- 32. Bill 267 was passed but the Governor has in his wisdom added a
- 33. small amendment which does not do violence to the bill and I move
- 34. to concur. The amendment...on lines twenty-six through thirty-one

- 1. inserting in lieu of those lines this: No per diem or travel
- 2. or other expenses for transacting county business other than board
- 3. meetings may be paid except upon the filing with the county board
- 4. of a report stating the nature of such business. Such report
- 5. shall appear on the minutes of the meeting of the county board
- 6. at which such per diem and expenses are approved and would appear
- 7. that this would tighten up the distribution of expenses by

I did not intend that the Legislature should seize control of it since frankly, I, I wouldn't want to have to take the blame for that Commission all the people in my district that don't get scholarships, which happens to

19. PRESIDENT:

Any further discussion? Senator Mitchler.

SENATOR MITCHLER:

be more than do.

Well, I understood the bill when you passed it, and I gave it support. The idea that the Chairman and members of the State Scholarship Commission would be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. Now, do I understand that the Governor accepted the Senate advising and consenting to the members but not to the Chairman. Is that what the Governor feels is proper?

PRESIDENT:

Senator Schaffer.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

Well, since the Chairman would also be a member, we would have to advise and consent to his appointment. But when he was

selected as Chairman, and I believe the procedure is that the membership selects the Chairman, I suspect not without 2. some friendly advise from the Executive Mansion, that he would 3. not have to come back. The Governor objected that there was 4. no precedent in State government for this type of a procedure, 5. I can't honestly say that I, I'm sure of a precedent in this area, 6. he may have a point. I'm not necessarily saying it's a bad 7. precedent, I'm just saying that it is not necessary to 8. accomplish the goal of this particular piece of legislation. 9.

SENATOR KENNETH HALL:

Thank you. Mr. President, Senate Bill 827 was co-sponsored by myself and Senator Vadalabene, and what this did is the funding of Illinois' operation deficit for the Bi-State Transit System which is in our area. Now, this substance of the veto was to make permanent the allocation of two-... two-thirty-seconds of the sales tax collected from the Bi-State Metropolitan District. After consultation with Senator Vadalabene and myself that we decided that at the request of the House Transportation Committee, the Transportation Study Commission is studying the Bi-State situation to determine what source of local funding are available for a local match. A permanent two-thirty-second allocation would lock Bi-State into a formula and hamper the flexibility of the Commission and its study. And upon that grounds the Governor vetoed it and that was the rationale of the Governor's veto. So I move and Senator Vadalabene does likewise, to accept the specific recommendation.

PRESIDENT:

SENATOR BERNING:

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2. Thank you. Mr. President and members of the Senate, 3. to refresh your memory, Senate Bill 845 was introduced 4. after a decision that seemed to preclude a suspended employee 5. who was subsequently reinstated from being entitled to claim 6. the back wages for the time during which he was suspended. 7. Our bill then was passed, and the amendment which the 8. Governor has suggested and with which I concur doesn't 9. challenge the right of the reinstated employee to back wages 10. due him, but does require that any compensation that he has 11. received from the Unemployment Compensation Act or other 12. employment be deducted from what the State is obligated 13. to pay him. There is one other small portion that is 14. also apparently justified and that is that if the replacement 15. employee has received some advancement entitling him to additional 16. increase in compensation that increase will not accrue to the 17. reinstated employee. SENATOR ROCK:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I have filed with the Secretary this morning a motion with respect to Senate Bill 37. I am moving at this time to accept the specific recommendations of the Governor with respect to Senate Bill 37. Senate Bill 37, I'm sure everyone will recall, was that fifty-nine page compendiem of recodifying the horse racing legislation in the State of Illinois. The Governor's amendatory veto message contained five pages of text and eight pages of an appendix detailing in specifying the changes that the Governor saw fit to make pursuant to, I am told, a letter of August 20, 1975 addressed to the Governor, a copy of which I have available if anybody would care to see it, from the Illinois Racing Board in the person of Mr. Scariano, the Chairman. And the Governor indicates in his message to the 79th General Assembly, which was read into this Body on October 22nd. He says, and I quote, "I want to stress again that the changes I have made in this bill bring it into conformity with the recommendations of the Racing Board. And I have placed great reliance on those recommendations." and I close quote. Now the ...

