2. The hour of nine having arrived, the Senate will come to
3. order. Prayer will be by the Reverend Rudolph S. Shoultz, Union Baptist
4. Church, Springfield, Illinois.

5. REVEREND SHOULTZ:

6. (Prayer given by Reverend Shoultz)

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Reading of the Journal. Senator Kenneth Hall.

9. SENATOR HALL:

10. Thank you, Mr. President. I move that reading and approval
11. of the Journals of Monday, November the 3rd, 1975, Tuesday, November
12. the 4th, 1975 and Wednesday, November the 5th, 1975, be postponed
13. pending arrival of the printed Journal.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. You heard the motion, all in favor will say Aye. Opposed
16. Nay. The Ayes have it. The motion carries. Committee Reports.

17. SECRETARY:

18. Senator Donnewald, Chairman of the Assignment of Bills, assigns
19. the following bills to Committee:

20. Appropriations - Senate Bill 1519.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. The Senate will be at ease for a moment. Will the Sergeant-
23. At-Arms come to the rostrum, please. Senator Bruce, may I see
24. you a moment. Senator Howard Mohr, see you a moment. The Senate
25. will come to order. Senate Bills on the order of 2nd reading.
26. Senate Bill 1508, Senator Bruce. Is he here? Senate Bill 1518,
27. Senator Howard Mohr. He wasn't here - I suppose he'll be right
28. back in, he was here a little earlier. Senator Howard Mohr was
29. here a moment ago - oh there he is. Senate Bill 1518, Senator
30. Howard Mohr. Read the bill.

31. SECRETARY:

32. Senate Bill 1518.

33. (Secretary reads title of bill)

1. 2nd reading of the bill. No Committee Amendments.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Any amendments from the Floor? 3rd reading. The Senate will
4. come to order. Senate Bills on 2nd reading. Senate Bill 1508,
5. Senator Bruce.

6. SENATOR BRUCE:

7. Yes, Mr. President, I think Senator Harris has an amendment
8. for Senate Bill 1508.

9. SECRETARY:

10. Senate Bill 1508.

11. (Secretary reads title of bill)

12. 2nd reading of the bill. No Committee Amendments. One Floor Amend-
13. ment offered by Senator Harris.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Harris.

16. SENATOR HARRIS:

17. Thank you, Mr. President. The effect of this amendment is to
18. reduce the supplemental authorization to this Agency by two months,
19. thereby giving it an additional four months to operate. Actually,
20. it would probably have slightly more funds than that at its actual
21. expenditure rate. Even with this amendment it will have been author-
22. ized 11.8 percent more than it actually expended in Fiscal '75. Now
23. the thrust of this is that since it will in all probability have a new
24. law to administer that we really won't be able to tell precisely
25. what its new responsibilities will be and we will have then in
26. April a far more accurate analysis of what its responsibilities
27. are going to be, having operated for five months then under the new
28. law. Additionally, the minority staff is quite troubled about the
29. fact that we have requested information from the Board and just
30. really have been rebuffed or ignored in our inquiry for performance
31. data and information with respect to its operation. I really don't
32. want to be this cute about things, but there is some sort of message
33. contained here in this reduction that of course would then require

1. the Board to have further action by the Legislature before it
2. could complete its full Fiscal '76 operations. I would hope that
3. the membership would join me in this. I am of course completely
4. sincere about the fact that between now and April we will have to
5. ...we will have more information to operate from and perhaps the
6. Board will develop a little greater spirit of cooperation with
7. our Appropriations Staff. I move the adoption of Amendment No. 1.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Any further discussion? Senator Bruce.

10. SENATOR BRUCE:

11. I think we should point out to the members that the problem
12. that we are creating for ourselves and that is we first funded
13. the State Racing Board for six months, the first time that I can
14. recall that an Agency of the State was...

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Just a moment. Will the members be in their seats.

17. SENATOR BRUCE:

18. ...that we funded an agency for only six months, now we
19. are adding on an additional four months, then obviously we will
20. have to come on with another two months appropriation. I agree
21. with Senator Harris that if information is not forthcoming from
22. the State Racing Board, the Legislature has a right to make some
23. sort of message. I think this is perhaps an inappropriate message.
24. I have not had a chance to talk to Mr. Scariano concerning this
25. matter, I hope to speak with him today and I think any information
26. that Senator Harris wants and his staff would desire, that we can
27. provide that to him.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Any further discussion? The question is shall Amendment No. 1
30. be adopted. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes
31. have it, Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Any further amendments? 3rd
32. reading. On the order of Total Vetoes on page three of your
33. Calendar. Senate Bill 16, Senate Bill 32, Senate Bill 32. Senator

1. Graham is recognized.

2. SENATOR GRAHAM:

3. I am wondering, Mr. President. I would like a full participation

4. in the consideration of this bill. I...looking around the Chamber,

5. I find that we probably won't have that at this time and I would

6. like to have leave to come back to this a little bit later, if you

7. would please.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senate Bill 55, Senator

10. Nudelman.

11. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

12. Thank you Mr. President. I feel too that we are short members

13. and I'd appreciate the permission to come back to this matter a little

14. later.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senate Bill 175, Senator

17. Hynes. Same motion? Senate Bill 693, Senator Hynes. Senate Bill

18. 911, Senator Philip. Senator Pate Philip, Senate Bill 911. For

19. what purpose does Senator Vadalabene arise?

20. SENATOR VADALABENE:

21. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I would ask leave to come back

22. to Senate Bill 16 a little later on.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. I'm sorry, Senator.

25. SENATOR VADALABENE:

26. Yes, I'm asking for leave to come back to Senate Bill 16. I

27. understand you went over that already and I would ask leave if you

28. would give me the courtesy a little later on to come back...

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Leave is granted.

31. SENATOR VADALABENE:

32. Thank you.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Pate Philip.

2. SENATOR PHILLIP:

3. Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to make the same request,
4. if I could come back to Senate Bill 911 a little bit later.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. On the order of item reductions on page ten, Senate Bill 555,
7. Senator Don Moore.

8. SENATOR MOORE:

9. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. This
10. Item Veto of the Appropriation Bill for the Illinois Department
11. of Public Aid does two things. One, it reduces to a level of six
12. percent which the Governor recommended, and it also reduced from
13. the Medical Line Item approximately fifty million dollars. I filed
14. a motion on this matter, Mr. President, but I think the members of
15. this Body will recall when we passed the Appropriation Bill for
16. the Department of Public Aid, I predicted that there would be a
17. one hundred and fifty to two hundred million dollar deficiency. I'm
18. happy that the Governor now realizes that my prediction was correct.
19. On October 15th we were informed by the Bureau of the Budget that
20. as of that date the projected deficiency was a hundred and seventeen
21. million, five hundred thousand. I see no reason in view of the
22. fact that the administration does admit that there will be a large
23. deficiency in Public Aid, for doing it in a piecemeal basis. The
24. fifty million that was taken out of the Medical Line Item, the
25. Administration now decides that there will be a sixty-nine million
26. dollar deficiency in that particular item. I think that this just
27. does prove, although there was great publicity when the Chief
28. Executive vetoed out fifty million dollars out of the Public Aid
29. Budget, and then some three months later comes in and says well
30. I guess I was wrong, there's going to be a huge deficiency in
31. Public Aid. I, therefore, would move you, Mr. President, to Table
32. my motion to override the Item Veto in Senate Bill 555.

3. the one you meant?
4. SENATOR BRUCE:
5. Yes, Mr. President, on page 12.
6. PRESIDENT:
7. I'm sorry. On page 12 on Specific Recommendations for Change,
8. Senate Bill 1392, Senator Bruce.
9. SENATOR BRUCE:
10. Yes, Mr. President. In all the amending we did on this bill
11. and I've spoken to Senator Graham - it relates to Law Enforcement
12. Officials and Correctional Officers injured while on duty by prisoners
13. during a prison altercation we forgot the exact wording and the
14. Governor's added working within a penal institution and, I would
15. move that we accept the Specific Recommendation of the Governor
16. as to that change.
17. PRESIDENT:
18. Any further discussion? Senator Graham.
19. SENATOR GRAHAM:
20. I'd only like to indicate that the feeling now existing in
21. our penal institutions by our security people with regard to their
22. lack of protection and other amenities which they think they should
23. have, that this is an important consideration for those who are
24. inside those walls without any weapons or anything and I...I concur
25. in Senator Bruce's recommendation.
26. PRESIDENT:
27. Any further discussion?
28. SENATOR GRAHAM:
29. That's a rare thing for me to do.
30. PRESIDENT:
31. The question is shall the Senate accept the Specific Recommend-
32. ations of the Governor as to Senate Bill 1392 in manner and form
33. as just stated by Senator Bruce. Those in favor will vote Aye.

1. Opposed will vote Nay. The Secretary will call the roll.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Joyce, Aye. Buzbee, Aye. Carroll, Aye. Brady, Aye. Bell,

13. Aye. McCarthy, Aye. Egan, Aye. On that question the Ayés are 46,

14. the Nays are none. The Specific Recommendations of the Governor to

15. Senate Bill 1392 having received the required majority vote of

16. Senators elected are declared accepted. There are 46 persons on the

17. last roll call, it seems it takes us a half hour to get started in

18. the morning, so we can go back to Total Vetoes and we'll start with

19. Senate Bill 16, Senator Vadalabene. You want to go with Senate

20. Bill 16? Senate Bill 32, Senator Graham.

21. SENATOR GRAHAM:

22. Mr. President...Mr. President and members of the Senate. I

23. made one of my finest presentation speeches yesterday and I under-

24. stand the change in the atmospheric conditions of the Senate, I've

25. been through those many times. I...

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Will the members be in their seats please.

28. SENATOR GRAHAM:

29. Including our leader.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Vadalabene will you take your conference back off the

32. floor. The members be in their seats please.

33. SENATOR GRAHAM:

1. I want to tell you today that the people that are interested
2. and have been interested in compiling the language of this bill
3. have done so in all seriousness. We have done so after a complete
4. analysis of the problem...problems and one hundred percent communica-
5. tions with the Feds regarding LEAA monies. Some papers have editor-
6. ialized against the bill in its current form because they didn't
7. know what this bill did. They knew what someone in the administra-
8. tion wanted them to know and nothing else. They said it should be
9. changed because they were fearful of losing Federal Funds. As I
10. said yesterday, Ladies and Gentlemen of this Senate, that just
11. is not so. This will assure us of two things. It will assure us
12. of the granting of the monies in the areas where the incident of
13. crime is the greatest. It will assure us fair and equitable distri-
14. bution of those funds. It will assure us that those who are doing
15. this had been confirmed by the membership of the Illinois State
16. Senate and will be accountable to the Illinois General Assembly
17. for their actions. We've incorporated in the plans for this a
18. broad base community participation in this very important program.
19. I recommend it to you people, those who are in areas of the highest
20. incidental crime, I recommend it to you thoroughly. If you will
21. look back not very far in your past you might have felt that you
22. were not treated fair and equitably. I can - not going to burden
23. you with this anymore. This bill will do nothing at all for the
24. Second Legislative District. Not one thing. It will do nothing
25. at all for John Graham. It will do something for the State of
26. Illinois. It will put accountability into the Illinois Law Enforce-
27. ment Commission and I don't know any more I can say. I ask that we
28. do vote favorably for this bill. That it do pass the veto of the
29. Governor to the contrary notwithstanding.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Any further discussion? Senator Bruce.

