30. It doesn't preclude them. What my bill does is regulate
31. the certain provisions requiring ownership in hospital corporations
32. from operating. This was in conformance with the medical society's
33. wishes.

6. Would I have your permission if necessary to offer additional
7. amendments on third reading to clarify language that I might

14. All right, gentlemen,, before we proceed, there has also
15. been a request for leave to take still photographs by a Miss

5. the following performed in such licensed hospital, medical lab-
6. oratory, or other licensed center furnished such pregnant women
7. with a true copy, and on page 2 by deleting line 12, inserting
8. in lieu thereof the following licensed hospital, medical labor-
9. atory or other such center and on page 2 by deleting lines 16
10. and 17 and inserting thereof the following abortion facilities
11. such as licensed hospitals, medical laboratories, and other such
12. centers has furnished the results of the pregnancy tests, too.

13. SENATOR LEMKE:

14. What this amendment does is delete the provision requiring
15. the pregnancy test be performed by independent licensed private
16. medical laboratories and instead require that this test be per-
17. formed by a licensed hospital laboratory or other like center
18. connected...unconnected with the ambulatory surgical treatment
19. center. This remedies the objection that only private medical
20. laboratories could administer the test. I ask for its adoption.

5. SENATOR NIMROD:

6. Yes, Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen of the Senate.

7. By agreement with the committee, I did agree to further amend
8. the bonding provision to provide for revenue bonds and also
9. reduce the amount of money that the bond would be allowed for
10. local schools to borrow from \$10,000 to \$5,000. So, any school

28. Senator Shaffer, are you ready? ...for that emergency-
29. type appropriation that everybody's concerned about? Middle of
30. page 8, on the order of Senate Bills, 2nd reading, Senate Bill
31. 946. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

32. SECRETARY:

33. Senate Bill 946.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations II

1. offers 1 amendment.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Buzbee.

4. SENATOR BUZBEE:

5. Thank you, Mr. President. I'm going to give a brief
6. explanation of this ...and defer to Senator Carroll. This
7. amendment reduces the supplemental appropriation request by
8. \$2,700,500. This reduction is made only in personal services,
9. and related accounts. It is based on a higher actual turnover
10. in hiring lag than was budgeted for by the department. The
11. department still has over \$4,000,000 in 2% transfer authority
12. for FY-79 in their GR lines. This change reduces the supplemental
13. request down to \$6,299,500. The fact of the matter is that
14. through gross mismanagement, once again in the department in
15. the Governor's Office, we see these supplemental requests coming
16. in for \$9,000,000 to pay off an AFSCME agreement is what it
17. amounts to, the Governor assigned, and then presents us with
18. the bill. Frankly, those of us on this side of the aisle are
19. getting a little tired of being pictured as the big spenders
20. in State Government, when it's the Governor on the other side
21. of the aisle who continuously signs the contracts, the agreements,
22. gives away the State Treasury to the various unions who work...
23. who are organized in State Government, and then presents the
24. legislature with the bill, and says "Here, pay it", and then
25. in the campaign year, of course, he goes all over the state,
26. telling what big spenders the Democrats are. And the fact of
27. the matter is that the Democrats haven't had a thing to do with
28. this request. We've been opposed to it. We've been opposed
29. to his continual signing the agreements with AFSCME, but he
30. continues to do it. This year, he's costing the State of Illinois
31. in FY-70, rather FY-80, he's costing the State of Illinois
32. \$54,000,000 additional taxpayer dollars in benefits to AFSCME
33. employees. Now I believe in fair & equitable compensation, and
I believe that those employees ought to have the right to bargain

1. collectively, and I believe that they ought to have the right
2. to get a fair and equitable raise, but for the Governor to
3. continuously take the unilateral action of signing the agreement
4. and then presenting us with the bill and say "Here, pay it",
5. as far as we're concerned, is going to stop. As a matter of
6. fact, in just a few minutes, we'll be getting to a bill that
7. Senator Regner and Senator Sommer and Senator Carroll and myself
8. are co-sponsors of, that will require legislative approval of
9. agreements of this type in the future. But in the meantime,
10. we have nothing we can do with the agreement that has already
11. been made, other than to refuse to pay part of the bill, and
12. that's why we have this amendment put on, and that's why we
13. intend to stick with it. Mr. Governor, if you want to sign the
14. agreements, then you come up with the money. But we're tired
15. of paying you out of your problems.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Further discussion. Senator Schaffer.

18. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

19. Mr. President, Senator Buzbee has, I think, come to the
20. crux of this particluar situation. The Department of Mental
21. Health did, in fact, enter into an agreement with AFSCME, an
22. agreement which the Governor did, in fact, agree to, and a
23. result of that agreement, after all the statistics have been
24. tossed around, is that they need the supplemental appropriation.
25. They need it in total to meet the payrolls for the remaining part
26. of this fiscal year. The simple fact is that this amendment
27. will provide for a reduction that in effect, will cause the
28. Department of Mental Health not to meet their payroll on the
29. last 2 weeks in the month of June, some 3,727 employees, at
30. various facilities around the State, who, you know, deserve to
31. be paid. Now, we've got some gamesmanship going on, Senator
32. Regner has a bill coming up that will address this problem
33. directly. We can play games, we can force a bouple of pay-

1. less weekends for some Mental Health employees. By the way,
2. I don't see anywhere on the list here that the Governor's
3. salary will be withheld for those two weeks or so that ours will.
4. Just the poor people who happen to work over in the Mental
5. Health Hospitals and empty the bedpans, that's who we're
6. talking about not paying. Not the bureaucrats, not the legis-
7. lators, not the Governor, just the poor people that make State
8. Government run in the Department of Mental Health. Now I share
9. Senator Buzbee's frustration about our inability to come to grips
10. with the AFSCME contract, but I don't think that this is the
11. vehicle. I would request this amendment be defeated and I would
12. request a roll call.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Further discussion. Senator Carroll.

15. SENATOR CARROLL:

16. Why, thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
17. Senate. I am amazed sometimes, Senator Schaffer, at your comments,
18. and I say so with a smile. Because, you are frustrated, I can
19. understand that. If I had to stand there and defend the department
20. on this bill, I too would be frustrated. The problem with this
21. department and with most of these supplementals is the improper
22. management of government by the 2nd floor and its agencies. The
23. improper management of the fiscal responsibility of this state. This
24. is a department. A department that had 3,000 employees turnover
25. this year. 2700 of those employees were then hired. 2700 new
26. employees by the Department of Mental Health and Develop-
27. mental Disability. If they had followed their own standards,
28. with the time it takes to bid a job, with the time it takes to
29. fill a vacancy, according to that department's fiscal officers,
30. it takes 45 days, normally, to fill a job. Those 45 days could
31. have produced \$4,050,000 in turnover and hiring lag that they
32. would not have needed in this supplemental. The supplemental
33. should have been for \$5,000,000 only, not for the \$9,000,000
in this request, had they followed normal hiring practices, as

1. well as good management decisions. They did not do that, and
2. their turnover and hiring figure was just over 1,300,000, instead
3. of \$4,050,000, so what this amendment does is just takes out
4. that additional \$2,700,500, that additional amount to cover what
5. should have been, under normal practice and good management,
6. a normal 45-day lag period in filling vacancies, and bringing
7. in a lower level that \$2,700,500 waste that we will not tolerate
8. from this or any other department, where they speed up their
9. hiring practices in order to spend money they know they do
10. not have. And just to repeat, within their own transferability,
11. there is over \$4,000,000 available to this department to meet
12. the payroll if they want to transfer funds from other lines.
13. All we are saying is be responsible. You knew in July how much
14. money you had to run your department, Mr. Director. Live
15. within that budget. Don't come back here, because you didn't
16. live within your budget when you had the means to do so. They
17. had the means, they decided not to avail themselves of it, so
18. that you could stand up here and say give them more, give them
19. more, give them more, forget about what you've done with the
20. budget. I think this amendment is a good one, and I think the
21. whole Senate should be on record in support of this.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Any further discussion. Senator Schaffer for the 2nd time.

24. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

25. Alright, I thought I'd discuss my level of frustration
26. with Senator Carroll. Yes, I have to admit that my frustration
27. with the 2nd floor is only exceeded by my frustration with the
28. liberations of this particular body. Again, I would point
29. out, without disagreeing with at least some of what has been
30. said on the other side by at least a couple of the members
31. on the other side, that the AFSCME agreement is the problem
32. here, and whether you like it or not, that is the problem.
33. I have to somewhat smile at my colleague on the other side who

1. says that they hire the people back too quickly, particularly
2. in view of the fact that not one but several legislative committees
3. consistently badger this department to get their ratio, staffing
4. ratios up in the various agencies, and every time they're late
5. on that, we launch an investigation and put a resolution in and
6. create a new committee to investigate them to get them to hire
7. people quicker, and then we turn around and blast them when they
8. respond to us. The bottom line is that there are 3,727 people
9. who aren't going to get paid for the last 2 weeks in June, with
10. this supplemental as it now stands. I'm for good management,
11. but I would suggest to you that why punish the people that
12. empty the bedpans and why don't we go after the bureaucrats
13. and the administrators who run the department and the executive
14. branch, let's take a shot at the BOB's budget. Why go after
15. the people who empty the bedpans. That doesn't seem fair to
16. me.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Buzbee, you may close the debate.

19. SENATOR BUZBEE:

20. Thank you, Mr. President. You know, it's really kind of
21. strange, the argument that we're getting from that side of the
22. aisle. When we talk about several of us consider ourselves to
23. be proponents of fiscal responsibility, including most of the
24. members of that side of the aisle, I know, and yet we keep
25. saying "...but let's just forgive this one more case of mis-
26. management just one more time." Well let me name some of the
27. other cases we've already forgiven this year, the Department
28. of Public Aid, the Department of Military and Naval, the Depart-
29. ment of Law Enforcement, the Department of Corrections, the
30. Department of Children and Family Services, the Department of
31. Public Health, we've come in with supplementals for each of those.
32. Now, we have seen something like a 7% growth in the personal
33. services line for the Department of Mental Health with the 20%

1. decline in population. Now Senator Schaffer, I beg to take
2. hombrage with you on the one statement that you made when you
3. said that we keep telling departments to get your staff/patient
4. ratio in line. As a matter of fact, what I had continuously
5. been saying to this department, "How can you possible merit
6. hiring more employees when your population is going down by
7. 20% this last year?" I made that statement in committee to
8. the director, I made the statement in public to the Governor,
9. I made the statement in the Governor's mansion to the Governor.
10. I still don't quite understand that line of reasoning. Now, we..
11. Senator Schaffer talked about 3,727 employees who are going to
12. go without a payday. That's the same old kinds of bureaucratic
13. bull malarkey that we see coming out of these departments time
14. after time after time. You put the...you try to put public
15. pressure on the legislature, and everybody points to the legis-
16. lature and says "Look, it's those folks that are denying you
17. your payday. It's those dirty old politicians that sit in
18. the legislative chambers on the 3rd floor that are denying you
19. your payday, because they refuse to give the money." Well, the
20. fact of the matter is there is over \$4,000,000 of transfer
21. capability within this department's line items right now.
22. They can transfer those dollars if the good Doctor Devito is
23. not competent enough to find the places to transfer those funds
24. from, I suggest that we fire the good Doctor Devito. We are
25. allowing almost \$7,000,000 in new money to pay for this AFSCME
26. agreement, and we're saying to the department that you have
27. \$4,000,000 in transfer capability-use that. We're not going
28. to give you everything you ask for, but we're going to make a
29. stance at some point. We gave in on Law Enforcement. I regret
30. that. I was cajoled by the Governor, and by members of the other
31. side of the aisle, and I finally gave in. I regret that sincerely.
32. I will not give in on this one. I suggest that we do take that
33. roll call. Let's let the citizens of the State of Illinois once

1. and for all see who does stand up for fiscal responsibility,
2. and I would suggest that we adopt this amendment.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Buzbee has moved the adoption of Amendment number
5. 1 to Senate Bill 946. A roll call has been requested, those
6. in favor of the amendment will vote Aye, those opposed will
7. vote Nay, the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have
8. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the
9. Ayes are 29, the Nays are 23, none voting present. The
10. amendment is adopted. Any further amendments?

11. SECRETARY:

14. Third reading.

5. Yes, if...if I may, Mr. President, I would like the
6. Journal to reflect according to our rules, the House sponsor of

15. Yes, also, Mr. President, House Bill 1175 was passed

17. and he has asked me to pick up the sponsorship and that
18. sponsorship was picked up in the Senate by Senator Nimrod and
19. I would like the Journal to reflect that fact.
20. PRESIDENT:
21. Heard the request. Is leave granted? Leave is granted.
22. So ordered. On the Order of Senate Bills, 3rd reading,
23. we will continue on a daily basis from where we left off the
24. day before. There are, however four...no, three emergency
25. supplemental appropriations which the sponsors have requested
26. that the Chair get to. If you'll take your pencil out, it's
27. Senate Bill 340, a supplemental to the Secretary of State,
28. Senate Bill 368, a supplemental to the Department of Public Health,
29. and 945 which is at the bottom of page 35, Senate Bill 945
30. for the Department of Corrections. So, with leave of the Body,
31. we'll go to those three bills and then we will begin at the top
32. of page 15 with Senate Bill 324. On the Order of Senate Bills,
33. 3rd reading, Senate Bill 340. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

1. SECRETARY:

2. Senate Bill 340.

3. (Secretary reads title of bill)

4. 3rd reading of the bill.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Buzbee.

7. SENATOR BUZBEE:

8. Mr. President, this is a supplemental appropriation to the
9. Secretary of State.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Buzbee.

12. SENATOR BUZBEE:

13. Ten thousand dollars of this is from GRF for two purposes,
14. refunds for fees collected and supplemental library grants.
15. The Secretary estimates that four hundred and eighty-five
16. thousand dollars will be needed to meet an anticipated deficiency
17. in the refund account, four hundred and seventy-five thousand
18. from the Road Fund and ten thousand from GRF. This is
19. pass through money to citizens of Illinois for the return of
20. fees collected in error is all that is. It's a little bit
21. different. The delivery of plates was slower this year with
22. the delay caused by the shift from annual plates to multi-year
23. plates. As the display deadline approached, many applicants
24. not yet receiving their plates went ahead and purchased a set
25. at banks and currency exchanges resulting in duplicate registrations.
26. Consequently, these applicants are seeking refunds for one
27. set of the plates. Applicants confused about the actual fee due
28. for the multi-year plates sent in the old annual fee. In such
29. instances the application was processed as the short option,
30. thereby necessitating a partial refund. The Secretary of State is
31. seeking an additional three million all Federal funds to be
32. dispersed in FY'79 for library service grants. The original FY'79
33. appropriation of three million has already been expended or

1. obligated as of February the 28th, '79. These grants are
2. issued pursuant to the Federal Library Service and Construction
3. Act and in the past have not been appropriated by the General
4. Assembly. FY'79 is the first year that these funds were
5. appropriated. The Secretary of State states that
6. miscommunication between the library and budget office led
7. to the wrong amount being used in the FY '79 appropriation
8. bill and I would ask for a favorable roll call.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Any discussion? Senator Knuppel.

11. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

12. Well, this isn't to appropriate more money, is it?
13. I'm against deficiency appropriations.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Further discussion? Senator Schaffer.

16. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

17. Mr. President, in the last campaign, Secretary of State
18. Dixon went all over this State promising to spend less money
19. and attacking the Republicans as the big spenders and we, on this
20. side of the aisle, are tired of it, we're tired
21. of this kind of chicanery. All for the last year we've
22. heard about these raids on the Motor Fuel Funds. We haven't
23. got money to build the little bridge so the bus can go across
24. so the school kids can get to school on time. But we're going to
25. get more money for the bureaucrats from the Road Fund. I think
26. the time has come for this Senate to decide who is fiscally
27. responsible and who is not. I urge the defeat of this amendment.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. The question is shall Senate Bill 34...Senator Buzbee.

30. SENATOR BUZBEE:

31. Mr. President, I wanted to thank you for the
32. propituous time that you chose to call this bill. It's greatly
33. appreciated.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. It was an...it was an attempt on the part of the Chair to
3. suggest you might curtail some of your loquaciousness.

4. Senator Buzbee may close, briefly.

5. SENATOR BUZBEE:

6. Thank...thank you, Mr. President. If...if one can't be
7. loquacious here, where can one be loquacious?

8. PRESIDENT:

9. I've got a place for you.

10. SENATOR BUZBEE:

11. Kings...I would just point out to Senator Schaffer that
12. we have a lot of little citizens out there waiting for their
13. refunds on their license plate applications. And if we don't
14. pass this bill, those little citizens are not going to get their
15. refunds and I think we ought to pass it.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. The question is shall Senate Bill 340 pass. Those in
18. favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting
19. is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?
20. Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 44, the Nays
21. are 7, 2 Voting Present. Senate Bill 340 having received a
22. constitutional majority is declared passed. If you'll turn
23. now, Gentlemen, to the top of page 17 on the Order of Senate Bills,
24. 3rd reading, Senate Bill 368. Read the bill...Senator Berning,
25. for what purpose do you arise?

26. SENATOR BERNING:

27. For a question of the Chair.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Yes, Sir.

30. SENATOR BERNING:

31. When will we consider those bills called on 3rd reading
32. yesterday that were necessarily called back for 2nd reading?

33. PRESIDENT:

1. We will...we will attempt to make the whole circuit and
2. get back to them just as quickly as possible.

3. SENATOR BERNING:

4. They do not come up in advance of 3rd reading
5. considerations today?

6. PRESIDENT:

7. No, Sir. On the Order of Senate Bills, 3rd reading,
8. Senate Bill 368. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

9. SECRETARY:

10. Senate Bill 368.

11. (Secretary reads title of bill)

12. 3rd reading of the bill.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Daley.

15. SENATOR DALEY:

16. Mr. President and fellow Senators. This bill is for the
17. health services for premature and high mortality risk infants and
18. their mothers. It's a 3.6 million dollar appropriation. The
19. committee worked closely with the Department of Public Health.
20. The unrealistic approach they've had for prenatal care in Illinois
21. ...we've had a bipartisan support in the committee and I ask for
22. the full support of...of this supplemental appropriation.
23. It's greatly needed in Illinois.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Is there any discussion? If not, the question is shall Senate
26. Bill 368 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed
27. will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
28. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question the
29. Ayes are 52, the Nays are none, none Voting Present. Senate Bill
30. 368 having received a constitutional majority is declared passed.
31. If you will turn now to page 35 on the Calendar, on the Order of
32. Senate Bills, 3rd reading, Senate Bill 945. Read the bill, Mr.
33. Secretary.

1. SECRETARY:

2. Senate Bill 945.

3. (Secretary reads title of bill)

4. 3rd reading of the bill.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Graham.

7. SENATOR GRAHAM:

8. Mr. President and members of the Senate. It's with a great
9. amount of timidity that I present this bill. Supplemental
10. appropriation request to help take care of some of the expenses
11. of the Stateville lock-up and shake-down. There is a six
12. hundred and eighty-three four was reduced and the...it's now
13. standing at four six two four and I ask for your...

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Is there any discussion? If not, the question is shall
16. Senate Bill 945 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those
17. opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted
18. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On
19. that question the Ayes are 51, the Nays are none, none Voting
20. Present. Senate Bill 945 having received a constitutional
21. majority is declared passed. All right. Gentlemen, if you'll
22. now turn to page 15, we will begin where we left off yesterday,
23. top of page 15, first bill to be called will be Senate Bill...
24. On the Order of Senate Bills, 3rd reading, Senate Bill 324.
25. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

26. SECRETARY:

27. Senate Bill 324.

28. (Secretary reads title of bill)

29. 3rd reading of the bill.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

31. Senator Nedza.

32. SENATOR NEDZA:

33. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
Senate Bill 324, what it does is take out of...misdemeanor out of the

1. Class C status and making it a Class A status for anyone who
2. knowingly or without authority to enter after notice any
3. portion of an airport which is being used for a landing or taking off
4. aircraft and has been designated by the Airport
5. Authority as restricted or...restricted landing area.
6. If there are no questions on the bill, I would move for a
7. favorable vote.
8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
9. Is there discussion? Senator D'Arco.
10. SENATOR D'ARCO:
11. Why don't you make it a Class X felony like all our other
12. bills 'cause then we would be consistent, you know. What
13. is...a trespasser, are we talking about someone who trespasses
14. on airport property without, you know, is that what we're talking
15. about?
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
17. Senator Nedza.
18. SENATOR NEDZA:
19. That is correct, Senator, and I don't think we should go into
20. the severity of a Class X when we're just trespassing on land.
21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
22. Senator D'Arco.
23. SENATOR D'ARCO:
24. This makes it a Class A misdemeanor for people who are caught
25. trespassing on airport property, is that correct?
26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
27. Senator Nedza.
28. SENATOR NEDZA:
29. That is correct, Senator.
30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
31. Senator D'Arco.
32. SENATOR D'ARCO:
33. Well, I can't support it, I really can't.
PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

1. Senator Nimrod.

2. SENATOR NIMROD:

3. A question of the sponsor.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

5. Indicates he will respond.

6. SENATOR NIMROD:

7. Senator Nedza, I had a call from FAA this morning, are you

8. sure they're in support of this bill?

