6 PRESIDENT:

7 Reading of the Journal.

8 SECRETARY:

9 October 22nd, 1975, Wednesday, October 22, 1975, Thursday,
10 October 23rd, 1975.

11 PRESIDENT:

12 Senator McCarthy.

13 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

14 Yes, Mr. President. I move that the Journals just read
15 by the Secretary be approved unless some Senator has additions
16 or corrections to offer.

17 PRESIDENT:

18 Heard the motion. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay.
19 The Ayes have it. The motion carries. Committee reports.

20 SECRETARY:

21 Senator Partee, Chairman of Rules Committee, reports
22 that the Rules Committee met on November 3rd, 1975, and by a
23 vote of five to nothing authorized Senate Bill 1513 to be
24 introduced, read a first time, ordered printed, and referred
25 to the Committee on Assignment of Bills. Senate Bill 1513.

26 (Secretary reads title of bill)

27 1st reading of the bill.

28 Senator Donnewald, Chairman of Assignment of Bills,
29 assigns the following bill to Committee.

31 PRESIDENT:

32 Resolutions.

33 SECRETARY:

Senate Resolution 163 introduced by Senator Kenneth Hall

1 and all Senators...it's congratulatory.

2 PRESIDENT:

3 Senator Hall.

4 SENATOR HALL:

5 Thank you, Mr. President, fellow Senators. This is
6 a congratulatory resolution for a policeman who acted in
7 and above, beyond the call of duty. It's congratulatory.
8 He has been commended for different groups and I would like
9 at this time for it to be...

10 PRESIDENT:

11 Senator Hall moves the suspension...

12 SENATOR HALL:

13 ...rules...

14 PRESIDENT:

15 ...of the rules for the immediate consideration of this
16 resolution. All in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The resolution
17 is under consideration. Senator Hall now moves for the
18 immediate adoption of this resolution. All in favor say Aye.
19 Opposed Nay. The resolution is adopted.

20 SENATOR HALL:

21 Thank you.

22 SECRETARY:

23 Senate Resolution 164 introduced by Senator Mitchler.
24 It's congratulatory.

25 PRESIDENT:

26 Senator Mitchler.

27 SENATOR MITCHLER:

28 I move for the immediate consideration and adoption of this
29 resolution. It's congratulatory. What...what is the name...

30 SECRETARY:

31 Miss U.S.A.

32 SENATOR MITCHLER:

33 ...well that's Christy de la Cerra.

PRESIDENT:

1 Senator Mitchler moves for the suspension of the rules for
2 the immediate consideration of this resolution. All in favor will
3 say Aye. Opposed Nay. The rules are suspended. Senator Mitchler
4 now moves for the immediate adoption of this resolution. All in favor
5 will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The resolution is adopted.

6 SECRETARY:

7 Senate Resolution 165 introduced by Senator Mitchler. And
8 it's congratulatory...Lester W. Bell.

9 SENATOR MITCHLER:

10 This is for Lester W. Bell, Thirty-third Degree, who is the
11 Commander in Chief of the Oriental Consistory of the Scottish
12 Rite for the Valley of Chicago. I would ask for suspension
13 of the rules, immediate consideration and adpotion of the
14 resolution.

15 PRESIDENT:

16 Senator Mitchler seeks the suspension of the rules
17 for the immediate consideration of this resolution. All in favor
18 say Aye. Opposed Nay. The rules are suspended. Now, Senator
19 Mitchler moves for...the immediate adoption of this resolution.
20 All in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The resolution is adopted.

21 SECRETARY:

22 Senate Resolution 166, introduced by Senator Mitchler

24 PRESIDENT:

25 Senator Mitchler.

26 SENATOR MITCHLER:

27 This is a congratulatory resolution for the Joliet Lodge
28 300 of the Loyal Order of Moose on the occasion of their sixty-
29 fifth anniversary and I would ask for suspension of the rules,
30 immediate consideration and adoption of the resolution.

31 PRESIDENT:

32 Senator Mitchler moves for the suspension of the rules

34 say Aye. Opposed Nay. The resolution is under consideration.

1. Senator Mitchler now moves for the immediate adoption

5. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

6. I would inquire of the Chair if Senator Mitchler

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Just a moment. Will the members be in their seat.
15. Your voices carry very much in here. We can hardly hear it.
16. Senator Palmer.

