports be printed and put on the member's
7 desks before they're voted on? Is that your request?

8 SENATOR BUZBEE:

9 Well, Mr. President, my request is that I have something that
10 I have...I am able to cast somewhat of an intelligent vote hopefully
11 on to base my vote upon because we're going to be coming in...

12 PRESIDENT:

13 I understand that, that is why I asked the question I asked.

14 SENATOR BUZBEE:

15 ...well, yes, I'm...I'm not trying to be dilatory, I'm not trying
16 to be obstreperous; I just want to know what I'm voting on...so, if...
17 if...if that's what it takes, then, yes, I guess that's what I'm asking.

18 PRESIDENT:

19 I heard your...your interrogation.

20 SENATOR BUZBEE:

21 So what...I've...I...again I am directing a question at the
22 Chair what...what is the response of the Chair as to what will the
23 members have to base their votes upon other than the sponsor's ex-
24 planation in the future?

25 PRESIDENT:

26 We can print Conference Reports. Some of them will...will
27 come in today and be acted on today. We'll...we'll with as much dis-
28 patch as is humanly possible, print the Conference Committee Reports, so
29 they will be available to the members. The question is, shall the Sen-
30 ate adopt the Conference Committee Report on House Bill 1090. Those in
31 favor will vote Aye, opposed Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted
32 who wish? Take the record. On this question, the Ayes are 48, the
33 Nays are none, with one Voting Present. The Senate adopts the Con-

1 ference Committee Report on House Bill 1090, and the bill having
2 received the required constitutional majority is declared passed.
3 Senator Netsch is recognized for a motion on House Bill 390, or 309.
4 309.

5 SENATOR NETSCH:

6 I think in view of the lateness of the hour, that I would re-
7 quest that be reset for next week, and I believe Senator Egan has a
8 similar request with respect to his motion.

9 PRESIDENT:

10 Would you care for a specific date, Seantor?

11 SENATOR NETSCH:

12 Tuesday...Wednesday, Senator Egan requests Wednesday, I'll
13 take the same day.

14 PRESIDENT:

15 That's Wednesday June...

16 SENATOR NETSCH:

17 Wednesday, I'm sorry, June 11th, I believe it's the 11th, Mr.
18 President.

19 PRESIDENT:

20 June 11th...

21 SENATOR NETSCH:

22 Yes.

23 PRESIDENT:

24 Senators Netsch and Egan move that House Bills 309 and 1124 be
25 deferred on the Calendar of Motions in Writing to Wednesday June 11th,
26 1975. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Netsch.

27 SENATOR NETSCH:

28 Well...I almost have the Floor, Mr. President...

29 PRESIDENT:

30 You have the Floor.

31 SENATOR NETSCH:

32 Thank you very much. May I also seek the consent of the Senate,
33 unanimous consent, to shift the chief sponsorship of House 1627 from

1 Senator Regner to myself with his permission.

2 PRESIDENT:

3 Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Rock.

4 SENATOR ROCK:

5 Thank you, Mr. President. Similar...similar motion, House
6 Bill 1079 which is the appropriation for the Dangerous Drugs
7 Commission, was inadvertently assigned to Senator Romano, the chief
8 sponsor, Senate sponsor should be, and I would ask leave that he be
9 shown as Senator Palmer.

10 PRESIDENT:

11 Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Johns.

12 SENATOR JOHNS:

13 Just a point of information. Now, will all the Senators please
14 give me your attention? Today, we have in Executive Committee one
15 of the largest workloads we've faced in a long time. I do not like
16 the idea of having you come into that committee hungry and from such
17 a discussion as we've just had. So, I'm going to move the committee
18 up to 1:15. That gives you an adequate time to get...what's that
19 Senator Merritt? Senator Merritt. ...Well, I'll give you fifteen more
20 minutes, 1:30, and so I will expect you to be there. I want to start
21 immediately at 1:30, we've got a tremendous workload, and I would
22 appreciate your being...

23 PRESIDENT:

24 Just...just...just a minute, Senator.

25 SENATOR JOHNS:

26 They're on time.

27 PRESIDENT:

28 That may cause us some conflicts. Senator Rock.

29 SENATOR ROCK:

30 Well, thank you, Mr. President. I...don't...I do not disagree
31 with Senator Johns. I think the idea of a lunch hour is a good one.
32 The problem, however, appears that the Committee on Elections and
33 Reapportionment is scheduled in the Room 212 at 2:30, so Executive

1 would have only an hour in that event.