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

10. Senator Nedza.

11. SENATOR NEDZA:

12. The last notification I had from them, yes, Senator,

13. they were, as a matter of fact, they were going to be down here,

14. but they didn't think that there was going to be any

15. adversity to it so they felt that they would stay in Chicago.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

17. Senator Nimrod.

18. SENATOR NIMROD:

19. Yeah, I...I, you know, I don't know if you would like to

20. take this out of the record or not, is this your first bill?

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

22. Senator Nedza you may respond.

23. SENATOR NEDZA:

24. Yes, it is, Senator.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

26. Is there further...Senator Chew.

27. SENATOR CHEW:

28. Listen, as Chairman of Transportation, I've been in contact

29. with the transportation experts in Washington as of this morning

30. and we were in phone contact, and they asked me to ask this

31. Senate please do not pass the bill because it would encroach

32. on not only your civil rights, but your constitutional rights.

33. And...and I've got...I've got the Secretary of Transportation out

1. there in the hall waiting to see if anybody votes for this bill,
2. then all the trains and planes are going to stop running.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

4. Is there further discussion? Senator Nedza may close, if
5. you wish.

6. SENATOR NEDZA:

7. All I would request of you, Ladies and Gentlemen, is a
8. favorable vote.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

10. The question is shall Senate Bill 324 pass. Those in
11. favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The voting is open.
12. Have all those voted who wish? Have all those voted who wish?
13. Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 51, the Nays
14. are 3. Senate Bill 324 having received its constitutional
15. majority is declared passed. Senate Bill 325, Senator Nedza.
16. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

17. SECRETARY:

18. Senate Bill 325.

19. (Secretary reads title of bill)

20. 3rd reading of the bill.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

22. Senator...Senator Vadalabene, for what purpose do you arise?

23. SENATOR VADALABENE:

24. Yes, there was button problems again on that last bill. Had I
25. known that people were going to play a piano with it,
26. I would have left it at green. However, during the first
27. course of the piano lesson, it was red, green, red, green, red,
28. green. And when you took the record, it was red. I want the
29. record to show that I would have voted Aye.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

31. It will be recorded forever electronically. Same request...
32. tell the Secretary...if the members would tell the Secretary,
33. he'll arrange that. Senator Lemke, for what purpose do you arise?

1. SENATOR LEMKE:

2. Senator Nedza, is this Senator Nega's first bill?

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

4. No, he hasn't described the bill yet. Senator Nedza, you
5. may proceed. We've got to get moving.

6. SENATOR NEDZA:

7. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen, I am the
8. hyphenated sponsor of this bill but in reality, Senator Nega,
9. who is not with us because of a recent heart attack, it seems
10. rather odd that at the time that he was proposing this bill,
11. and this bill is an Act that requires all medical personnel,
12. nurses, paramedics, firemen, and policemen and including the
13. voluntary and auxiliary firemen, to be certified in cardio-
14. pulmonary resuscitation, which is a properly trained and certified
15. person to provide emergency treatment in case of heart attacks.
16. It's a sort of a sentimental thing because of the fact that
17. Senator Nega is not with us, he's still recuperating from the
18. heart attack that he received after being down in the Senate a
19. short time, but I would also ask a favorable vote on this.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

21. Is there discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill
22. 325 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The
23. voting is open...voted who wish? Have all those voted who wish?
24. Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 47, the Nays
25. are none, 1 Voting Present. Senate Bill 325 having received
26. a constitutional majority is declared passed. Senator Buzbee, for
27. what purpose do you arise?

28. SENATOR BUZBEE:

29. Mr. President, I apologize for raising...for rising at this
30. late date, but I would like to be shown as a cosponsor of Senate
31. Bill 325, if the sponsor...

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

33. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Senate Bill 326, Senator
Lemke. Senate Bill 327, Senator Lemke. Senate Bill 328, Senator

1. Bowers. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.
2. SECRETARY:
3. Senate Bill 328.
4. (Secretary reads title of bill)
5. 3rd reading of the bill.
6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
7. Senator Bowers.
8. SENATOR BOWERS:
9. Thank you, Mr. President. This bill is intended to bring
10. the law into conformity what most of us thought it was up until
11. some recent court decisions and that is that the trustee or
12. fiduciary is not responsible from his individual assets for
13. any judgment that takes place merely because he happens to be
14. a trustee or fiduciary. What it does not do is cover
15. any area where there is a contract or where there is negligence
16. or any tort area at all. I know of no opposition to the bill.
17. It passed out of committee unanimously. Unless there are questions,
18. I would ask for a favorable roll call.
19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
20. Is there discussion? Question is shall Senate Bill 328 pass.
21. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The voting is open.
22. Have all those voted who wish? Have all those voted who wish?
23. Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 55, the Nays are
24. none. Senate Bill 328 having received a constitutional
25. majority is declared passed. Senate Bill 330, Senator Vadalabene.
26. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.
27. SECRETARY:
28. Senate Bill 330.
29. (Secretary reads title of bill)
30. 3rd reading of the bill.
31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
32. Senator Vadalabene.
33. SENATOR VADALABENE:
Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate.

1. Senate Bill 330 provides that the township highway commissioner
2. as an elected official, is a separate entity of local government.
3. Only the highway commissioner has the authority and the
4. responsibility to maintain the township roads. And naturally
5. it follows that the highway commissioner should prepare and
6. adopt the budget that is to govern the discharge of his
7. statutory duties. Secondly, the trustees have no knowledge of
8. the work necessary to discharge the highway commissioner's
9. responsibility of maintaining the roads under his jurisdiction.
10. At best, whatever knowledge they would have, has to come from
11. the highway commissioner himself or would be knowledge shared
12. by the community at large. Therefore, to place the trustees
13. in control of the highway commissioner's budget unrealistically
14. places this authority on a group who does not have the knowledge,
15. experience, or responsibility of the highway commissioner.
16. And finally, compounding the problem is the fact that this
17. places trustees in a position of having complete control
18. over the highway commissioner in the manner in which he
19. discharges his responsibility. The trustees can literally
20. dictate what the highway commissioner does and therefore, places
21. the highway commissioner in a position that is subject to
22. their every whim. Experience has shown that politics enters
23. into the relationship because of this unique situation
24. and that trustees will not approve budgetary items simply because
25. they hope to embarrass the highway commissioner for any number of
26. possible reasons. The law should place the authority to adopt
27. the budget where the responsibility lies in the highway commissioner.
28. He, in turn, is subject to the vote of the electorate, the
29. ultimate authority, a group not so readily influenced or
30. motivated by political consideration and I would appreciate a
31. favorable vote.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

33. Senator Moore.

1. SENATOR MOORE:

2. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate.

3. I am very well familiar with this bill inasmuch as that I was
4. the sponsor of the bill about twelve years ago when I was
5. Chairman of Counties and Townships in the House that took
6. the authority away from the highway commissioner and vested
7. it in the Board of Auditors. At that time, there were some
8. abuses that came to the committee's attention where a highway
9. commissioner would go further off than he should. It now appears
10. that there are more abuses by the Board of Trustees in our
11. townships who have control over the...the appropriation and budget
12. making aspect of the road district commissioner. There are more
13. abuses today than there were twelve years ago when we changed
14. it. I am willing to support Senator Vadalabene in the passage
15. of Senate Bill 330. It has come to my attention that there,
16. as I said before, there are more abuses now than what there
17. were when we changed it twelve years ago, so I would urge support
18. of Senate Bill 330.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

20. Senator McMillan.

21. SENATOR McMILLAN:

22. Mr. President, members of the Senate. I would rise
23. in opposition to Senate Bill 330. Admittedly being a township
24. road commissioner is not a glamorous or high-paying or
25. rewarding position to run for and be elected to. On the other
26. hand, the abuses that occur when a township road commissioner
27. is not accountable to somebody else for his funding, are abuses
28. to the people who reside in that township. If we are to take
29. away the right of the township auditors to approve the budgets and
30. so forth of the township road commissioners we leave somebody
31. who is a veritable czar in his ability to decide what he wants
32. to do for his friends or not do for those who he doesn't happen to
33. like in his particular township. The abuses are bad enough against

1. residence of the township as it is. I can remember one
2. particular instance last winter when the snow was a bad
3. problem, when there was one particular resident who the
4. township road commissioner in the township next to me didn't
5. really want to...to clean out. The baby had to be taken out on
6. a sled across several miles in order to...to be somewhere
7. where he could be protected. And the township road
8. commissioner very arrogantly went all over the township saying
9. by God, he wasn't about to plow that couple out. Were it not
10. for the authority that the auditors have to have some veto
11. power over his budget, he would never be held accountable
12. and he is being held accountable after the fact. So, I understand
13. that there is possibility for abuses when the auditors do have
14. some control over the road commissioner. If we change it back
15. then, the road commissioner is really accountable to nobody
16. and those are jobs which...which admittedly you just don't get
17. people jumping at a chance to serve in. So, even though I know
18. this bill is well intended, I think so that there will not be
19. abuses against people who are residents of townships, I would
20. call for a No vote.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

22. Senator Wooten.

23. SENATOR WOOTEN:

24. Thank you, Mr. President. I, too, rise in opposition to
25. Senate Bill 330. I would simply ask my colleagues to remember
26. that one of the fundamental principles of all legislative
27. bodies is that of collective judgment and we have always placed
28. fiscal responsibility, final fiscal responsibility in a legislative
29. body. We don't let the sheriff arbitrarily set his budget.
30. The county board does it. We don't let the Governor arbitrarily
31. decide how much money the State spends. The Legislature does it.
32. We should not let the road commissioners decide on their own
33. what their budget would be. They should be subject to the collective

1. judgment of the town board and for...for that very cogent
2. reason, there may be instances where whole town boards have
3. gone awry but it is less likely that you will make serious
4. mistakes when you have collective judgment than when you leave
5. something this important to a single person. So, I urge the
6. defeat of 330.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

8. Is there...Senator Weaver.

9. SENATOR WEAVER:

10. Thank you, Mr. President. Well, I rise in support of
11. Senate Bill 330. Those of us who live in rural communities
12. really know better than most how dependent we are for
13. good maintenance of roads, whether or not the township road commissioners
14. is doing the job and if he doesn't do the job and he isn't
15. cooperating with the total populous, we just get somebody else
16. to run against him and it's not that difficult. He's elected
17. every four years and in too many cases, the Board of
18. Auditors have hamstringed the road commissioner and made him
19. look bad, even though they wouldn't supply...not supplying him
20. with sufficient funds to do the job in the township so I think
21. we've fared pretty well in years past by letting the road
22. commissioner develop his budget. If he gets out of line,
23. we can vote him out of office.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

25. Senator Schaffer.

26. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

27. Well, I'd like to briefly echo Senator Weaver's sentiments.
28. We had a situation in my area where a particular, well, a series
29. of town boards had been in effect, keeping a road commissioner
30. from having any funds and along comes the blizzard of '79
31. which my friends from Chicago are so accutely aware of and in
32. one township, lo and behold, who do we have petitioning
33. the road commissioner to do more? The very people who didn't
give him the money in the first place. This is an elected official.

1. He's accountable at election time just like you and I are. By
2. the way, this is a separate road district which is separate,
3. of course, from the township levies. He takes the heat, the
4. people can pitch him out. They know whether the road
5. is plowed, they know whether the road is patched. He ought to
6. have the authority to go with the responsibility. I think this
7. is a good bill and I intend to support it.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

9. Senator Knuppel.

10. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

11. Well, I think Senator Schaffer and Senator Weaver said it.
12. Where the responsibility lies is the person who should have
13. charge of this and the public are full-well and aware of
14. whether he does his job. Certainly, the...the road
15. commissioner of a township is one of the most automatic people
16. with one of the most...some of the greatest power of any
17. individual, but he is a person who has to put it on the line
18. and if he doesn't deliver, why, then, he's the person
19. that's voted out of office and I say this is good legislation.
20. I have several township where there's ongoing fights between
21. the Board of Town Auditors and other township officials
22. about signing orders, et cetera. And I think it should go
23. back to the highway commissioner. He should be the responsible
24. party and it's good legislation.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

26. Senator Nimrod.

27. SENATOR NIMROD:

28. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
29. It seems to me that if we want to have good township government,
30. if we want to have a government that the people can look to with
31. some respect, they would have to look at one authority. I realize
32. and I understand the problems that come in with some of the different
33. townships, we have different personalities. But I think what we need

1. to say is this township government is the closest government to
2. the people. I think we ought to maintain its strength and
3. it ought to be in one integrity and I don't think we should
4. pass a bill that kind of destroys the...where they look to
5. for one individual. We'll someday get highway commissioners
6. going off in their own direction, town boards going off
7. in their own direction, assessors going off in their own
8. direction. We don't do that in our villages, we don't do that
9. in any other government and as much as I hate to see it, I think
10. the highway commissioner is part of township government and
11. he ought to be accountable to the board as well as the people.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

13. Is there further discussion? Senator Vadalabene may
14. close.

15. SENATOR VADALABENE:

16. Yes, I just wish a favorable vote on this legislation and
17. in the final analysis, it's always the trustees who will...
18. who approves a highway commissioner's bills. So, there is...
19. there is someplace there where they have some voice and I would
20. appreciate a favorable vote.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

22. The question is shall Senate Bill 330 pass. Those in
23. favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The voting is open. Have
24. all those voted who wish? Have all those voted who wish?
25. Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 32, the Nays
26. are 20, 1 Voting Present. Senate Bill 330 having received
27. a constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate...Senator
28. D'Arco, for what purpose do you arise?

29. SENATOR D'ARCO:

30. I move to reconsider the vote by which Senate Bill...

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

32. Heard the motion. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye.
33. Senator Vadalabene moves to...that lie upon the Table.

1. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye. The Ayes have it.
2. Senate Bill 331, Senator Walsh. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.
3. SECRETARY:
4. Senate Bill 331.
5. (Secretary reads title of bill)
6. 3rd reading of the bill.
7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
8. Senator Walsh.
9. SENATOR WALSH:
10. Mr. President and members of the Senate. Senate Bill 331
11. addresses itself to a question that we have debated
12. in the Senate over the past few weeks, that is the...the legal
13. drinking age for the beverages beer and wine. Senate Bill
14. 331 would provide that municipalities and counties may increase
15. the minimum age requirement for the sale, gift or delivery
16. of beer and wine to age twenty-one by adoption of an ordinance.
17. In effect, it extends the same authority to non-home rule units
18. that home rule units have under the present law. I believe
19. it is a good compromise. It...it may not satisfy those of us
20. who wish that the drinking age be increased to twenty-one, but it
21. does, at least, address itself to the problem and it would
22. ...it would answer the...the question and the problem that's raised
23. when home rule units such as the City of Chicago increased
24. the drinking age to twenty-one and then all those who
25. are desirous of drinking beer and...beer and wine the age is
26. nineteen and twenty, then go to suburbs and the surrounding
27. area. The same thing would be true of any other home rule
28. unit where non-home rule units in the vicinity must continue
29. to...to serve people ages nineteen and twenty. I believe it's
30. a good bill and I would urge your favorable consideration.
31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
32. Is there discussion? Senator Rock.
33. SENATOR ROCK:

1. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
2. Senate. I rise in opposition to Senate Bill 331 for obvious
3. reasons. I have opposed the...the return of the legal drinking
4. age to twenty-one but more importantly than that, I think,
5. this bill represents, I think, a dramatic change in philosophy.
6. Senator Ozinga has testified and has spoken at great length
7. and with great eloquence concerning the chaotic condition if
8. all the municipalities and counties did a different thing and so
9. his bill would apply State-wide. The other part of this is that
10. we are here by virtue of Senate Bill 331, granting
11. communities and counties who have had the opportunity
12. in many instances, DuPage, for instance, had the opportunity,
13. to opt to become home rule units and they chose not to.
14. Now, they want the best of both worlds, they would like
15. to have home rule powers and not have any of the home rule
16. obligation. I think it's a bad philosophical idea and I would
17. urge a No vote.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

19. Is there further discussion? Senator Nimrod.

20. SENATOR NIMROD:

21. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
22. Senate. Senator Walsh, the problem with the bill here seems
23. to me that we are kind of diluting the efforts of Senate Bill
24. 2 and those of us that want to vote for that bill, find ourselves
25. in a dilemma, I would think. I would hope that you might be able
26. to hold your bill until we have a chance to vote for Senate Bill 2
27. and if it doesn't go this might be an alternative. But, in the
28. essence, I think that we ought to give Senate Bill 2 a chance
29. since it seems to do the total job that most of us are looking for.
30. I would ask that you might give us a chance to do that before
31. we have to vote on your bill.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

33. Senator Walsh.

1. SENATOR WALSH:

2. Mr. President, in response to the question, I have discussed
3. this subject matter with Senator Ozinga and others and I will
4. not move my bill in the House in...if Senator Ozinga's bill
5. passes. I prefer Senator Ozinga's bill, personally. We have
6. voted on it once, however, and it is temporarily stalled and I'm
7. afraid that the vote on Postponed Consideration will be the last
8. order of business so that we will have voted on all 3rd reading
9. bills before...before we vote on bills that are on the Order of
10. Postponed Consideration. So, I have indicated to Senator Ozinga
11. that this is...is an alternative and albeit in my mind,
12. an unsatisfactory alternative, but better than nothing alternative
13. to his bill. So, that is the position I take and I would hope that
14. I would have your support as well as his on this bill because
15. it is certainly better than nothing.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

17. Is there further discussion? Senator Buzbee. Senator Walsh
18. may close. Just a moment. Senator Ozinga. I'm sorry.

19. SENATOR OZINGA:

20. Maybe we could settle all of this dilemma right now by
21. calling Senate Bill 2 and suspend our rules and call it right now.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

23. Senator Walsh may close.

24. SENATOR WALSH:

25. I would be happy to take this bill out of the record and vote
26. on Senate Bill 2, first. If that passes I would be happy to hold this
27. bill.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

29. The question is...the question is...Senator Ozinga, for what
30. purpose do you arise?

31. SENATOR OZINGA:

32. I'd like to make a motion to suspend the rules, at the present
33. time, and...for the purpose of going to Postponed Consideration and
calling Senate Bill 2 only.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
2. Senator Rock.
3. SENATOR ROCK:
4. Well, I would point out to the Senator there are some
5. seven hundred bills on the Calendar, many of which have not had
6. the opportunity yet to be addressed and it just seems to me only
7. fundamentally fair that everybody have their opportunity.
8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
9. Senator Knuppel.
10. SENATOR KNUPPEL:
11. Look, we're going to horse around with this thing a lot more.
12. Let's either vote it up or vote it down. It's been there, it was
13. one of the first bills introduced. I can't see where Bill number
14. 1347 is entitled to the same consideration as Senate Bill 2.
15. That bill has been there and what happened here one day we
16. were short of bodies. Somebody had been here and I, myself,
17. thought I had voted on my switch and some kid had been here over
18. the weekend and the switch was locked. It was the first
19. bill voted on and I didn't get recorded. Now, fair is fair and I think
20. that you know, either the bill has got support or it doesn't
21. have support. Let's get it the hell out of here. But don't
22. monkey around with it and play games.
23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
24. Senator Ozinga.
25. SENATOR OZINGA:
26. I will persist in my motion to call the bill. Suspension of the
27. rules for the purpose of going to Postponed Consideration
28. at this time and ask for a roll call.
29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
30. Do we have unanimous consent of the Body? ...having
31. unanimous consent, it does require thirty votes to suspend the
32. rules for the immediate consideration of...just a moment.
33. Senator Ozinga.
SENATOR OZINGA:

1. I'll ask for a roll call on that motion.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

3. All right. The question is shall...shall the Senate go out

4. of the order of business to the Order of Postponed Consideration

5. to consider Senate Bill 2? Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed

6. Nay. The voting is open. Have all those voted who wish? Take

7. the record. On that question the Ayes are 38, the Nays are

8. 13. Senate Bill 2...we now revert to the Order of Postponed

9. Consideration for Senate Bill 2. The bill has been read. The

10. Chair recognizes Senator Ozinga.

11. SENATOR OZINGA:

12. Mr. President, members of the Senate. I think we've argued

13. this bill. I've lobbied with you all. I've pleaded with you all.

14. I think this bill is morally a bill that should be passed and if

15. after having considered all of the arguments and talked personally

16. with you I should, at this time, receive thirty-nine votes.

17. I respect the wishes of the President of the Senate when he

18. says he wants to get bills off of the Calendar and as such,

19. I think that we can go ahead and call the roll. And I would

20. plead for an affirmative vote.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

22. Senator Egan.

23. SENATOR EGAN:

24. Now, I'm not kidding, Senator, and I don't mean to demean

25. your position in this bill or your sincerity but what does it do?

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

27. Senator Ozinga.

28. SENATOR OZINGA:

29. This bill raises the drinking age back to twenty-one years

30. old. It does not preempt home rule powers and that is practically

31. all that it does, but it is State-wide and uniform.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

33. Is there further discussion? Question is shall Senate Bill

2 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The voting

1. is open. Have all those voted who wish? Take the record. On that
2. question the Ayes are 38, the Nays are 13, 3 Voting Present.
3. Senate Bill 2 having received a constitutional majority is
4. declared passed. Senator Nimrod, for what purpose...