32. SENATOR BRUCE:

33. Well, Senator Graham, how quickly our marriage has been

1. dissolved and agreement is no longer with us. I appreciate your
2. support on the last bill, but I must rise in opposition on the
3. override on Senate Bill 32. I would hope that we would capsulize
4. very quickly the problems that will be created by this bill. First
5. of all, we should know about the formula that was...which is in the
6. bill based on crime rate and the population of each of the five
7. Judicial Districts. I don't know where we got the idea that Judicial
8. Districts, but they're in there. I think that we ought to all be
9. aware of the fact that under the Omnibus Crime and Safe Streets
10. Act, Section 203A of that Act, it's very plainly stated by the
11. Federal Government that a commission shall be created and designated
12. by the Chief Executive of the State and be subject to its jurisdiction.
13. I don't know if you can be any clearer about that, I'm a plowed-ground
14. county lawyer, as Senator Sours used to say and it seems to me that
15. that is a very clear statement. This is an Executive function. I
16. think we violate that Federal Mandate, we then make Illinois ineli-
17. gible to receive some one hundred million dollars in Federal funds
18. that we have received in the past four years. Secondly, I think
19. that Senator Graham would be aware and would want you to know that
20. the fact that Regional Planning Agencies are the ones who approve
21. or veto or have veto power over any grant. There are nineteen of
22. those within the State of Illinois with a total of eight hundred
23. and sixty-four commissioners. That would mean that the entire
24. eight hundred and sixty-four would have an obligation to run this
25. program. They have the veto power according to 6.07 Section of
26. the Bill. No award shall be made by the commission which has not
27. been approved by each appropriate Regional Planning Unit or Units
28. or Regional Councils or Council. It a...that doesn't create a
29. real big problem you'd think because all they have to do is veto
30. in their area, but as you know this Legislature spent three million
31. three hundred thousand dollars on the Illinois State Police Emergency
32. Radio Network, commonly known to us as ISPERN. That is a State-wide
33. network that we are now involving counties in so that they have

1 a static free channel to communicate with State Police. Many of
2 those grants have been placed in my district. The problem is that
3 that is State-wide money. And the eight hundred and sixty-four
4 commissioners may very well have to vote whether Richland County
5 or Wayne County gets an ISPERN radio put in the car purchased by
6 ILEC funds. Besides that, I think it would be easier if all these
7 Regional Planning Commissions were within the five Judicial Circuits.
8 If you could lay one circuit down and say those all within this one
9 circuit are all one Regional Planning Commission. Unfortunately,
10 of the nineteen commissions we have, seven overlap Judicial Districts.
11 The bill does not say do those seven have control in the other
12 Judicial Districts or do the other Judicial District people not
13 have to worry about the seven overlapping districts. I think
14 finally, and a major flaw in the bill, is the fact that the Chief
15 Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Illinois appoints four
16 members. Now if this does not fly in the face of separating the
17 Legislative, Executive and Judicial. We have Legislative appoint-
18 ments confirmed by the Senate, we have Executive appointments con-
19 firmed, now we have appointments by the State Supreme Court Justice.
20 It seems to me that we have made a pretty big change in the system.
21 It certainly is not an Executive function, I think it certainly
22 violates Section 203A of the Omnibus Crime and Safe Streets Act.

23 PRESIDENT:

24 Senator Rock.

25 SENATOR ROCK:

26 Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
27 I rise in support of Senator Graham's motion. I had spoken with
28 him some time ago and assured him that I would do so and I keep
29 my word. I would like to point out in response to Senator Bruce
30 that I have been given a copy of the LEAA Guideline Manual State
31 Planning Agency Grant, rules and regulations, I guess they would
32 be, and number twelve thereof says very specifically and this is in
33 direct response I hope and I think to the allegation, and I think

1 it is just that, an allegation, that somehow by virtue of this
2 Legislative action we would jeopardize whatever Federal monies come
3 into our State. And the LEAA guideline itself says, the Act requires
4 that State Planning Agencies be created or designated by the Chief
5 Executive of the State and be subject to his jurisdiction, with
6 that we have no argument. It goes on further to say, that these
7 requirements can be met whether the agency is established by Legis-
8 lative enactment, Executive order, or a combination of the two. It
9 is not inconsistent with gubernatorial creation or designation for
10 the State Legislature to prescribe the size, composition, and other
11 characteristics of the agency. That is exactly what we are doing.
12 I think it's about time we did it, and I would urge an Aye vote.

13 PRESIDENT:

14 Senator Glass.

15 SENATOR GLASS:

16 Well, thank you, Mr. President. As a matter-of-fact, Senator
17 Rock cited the language that...that I was going to read from the
18 guidelines, but I think it makes it clear that the fact that the
19 Legislature is involved in prescribing the size and composition
20 and so forth of the body does not in any way jeopardize the Federal
21 funding. I think that point ought to be made clear and I...I too
22 rise in support of Senator Graham's motion to override.

23 PRESIDENT:

24 Any further discussion? Senator Graham may close the debate.

25 SENATOR GRAHAM:

26 Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I'm glad to
27 report to you that our marriage between Senator Bruce and myself
28 was short-lived because with our difference in philosophies, I
29 wouldn't want anybody to think there was anything permanent about
30 it. I also think that the plowed-ground attorneys should check
31 with some good attorneys and they'll find out what's really going
32 on. I just want to say, this is a probably a differential treatment
33 of our rules. But I want to say to you, Ladies and Gentlemen, that

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1. this little fellow sitting here in the wheel chair has worked on
2. this four months and I'll put him up against any attorney in the
3. State of Illinois for interpreting the Federal Act and that has
4. been - he has been a source of strength and a source of Judicial
5. information for me. I said yesterday this, doesn't destroy the
6. employees of ILEC, it assures a equitable distribution of the
7. funds and I ask for an Aye vote.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. The question is shall Senate Bill 32 pass, the veto of
10. the Governor to the contrary notwithstanding. Those in favor
11. vote Aye. Opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. The Secretary
12. will call the roll.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Bell, Berning, Bloom, Brady, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll, Chew,
15. Clarke, Course, Daley, Davidson, Demuzio, Donnewald, Dougherty,
16. Egan, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth Hall, Harris,
17. Hickey, Hynes, Johns, Joyce, Knuppel, Kosinski, Lane, Latherow,
18. Lenke, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard Mohr, Don Moore, Morris,

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Roe, No. On that question the Ayes are 39, the Nays are 13.
24. Senate Bill 32 having received the required three-fifths vote is
25. declared passed. The veto of the Governor to the contrary notwith-
26. standing. Senate Bill 55, Senator Nudelman.

27. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

28. Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 55 would do exactly
29. and no more no less than is stated in the Calendar. It provides
30. that the venue for prosecution of violations of the Retailers'
31. Occupational Tax Act is - should be in the county of defendant's
32. principal place of business. As you are probably aware, presently
33. if there is an alleged violation and there is a criminal prosecu-
34. tion, the defendant is required to defend himself in Springfield

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1. with all of the concomitant expenses, inconveniences and require-
2. ments for obtaining of bringing records and obtaining of counsel
3. and so forth, where I think you can all see as in any other criminal
4. prosecution...

5. PRESIDENT:

6. One moment please.

7. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

8. Thank you.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Will the members be in their seats.

11. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

12. Thank you, Mr. President. As is involved in any other criminal
13. prosecution it would be extremely more convenient for a defendant
14. to defend himself in the county in which he lives or in which
15. his place of business is. I think it is unfair and unreasonable
16. that the State of Illinois would require such a defendant to come
17. to Springfield. I think it...in balance if we are to measure
18. inconveniences, it is certainly less inconvenient for the State
19. to go where - to any county within the State where it has prose-
20. cutorial offices to prosecute such a defendant. As Senator
21. Graham has said, I have no, no clients in this area, I have never
22. defended one of these cases, I don't know anybody who has been
23. prosecuted, but on the other hand it is a question of simple
24. justice and I solicit your Aye vote for an override and would
25. point out it takes thirty-six votes. I'll answer any questions.
26. Thank you.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Any further discussion? Senator Terrel Clarke.

29. SENATOR CLARKE:

30. Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I just want
31. to point out that this Department of Revenue at the present time
32. has been collecting hundreds of millions of dollars in unpaid
33. sales tax. They're doing one of the best jobs that's been done

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1. in years. This bill would in effect cost the State of Illinois
2. millions of dollars - it is going to make it that much harder
3. to go to local prosecutors and prosecute. I think if we've got
4. a fiscal crisis, we ought to keep the law as it is and not over-
5. ride this bill.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Any further discussion? Senator Rock.

8. SENATOR ROCK:

9. Question of the sponsor, Mr. President, if he'll yield.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. He indicates he'll yield.

12. SENATOR ROCK:

13. Senator, this seems to me to be eminently reasonable and
14. justifiable. I wonder if you could explain to me what the
15. Governor said in his Message.

16. SENATOR CLARKE:

17. The Governor said that it would be in effect, he said that
18. it would be inconvenient for the State and I find that totally un-
19. acceptable. And what the previous speaker has said about collections
20. has nothing to do with the prosecution of a criminal, alleged
21. criminal violation. That comes a long way down the road after
22. collection and after the other...the other resources which the
23. State has. We passed a bill last year which permits the State
24. to make all sorts of collections under what I consider terrible
25. circumstances. They can go in and take from the premises of a...
26. of a retailer now under a law we passed last year, rather during
27. the last Session, take his property to satisfy claims et cetera,
28. et cetera. The prosecution in a criminal act has nothing to do
29. with collection and I think that it's unreasonable to try and
30. equate those two elements of the problem. They have nothing to
31. do with one another and at the point where the...where the State
32. alleges a criminal violation, all of the other remedies and all
33. of the other collections have long since gone by the board and

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1. it has - there is absolutely no connection and I would reiterate
2. my previous statement.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Rock.

5. SENATOR ROCK:

6. Well thank you, Senator. I totally agree with what you have
7. said and I too would urge an Aye vote. And I would also like
8. to point out that I think the Illinois State's Attorneys' Associa-
9. tion ought to receive if they have not already, a copy of that
10. Veto Message, because couched in the middle of a paragraph in
11. there as I recall it, is a statement that the Chief Executive
12. does not feel that the State's Attorneys, some of whom are now
13. going to be making forty-two thousand dollars a year in certain
14. downstate counties, are capable, are capable of prosecuting this
15. type of case. I think it's an affront to these elected officials
16. and I would urge an Aye vote.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Any further discussion? Senator Nuelman may close the debate.

19. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

20. I didn't want to bring that point up Senator, but I think
21. even if, if we were to accept that argument, the various Attorneys
22. General which are located throughout the States are certainly
23. capable and have the authority to prosecute. So I think it's
24. a...it's a de minimis argument that we shouldn't pay any attention
25. to. Thank you for your comments.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. The question is shall Senate Bill 55 pass, the veto of
28. the Governor to the contrary notwithstanding. Those in favor
29. vote Aye. Opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Secretary
30. will call the roll.

31. SECRETARY:

7. Senator Graham, Aye, Senator Netsch, Aye. Senator Harris,
8. Aye. Senator Latherow, Aye. On this question the Ayes are 41,
9. the Nays are 6. Senate Bill 55 having received the required three-
10. fifths vote is declared passed, the veto of the Governor to the
11. contrary notwithstanding. Let the record show that if Senator
12. Davidson had been here he would have voted Aye. Senate Bill 16,
13. Senator Vadalabene.

14. SENATOR VADALABENE:

15. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I...I guess
16. I've worked for four days on trying to get the necessary votes
17. to override the Governor's Veto in regard to the separation of
18. SIU Edwardsville from SIU Carbondale. The time has come, I'm
19. going to be brief. We were told several years ago when the citizens
20. of the metropolitan or Metro-East area came up with six hundred
21. thousand dollars for the purchase of the land of SIU Edwardsville,
22. that some day we would be autonomus. I think the time has come
23. that we stop living in the shadows of Carbondale and that we plan
24. the destiny and future of the twelve thousand students, who most
25. of them reside in the Metro-East area and who most of them upon
26. graduation, sixty-five percent of them, still stay and live in
27. the Metro-East area. It's time that we plan their destiny and
28. their future and, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I would
29. appreciate a favorable vote in overriding the Governor's Veto.

30. Roll Call.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Any further discussion? Senator Buzbee.

33. SENATOR BUZBEE:

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1. Well, perhaps we all ought to join into this because some
2. of us consider that we're having to live in the shadow in Carbondale
3. that the Carbondale campus is having to live in the shadow of
4. Edwardsville and that Edwardsville is the millstone around our
5. necks. So perhaps out of a sense of our own self-aggrandizement
6. and so forth we ought to support this. But, it's just not
7. good government. I think most of the people here understand
8. that. We tried for a year or not we tried, but some of you folks
9. that have been in the Legislature for a long time fought hard and
10. long to try to establish a system of university systems so we
11. wouldn't have all of the various campuses down here haggling
12. the Legislature all the time to try to get funds, and of course
13. that's exactly what we're going to go back to again if we start
14. splitting up these systems. And for anybody to say that SIU
15. is the only system or that SIU Edwardsville is the only university
16. in a system that wants their own separate board is simply not
17. true. You know that. I know that. I can give you names of
18. Legislators right now who have told me as soon as this bill
19. becomes law, I'm putting in a bill to get my university out of
20. that system and for the propaganda to be passed around by various
21. administrators from the SIU Edwardsville Campus and from various
22. Legislators that represent that area, to say we're the only one
23. that want out, it's not going to happen to anybody else, that's
24. not true, and they know it's not true because they probably also
25. know the names of the folks that are going to be asking to get
26. out of their various systems and have their own board. Now, again,
27. I reiterate, I have had numerous people from the SIU Carbondale
28. Campus come to me and say support this bill. We want to get rid
29. of Edwardsville. We want our own identity. Support this bill.
30. And I have consistently taken the position, and I still take the
31. position, no, it is not responsible, it is not good government,
32. and it's not going to do anything for higher education in the
33. State of Illinois. I know that Sam has the wheels greased, I

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1. know the votes are here, I know that I'm the voice crying in the
2. wilderness, but by damn, I'm going to continue to cry.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Thank you, Senator Crisenberry, I mean Senator Gilbert, I mean
5. Senator Buzbee. Any further discussion? The question is shall
6. Senate Bill 16 pass, the veto of the Governor to the contrary
7. notwithstanding. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote
8. Nay. Secretary will call the roll.