17. SENATOR PALMER:

18. ...and this resolution. I move for its adoption.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Any discussion? Senator Palmer moves for the immediate
21. adoption of this resolution. All in favor say Aye. Opposed

2. SENATOR BELL:

3. Yes, thank you Mr. President.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator, Senator. The Secretary informs me that no motion
6. has been filed on this bill.

7. SENATOR BELL:

8. That's right. I want to sustain the Governor's veto on it.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Well, even so, you...we should have a written motion.
11. In other words, Senator, you are in favor of what has, the veto
12. as...as announced. So you don't have to do anything. It just
13. stays in that posture and that's it. Senate Bill 279, Senator

23. SENATOR HARRIS:

24. Mr. President, would it not be more judicious of time
25. utilization just to inquire from the membership whether anyone
26. wishes their motions called? And it does seem to me that it...
27. we really don't need to go through the recital all the way
28. through the Calendar. If a member wants to get at it, I
29. appreciate that...that there's a reluctance about being first
30. but it just seems to me that we could save some time.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Well, I had planned not to do that but once, to go through
33. them one time and then from that point forward.

SENATOR HARRIS:

1. Okay.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. ...do this so that everybody...

4. SENATOR HARRIS:

5. Fine. Very good. Okay.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Knuppel.

8. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

9. Parliamentary inquiry. If...if like on 410 we just went by as
10. far as I'm concerned there was a duplicate bill passed. I want to
11. get it off the Calendar. What do I do to do this? There's no
12. use in calling it.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. What we're going to do, Senator, just to get a handle on
15. things, is to go through this list one time. From this point
16. forward anyone that had a total veto that wants consideration
17. of it will file a motion. And then we'll only call those, but

21 the membership. Commencing on page ten are Item Reductions and there
22 follows on page eleven for about two-thirds of the page, Item
23 Reductions. The Secretary informs me that no motions have been
24 filed on Item Reductions. There is a motion on a specific
25 recommendation for change. On Item Vetoes there are no motions
26 filed, on Item Reductions there is one, which is Senate Bill 555 and
27 that's Senator Don Moore. Senator Moore, do you care to go with that
28 now? Hold it. We're going to the order of Specific Recommendations
29 for Change. Senate Bill 24, Senator Wooten. Just a moment.
30 Could we break up the caucus here please, and would the members
31 be in their seats. Senate Bill 24, Senator Wooten. Senate Bill
32 37, Senator Rock. Senate Bill 45, Senator Fawell. Senate Bill
33 66, Senator Graham. Senate Bill 223, Senator Fawell. Senate Bill 267,

1. Senator Berning. Senator Berning.

2. SENATOR BERNING:

3. Mr. President and members of the Senate. There is a motion
4. filed with the Secretary to accept the specific recommendations
5. of the Governor to Senate Bill 267, and I therefore move that
6. the recommendations of the Governor be accepted as presented if
7. that's the proper motion.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Do you desire to explain it, Senator?

10. SENATOR BERNING:

11. I beg your pardon.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Do you desire to explain your position?

14. SENATOR BERNING:

15. What, you want me to explain the Governor's amendment?

16. My position is to concur in the Governor's amendatory
17. vetos of Senate Bill 267, which affects the Commission Counties
18. and their...

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Just a minute, Senator. The only reason I made the
21. suggestion is that somebody is going to stand up in a few minutes
22. and say what are we voting on. And that's the only reason
23. I ask you to give a brief explanation of it and I'm going to
24. ask for any further discussion so that the members will, in fact,
25. know what they're voting on. That's the only reason I did it.

