30. by the Secretary of State or other official driver's license  
31. agency in any other jurisdiction. Section 2 of the bill makes it a  
32. Class B misdemeanor for that person...for any person to duplicate,  
33. manufacture or sell any such document. So what's the problem in the  
State of Illinois? I thought the easiest way to illustrate it with

1. you, if you haven't already thrown it in your wastebasket which is  
2. usually happens with handouts, but I did have distributed and I hold  
3. up now a sample of a brochure for want of a better word, that is  
4. being sent, as you can see, from Westminster, California which  
5. says that we will give you a simulated driver's license issued  
6. directly to you for any state you want for any name or age and you'll  
7. see that's all underlined. They try to protect themselves somewhat  
8. to say that this is sold for amusement purposes only. In committee,  
9. one of the...one of such licenses was presented to the committee and  
10. I can state to you that they look very, very authentic. They have  
11. right across the top of it Illinois Driver's License. Obviously,  
12. young people are buying these things to use for false I.D.  
13. most logically in the procurement of alcoholic beverages. As you  
14. know, most people don't look too closely at those identification  
15. anyway. In the middle of the brochure, you see a picture of what a  
16. driver's license looks like, it looks very official. The Secretary of  
17. State of the State of Illinois conferred with the Attorney General  
18. about what could be done to stop this process and was advised that  
19. Illinois was lacking in law to attack the problem. The Secretary of  
20. State having heard that from the Attorney General has asked that  
21. this type of legislation be introduced to prevent people from  
22. displaying this type of driver's license and also to prevent anyone  
23. from selling it in the State of Illinois. To display it, a Class  
24. C misdemeanor, to produce it and sell it a Class B misdemeanor  
25. and I would be happy to answer any questions.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Is there any discussion? Senator Berning.

28. SENATOR BERNING:

29. Thank you, Mr. President. This is obviously needed legislation.  
30. The question that arises in my mind, Senator, is apparently Section  
31. 6...on page 2 of the amendment, Section 6-301.1 false driver's  
32. license where it becomes a Class B misdemeanor to duplicate,  
33. manufacture or sell. Well, as you indicate with your handout, this is  
all being done in California. My question has to do with whether or

1. not there is any way we can impose a penalty here that will prevent  
2. say, advertising by an out-of-state firm and thereby make it a...  
3. a penalty or a violation which can be subject to a...a fine for  
4. instance.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

6. Senator Sangmeister.

7. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

8. This is not what this legislation attempts to do, Senator Berning  
9. and I can appreciate your...your concern in that area. The only  
10. thing we do have is that same second page of the amendment that  
11. you're talking about, we do have injunctive relief in there.  
12. Whether or not that injunctive relief is broad enough to allow the  
13. Secretary of State to enjoin the circulation of that kind of  
14. ...of literature, I really don't know. But the Secretary is  
15. satisfied that if this bill becomes law, that he will have sufficient  
16. powers to prevent the use and the sale of it in the State of  
17. Illinois.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

19. Is there any further discussion? Senator Merlo.

21. Question to the sponsor. George, does this also direct itself  
22. to the Identification Card Act, the...those that are not driver's

27. No, it does not. I have another bill which will be coming,

implement this law and also the maximum weight is equivalent

1. to the permit for other two axle vehicles with this change.  
2. It will also, on the two year exempt vehicle license plates,  
3. it will raise that from eight dollars to sixteen dollars. This