5. SENATOR NIMROD:

6. Move to reconsider the vote.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

8. Motion is to reconsider and Senator Rhoads moves that that
9. lie upon the Table. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye.
10. Those opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. The motion is Tabled.

11. Senator Walsh, do you wish to Table your bill?

12. SENATOR WALSH:

13. That's my legislative program, Mr. President. Just pass
14. the bill, if you will.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

16. He means skip it. Take it out of the record. Senate Bill
17. 337, Senator Regner. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

18. SECRETARY:

19. Senate Bill 337.

20. (Secretary reads title of bill)

21. 3rd reading of the bill.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

23. Senator Regner.

24. SENATOR REGNER:

25. Mr. President and members of the Senate. This bill
26. has been mentioned a couple of times in debate already today.
27. But what it does, it specifies that any agreement negotiated
28. by the Department of Personnel affecting pay of State employees
29. on or after July 1st, 1979, must first be approved by a majority
30. of the General Assembly before it becomes effective. The approval
31. would be by joint resolution. What this bill would do to make
32. the Department of Personnel's Employee Relations Division,
33. accountable to the Legislature. Currently, it's difficult to
obtain necessary information from that Department...Division within

1. the Department concerning collective bargaining agreements.
2. It's been felt very strongly by the members of the Appropriation
3. Committee and two years ago by the entire Senate that the
4. General Assembly should be made...should have the opportunity
5. to participate and approve any negotiated agreements. After all,
6. we are responsible for appropriating the monies and I certainly
7. don't think that we should be nothing more than a rubber stamp
8. for anyone. In other words, approving what has already been
9. approved by a department within the Executive Branch.
10. And I would urge a favorable roll call on Senate Bill 337.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

12. Senator Collins.

13. SENATOR COLLINS:

14. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I rise in opposition to
15. this bill 'cause I really feel that this is an attempt
16. to undermine collective bargaining. I'm clearly aware of the
17. problem and I feel that the Legislature, in fact, should have
18. something to say about negotiating contracts through the regular
19. appropriation process and that contract should be negotiated
20. time enough for those contract negotiations and expenditures to
21. be included in the Department's budget. But I really feel that
22. this is an attempt to undermine the whole collective process and
23. therefore, I'm opposed to the bill.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

25. Senator Buzbee.

26. SENATOR BUZBEE:

27. Thank you, Mr. President.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

29. Proceed.

30. SENATOR BUZBEE:

31. Thank you. As I stated earlier in an argument
32. on a previous bill, the time has come for the Legislature to have
33. final approval on agreements that may be negotiated between the
Chief Executive and Labor unions. Now, the fact of the matter is

1. Senator Collins just made an argument which would be a good one
2. except that's in a perfect world, Senator Collins, and this
3. world that we operate in is far from perfect. The Chief Executive
4. starting with Governor Walker and continuing under Governor
5. Thompson, has completely ignored, has never, ever negotiated a
6. contract in time for our consideration of that contract
7. in the appropriations process. In fact, they do just exactly
8. the opposite. They negotiate the contract and put it out on
9. the board after we've already been through the appropriations
10. process so...deliberately, so we cannot have any input into it.
11. I favor collective bargaining for public employees. I have
12. historically. I have from the time that I first starting running
13. for public office and have continued to do so. I also believe
14. that public employees should have the right to get decent
15. income raises as every other person who works for a wage should.
16. However, we are constitutionally charged with the responsibility
17. of appropriating the State's tax dollars. We are constitutionally
18. charged with the responsibility of being able to say to the
19. taxpayers, we have spent your money in what we believe is a fair
20. and equitable manner. We can never do that as long as
21. we do not have control of the process of...of formalizing
22. contracts that may be negotiated between the Chief Executive
23. and the unions. This will give us some slight hammer on what
24. ultimately goes into contracts. It will give us some slight hammer
25. on perhaps being able to eventually achieve more control over
26. the appropriations process, the amount of control we were supposed
27. to have, as spelled forth in the...in the Constitution, as
28. set forth in the Constitution but which, in fact, has been
29. eroded by the Chief Executive's continual negotiating contracts
30. without our input. I think this is a good bill. I think it's
31. high time and I would solicit your favorable support.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

33. Senator Wooten.

SENATOR WOOTEN:

1. Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Collins sees this bill as
2. an attempt to undermine collective bargaining. I see it as
3. an attempt to undermine the General Assembly. I asked my
4. colleagues, if you really want to get involved in this kind
5. of detail, it seems to me the rational approach...can we have
6. some order, Mr. President.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

8. We have very little. Will the Sergeant-at-Arms
9. clear the aisles. Will members be in their seats.

10. SENATOR WOOTEN:

11. Thank you, Mr. President. It seems to me the rational
12. approach is for us to tell each department how much money they may
13. have and then let them account for their stewardship in the
14. appropriations process. And if we can't stick by that, then something
15. is very much wrong with us. But to get us involved in approving
16. or disapproving of collective bargaining agreements, we might
17. as well be deciding how many typewriters they buy and what brand.
18. I just don't think we ought to get into it and if we do, I promise
19. you it will be something you will regret the rest of the time
20. you spend in this Chamber. We have the means by telling the
21. departments this much money you may have and no more and then
22. stick by that. And then leave it to the department to account
23. for their stewardship. I just don't think we should get involved
24. in even this degree of detail because once you go down that path,
25. it just gets to be like encountering the tar baby. We shouldn't
26. do it.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

28. Senator Davidson.

29. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

30. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I rise in opposition
31. to this bill for two reasons. First and foremost to save ourselves
32. from ourselves. How many of you have been involved in collective
33. bargaining on either side of the table? Good. Then you're all
going to vote No on this bill because there's no way in God's good

1. Earth that we, fifty-nine votes, collectively can make a
2. fair and just decision on a collective bargaining bill that
3. we neither one sat on the side of the table to do the negotiations.
4. If you want to deal with this, deal with it through the
5. appropriating process. They've got so much money for so
6. many jobs, then they know they have to correct their head
7. count within that category. Let's not put forth a facade
8. to the people that we're going to control collective bargaining by
9. this process that we have to approve the contract after the
10. fact when we didn't sit in on the negotiations.

11. I urge you to vote No.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

13. Senator Savickas. Senator Netsch.

14. SENATOR NETSCH:

15. I think it's ironic, Mr. President, that we, in the
16. General Assembly, are ready to authorize and pass legislation
17. with respect to the end result of the collective bargaining
18. process before we have ever authorized collective bargaining
19. by public employees. It seems to me it really is the tail wagging
20. the dog. Quite apart from the fact that I think that it would
21. be a disaster for the General Assembly as well as a confusion
22. of the appropriate roles. There are other ways in which we can
23. control the Executive and perhaps we ought to start thinking about
24. them.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

26. Will the Sergeant-at-Arms clear the aisle. Proceed.

27. Is there further discussion? Senator Bruce.

28. SENATOR BRUCE:

29. Well, I just have been reading Senate Bill 337. I wonder
30. if the sponsor would yield to a few questions. I...I hope...

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

32. Indicates he will.

33. SENATOR BRUCE:

I hope she catches him. Just wonder in the first line it

1. says every agreement negotiated affecting pay shall not take
2. effect, does that mean every agreement?

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

4. Senator Regner.

5. SENATOR REGNER:

6. That's what it says. It says every agreement negotiated
7. by the Director of Personnel.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

9. Senator Bruce..

10. SENATOR BRUCE:

11. Well, I have more than a passing interest in the group
12. insurance program and that is an agreement negotiated by the
13. director which will take effect after July 1st, it's going
14. to cost about twenty-two million dollars. That's a contractual
15. arrangement we have with the group insurance provider in this
16. State. Are you telling me that until we pass a resolution on
17. that particular program of benefits that we're not...we're going
18. to be in default on all the hundred and and twenty-two thousand
19. enrollees under our program?

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

21. Senator Regner.

22. SENATOR REGNER:

23. Well, Senator Bruce, I'd say it does give the...the Legislature
24. a voice in those decisions also and I see nothing wrong with that.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

26. Senator Bruce.

27. SENATOR BRUCE:

28. Well, I think that is the kind of problem I see with this
29. type of legislation. No one has talked about group insurance,
30. that is just one small aspect of State Government. But I don't
31. think anyone wants to walk out of here on July the 1st, and
32. that's when our new agreement goes into effect, and find out that
33. no one is covered for group insurance in this State and Senator
Savickas tells me we're not going to be out of here on July

1. the 1st. Well, that...that one goes into effect July the 1st and
2. if you want to come back and debate it, that's fine. I've been
3. on that commission eight years now and I have trouble keeping even
4. four legislative members, that's how excited everybody is about
5. that particular commission. We have two vacancies and if you
6. want to come in and join us, I'm sure that Senator Rupp and I would
7. gladly have you on the commission and will expand its...its
8. authority. But I just wonder whether or not we want to do what
9. is in this bill. Senate Bill 337 is going to involve us in
10. fourteen already existing labor agreements. And how many more
11. are we going to have in the years coming, I don't know. We hear
12. all the time about the problems of full-time legislators and the
13. pressure on the legislative bodies. The last thing that I want to
14. do is go back with my people in Mount Vernon or in Effingham
15. and sit down with them across the table and spend forty
16. or sixty or a hundred hours with them negotiating what I think is
17. a fair raise for a mental health employee at Mount
18. Vernon. I'm willing for the department to do that. Under Governor
19. Ogilvie they did, under Governor Walker they've done it, under
20. Governor Thompson they've done it. They've done it maybe not the
21. way I would want to have it done, but none of us are the Governor
22. of the State of Illinois. He takes the heat for that kind of
23. problem. Just seems to me if you want to become a full-time
24. legislative body, pass this bill, bring all the State employees
25. in here. Let's pack the galleries and let's include the
26. firefighters and the electricians and the people at the University
27. of Illinois on prevailing wage rates, let's bring in the
28. Department of Labor and see if that's really the true prevailing
29. wage. Let's bring in the Federal employees under BES and see what
30. their benefit structure is and what they are going to cost us
31. on July the 1st and let's really do all of that and I think the
32. problem is we don't want to do all of that. We want to get back at
33. a particular group of individuals and I think this is a step in

1. the wrong direction if Illinois is going to say to the Legislature
2. we're going to negotiate all the agreements.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

4. Is there further discussion? Senator Regner may close.

5. SENATOR REGNER:

6. Just very shortly, Mr. President and members.

7. Each one of the opponents of this bill stated basically the same
8. think but a different angle. Stating how much will be involved if this
9. bill passes. Wasn't that the oath of office we took when we were
10. sworn into office that we were going to be involved and if
11. we're responsible for appropriating money, we certainly should
12. have some input into how much money we're going to appropriate
13. and why we're going to appropriate those dollars. I think it's an
14. excellent bill. I'm tired of being a rubber stamp for
15. any administration regarding pay raises and I'd urge a Yes vote
16. on Senate Bill 337.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

18. The question is shall Senate Bill 337 pass. Those in
19. favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The voting is open. Have all those
20. voted who wish? Have all those voted who wish? Take the
21. record. On that question the Ayes are 27, the Nays are 26.
22. Senate Bill 337...there is a request for postponed consideration.
23. The bill will be postponed. Senator Vadalabene, for what purpose
24. do you arise?

25. SENATOR VADALABENE:

26. As a point of personal privilege, Mr. President.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

28. State your point.

29. SENATOR VADALABENE:

30. Mr. President...

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

32. State your point.

33. SENATOR VADALABENE:

1. Yes, thank you, very much. The first grade class of the
2. Emerson School at Granite City is in the east gallery and I would
3. like for them to stand and be recognized.
4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
5. Please stand and be recognized. Senate Bill 342,
6. Senator Hall. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.
7. SECRETARY:
8. Senate Bill 342.
9. (Secretary reads title of bill)
10. 3rd reading of the bill.
11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
12. Senator Hall.
13. SENATOR HALL:
14. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
15. This bill is the results of the Legislative Audit Commission's
16. audit package in 1978. It's supported by the State Community
17. College Board of Trustees, the Illinois Community College
18. Board and the Auditor General of the State of Illinois.
19. It simply says that the Board of Trustees of the East St.
20. Louis Community College provide an annual audit on the fiscal
21. years when the Auditor General does not perform this audit and I
22. have a letter from the Auditor General confirming that he will
23. do this. I would ask your most favorable support of this bill.
24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
25. Is there discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill
26. 342 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The
27. voting is open. Have all those voted who wish? Take the record.
28. On that question the Ayes are 46, the Nays are 1. Senate Bill
29. 342 having received a constitutional majority is declared passed.
30. Senate Bill 343, Senator Berman. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.
31. SECRETARY:
32. Senate Bill 343.
33. (Secretary reads title of bill)
- 3rd reading of the bill.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

2. Senator Berman.

3. SENATOR BERMAN:

4. Thank you, Mr. President. This is a housekeeping bill
5. requested by the Chicago Board of Education. It would allow
6. them to enter into contracts not to exceed one year which
7. contracts could extend into the next fiscal year. These contracts
8. must include a limitation on the amount to be expended and shall
9. impose no obligation on the board except pursuant to
10. written purchase orders. It applies only to requirement
11. contracts which are contracts for a supplier to supply all of the
12. material necessary for...of a designated type which the board
13. needs. I'd be glad to respond to any questions.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

15. Is there discussion? Senator Davidson.

16. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

17. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I rise in support of
18. this bill. This is an item which other school districts do not
19. have the number to deal with and Chicago...it's a housekeeping
20. bill. I urge our side of the aisle to vote for it.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

22. Is there further discussion? The question is shall
23. Senate Bill 343 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed
24. Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the
25. record. On that question the Ayes are 40, the Nays are 2, 4 Voting
26. Present. Senate Bill 343 having received a constitutional
27. majority is declared passed. Senate Bill 344, Senator Grotberg.
28. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

29. SECRETARY:

30. Senate Bill 344.

31. (Secretary reads title of bill)

32. 3rd reading of the bill.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

Senator Grotberg.

1. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

2. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate.

3. Two years ago, I sponsored and we passed out of this Senate
4. the Charitable Risk Trust Pool for the not-for-profit hospitals
5. and nursing homes and other agencies, private agencies, that
6. they may form a risk pool for their liabilities such as
7. malpractice in the hospitals and regular liability insurance.
8. It's been a most successful program and just in the first trust
9. that's been established in the Chicagoland area, they have
10. saved already in this Fiscal Year some five hundreds of thousands
11. of dollars in premiums that can go into social service work.
12. Following that, we are now seeking to add to that eligibility
13. in Senate Bill 344 units of local government that perform services
14. similar to the 501-C3 Federal Regs such as a county nursing home,
15. the few county hospitals that we have, that they, too, may also
16. either form their own or join an existing charitable risk
17. pool. That's all this bill does. It's an excellent bill and I'll
18. be glad to answer any questions. Otherwise, just take a favorable
19. roll call.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

21. Is there discussion? Senator Berning.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
2. Senator Berning.
3. SENATOR BERNING:
4. Thank you. One question of the sponsor.
5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
6. Indicates he will respond to one question.
7. SENATOR BERNING:
8. All local units of government are tax-exempt, but this then
9. accomodates townships and counties and municipalities?
10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
11. Senator Grotberg.
12. SENATOR GROTBURG:
13. It's all of them, and the language is exactly for our
14. tax-exempt institutions that are entities established by
15. units of local government whose functions are similar to 501C-3
16. organizations.
17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
18. Is there further discussion? The question is shall Senate
19. Bill 344 pass? Those in favor vote Aye, those opposed vote Nay.
20. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the
21. record. On that question, the Ayes are 50, the Nays are none,
22. one voting present. Senate Bill 344, having received the con-
23. stitutional majority is declared passed. Senate Bill 345,
24. Senator Grotberg. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.
25. SECRETARY:
Senate Bill 345.
26. (Secretary reads title of bill)
27. 3rd reading of the bill.
28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)
29. Senator Grotberg.
30. SENATOR GROTBURG:
31. Yes, Senate Bill 345, Mr. President and members of the
32. Senate, is the Commission on Children's Restitution Bill for
33. juvenile delinquents, and it defines as a condition of pro-
bation, the concept of restitution. Of several bills around,

1. this is probably the best drafted one with the best protec-
2. tion in it. For the youngster, you can't employ him in a
3. dangerous occupation...The principle is not necessarily to
4. repay the victim, but to straighten out the kid, and the
5. union amendment is on it. You can't use him to replace
6. jobs in existence but it's for public service or community
7. service at the judge's discretion. I'll be glad to answer
8. any questions.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

10. Senator Lemke.

11. SENATOR LEMKE:

12. How would this affect the judge from ordering the youth
13. or person who has written graffiti on a building. Last year,
14. we passed a building law which said that a judge can't order
15. a fine or order the youth to clean up that graffiti on that
16. building. How would that affect that? ...graffiti he wrote on
17. the building?

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

19. Senator Grotberg.

20. SENATOR GROTBORG:

21. ...the specific violations are not outlined in this
22. bill. One of the...it adds section N, from A through N, to the
23. probation options that the court has, and the violations are
24. not...they have to be convicted of the misdemeanor, to say the
25. least.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

27. Senator Lemke.

28. SENATOR LEMKE:

29. I think that this would have a great effect. The people
30. in my area are very concerned about youths being...because the
31. parents pay the fine but the youths have to do the work. They
32. figure that if enough youths get out there and are forced to
33. clean up the graffiti on these buildings and take care of the

1. vandalism work, then they will not do it again, and I think
2. this bill will injure this concept because we're dealing
3. with public buildings and schools that are under labor con-
4. tracts to clean up things. And I think the idea of the bill
5. is a good idea, and I think that this bill is contrary to that
6. concept. That's why I'm voting against it.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

8. Is there further discussion? Senator ...Is there further
9. discussion? Senator Grotberg may close.

10. SENATOR GROTBORG:

11. Before closing, Gentlemen of the Senate and Ladies, in
12. answer to you, Senator Lenke, this does not preclude, this allows
13. all of that...it allows all of that, exactly as you want it.
14. The judge can tell them to do anything within the realm of, and
15. certainly cleaning buildings is public service construed by
16. this. I would just seek a favorable roll call for what I think
17. is an excellent bill...an excellent attempt to give the judge
18. discretion...to let the perpetrators of the crime remedy the
19. harm.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

21. The question is shall Senate Bill 345 pass. Those in
22. favor vote Aye, those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open.
23. Have all those voted who wish? Have all those voted who wish?
24. Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 50, the Nays
25. are 1. Senate Bill 345, having received the constitutional
26. majority is declared passed. Senate Bill 346, Senator Grotberg.
27. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Senate Bill 346. (Secretary reads title of bill)

30. 3rd reading of the bill.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

32. Senator Grotberg.

33. SENATOR GROTBORG:

1. Thank you, Mr. President, and again, members of the
2. Senate, for your patience...I'll never file 3 bills in a row
3. again. This bill amends the County Detention Home Act, which,
4. if you will recall, is a permissive act that counties may establish
5. detention homes. Under the federal Juvenile Justice and Delinq-
6. uency Prevention Act of 1974, we find that minors charged with
7. status offenses, crimes only because they would...if they were
8. adults, they wouldn't be crimes, have to be segregated out of
9. such homes. This allows all the counties..about 11 or 12 counties
10. that already have a detention home, to establish within that
11. detention home or if they wish to do another one but only by
12. full referendum, to establish a shelter care home for such
13. kids that do not belong behind bars and in full security
14. detention homes. The bill amends the County Detention Home
15. Act and the Juvenile Court Act. I would like to try and answer
16. questions.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

18. Senator D'Arco.

19. SENATOR D'ARCO:

20. Thank you, Mr. President. Will the sponsor yield for
21. a question?

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

23. He indicates that he will.

24. SENATOR D'ARCO:

25. Senator Grotberg, some of the people from the Commission
26. on Delinquency Convention...Prevention were concerned because
27. this does affect Cook County Detention Homes on Roosevelt Road
28. and Ogden, where many of the kids are housed now, and if it applies
29. to ...which it does apply to, neglected children, as well as
30. juveniles in need of supervision..minors in need of supervision,
31. and not hard-core criminal-type juveniles. Are you going to
32. let them out of that County Detention Home...and what they're
33. worried about is that there won't be any place to house these

1. kids, once we let them out of these homes if this bill passes.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

3. Senator Grotberg.

4. SENATOR GROTBORG:

5. I understand that, Senator D'Arco. The courts are about
6. to make us do it, anyway, under the 1974 Act. The pressure is
7. on, and the halfway house concept or the foster home care ..
8. the alternative placements are available to the courts now.
9. The most convenient and lowest cost one is in Audie Home, and
10. it is new. This would allow them to open up the doors in a
11. section of that home, and just give full passage. You can do
12. it within the existing building, or if everybody needs it and
13. people want to pay for it, to go ahead and build one. But, I
14. raise those same questions in committee. Is this going to put
15. the gun to the head of County Boards and the taxpayers to change
16. an existing, relatively new home.. We have one in Kane County,
17. also. Brand new, not nearly as big as yours, but from a stand-
18. point of that, you can open up the existing home, take a floor
19. or a few rooms, and just take the door handles off and open it
20. in a non-secure situation.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

22. Is there any discussion? Senator Grotberg, you may
23. close if you wish.

24. SENATOR GROTBORG:

25. Roll call.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

27. The question is, shall Senate Bill 346 pass. Those in favor
28. vote Aye, those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. All those
29. voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes
30. are 54, the Nays are none. Senate Bill 346, having received
31. the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. Senate
32. Bill 353, Senator Rupp. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

33. SECRETARY:

1. Senate Bill 353.

2. (Secretary reads title of bill)

3. 3rd reading of the bill.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

5. Senator Rupp.

6. SENATOR RUPP:

7. Thank you, Mr. President. This bill amends the Insurance..
8. Illinois Insurance Code, and it provides that life insurance
9. companies need not reprint their insurance policies, all their
10. policies now, to show that they are required to pay the 6%
11. interest on late payments. Last session, Senate Bill 1063
12. sponsored by Senator Knuppel, provided that life insurance
13. companies had to pay that 6% on late payments, which is ...
14. 15 days after a proof of loss, and the bill clarifies that the
15. 6%, while it still has to be paid, does not have to be thrown
16. in the policy. However, in response to a question by Senator
17. Berman in committee about proper notification, an amendment was
18. added to the bill, and requires the company to notify the
19. beneficiary at the time of the claim that the interest will
20. be paid. I ask a favorable roll call.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

22. Is there any further discussion? The question is shall
23. Senate Bill 353 pass. All in favor vote Aye, all opposed
24. vote Nay. Voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all
25. voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes
26. are 53, none voting no, none voting present. Senate Bill 353,
27. having received the constitutional majority is declared passed.
28. Senate Bill 354, Senator DeAngelis. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

29. SECRETARY:

30. Senate Bill 354.

31. (Secretary reads title of bill)

32. 3rd reading of the bill.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

34. Senator DeAngelis.

1. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

2. Mr. President, memberpersons of the Senate, there had
3. been a considerable conversation and speculation whether red-
4. lining does exist or does not exist. Senate Bill 354 permits
5. a recording system which could be used as a data base to repute
6. or substantiate those charges. It allows the Director of Insurance
7. to force insurance companies to report lost data and non..non-
8. renewables by zip code. I urge its passage.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

10. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question is
11. shall Senate Bill 354 pass. Those in favor vote Aye, those
12. opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who
13. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that
14. question, the Ayes are 50, none voting No, and none voting
15. present. Senate Bill 354, having received the constitutional
16. majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 359, Senator Newhouse.
17. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

18. SECRETARY:

19. Senate Bill 359.

20. (Secretary reads title of bill)

21. 3rd reading of the bill.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Senator Newhouse.

24. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

25. Yes, Mr. President, Gentlemen, this is a Legislative Ad-
26. visory Committee bill, which expands the agencies which are required
27. to meet with an advisor, Legislative Advisory Committee on Public
28. Aid. It expands to include the Financial Fraud and Forgery
29. Bureau of the Department of Law Enforcement, the State Board
30. of Education of the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation. It
31. also clarifies the subpoena power provisions of the Act. It
32. authorizes the court to order the person who refuses to obey
33. a committee subpoena to appear or produce documentary evidence

1. or to give evidence relating to the subject matter. That is
2. the substance of the bill, and it's a good bill. I'd like a
3. favorable roll call.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Is there any further discussion? Senator Moore.

6. SENATOR MOORE:

7. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate, I rise
8. in support of Senate Bill 359. This is a bill that was recom-
9. mended by the Legislative Advisory Committee on Public Aid, and
10. as far as the members on this side of the aisle, I'd appreciate
11. a favorable vote.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question is
14. shall Senate Bill 359 pass. Those in favor vote Aye, those
15. opposed vote Nay, the voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
16. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the
17. Ayes are 51, none voting No and none voting Present. Senate
18. Bill 359, having received the constitutional majority, is declared
19. passed. Senate Bill 360. Senate Bill 361, Senator D'Arco.
20. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

21. SECRETARY:

22. Senate Bill 361.

23. (Secretary reads title of bill)

24. 3rd reading of the bill.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

26. Senator D'Arco.

27. SENATOR D'ARCO:

28. Thank you, Mr. President, my fellow Senators, Senate Bill
29. 361 authorizes the University of Illinois to own and operate
30. Energy Generating plants to service university facilities and
31. to sell excess energy to others. This is..concerning state
32. and private hospital facilities within the Medical Center
33. district, which is in my district, and it's a transfer of

1. ownership from Commonwealth Edison, which owns and operates
2. the steam plant to the University of Illinois, which would own
3. and operate and sell its excess steam...and we have a lot of
4. steam in the chamber, to all the facilities..facilities.
5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
6. Is there any further discussion? Senator Mitchler.
7. SENATOR MITCHLER:
8. Mr. President...
9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
10. Senator Mitchler.
11. SENATOR MITCHLER:
12. A question of the sponsor.
13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
14. He indicates he will yield.
15. SENATOR MITCHLER:
16. Senator D'Arco, is the University of Illinois up there...is
17. that in your district..right near your home there?
18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
19. Senator D'Arco.
20. SENATOR D'ARCO:
21. It's in Senator Weaver's district. The one that's in
22. my district is the Circle Campus, which is an adjunct more
23. than an entire, complete university, you know.
24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
25. Senator Mitchler.
26. SENATOR MITCHLER:
27. Well I...I would just want to make certain...I know your
28. home is located right near there, and they weren't going to
29. generate electricity in that..to furnish your home. You didn't
30. have any conflict of interest in this, did you, Senator?
31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
32. Is that a question, Senator Mitchler?
33. SENATOR MITCHLER:

1. Yes, I...

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

3. Senator D'Arco.

4. SENATOR D'ARCO:

5. Last Christmas, that's how I lit up my Christmas tree.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Senator Grotberg.

8. SENATOR GROTBORG:

9. A question of the sponsor.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. He indicates he will yield.

12. SENATOR GROTBORG:

13. Senator D'Arco, my concern is why do we need this legislation?

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

15. Senator D'Arco.

16. SNEATOR D'ARCO:

17. Well, after the war, after World War II, this is true,

18. Commonwealth Edison and the University entered into a lease

19. arrangement, whereby Commonwealth Edison would lease to the

20. University the facility to supply the steam to the University

21. and other facilities, and the loan that happened at that time

22. has been paid off since then, and it was part of the agreement

23. then that Commonwealth Edison, once the loan was paid off, would

24. transfer ownership to the University, and that's why we need

25. this bill.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

27. Senator Grotberg.

28. SENATOR GROTBORG:

29. My question then, Senator D'Arco, my second question...

30. the State of Illinois has generating plants all over the state.

31. We've got one of the finest electrical steam generating plants

32. at Elgin State Hospital, at Geneva School for Girls...they're

33. standing idle because they found later on a few years back, that

1. they could buy from Commonwealth Edison, and those plants have
2. been idle, some of them for 10 years. Do we need a utility
3. license or some such legislation as this to enable all of our
4. abandoned electrical plants that the state owns to go back into
5. business? I'm serious.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Senator D'Arco.

8. SENATOR D'ARCO:

9. I'm serious. Because this will give money to the University,
10. and maybe, if you talk to the people from the University, we
11. can earmark that money that they're going to get from
12. selling the steam to try to save some of these energy generating
13. plants. You know...I...really...

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

15. Senator Grotberg.

16. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

17. I'm going to...I think it's a great bill. My concern is
18. and I'll...when you get it into the House, maybe it's the
19. vehicle to amend that can crank out a permissive legislation
20. for all of our generators to start cranking out and selling
21. their merchandise and liquidate some of the power costs. Thank
22. you very much for your time. I didn't mean to slow up the
23. proceedings.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Senator Knuppel.

26. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

27. Well I just had one question of the sponsor.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

29. He indicates he will yield.

30. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

31. How do you get your name in all caps? Does that light up
32. like the Christmas tree?

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

Senator D'Arco.

1. SENATOR D'ARCO:
2. Senator Savickas asked me that question, and I think it's
3. a misprint myself...I don't know why they did that, really...
4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
5. If there's no further debate, Senator D'Arco may close..
6. SENATOR D'ARCO:
7. I'll finish now. You can vote on the bill...
8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
9. ...the debate.
10. SENATOR D'ARCO:
11. Vote for the bill.
12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
13. The question is shall Senate Bill 361 pass. Those in favor
14. vote Aye, those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have
15. all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record.
16. On that question, the Ayes are 54, the Nays are 1, and none voting
17. Present. Senate Bill 361, having received the constitutional
18. majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 362, Senator Davidson.
19. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.
20. SECRETARY:
21. Senate Bill 362.
22. (Secretary reads title of bill)
23. 3rd reading of the bill.
24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
25. Senator Davidson.
26. SENATOR DAVIDSON:
27. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate, this bill
28. is to correct the intent..what we wanted to do with House Bill
29. 1803, the Cost of Living raise on retired teachers last year,
30. and the way we passed it, we have a split time-one September
31. 1, this will make it...excuse me, January 1, this will make it
32. all the same date. It's recommended by the Pension Laws Commission.
33. I'd appreciate a favorable vote.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
2. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question is
3. shall Senate Bill 362 pass. Those in favor indicate by voting
4. Aye, those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted
5. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that
6. question, the Ayes are 50, the Nays are 1, and 1 voting Present.
7. Senate Bill 362, having received the constitutional majority,
8. is declared passed. Senate Bill 363, Senator Egan. Read the
9. bill, Mr. Secretary.
10. SECRETARY:
11. Senate Bill 363.
12. (Secretary reads title of bill)
13. 3rd reading of the bill.
14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
15. Senator Egan.
16. SENATOR EGAN:
17. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate, Senate
18. Bill 363 will place into the Retirement Fund of the State
19. Police, the police who are now employed by the Secretary of
20. State, and this will accomodate the Office of the Secretary
21. of State insofar as the amount of upgrading that they do with
22. their police force. As you know, recently the Secretary's
23. office has gone into the chop-shop operation, and they've
24. investigated all the frauds involved with the use of driver's
25. licenses and also in auto thefts. Now, they've also agreed
26. with the State Police to augment their force insofar as the weight
27. restrictions-and the weight stations throughout the state. The
28. augmentation and the upgrading satisfies the State Police force,
29. so that they feel that the...the help that will be given to them
30. and consequently the liability that may accrue in their system,
31. they feel is justified. So, I...it's been through the Pension
32. Laws Commission..it received a unanimous approval there, where
33. it also received a unanimous approval in the Pensions Committee

1. and I ask for your support.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

3. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question is
4. shall Senate Bill 363 pass. Those in favor indicate by voting
5. Aye, those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted
6. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that
7. question, the Ayes are 55, the Nays are 0, and none voting
8. Present. Senate Bill 363, having received the constitutional
9. majority, is declared passed. For what purpose does Senator
10. Nimrod rise?

11. SENATOR NIMROD:

12. Mr. President, I would like to, on a point of personal
13. privilege here, have a chance to introduce a guest that's with
14. us. Representative Tom Stivers from the State of Idaho. He
15. is Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee of that state, and
16. there are 70 members in the..the legislature as I understand
17. it. He's not a lawyer...I understand there's only one lawyer
18. in the entire House. Yea! He is, however, a native of Illinois,
19. and he's a board member of the American Legislative Exchange
20. Council-ALEC, and I might ask if the President might introduce
21. the guest sitting to my left.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Senator, why don't you come up here and meet our membership.

24. SENATOR NIMROD:

25. Representative Stivers, would you like to go up to the
26. podium?

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Our fellow Senators, this is Representative Stivers, who
29. wishes to acknowledge his presence here.

30. REPRESENTATIVE STIVERS:

31. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
32. State of Illinois. You can't imagine what an extreme pleasure
33. it is for me to be back in Illinois once again, after an absence

1. of, believe it or not, 51 years. I was born in Maroa, Illinois,
2. between Clinton and Decatur, in 1918, left there in 1928, and
3. have never been back until this year, and it's been an extreme
4. pleasure to visit your state and see some of the relatives that
5. we left here that many years ago, and visit with some of your
6. great people of the State of Illinois. I do bring with me, of
7. course, wishes from the State of Idaho, and I want you to know
8. that we're shipping all the potatoes we can. We're not quite
9. as short of potatoes as you are of energy, but if you have any
10. extra diesel oil, send it west. We need it to pump those
11. potatoes up. Again, thanks so much for letting me appear
12. before your group. I know you don't have any big problems in
13. Illinois like we have in Idaho. If you have excess knowledge
14. or anything, we can accept that back there, too. Once again,
15. thanks so much for having me with you.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. Senate Bill 364, Senator Bowers. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

18. SECRETARY:

19. Senate Bill 364.

20. (Secretary reads title of bill)

21. 3rd reading of the bill.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Senator Bowers.

24. SENATOR BOWERS:

25. Thank you, Mr. President. I would like to state to the Body
26. that this bill does exactly what the Calendar indicates. It
27. provides that where 2 or more offenses result from a single
28. transaction or a continuing cause of conduct, they may all be
29. tried and charged in any county where one of the offenses was
30. committed. I have distributed to the membership a letter from
31. Judge Steigmann from Champaign County, indicating the importance
32. of this particular bill. What we're trying to get at is the
33. situation where there is a..an abduction, for instance, and

1. the victim may be female and blindfolded, and she may be
2. raped in several different counties on, and under the circum-
3. stances, cannot testify as to which county is involved. It..I
4. should also call attention to the Body of the..the last page
5. of that particular letter that indicates that there are Appellate
6. Court cases that hold that venue is an element of the crime which
7. must be proved beyond a reasonable doubt, and as the judge points
8. out, this is a horrendous situation, where a procedural question
9. only...is involved in an attempt to prove a particular crime.
10. I realize there are some constitutional implications in this
11. bill, and I would point that out to the Body..we think it's
12. constitutional, but I certainly can't guarantee that. It is
13. an effort to get at a very serious problem, and I would
14. commend it for your consideration and would answer any questions.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

16. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question is
17. shall Senate Bill 364 pass. Those in favor vote Aye, those
18. opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
19. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,
20. the Ayes are 48, the Nays are 6, and none voting Present.
21. Senate Bill 364, having received a constitutional majority,
22. is declared passed. Senate Bill 365, Senator Geo-Karis. Read
23. the bill, Mr. Secretary.

24. SECRETARY:

25. Senate Bill 365.

26. (Secretary reads title of bill)

27. 3rd reading of the bill.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

29. Senator Geo-Karis.

30. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

31. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,
32. Senate Bill 365 is a language clarification bill. At the
33. present time, there is a difference between the Civil Service

1. Act and the Police and Fire Act for those persons who are on
2. the original entrance list. If a person takes an entrance
3. exam and becomes overage while he is on the list under the
4. present statutes, he is covered under the Police and Fire
5. Act, and may be appointed, but there are no provisions for
6. a person who becomes overage while on a list under Civil
7. Service. This bill will take care of the problem by providing
8. that if a person is on the list and becomes overage, overage,
9. rather, he may still be appointed until the entrance list
10. expires, and I ask for your favorable consideration.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question is
13. shall Senate Bill 365 pass. Those in favor vote Aye, those opposed
14. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have
15. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the
16. Ayes are 48, the Nays are 1 and 5 voting Present. Senate Bill
17. 365, having received the constitutional majority, is declared
18. passed. Senate Bill 366, Senator Geo-Karis. Read the bill,
19. Mr. Secretary.

20. SECRETARY:

21. Senate Bill 366.

22. (Secretary reads title of bill)

23. 3rd reading of the bill.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Senator Geo-Karis.

26. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

27. ..Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,
28. Senate Bill 366 is a companion bill, and we had to put an amend-
29. ment at the request of the staff man from..Sandy Goldstein of
30. the Pension Laws Commission, and what this provides is that
31. the...it provides a minor change in the Pension Act to reflect
32. that if a person is on an original entrance roster and becomes
33. overage, he may still be admitted to the Pension system as it

1. reflects..as it is reflected in those sections that the
2. Civil Service Act mention. The synopsis of the bill,
3. unfortunately, does not reflect the intent of the bill,
4. so I request a favorable consideration.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

6. Is there any further discussion? Senator Rock.

7. SENATOR ROCK:

8. Question of the sponsor, Mr. President.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

10. She indicates she will yield.

11. SENATOR ROCK:

12. Well, I don't know what the synopsis reflects, but you seem
13. to be saying that if I am on the eligibility list, having taken
14. the exam for the Fire Department, and I, during the course of
15. my tenure on the list, I become overage before appointment, I
16. can nonetheless be a member of the pension fund?

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Senator Geo-Karis.

19. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

20. Senator Rock, what this bill does, it allows those firemen
21. who receive employment after age 36 and were employed by
22. the Civil Service Act to participate in the fund.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Senator Rock.

25. SENATOR ROCK:

26. Well, allow me to read Amendment No. 2. It says very
27. clearly "If a person is placed on a list for service in a
28. fire department and becomes overage before he is appointed,"
29. would suggest to me that he has never worked as a fireman,
30. "he remains eligible for participation in a fireman's pension
31. fund, as created, until such list is abolished." I just
32. simply don't know what that means.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. Senator Geo-Karis.

2. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

3. Senator Rock, my understanding is what this means, it
4. refers back to the section in the bill..hold on just a minute,
5. sir...it refers back to...hold on a minute...rather than
6. take the time, I wonder if I could take it out of the record,
7. and I can verify what I think it means.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

9. Take it out of the record. Senate Bill 376, Senator
10. Geo-Karis. Senate Bill 369, Senator Berman. Read the bill,
11. Mr. Secretary.

12. SECRETARY:

13. Senate Bill 369.

14. (Secretary reads title of bill)

15. 3rd reading of the bill.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. Senator Berman.

18. SENATOR BERMAN:

19. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
20. Senate, Senate Bill 369 requires the Chicago Board of Education
21. to suspend the certificate of a teacher who has been con-
22. victed of certain enumerated sex or narcotics offenses. What
23. we've done by the amendment is to delineate the specific sections
24. it applies to, and the purpose of the bill is to address the
25. specific types of crimes that would be a potential threat to
26. the children in the school as relates to the relationship with
27. that teacher. I..the bill has been discussed with members of
28. the Board, as well as with the Teacher's Union. I'd be glad
29. to respond to any questions.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Is there any further discussion? Senator Netsch.

32. SENATOR NETSCH:

33. Senator Berman, I do not have the text in front of me at

1. the moment. Would you just briefly review the particular
2. crimes which the bill is now applicable to. I understand
3. that it is limited in its application.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. The following crimes would be the basis for the sus-
6. pension of a teaching certificate: rape, deviate sexual
7. conduct, deviate sexual assault, indecent liberties with a
8. child, contributing to the sexual delinquency of a child,
9. indecent solicitation of a child, public indecency, ag-
10. gravated incest, incest, prostitution, soliciting for a
11. prostitute, soliciting for a juvenile prostitute, pandering,
12. keeping a place of prostitution, patronizing a prostitute,
13. pimping, juvenile pimper..pimping, obscenity, harmful material,
14. and tye..tie-in sales of obscene publications to distributors.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

16. Senator Netsch.

17. SENATOR NETSCH:

18. Thank you. I think the point comes through that they are
19. offenses. There might be 1 or 2 that are questionable in terms
20. of whether they really do involve the basic moral integrity of
21. the person..at issue, but I think it is clear that most of
22. them do involve activity which ought not to..or to which children
23. ought not to be exposed, and I think on that basis, it's sound.
24. The concern that some of us have had initially, if it were too
25. broad, is that if we keep closing off every activity, every area
26. of activity and employment to every one who's ever been convicted
27. of any crime, then we do indeed force them back into the very
28. thing that we're supposed to be getting them out of. I think
29. that this one makes a good deal of sense in terms of its limit-
30. ation. Thank you.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. Is there further discussion? Senator Lemke.

33. SENATOR LEMKE:

1. How does this affect the 1st offender on..under the
2. Illinois Controlled Substance Act?
3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
4. Senator Berman.
5. SENATOR BERMAN:
6. The...we have excluded possession of not more than 10
7. grams of cannabis, delivery of not more than 2½ grams, and
8. excluded also, the person placed under first offender pro-
9. bation.
10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
11. Senator Lemke.
12. SENATOR LEMKE:
13. Then it were...the first offender under the Controlled
14. Substance Act, no matter what he was possessing, whether he's
15. excluded, and he can still be put back as a teacher?
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
17. Senator Berman.
18. SENATOR BERMAN:
19. Yes. We felt that we'd be working at diametrically opposed
20. purposes if we changed the criminal law to try to encourage
21. rehabilitation under the First Offender Probation, and prevent
22. this fellow or girl from pursuing his...occupation as a teacher.
23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
24. Senator Lemke.
25. SENATOR LEMKE:
26. This means a man that's convicted and a heroin addict, can
27. get back in as a teacher. Is that right?
28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
29. Senator Berman.
30. SENATOR BERMAN:
31. No. This is only under the Cannabis Control Act that we're
32. talking about the first offender.
33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

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Senator Lemke.

SENATOR LEMKE:

Now, that would mean...would that mean...would that put a restriction as to how much he's caught with? What if he's a peddler of a couple of pounds in his possession when he gets caught selling...and he didn't sell it in school, and he still is selling it on the street...because he didn't violate anything around the school, he can still go back to school, and...Is that right?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

Senator Berman.

SENATOR BERMAN:

I would defer to those who are more familiar with the items that a person could be placed under a First Offender Probation under the Cannabis Control Act. I..my impression was, Senator, and I admit that I am not totally familiar with the terms of that First Probation Offender status, that we're talking about a person that has been placed on probation for relatively minor violations of the Cannabis Control Act, not for heavy drugs..that would not be covered by that.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

Senator Lemke.