26. SENATOR BERNING:

27. Very well. Senate Bill 267 was a County Problems Commission
28. Bill introduced at the request of the Commission Counties. Those
29. counties were statutorily prohibited from exercising any authority
30. similar to the other counties in establishing rates of reimbursement
31. for their members for necessary travel and other expenses. Senate
32. Bill 267 was passed but the Governor has in his wisdom added a
33. small amendment which does not do violence to the bill and I move
34. to concur. The amendment...on lines twenty-six through thirty-one

1. inserting in lieu of those lines this: No per diem or travel
2. or other expenses for transacting county business other than board
3. meetings may be paid except upon the filing with the county board
4. of a report stating the nature of such business. Such report
5. shall appear on the minutes of the meeting of the county board
6. at which such per diem and expenses are approved and would appear
7. that this would tighten up the distribution of expenses by
8. providing that a claim must be filed. I see no objection and I
9. therefore would move to concur.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Any further discussion? The question is shall the Senate
12. accept the specific recommendations of the Governor to
13. Senate Bill 267 in the manner and form just stated by the Senator
14. Berning. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay.
15. The Secretary will call the roll.

32. SENATOR GRAHAM:

33. Yes, Mr...

2. Just a moment, Senator, let, let's read the motion. Read
3. the motion.
4. SECRETARY:
5. I move to accept the specific recommendations of the Governor
6. as to Senate Bill 66 in the manner and form as follows:
7. On page four, line eleven, by deleting five hundred and
8. inserting in lieu thereof, fifty. Dated October 22. Signed
9. by Senator John Graham.
10. PRESIDENT:
11. Senator Graham.
12. SENATOR GRAHAM:
13. Mr. President, and members of the Senate, this was a bill
14. dealing with annexational property at the Metropolitan Sanitary
15. District.
16. PRESIDENT:
17. Just a minute, senator. will the members be in their seats.
18. Can't hear the gentleman. The noise carries tremendously well
19. in this room. The acoustics are very good and you just can't
20. hear even if you're talking to the person right beside you.
21. I...we can hear it up here. Senator Graham.
22. SENATOR GRAHAM:
23. We passed the bill once and the Village of Richton Park
24. found the necessity to have us consider an annexation for
25. them and as a result of Senator Moore and other people we called
26. it back, hung on their amendment and found out later their
27. attorney found out that there was a typographical error on page
28. four, line eleven. They have five hundred in there and it should
29. have been fifty. This specific recommendation corrects that
30. typographical error and I do move to accept the specific recom-
31. mendation of the Governor on Senate Bill 66.
32. PRESIDENT:
33. Any further discussion? The question is shall the Senate

1. accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to
2. Senate Bill 66 in the manner and form as just stated by the
3. Senator. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will
4. vote Nay. Secretary will call the roll.

5. SECRETARY:

18. 66 having received the required majority vote of Senators

20. Buzbee. Senate Bill 518, Senator Carroll.

21. SENATOR CARROLL:

22. Thank you Mr. President, and members of the Senate. Oh,
23. excuse me. I move that...

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Would the gentlemen standing between me and Senator Carroll
26. please find comfortable seats. Senator Palmer.

27. SENATOR CARROLL:

28. I can see over them.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Oh, he can see over you. All right.

31. SENATOR CARROLL:

32. Yeah.

33. PRESIDENT:

34. But you can't talk over...Senator Carroll is recognized.

1. SENATOR CARROLL:

2. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate.
3. The Governor made a correction in the language on Senate Bill
4. 518. It was a error in the original drafting. He corrected
5. that through amendatory veto and I would move that the Senate
6. do accept the Governor's specific recommendation for change.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Any further discussion? The question is shall the Senate
9. accept the specific recommendation of the Governor as to
10. Senate Bill 518 in the manner and form as just stated by
11. Senator Carroll. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed Nay.
12. Secretary will call the roll.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Bell, Berning, Bloom, Brady, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,

24. On that question the Ayes are 45, the Nays are 1.
25. The specific recommendations of the Governor as to Senate Bill
26. 518 having received the required majority of vote of Senators
27. elected, are declared accepted. Senate Bill 522, Senator Carroll.
28. Just a moment, just a moment, now the configuration of this room
29. reminds you perhaps of a theatre, and there seems to be a desire
30. to participate as a Thespian or some sort. But would you please
31. keep down the noise level so that we'll be able to hear those
32. persons who desire to transact business. Senator Carroll.