19. Kosinski, Aye. Harber Hall, No. Bruce, No. Senator Vadalabene.

20. SENATOR VADALABENE:

21. Call the absentees please, and Mr. President, the only reason
22. I was discourteous to Harber Hall is because he committed his
23. vote to me and it's the only reason I called him.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Call the absentees. Call the absentees.

26. SECRETARY:

27. Bell, Bloom, Carroll, Fawell, Graham, Don Moore, Morris, Nimrod,
28. Ozinga, Philip.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Don Moore, Aye.

31. SECRETARY:

32. Regner, Romano, Soper, Wooten.

33. PRESIDENT:

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1. On that question the Ayes are 39, the Nays are 13. Senate
2. Bill 16 having received the required three-fifths vote is declared
3. passed, the veto of the Governor to the contrary notwithstanding.
4. Senate Bill 175, Senator Hynes.

5. SENATOR HYNES:

6. Senate...Senate Bill 175 involves a very simple concept. It
7. changes from mid-term to the tenth day of classes, the date for
8. computing semester hours carried for purposes of determining
9. reimbursement to the Community Colleges around this State. The
10. bill has an effective date of July 1st, 1976 and, therefore it does
11. not have a fiscal impact in the current year. The principal
12. objection to the bill was a fiscal one and it is my contention
13. that it will not have a fiscal impact in the sense that by simply
14. reducing the hourly rate per student, the board can adjust the
15. outflow of cash. The advantage of the bill is that for statistical
16. purposes...

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Just a moment. Just a moment. Let's hold down the noise
19. please. Continue, Senator Hynes.

20. SENATOR HYNES:

21. The advantage of the bill is that it will bring uniformity
22. to reporting and statistical uses in that the Community Colleges
23. will now be reporting on the same basis as other institutions of
24. higher education. So I...it is a bill that has been through this
25. General Assembly on several occasions. It passed in the last
26. Session and it's back again here now and I think this is the time
27. to make up our minds as to whether we want to have this uniformity
28. in reporting and I would urge your support in this override effort
29. and move that Senate Bill 175 do pass, the veto of the Governor
30. to the contrary notwithstanding.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Any further discussion? Senator Fawell.

33. SENATOR FAWELL:

1. Well just a few words. There's no fiscal impact this year,
2. but there will be a fiscal impact coming and I think that we've
3. got to begin to look at that. We have ignored some of these
4. ramifications for quite some time and the chickens are here
5. roosting. What we're doing here is saying that we're going
6. to be counting attendance on the basis of the first ten days,
7. as I recall, and that means that it's really not an honest
8. count. I think as Senator Hynes has said, apparently this is
9. utilized in other areas of higher education, but that doesn't
10. necessarily make it right. I think that the Governor's rationale
11. for vetoing this bill is sound and I would urge that we do not
12. vote to override.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Any further discussion? Senator Hickey.

15. SENATOR HICKEY:

16. Yes, Mr. President, I want to speak in favor of the override.
17. I feel that it should as Senator Hynes says, that it should be
18. uniform, that the Community Colleges should have the same way
19. of counting that the senior institutions do and always have had,
20. and they've really been on the short end of things because they
21. haven't heretofore. Now as some people say, they go out and they
22. build up their enrollments way beyond what they should be in
23. anticipation of...of them falling off later. But they've got to
24. have faculty for that...for that...that early time and for the
25. rest of...for the rest of the semester and they've got to be
26. prepared and I think that this bill should be overridden.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Any further discussion? Senator Bruce.

29. SENATOR BRUCE:

30. Well I think Senator Fawell has put his finger on what we
31. ought to be thinking about and that is, this is going to cost
32. more money. There is no question about it. It will cost more
33. money. The Illinois Community College Trustees memorandum that

1. came around today says we've reduced the impact of this by
2. making it effective at a later date. The only reason that is
3. done because it will be effective monetarily at a later date.
4. It impacts on schools that have the worst record of keeping
5. students in class. Now we already pay at mid-term. It would
6. be the most reasonable thing to say that we would pay after
7. you've educated every student, and if a student stays through
8. the full semester, we will pay you for educating that student,
9. but we can't do that, so we fell back to mid-term. We figure
10. we'll split the loss with you. If you don't have the teachers
11. to keep a kid in class the second half of the semester or
12. quarter, we'll still pay because you had to keep him the first
13. half. Now what this says, is we're going to start on the tenth
14. day. If you're a good community college administrator you will
15. say, hype up the classes as high as you can, enroll anybody that
16. you can get into your classroom, because if we can hold them
17. there till the tenth day, they don't even have to attend, my
18. wife is a community college teacher, they don't even - the attendance
19. problems don't even occur until after the tenth day. The student
20. may never attend class, may never get the first hour of instruction,
21. and we say we're going to pay for the full quarter. Not talking
22. about paying for the first ten days, we're paying for the first
23. quarter. It...it is an incentive to junior colleges and community
24. colleges to take the worst possible approach to enrollment. I would
25. say that the fiscal impact is going to be severe. To say that we
26. are going to just reduce the amount of money available just doesn't
27. solve the problem. You then reward those that have done the worst
28. job and harm even more those that have done a good job of selection
29. and enrollment. Doesn't make good sound policy the fact that they
30. do it at the higher institutional level just doesn't mean we ought
31. to force the bad policy on community colleges. I think it's a
32. bad deal. The Illinois Board of Higher Education is opposed to
33. it. The Committee on Community College Finance of the Illinois

1. Board of Higher Education is also opposed to it. Thank you,
2. Mr. President.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Bell.

5. SENATOR BELL:

6. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. Senator
7. Bruce brings up an interesting point in reference to the fact
8. that in education, higher education specifically, we should
9. really try to pay our cost of educating the student when that
10. actual education has taken place. Well, the fact of the matter
11. is, I believe that is what you said, Senator Bruce, the fact of
12. the matter is that nobody does it that way in higher education
13. and I don't see why the community colleges should be treated any
14. differently than the way the Board of Higher Education treats
15. their system or we treat their system through the Board of
16. Higher Education. And I'd like to point out to the members of
17. this Body that the fact of the matter is that percentage wise
18. revenues to the community colleges have been falling off much
19. more substantially than have revenues for the other college
20. systems here in the State of Illinois. Now, community colleges
21. have a unique role that they have been playing here in Illinois.
22. We...we are a unique State in that role being provided in the
23. way of community education and services. They are doing a fine
24. job with a lessening or a loss percentage wise of revenue that
25. they have been forced to take. Now I think it's only proper
26. and fitting that this particular educational system in Illinois
27. be treated in a like manner to the rest of the higher educational
28. systems in Illinois, and I would appreciate your support for
29. Senate Bill 175.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Will the Sergeant-at-Arms clear the back or have the people
32. seated please and bring to a cessation the conversation in that
33. area. Any further discussion? Senator Berning.

1. SENATOR BERNING:

2. I'd like to ask a question of the sponsor. I may have
3. been absent when he touched on this, but in that event I'd appreciate
4. a comment.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. He indicates he'll yield.

7. SENATOR BERNING:

8. Approximately what amount of dollars is involved in Senate
9. Bill 175?

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Hynes.

12. SENATOR HYNES:

13. Well, perhaps I can answer your question, Senator Berning, and
14. conclude my remarks at the same time. That's the point that
15. Senator Bruce made and it was made I think by one of the other
16. speakers. There is no fiscal impact whatever in the current
17. fiscal year. The bill does not take effect until July 1st of
18. 1976. Secondly, it is my position that it does not have a
19. fiscal impact in the sense that this is only one element of
20. the formula for funding these schools. The other end of it is
21. the dollar rate per hour that we pay and that can be adjusted
22. upward or downward depending on what kind of allocation is made
23. to the junior colleges. That is in fact what is done now. If
24. you look at the existing law, the formula pays out at seventeen
25. dollars and sixty-one cents per hour. That was done to reach a
26. specific gross amount of dollars and the same thing can be done
27. under this bill. So my answer to you is that it does not have
28. a fiscal impact.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Berning.

31. SENATOR BERNING:

32. Do I understand you correctly that while this has no fiscal
33. impact for this year, it also has no affect in the next fiscal year.

1. SENATOR HYNES:

2. Senator Berning...

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Hynes.

5. SENATOR HYNES:

6. That is my position on it in this sense, because the...the
7. reimbursement is determined by the number of students times the
8. hourly rate and if you adjust the hourly rate downward or upward
9. you change what the reimbursement is going to be, and that
10. is what the Board of Higher Education will in fact do, they will
11. determine how much money is available for the junior colleges
12. and then will multiply the number of students times the hours
13. at whatever rate they determine. This is important for statistical
14. purposes. Now, there are others that feel that there's going to
15. be pressure upward.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Any further discussion? Senator Soper.

18. SENATOR SOPER:

19. Thank you, Mr. President. Now, Senator Hynes, there's only
20. one thing that bothers me about this bill. I think that if the
21. student enrolls in a class or in a junior college up to ten days
22. he can withdraw and receive his tuition back. Now, if you're going
23. to keep him on this enrollment and then he gets his money back,
24. he can enroll in three or four different colleges or different
25. classes. Now you've got a false enrollment in that school. I
26. don't mind paying the junior colleges on the number of students
27. they have enrolled, but this is going to be a rip-off similar
28. to one that I understand. You know, they have different...they
29. have different what they call clubs in a...in a different schools
30. and different colleges. They'll have a German Club, a Bohemian Club,
31. a Polish Club, a Crocheting Club and it seems that when they...
32. when they come in with their contracts they'll say well if a
33. club has twenty-five students in it then the supervisor or the

1. teacher that takes care of that club will get three hundred
2. dollars for supervising that club. If the club has seventy-five
3. or fifty members they get more money. If they have a hundred or
4. a hundred and twenty-five they get something like eighteen hundred
5. to two thousand dollars. Well, all the kids think it's fun and
6. games, they all join the Russian Club and they get a hundred and
7. twenty-five and their favorite teacher gets himself two thousand
8. dollars and at the first meeting there are three kids that come
9. to the Russian Club. Now, that's...that's a rip-off. That's
10. what can happen with this thing. Now of they're going to be...if
11. they're going to be - if we're going to have legitimate students
12. going to have a legitimate education then we've got to give the
13. money to where the legitimate education is. And if it's going
14. to be a subterfuge, I'm sorry I can't vote for a subterfuge.

15. *end of reel 1*
PRESIDENT:

16. Any further discussion? Senator Hynes may close the debate.

17. SENATOR HYNES:

18. One final point. I think it is - it actually maligns the
19. administrators of the community colleges of this State to suggest
20. as a couple of the speakers have done, that this would permit them
21. to inflate their classes and that they would so do it. I just
22. don't think that is going to happen and if there was a pattern
23. of that I think it is within the power of the board to disallow
24. that kind of enrollment. So I do not think there is a fiscal
25. impact involved in this bill. I think for reporting and statistical
26. purposes the community colleges ought to be put on the same basis
27. as the other institutions of higher education and I would urge
28. your support.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. The question is shall Senate Bill 175 pass the veto of the
31. Governor to the contrary notwithstanding. Those in favor vote
32. Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The Secretary will call the roll.

21. Mr. President, I didn't think I voted on the original roll
22. call on that.
23. PRESIDENT:
24. How is Senator Latherow recorded?
25. SECRETARY:
26. Not...not recorded.
27. PRESIDENT:
28. He's not recorded. Okay.
29. SENATOR LATHEROW:
30. I vote No.
31. PRESIDENT:
32. Have all voted who wish? Carroll, Aye. On that question the
33. Ayes are 29 the Nays are 22. Senate Bill 175 having failed to

1. receive the required three-fifths vote, the motion thereto is lost.
2. Senate Bill 693, Senator Hynes. Senate Bill 911, Senator Philip.
3. Senator Graham, will you help me get them quiet? Thanks. Senate
4. Bill 911, Senator Philip.

5. SENATOR PHILIP:

6. Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 911 was vetoed by the
7. Governor on the basis there was no money appropriated. The bill
8. does basically two things. Number one, it provides the Department
9. of Transportation would report to the County Animal Administrator
10. any tag on an animal killed on a highway. Now, at this point
11. they're responsible for picking up those dead animals now, so I
12. don't see where there's any additional cost to the Department of
13. Transportation at all. Secondly, it would provide that a veter-
14. inarian would not have to collect fees imposed on by the county.
15. There are, I understand that there are two counties that have a
16. registration fee for animals, Lake and Sangamon County, and they
17. expect the local veterinarian to collect that fee for them, so
18. I'll be happy to answer any questions.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill
21. 911 pass, the veto of the Governor to the contrary notwithstanding.
22. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote No. The Secretary
23. will call for the bows.

4. Nays are 11. The motion having failed to receive the required
5. three-fifths vote is declared lost. Senate Bill 985, Senator
6. Kosinski. Senator Kosinski, are you going to...okay, hold. Senate
7. Bill 986, Senator Graham. Senate Bill 1478, Senator Shapiro.
8. Senate Bill 1493, Committee on Education, Senator Buzbee. To
9. the matter of Item Vetoes. On page ten, Senate Bill 471, Senator
10. Bruce. Senate Bill 517, Senator Carroll.