2 PRESIDENT:

3 Senator Chew.

4 SENATOR CHEW:

5 And it would conflict with Transportation...

6 PRESIDENT:

7 Never mind.

8 SENATOR CHEW:

9 ...because I'm on Executive...

10 PRESIDENT:

11 Senator Johns.

12 SENATOR CHEW:

13 We might as well go on with it now.

14 PRESIDENT:

15 Senator Johns.

16 SENATOR JOHNS:

17 Mr....Mr. President, I see a problem. I tell you what. We
18 will just have to accept the attendance there. We will start immediately.

19 PRESIDENT:

20 Thank you, Senator. Senator Kenneth Hall.

21 SENATOR KENNETH HALL:

22 Thank you, Mr. President. I seek leave of the Senate to have
23 House Bill 1587 re-referred from Executive and Appointments Committee
24 to, what's the Welfare Committee. I've talked to the Chairman of both
25 committees and it is acceptable.

26 PRESIDENT:

27 Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Dougherty.

28 SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

29 Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. The Committee...
30 Committee on Local Government scheduled to meet at 10:30 will have
31 a meeting in Room 400 at 12:45. We will work as long as we can to meet
32 our other committee commitments. We'll...and...and then...we'll move
33 over to next week if we have to.

1 PRESIDENT:

2 Thank you, Senator...

3 SENATOR DOUGHERTY:

4 12:45 in Room 400.

5 PRESIDENT:

6 Thank you, Senator. Senator Egan.

7 SENATOR EGAN:

8 Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. I would like
9 leave to...re-refer House Bill 777 from Labor to Transportation with
10 permission of both the Chairmen, I have that permission, may I have
11 leave to make that re-referral.

12 PRESIDENT:

13 Is there a leave? Leave is granted.

14 SENATOR EGAN:

15 And Mr. President, also Senate Bill...rather House Bill 1851
16 from the Committee on Judiciary to the Committee on Executive Appoint-
17 ments with the permission, already granted, of both Chairmen.

18 PRESIDENT:

19 Is there a leave? Leave is granted. Senator Harber Hall.

20 SENATOR HARBER HALL:

21 Mr. President, I'd like leave of the Body to re-refer the follow-
22 ing bills from Executive Appointments to Local Government Affairs. I've
23 talked to both Chairmen of these two Committees about these bills, and
24 the bill numbers are 1453, 1455, 1456 and 1458.

25 PRESIDENT:

26 Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senator Daley.

27 SENATOR DALEY:

28 Mr. President, fellow Senators, the Judiciary meeting will be
29 held at 2:30 in Room 400.

30 PRESIDENT:

31 Senator Kosinski.

32 SENATOR KOSINSKI:

33 Thank you, Mr. President. The Elections and Reapportionment

1 meets at 2:30 sharp. Gentlemen get in there fast, we'll get out
2 fast.

3 PRESIDENT:

4 Senator Latherow.

5 SENATOR LATHEROW:

6 Thank you, Mr. President. I have House Bill 1340 that was
7 assigned to Labor and Commerce and I would ask that that bill re-
8 referred to Transportation and permission to have it heard today.

9 PRESIDENT:

10 Is there leave?

11 SENATOR LATHEROW:

12 I have talked with both Chairmen.

13 PRESIDENT:

14 Leave is granted. Senator Palmer.

15 SENATOR PALMER:

16 I would like to announce that the Education Committee will meet
17 on the Senate Floor at 12:30, and Mr. President, while I have the mike,
18 I would like the record to show on House Bill 1079 that the Senate
19 sponsor is Senator Ben Palmer in lieu of Senator Romano, that was done
20 by error.

21 PRESIDENT:

22 That's already been done twice. Leave is granted twice. Now...
23 on the Secretary's Desk. Senate Bill 35, Senator Hickey. Senate Bill
24 35 on the Secretary's Desk.

25 SENATOR HICKEY:

26 Mr. President, in...since some people want to have something in
27 writing in front of them before they vote it, even though this is
28 a very simple measure, I just ask for this to be printed, and I'll...
29 I'll postpone consideration until tomorrow.

30 PRESIDENT:

31 Thank you, Senator. Senate Bill 146 on the Secretary's Desk,
32 Senators Schaffer and Davidson. Hold it till tomorrow. Take it out
33 of the record.

1 SENATOR GRAHAM:

2 Mr. President, and members of the Senate. We have a Vehicle
3 Bill, a bill that's on the Secretary's Desk for our concurrence or
4 nonconcurrence in a House amendment. There is a need for the House
5 to put an amendment on this type legislation to help correct a very...