33. SENATOR CARROLL:

34. Thank you, Mr. President, colleagues of the Senate, I would

1. move that we do accept the Governor's specific recommendations
2. for change for Senate Bill 522. This dealt with the powers
3. of the Boards of Directors of credit unions and there was some
4. ambiguity in the language. The Governor's office felt that it was
5. not quite clear what was meant, and after discussion it was
6. determined that he would amendatorily veto the bill to make the
7. language more specific. I would therefore move we accept
8. the Governor's specific recommendations for change.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. We can't same roll call these bills, Senator Chew, to give
11. them constitutional authority. Any further discussion? The
12. question is shall the Senate accept the specific recommendations
13. of the Governor as to Senate Bill 522, in the manner and form
14. as just stated by Senator Carroll. Those in favor will vote
15. Aye. Opposed Nay. Secretary will call the roll.

27. Shapiro, Aye, Savickas, Aye, Course, Aye. On that question,
28. the Ayes are 49, the Nays are none. Those Voting...pardon me,
29. the specific recommendations of the Governor as to Senate Bill
30. 522, having received the required majority of Senators elected,
31. are declared accepted. Senate Bill 572, Senator Johns. Senate
32. Bill 617, Senator Savickas. Senate Bill 699, Senator Shapiro.
33. Senate Bill 701, Senator Knuppel. Senate Bill 707, Senator Shaffer

1. is recognized.

2. SECRETARY:

3. I move to accept the specific recommendations of the Governor
4. as to Senate Bill 707 in the manner and form as follows:
5. On page one, line twenty-one, by deleting also with the advice
6. and consent of the Senate. Filed October 22, by Senator Jack
7. Schaffer.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Schaffer.

10. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

11. Mr. President, this bill requires the Senate confirmation
12. of members of the Illinois Scholarship Commission as introduced
13. and passed. It would also of required the Senate confirmation
14. on the Chairman, the Governor objected to that
15. provision. I don't particularly care one way or the other.
16. The thrust of the bill was that the Senate do have a chance
17. to confirm once every six years these members. I'm perfectly
18. willing to go along with the Governor on this particular
19. issue.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Any further discussion? The question is shall the Senate
22. accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to Senate
23. Bill 707 in the manner and form as just stated by Senator Schaffer.
24. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay.
25. For what purpose does Senator Mitchler arise?

26. SENATOR MITCHLER:

27. Mr. President, I'd like to ask the sponsor of this bill
28. a question.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. He indicates he'll yield.

31. SENATOR MITCHLER:

32. Senator Schaffer, the original intent of this bill was
33. to give the legislative branch of government a little, a little

1. more control over the selection of the Chairman and members of
2. the State Scholarship Commission. Is that correct?

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Schaffer.

5. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

6. Well, since I wrote the bill, introduced it, my intent
7. was that the members of this Commission be brought before a
8. public forum for questioning on policies at least once during
9. their tenure which happens to be a six year term. I didn't
10. particularly view it as a power grab or thrust for control of
11. the Commission, I just feel that those members should be asked
12. their philosophical positions on...the parts and necessary
13. operation of that particular very important and very well
14. funded Commission. I did not intend that the Legislature
15. should seize control of it since frankly, I, I wouldn't want
16. to have to take the blame for that Commission all the people
17. in my district that don't get scholarships, which happens to
18. be more than do.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Any further discussion? Senator Mitchler.

21. SENATOR MITCHLER:

22. Well, I understood the bill when you passed it, and I
23. gave it support. The idea that the Chairman and members
24. of the State Scholarship Commission would be appointed by the
25. Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. Now, do I
26. understand that the Governor accepted the Senate advising and
27. consenting to the members but not to the Chairman. Is that
28. what the Governor feels is proper?

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Schaffer.

31. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

32. Well, since the Chairman would also be a member, we would
33. have to advise and consent to his appointment. But when he was

1. selected as Chairman, and I believe the procedure is that
2. the membership selects the Chairman, I suspect not without
3. some friendly advise from the Executive Mansion, that he would
4. not have to come back. The Governor objected that there was
5. no precedent in State government for this type of a procedure,
6. I can't honestly say that I, I'm sure of a precedent in this area,
7. he may have a point. I'm not necessarily saying it's a bad
8. precedent, I'm just saying that it is not necessary to
9. accomplish the goal of this particular piece of legislation.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Mitchler.

12. SENATOR MITCHLER:

13. Well, would this in any way violate any statute or anything
14. if we refused the Governor's recommendation not to confirm
15. the Chairman after he's appointed? Would this be in violation
16. of any Executive authority vested in the Office of the Governor?

