2. The hour of noon having arrived the Senate will come to
3. order. Prayer by Reverend Anthony Tzortzis, Saint Anthony's
4. Hellenic Orthodox Church, Springfield. Will our guests in the
5. galleries please rise.

6. REVEREND ANTHONY TZORTZIS:

7. (Prayer given by Reverend Anthony Tzortzis)

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

9. Reading of the Journal. Senator Demuzio.

10. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

11. Mr. President, I move that reading and approval of the
12. Journals of Friday, March 28th and Tuesday, April the 8th, in
13. the year 1980, be postponed pending arrival of the printed Journals.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

15. You've heard the motion by Senator Demuzio. Is there discussion
16. of the motion? All in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have
17. it. The motion prevails. If we can have some order, please.
18. We have some very special guests with us today, who will be introduced
19. by Representative Glen Bower. We're happy to have one of our
20. House members over here, and I think the others are on their way.
21. Representative Bower.

22. REPRESENTATIVE BOWER:

23. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
24. It is my pleasure to present to you the Flaming Heart's basketball
25. team of Effingham, who placed second in the Class AA State Tournament
26. two weeks ago in Champaign. The team is represented in the Senate
27. by President Bruce, and represented in the House by Representative
28. Brummer, myself and Representative Robins. Although we placed
29. No. 2 in Champaign certainly in the hearts of the people of Effingham
30. and our area, they're No. 1, and when we placed No. 2 you must
31. bear in mind that we were the smallest high school by far in the
32. elite eight, and it's now my pleasure to present to you the head
33. coach of the Flaming Hearts, Jim Maxedon.

3. REPRESENTATIVE BOWER:
4. Thank you coach. Mitch Arnold, as the coach indicated is going to play at the
5. University of Illinois next year, received just about every honor
6. that was possible for a high school basketball player to receive,
7. also Euwe Blaub, who is the tallest high school basketball player
8. in Illinois history, was a recipient of many honors, we're very
9. proud of him. We have a couple of sets of parents here, I'd like
10. to ask former Representative Chuck Keller to introduce them.

14. Thank you, very much.

16. For what purpose does Senator Hall seek recognition?

18. Thank you, Mr. President. I just wanted to welcome that team,
19. and tell them that the mighty Rockets from East St. Louis welcome
20. them to Springfield.
21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
22. For what purpose does Senator Donnewald seek recognition?
23. SENATOR DONNEWALD:
24. Yes, Mr...
25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
26. May we have some order, please? Senator Donnewald.
27. SENATOR DONNEWALD:
28. Inadvertently I assigned Senate Bill 2007 to Executive and
29. it should have been to Executive Appointments, it's an easement
30. bill. I ask leave to have that rereferred.
31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
32. Senator Donnewald asks leave. Is there leave? Leave is granted.
33. For what purpose does Senator Nash arise?

1. SENATOR NASH:
2. Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. To
3. let the record show that Senator Lemke and Senator Nega are absent
4. on official business.
5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
6. The record will so show. Senator Lemke and Senator Nega.
7. Senator Vadalabene for an announcement.
8. SENATOR VADALABENE:
9. Yes, I would like to be shown as a co-sponsor of Senate Bill
10. 1755.
11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
12. You've heard the motion. Is there discussion? All in favor
13. say Aye. Opposed Nay. So shown. For what purpose does Senator
14. Berning arise?
15. SENATOR BERNING:
16. Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like also, to be shown as a co-
17. sponsor of Senate Bill 1586.
18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
19. Is there leave? Leave is granted. For what purpose does
20. Senator Davidson arise?
21. SENATOR DAVIDSON:
22. While we have a lull, I'd like to make an announcement.
23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
24. Proceed.
25. SENATOR DAVIDSON:
26. Mr. President, and members of the Senate. If I could have your
27. attention please? The Governor's Prayer Breakfast to which all of
28. you are a participant, if you care to be, it will be Thursday, May
29. the 1st at 7:45 a.m. at the Holiday Inn East. Jim Lear of the
30. McNeil Lear Report which you can see on Public Television
31. News at five thirty every evening is the speaker. The tickets are
32. seven dollars, you'll be getting a written note from me. If you're
33. going to go I must know by April...the Thursday before the May 1st...

