- 5. a voice vote, Senator. Senator Bruce, it...it was reassigned
- 6. to the Committee on Judiciary II. Senator Bruce.
- 7. SENATOR BRUCE:
- 8. Well, the resolution does deal with corrections and the
- 9. reason it was in Executive, Senator Graham, is that late one
- 10. evening near midnight, I believe, it came over from the House
- 11. and under our rules it had to go to Executive and, I believe,
- 12. there are only two of us here and I was the Presiding Officer
- 13. and it went into Executive, but there was substantial agreement
- 14. that it would come out and be heard more appropriately in
- 15. Judiciary II. That's why it was in Executive because our rules
- 16. mandate it go there and that is, in fact, where it did go because
- 17. there wasn't anyone else on the Floor except myself and, I
- 18. believe, Senator Wooten was here about midnight one evening.
- 19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
- 20. Senator Graham.
- 21. SENATOR GRAHAM:
- 22. In...in order to do that there would have to be a motion
- 23. to suspend the rules. How did we get that done with two
- 24. people here?
- 25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
- 26. Senator Bruce.
- 27. SENATOR BRUCE:
- 28. That...Senator Graham, that's exactly why it is in
- 29. Executive because our rules require that it goes directly
- 30. to Executive and that's why the motion was made on the Floor
- 31. to...to transfer it from Executive to Judiciary II. There was
- 32. no choice in the matter and I didn't want to try to suspend
- 33. the rules. We were absolutely here by ourselves. We were

- 1. just accepting Messages from the House and that was one of the
- 2. messages. So it went to Executive pursuant to the rules of the
- Senate.

- 8. language that affects this entire State of Illinois with regard
- 9. to conjugal visits to prisons. Now that's all the damn thing
- 10. does and I want it in Executive. Now how do I get it there?
- 11. And I don't like the way this happened and if there was a
- 12. vote to send it to Judiciary II I would like to...I'd like to
- 13. have that vote reconsidered or something. I want that bill
- 14. in and everybody else that has any interest in this should
- 15. want it in Executive, too.

- 17. Well, Senator, you have a right and voted on the prevailing

- because we passed it out of Judic and they're mad about
- 3. that. Well, it's a good resolution and we gave it ample
- 4. consideration in Judic and there's no reason why it
- 5. shouldn't be on the Calendar at the moment.
- 6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
- 7. Now, just a moment. Senator Netsch.
- 8. SENATOR NETSCH:

- 9. Thank you. The resolution...Senator D'Arco is
- 10. quite correct, that Senator Wooten had indicated that there
- 11. would be no meetings of Executive at the request of the
- 12. House sponsors who...who, incidently, were Roman
- 13. Kosinski as well as Harold Katz, Senator Graham, who
- 14. wanted the resolution heard and with, as I understand,
- 15. that the...certainly the tacit approval of the Department
- 16. of Corrections who testified before our committee this
- 17. morning and supported it, we asked that it be sent to
- 18. Judiciary. It related to subject matter that came before
- 19. us and it was the only opportunity for it to be heard.
- 20. That was the reason for it. It was not to avoid
- 21. Executive. It's just that Executive is simply not going
- 22. to meet. And so, on that basis, we did hear testimony
- 23. this morning and the committee did indicate its...its
- 24. viewpoint with respect to the resolution. I would suggest,
- 25. because we have already gone through all of it, Senator
- 26. Graham, that if you do disapprove of the resolution,
- 27. then that certainly can be expressed when the time comes
- 28. and it is called on the Floor. But it would be
- 29. really not fair to the sponsors in the House and certainly
- 30. would not be fair really to members of Executive who are
- 31. not going to be meeting, to send it to that committee and
- 32. then we would have to find the time to call a special
- 33. hearing and that sort of thing, which I think really would

- 1. just tie us up further. So, it seems to me that this is a
- 2. much more appropriate and expeditious way to go
- 3. about it.
- 4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
- 5. Senator...Senator Joyce. There...there is...there
- 6. are many Senators wishing to address themselves to this
- 7. particular issue so we're going to take them as they come.
- 8. Senator Joyce. Senator Daley.

- Senator Rhoads has moved to appeal the ruling of the Chair.

- Senator Rhoads's point is valid, that once we have adjourned,
- the rest...until tomorrow at 12:15, any other proceeding is,
- in fact, a nullity and we really should recognize that and 29.