SENATOR LEMKE:

Well, we're talking about all First Offenders, aren't we under the Cannabis..under the Controlled Substance? How can we make a special exclusion for guys that are convicted under the Controlled Substance Act..Is there certain sections of the Controlled Substance Act that they're convicted on, or is..they all convicted on violation of just the Controlled Substance Act?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

Senator Berman.

SENATOR BERMAN:

Let me repeat. If there is a conviction for possession

1. of more than 10 grams of cannabis, delivery of more than 2½
2. grams, or if they were put under the..let me back up. If the
3. person is convicted of possession of more than 10 grams of
4. cannabis, or delivery of more than 2½ grams of cannabis, they
5. could lose their teaching certificate.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Senator Lemke. Any further discussion? Senator Daley.

8. SENATOR DALEY:

9. Mr. President, fellow Senators. In regards to this bill
10. which I've supported in committee, I think finally it allows
11. the Boards of Education throughout the state to evoke the
12. teachers or principal upon conviction of a crime as Senator
13. Berman stated. I would like to see this go further, in regards
14. to narcotics, especially the first offense. When you place some-
15. one in line with the young people of our communities, especially
16. a principal or teacher...violation of certain narcotics crimes,
17. they should not be teaching the children. I would hope that
18. an amendment would go on in the House to conform it to the
19. Narcotic First Offense, so that they would lose their certificate
20. in teaching, because in my district, I don't want them in my
21. district. You can put them in your district if you want them, but
22. the kids in my district should have the opportunity that a
23. principal or teacher should not be convicted of a serious crime.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Is there any further discussion? If not, Senator Berman
26. may close the debate.

27. SENATOR BERMAN:

28. Thank you, Mr. President. I think the point Senator Daley
29. raised is a..can be adequately debated in the House. We did
30. address this..we did address this in a way that we thought re-
31. sponded to the comments that were raised in the Senate Education
32. Committee. I think that this will merely leave the one area
33. of the relatively minor drug offenses or the First Probation

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1. status for full discussion there. Other than that, I think
2. that it is a very important bill to pass for the protection
3. of our children. I solicit your Aye vote.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. The question is shall Senate Bill 369 pass. Those in favor
6. vote Aye, those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all
7. voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record.

8. On that question, the Ayes are 54, the Nays are 1, and none voting
9. Present. Senate Bill 369, having received the constitutional
10. majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 371, Senator Keats.
11. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

12. SECRETARY:

13. Senate Bill 371.

14. (Secretary reads title of bill)

15. 3rd reading of the bill.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. Senator Keats.

18. SENATOR KEATS:

19. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, Senate
20. Bill 371 is to be known as the National Guard Preference Act.
21. This is legislation of national significance. It's a prototype
22. bill-it will be used for other states. I've introduced this
23. bill as one of three that I worked with the conjunction of the
24. Army Readiness Command at Fort Sheridan, and with the active
25. support of the Department of the Army, the Department of the
26. Navy, etc. This bill, if we pass in Illinois, will be a proto-
27. type used as model legislation in the other 50..other 49 states.
28. What the bill does, it says that an active member of the Illinois
29. National Guard would receive a 5-point preference for Civil
30. Service Employment if they apply for a state position, and ..
31. after they've taken the Civil Service Exam, 5-points is added
32. to their score. This bill does not cost the state a penny, and
33. gives equal opportunity for all male or female, regardless of

1. race, religion, etc. And if we're to talk on the national
2. level about the various problems we're having in terms of
3. military preparedness, it is always beneficial if we at the
4. state level can do things that will cost nothing, but clearly
5. improve the nation's military readiness. I'd appreciate your
6. support.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

8. Further discussion? Senator Martin.

9. SENATOR MARTIN:

10. Will the sponsor yield?

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. He indicates he will.

13. SENATOR MARTIN:

14. The bill seems to indicate the Naval Militia is also involved.
15. I have a faint recollection that they haven't been called up
16. since 1937, isn't that correct?

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Senator Keats.

19. SENATOR KEATS:

20. I believe it's 1935. I believe you're in error. In terms
21. of Naval Militia...if someone could correct me, does the Naval
22. Militia in Illinois have 3 members, or something like that?
23. We've tried to do away with that. I remember last year, I voted
24. to do away with it, but I don't know exactly what its status is
25. today.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

27. Senator Martin.

28. SENATOR MARTIN:

29. Well then I would have to ask, I think, a legitimate question.
30. ...Perhaps the rest of the bill is all right. Why, on God's
31. green earth, would you include the Naval Militia, which hasn't
32. been called up since 1935, to give preference on any entrance
33. examination?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

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Senator Keats.

SENATOR KEATS:

The reason it's involved because it has virtually no members as it is part of the National Guard program, and if we are to call it the National Guard Preference, we must include Army, Navy, and Air Force. Now I would rather hope that Pancho Villa will not come up the Mississippi River in gunboats to attack us, because if we did, I seriously doubt that the Naval Militia would have the might to defend us. But we are, in reality, dealing with our National Guard, which is a substantial force, and it's only at about 70% membership now.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

Senator Martin.

SENATOR MARTIN:

Again, so this also includes the Air Force? Well, since we aren't supposed to have a Naval Militia, you've excluded the Air Force, but you just said that you had to include the Naval Militia. Now, how could you not have to include one, and include the other?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

Senator Keats.

SENATOR KEATS:

The Air Force National Guard is not excluded from the bill. If I said that, I was in error on my statement. It would not be excluded.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

Senator Martin.

SENATOR MARTIN:

Just so I've got it clear. So, a Naval Militia we don't want is included, an Air Force we don't have is included...an interesting bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. Senator Knuppel. For what purpose does Senator Keats
2. rise?
3. SENATOR KEATS:
4. Explanation. Apparently, I...
5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
6. There wasn't a question, Senator.
7. SENATOR KEATS:
8. Yeah, I know, but apparently I said something a moment
9. ago that was in error. We do have an Air National Guard.
10. Apparently I said we didn't, and...
11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
12. Senator, you can make those remarks on your closing.
13. Senator Knuppel.
14. SENATOR KNUPEL:
15. I just wanted to ask the sponsor a question.
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
17. He indicates he will yield.
18. SENATOR KNUPEL:
19. I notice that in the newspaper the other day, notwithstanding
20. at that part of the media, that...that there was a bill that
21. was under fire in the State of Massachusetts for doing exactly
22. this thing, and that the decision was pending before the Supreme
23. Court. Are you familiar with this, and has this bill been drafted
24. in a manner that it might avoid the constitutional attack?
25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
26. Senator Keats.
27. SENATOR KEATS:
28. Am I aware of the Massachusetts case? No, I normally avoid
29. anything Taxachusetts does. That's really not a good prototype
30. for the country. In terms of the court case, we did research it
31. specifically in Illinois over a year ago, in terms of where the
32. bill would fit, and every provision would be constitutional and
33. is specifically geared to have equal opportunity available to

1. all individuals.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

3. Senator Knuppel.

4. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

5. Well, I don't know what that case...it was just a blip
6. in the paper, but apparently there are some constitutional
7. questions about providing veterans' preferences on Civil
8. Service examinations, and if it's true of veterans, I assume
9. it would be true of members of the National Guard. I'm going
10. to vote for the legislation, but I just want to make a record
11. on the fact that it very well may be unconstitutional.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Senator Buzbee.

14. SENATOR BUZBEE:

15. Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Keats, I would like to
16. correct something that you said. There are more than 3 members
17. of the Naval Militia. There..the officer to enlisted person
18. ratio, by the way, is about 2 to 1-about 2 officers for every
19. 1 enlisted man. There's something like 300 or 400 members of
20. that organization. Governor Thompson appointed a gentleman
21. to head that organization with the expressed intent of getting
22. rid of it, and now that..that individual has become a strong
23. advocate of the Naval Militia, so we're back at home plate again
24. with a new batter up. I would like to ask a question. Why are
25. you doing this for the National Guard for state Civil Service
26. employment, and not including other members of the military?

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Senator Keats.

29. SENATOR KEATS:

30. As Major Buzbee knows, Captain Keats is a member of the United
31. State's Army Reserve, and No. 1, it might be a conflict, but
32. in reality, the reason I'm not doing it is because the National
33. Guard, specifically being a state agency, is technically the

1. Governor's Army, technically, and if we have an emergency,
2. be it a flood or whatever, they're called up. I figure if
3. they're working for the state, we won't miss them as much.
4. In fact, if half the state didn't show up, no one would
5. notice, but if they were in private employment, we have
6. had serious problems with employers and legitimate complaints
7. from those employers, that they don't feel that those individuals
8. can leave their jobs...at the will of the Governor, which is
9. what it is. So in reality, it's for those individuals who
10. would be called up strictly in state service.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Senator Buzbee.

13. SENATOR BUZBEE:

14. Well, I don't think that answered my question. My question
15. is-why should we do this for members of the National Guard and
16. not for members of the U.S. Army or U.S. Air Force or U.S.
17. Navy or U.S. Marine Corps Reserve?

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

19. Senator Keats.

20. SENATOR KEATS:

21. Well, basically there are 2 reasons. 1, if I include the
22. Reserve, I can't pass the bill, and No. 2, in reality, the
23. Guard is our Illinois agency, where the Reserves, why as you
24. are well aware from your assistance to me on another bill,...
25. while I do feel that the Reserves are very important, it's a
26. different situation in their calling..when they're called up
27. then from when the National Guard...The National Guard can be
28. called up for 2 weeks at a stretch. When we bring up the
29. Reserves, we're bringing them up for you know..substantially
30. more than 2 weeks.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. Senator Buzbee.

33. SENATOR BUZBEE:

Well, I would just like to point out..First of all, I would

1. like to have a National Guard bill in here sometime that I
2. could support, because I really do feel I'm supportive of
3. the National Guard, but it seems like the bills we get keeps
4. wanting to give the National Guard an extraordinary type of
5. advantage over anybody else who served in the military services,
6. and I don't find that quite fair. We now pay National Guardsmen
7. a minimum of \$40 a day when he's called up for State Active Duty,
8. that is by State Law. Any person who belongs to the Marine
9. Corps or the Army or the Navy or the Air Force Reserve..if they are
10. not of such a rank to earn that type of money, they don't earn
11. near \$40 a day when they're called up, but that's really kind
12. of beside the point. The real point is a National Guardsman
13. spends 6 months on active duty, and then spends 5½ years,
14. 1 weekend a month, 2 weeks during the summer, and if necessary,
15. may be called up for State Duty..for flood control or whatever.
16. But why should we give an extraordinary sort of advantage in
17. a testing situation to somebody who has only spent 6 months on
18. Active Duty? I don't really understand why we have to do that.
19. If they can take the test in a competitive situation and score
20. a sufficiently high grade and can be hired, then fine, but
21. why should we give them an extra 5 points? The old idea that
22. the Federal Government established several years ago of 5 points
23. extra for a veteran was aimed at that veteran who had spent 2
24. years minimum or 3 years or 4 years service to his country, not
25. somebody who had spent 6 months, and so I'm really confused as
26. to why we ought to do this, and I just think it's a bad concept.
27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Further discussion. Senator Wooten.

29. SENATOR WOOTEN:

30. Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in opposition of this
31. bill. I do not think it appropriate. There is a very good
32. reason for giving preference to veterans of the armed forces.
33. That has been a long established practice-5 points if you are

1. not disabled, 10 points if you are disabled. To give 5
2. points for service in the National Guard seems to me to be
3. inappropriate when placed on the scale of preference given
4. veterans. May I also point out, Senator Keats, you have not
5. solved the problem of double preference in your amendment. I
6. think it is still possible that someone could receive double
7. point..double points for service to the armed forces and
8. in the National Guard. They could be added together. I don't
9. believe you've cured that with your amendment. I have been
10. quite supportive of the National Guard in this state. If you'll
11. recall, I..we had quite a bit of discussion on a bill I had to
12. give them scholarships to recruit people into the National
13. Guard. I believe in that, and I would like to expand that
14. program slightly. But I just don't think this is the appropriate
15. way to go. I don't see what the service is in the National Guard
16. that merits this preference. You're talking about the same
17. kind of preference you give a veteran of the armed forces. I
18. don't think the 2 are comparable. I just don't believe we should
19. do this. We have enough difficulty in our Civil Service situations,
20. particularly when we are trying to give women an opportunity
21. to move into Civil Service positions. To expand the Veterans
22. Point Preference Program I think is inadvisable, and if this
23. is model legislation, it is not a very good model.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Senator Mitchler.

26. SENATOR MITCHLER:

27. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. This is
28. a very good bill. As Senator Keats pointed out, it does not
29. provide for dual veterans preference. The Federal Veterans Pre-
30. ference covers the Army, Navy, Marines, Coast Guard, Air Force,
31. and what have you. This is providing for our Illinois National
32. Guard and Illinois Naval Militia the veterans preference, and I
33. might add that you have a very large number of women that are

1. enlisted in the Illinois National Guard at this time. Now
2. this is our peacetime first line of defense, and their
3. activities and the jobs that they're called upon to do
4. are numerous and are very honorable. This provides for a
5. recognition of those efforts. It will be another inducement
6. for them to get out and get additional enlistment and encourage
7. membership in the Illinois National Guard and Illinois Naval
8. Militia. Rear Admiral Stormy Webber, Alvin Webber, who is also
9. the executive director of the Illinois Federation of Independent
10. Colleges and Universities, was appointed by Governor Thompson
11. to be the commandant of the Illinois Naval Militia. There are
12. a number in there. But..this is a good concept and recognizes
13. the good work of the National Guard and I won't go into the de-
14. tail on all of the fine things that they do, and I'd ask for
15. your support of Senator Keats's bill.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. Senator Nimrod.

18. SENATOR NIMROD:

19. Thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen of the
20. Senate, I think the fact that we must recognize that in today's
21. Volunteer Army, we find that there are vacancies, both in the
22. National Guard and the Reserves, and the regular Army. It is
23. certainly a desirable kind of thing to attract those who want
24. to enlist, either in the Reserves or the Guard, to the National
25. Guard. It seems to me that this is offering an incentive after
26. an individual has served 3 of his 6 years to offer him an oppor-
27. tunity if they choose to come into state government. You know,
28. if we don't have this..if we don't have a kind of incentive over
29. and above the Army Reserve and the National Guard, of course, can
30. be called in without federalizing them, we find that we're going
31. to have a 2nd-rate National Guard. If we in Illinois are not
32. concerned about making our Illinois Guard a better and certainly
33. an attractive place to enlist, and certainly we are not going

1. to get a desirable kind of people. It costs us nothing. It
2. provides an incentive, and I think that it is in the best interests
3. of the State of Illinois.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Any further discussion? Senator Wooten, for the 2nd time.
6. Senator Keats may close the debate.

7. SENATOR KEATS:

8. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
9. Senate. I would like to close by saying this is true, this
10. bill is a national prototype, because in America today, in the
11. various National Guards in various states, there is clearly a
12. problem with recruiting. Our young people don't feel quite the
13. obligation to their country that they once did, and it is
14. necessary for us to find a way to make service to the state or
15. to the country more valuable and easier to get individuals in.
16. This bill enhances the recruiting capability of the Illinois
17. National Guard, and would set a precedent nationally. In terms
18. of the entire Veterans Preference issue, I now realize what
19. Senator Knuppel was talking about, and I apologize for having
20. missed it at that time. The Veterans Preference issue is being
21. questioned on a constitutional matter. The National Guard
22. preference would not be, because it deals with people who join
23. today, and is in no way discriminatory on race, sex, etc. There-
24. fore, there is no way this would be declared unconstitutional
25. in the same way that the Veterans Preference has been questioned.
26. Again, it costs nothing. It gives everyone a fair and equal
27. opportunity, and what all..I did want to mention the last point
28. in terms of the double benefit. The 2nd Amendment cleared that
29. up, and there's now no possibility there can be double amendment.
30. With that, I would request your support for this bill to benefit
31. the Illinois National Guard.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. The question is shall Senate Bill 371 pass. Those in favor

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1. vote Aye, those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have
2. all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record.
3. On that question, the Ayes are 28, the Nays are 19, and none
4. voting Present. Senate Bill 371, having failed to receive the
5. constitutional majority, is declared lost. Senate Bill 377,
6. Senator Regner. Senate Bill 378, Senator Nash. Read the
7. bill, Mr. Secretary.

8. SECRETARY:
9. Senate Bill 378.

10. (Secretary reads title of bill)
11. 3rd reading of the bill.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
13. Senator Nash.

14. SENATOR NASH:
15. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,
16. Senate Bill 378 permits the sale of an acoholic liquor in
17. any building used as a State Armory under certain conditions,
18. such as the adjutant general..written..adjutant general...to
19. the issuance of a license to sell alcoholic liquor in such a
20. building should be filed with the Liquor Control Commission,
21. also the alcoholic liquor is sold or dispensed only in connection
22. with a organized function held on a special occasion. The
23. organized function is one for which the planned attendance is
24. more than 25 people, and also the person running the function
25. must supply the state with Dram Shop insurance.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
27. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question is
28. shall Senate Bill 378 pass. Those in favor vote Aye, those opposed
29. vote Nay, and the voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
30. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,
31. the Ayes are 46, the Nays are 1, and 4 voting Present. Senate
32. Bill 378, having received the constitutional majority, is declared
33. passed. Senate Bill 385, Senator Rupp. Senate Bill 388, Senator

1. Daley. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

2. SECRETARY:

3. Senate Bill 388.

4. (Secretary reads title of bill)

5. 3rd reading of the bill.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Senator Daley.

8. SENATOR DALEY:

9. Mr. Chairman, Senator..and fellow Senators, this is a
10. Dangerous Drug Commission Bill in regards to placing the
11. drug Palwin on Schedule 3. It would require a triplicate
12. form. It's a..only could be used for medical use, and has
13. a high potential for abuse, that's why you need triplicate
14. forms. It also places the drug known as Angel Dust on a
15. schedule 1, conformswith federal regulations. I'd ask for a
16. favorable roll call.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question
19. is shall Senate Bill 388 pass. Those in favor vote Aye,
20. those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted
21. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that
22. question, the Ayes are 54, the Nays are none, and one voting
23. Present. Senate Bill 388, having received the constitutional
24. majority, is declared passed.

27. (Secretary reads title of bill)
28. 3rd reading of the bill.
29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
30. Senator Rupp.
31. SENATOR RUPP:
32. Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 402 would allow
33. park districts to issue Revenue Bonds for the purpose of

1. constructing or expanding an airport or a landing field. The
2. park board is required under the Act to adopt an ordinance,
3. describe the project, give the specifications and also set
4. forth the maturities and the interest rate, which cannot
5. exceed eight percent a year. The Illinois...Park District
6. supports the bill. Senator Knuppel has a bill similar to
7. this. The differences are he has the nine and a half
8. percent interest, ours has an eight and we have already
9. have an airport and there's some question as to whether or
10. not the other bill would just be for construction. We are
11. interested, not only in construction but in expansion.
12. We ask a favorable roll call.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

14. Is there any further discussion? Senator Rhoads.

15. SENATOR RHOADS:

16. A question of the sponsor, if he will yield.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. He indicates he will yield.

19. SENATOR RHOADS:

20. Senator Rupp, this relates to the...Senator Knuppel's
21. bill. You said the only differences were a different
22. percentage rate, number one, and what was the other difference?

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Senator Rupp.

25. SENATOR RUPP:

26. Our bill...I think the wording of it includes expansion
27. and not only construction of...of airports but it also says
28. expansion and there wasn't...there was some question as far
29. as the legal people in the Decatur Park District as to whether
30. that word had to be in there. We asked that it be put in.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. Senator Rhoads.

33. SENATOR RHOADS:

1. Two other quick questions, Senator Rupp. I have to ask
2. you the same thing that I asked Senator Knuppel the other day.
3. Number one, does it affect...number one, does it affect Cook
4. County, specifically the Cook County Forest Preserve District
5. and number two, where did the bill come from? Who wants it
6. and why and so forth?

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

8. Senator Rupp.

9. SENATOR RUPP:

10. Thank you, Mr. President. No, it...the only park districts
11. that it would affect are those that have airports. If they
12. have one, it might affect them. This situation as far as some
13. park districts having airports dates way back when they were
14. starting to set up these smaller airports all over the country
15. and some of the governmental units, the local units were not
16. interested. The city or the county were not interested in
17. getting into that business. They then went to the park districts
18. and in some areas the park districts did accept that responsibility.
19. I think there might be six, seven, eight or so in the entire
20. State. This came from the Park District in the City of Decatur.
21. That's where this bill originated.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question is,
24. shall Senate Bill 402 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those
25. opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who

27. question, the Ayes are 44, the Nays are 5 and 4 Voting Present.
28. Senate Bill 402 having received the constitutional majority
29. is declared passed. Senate Bill 403, Senator Davidson. Read
30. the bill, Mr. Secretary.