1. that cutoff deadline. We are saving seats for members of the Senate
2. and the House of Representatives at the downfront tables, so please
3. see me, you'll be getting a written notice. Thank you.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

5. For what purpose does Senator Rock arise?

6. SENATOR ROCK:

7. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
8. If I can have the attention of the membership...

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. Could we have some order please? Senator Rock.

11. SENATOR ROCK:

12. I think we can handle our business on the Floor today with some
13. dispatch. There is a committee, Appropriations II is going to meet,
14. I'm sure Senator Buzbee will announce, at two o'clock in Room 212.
15. Tomorrow when we adjourn we will be in less than full Session at
16. 9:30 a.m., and adjourn shortly thereafter until Tuesday of next
17. week at the hour of noon. This afternoon it seems to me that we can,
18. if the sponsors wish, move the Senate Bills on 2nd to 3rd, pass, if the
19. Body approves, the Senate Bills on 3rd reading. We have a report from
20. the Executive Committee on Appointments with respect to some
21. Gubernatorial appointees that were subject to advice and consent
22. this morning at Executive Appointments, and I think all in all
23. we could wrap it up in about thirty minutes.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

25. Is there leave to go to the Order of Resolutions? Leave is
26. granted.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Senate Joint Resolution 86, offered by Senator Rock.

29. (Secretary reads SJR 86)

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

31. Senator Rock.

32. SENATOR ROCK:

33. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.

1. To again repeat this is the Adjournment Resolution, which calls
2. for us, upon adjournment tomorrow morning approximately 9:30, to
3. return to Springfield next Tuesday at the hour of noon. I would
4. move Mr. President for the suspension of the rules and the immediate
5. consideration and adoption of this Joint Resolution.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

7. You've heard the motion to suspend the rules for the immediate
8. consideration and adoption. Is there leave? Leave is granted.
9. On the motion to adopt, all in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The
10. Ayes have it. The resolution is adopted. Senator Vadalabene.
11. Senator Vadalabene are you ready? Is there leave to go to the
12. committee reports? Leave is granted. Committee reports.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Senator Vadalabene, Chairman of the Committee on Executive
15. Appointments and Administration, to which was referred the Governor's
16. Message of March 28th, 1980, reported the same back with the re-
17. commendation that the Senate advise and consent to the following
18. appointments.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

20. Senator Vadalabene.

21. SENATOR VADALABENE:

22. Yes, thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I
23. move that the Senate resolve itself into Executive Session for the
24. purpose of acting on the Governor's Appointments, set forth in the
25. Governor's Message of March 28th, 1980.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

27. Motion is, that we resolve ourselves in Committee of the Whole.
28. You've heard the motion. All in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The
29. Ayes have it.

30. SENATOR VADALABENE:

31. Thank you, Mr. President. With respect to the Governor's Message
32. of March 28th, 1980, I will read the unsalaried appointments to
33. which the committee on Executive Appointments and Administration

1. recommends, that the Senate do advise and consent. After reading
2. those appointments I intend to ask leave to consider all of the
3. unsalaried appointments on one roll call, unless any Senator has
4. objection to any particular appointment.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

6. All right. For what purpose Senator...Senator Vadalabene.
7. For what purpose does Senator Rhoads arise? Gentlemen may we have
8. some order. We are at the point that Senator Vadalabene is going to
9. read a...a list of appointees. If you will have objections, make
10. them now, we get to the end and...and we get to the roll call, and
11. there will be an objection to a particular name. Now is the time
12. he will read it, and make the objections. Senator Rhoads.

13. SENATOR RHOADS:

14. Well, yes, I will have an objection on Mr. Erie Jones.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

16. All right. Senator Vadalabene.

17. SENATOR VADALABENE:

18. Yes, those objections should be acknowledged when we get
19. to the salaried appointments. These are the unsalaried.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

21. We will start with unsalaried, and Senator Vadalabene has asked
22. leave that the unsalaried positions be considered on one roll call.
23. He will now read the list and if there is objection make it at the
24. conclusion of his reading. Senator Vadalabene.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

1. Is there leave to have all the unsalaried appointees considered
2. on one roll call as just named by Senator Vadalabene? Leave is
3. granted. Senator Vadalabene for the motion.