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Schaffer.

19. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

20. The Governor seems to think so.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Any further discussion? Senator Schaffer, do you desire
23. to add anything? The question is shall the Senate accept
24. the specific recommendations of the Governor as to Senate
25. Bill 707 in the manner and form as just stated by Senator
26. Schaffer. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed Nay.
27. Secretary will call the roll.

14. SENATOR SAVICKAS:

15. Just a question, Mr. President. I had a bill on amendatory
16. veto with the Senate Bill 617 that referred to the child labor
17. law. And in the veto message, I assume that the bill that's
18. printed on the back should be the same bill as the bill
19. that's referred to on the front of the veto message. And in
20. my case it's a totally different bill and this threw me off
21. for a...a matter of a few minutes. I just bring this to your
22. attention if there are other bills this way.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator, we really appreciate your alertness. We have
25. discovered this error and we've discovered that the second
26. page of Senate Bill 45 is printed on the back of Senate Bill
27. 617 and the second page of Senate Bill 617 is printed on the
28. back of Senate Bill 45. It's a printing error. Thank you
29. for your alertness.

30. SENATOR SAVICKAS:

31. You're quite welcome.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senate Bill 827, Senator Kenneth Hall.

1. SENATOR KENNETH HALL:

2. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
3. Senate. There's a motion on the Secretary's Desk.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Read the motion.

6. SECRETARY:

7. I move to accept the specific recommendations for change
8. of the Governor with respect to Senate Bill 827 in the manner
9. and form as follows: Amend Senate Bill 827 on page three,
10. lines sixteen and seventeen by deleting with respect to fiscal
11. year 1975 and inserting there and inserting in lieu thereof,
12. with respect to fiscal year 1976. And on page four, by inserting
13. line twenty-seven the following: Section Two. This amendatory

16. SENATOR KENNETH HALL:

17. Thank you. Mr. President, Senate Bill 827 was co-sponsored
18. by myself and Senator Vadalabene, and what this did is the
19. funding of Illinois' operation deficit for the Bi-State
20. Transit System which is in our area. Now, this substance of the
21. veto was to make permanent the allocation of two-...
22. two-thirty-seconds of the sales tax collected from the
23. Bi-State Metropolitan District. After consultation with
24. Senator Vadalabene and myself that we decided that at the
25. request of the House Transportation Committee, the Transportation
26. Study Commission is studying the Bi-State situation to determine
27. what source of local funding are available for a local
28. match. A permanent two-thirty-second allocation would lock
29. Bi-State into a formula and hamper the flexibility of the
30. Commission and its study. And upon that grounds the Governor
31. vetoed it and that was the rationale of the Governor's veto.
32. So I move and Senator Vadalabene does likewise, to accept the
33. specific recommendation.

2. Any further discussion? The question is shall the Senate
3. accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to
4. Senate Bill 827 in the manner and form as just stated by
5. Senator Kenneth Hall. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed
6. Nay. Secretary will call the roll.

7. SECRETARY:

8. Bell, Berning, Bloom,...

9. PRESIDENT:

10. For what purpose does Senator Harris arise? One moment,
11. please. We're on roll call, Senator. Senator Harris.

12. SENATOR HARRIS:

13. Yes, well I appreciate the fact that we are on roll call.
14. I am not being critical whatsoever of Senator Hall's explanation.
15. But I think there is a pretty serious question involved here,
16. and very frankly, I was trying to research a rather lengthy

7. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. After
8. conferring with Senator Harris, I am now ready to go on
9. Senate Bill 827. As I will reiterate that this was sponsored
10. by Senator Vadalabene and myself, and at the...the Governor's
11. rationale for the veto, was at the request of the House Trans-
12. portation Committee, the Transportation Study Commission
13. is studying the Bi-State situation to determine what source
14. of local fundings are available for a local match. A permanent
15. two-thirty-second allocation would lock Bi-State into a formula
16. and would hamper the flexibility of the Commission and its
17. study. In other words, that that area that we represent is
18. unable to come up with its portion and so that the...studying
19. now is to come up with a solution and we won't have to continually
20. go with this each session.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Any further discussion? The question is shall the Senate
23. accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to
24. Senate Bill 827 in the manner and form as just stated by
25. Senator Kenneth Hall. Those in favor vote Aye. Opposed
26. will vote Nay. Secretary will call the roll.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Bell, Berning, Bloom, Brady, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll,
29. Chew, Clarke, Course, Daley, Davidson, Demuzio, Donnewald,