31. SECRETARY:

32. Senate Bill 403.

33. (Secretary reads title of bill)

1. 3rd reading of the bill.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

3. Senator Davidson.

4. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

5. Mr. President and members of the Senate. This bill is
6. due to one, possibly two employees when there was a change
7. from the...U.S. Department of Agriculture to the State
8. Department. These were inadvertently left off. The Pension
9. Laws Commission recommends this bill. I appreciate a
10. favorable vote.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question
13. is, shall Senate Bill 403 pass. Those in favor vote Aye.
14. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted
15. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On
16. that question, the Ayes are 38, the Nays are 9 and none
17. Voting Present. Senate Bill 403 having received the
18. constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate Bill 404,
19. Senator Weaver. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

20. SECRETARY:

21. Senate Bill 404.

22. (Secretary reads title of bill)

23. 3rd reading of the bill.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Senator Weaver.

26. SENATOR WEAVER:

27. Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 404 will increase
28. the membership of the Illinois Industrial Development Authority
29. from seven to eight. It would include the Chairman of the
30. Economic Development Commission or his...designee as an ex
31. officio member of this commission. If there's any questions,
32. I'll be happy to try to answer them.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. Is there any further discussion? If not...Senator Rock.
2. SENATOR ROCK:
3. A question of the sponsor, if he'll yield.
4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
5. He indicates...he will yield.
6. SENATOR ROCK:
7. I just wonder, we...we have for some time around here
8. been opposed or not opposed but questioned always...even
9. numbered boards, why are we not questioning the even...this
10. even numbered board?
11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
12. Senator Weaver.
13. SENATOR WEAVER:
14. Well, Mr. President, this is an ex officio member, mainly
15. for liaison communications between what the commission is trying
16. to accomplish and what we might try to do to help create more
17. jobs in the State of Illinois. I don't know that there's any...
18. that he would have any voting powers on the commission, just
19. mainly liaison purposes.
20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
21. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question
22. is, shall Senate Bill 404 pass. Those in favor vote Aye.
23. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted
24. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that
25. question, the Ayes are 48, the Nays are 1 and none Voting
26. Present. Senate Bill 404 having received the constitutional
27. majority is declared passed. Senate Bill 405, Senator Chew.
28. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.
29. SECRETARY:
30. Senate Bill 405.
31. (Secretary reads title of bill)
32. 3rd reading of the bill.
33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. Senator Chew.

2. SENATOR CHEW:

3. Thank you, Mr. President. It does just what the Calendar

4. says. It deals with the Motor Fuel Tax on aircraft fuel and

5. I ask for a favorable roll call.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Is there any further discussion? Senator McMillan.

8. SENATOR McMILLAN:

9. Mr. President and members of the Senate. This is the

10. same bill we passed yesterday, but I thought it was not a

11. very good idea then and I oppose it today for the same

12. reasons.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

14. Is there any further discussion? Senator Rhoads.

15. SENATOR RHOADS:

16. Just to ask the sponsor a question.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. He indicates he will yield.

19. SENATOR RHOADS:

20. Senator, in its present form is Senate Bill 405 identical

21. to Senate Bill 201 that passed?

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Senator Chew.

24. SENATOR CHEW:

25. Yes.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

27. Senator Rhoads.

28. SENATOR RHOADS:

29. Well, then the next question is, why are we passing it

30. twice?

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. Senator Chew.

33. SENATOR CHEW:

1. We're not passing it twice. We're passing a bill that's
2. identical to one that has been passed. We want to present
3. both of them to the Governor.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Senator Rhoads.

6. SENATOR RHOADS:

7. Is this bill, in your opinion, and you are a keen
8. observer of the legislative process, in your opinion would
9. this bill likely to be...remain unamended over in the House?

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Senator Chew.

12. SENATOR CHEW:

13. No one has notified me of a pending amendment in the
14. House nor here in the Senate, Senator and if I get a
15. notification I'll be glad to notify you and see what the
16. amendment is.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question
19. is, shall Senate Bill 405 pass. Those in favor vote Aye.
20. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted
21. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On
22. that question, the Ayes are 41, the Nays are 8 and 1 Voting
23. Present. Senate Bill 405 having received the constitutional
24. majority is declared passed. Senate Bill 407, Senator Moore.
25. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

26. SECRETARY:

27. Senate Bill 407.

28. (Secretary reads title of bill)

29. 3rd reading of the bill.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Senator Moore.

32. SENATOR MOORE:

33. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. Senate

1. Bill 407 amends the enabling legislation of the Commission
2. for Economic Development. It does four or five things. One,
3. the...it provides that the public members, which are appointed
4. by the Governor are...shall have the advice and consent of
5. the Senate. It is the feeling that because of the importance
6. of this commission that the State Senate should also have a
7. look at the Governor's nominees. Secondly, it provides
8. that the commission shall review the activities of the
9. Department of Business and Economic Development or its
10. successor agency and counsel and advise the director. It
11. can study...have studies, make recommendations, conduct
12. hearings. The commission shall have access to records and
13. studies of other State agencies that instead of coming out
14. with a biennial report, it will come out with an annual
15. report and finally, that in the performance of the duties
16. the commission may accept grants or funds from either the
17. Federal Government foundations or public or private organizations.
18. I'd ask for a favorable roll call.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question is,
21. shall Senate Bill 407 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those
22. opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who
23. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that
24. question, the Ayes are 49, the Nays are 2 and none Voting
25. Present. Senate Bill 407 having received the constitutional
26. majority is declared passed. Senate Bill 409, Senator Chew.
27. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Senate Bill 409.

30. (Secretary reads title of bill)

31. 3rd reading of the bill.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. Senator Chew.

1. SENATOR CHEW:

2. Yes, Mr. President. This bill was amended for clarification
3. and a definition. It does not increase taxes. It just allows
4. the townships to set up these regional juvenile shelter care
5. facilities and I ask for a favorite roll call.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question is,
8. shall Senate Bill 409 pass. Those in favor vote Aye.
9. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted
10. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On
11. that question, the Ayes are 49, the Nays are 3 and 1 Voting
12. Present. Senate Bill 409 having received the constitutional
13. majority is declared passed. Senate Bill 412, Senator DeAngelis.
14. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

15. SECRETARY:

16. Senate Bill 412.

17. (Secretary reads title of bill)

18. 3rd reading of the bill.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Senator DeAngelis.

21. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

22. Thank you, Mr. President and other persons of the Senate.
23. Senate Bill 412 was introduced to resolve a problem. In...in
24. spite of what there appears to be a surplus of teachers in
25. some areas there is, in fact, a shortage of qualified
26. substitute teachers in certain specialties. What 412 does, it
27. permits annuitants for retired teachers to teach ninety-
28. five days a year instead of seventy-five days a year without
29. the loss of their pension. I urge aits passage.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Is there further discussion? Senator Buzbee.

32. SENATOR BUZBEE:

33. Senator, I wonder...my father is one of those people

1. who participates in that. He's a retired teacher and who
2. teaches...substitute and...and up and so forth after...after-
3. wards, but is that not going to have a major fiscal impact
4. on what we're going to allow them now to continue drawing a
5. full time pension and if we...allow them to teach ninety-
6. five days, that's over half a year. So in other words, they
7. can go ahead and draw full time teachers pension and then be
8. employed. In reality...the...the School Code says you got to
9. have a hundred and eighty days...a hundred and seventy-six
10. actual class room days so the ninety-five days you actually
11. are allowing...you're allowing half time employment and
12. still be able to draw a half time salary and draw full time
13. pension. Isn't that going to have a fiscal impact?

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

15. Senator DeAngelis.

16. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

17. Senator Buzbee, currently they're allowed to teach seventy-
18. five days. They get paid on a per day basis. I think in our
19. district it's about thirty dollars per day. This still keeps
20. them under what...under what they can earn...the forty-five
21. hundred dollars that they can earn. We're really moving it
22. up twenty days more simply to take care of some serious
23. problems that occur in certain specialties. Currently, they're
24. permitted to work, by the way, in other fields without the
25. loss of their...pension. It's only if they go back to teaching
26. that they lose their pension. I don't know if I've answered
27. your question, but...we're increasing it by twenty days.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

29. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question
30. is, shall Senate Bill 412 pass. Those in favor vote Aye.
31. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted
32. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On
33. that question, the Ayes are 30, the Nays are 7, 3 Voting Present.

1. Senate Bill 412 having received the constitutional majority
2. is declared passed. Senate Bill 414, Senator Merlo. Senate
3. Bill 415, Senator Maitland. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

4. SECRETARY:

5. Senate Bill...415.

6. (Secretary reads title of bill)

7. 3rd reading of the bill.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

9. Senator Maitland.

10. SENATOR MAITLAND:

11. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
12. Senate. In, especially, downstate Illinois there are a
13. multitude of small utility companies, primary telephone
14. companies and in those same communities it sometimes becomes
15. necessary or desirable for people who own those companies
16. to...to serve on a town board, et cetera. Currently, the
17. Statutes will not allow this to happen and to also have a
18. telephone in that particular facility. Now, there are some
19. serious problems here in that if there's not a telephone
20. in that particular town hall or whatever and these people
21. are also serving on the fire department there's no way
22. that they can even be notified of a fire or respond to that
23. fire, so this...simply pertains to communities less than
24. seventy-five hundred. These rates are...are still controlled
25. by the Commerce Commission. I submit to you it's a good bill
26. and I would appreciate a favorable roll call.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question
29. is...Senator Bruce.

30. SENATOR BRUCE:

31. Well, I...does this bill say that you can be a director
32. of a bank and make deposits in a bank and still not have a
33. conflict of interest?

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Senator Maitland.

3. SENATOR MAITLAND:

4. I believe that there was a...an amendment attached that
5. indicated a director. Yes.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Senator Bruce.

8. SENATOR BRUCE:

9. It seems to me Senator Philip and I spent a great deal
10. of time last year on this particular bill. I'm not going to
11. ask you to take it out of the record, but it...it seems to
12. me that that's a fairly substantial change in the way we
13. drafted the legislation to avoid conflicts of interest and
14. we are now back to the situation where we can say that a
15. director of a bank who serves as a city councilman can place
16. on deposit money in that bank of which he is a director and I,
17. frankly, think that goes beyond what I feel is...is proper
18. government. We...there are choices that have to be made and
19. that certainly is a conflict when you sit on both the city
20. council and on the bank board. That's a fairly obvious conflict
21. of interest and I...I don't think that's the sort of thing we
22. ought to do without some degree of thought.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Is there any further discussion? Senator Bowers.

25. SENATOR BOWERS:

26. Well, it says director but I thought it was limited to
27. public utilities.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

29. Senator Maitland.

30. SENATOR MAITLAND:

31. Mr. President, as I understood Senator Philip's amendment
32. and it is not...he is not on the Floor at this time, I...I
33. believe it did pertain to a bank. That was Amendment No. 3.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Senator Bowers.

3. SENATOR BOWERS:

4. I would like to address that issue. I think I know what
5. Senator Philip was driving at. Our state's attorney...last
6. time when we passed this bill we said bank officers. Our
7. state's attorney in DuPage County has...has ruled that a
8. director is not a bank officer, so this does not fundamentally
9. change what we did in the last Session other than to add to
10. the exemption bank directors in...in addition to bank officers
11. and I think most of us thought that directors were officers.
12. That's not the ruling of our state's attorney and that was
13. the purpose of the amendment he put on and I would hope that
14. it not fit the bill; frankly.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

16. Senator Bruce.

17. SENATOR BRUCE:

18. Well, when Senator Philip and I helped draft his amendment
19. the...the limitation on officers of the S and L's and
20. employees were those people who owned less than seven and a
21. half percent and the way I read the amendment that a director
22. would be excluded if he owned sixty percent of the bank or
23. without limitation. I...I'm not quite sure it reads the way
24. you and I think that it reads. The...the officers and employees
25. were excluded if they owned less than seven and a half percent.
26. I'm not sure that the directors given the placement of the comma
27. ...if you own half an interest in a bank in a small community
28. and serve both as city councilman and bank director. I'm not
29. sure, Senator Bowers. It came upon me very quickly here this
30. afternoon.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. Is there any further discussion? Senator Maitland may
33. close the debate.

1. SENATOR MAITLAND:

2. Thank you, Mr. President. I think this is a...legislation
3. that addresses itself to several small communities where, in
4. fact, it is difficult to find capable people to serve in...
5. these capacities. I see no problem with this. I might just
6. respond to Senator Bruce. The only thing we do say here...in
7. this particular area is and directors and that still is in
8. the seven and a half percent so I would appreciate a favorable
9. roll call.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. If there's no further discussion, the question is, shall
12. Senate Bill 415 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed
13. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have

22. (Secretary reads title of bill)

23. 3rd reading of the bill.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Senator Martin.

26. SENATOR MARTIN:

27. Yes. This is the first of a series of three bills introduced
28. on behalf of the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules. This
29. particular bill mandates the Regional Superintendent of Schools
30. to check the permits of school bus drivers and also sets up an
31. alternative in those districts that only have one bus company
32. in addition to termination of contract that will allow them to

20. Statutory language reflects an excellent practice of the
21. Chicago Board of Elections.

23. Is there any further discussion? If not, the question

3. Senator Martin.

4. SENATOR MARTIN:

5. This affects the Public Aid Code...legislation that was
6. passed effective December, 1977 gave legislative intent to the
7. termination of medical vendors, however the Public Aid
8. Department has, thus far, refused to specify in their rules
9. and regulations what management responsibility is and other
10. areas of the Act. This renews the legislative intent and

28. SENATOR BLOOM:

29. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. This
30. bill and the next three bills are from a Joint Committee on
31. Administrative Rules. This bill addresses a problem that the
32. committee found itself confronted with and it's an outgrowth
33. of the case of Stouffer versus Motor Vehicle Casualty. Basically,

1. the bill requires that agencies to include in their rules

19. (Secretary reads title of bill)

20. 3rd reading of the bill.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

22. Senator Bloom.

23. SENATOR BLOOM:

24. Okay. Thank you. 420, 21 and 22 are part of the...the Joint
25. Committee package as well. Basically, this bill gives the
26. Board of Vocational Rehabilitation expressed authority over
27. rule making by clarifying the Statutory language. There was
28. some question when they had some rules as to whether they
29. had the authority to so promulgate them.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

31. Is there discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill
32. 420 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
33. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted

2. 55, the Nays are none, none Voting Present. Senate Bill 420

7. Senate Bill 421.

8. (Secretary reads title of bill)

9. 3rd reading of the bill.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. Senator Bloom.

12. SENATOR BLOOM:

13. Thank you, Mr. President. This bill makes some technical
14. changes that clarify the scholarship terms. One year of
15. service per each year of medical training and gives the
16. Department of Public Health necessary authority to set the
17. standards for so doing. Answer any questions and ask for a
18. roll call.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

20. Is there discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill
21. 421 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Senator Berning, for
22. what purpose do you arise?

23. SENATOR BERNING:

24. Well, I'm sorry, I wanted to catch your attention before
25. you had announced the necessity of taking the roll call. My
26. question has to do with the mandates here if I interpret this
27. correctly, the mandating of a student to provide a certain
28. type of service as the result of a scholarship having been
29. awarded to him by the State Scholarship Commission. Now,
30. while I agree it is laudable to attempt to capitalize on
31. the talents of our students and the beneficiaries of our...
32. of the State's largesse and the State's educational system
33. I must question whether or not we are really acting responsibly

1. in, for all intents and purposes, shackling a student, a
2. graduate to a career in a certain area, a certain spot and
3. in a certain procedure which may not be to his liking. Now,
4. if I am misconstruing the intent of this bill then I...I would
5. like to be corrected.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

7. Further discussion? Senator Netsch.

8. SENATOR NETSCH:

9. Well, let me ask a question, Senator Bloom and...and
10. perhaps, you...if you respond to it...it will also take care
11. of the point that Senator Berning was raising. Despite what
12. the caption says, is it not correct that the bill does not
13. absolutely require that someone serve in a particular area
14. who has received this scholarship that there is a way to
15. avoid that and that is to pay a dollar penalty, which I assume,
16. consists of repaying the money loaned plus...is it two or one
17. time the original scholarship fund? The point being, of course,
18. if there's no way to enforce a provision that the doctor
19. serve in a particular area and in a particular practice and
20. so there has got to be a way for him, in effect, to buy his
21. way out. Is that correct?

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Senator Bloom.

24. SENATOR BLOOM:

25. Thank you. Yes. As originally drawn, the Family Practice
26. Act specified only that he or she agree to serve three years
27. as a primary care physician spending at least fifty percent of
28. the time engaged in a designated shortage area. That was the
29. whole theory behind the Family Practice Act, to get doctors
30. into areas where there was a shortage thereof. The department
31. came in with rules attempting to set some kind of standards
32. and some kind of penalty if...if they bailed before the three
33. year period...ended. They did not...so have the authority, so

1. therefore, the committee recommended this...this bill where
2. they do it in one year bites so the Act is now amended to
3. read that he or she agrees to serve one year for each year
4. of medical training, which they get a scholarship and they
5. agreed to repay in full all scholarships received under the
6. program established by this Act, plus a penalty of twice
7. the amount and some kind of stick along with the carrot.
8. Does that answer your question?

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. Senator Netsch.

11. SENATOR NETSCH:

12. Yes. What you are saying is that there is a way for them
13. to...for the recipients of the scholarship, in effect, to buy
14. their way out of the period of service by paying a double
15. penalty. The...the one thing that I didn't realize though,
16. that you said in answering the question that interests me is,
17. that we have reduced the commitment on the part of the
18. scholarship recipients. Under the original Act they were
19. required, even though it was not enforceable as such, to serve
20. three years and now it's down to one year for each year of
21. scholarship?

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Senator Bloom.

24. SENATOR BLOOM:

25. That is correct. The department said during the hearing
26. on this rule that they would have a situation they...were
27. starting to experience, I should say, a situation where someone
28. would have a Family Residency or a Family Practice Scholarship
29. and get into it partially and then say that's not for me. You
30. see what I mean and so that way they understand going in that
31. if they get a Family Residency Scholarship or Family Practice
32. Scholarship, excuse me, I'm not familiar with the terminology,
33. then...

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
2. Senator Netsch.
3. SENATOR NETSCH:
4. Do you know the value of a scholarship under this bill?
5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
6. Senator Bloom.
7. SENATOR BLOOM:
8. No.
9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
10. Senator Netsch.
11. SENATOR NETSCH:
12. Well, I think...I think we understand the bill now and
13. it makes sense in that respect. That is in providing this
14. kind of option. I guess my only comment is that I think the
15. recipients who do intend to stay in it, I understand the
16. example you just gave, but for those who do intend to stay
17. in it, they are getting off pretty cheaply at that.
18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
19. Further discussion? Senator Berning.
20. SENATOR BERNING:
21. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. For the second time, a
22. question of the sponsor.
23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
24. He indicates he will yield. Senator Berning.
25. SENATOR BERNING:
26. Is this the only area...the only field of endeavor where
27. we require this repayment? For instance, what about a dentist?
28. What about an athlete?
29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
30. Senator Bloom.
31. SENATOR BLOOM:
32. I am unaware of any other Acts like this Act. When this
33. Act was...passed, the purpose was to provide a financial incentive

1. to get family practice doctors into areas where there was a
2. shortage thereof.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

4. Senator Berning.

5. SENATOR BERNING:

6. Well, members of the Senate, I fully remember when this
7. legislation was first enacted and some of you may recall, as
8. I do, having seen signs along the highway saying, doctor
9. needed in village so and so. It was a serious situation and
10. I think, perhaps, there are still illustrations available
11. where there are communities without a doctor, but what concerns
12. me now is, that laudable as the objectives may have been at
13. that time, and I think I voted for the bill originally, we
14. are now confronted, as I see it, with a...a serious question
15. of equal protection under the law or equal liability under the
16. law. Our total Scholarship Commission expenditures are huge.
17. A relatively small amount of that goes in this particular area.
18. It would seem to me that we are discriminating against those
19. individuals who are going into the medical field itself and I'm
20. not...I realize I'm not talking exclusively on the bill before
21. us, but the bill, which is...or the Statute which is being
22. amended by this bill, what we are providing for, is a total
23. of three years. The maximum required service under this
24. agreement shall be three years, which is reiterating what is
25. being stricken and it just appears to me that we ought to
26. reexamine this, particularly in light of other disciplines,
27. which may or may not have as much justification for this kind
28. of restriction or requirement for service, servitude, if you
29. will, or repayment. There are many areas, I am sure, where
30. dentists are not in an oversupply and we ought to, perhaps,
31. ...hanging this sort of restriction on that particular field,
32. as well.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

1. Senator Geo-Karis.

2. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

3. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.

4. I think this is a very good restriction. I think we should
5. make people who do get scholarships a little more conscious
6. of the fact that they've gotten help to get through and this...
7. let's not kid ourselves, there's many communities that do not
8. have a doctor on hand that would like to have one. They're
9. not going to suffer. I don't know of one doctor that's not
10. making money and if they don't want to go into a community
11. that they're supposed to go, let them pay for their scholar-
12. ships back, but I think it's a very good bill and I urge your
13. support.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

15. Further discussion? Senator Bloom may close.

16. SENATOR BLOOM:

17. Thank you, Mr. President. I'd appreciate a favorable
18. roll call.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

20. The question is, shall Senate Bill 421 pass. Those in
21. favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open.
22. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the
23. record. On that question, the Ayes are 54, the Nays are none.
24. 1 Voting Present. Senate Bill 421 having received the
25. required constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate
26. Bill 422, Senator Bloom. Senator Bloom, do you wish to call
27. that one? Read the bill, Mr. Secretary, please.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Senate Bill 422.