4. SENATOR VADALABENE:

5. Yes, Mr. President. Will you put the question as required
6. by our rules.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. The quesiton is, does the Senate advise and consent to the
9. nominations just made? Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed
10. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have
11. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the
12. Ayes are 54, the Nays are none. None Voting Present. A majority
13. of Senators elected concurring by record vote, the Senate does advise
14. and consent to the nominations just made. Gentlemen may we have
15. some order please? Those were the unsalaried appointments. Now,
16. Senator Vadalabene do you have further business?

17. SENATOR VADALABENE:

18. Yes, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. With respect to
19. the Governor's Message of March 28th, 1980, I will read the names
20. of the salaried appointments, to which the Committee on Executive
21. Appointments and Administration recommends, that the Senate do
22. advise and consent to. After reading the appointments, I intend
23. to ask leave to consider all of the salaried appointments on one
24. roll call, unless any Senator has any objection to any particular
25. appointment. Now, I might make note that there is objection to
26. two salaried appointments of which I have withheld, and I will ask
27. for separate rollcalls for them after I go through the salaried
28. appointments of which I have not received any complaints.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

30. Proceed, Senator...Senator Vadalabene.

31. SENATOR VADALABENE:

32. Thank you, Mr. President. To be the Deputy Commissioner of
33. Banks and Trust Companies, for a term expiring October 18, 1982,

1. Bruce J. Brizzolara of Park Ridge. To be a member of the Chicago
2. Transit Authority, for a term expiring September 1, 1983, John J.
3. Hoellen of Chicago. To be the Superintendent of the Illinois State
4. Police, for a term expiring January 19, 1981, R. J. Miller of Pawnee.
5. And to be the Director of the Department of Aging, for a term
6. expiring January 19, 1981, Peg Blaser of Springfield. And to be
7. the Assistant Secretary to the Department of Transportation, for
8. a term expiring January 19, 1981, Hugh R. Murphy of Villa Park.
9. To be members of the Pollution Control Board for the terms indicated,
10. Irvin G. Goodman of Oak Brook, term expiring July 1, 1982, and Joan
11. G. Anderson of Western Springs, term expiring July 1, 1981. Now,
12. Mr. President, having read the salaried appointments, I now seek
13. leave to consider these appointments on one roll call, unless some
14. Senator has objection to a specific appointment.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

16. You've heard the motion, that they be considered on one roll
17. call, the names just mentioned by Senator Vadalabene. Is there leave?
18. Leave is granted. Senator Vadalabene.

19. SENATOR VADALABENE:

20. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. Will you put the question by...
21. as required by our rules.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. The question is, does the Senate advise and consent to the
24. nominations just made. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed
25. will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have
26. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes
27. are 53, the Nays are none. None Voting Present. A majority of
28. Senators elected concurring by record vote, the Senate does advise
29. and consent to the nominations just made. Senator Vadalabene.

30. SENATOR VADALABENE:

31. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. Now, I will go to two other
32. appointments...come on...on single...on single roll calls. Okay?
33. All right, to be a member of the Pollution Control Board, for the

1. term indicated, Jacob D. Dumelle of Oak Park, whose term expires
2. July 1, 1982. Having read the name of the salaried appointments, I
3. now seek for a roll call, unless there's any objection.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