11. SENATOR CARROLL:

12. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. This
13. motion has been filed to restore certain funds to the Board
14. of Governors for the operation of a parental school at Northeastern
15. Illinois University. The General Assembly by way of history,
16. originally took this side of residential school which had been
17. operated by the Chicago Board of Education for truant children,
18. for their social readjustment and rehabilitation, and gave it
19. to the Board of Governors for operation by Northeastern, which
20. is basically in thrust a teacher's type institution. Northeastern
21. is adjacent to that land and needed part of the property for
22. its own expansion and alleged to us that they had the expertise
23. to operate this truant parental school. We at that time on their
24. commitment that they would continue to operate it until a viable
25. alternative had been found, we gave them that property and that
26. responsibility. They have accepted the property and by the
27. Governor's Veto have relinquished the responsibility. A former
28. director of Children and Family Services had conducted a study,
29. or started a study at our behest at Senator Weaver's amendment
30. to a bill at one time, to find viable alternatives and to expand
31. parental's operation to the full County of Cook and possibly find
32. an additional site for downstate truancy problems. Mr. Miller's
33. recommendations at that time were no alternative. There was a

1. big hullabaloo at the time and that ceased. Now, by Executive
2. action, through his Reduction Veto, they came in one day and
3. said in two days you no longer operate. They just reduced the
4. funds totally to destroy the operation and provided no viable
5. alternative, nor even an unviable one. No alternative was
6. given to the county courts on where to send truant children
7. for their rehabilitation and readjustment. We think this is
8. an essential program for the children within our county and
9. within the State. We would hope that this program would be
10. not only refunded now and that we continue to find viable
11. alternatives for our area and for the entire State. I think
12. we must honor our commitments in the past when we gave this
13. land to Northeastern Illinois University and I think we must
14. restore these funds until some other alternative is found. I
15. would ask that we have the favorable vote to restore the Re-
16. duction Veto of the Governor. I might add that in his Veto
17. Message he did not at any time even allude to what he was doing.
18. He said this was part of a six percent cut, what he didn't
19. say is that he was cutting out the entire budget for one particular
20. operation and I think we must honor our commitment and restore
21. these funds. Thank you.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Any further discussion? Senator Carroll, what is your
24. specific motion?

25. SENATOR CARROLL:

26. My specific motion is to restore on page two reduced item,
27. lines eighteen through twenty-one.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. All right. The question is shall the item alluded to
30. be restored, the Item Reduction of the Governor to the contrary
31. notwithstanding. Those in favor vote Aye. Opposed will vote
32. No. The Secretary will call the roll.

7. Rock, Roe, Romano, Savickas, Schaffer, Shapiro, Smith, Sommer,
8. Soper, Vadalabene, Weaver, Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Bell, No. Knuppel, Aye. Lemke, Aye. Request for a call
11. of the absentees.

12. SECRETARY:

13. Bruce, Bloom was first, Buzbee, Clarke, Davidson, Demuzio,
14. Fawell, Glass, Graham, Hickey, Joyce, McCarthy, Newhouse, Nimrod,
15. Ozinga, Romano, Shapiro.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Nimrod, No. On that question the Ayes are 26, the Nays are
18. 21. The item on page two, lines eighteen through twenty-two having
19. failed to receive the required majority vote of Senators elected
20. is...the motion is lost on that item. Senate Bill 633, Senator
21. Hynes. Just a moment please. Senate Bill 635, Senator Rock.
22. Senate Bill 1496, Senator Kosinski. Now we're going back to the
23. order of Total Vetoes on page seven. Senate Bill 985, Senator
24. Kosinski or Daley.

25. SENATOR DALEY:

26. Mr. President and fellow Senators, I'm handling this bill
27. on behalf of Senator Kosinski. I filed the motion that Senate
28. Bill 985 do pass, the veto of the Governor to the contrary not-
29. withstanding. This bill as we all know is a court reporters
30. bill. The Governor vetoed the salary increase for the court
31. reporters in the State of Illinois. It was increased from
32. sixteen thousand to nineteen thousand dollar increase and the
33. Governor totally vetoed the increase for the court reporters

1. and I think it's vitally needed to the court reporters of the
2. State of Illinois. It was only one million two hundred and seventy-
3. two thousand dollars. I think they...they need the increase. They
4. are hard working people and I think lawyers and judges know this
5. throughout the State of Illinois and I would ask a favorable roll
6. call.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Any further discussion? Senator Knuppel.

9. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

10. Will the sponsor yield to a question?

11. PRESIDENT:

12. He indicates he will.

13. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

14. What is the disproportion between the salary of court
15. reporters and reporters for the Industrial Commission? Are
16. you familiar with that?

17. SENATOR DALEY:

18. No, I don't know.

19. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

20. Mr. President, I will support this legislation because I
21. believe the court reporters of a high quality are required, but
22. I would like to call to the attention of this Body that if this
23. is done there be at least an eight thousand dollar differential
24. between the court reporters who are working for the Industrial
25. Commission and they're probably working as hard if not harder
26. doing more work than the court reporters and then when we come
27. back here in the Spring maybe we should do something for the
28. reporters for the Industrial Commission because we're losing
29. good court reporters and sometimes I've had to wait as long
30. as a year to get a transcript out of the Industrial Commission which
31. is ridiculous and part of it is due to the pay. So I'll
32. support you, but I'll expect you then to come here and support
33. me. The same...there are sometimes almost the same people with

1. the same qualifications, and there is a vast differential in
2. pay.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

4. Senator Kosinski.

5. SENATOR KOSINSKI:

6. Mr. President and members of the Senate. In referring to
7. Senator Knuppel, let me say this, I've always supported people
8. who do a great job and deserve more money and raises. May I
9. just inject one statement here. I had contacted the administrator
10. of the Supreme Court regarding these bills...this bill, Roy
11. Gulley, Administrator Gulley, and he says, "the Governor explains
12. his actions solely on the basis that the State cannot afford the
13. raise at this time." I question his wisdom in this regard. Ladies
14. and Gentlemen, I think this enough...explains enough that the
15. court reporters were justiable in getting their raise and I
16. hope and pray that you do the same and vote Aye in their behalf.
17. Thank you very much, God bless.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill
20. 985 pass the veto of the Governor to the contrary notwithstanding.
21. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. Secretary
22. will call the roll.

23. SECRETARY:

24. Bell, Berning, Bloom, Brady, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll, Chew,
25. Clarke, Course, Daley, Davidson, Demuzio, Donnewald, Dougherty,
26. Egan, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth Hall, Harris,
27. Hickey, Hynes, Johns, Joyce, Knuppel, Kosinski, Lane, Latherow,
28. Lemke, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard Mohr, Don Moore, Morris,
29. Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman, Ozinga, Palmer, Philip, Regner,
30. Rock, Roe, Romano, Savickas, Schaffer, Shapiro, Smith, Sommer,
31. Soper, Vadalabene, Weaver, Welsh, Wooten, Mr. President.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Clarke, No. Graham, No. McCarthy, Aye. Morris, is that
34. No? Were you pointing to your nose or to your eye? Morris, No

1. Request for the call of the absentees. Just one moment. Before
2. we make the request for the call of the absentees, the membership
3. should be advised and I'm seeking leave for some television
4. studios to take some pictures while we're here in this unique
5. sort of hall. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Continue
6. with...call the absentees.

7. SECRETARY:

8. Bloom.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Now, will the members please be in their seats. We will
11. not look disruptive, as we are.

12. SECRETARY:

13. Hickey.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Turn off the sound, will you fellows. (Machine cut-off)...this in
16. living color. You can get them too, it's okay. Continue the roll call.

17. SECRETARY:

18. Don Moore, Newhouse, Romano, Shapiro, Soper, Wooten.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. On that question the Ayes are 34, the Nays are 20, with 2
21. Voting Present. Senate Bill 985 having failed to receive the
22. required three-fifths vote, the motion thereon is lost. On the
23. order of - continuing on the order of Total Vetoes. Senate
24. Bill 1493, the Committee on Education, Senator Buzbee. Senator
25. Glass has filed the motion. Senator Buzbee is the principal sponsor.

26. SENATOR BUZBEE:

27. Mr. President, I do wish an opportunity to speak on Senate
28. Bill 1493, however, since it's not my motion that was - I think
29. it would be appropriate that I would defer at this time to
30. the person who filed the motion, but I do wish to speak later.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Yes, that opportunity will be afforded. Senator Glass.

33. SENATOR GLASS:

1. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen. I have filed
2. a motion that Senate Bill 1493 be approved, the veto of the
3. Governor to the contrary notwithstanding. I think as most of
4. the membership knows, Senate Bill 1493 makes major changes in
5. the Illinois School Aid formula and is a bill that was carefully
6. worked out over a long period of time originating in a subcommittee
7. chaired by Senator Buzbee. This was in fact a committee bill.
8. It had approval I think of most of the members of both parties
9. in both Houses. The significant changes that it makes to the
10. formula, I would start off by enumerating the elimination of
11. the...the tax rollback provision that is now in the law and
12. under that provision school districts are mandated to reduce
13. the local tax rates which their voters have already approved.
14. I think this is the height of taking away from local districts,
15. local control and local autonomy. The right to determine how
16. much they wish to spend on their own programs by this bill is
17. eliminated because of the forced reduction in these...in these
18. local tax rates. What we are saying by eliminating the roll-
19. back is let's leave it up to people in...in our communities
20. all over the State to have the right to decide what kinds of
21. programs they are willing to pay for. So it would...it would
22. restore that right by eliminating this mandated tax rollback
23. provision. Also it's of great significance to a lot of the
24. downstate districts because it allows the inclusion of the
25. transportation tax rate and the operating fund allowing them
26. additional State aid. It contains other provisions which I'm
27. sure may be - come out in the discussion, and the cost of this
28. bill for the current year is slightly in excess of the twenty
29. million dollars which the Governor indicates is available and
30. which he attempted to put in to a so-called Whole Harmless Bill.
31. That bill has now been defeated in the committee in the House
32. and I...I personally believe that a far wiser use of those funds
33. would be to put them in the formula and to help fund Senate Bill

1. 1493. Now, I'd like to point out one other important factor
2. regarding this bill. There is no appropriation attached to it.
3. In and of itself, Senate Bill 1493 has no appropriation. And
4. I've already indicated the cost for the current year is about
5. equivalent to the amount the Governor says is available. There
6. has been some information put out through the Governor's Office
7. about what this bill will cost next year and that figure has
8. been set at ninety-five million dollars and I will represent to
9. this Body that that figure is vastly in error. The reason for
10. the high estimate, sixty million of the ninety-five is attributable
11. to the cost of funding the change in the Title I provisions for
12. the City of Chicago, but the Title I count for the City according
13. to its estimates, are going to be approximately the same under
14. the new Title I formula as they were under the old formula, so
15. that cost rather than being a total of ninety-five million is
16. more like forty million. Those are...those are estimates, Ladies
17. and, Gentlemen and I think it is always within...

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Will the members be in their seats. Continue Senator Glass.

20. SENATOR GLASS:

21. Thank you, Mr. President. It is always within the province
22. of this Body through the appropriation process to appropriate
23. only such monies as we have available and in fact, that is our
24. responsibility. So we should fund - we should make the improve-
25. ments to the formula that this bill provides. We should take
26. a look at it at the appropriate time and determine whether in
27. fact we can fully fund this or not, and we should override the
28. Governor's Veto at this time and I would urge my colleagues
29. that we do this, so I'd be happy to answer any questions.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Buzbee.

32. SENATOR BUZBEE:

33. Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, I'm put in the

1. strange position of being the...being shown as the lead sponsor on this
2. particular bill which was in fact a compromise that started with a commi-
3. tee, subcommittee in the Senate...subcommittee of the Education Committee
4. and eventually got down to be a Conference Committee between the
5. Senate and the House in the end and we hammered out a compromise
6. that we thought we could all live with at that time. But as I
7. started to say, I'm put in the strange position of now being
8. opposed to my own bill. And the reason for my opposition is
9. not because I don't believe in what the bill principally does,
10. but because of some other things. I was surprised and shocked,
11. quite honestly, when I found out the Governor had vetoed Senate
12. Bill 1493 because he had said in his message in March, I believe
13. it was, that he had twenty million dollars that he had set aside
14. in the budget for the purpose of distribution to downstate
15. school districts, if the Legislature would come up with a
16. method of distributing that twenty million dollars. So Senate
17. Bill 1493 was the answer to that I thought, and all the rest
18. of us thought. But there were a couple of very tough provisions,
19. very complicated provisions, very expensive provisions, perhaps,
20. that were included in the bill, it was the Governor's principal
21. reason for vetoing it I understand. I talked to the Governor's
22. office after I found out and they told me that that was their
23. main reasons and those provisions were Title I, which of course
24. has to do with the number of poverty level students that are...
25. that are enrolled in your school district. Now there has been
26. a lot of figures bandied about as to the cost of Title I. The
27. Governor's Office says it would cost in Fiscal '77, that Title I
28. would cost the State an additional sixty million dollars. The
29. Chicago School Board says that their figures show that Title I
30. would be an additional cost in Fiscal '77 of somewhere between
31. zero and six million dollars. So we have anywhere from zero to
32. sixty million dollars as being the additional cost of Title I
33. and so we're in a position of not really knowing who to believe.
34. But the Chicago School Board, I understand, now says that Title I.