4 PRESIDENT:

5 Palmer, Aye, Daley, Aye, Mitchler, Aye, Nudelman, Aye.
6 On this question the Ayes are 49, the Nays are none. The
7 specific recommendations of the Governor as to Senate Bill 827,
8 having received the required majority of vote of Senators
9 elected, are declared accepted.

10 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

11 Resolutions.

12 SECRETARY:

13 Senate Resolution 167, introduced by Senator Mitchler
14 and all members. It's congratulatory. It's congratulating
15 Miss Janet Erwin. Ewing.

16 SENATOR MITCHLER:

17 Ewing...is this one for Ewing? This is another one of our
18 beauties. Beautiful girl, made a wonderful title, Miss Teenage
19 Aurora. I'd ask for suspension of the rules, immediate consider-
20 ation and adoption...

21 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

22 Senator Mitchler has moved to suspend the rules for the
23 immediate consideration of Senate Resolution 167. All those
24 in favor signify by saying Aye. Those opposed...the Ayes have
25 it. The rules are suspended. Senator Mitchler now moves for
26 the immediate adoption of Senate Resolution 167. All those
27 in favor signify by saying Aye. All those opposed...the Ayes
28 have it. The resolution is adopted. Resolutions.

29 SECRETARY:

30 Senate Resolution 168, introduced by Senator Buzbee.
31 It's congratulatory.

32 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

1. Senator Buzbee.

2. SENATOR BUZBEE:

3. Mr. President I don't introduce very many congratulatory
4. resolutions, but this one happens to be for Ray Chancey, who
5. is the Democratic County Chairman of my county. And Ray has
6. served as a Precinct Committeeman since 1945 and as County
7. Chairman since 1967. We had a dinner about a week and a half
8. ago for Ray celebrating his some thirty years in the service
9. of the Democratic Party and it was probably the most successful
10. political dinner I've ever been to. The speeches were short.
11. From the time we started to eat until we got out of there it
12. was exactly two hours and everybody just had a great time.
13. And I thought that we ought to ...ought to have a resolution
14. in to congratulate Ray and I would ask that all members
15. be shown as co-sponsors.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

17. Is leave granted? Leave, all members will be shown.
18. Senator Buzbee moves to suspend the rules for the immediate
19. consideration of Senate Resolution 168. All those in favor
20. signify by saying Aye. All those opposed...the Ayes have it.
21. The rules are suspended. Senator Buzbee now moves the immediate
22. consideration, the adoption of resolution...Senate Resolution
23. 168. All those in favor signify by saying Aye. All those
24. opposed...the Ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

25. SECRETARY:

26. Senate...Senate Resolution 169, introduced by Senators
27. Daley, Savickas, Hynes, and Lemke. It's congratulatory.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

29. Senator Daley.

30. SENATOR DALEY:

31. Mr. President and fellow Senators. This is a congratulatory
32. resolution for a priest for seventy-years of age. I ask for
33. the suspension of the rules for the immediate consideration

1. and adoption of this resolution.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

3. Senator Daley has moved to suspend the rules for the

4. immediate consideration of Senate Resolution 169. All those

5. in favor signify by saying Aye. All those opposed...the Ayes

6. have it. The rules are suspended. Senator Daley now moves

7. for the adoption of Senate Resolution 169. All those in

8. favor signify by saying Aye. All those opposed...the Ayes have

9. it. The resolution is adopted.

10. SECRETARY:

11. Senate Resolution 170, introduced by Senator Mitchler.

12. And it's congratulating a Miss Robin Lucker.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

14. Senator Mitchler.

15. SENATOR MITCHLER:

16. That's Miss Teenage America and she's just as pretty

17. as the previous young lady we congratulated and I move

18. for suspension of the rules, immediate consideration and

19. adoption of the resolution.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

21. Senator Mitchler has moved to suspend the rules for the

22. immediate consideration of Senate Resolution 170. All those

23. in favor signify by saying Aye. All those opposed...the Ayes

24. have it. The rules are suspended. Senator Mohr, for what

25. purpose do you arise?