the motion I have filed accepts the specific recommendations 1. of the Governor for change and the motion is nine pages ·2. long. There are some twenty-four substantive changes of 3. one degree or another. I would just... I think, unless there are 4. any questions, point out some of the highlights. One is, of course, I'm sure everyone is aware and has read in the news media, 6. that there is now a prohibition against any political con-7. tributions from owners of racing associations. 8. and Mr. Scariano thought that that was abosolutely vital. 9. I have no compunction about accepting that change. I still 10. feel that it's a dubious constitutionality at best, but if they 11. feel it's that important I don't have any problem with that. 12. So Mr. Chairman...Mr. President unless there are any questions 13. I think that the amount of work over an eighteen month period 14. that has been done with respect to Senate Bill 37 and its 15. predecessor bills that were introduced in the House and the 16. Senate warrants this action by this General Assembly. We now)7. have virtual unanimity among the members of the racing board, 18. the Illinois Legislative Investigating Commission, the 19. Governor's office and all interested parties. This will put 20. Illinois in the forefront of the Horse Race Industry in the... 21. in the United States. This is the first major revision of. 22. this law and with the passage of this bill, with the acceptance 23. of the Governor's specific recommendations for change, 24. Illinois will have the finest, most comprehensive racing act 25. in the United States of America. And I move, therefore, to 26. accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to 27. Senate Bill 37 in the manner and form as follows pursuant 28. to the nine page motion I have today filed with...with the Secretary. 29. PRESIDENT: 30.

Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

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Thank you, Mr. President. I want to join Senator Rock

in concurring in these specific recommendations by the Governor l. to Senate Bill 37. But I do want to add these comments. 2. There is a constitutional principle involved here that I want 3. . to, at least for the record, ennunciate. I'm confident that 4 . these amendatory changes go far beyond what was contemplated 5. by the convention. When Illinois innovatively suggested 6. empowering a Chief Executive with legislative amendatory 7. veto authority. And I'm personally somewhat troubled by this 8. extreme utilization of the amendatory veto power. 9. out, however, that there is so much good in this bill 10. as amendatorily vetoed with the one exception that Senator 11. Rock has explained and that is to reinstitute into the bill 12. 13. the authority for municipalities to levy a precisely prescribed admissions tax. I might point out that in the Governor's 14. amendatory veto in his diktat, he stated that with respect 15. to the question of Sunday racing that that be left to the 16. discretion of the local municipality involved. But that with 17. respect to the imposition of an admissions tax that municipalities 18. be restricted and not given that kind of local discretion. 19. Well, this suggestion on the part of the Chief Sponsor of this 20. 21. bill to authorize that discretion is, in fact, sound and does make the question of local discretion, with respect to those two 22. questions, one of local home rule authority and self-determination. 23. I do again want to state for the record my reluctance to approve 24. this kind of extreme utilization of legislative initiation 25. by the Executive Department. But I would concur and do want 26. to add enthusiastic approbation of the work that has gone 27. into what will be hopefully the end product if we and the House 28. concur in the amendatory vetoes with that single exception to 29. Senate Bill 37. As Senate Rock... Senator Rock has said, if, 30. in fact, this then will become the law, and it should before 31. the first of December because of the very important responsibility 32. of assigning dates for 1976 the first week in December, 33.

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it is imperative that we take action now. We will, in fact, have the outstanding public policy regulating racing in the United States of America. So enthusiastically, I would urge both sides of the aisle and all members to concur in these specific recommendations of the Governor and move this bill on its way to the House so that, in fact, before the first of December we will have operative the finest piece of regulatory regulation in law in the United States.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Knuppel.

SENATOR KNUPPEL:

Mr. President and members of this Body. While I enthusiastically also endorse the approval of the amendatory veto, I am not as confident as the two people who have spoken before me as to what this legislation will do with an already very sick industry in the State of Illinois. I tell you that out of all the stallions in the harness racing business in the United States, there's only one, only one percentage sire standing in the State of Illinois. And while this bill does a lot to clean up the racing field and...and it's a step in the right direction, I think it's going to be a long time, a long time before we have an industry in this State like they have in Kentucky, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York. a step in the right direction. I don't want anyone to think that this should be the ultimate or the outstanding piece of legislation and that...that I...that's the reason I stood to speak. Both people have praised this as being outstanding. I'll wait to see what the ... what the situation is with our breeding industry five years from now before I endorse it as the most outstanding in the United States. I think it's a step in the right direction. I think there's a heck of a lot has to be done. We've got a sick industry on our hands. And if we don't do something about it, the industry is going to die in

1. Illinois. Let me tell you why I say this. I had a colt
2. this year. It was a three-year-old colt. He won five
3. county fairs in the State of Illinois. He was the best
4. three-year-old in Morgan County, Menard County, in Brown
5. County, Tri County, and Bond County. I took that colt to
6. Chicago to race after the racing season was over, he had to
7. be one of the top ten...top three-year-olds...one of the top
8. three-year-olds bred in the State of Illinois. He couldn't
9. even win a race. I had to bring him back down here. Now

even win a race. I had to bring him back down here. Now there's something wrong with the industry when you've got

one of the top, one of the very top three-year-old pacers

in the State of Illinois and he can't go to Chicago and...

and pay his way. That means that he isn't well enough bred,

that's the only reason the colts that are coming in there

from New York, Kentucky, New Jersey and Pennsylvania are so

much better that this colt couldn't even win at Chicago.