30. (Secretary reads title of bill)

31. 3rd reading of the bill.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. Senator Bloom.

1. SENATOR BLOOM:

2. Thank you. This addressed another aspect of the Family
3. Practice Grants and those...this provides secondary criteria
4. that the department would use in awarding grant monies to
5. the medical schools who have family practice. Basically, it
6. again it's technical and clarifies, however, I will read it.
7. It says, "in distributing such funds the department may also
8. consider as a secondary criteria whether a family practice
9. program at medical school has adequate courses of instruction
10. in the behavioral sciences, availability in systematic
11. utilization of opportunities for residents to understand the
12. areas in which they would do their family practice. A
13. continuing program of community oriented research in such
14. areas as risk factors in community...populations, immunization
15. levels, enviromental or occupational hazards and finally,
16. sufficient mechanism for maintenance of quality training and
17. an appropriate course of instruction in the institutions of
18. that area." Answer any questions you may have and otherwise
19. ask for a roll call. Thank you.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

21. Is there discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill
22. 422 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
23. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
24. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are
25. 56, the Nays are none. None Voting Present. Senate Bill 422
26. having received the required constitutional majority is
27. declared passed. Senator Rupp, on 426? Read the bill, Mr.
28. Secretary. Senate Bill 426.

29. SECRETARY:

30. Senate...Senate Bill 426.

31. (Secretary reads title of bill)

32. 3rd reading of the bill.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

1. Senator Rupp.

2. SENATOR RUPP:

3. Thank you, Mr. President. What this bill does it amends
4. the Illinois Vehicle Code and the synopsis uses the word
5. "exempt" but more apt would be the word that..."to substitute"
6. and what the situation is, is when the banks and savings and
7. loans issue license plates and collect the State's money,
8. there is a special bond that has to be issued and what all
9. this does is permit the savings and loans and the banks that
10. have other bonding available, such as a blanket position
11. bond that, just by certification to the State, that they
12. have this bond. They will not have to get the other separate
13. small bond to cover each instance and ask specific Yes on
14. this bill.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

16. Is there discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill
17. 426 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
18. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
19. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are
20. 48, the Nays are 2, 3 Voting Present. Senate Bill 426 having
21. received the required constitutional majority is declared
22. passed. Senate Bill 428, Senator Lemke. Read the bill, Mr.
23. Secretary.

24. SECRETARY:

25. Senate Bill 428.

26. (Secretary reads title of bill)

27. 3rd reading of the bill.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

29. Senator Lemke.

30. SENATOR LEMKE:

31. What this bill does, is changes. the primary date to
32. the first Tuesday in September.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

1. Is there discussion? All right. Let's see. Senator
2. Berman, Senator Rhoads, Senator Netsch, Senator Carroll,
3. Senator...All right. Senator Rhoads.

4. SENATOR RHOADS:

5. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

7. May we have some order, please. Senator Rhoads.

8. SENATOR RHOADS:

9. There was, of course, a...a bill on the Calendar
10. yesterday, which was debated, Senate Bill 163, sponsored by
11. Senator Wooten and myself. The key difference between
12. Senate Bill 163 and Senate Bill 428 sponsored by Senator
13. Lemke is that Senate Bill 428, as it is currently drafted
14. does not provide for the election of delegates to the
15. National Nominating Conventions. In fact, it provides for
16. a system where the State party conventions would select the
17. delegates to the National Nominating Convention. My
18. personal...preference is for Senate Bill 163. I...I think
19. the method of electing our delegates is an important one.
20. I think that is a bill that the Governor can easily sign
21. and I suspect that he will have more difficulty signing this
22. bill if it reaches his desk. However, I'm going to vote for
23. it because I think we do need another vehicle and I think the
24. concept is a good one, notwithstanding my objections to that
25. delegate appointment process.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

27. Senator Berman.

28. SENATOR BERMAN:

29. Thank you, Mr. President. I didn't want Senator Wooten
30. to think that I didn't like his bill and that I do like
31. Lemke's bill. I'll play the tape back again. The...the
32. concern that I have...that I voiced yesterday is the same one
33. that I have today with the September primary. I am concerned

1. that it will disenfranchise and irrevocably interfere with
2. the constitutional rights of the Jewish people in their
3. observation of the high...high holy days. Now, since
4. yesterday, I have made contact because Senator Wooten
5. indicated that New York has a September primary and there
6. are a few Jews in New York that participate and I'm trying
7. to find out what they do about it there. So, first I would
8. ask Senator Lemke if he wants to take this out of the record
9. until I get an answer from New York and without...and until
10. then I've got to continue to voice my objections because
11. I think that we are disenfranchising a very important and
12. participatory segment of our community, with a September
13. primary.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

15. Further discussion? Senator Netsch...Senator Netsch,
16. do you wish...do you not wish to speak on this?

17. SENATOR NETSCH:

18. I'll yield to Senator Wooten, well...

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

20. Senator Carroll is...is next in the rotation. Senator
21. Carroll.

22. SENATOR CARROLL:

23. For the sake of the brevity of the today's proceedings,
24. I'll just also journalize the comments on Senator Wooten's
25. record with leave of the Body, rather than repeat them, but
26. I think the issue is an important one as it relates,
27. especially to the Jewish community and to those who raised
28. New York and the fact that they seem to have a September primary
29. without much problem, I don't know if there's any causal
30. connection, but I would remind them of the financial plight
31. New York has been in of late.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. Senator Davidson.

1. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

2. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I rise
3. in support of this bill. 428 happens to be identical of
4. Senate Bill 173, which happens to be sponsored by Senator
5. Davidson. Also, is identical to Senate Bill 16 sponsored
6. by Davidson and Donnewald in the 80th General Assembly. I
7. like the idea of the delegates at the Republican and Democrat
8. State Conventions. According to statistics when we did the
9. research on it two years ago ninety-five plus percent of all
10. the delegates that attend a national convention are what
11. you call regular organization people. To have an election,
12. to elect a possibility five people...five people out of a
13. hundred delegates in the State of Illinois for the costs of
14. from twelve to fourteen million dollars is not very good
15. economic exchange. People may disagree with me. That's
16. their right. I urge you to vote for this so we get a change
17. whether we have to change it a different day in September for
18. the sake of the Jewish community, fine, but let's get it to
19. a reasonable time. September.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

21. Further discussion? Senator Wooten.

22. SENATOR WOOTEN:

23. Yeah, thank you, Mr. President. This gives me a real
24. dilemma because I am totally committed to the September primary
25. date, but not at all to delegate selection by caucus. I wish
26. it were possible to separate one side of this bill from the
27. other. I am led to believe that the Governor would veto
28. that aspect of the bill, but faced with that doubt, I fear
29. I must vote Present on this bill, but I...at the same time
30. I kind of want it to pass because we do need a September
31. primary, but I just don't want to be in the position of
32. endorsing a delegate selection by caucus.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

1. Senator Gitz.

2. SENATOR GITZ:

3. Mr. President, I think that there are arguments on both
4. sides of the question in terms of a September primary. What
5. really disturbs me most about this bill, is the fact that it
6. will choose national convention delegates in a caucus system
7. and I don't think that that is the best and fairest way to
8. proceed. We are in a time in our country when there is more
9. apathy, more cynicism than perhaps ever before. I, for one,
10. think that there is a lot to be said for electing primary
11. delegates and giving presidential candidates the opportunity
12. to campaign within the State and elect delegate slates that
13. are pledged to them. Most importantly, I think the present
14. system guarantees that, at least, every geographical area in
15. the State will have a fair representation and the power to
16. choose those delegates are reserved for the people who, I
17. think, should count most, namely the electorate. I'm very,
18. very...you know, I have no problem with the question of the
19. September primary, per se, I'm not convinced it's the solution
20. to our problems, but this bill, in my opinion, is extremely
21. dangerous in the way it chooses national convention delegates.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Further discussion? Senator Geo-Karis.

24. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

25. Well, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
26. Senate. People are getting very tired of our campaign
27. rhetoric for six months. Very bored with it and I don't
28. think we're doing a service to the public or ourselves or
29. any other candidate who is wanting to run for office. I
30. think the...I'm for the September date and I'm sure...the
31. House can make an amendment that will be feasible for the
32. holiday involving the Jewish people. I certainly would never
33. object to that. As far as selection of delegates at conventions

1. maybe it might be more feasible to do it that way, but certainly
2. we've gotto keep in mind that a September date is far better
3. on the public and less wasteful than the six months of rhetoric
4. and garbage that we have to come forth with in order to justify
5. our candidacy.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

7. Senator Knuppel.

8. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

9. Well, all I can say is if President Carter is the result
10. of a free and open primary, as opposed to the caucus system
11. let's go to the caucus system.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

13. Further discussion? All right. Senator Lemke may close
14. the debate.

15. SENATOR LEMKE:

16. I think...I think the bill is a good bill and the time
17. has come and I ask for the favorable consideration of the bill,

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. The question is, shall Senate Bill 428 pass. Those in
20. favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open.
21. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all
22. voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes
23. are 35, the Nays are 17, 3 Voting Present. Senate Bill 428
24. having received the required constitutional majority is
25. declared passed. Senate Bill 430, Senator Nash. Read the
26. bill, Mr. Secretary, please.

27. ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. FERNANDES)

28. Senate Bill 430.

29. (Acting Secretary reads title of bill)

30. 3rd reading of the bill.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

32. Senator Nash.

33. SENATOR NASH:

1. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
2. Senate Bill 430 amends Sections 5.1...5.11 of the Chicago
3. Sanitary District and authorizes payment of purchases...
4. purchase orders or contracts of five thousand dollars or
5. less without prior...board approval. This will permit the
6. Sanitary District to get advantage of prompt payment discounts
7. and not wait for the board to meet twice a month before they
8. can pay their bills on time.
9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. Is there discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill
11. 430 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
12. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
13. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are
14. 51, the Nays are 3. None Voting Present. Senate Bill 430
15. having received the required constitutional majority is
16. declared passed. Senate Bill 431, Senator Nash. Read the
17. bill...Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

18. SECRETARY:

19. Senate Bill 431.

20. (Secretary reads title of bill)

21. 3rd reading of the bill.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Senator Nash.

24. SENATOR NASH:

25. Mr. President, I ask leave of the Body to bring Senate
26. Bill 431 back to 2nd reading for the purpose of Tabling
27. Amendment No. 1, which was to have been Tabled when Amend-
28. ment No. 2 was put on.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

30. Well, Senator, we'll take those all at one time. There's
31. several Senators who wish to do that, but we've had to pass
32. over them till we go to that order of business of 3rd and
33. recall. Is...can you take it out of the record, Senator?

1. All right. Take it out of the record. 432. 433. Read the
2. bill, Mr. Secretary. Senate Bill 433.
3. SECRETARY:
4. Senate Bill 433.
5. (Secretary reads title of bill)
6. 3rd reading of the bill.
7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
8. Senator Nash.
9. SENATOR NASH:
10. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
11. What this bill does, it allows the purchasing agent of the
12. Metropolitan...Sanitary District to decide on the winning
13. bid and when there's tied bids all his recommendations need
14. board approval. Right now, there's a tied bid. They have
15. to order rebidding and that's all the bill does.
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
17. Is there discussion? Senator Shapiro.
18. SENATOR SHAPIRO:
19. Will the sponsor yield to a question?
20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
21. Indicates he will. Senator Shapiro.
22. SENATOR SHAPIRO:
23. Senator Nash, what is the purpose of this bill?
24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
25. Senator Nash.
26. SENATOR NASH:
27. Senator Shapiro, the Sanitary District asked for this bill
28. because when they have tied bids, right now when bids on
29. contracts are before the purchasing agent, he decides who
30. the winning contractor will be and he needs board approval.
31. Where there are tied bids he has to...they have to rebid.
32. This will eliminate that. He can choose the winning
33. contractor who will best serve the public by all his

1. recommendations he needs full board approval.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

3. Senator Shapiro.

4. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

5. I'd like to speak to the bill. You know as laudable
6. as the explanation sounds and what Senator Nash did say is
7. true, I think if you read the amendment you'll find that
8. this just opens the Sanitary District's bidding procedure
9. just wide open and actually places the power in the hands
10. of one person and virtually it takes away the discretion
11. of the board and just let me read this to you. The amendment
12. to the bill says this. "In the event of tied low or high
13. bids, the purchase order or contract shall be awarded on
14. the basis of what the purchasing agent determines will best
15. serve the public interest or he may reject all bids." Now,
16. as I read that and reading the old language in the existing
17. law this purchasing agent, if there is a...a tied low bid
18. he can reject all bids or award it to whomever he chooses
19. or if there is a tied high bid, he can also award that contract
20. to the high bidder even though there may be bidders within
21. intervening figures, but the...this...

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Excuse me...Excuse me, Senator Shapiro...

24. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

25. Yes.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

27. ...for what purpose does Senator Nash arise?

28. SENATOR NASH:

29. Can we take this bill out of the record, please?

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

31. I think that's...that's acceptable. Senator Shapiro.

32. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

33. There's one more point I'd like to make. In this

1. particular Section, it pertains only to those bids in five
2. thousand dollars or excess. In other words, the bid could
3. be a...a million contract and the purchasing agent could
4. decide who gets it and so on and so forth so either taking
5. it out of the record or something of that nature, I think
6. is in the best interest of the Sanitary District and the
7. taxpayers of Chicago.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

9. Is there leave...is there leave to take it out of the
10. record? Leave is granted. The bill will be taken from the
11. record. Senate Bill 434, Senator Nash. Read the bill, Mr.
12. Secretary.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Senate Bill 434.

15. (Secretary reads title of bill)

16. 3rd reading of the bill.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

18. Senator Nash.

19. SENATOR NASH:

20. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
21. What this bill does, it requires review of all leases given
22. out by the Sanitary District every ten years instead of the
23. present now fifteen years.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

25. Further discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill
26. 434 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
27. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all
28. voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the
29. Ayes are 52, the Nays are none, none Voting Present. Senate
30. Bill 434 having received the required constitutional majority
31. is declared passed. Senate Bill 435, Senator Nash. Read the
32. bill, Mr. Secretary.

33. SECRETARY:

1. Senate Bill 435.
2. (Secretary reads title of bill)
3. 3rd reading of the bill.
4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
5. Senator Nash.
6. SENATOR NASH:
7. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
8. What this bill does, is it authorizes the Sanitary District
9. to impose a lien on real estate for delinquencies and payments
10. of charges imposed by the Chicago Sanitary District.
11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
12. Is there discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill
13. 435 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
14. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
15. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are
16. 52, the Nays are 3, none Voting Present. Senate Bill 435
17. having received the required constitutional majority is
18. declared passed.

3. SECRETARY:

4. Senate Bill 438.

5. (Secretary reads title of bill)

6. 3rd reading of the bill.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. Senator Lemke.

9. SENATOR LEMKE:

10. What this bill does is amends the Unemployment Insurance
11. Act to define employment and to exclude from...from definition work
12. performed in the employ of school, college, or univerisity by a
13. student. This is to allow students who work their way through
14. college to work in dormitories and cafeterias, et cetera, for their
15. room and board and for...to help them get through school and it's
16. needed by the universities for their student programs. I ask
17. for a favorable adoption.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Is there discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill 438
20. pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
21. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all
22. voted who wish? Take the record. On that...on that question the
23. Ayes are 56, the Nays are none, none Voting Present. Senate Bill
24. 438 having received the required consitutional majority is
25. declared passed. Senate Bill 439, Senator Lemke. Senate Bill 442,
26. Senator Egan. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Senate Bill 442.

29. (Secretary reads title of bill)

30. 3rd reading of the bill.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

32. Senator Egan.

33. SENATOR EGAN:

Thank you, Mr. President. All this bill does is correct

1. references to the State Service Occupation Tax Act in...in
2. shifting sections within a bill that passed in the last
3. Session. It is technical. It is not substantive. There is
4. no controversy that I know of, conceivably, and so I would ask
5. for your favorable consideration.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

7. Is there discussion? Is there discussion? All...the
8. question is shall Senate Bill 442 pass. Those in favor vote
9. Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open.
10. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?
11. Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 52, the Nays
12. are none, none Voting Present. Senate Bill 43...442
13. having received the required constitutional majority is
14. declared passed. Senate Bill 446, Senator Netsch. Read the bill,
15. Mr. Secretary, please.

16. SECRETARY:

17. Senate Bill 446.

18. (Secretary reads title of bill)

19. 3rd reading of the bill.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

21. Senator Netsch.

22. SENATOR NETSCH:

23. Thank you, Mr. President. The summary on the Calendar is
24. not correct. The bill, as it was amended, simply gives minors
25. the same rights as adults presently have with respect to the
26. treatment of their records once they have been exonerated of, in this
27. case, a charge of delinquency. In other words, when a minor
28. has been released without being adjudicated, or found in effect,
29. non-guilty of a charge of delinquency, the photographs, fingerprints
30. and other records of identification shall be returned to the minor
31. and there are provisions for expungment. It tracks almost exactly
32. the same rights that are now available to adults.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

Is there discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill 44...

1. Senator DeAngelis on this bill? Senator DeAngelis.

2. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

3. Senator Netsch, is it possible that...that due to the

4. juvenile court system that they can be found or put into a

5. different category that an adult cannot be put into? For

6. instance, they may be declared a minor in need of supervision

7. as a lesser charge than to be adjudicated as a minor.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

9. Senator Netsch.

10. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

11. Under...under this bill the record would still be expunged,

12. correct?

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

14. Senator Netsch.

15. SENATOR NETSCH:

16. Well, the...excuse me. The exact language is upon the

17. dismissal of a minor charged with being a delinquent, or upon being

18. released without being adjudicated so that what we are concerned

19. about are those cases where a minor has been charged with

20. delinquency and is either found not guilty or is released without

21. further pusuit of the charges.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Senator DeAngelis.

24. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

25. Well, I think, Senator Netsch, you're trying to draw a

26. parallel to what happens with adults and the adult system, the

27. level of pleadings is not similar to the level of pleadings

28. permitted in the juvenile court system.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

30. Senator Netsch. Senator DeAngelis.

31. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

32. I thought that the analogy was quite unfair because the

33. two systems don't function in the same manner.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. Further discussion? Senator Netsch may close.

3. SENATOR NETSCH:

4. I think it does exactly what I've indicated that it does do,
5. it deals only with minors who are charged with delinquency and
6. it provides exactly the same procedures available to them that
7. are currently available to adults who are charged with a crime
8. and subsequently found not guilty or the charge is not pursued
9. and it's not entirely true that adults cannot also have
10. lower level charges found against them even though they may
11. have been charged with a higher rank crime. But that is not
12. really what we are concerned about. We're concerned about the
13. delinquency charge and the finding of, in effect, not
14. guilty.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

16. The question is shall Senate Bill 446 pass. Those in favor
17. vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open.

18. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?

19. Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 39, the Nays
20. are 9, 1 Voting Present. Senate Bill 446 having received
21. the required constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate
22. Bill 447, Senator Wooten. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

23. SECRETARY:

24. Senate Bill 447.

25. (Secretary reads title of bill)

26. 3rd reading of the bill.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Senator Wooten.

29. SENATOR WOOTEN:

30. Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 447 is the Retail
31. Food Establishment Sanitation Act. This is the third Session I have
32. handled this bill. The first year we didn't get out of committee
33. because there...quite frankly, we did not undertake negotiations

1. with the Motel and Hotel Association. Last year,
2. we did and it passed out of this Body with 46 Aye votes.
3. This year the only change from the bill that we considered
4. last year is the accepting a few more suggestions from the
5. Restaurant Association. We have changed the fee schedule in
6. accordance with their wishes. We have changed the time to which the
7. department has to respond to the submission of plans. We've
8. adopted language for the Chicago Board of Health which would make
9. it simpler for them to administer. What the program does,
10. simply, is to provide a service that most citizens of Illinois
11. think they already have and that is a...a modern restaurant
12. inspection bill. I think it's been drawn so there is no duplication
13. so local units can administer it, receive the fees, do the work.
14. I believe that it is a model of accommodation to all the various
15. groups, who have been interested in it. We have considerable
16. support from the northeastern corner of the State from
17. sanitarians, from local health departments. I would like to think
18. that we've done a very reasonable job of putting together a reasonable
19. bill. I'd be glad to answer any questions and ask for your
20. favorable consideration.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

22. ...discussion? Senator DeAngelis.

23. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

24. Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Wooten, I believe you did
25. agree to bring this back for possible amendment and I do have
26. an amendment on file with the Secretary of the Senate that I would
27. like to put on this bill.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

29. Senator Wooten.

30. SENATOR WOOTEN:

31. Thank you. I'm sorry you didn't tell me about this earlier,
32. Senator. I would not be in the posture of losing the valuable
33. time on the bill, but I will bring it back to 3rd at your
request.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. Senator Wooten requests that the bill be taken out of the
3. record. Is there leave? Leave is granted. The bill will be
4. taken out of the record. Senate Bill 449, Senator Graham.
5. Senator Graham.