26. SENATOR HOWARD MOHR:

27. Yes, Mr. President. Senator Mitchler seems to have, as

28. long as I've been in this Body, all of the Miss Teenagers and

29. all of the beauty queens from the entire State of Illinois.

30. I wonder if this contest is restricted to just his district.

31. Would you know?

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

33. The Chair has no opinion on that. I...I know that in...

1. I know that in Forest Park there are some beautiful young
2. ladies. That much I can tell you. Senator Mitchler has moved
3. for the suspension of the rules for the...immediate consideration
4. of 170. All those in favor signify by saying Aye. All those
5. opposed...the rules are suspended. Senator Mitchler now
6. moves for the adoption of Senate Resolution 170. All those
7. in favor signify by saying Aye. All those opposed...the Ayes
8. have it. The resolution is adopted.

9. SECRETARY:

10. Senate Resolution 171, introduced by Senator Partee and
11. all members. It's congratulatory.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

13. Senator Partee.

14. SENATOR PARTEE:

15. Mr. President and members of the Senate. This is a
16. resolution for somebody whose name you've heard of. It's a man
17. named Irving Kupcinet, who has given forty years of his life since
18. 1935, to the newspaper business and to sportscasting. He writes
19. a column called "Kup's Column" which is read internationally.
20. There are many, many things in this resolution which I will
21. not reiterate that relates to his rather colorful career. But
22. the least of which is not that...the fact that he is a great
23. humanitarian and has each year a Purple Heart Cruise for
24. Veterans. He originated this nearly thirty-years ago. He's
25. an outstanding American and he lives in the city where I live
26. and I would ask for the suspension of the rules for the immediate
27. consideration of this resolution.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

29. Senator Partee has moved to suspend the rules for the
30. immediate consideration of Senate Resolution 171. All those
31. in favor signify by saying Aye. All those opposed...the Ayes have
32. it. The rules are suspended.

33. SENATOR PARTEE:

1. I now move the adoption of the resolution immediately.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

3. Senator Partee moves the adoption of Senate Resolution
4. 171. All those in favor signify by saying Aye. All those
5. opposed...the Ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

6. SECRETARY:

7. Senate Resolution 172, introduced by Senator Philip and
8. Mitchler and all Senators. It's congratulatory.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

10. Senator Philip.

11. SENATOR PHILIP:

12. Thank you, Mr. President. I was completely unaware until
13. this afternoon that Miss World Illinois comes from DuPage
14. County, the City of Lombard. So this is a resolution
15. congratulating her for her beauty and talent. So I move the
16. suspension of the...appropriate rules and the immediate
17. adoption of this resolution.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

19. Senator Philip has moved to suspend the rules for the
20. immediate consideration of Senate Resolution 172. All those in
21. favor signify by saying Aye. All those opposed...the Ayes have
22. it. The rules are suspended. Senator Philip now moves the
23. adoption of Senate Resolution 172. All those in favor signify
24. by saying Aye. All those opposed...the Ayes have it. The
25. resolution is adopted.

26. SECRETARY:

27. Senate Resolution 173, introduced by Senators Howard Mohr,
28. Harris, Graham, and Partee. It memorializes Congress to extend
29. the Federal revenue sharing.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

31. Executive...Senator Mohr, for what purpose do you arise?

32. SENATOR HOWARD MOHR:

33. Mr. President, I would invite all members to join with me

1 in the sponsorship of this resolution. It's something that is
2 needed by...the continuation is needed by local government,
3 the Illinois Municipal League and other municipalities through-
4 out the entire State are very interested in this resolution
5 and I would move for the suspension of the rules and then...
6 the motion for the immediate adoption.

7 PRESIDENT:

8 Any further discussion? Senator Mohr moves for the immediate
9 suspension of the rules. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed,
10 Nay. The rules are suspended. The Senator now moves for
11 the immediate adoption of this Resolution, 173. All in favor
12 say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The resolution is adopted. Senator
13 McCarthy.

14 SENATOR MCCARHTY:

15 While...while we're just waiting for a couple of moments,
16 I'd like to announce that which is printed and that is that
17 at eight o'clock tomorrow morning, in Room 400 there will be a...