1. provisions that we ought to go ahead and just let 1493 die a
2. natural death and we will include the good provisions in other
3. legislation. So, I intend to vote Present, I don't vote that
4. way very often, but I'm going to vote Present on this bill and
5. try to sustain the Governor's Veto. Thank you, Mr. President.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Rock.

8. SENATOR ROCK:

9. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
10. I rise in support of the motion made by Senator Glass to override
11. on this bill. And I would just point out what I think was an
12. inaccurate statement by Senator Buzbee. I do not think it has
13. ever been the position of the Chicago Board that the Title I
14. positions are somehow a bad provision and that they don't really
15. need them, which statement was made at least twice during the
16. course of his remarks. I think that there was some conversation
17. yesterday because of the misinformation that was floating through
18. these halls and the halls across the street to the tune of some
19. ninety million dollar cost figure. It is not a ninety million dollar
20. cost figure and just to allay any fears that were still extant, it
21. was proposed that that provision could in fact be deleted as an
22. accommodation to the people from downstate. We needn't delete those
23. provisions. We still maintain it is not a ninety million dollar
24. package, but I think this...this motion deserves our support.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Hynes.

27. SENATOR HYNES:

28. I would...I would concur in what Senator Rock had to say and
29. add one or two additional points. This bill was the result of
30. long, hard efforts to reach an acceptable compromise proposal that
31. would remedy some of the defects, the admitted defects in the
32. existing formula. It was the result of many, many hours of
33. negotiation. It passed virtually unanimously in both Houses.
34. There were one or two dissenting votes at the most and it was

1. is not that important to them, they would like to have it, but
2. it's not something they cannot live without and so therefore they
3. are willing to eliminate that provision in any compromised bill
4. that may come up. And in fact there are compromised bills being
5. worked right now, we all know that and the provisions, the good
6. provisions of Senate Bill 1493 will be included in any of these
7. compromised bills I believe. Senator Hynes has a bill that's
8. now in a Senate Committee that could be discharged and amended
9. to include the good provisions of 1493. I have filed a bill
10. in the Special Session which would include the good provisions of
11. Senate Bill 1493 and that...those good provisions are principally
12. these. One, it would lower the qualifying rate for...to give
13. school districts access, greater access to maximum State aid;
14. two, it would eliminate the rollback, which I know a lot of
15. the suburban areas are extremely interested in; and three, it
16. would include the transportation tax rate in the calculation
17. of the formula for your school aid. So, the basis of my opposition
18. to Senate Bill 1493 is this. Title I is included in there and
19. now the folks that would benefit most from Title I say we don't
20. even have to have it, it's not necessary so don't worry about
21. it. The other bad provision that I didn't like in the bill to
22. start with, but again it was a compromise bill, and that was the
23. ability given to the local school boards to increase their property
24. tax rate with only a backdoor referendum. So, by eliminating
25. those two objectionable provisions in a new bill, we can still
26. include the good provisions in a new bill. So, I submit to you
27. that a vote against 1493 today will not be a vote against helping
28. those suburban schools who want to eliminate the rollback, or will
29. not be a vote against those of us in downstate areas who want
30. to continue to have their...to be able to use the Transportation
31. Tax Rate and to lower the qualifying rate, because those provisions
32. will be included in other legislation that will be coming out
33. and I think that if we can agree on a bipartisan support of these

1. an effort really to do something to benefit downstate districts
2. that were not being treated as well under the formula as I think
3. all of us thought they should be. It is true as Senator Buzbee
4. has mentioned that there have been discussions about even further
5. refinements and improvements. The difficulty that we face now
6. is that this is the last day for action on this bill, and it
7. is a bill which is close to final enactment and therefore I
8. think it would be a mistake for us to allow this bill at this
9. moment to simply die. I think it should be kept alive and I think
10. the override motion should be supported. It is basically a good
11. bill. It is possible that something may be worked out to improve
12. it in the future and we have the opportunity to do something at
13. that point, but at this juncture I think the bill should be
14. supported and Senator Glass' motion should be supported.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Fawell.

17. SENATOR FAWELL:

18. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I rise in support
19. of the bill also. I think one thing we should remember is that
20. they - in this bill are two at least vital helps to our local
21. school districts. The elimination of the rollback tax is
22. one and the other which many districts, especially the unit
23. districts, may be able to take advantage of is to increase their
24. educational and their building rate if they find themselves in a
25. crisis. And I'm going to suggest to you that a lot of districts
26. are going to find themselves in a crisis. I think the Governor
27. made a mistake when he totally vetoed this bill. He could have
28. used his amendatory veto powers and he could have salvaged the
29. portions of this bill which I think everyone agrees are worth
30. salvaging, even Senator Buzbee, who I know is basically in support
31. of the concept here has said, well we can do this by means of
32. another bill. Maybe we can and maybe we can't. I don't know.
33. I know I have a bird that's in the hand here and a lot of them in the

1. bush. And it seems to me that we ought to salvage these local
2. helps any way that won't cost the State one dime. Now, as far
3. as what future fiscal costs are going to be, be we all know as a
4. practical matter that depends what's in the appropriation bill
5. and I for one have indicated as I think many of us have, that
6. we're not going to be appropriating more funds than what
7. revenues might be available. So as a practical matter, whether
8. we're talking about roughly a thirty-five million dollar cost
9. next year, negligible cost as far as this year is concerned, the
10. real vital decision on appropriations is going to be made in
11. regard to appropriations. But if we want a salvage for our
12. local school districts at least the ability to be able to handle
13. the crisis on their own, inasmuch as we have contributed to
14. a degree to the financial crisis they will have because we
15. probably aren't going to be able to live up to our commitment
16. in regard to the resource equalizer, then I say to you we've
17. got to at least give them these local tools to be able to help
18. themselves. And thus, I think it is worthwhile to certainly
19. salvage the fine local aspects of Senate Bill 1493. For that
20. reason I, rise in support of this bill.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Any further discussion? Senator Morris.

23. SENATOR MORRIS:

24. I rise in opposition to this bill and in support of the
25. veto and very much along the lines of Senator Ruzbee. Yesterday
26. I saw a memo in the House of Representatives during a vote on
27. a crucial veto override there which was labled something Hynes-
28. Berman or Berman-Hynes proposal, which was floated as more or less
29. of a compromise to salvage the palatable parts of Senate Bill 1493
30. and to eliminate the part which is the confusion in the discussion.
31. Last night eighty-nine votes were had on the House on a certain
32. issue and apparently that proposal is no longer alive today, which
33. is a rather interesting development. We do have a bill in the Special

1. Session which was introduced by Senator Buzbee, which does in
2. fact provide many of the items within 1493 which are acceptable
3. and could be a great vehicle for a compromise in a solution to
4. this and I think it is very important that we do not approve this
5. bill today so that we can effect a fair compromise to all of the
6. school districts in the State and not possibly by accident, mortgage
7. the future of Illinois, because of the controversy in the numbers
8. in the Title I inclusion. Some people say it won't cost a
9. whole lot of money. Forty million dollars, that's still a lot
10. of money to me. Others say it could go as high as ninety million
11. dollars in the second year. I think because of that confusion,
12. that provision should be out of the bill and as a result, Senator
13. Buzbee's bill in the Special Session is the ideal vehicle. The
14. other part of Senate Bill 1493 that I hope everyone will remember,
15. we talk about helping the local school districts, don't forget
16. the local taxpayer. There are two provisions in Senate Bill
17. 1493 which provide for a tax increase without a referendum. They
18. will be allowed to increase by six cents the first year and six
19. and one half cents the second year the local taxes without a
20. referendum with a backdoor provision. I think that's something
21. we ought to remember. Senator Buzbee in his wisdom has taken
22. those provisions out of his proposal and since it is in the
23. Special Session we still have plenty of time to act on it and,
24. Senator Fawell, that is a bird in the hand and not necessarily a
25. bird in the bush. And I would hope that people would remember
26. the Berman-Hynes proposal of yesterday and the discussion of
27. yesterday, that yes, we're willing to eliminate Title I and
28. not forget now that a vote was cast last night in the House
29. of Representatives, that accommodation may not any longer
30. be necessary. We can't afford to mortgage the future of the
31. State of Illinois and I urge a No vote on the motion of
32. Senator Glass. Thank you.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Palmer. For what...state your point of order, Senator
2. Rock.

3. SENATOR ROCK:

4. It was repeated at least twice, maliciously and inaccurately,
5. by the previous speaker that that proposal has somehow met its
6. demise now that the vote was taken in the House. That is, I
7. submit, Sir, maliciously inaccurate. And sounds like it comes
8. from the second floor and I resent it.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Hynes, for what purpose do you arise?

11. SENATOR HYNES:

12. For the same purpose, Mr. President, that...

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Hynes is recognized.

15. SENATOR HYNES:

16. That proposal has not met its demise and in fact I have the
17. amendments here that are ready and available, but I made the point
18. earlier that this bill does have some important ingredients in
19. it and it must be acted on in one way or another today, it still
20. requires House action, and I think that it ought to be supported.
21. That proposal of yesterday is still very much alive and can be
22. acted upon within the time left to us in this...in this October
23. and November Session. So that I...I think that those statements
24. are misleading. I do not think they are a fair statement at all
25. of the situation.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Palmer.

28. SENATOR PALMER:

29. Mr. President...

30. PRESIDENT:

31. One moment, Senator Palmer. Senator Rock.

32. SENATOR ROCK:

33. One further point. I do not think it was as malicious as
34. it was just born of ignorance. That Senator Buzbee's proposal

1. does not in fact meet the call of the Governor.
2. PRESIDENT:
3. Senator Palmer.
4. SENATOR PALMER:
5. Again, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. Wait...wait...
6. PRESIDENT:
7. Senator Buzbee.
8. SENATOR BUZBEE:
9. Well, I am...I am taken aback with the statement by the
10. Assistant Majority Leader that my bill does not meet the call
11. of the Governor. I was not aware that the Rules Committee had
12. yet ruled on whether my bill met the call of the Governor or
13. not, and if so I would like to be now informed, Mr. President.
14. PRESIDENT:
15. Senator, he did not say precisely what you said. That was
16. an expression I take it of his opinion. He did not say anything
17. about the Rules Committee at all. It was not mentioned.
18. SENATOR BUZBEE:
19. Well, I assume that the Assistant Majority Leader when he
20. speaks that says that my bill does not meet the purview of the
21. call of the Governor, does not fall within the purview, that
22. that is some expression of sentiment that is now presiding or
23. residing rather, in the Rules Committee, and so, you know, if
24. we're going to continue on these points of order, I would like
25. to hear...
26. PRESIDENT:
27. No, our problem really is that we are continuing on a large
28. number of assumptions and once we get involved in assumptions
29. we create problems for ourselves, I think. Senator Palmer.
30. SENATOR PALMER:
31. Yeah, Mr. President and members of the Senate.
32. PRESIDENT:
33. Senator Palmer is recognized.
34. SENATOR PALMER:

1. Yes...yes. Again, Mr. President and members of the Senate.
2. I, too, rise...I...I'm not this short. I, too, rise in support of
3. Senate Bill 1493 but unlike Senator Buzbee, not only did I
4. support it when it first came to the Senate Floor before the
5. veto, I am supporting it now. The inconsistency is, and I
6. am appalled the same as Senator Rock and Senator Hynes, as to
7. the inconsistencies in the position of Senator Buzbee. Senator
8. Buzbee, being Chairman of the Subcommittee, presented to this
9. Senate, Senate Bill 1493, and he represented to this Body that
10. it was the best remedy available to remove the inequities of
11. the school formula. And another thing, there are many of us
12. who come here and make statements that their districts and their
13. constituents demand certain actions on their part. Now, this
14. Senate Committee of the...has made appearances and heard testimony
15. throughout the State and I have with me a written statement by
16. the representative of the Carbondale representation and the
17. Board of Education and the Administrative Staff of the Carbondale
18. Community High School fully support the position statement and
19. the Illinois Committee on full funding as adopted. And they
20. also in their testimony definitely stated that they are certainly
21. opposed to the reductions caused by the Governor's Veto and
22. they support the override. Now, I do not understand these in-
23. consistencies, and I'd also like to call attention to the
24. rest of the Body that we heard in the Senate Committee, not
25. only in Chicago, but we were downstate and we heard from the
26. leading educators and administrators of school districts from
27. were all over the State. And we heard from these describe
28. their plights. We heard that they were suffering from severe
29. consequences, critical circumstances, deficit spending, destruction
30. of vital education programs and absolute elimination of education
31. programs and destruction and curtailing of education services.
32. We heard these and other descriptions of educational losses up
33. to the children from...from...Western Springs, Granite City, Alton,