So the industry is a very sick industry and it isn't the colt

because the colt proved he was a good colt by winning

five State...five of the county fairs in the State of Illinois.

I just say don't put it up as being something super. We've

still got to continue work on it to protect the industry.

PRESIDENT:

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Any further discussion? Senator Mitchler. SENATOR MITCHLER:

Mr. President and members of the Senate, very briefly, this Senate Bill 37, I happen to be waiting for another bill to be heard in the same committee when this was heard in committee and I believe there were very large number of amendments proposed. I recognize that Senator Rock and Senator Harris have worked dilegently in attempting to produce a good Illinois Horse Racing Act. And I certainly appreciate their efforts in that behalf. However, I want to point out as a legislator, about the fact that several different proposals

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were made during the last session including House Bill 1886 1. by the Illinois Racing Commission and more or less from the 2. Governor which bill is still in committee, and now we find 3. the Governor using his legislative authority rather than an 4. amendatory veto, I call it legislative authority from the 5. Executive Branch, to make some very substantive changes 6. and the bill that I recognized at the time it was passed 7. had extensive debate and amendments, both in committee, on the 8. Floor, in both Houses. And I more or less object to this. 9. I have a...a racetrack in my district in North Aurora, Aurora 10. Downs. There were some things in the bill that I didn't 11. think were really in the best interest of the racetrack in 12. my district, although I'm not...I don't go out there, I don't 13. know anything about racehorsing like Senator Knuppel or 14. some of the other...those that are involved in the racetrack 15. industry. But what I point out is when you talk about whether 16. or not ... and try to legislative ... whether or not somehody 17. can give financial contributions just because they're in the 18. racing industry or not, that's unconstitutional. Because 19. it's unconstitutional to deprive anybody from making any 20. participation in any type of political activity, if it is made 21. known that they are so involved. And let the courts decide 22. that. We don't try...should be down here trying to legislate 23. that type of morality and that type of stuff. There's many of 24 these things in this bill that I did not like at the time, 25. and I don't like the Governor coming back now with his amendatory 26. veto and taking on the legislative authority. But because of 27. the confidence I have in Senator Rock and Senator Harris, 28. attempting to bring out a good Illinois Horse Racing Act, I'm 29. going to vote now as I did during the Session and vote Present. 30. PRESIDENT: 31.

Any further discussion? Senator Rock may close the debate. SENATOR ROCK:

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Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the...
 PRESIDENT:

Just a moment...

SENATOR ROCK:

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...Senate.

PRESIDENT:

...just a moment, Senator. It's just impossible to
 hear. The acoustics, as I pointed out earlier, in this room
 are very good. So when you're having what you think is a
 private conversation, it isn't private at all. Senator Rock.
 Senator Harris, for what purpose do you arise?

12. SENATOR HARRIS:

Well, when Senator Rock closes I just want to add this very limited comment, and that is that Senator Knuppel is exactly right. This bill, even now, is not written in stone and I think we can continue to do strong, improving things in the future. But the fact is that the time is now to proceed and get it started. And Illinois cannot afford to wait beyond December first of this year to get moving. So I enthusiastically join in supporting this but suggest that we'll continue in our efforts to make Illinois the outstanding State in the future in this important industry that produces sixty-million dollars of revenue minimum a year now. And if we do our job right that figure will grow significantly down the road.

PRESIDENT:

Now, just before Senator Rock closes the debate, will the members be in their seats and particularly Senator Chew.

Senator Rock.

30. SENATOR ROCK:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senator Harris did make two good points and I...labored hard and long over the Klinger question as to the Governor's use

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> 1. of the amendatory veto. However, I should in fairness, point 2. out that some of the changes that were, in fact, made, came 3. at...at our own suggestion in addition to the suggestion 4. of the Racing Board. And I think the thing of major sub-5. stantive impact, as the Governor sees it at least, was the 6. proscription against political contributions. Frankly, 7. I don't feel that that's all that important item, so I am 8. moving at this time to accept the specific recommendations 9. of the Governor as to Senate Bill 37 in the manner and form 10. as filed with the Secretary. And I would just point out 11. in...finally closing, that what Senator Harris said about the December 1 allocation of dates for next year is extremely 12. 13. important. And, therefore, this bill our recommendation 14. has an immediate effective date.