18 PRESIDENT:

19 Pardon me, Senator. Just a moment, Senator. Now,
20 now here's an announcement that, if I were a wagerer I would
21 wager nobody heard. Senator...Senator McCarthy.

22 SENATOR MCCARTHY:

23 Well, thank you very much, Mr. President. Again, this is an
24 announcement of something that's printed in the...in the
25 Calendar. And that is at eight o'clock tomorrow morning,
26 in Room 400, they'll be a meeting of the Senate Finance
27 and Credit Regulations Committee to consider two bills, 3115
28 and 3116. They'll be some witnesses there and I would encourage
29 full participation. Thank you. Eight o'clock. Room 400. To-
30 morrow.

31 PRESIDENT:

32 Senator Vadalabene.

33 SENATOR VADALABENE:

1 Yes, thank you, Mr. President. In the form of an
2 announcement, in Room 212, at ten o'clock tomorrow morning,
3 the Executive Committee on Appointments and Administration.
4 Room 212. Tomorrow morning, ten o'clock.

5 PRESIDENT:

6 Communications. Communications.

7 SECRETARY:

8 Pursuant to the provisions of Senate Resolution 162, I hereby
9 appoint Senator Richard Daley, a member of the Senate Revenue
10 Committee, as a member of the Committee on Physical Accountability.
11 Signed, Senator Kenneth Course, Chairman of Revenue Committee.

12 PRESIDENT:

13 And, may I have your attention. There's another one, Senator.

14 SECRETARY:

15 Pursuant to the provisions of Senate Resolution 162, I hereby
16 appoint Senator Kenneth Buzbee, a member of the Senate Appropriations
17 Committee, as a member of the Committee on Physical Accountability
18 Signed, Senator Thomas Hynes, Chairman, Appropriations Committee.

19 PRESIDENT:

20 The Chair is now informed that all members of that...that
21 committee have been appointed. Four of them are members by oper-
22 ation of law and the other four were appointed in conformity with
23 the rules set forth in the resolution. The members, then, are
24 Senators Course, Hynes, Daley, Buzbee, Shapiro, Weaver, Graham,
25 and Nimrod. Senator Harris and I would like to meet with this
26 committee at eleven-thirty tomorrow morning in my office. The
27 Session will commence tomorrow at noon. There are committee
28 hearings in the morning, some of which have already been announced.
29 Senator Smith is recognized for the purpose of an announcement.

30 SENATOR SMITH:

31 Mr. President and members of the Senate. I've caused to
32 be circulated and I hope that each of you have received such,
33 an invitation to have breakfast with us tomorrow morning at

1 eighty-thirty o'clock at the State House Inn. I assure you
2 that this call is not for any political purposes or reasons
3 whatsoever. If it were for political purposes, I think you know
4 that I have enough experience and sense to not attempt it
5 in any such way as this. We want to meet with you, we want to
6 felicitate with you, have breakfast with you and one additional
7 matter that we will discuss tomorrow morning. It does not
8 pertain to politics. The breakfast will be not at your expense.
9 I am sure I looked into this pocket a while ago and I called
10 Senator Davidson's attention to the fact that the good wife
11 has placed sufficient monies here in and amongst my papers
12 to take care of whatever expense is attached to it. However,
13 I hope that you will obey, if you intend being present, the
14 request that you contact either Senator Davidson's secretary
15 or my secretary and advise that you're planning to be in attendance.
16 It's needful that we know and so advise the hotel. It will
17 not last more than the last one that we had, maybe forty minutes
18 or less, Mr. President. Please let us know if you propose
19 to be in attendance.

20 PRESIDENT:

21 Thank you very much, Senator. And I would only say that
22 Mrs. ...Mrs. Smith is a good sponsor...she's sponsoring. Any
23 further business to come before the Senate? The Calendar shows a
24 meeting of the Special Session scheduled for four o'clock
25 today. That will be a perfunctory meeting inasmuch as there
26 have been no bills and the members will have no necessity
27 to return for that perfunctory meeting. Any further business?
28 Any special business to come before the Senate? Senate
29 stands adjourned until noon tomorrow, November 4th, 1975.