1. Villa Grove, Carbondale, Mr...Senator Buzbee, Bloomington,
2. Springfield, Peoria, Park Forest, Decatur, Urbana, Champaign,
3. Danville, now wait, I want to call your attention that I am not
4. a train stop conductor. These are...
5. PRESIDENT:
6. Just a moment. Just a minute.
7. SENATOR PALMER:
8. ...districts. These are districts that are in trouble and I'm
9. going to go...
10. PRESIDENT:
11. The gentleman from our Education Committee is speaking...just
12. a moment, Senator. He's entitled to some order. Will the members
13. be in their seats.
14. SENATOR PALMER:
15. Danville. What happened? Danville, Senator Merritt; Updyke.
16. Updyke, Senator Bruce; Rock Falls, Senator Wooten; Midlothian,
17. Senator Moore; Waverly, Senator Demuzio; St. Anne, Senator Joyce;
18. Pittsfield, Demuzio; Homer, Senator Merritt; Joliet, Senator Bell,
19. and incidentally, I've got the written testimony right with me if
20. any one of you Senators want to see it. And they all cried for
21. help, they all cried for the override of this bill, and Carbondale
22. is here, I've got it right in front of me if you want to see it.
23. I'm going on - Lincoln, Illinois; Lincoln, Illinois; Plainfield,
24. Bell; Thornship, Township; Georgetown, Senator Merritt; New Trier, Senat
25. Glass; Rockfort...Rockford, Senator Hickey; anybody want to transfer
26. to Palatine, Regner; Oak Park, Park; LaGrange, Clarke and Evanston,
27. Glass. Now, we must remember - Waukegan...Waukegan...we've got
28. that on tape, we've got that on tape. Now, we have the written
29. testimony and the comments from these representatives, these
30. leaders in the districts, and all of them - all of them demand, urge,
31. they hope or they even pray that we Legislators override the
32. Governor's Veto and especially 1493 and all the three votes
33. that you have to concern yourself with. If these votes are not

1. overridden, I want you to listen to this, if these votes are not
2. overridden the alternatives are increases in local property tax or
3. reductions in limitations of education in many school districts.
4. Neither of these alternatives are welcome. To cut back on the
5. development of progress of children's education is false economy.
6. Not that - I'm reading this...I'm reading this from the testimony
7. of your people that came down to our committee. .I copied down
8. what they said. Gentlemen, I ask for the override of the veto
9. of 1493 and if anybody wants to see the testimony of their represen-
10. tative, I have it.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Wooten.

13. SENATOR WOOTEN:

14. Senator Palmer is a difficult act to follow. I'd merely like
15. to tell him that my town is Rock Island, not Rock Falls. That
16. was earlier, Charlie, that was on the line too. I simply want
17. to go back to something that Senator Fawell said and some other
18. assumptions that have been made here and remind my colleagues that
19. one of the most venerable institutions of the Senate is inconsistency
20. and we need not let that bother us in this case more than any other.
21. I would simply say though that if there is an attempt to get this
22. bill presented to us in another form without the two objectionable
23. features that obviously is the course to pursue. It would have
24. been much better if this Senate bill had been amendatorily vetoed.
25. That was not done. I do not think we should take those two provisions,
26. which I believe many of us find objectionable, in seeking to get
27. the three good parts of the bill. The proper action is to sustain
28. the veto and then to revive those portions which we all agree are
29. salutary, and proceed in that fashion. So, Senator Fawell's argu-
30. ments for an override I think should be turned around and be presented
31. in support of sustaining the veto.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Will the members be in their seats. There are going to be a

1. couple of still photographs made for the local press in Springfield.
2. I wanted you to be advised that pictures are now being made. Senator
3. Hynes.
4. SENATOR HYNES:
5. On a point of order, Mr. President.
6. PRESIDENT:
7. State your point.
8. SENATOR HYNES:
9. Again, I wish to point out so that this is very clear, that
10. the other proposal is still in order. Senator Buzbee has been
11. involved in discussions on that point and he is working toward
12. trying to come up with a proposal that will meet the questions
13. that are involved here. But, I repeat again, that the support
14. is necessary on this bill in order to preserve it for the balance
15. of the Session.
16. PRESIDENT:
17. Any further discussion? Senator Glass may close the debate.
18. SENATOR GLASS:
19. Well, thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen. I think
20. in response to Senator Wooten, Senator Morris, Senator Buzbee, some
21. of the others that are talking about a compromise, I could certainly
22. support such a compromise, I've seen it and I think some of the
23. provisions in it are good, but you can always say that about any
24. bill. Sometime in the future you can develop a compromise if the
25. bill that you're voting on is...is not passed. But you don't know
26. if and when that compromise will be worked out or passed. Now,
27. Senate Bill 1493 already represents a significant compromise of
28. the different interests in education in Illinois and it ought to
29. be passed and ought to become law. And I would point out one
30. other thing. In his Veto Message on August 6th, Governor Walker
31. vetoed five bills pertaining to education all in one message. He
32. had a combined message for all of those bills. Probably the most
33. catastrophic veto among them for at least our area of the State,
34. was the veto of Senate Bill 209, which would have assured a lot

1. of the districts protection from the loss of local revenues
2. because of the increase of the multiplier. That has had a
3. devastating effect on numerous school districts. 1493, I submit
4. to you, is a minimum of...of what we ought to do in good con-
5. science to support our schools and I would urge an Aye vote.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. The question is shall Senate Bill 1493 pass the veto of the
8. Governor to the contrary notwithstanding. Those in favor will
9. vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. Secretary will call the roll.

10. SECRETARY:

11. Bell, Berning, Bloom, Brady, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll, Chew,

23. Present. Let the record show 3 Present, I'm sorry, 27 Ayes, 25 Nays
24. and 3 Present.. 27 Ayes, 25 Nays and 3 Present. The motion is
25. lost. On the order of Item Reductions on page 11. Senate Bill
26. 1496, Senator Kosinski. Senate Bill 1496, no call. On the order
27. of Specific Recommendations for Change on page 11. Senate Bill
28. 223, Senator Fawell.

29. SENATOR FAWELL:

30. Senate Bill 223. My motion is to accede to the Governor's
31. changes. This bill, Senate Bill 223, was very similiar to House
32. Bill 598. Both of these bills amended the Mental Health Code in
33. reference to the question of limitations on the per month expenses

1. in instances where children are transferred from a public facility
2. into a private mental health facility. This bill merely puts it
3. in line with House Bill 598 and I make the motion, therefore,
4. Mr. President, that we accede to the Governor's changes which
5. accomplish that fact.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Any further discussion? The question is shall the Senate
8. accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to
9. Senate Bill 223 in the manner and form as just stated by Senator
10. Fawell. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay.
11. The voting is open. The Secretary will call the roll.

25. 47, the Nays are none. Senate Bill 223 having received the required
26. majority vote of Senators elected, the specific recommendations of
27. the Governor are hereby declared accepted. Senate Bill 701, Senator
28. Knuppel. Fine. We'll be back. You want to...Senator Knuppel.

29. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

30. What we have here is, we have bills that are kind of analogous
31. and I've been waiting on Senator Hall to call his to see what
32. happened with reference to his and so that was the reason I passed
33. it.

1. PRESIDENT:
2. Senate Bill 992, Senator Hynes. Senate Bill 1022, Senator
3. Rock.
4. SENATOR ROCK:
5. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
6. I would first ask that the Journal reflect the fact that Senator
7. Romano is absent due to illness. I have asked leave that the
8. Journal reflect...
9. PRESIDENT:
10. Is leave granted? Leave is...leave is granted.
11. SENATOR ROCK:
12. ...that Senator Romano, and I would further ask leave that
13. I be allowed to handle this motion on his behalf.
14. PRESIDENT:
15. Leave is granted.
16. SENATOR ROCK:
17. I am moving, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
18. Senate, to accept the specific recommendations of the Governor
19. as to Senate Bill 1022, in the manner and form as filed with the
20. Secretary. The bill as introduced by Senator Romano, I am led
21. to believe emanated from the Pension and Laws Commission and it
22. extended a annual adjustment in the General Assembly Pension
23. System to the new group of retirees. It further amended the
24. Chicago Laborers Annuity Article to provide among other things
25. that refunds of pension contributions are not exempt from gar-
26. nishment. Now, the Amendatory Veto simply restored that exemption
27. of refunds from garnishment. It appears to me in any event, that
28. the remainder of the bill, the changes with respect to the General
29. Assembly retirement system and the procedural changes in the
30. Chicago Labor System would be in jeopardy if we do not accept
31. the Amendatory Veto. There is some disagreement, frankly, among
32. some of the membership on the Pension Laws Commission as to
33. whether or not as a policy matter the refunds of employees and

1. widows should be allowed to be garnished. The Governor has seen
2. fit to take that question out of the bill and I think we should
3. accept his specific recommendations and we can deal with that
4. question in the next Session. So, I would move, Mr. President, that
5. we accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to
6. Senate Bill 1022, in the manner and form as filed with the
7. Secretary.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Any further discussion? The question is shall the Senate
10. accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to Senate
11. Bill 1022, in the manner and form as just stated by Senator Rock.
12. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote No. The voting
13. is open.

28. is there leave to go to the order of Total Vetoes for the consider-
29. ation of Senate Bill 942? Leave is granted. Senate Bill 942,
30. Senator Harber Hall.

31. SENATOR HALL:

32. Mr. President, Senate Bill 942 is one of several bills that
33. were introduced in the last General Assembly that dealt with

1. permitting minors under the age of sixteen down to the age of
2. fourteen to be permitted to do some types of labor during some
3. hours, principally during the summer. My bill does exactly that.
4. It was vetoed in entirety by the Governor. I think it's pretty
5. much recognized that young people in the summertime do need to
6. perform duties, work, earn a little bit of money and more impor-
7. tantly than that perhaps, is to be engaged in something of more
8. wholesome responsibility than just idling on the streets. I
9. would ask that this Body override the Governor's Veto by voting
10. to pass the Governor's Veto to the contrary notwithstanding.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill
13. 942 pass, the veto of the Governor to the contrary notwithstanding.
14. Those in favor vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The Secretary
15. will call the roll.

29. The motion on Senate Bill 942 having failed to receive the required
30. three-fifths vote is declared lost. Senator Knuppel, for what purpose
31. do you arise?

32. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

33. Well I don't know if it's proper to go out of order to go back.

1. now to the Amendatory Vetoes, but I think we might just as well
2. consider 701. I want...it deals with the same subject matter. It's
3. also been substantially changed and...and the provisions reduced to
4. where about all the bill does now is allow two additional hours in
5. the summertime. It's not as...not as far reaching as Senator Hall's
6. bill or as my bill originally was. But I think this is still...I
7. think it is still good to enlarge the periods of time with daylight
8. saving and so forth, that youngsters fourteen and fifteen can work
9. during the summertime. It raises the level from seven to nine o'clock,
10. and I would call my motion in that regard.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Is there leave to go to the order of Specific Recommendations
13. for Change for the consideration of Senate Bill 701. Leave is
14. granted. Senator Hall. Senator Harber Hall.

15. SENATOR HALL:

16. I rise in support of this bill.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Any further discussion? The question is shall the Specific

20. those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed No. Call the roll, Secretary.

10. Senators elected are declared accepted. Senator Buzbee.
11. SENATOR BUZBEE:
12. Parliamentary inquiry, Mr. President.
13. PRESIDENT:
14. Yes, state your...
15. SENATOR BUZBEE:
16. In view of what has now happened to Senate Bill 1493, when
17. could I expect a ruling from the Rules Committee as to whether
18. my bill in the Special Session falls within the purview or not?
19. PRESIDENT:
20. Immediately after its next meeting.
21. SENATOR BUZBEE:
22. Thank you, Mr. President. Could I inquire as to when the
23. next meeting of the Rules Committee is scheduled.
24. PRESIDENT:
25. For Monday at noon. Monday at noon.
26. SENATOR BUZBEE:
27. Could I extend my...
28. PRESIDENT:
29. Pardon me, when I say Monday, I mean that Monday on which we
30. return, which is the eighteenth. I stand corrected. It is Tuesday
31. the eighteenth at noon.
32. SENATOR BUZBEE:
33. Could I extend my parliamentary inquiry then to inquire. I
34. believe that we have not, the bill has not been read a first time

1. awaiting the Rules Committee's ruling, so assuming that if the
2. Rules Committee were to rule that it is within the purview, it
3. would take three separate days in the Senate, if we could get it
4. out and get it passed and then three days in the House for a total
5. of five days maximum...minimum rather, that it's going to take to
6. get the bill through the Legislative process. Am I to understand
7. that the inaction of the Rules Committee up to this point has
8. already precluded the possibility of that bill being passed into
9. law.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. I'm glad you brought that to the Chair's attention Senator
12. Buzbee. There is no intention to do that at all and on the basis
13. of what you have just suggested, we will perhaps have a Rules Committee
14. meeting today, consider that bill, and if it comes out of that
15. committee, it can be read a first time today.