6 PRESIDENT:

7 What is the number of the bill, Senator?

8 SENATOR GRAHAM:

9 ...Problem, and I, at this point in time, want to explain to the
10 members that we're accomodating the House, I'm going to move that we
11 do not concur in the House amendment and return it, ask for a Con-
12 ference Committee so we can accommodate their desires.

13 PRESIDENT:

14 The motion is on Senate Bill 66. All in favor will say Aye.
15 Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. The motion carries. Resolutions.

16 SECRETARY:

17 Resolution No. 93 introduced by Senator Newhouse, congratulatory.

18 PRESIDENT:

19 Senator Newhouse.

20 SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

21 Read the Resolution.

22 PRESIDENT:

23 Could you explain it, Senator. We...we got a time problem.

24 SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

25 This is a congratulatory resolution for a businessman in the
26 City of Chicago, Mr. S. B. Fuller, who celebrates his seventieth
27 birthday, there was a testimonial to him last night, and this is for
28 that purpose.

29 PRESIDENT:

30 Senator Newhouse moves the suspension of the rules for the
31 immediate consideration and adoption of the Resolution. All in favor
32 will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. The rules are suspended.
33 Senator Newhouse moves the immediate adoption of Senate Resolution 93.

1 All in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Resolution is adopted.

2 SECRETARY:

3 Senate Resolution 94 introduced by Senator Mitchler, it's
4 congratulatory.

5 PRESIDENT:

6 Senator Mitchler.

7 SECRETARY:

8 Union Congregational Church.

9 SENATOR MITCHLER:

10 Yes, this is Congratulatory Resolution...

11 PRESIDENT:

12 Senator Mitchler moves the immediate suspension of the rules
13 for the immediate consideration of Senate Resolution No. 94. All in
14 favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The rules are suspended. Senator
15 Mitchler moves the immediate adoption of Senate Resolution 94. All
16 in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The amendment is adopted.

17 SECRETARY:

18 Senate Resolution No. 95 introduced by Senator Mitchler, it's
19 congratulatory.

20 PRESIDENT:

21 Senator Mitchler.

22 SENATOR MITCHLER:

23 Move for suspension of the rules and adoption of this congratu-
24 latory Resolution.

25 PRESIDENT:

26 Senator Mitchler moves for the suspension and the immediate con-
27 sideration and suspension of the rules and adoption of Senate
28 Resolution 95. Those in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The
29 rules are suspended. Senate Mitchler moves for the immediate adoption
30 of Senate Resolution No. 95. All in favor say Aye, opposed Nay.
31 The Ayes have it. Senate Resolution No. 95 is adopted.

32 SECRETARY:

33 Senate Resolution 96 introduced by Senator Newhouse, and it's

1 a Death Resolution.

2 PRESIDENT:

3 Will the members be in their seats? This is a Death Resolution.
4 Will the members be in their seats? This is a Death Resolution. Will
5 the members be in their seats? This is a Death Resolution. Senator
6 Newhouse.

7 SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

8 Thank you, Mr. President. I think we all know that three days
9 ago one of the former heavyweight champions of the World, Ezzard
10 Charles, died in the City of Chicago. It's not so important that
11 Ezzard Charles was heavyweight champion of the World as it was, as it
12 was, was what kind of human being he was. He was a man gave tremendously
13 of himself to young people, old people, strangers, friends, later in
14 his career afflicted with a disease that debilitated his body by
15 stages and I'm sure that you can imagine for a man as active and as
16 athletic as he what a traumatic situation it was, however, right to
17 the end, he was the same cheerful individual that he was when he had
18 all his faculties: Toward the end, this man, this giant, was unable
19 to speak, and he communicated with people by blinking his eyes.
20 Courageous man, great heart, we are going to all miss him, and I
21 would certainly like this Body to recognize the fact that we've lost
22 a great man from our community.

23 PRESIDENT:

24 Senator Newhouse moves the immediate suspension of the rules for
25 the immediate consideration of Senate Resolution 96. Those in
26 favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. The rules
27 are suspended. Senator Newhouse moves the immediate adoption of Senate
28 Resolution 96. Those in favor will...will please rise. The Resolution
29 is adopted. Senator Newhouse.

30 SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

31 I'm sorry I omitted a very important thing. I'd like all
32 Senators to join in this Resolution.

33 PRESIDENT:

1. Leave is granted. The Senate will stand adjourned until

2. nine o'clock tomorrow morning.

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