5. Senator Donnewald.

6. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

7. Yes, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. Earlier today,
8. early this morning, we had a committee meeting of the Committee on
9. Executive Appointments, chaired by Senator Vadalabene. We did con-
10. sider one, Jacob Dumelle, and Mr. Dumelle historically was appointed
11. by the former Governor Walker, and now Governor Thompson is reappoint-
12. ing Mr. Dumelle to the Chairman of the Pollution Control Board. Now,
13. back two years ago, I think most of you will remember, that we in-
14. troduced a bill that was meant to let us burn Illinois coal, it was
15. a Sulfur Emissions Bill. That Sulfur Emissions Bill, I happen to be the
16. principal sponsor, and prior to passing that onto the order of 3rd
17. reading, I held it on 2nd reading for at least two and a half months.
18. During that period of time I got the Pollution Control Board people,
19. the Environmental Protection Agency people, the coal industry, and
20. all those who might have been concerned with passage of such leg-
21. islation. Now, after that time had elapsed...after that time elapsed,
22. Ladies and Gentlemen of this Body, we did have an agreement, and no
23. one, and I say no one objected to the form of that bill. The bill
24. passed the Senate with some 42 to 43 votes, went to the House, suddenly
25. there was a letter sent by Mr. Dumelle objecting vehemently to that
26. particular piece of legislation that would allow us to burn Illinois
27. coal. Now, I ask you is that a good administrator to not have
28. communication with the people on his own board, his own employees.
29. I say no, he is not a good administrator, I say no because I think
30. that we can have others that can do a much better job, and...and
31. really seek to burn Illinois coal in a way that would not affect
32. the environment, and I might add that further testimony this morning
33. disclosed that I don't really see a need of the...the PCB or the
Pollution Control Board, after the testimony that the witnesses

1. gave. Thank you.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

3. You've heard the discussion. Senator Vadalabene.

4. SENATOR VADALABENE:

5. Yes, thank you. Will you put the question as required by
6. our rules.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. Is there further discussion? The question is, does the Senate
9. advise and consent to the nomination just made. Those in favor
10. vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all
11. voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On
12. that question, the Ayes are 45, the Nays are 3. 3 Voting Present.
13. A majority of Senators elected concurring by record vote, the Senate
14. does advise and consent to the nomination just made. Senator
15. Vadalabene.

16. SENATOR VADALABENE:

17. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. With respect to the Governor's
18. Message of March 28th, 1980, I will read the name of the salaried
19. appointment to which the Committee on Executive Appointment and
20. Administration recommends that the Senate advise and consent to.
21. To be director of the Emergency Services and Disaster Agency, for
22. a term expiring October 1, 1981, E. Erie Jones, Jr. of Creal Springs.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. You've heard the nomination. Is there discussion? Senator
25. Rhoads.

26. SEANTOR RHOADS:

27. Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I apologize
28. for not having the materials here in front of me that are presently
29. in my district office. I did not think we would get to this order
30. of business today, with the committee meeting being held only this
31. morning, and it is, of course, something that you don't want to
32. do to call into question the reputation of a director without having
33. as thorough an investigation as possible, however, in this instance
I have to vote my district. The Civil Defense officials, of the

1. Village of LaGrange which is in my district, along with radio station
2. WTAQ, which has held a series of editorials opposing the con-
3. firmation of Mr. Jones, have charged that he has been in a word,
4. incompetent in his administration of this agency. My own experiences
5. during the snowstorm of last January, a year ago in January, lead
6. me to believe that there was something seriously wrong in the
7. ability of that agency to react under pressure. The most serious
8. allegation that has been made by WTAQ, and which I have asked our
9. staff to look into, is the fact that ninety-seven percent of the
10. budget of this agency has been spent on the director himself, or
11. on the activities of his office. Now, I'm very sorry that I haven't
12. ...this was first brought to my attention on the 4th of April, today
13. is the 9th of April, the staff did get me that information today,
14. I have not had a chance to...to go over it in detail. Based on the
15. very strong opinions, strongly held opinions, of people I regard as
16. professionals in the area of emergency services and disasters in my
17. district, based on their strongly held opinions, that this agency
18. is not being conducted under the guidance of Mr. Jones in the way
19. that it should, I feel compelled to vote No. I am told by a colleague
20. that other suburban newspapers in suburban Cook, and DuPage County
21. have held similar editorials in the last couple of weeks. I wish
22. there were more time to look into these charges, but for the present
23. time I must withhold my vote. Thank you.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

25. Further discussion of the nomination? Senator Vadalabene.

26. SEANTOR VADALABENE:

27. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. Will you put the question as
28. required by our rules.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

30. The question is, does the Senate advise and consent to the
31. nomination just made. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed
32. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have
33. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes
are 45, the Nays are 2. None Voting Present. A majority of

1. Senators elected concurring by record vote, the Senate does advise