16. SENATOR BUZBEE:

17. Thank you.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Vadalabene.

20. SENATOR VADALABENE:

21. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. Possibly, I would like to on a
22. point of personal privilege.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. State your point.

25. SENATOR VADALABENE:

26. After Senate Bill 16 had passed, there was some Ohs and Ahs
27. in regard to the...the a situation where Senator Harber Hall had
28. walked off of the Floor and I you know said, you made a commitment.
29. I...I want to clear that up that...that Senator Harber Hall did not
30. make a definite commitment. However, on a tennis court as were
31. lobbing back and forth, I said don't forget Senate Bill 16 and I
32. think he kinda shook his head in the affirmative. But that was
33. the commitment that I was relating to. Senator Harber Hall and I

1. are the greatest friends and I do not want any one to take any
2. retaliation in regard to Harber Hall in...in saying that he
3. did not keep his word. I'm really serious about this, Senator.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Forty Love.

6. SENATOR VADALABENE:

7. Yes, sir.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Harris is back now. We will return to the order of
10. Specific Recommendations for Change on page twelve of your
11. Calendar. Senate Bill 1108 is the first one. Senator Harris.

12. SENATOR HARRIS:

13. Mr. President, this bill was a bill that amended the Insurance
14. Code and gave direction to the department. The order of priorities
15. that insurance companies under liquidation would be responded to
16. insofar as debts are concerned and was actually supported by the
17. department. In the consideration of the bill, there was a break-
18. down of communication between the department and the Governor's
19. Office in considering the bill and inadvertently, some language
20. in the Amendatory Veto was written into the proposed bill that
21. honestly created problems. We've had discussions among represen-
22. tatives of the Governor's Office, the department and myself and
23. our staff and we have struck a solution which then would be for
24. me to provide some added language in my motion to accept that
25. would cure the problem. If we were to accept the Specific
26. Recommendations of the Governor, we really would have an infirm
27. bill and we would just have to let the whole thing go. It is
28. an important bill with respect to the department's need to
29. determine which obligations of the company ought to be handled
30. first and this clarifies that. The department, the Governor's
31. Office and I are all now in agreement that if we would accept
32. my motion, which is to add some additional language and put it
33. back in the shape was...that the bill was when we passed it,
34. everybody will be happy. I would urge you then to support the

1. motion that I have filed. The Governor has agreed to certify this
2. motion and we will cure the problem. I, therefore, move to accept
3. the recommendations of the Governor as to Senate Bill 1108 in the
4. manner and form as follows: at page one line 26, after the word
5. employee, strike the period and add the words, "and secured claims,
6. including claims for taxes and debts due the Federal or any State
7. or local government which are secured by liens perfected prior
8. to the commencement of delinquency proceedings". And at page two,
9. line one, add the words, "of general creditors" after the word
10. "claims". At page two, lines two and three, delete the words
11. "of the Federal or any State or local government" and add the
12. words "for taxes and debt due the Federal Government or any State
13. or local government which are not secured claims". I would urge
14. the members to sustain...or I'm sorry, accept these Specific
15. Recommendations.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Nudelman. You had...

18. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

19. Will the sponsor yield for a question?

20. PRESIDENT:

21. He indicates he will.

22. SENATOR NUDELMAN:

23. I'm sorry, Senator, I didn't hear the beginning of your explanation.
24. Am I to understand that this is a change in language that
25. this is something that has been written by the Governor or by
26. someone on his behalf and inserted into a bill that we passed.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Harris.

29. SENATOR HARRIS:

30. The Governor Amendatorily Vetoes the bill. I don't want to
31. focus the responsibility, but the suggestion to do so was a faulty
32. suggestion. The Governor has now agreed to put the bill back in the
33. shape that it was when we passed it and that's what I'm doing by

1. SENATOR HARRIS:

2. Thank you, Mr. President. On 1152 and subsequently 1153, I take
3. a little different position. I think I should explain to you all
4. what these two bills really deal with briefly, and that is that
5. the Road Program that is brought to us in printed form on July 1
6. now, really doesn't reach us in time for it to helpfully equip us
7. in our budgetary decision making and the two bills deal with...
8. with changing the timetable. Now, the...the bill that's before
9. us now, 1152, deals with the twenty year plan with the Highway
10. Program for Illinois. It adds into the law the two additional
11. modes of transportation, railways and water transportation
12. so that the Department of Transportation will be required to have
13. a twenty year program for the three modes of transportation and
14. it requires for five year updating of that a...a twenty year
15. plan and annual reporting of that. We also changed the timetable
16. of report by each succeeding year moving the publication date
17. to the first Wednesday in June the first year, the first Wednesday
18. in May the second year and the first Wednesday in April the third
19. year and remaining constant thereafter. We then would have on
20. an annual basis, this publication available to us on after a three
21. year period of reducing from July 1 down to April...the first
22. Wednesday in April, these documents that help us in making our
23. budgetary determinations. I would hope that we...and what the
24. Governor has done is Amendatorily Veto it to stop us at the
25. first Wednesday in June only. Moving us from the July 1 date
26. to the first Wednesday in June and staying there. I think we
27. all appreciate that in June we are really not able to give the
28. kind of care and attention that we ultimately ought to have. We
29. ought to have this information available to us earlier than the
30. first Wednesday in June and therefore, my motion is that we move
31. that the bills do pass the Specific Recommendations of the
32. Governor to the contrary notwithstanding. In other words, I am
33. suggesting that we get ourselves to that eventual April publication

1. date and have that information available to us on a more utili-
2. tarian timely basis. I would urge you to join me in overriding
3. the Specific Recommendations of the Governor.

19. SENATOR MCCARTHY:

20. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Body. I'm going to
21. ask for suspension of the rules with...relation to Senate Bill
22. 279. Now what Senate Bill 279 is well was listed on the Calendar
23. as a motion to override a Total Veto. This was considered two
24. days ago and the bill failed to receive the necessary votes.
25. Since that time there has been conversation with Senator Shapiro
26. and other members of the Republican side who have indicated that they
27. are supportive of this bill. Now there's, you know, I don't want

3. Well...my...my understanding of Senator McCarthy's motion

4. Rock, Aye. On that question the Yeas are 36, the Nays are 6,

5. the motion carries. Senator Soper has requested a verification.

6. Will all of the Senators please be in their seats. Senator

20. This bill has been up for consideration once. The motion
21. that is on the Floor is a motion to consider the bill.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

23. No, it's a motion to override.

24. SENATOR OZINGA:

25. No...no, that's the one that's on the Floor, but the motion
26. was to suspend the rules, this...what I'm saying is this. This...

7. the House and the Senate. I'd like for you to adopt it now to
8. be dispositive of the matter, otherwise, the agenda will be
9. crowded at the next Session with the firemen coming back in with
10. this same sort of a bill. It's not a threat. It's just intended
11. as a plain explanation of the facts. It has limited implication.
12. I've conversed with the Governor's Representative, he says that
13. he has withdrawn any...any type of hostility towards the bill and
14. I would ask that there be thirty-six affirmative votes on the
15. bill so that it would be dispositive. Thank you.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)

30. Berning, Aye. Senator Ozinga, Aye. Senator Joyce, Aye.
31. On that question the Ayes are 50, the Nays are none, none Voting
32. Present. A majorities of the Senators elected concurring by record
33. vote, the Senate does advise and consent to the nominations just

1. made. Senator Vadalabene.

2. SENATOR VADALABENE:

3. Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. With
4. regard to the Governor's messages of June 11th, June 25th and
5. June 27th and October 22nd, the committee recommends that the
6. Senate advise and consent to the following appointments which
7. are all salaried, however, before I go into those salaried
8. appointments, I would like to omit from today's list to be
9. Superintendent of Womens and Childrens Employment for a term

3. Senator Vadalabene is seeking leave. Is leave granted? So

8. The question is does the Senate advise and consent to the

21. Carroll, Aye. Kosinski, Aye. Partee, Aye. Course, Aye.
22. On that question the Ayes are 48, the Nays are none, none Voting
23. Present. The majority of the Senators elected concurring by
24. record vote, the Senate does advise and consent to the nominations
25. just made. Senator Vadalabene.
26. SENATOR VADALABENE:
27. Yes, thank you Mr. President. I move now that the Senate
28. arise from Executive Session.
29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR ROCK)
30. You've heard the motion. All in favor signify by saying Aye.
31. All opposed. The Ayes have it. So ordered. Senator Weaver, for
32. what purpose do you arise?
33. SENATOR WEAVER:

1. Mr. President, I would like to request about a twenty minute
2. recess for the purpose of a Republican caucus in 471 immediately.

17. I filed a motion on Senate Bill 471.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. I haven't gotten there yet, Senator. Right now we're talking
20. about Item Vetoes. I think that's a reduction that you had in
21. mind.

22. SENATOR LEMKE:

23. That's an Item Reduction here.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. All right. Are there any members with Item Vetoes that they
26. desire called? Now to the order of Item Reductions. Are there
27. motions, Mr. Secretary?

28. SECRETARY:

29. I have motions on 471, 517, 555, 633...

30. PRESIDENT:

31. 555 is gone.

32. SECRETARY:

33. And...

1. PRESIDENT:
2. That's the one Senator Moore dealt with this morning.
3. SECRETARY:
4. Right. Right. Yeah...it was withdrawn, right. And 635 and
5. 1496.
6. PRESIDENT:
7. Senate Bill 4... Senator Rock.
8. SENATOR ROCK:
9. Just so everyone will know. The motions filed with respect
10. to Senate Bill...the Item Reductions of Senate Bill 635 and 1496
11. will not be called.
12. PRESIDENT:
13. The record will so show. Senate Bill 471, Senator Lemke.
14. SENATOR LEMKE:
15. Filed the motion to override the Governor's Veto on Senate
16. Bill 471. The veto was a line Item Veto. Would cut eleven million
17. from the 1.75 million for junior colleges. This money is needed
18. to maintain college services for thousands of students who other-
19. wise will not be able to continue their education and I think it's
20. a necessity since their enrollment has increased in the junior
21. colleges, community colleges in our State, and I think this is a
22. bill that provides education to those people that we told to pull
23. themselves up by the boot straps and get an education. And most
24. of these people are working and going to school and trying to better
25. themselves and I urge a favorable vote for the override.
26. PRESIDENT:
27. Now, will the Secretary or Senator Lemke inform me as to the
28. page and line of the...
29. SECRETARY:
30. The page is 3, the line is 15, Senate Bill 471.
31. PRESIDENT:
32. All right. The question is shall the item...or any further
33. discussion? Senator Palmer.

1. SENATOR PALMER:
2. Just...just before the roll call, I just want the record to
3. show that the Chairman of the Senate Committee is highly in favor
4. of the override of this item. And I ask that the...
5. PRESIDENT:
6. Which Senate Committee, Sir? Education?
7. SENATOR PALMER:
8. The Education Committee.
9. PRESIDENT:
10. Thank you very much.
11. SENATOR PALMER:
12. And a...
13. PRESIDENT:
14. I wanted to identify it for the record.
15. SENATOR PALMER:
16. And this...this statement is made in view of the evidence
17. and the testimony we have before us. I ask that the members of
18. the Senate vote Aye on the motion. Thank you.
19. PRESIDENT:
20. Any further discussion? Senator Bruce.
21. SENATOR BRUCE:
22. I'm sorry, Mr. President, I just arrived and heard Senator
23. Palmer's brief explanation I guess. What I would like to say is
24. that I have introduced yesterday, Senate Bill 1519, which is an
25. eighteen million dollar supplemental appropriation to community
26. colleges throughout the State. We have found that we have under
27. estimated the amount of enrollment. We left here thinking it
28. would be somewhere in the neighborhood of a hundred and forty-two
29. thousand students, only to find in the Fall enrollment now, it's
30. approaching a hundred and seventy-eight thousand students. There
31. is not enough money in the present appropriation. Community
32. colleges recognize at least the problems of cash flow that are
33. presently existing and have decided to go the route of introducing

1. a supplemental appropriation, which we would act on in the Spring.
2. For that reason I...I personally did not file the motion to over-
3. ride on 471 even though I was the principal sponsor.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Any further discussion? The question is shall the item on
6. page 3, line 15 of Senate Bill 471 be restored, the Item
7. Reduction of the Governor to the contrary notwithstanding. Those
8. in favor vote Aye. Opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. The
9. Secretary will call the roll.

10. SECRETARY:

11. Bell, Berning, Bloom, Brady, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll, Chew,
12. Clarke, Course, Daley, Davidson, Demuzio, Donnewald, Dougherty,
13. Egan, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth Hall, Harris,
14. Hickey, Hynes, Johns, Joyce, Knuppel, Kosinski, Lane, Latherow,
15. Lemke, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard Mohr, Don Moore, Morris,
16. Netsch, Newhouse, Nimrod, Nudelman, Ozinga, Palmer, Philip, Regner,
17. Rock, Roe, Romano, Savickas, Schaffer, Shapiro, Smith, Sommer,

19. PRESIDENT:

20. On that question the Ayes are 15, the Nays are 19. The item
21. on page 3, line 15 of Senate Bill 471, having failed to receive
22. the required majority vote of the Senate elected, the motion thereto
23. is declared lost. Are there any other bills on Item Reductions?
24. Mr. Secretary, you mentioned 517, I think that bill has already
25. been dealt with. It has been, very good. One on 517 related to
26. the same item that we have already considered. Any other motions
27. on Item Reductions? We go to the order of Specific Recommendations
28. for Change. Are there any Senators with any motions on any of those
29. items? Any further business to come before the Senate in the
30. Regular Session? Resolutions.

31. SECRETARY:

32. Joint Resolution No. 56 introduced by Senators Philip, Hall,
33. Sommer, Schaffer, Nimrod and others. It's a Constitutional Amend-

1. ment.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Executive.

4. SECRETARY:

5. Kenneth Hall, I mean Harber Hall. Senate...Senate Joint
6. Resolution Constitutional Amendment No. 57 introduced by the
7. same sponsors.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Executive. Resolutions. Senator Egan.

10. SENATOR EGAN:

11. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. We have
12. a...the distinct pleasure of asking the Senate today to suspend
13. its rules so that we could immediately hear a resolution which
14. is congratulatory for one of our members thirty-seventh birthday.
15. I would ask that we do this in behalf of our good colleague and
16. our good friend, Senator Tom Hynes. He apparently has just left
17. the Chambers temporarily and will be back.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. The motion is to suspend the rules for the immediate consider-
20. ation of this resolution. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay.
21. The rules are suspended. The motion now by Senator Egan is to...for
22. the immediate adoption of this resolution. All in favor will say
23. Aye. Opposed Nay. For the record, the resolution is numbered 182.
24. Resolutions. For...for what purpose does Senator Egan arise?

25. SENATOR EGAN:

26. Well, Mr. President, just so that the recipient of the Congratu-
27. latory Resolution can hear that his colleagues certainly favor his
28. thirty-seventh birthday and wish him well. Tom Hynes.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. It seems like such a long time ago, Senator, we did that,
31. you're probably thirty-eight by now. Senator Hynes.

32. SENATOR HYNES:

33. Thank you very much. Actually it was last night and I...I

1. received a very, very good birthday present over in the House
2. and I just want to thank Senator Egan for introducing this
3. resolution and I would like to say to him that I hope that when
4. I'm as old as he is I'll be successful too. Thank you.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Equity abhors a volunteer. Message from the House.

7. SECRETARY:

8. A Message from the House by Mr. O'Brien, Clerk.

9. Mr. President - I am directed to inform the Senate
10. that the House of Representatives has adopted the following
11. Preamble and Joint Resolution, in the adoption of which I am
12. instructed to ask the concurrence of the Senate, to-wit:

13. House Joint Resolution 73.

14. Senator Latherow is handling this.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Latherow.

17. SENATOR LATHEROW:

18. Well, Mr. President and members, I'd just like to call to
19. your attention that this is a Death Resolution concerning a prior
20. member of the House who many of you here served years with. House
21. member H. B. Innen from Quincy, Illinois, passed away this past
22. July and I think this resolution is very proper at this time,
23. Mr. President, and I move for the suspension of the rules and
24. the immediate consideration of this Joint Resolution.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. The motion is to suspend the rules for the immediate considera-
27. tion of this Joint Resolution. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed
28. Nay. The rules are suspended. Senator Latherow now moves for
29. the immediate adoption of this resolution. All in favor will say
30. Aye. Opposed Nay. The resolution is adopted. Are there any
31. other motions in the Regular Session. Senator Rock.

32. SENATOR ROCK:

33. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.

1. I would wish the Journal to reflect that Senator Kosinski had to
2. leave. His wife was, as everybody probably knows, hospitalized
3. last night in somewhat of a hurry and he felt that he should be
4. with her today. He has requested that I make a motion that he
5. was going to make and tried to make earlier in the day, and that
6. is to discharge the Committee on Elections and Reapportionment of
7. which he is the Chairman, from further consideration of House
8. Bill 378 and to replace that bill on the Calendar on the order
9. on which it was committed, from which it was committed to that
10. committee. Now this is a bill of some extraordinary interest,
11. especially to our colleagues in the House and I would ask that
12. at this time it be placed on the Calendar so that we can argue
13. appropriately when we return on the eighteenth.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Any further discussion? Senator Harris.

16. SENATOR HARRIS:

17. Might I inquire from the member who made the motion. Is
18. this a Committee Bill?

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Rock.

21. SENATOR ROCK:

22. It...it is not a Committee Bill.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Harris.

25. SENATOR HARRIS:

26. Then I would suggest that the motion is not in order under
27. the Joint Rule.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Harris, this is the one I talked to you.

30. SENATOR HARRIS:

31. That's right, you did. And I'm inclined to think now that
32. ...that it ought to make it.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. So you are withdrawing your former remarks.

2. SENATOR HARRIS:

3. I...I move like...like you ruled earlier today on the

4. leave for the photography.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. I seem to remember that.

7. SENATOR HARRIS:

8. Yeah, well why don't you use the same degree of audibility

9. that...on my suggestion, on my inquiry as you did that.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Very well.

12. SENATOR HARRIS:

13. I was reminded then of Senator Charlie Baker's Chairing of

14. a committee one time when he called for the Aye votes and I think

15. there was only one Aye vote and Chairman Baker declared the motion

16. carried and several of the members of the committee raised the

17. point that they hadn't had an opportunity to cast their no votes

18. and Chairman Baker said when I want no votes, I'll ask for it.

19. This...this morning I was prompted to reminisce about Chairman

20. Charlie Baker.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Great fellow. Senator Netsch.

23. SENATOR NETSCH:

24. Mr. President, maybe Senator Harris knows what this is about,

25. but some of us do not. You didn't ask our permission to call it

26. up to the Floor today. Would someone just tell us what the bill

27. is about and...

28. PRESIDENT:

29. No...no, the gentleman making the motion I thought explained

30. it. Maybe you did not hear him.

31. SENATOR NETSCH:

32. No, he did not.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Rock.

2. SENATOR ROCK:

3. No, the...the bill is House Bill 378. It concerns the rotation
4. of candidates for the House of Representatives on the ballot and
5. now, you know, the question of how do we get to it under our rules,
6. I thought when I explained and made the motion, I...I think that
7. that argument is in order once the bill is on the Calendar. I am
8. making what I think is a proper motion to discharge the committee
9. from further consideration of this bill and have it placed on the
10. Calendar at which time I'm sure that the argument will ensue.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Any further discussion? Senator Netsch.

13. SENATOR NETSCH:

14. Just...just to complete that Senator Rock. The...what you are
15. saying is that any procedural questions you are suggesting be
16. debated at that time. All right, that...that's fine. As long...
17. as long as there's a chance to raise that issue. The bill sir,
18. that's not my problem. It's a major procedural thing that's
19. happening here.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Yes, and when you say I sought Senator Harris' permission,
22. I just told him out of courtesy as the leader of the other party
23. that this was going to take place. We keep nothing from you. This
24. is an open, aboveboard operation. The question is to discharge
25. Senate Bill 378 from the Committee on Elections to place it on
26. the Calendar, House Bill 378 to place it on the Calendar. Read
27. the bill. To be placed back where it was on the Calendar. All
28. in favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it, the motion
29. carries. (Machine cut-off) Knuppel.

30. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

31. Mr. Chairman, I have a bill that's in a similar position.
32. I don't know exactly...now it has to do with...it was introduced
33. here, it has to do with funding in the Department of Agriculture,

1. I think it's 1511, but I'm not sure, do you have that. I didn't
2. get it on the folder. It's an administration bill.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. House Bill 1511 you think? Senate Bill?

5. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

6. Senate Bill 1511, I believe. Do you have that? It was
7. introduced... It has to do with funds in the Department of
8. Agriculture. What? Okay. It was offered the first day in here
9. by Senator...Donnewald and no number was gotten and put on a file
10. and I didn't pick it up, I'm sorry.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. We are talking now, the Secretary is to his office. We'll
13. have the number in a moment. The bill is numbered 1511, it is
14. in Appropriations.

15. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

16. Right. I'd move to discharge this bill from further considera-
17. tion by the Appropriations Committee and have the same placed on
18. the Calendar at the order of 2nd reading.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. You heard the motion. Any further discussion?

21. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

22. Now what the bill does...

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Hynes.. Just a moment. Senator Hynes.

25. SENATOR HYNES:

26. No, go ahead.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Go right ahead.

29. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

30. I should explain the bill. What it does is increase the
31. authorization to spend Federal monies that are in the Wholesome
32. Meat Fund, some two hundred and ninety-five thousand dollars
33. worth. A hundred and fifty-six thousand to go to the City of

1. Chicago as a fifty-fifty match of expenditures and a hundred and
2. thirty-nine thousand to the Department of Agriculture to make...
3. to match State General Revenue Funds in carrying out meat and
4. poultry inspection. Now the Federal Government has advised the
5. Department of Agriculture these funds will be available for the
6. remainder of Fiscal '76. What's happening is some money, the
7. sixty-thousand dollars estimated revenues from inspection of
8. eggs will come in to, there's an increase in authorization to
9. spend sixty-thousand by the Department of Agriculture from the
10. master fund, but this will be replaced by the fees gathered
11. from inspection fees under the Egg Product Act. This is no
12. additional appropriation, it's merely an allocation of fund,
13. reallocation of funds in order that more money can be used
14. from the Federal Fund and the...it will create a job for one
15. auditor and a transfer and a hiring of some additional inspectors
16. because there's an increase in this type of work in the City
17. of Chicago.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. The Chairman and the Minority Spokesman of the Committee on
20. Appropriations are on their feet. I'll recognize first Senator
21. Hynes, then Senator Weaver.

22. SENATOR HYNES:

23. Mr. ...Mr. President, I think all of what Senator Knuppel has
24. said is accurate. Our staff has done an analysis of this bill and
25. has been in contact with the department and in keeping with the...
26. the policy of this limited Fall Session it was our judgement that
27. this bill could wait and should wait until we return after the
28. first of the year and I therefore would object to this motion to
29. discharge.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Weaver.

32. SENATOR WEAVER:

33. Thank you, Mr. President. I concur with Senator Hynes and

1. actually the department will not know exactly what the Federal
2. monies will amount to until January and so that will be sufficient
3. time to deal with this bill.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. In light of the two statements, what is your pleasure, Senator?
6. Senator Knuppel.

7. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

8. I've been asked to...to move that it be taken from Appropriations
9. and placed on the order of 2nd reading and one of the principal
10. reasons being that they're going to be a shortage of these type
11. of people in the City of Chicago, that they're the most effected
12. and you can vote your pleasure.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. The gentleman persists in his motion. The motion is shall
15. Senate Bill 1511 be discharged from the Committee on Appropriations.
16. All in favor will say Aye. Opposed...opposed Nay. A roll call
17. is requested. The Secretary will call the roll.

18. SECRETARY:

19. Bell, Berning, Bloom, Brady, Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll, Chew,
20. Clarke, Course, Daley, Davidson, Demuzio, Donnewald, Dougherty,
21. Egan, Fawell, Glass, Graham, Harber Hall, Kenneth Hall, Harris,
22. Hickey, Hynes, Johns, Joyce, Knuppel, Kosinski, Lane, Latherow,
23. Lemke, McCarthy, Merritt, Mitchler, Howard Mohr, Don Moore, Morris,

28. On this question the Ayes are 8, the Nays are 22, the motion
29. fails. Are there any further motions in the First Regular Session,

31. Resolution.

32. SECRETARY:

33. Senate Joint Resolution 57, no 58 it will be.

1. (Secretary reads Senate Joint Resolution No. 58)

2. PRESIDENT:

3. One o'clock p. m., Senator Hickey. Senator Rock.

4. SENATOR ROCK:

5. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
6. Senate. This is the Adjournment Joint Resolution, Senate Joint
7. Resolution 58. I would move to suspend the rules for its immediate
8. consideration and I will move its adoption.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Rock moves for the suspension of the rules for the
11. immediate consideration of this resolution. All in favor will
12. say Aye. Opposed Nay. The rules are suspended. Senator Rock
13. now moves for the immediate adoption of this resolution. All in
14. favor will say Aye. Opposed Nay. The motion...the resolution