6. SENATOR GRAHAM:

7. Mr. President and members of the Senate. Before some of you
8. get a heart attack, and some are ready, we did not get the attention
9. of the Mobile Park Home...Mobile Park Owners Association till the
10. time this bill went to committee. Those in committee that were
11. there that day, heard me work over the lobbyists a little bit
12. and we got their attention. Since then, I have met with
13. the contingent for the delegation to the Mobile Park Owners
14. Association and we're working on some amendments. We found that
15. they did have some legitimate beefs on the bill and we're
16. going to leave it in this posture and hope we can work out some
17. amendments and we do...at that time, I'd hope to call it. Today,
18. I'm going to leave it lie quietly and try to work out some
19. amendments, so don't have a heart attack, people.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

21. Senate Bill 450, Senator Knuppel. Read the bill, Mr.
22. Secretary.

23. SECRETARY:

24. Senate Bill 450.

25. (Secretary reads title of bill)

26. 3rd reading of the bill.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Senator Knuppel.

29. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

30. Mr. President and members of the Body. This bill is designed
31. to require that State agencies purchase automobiles meeting the
32. Federal standards of fuel efficiency. Those standards will
33. accelerate until the year 1981 and the minimum gas mileage
required of a vehicle will be seventeen miles per gallon and ultimately

1. 22.5 gallons in 1986. Now, what will happen is that
2. if...if those...if we're purchasing automobiles that don't
3. meet those standards of efficiency, the requirements will be
4. a two hundred dollar fine on...for example, 1980 on a fine
5. of a vehicle that goes from fourteen to fifteen miles per
6. gallon on a model that only meets thirteen to fifteen, will
7. be three hundred and on a model that gets less than thirteen
8. miles per gallon, five hundred and fifty dollars per automobile.
9. The amendment which was put on after the bill came out of committee,
10. is designed to make it quite explicit that this does not apply
11. to units of local government except as provided in the
12. section and in the section that's referred to, these vehicles
13. are...the ones are only school districts and junior colleges,
14. et cetera, community colleges and school districts. It doesn't
15. apply to your municipalities. It doesn't apply to police cars,
16. other kinds of emergency vehicles. Only the straight automobiles
17. purchased by the State of Illinois, community colleges and school
18. districts. I think this is good legislation in light of the
19. energy crisis that we're confronting and that the State, in the
20. purchasing of its vehicles, ought not to be paying penalties,
21. one, and two, we should be setting an example of energy conservation.
22. The bill has been reviewed carefully by the Illinois Energy
23. Resources Commission and has been recommended as one of its
24. pieces of legislation. I solicit a favorable roll call.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

26. Is there discussion? Senator Bloom.

27. SENATOR BLOOM:

28. These fines you mentioned, are they...how are you going to
29. impose them? Are you going to...are you going to ding their
30. appropriations? I mean, how does this work? It sounds good,
31. but if you think about it a little, it doesn't hold together real
32. well.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

Senator Knuppel.

1. SENATOR KNUPPTEL:

2. I would assume that the mere suggestion would be enough
3. for the involved State agencies and the fine that's imposed
4. by the Federal Government. I would think that that would be
5. sanction enough and the powers you say. Many times the
6. only power this Body has over an agency of State Government is
7. through its appropriation process.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

9. Senator Bloom.

10. SENATOR BLOOM:

11. Well, then, Appropriations Staff is going to be checking
12. the mileage on the cars of these agencies? I...I've got problems
13. with that, John.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

15. Further discussion? Senator Rhoads.

16. SENATOR RHOADS:

17. Question of the sponsor.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Indicates he will yield. Senator Rhoads.

20. SENATOR RHOADS:

21. If I understand correctly, the Federal Government would be able
22. to impose a fine on the State of Illinois for vehicles that were
23. not in compliance, is that correct, Senator?

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

25. Senator Knuppel.

26. SENATOR KNUPPTEL:

27. As...as I understand it, it's assessed against the automobile
28. and I assume passed on. I don't know just exactly how that's
29. done. But, they do have a penalty in the Federal law for the
30. purchase of these cars, starting with 1980 model cars, the
31. fuel consumption tax will be levied on the automobile. And I
32. assume that it's...that under that category, they would be able
33. to assess a penalty on the car, yes. Not on the State, but on the car.

1. That's the way they get around some of this stuff.
2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
3. Senator Rhoads.
4. SENATOR RHOADS:
5. Well, like Senator Bloom, I'm beginning to wonder if there
6. might be some sort of constitutional problem here. There's
7. all kinds of case law which suggests that one echelon of
8. government may not tax another echelon of government. The U.S.
9. Government may not tax the State and vice versa. Now, I
10. don't know whether fines would come under that same case law, but
11. I suspect that it would.
12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
13. Further discussion? Senator Nimrod.
14. SENATOR NIMROD:
15. Yeah. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
16. I think that this bill is getting a little bit out of hand.
17. What this really is is the gas guzzler law. The Federal
18. Government has already a restriction on it. And they are the ones
19. that impose the fines. What we're saying is that we shouldn't
20. allow our State agencies to buy cars if they have to pay
21. those Federal fines on. That's all we're saying. And we're
22. saying that they ought to live within that particular law
23. so we don't buy...so we will not pay any fines.
24. That's as simple as the law is.
25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
26. Further discussion? Senator Berning.
27. SENATOR BERNING:
28. Question of the sponsor.
29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
30. Indicates that he will yield. Senator Berning.
31. SENATOR BERNING:
32. What would be the reason, Senator, for exempting units of
33. local government when we have school districts in here
and the State?

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. Senator Knuppel.

3. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

4. I...I assume on the doctrine that they, likewise, will
5. do likewise and that the least government is the best government,
6. that we ought not to be passing these laws onto units of
7. local government, home rule problems. You get into the preemption
8. problem and a lot of other things. I assume that's
9. the reason.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. Senator Berning.

12. SENATOR BERNING:

13. Well, Senator, I understood it was your amendment and I
14. wondered why you felt you should exempt units of local government
15. I'm quite convinced there would be equally as many if not
16. more automobiles on the road in the name of local government than
17. there are in the name of schools or perhaps even the State.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Senator Knuppel.

20. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

21. ...is my amendment and I...and I...that's the reason. I would
22. prefer...I have another piece of legislation in here about mandated
23. programs. I have a kind of a phobia about telling units of local
24. government you have to do this or you don't have to do that. But
25. with...but with school districts, a substantial part of the funding
26. does come through the State Legislature.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Further discussion? Senator Knuppel may close.

29. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

30. Well, I would think that in light of the energy crisis, what's
31. happening with fuel, whether it's enforceable or not-I'm...I
32. have some misgivings myself about how difficult...but someplace
33. along the line, we're going to have to make some sacrifices and we're
going to have to bite the bullet, we're going to have to lay down

1. some rules. We're going to get some rationing whether
2. it's odd number or even numbered days or whatever it is.
3. I think that it sets a good example to say that we, in the State
4. of Illinois, are not going to spend money for noneconomical
5. vehicles. Now, many of the laws that are on the books can't be
6. enforced one hundred percent as Senator Bloom has pointed out.
7. The question is, is conceptually is this a good idea? Does it
8. set a good example, do we have a problem and the answer is yes.
9. It...it dovetails in tongue and grooves with Federal laws and
10. it's something that we ought to be doing. I submit that this is
11. good legislation and solicit a favorable roll call.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

13. The question is shall Senate Bill 450 pass. Those in
14. favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open.
15. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all
16. voted who wish? Take the record. On that question the Ayes
17. are 42, the Nays are 12, none Voting Present. Senate Bill 450
18. having received the required constitutional majority is declared
19. passed. Senate Bill 453, Senator Sangmeister. Read the bill,
20. Mr. Secretary.

21. SECRETARY:

22. Senate Bill 453.

23. (Secretary reads title of bill)

24. 3rd reading of the bill.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

26. Senator Sangmeister.

27. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

28. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. The present
29. law of the State of Illinois is that if you kill someone, you
30. can't inherit from them. What this bill will do is it will expand
31. it to also cover...that is if you kill someone and are convicted
32. of murder, we are now expanding it to voluntary manslaughter
33. as well. Actually, all we're doing is...is...is codifying
what is presently case law. For those of you that are

1. interested in the cases, there was a 1955 case, Bradley versus
2. Fox and there was a 1972 case, Cepo versus State Employees
3. Retirement System wherein the court said that a wrongdoer
4. should not be permitted to enjoy the fruits of his crime
5. whether or not he is technically indicted and convicted of a crime.
6. So, although the common law is there as far as case law and
7. court decisions are concerned, this bill would codify that
8. and put it specifically into that Act that if you're convicted of
9. murder or voluntary manslaughter, that, of course, you can't
10. inherit from the person that you kill. One additional thing
11. we have added in there and that is if you should leave the
12. jurisdiction or die before you are convicted, a court can determine
13. whether or not you should then inherit. The reason being is if
14. someone murders somebody or it's a voluntary manslaughter and
15. then kills himself before they are brought to trial, obviously
16. they still should be eliminated from the possibility of inheritance
17. and that's the reason that we're putting it into the...to the
18. Code rather than leaving it in case law.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

20. Is there discussion? Senator Moore.

21. SENATOR MOORE:

22. Will the...will the Senator yield, please.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. Indicates that he will yield.

25. SENATOR MOORE:

26. Senator Sangmeister, is this the bill that gives the
27. probate judge the authority to determine whether or not someone
28. shall inherit or not inherit irrespective of the fact of a
29. conviction by a judge of the criminal court?

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

31. Senator Sangmeister.

32. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

33. Yes, the...the amendment that was put on the bill states

1. the determination as to whether or not the person intentionally
2. and unjustifiably caused the death of the decedent for purposes of
3. this section shall be made by any court administering
4. or having jurisdiction to administer the estate of the decedent.
5. And presumably that would be the probate court, yes.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

7. Senator Moore.

8. SENATOR MOORE:

9. In speaking to the bill, in all respect to the sponsor, who
10. I have great respect for, I think that we are going a little
11. bit too far with Senate Bill 453 insofar as inheritance is
12. concerned. I, for one, do not want the probate judge of the probate
13. court in my county determining whether or not someone probably
14. killed someone or someone may have done it. I think this is
15. the province of the criminal court. I think that if the criminal
16. court finds someone guilty of murder or manslaughter, whatever
17. it may be, they should not inherit but I think that that
18. decision should be made in the criminal court of my county
19. and not by any probate judge in my county. I think we're extending the
20. law much too further...or much too far. I think this is a bad
21. precedent for us to start setting at this time and I would oppose
22. the passage of Senate Bill 453.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. The following Senators have sought recognition; Senators
25. Netsch, D'Arco, Collins and Berning and Senator Knuppel.

26. Senator Netsch.

27. SENATOR NETSCH:

28. Thank you. I have either a question of the sponsor or a comment.
29. As I understood you, Senator Sangmeister, if someone has
30. murdered, let's say a man has murdered his wife and then dies
31. or commits suicide or whatever, that the estate...he may not take
32. ...be an heir but that is not really the point at that...it
33. seems to me under those circumstances because he...there may well
be children in the family or some other relative who ought to be

1. permitted to inherit at that stage and I don't see any reason to
2. cut off people who may be quite innocent simply because that
3. man himself ought not to be able to inherit when he, in fact,
4. perpetrated the crime against the person. That doesn't make any
5. sense to me. I'll make it a question if you would like to
6. respond.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. Senator Sangmeister.

9. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

10. Well, number one, I think there's some confusion here.
11. If I may take the latitude of just rapidly answering Senator
12. Moore. He's got to understand that a person who is convicted
13. of murder or voluntary manslaughter, you know, there is no
14. further determination by any probate court at that point.
15. We're only talking about those cases where, for example,
16. a person has left the jurisdiction. Now, to answer your
17. question, the law is presently and we have not changed that
18. at all, that that person shall...the estate shall be distributed
19. in the same manner as if the person so convicted or found to have
20. caused the death, died before the decedent. That's the present
21. terminology that's in...in the law as it stands right now.
22. We're not changing that.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. Senator Netsch.

25. SENATOR NETSCH:

26. So you're saying that in my example, the children would be
27. able to inherit the estate, at least in that circumstance.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

29. Senator Sangmeister.

30. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

31. The answer is yes.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. Senator D'Arco. Senator Collins. Senator Berning.

1. SENATOR BERNING:

2. Just one question of the sponsor. If there were a situation
3. where there was no other heir than the individual or
4. individuals and I'm thinking about a case that I recall having
5. read where I believe there was a brother and sister who murdered
6. their parents. Now, if they were the only heirs left then and
7. became ineligible under this to acquire the estate, what would
8. become of that, if there were no other heirs? Have you made
9. provision for disposition of assets in such a case?

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. Senator Sangmeister.

12. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

13. No, we haven't changed the present law. If you say that
14. it's a brother and sister, they murder their parents and they
15. have absolutely no other heirs, the...just the way the law is
16. now, under succession, paragraph eleven, I presume it would
17. escheat to the State of Illinois.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Senator Berning. Further discussion? Senator Knuppel.

20. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

21. Well, my question probably has to do with a bill we passed
22. yesterday more than it does this bill because I understand
23. what this bill tries to do, but what if the people decide
24. they want to settle the estate, the son and daughter that we're
25. talking about that they want to settle the estate without
26. the necessity of going through probate as under Senator Rock's
27. bill? Now, me and my sister killed my mom and dad and there's
28. no other heirs and we decide we want to settle this up outside
29. the probate court, who has standing then and...and does anybody
30. have standing to force some kind of a settlement in court?

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

32. Senator Sangmeister.

33. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

Senator Knuppel, I...as I understand your question, the way the

1. ...the bill and the amendment is so drafted, that determination
2. would be left to the probate court, but I'm not quite sure I
3. understand the factual situation because the law, as I explained
4. to Senator Netsch, is presently that if you murder someone,
5. the estate is to be distributed in the same manner as if the person
6. who committed the murder died before the decedent, so the next
7. people in line, if there are heirs, would come right into that
8. line and it wouldn't change that if I'm getting to your question.
9. I'm not sure I am.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. Senator Knuppel.

12. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

13. As I've said, I don't know how these two sections fit
14. together and what authority anybody would have, I can understand
15. it if there's another child and the other child comes into the
16. probate court and petitions to have an administration as opposed
17. to a settlement without it. But what if these two people decide
18. that they're going to do this thing nice and cozy without going
19. into probate court? And then does the State of Illinois...is
20. that what you're telling me, the State of Illinois is going
21. to watch everyone of these situations to find out whether there
22. is or isn't any heirs and come in and force...in other words,
23. what I'm saying is the bill that passed yesterday may
24. completely vitiate what you intend to do with this bill.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

26. Senator Sangmeister.

27. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

28. Well, frankly, you can't, when you're presenting
29. legislation tied into every bill that's going through the
30. General Assembly as to what its affect may be on a bill that
31. passed yesterday, not being that thoroughly familiar with
32. the new administration of estates or small estates, however
33. that bill is worded. I don't see where there's any problem
or any conflict with this bill at all because simply if...if they

1. are the next survivors in line, they don't have to go into
2. probate court, they can resolve the matter among themselves.
3. But if there's a question as to whether or not the person died
4. without justification or it might have been a murder or
5. voluntary manslaughter, then, at that point, if there's
6. been no conviction of the person who did it, the probate court
7. would take that into consideration and have to make that
8. determination.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. Is there further discussion? Any further discussion?
11. Senator Sangmeister may close if he wishes.

12. SENATOR SANGMEISTER: .

13. Well, I understand this is a subject that does get
14. a little complicated. However, I can assure the Body that
15. all we are attempting to as I originally stated and that
16. is put the common law principles that a wrongdoer should not
17. be permitted to enjoy the fruits of his crime putting that
18. into the statutory language and that's all we're doing and I
19. would request a favorable roll.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

21. The question is shall Senate Bill 453 pass. Those in
22. favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open.
23. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the
24. record. On that question the Ayes are 22, the Nays are 24,
25. 2 Voting Present. Senate Bill 453 having failed to receive
26. the constitutional majority is declared lost.

27. Senate Bill 454, Senator Sangmeister. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Senate Bill 454.

30. (Secretary reads title of bill)

31. 3rd reading of the bill.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. Senator Sangmeister.

1. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

2. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate.
3. Presently under the School Code, Section 24-11, there is
4. established a probationary period of two consecutive school
5. terms before a certified teacher can enter upon tenure
6. status. What the Code does not do is define what constitutes
7. a complete term. This bill will do that. We originally had
8. a date of January 1st. We were in Senator Berman's Education
9. Committee at which point the representatives for the school
10. board was there and for the teachers and it was worked
11. out a compromise date that the term would begin as of November
12. 1st and on that basis, everyone was satisfied. The bill
13. came out of committee eleven to nothing and I know of no
14. opposition to the bill. Request a favorable roll.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

16. The question is shall Senate Bill 454 pass. Those
17. in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open.
18. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all
19. voted who wish? Take the record. On that question the Ayes
20. are 26, the Nays are 14. Senator Sangmeister.

21. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

22. Place that on postponed, please.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. The bill will be placed on the Order of Postponed Consideration.
25. Senate Bill 455, Senator Grotberg. Read the bill, Mr.
26. Secretary.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Senate Bill 455.

29. (Secretary reads title of bill)

30. 3rd reading of the bill.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

32. Senator Grotberg.

33. SENATOR GROTBORG:

1. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. First,
2. I would like leave to add Senator Mitchler as a cosponsor of
3. this bill that has its origins in our Kendall County.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

5. Well, if he will so inform the Secretary in writing that
6. will be done.

7. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

8. Thank you. We have, in the State of Illinois,
9. a provision with the Bureau of Mines and Minerals whereby they
10. are the permitting body for aggregate mining. We have amended
11. this bill so that the EPA section is out of it entirely and
12. we're now dealing only with the Bureau of Mines and Minerals
13. and they are in agreement with this amendment that notwithstanding
14. any other provisions, every municipality, county and township
15. has the power to regulate and restrict the location of any
16. sand, gravel, limestone and other nonorganic mineral
17. mining operations excluding fossil fuel. So, that we're getting
18. down to the gravel pits bill. It's been a matter of contention
19. for some time and EPA is only interested in the air and water
20. qualities and they have to get their permits to operate these
21. things from them. But as far as zoning is concerned, this would
22. let the municipality zoning prevail over the Bureau of Mines
23. and Minerals. I know of no objection to the bill at this point
24. in time. I'd be glad to help answer any questions.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

26. Any further discussion? Question is shall Senate Bill 455
27. pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting
28. is open. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On
29. that question the Ayes are 48, the Nays are 3, 1 Voting Present.
30. Senate Bill 455 having received a constitutional majority is
31. declared passed. Senate Bill 458, Senator Vadalabene. Read the bill,
32. Mr. Secretary.

33. SECRETARY:

Senate Bill 458.

1. (Secretary reads title of bill)
2. 3rd reading of the bill.
3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
4. Senator Vadalabene.
5. SENATOR VADALABENE:
6. Yes, this is a commission bill, Senate Bill 458, and under
7. this proposal, auto carriers would have an extension of three
8. feet in the front and less than four feet in the rear in
9. length limitation is overhang. Now, wait a minute, now.
10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
11. May we have some order, please. Senator Vadalabene is
12. recognized.
13. SENATOR VADALABENE:
14. Yes, I was rudely interrupted, Mr. President and members
15. of the...
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
17. Senator Vadalabene.
18. SENATOR VADALABENE:
19. Yes, I would like to go further with the explanation
20. then I know it will be clearer to everyone.
21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
22. Proceed.
23. SENATOR VADALABENE:
24. When this legislation was proposed initially, the question
25. was the safety and if you recall, I was the sponsor of that
26. legislation two years ago. Now, pursuant to a House Resolution
27. in the last Session, the Department of Transportation, the
28. Department of Transportation was authorized to issue permits
29. for this type of operation and was to accumulate data to
30. ascertain whether auto carriers with the overhang were safe
31. upon the Illinois highways. As of March 1st, 1979, the
32. cumulative totals indicated that there were three thousand three
33. hundred and fifty-nine trips in Illinois with the overhang
permits for a total mileage of eight hundred and seventeen thousand

1. four hundred and six miles. This is to further report that there
2. were no accidents related to or involving auto carrier overhang
3. during this period. It is a conservation measure, thus it is
4. safe to assume that it can be operated safely on the Illinois
5. highways and I would appreciate a favorable vote.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

7. Is there discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill
8. 458 pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote
9. Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all
10. voted who wish? Take the record. On that question the Ayes
11. are 13, the Nays are 12, 3 Voting Present. Senator Vadalabene
12. is recognized.

13. SENATOR VADALABENE:

14. Yes, Senator Rhoads suggested I put that on postponed
15. consideration. However, I just wanted to know, was that a good
16. presentation or not?

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

18. Senator, it was excellent. You...you...you've got them
19. down to a tie. Senator Vadalabene.

20. SENATOR VADALABENE:

21. Yes, thank you very much. That's all I wanted to know.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. On that...on that question there were 13 Yeas, 12 Nays,
24. 3 Voting Present. The bill having failed to receive a constitutional
25. majority is declared lost. Senator Coffey on 459. Senate Bill
26. 461, Senator Vadalabene. Registration. Quarterly registration.
27. Shall we read it, Senator? Senator Vadalabene. Read the bill,
28. Mr. Secretary.

29. SECRETARY:

30. Senate Bill 461.

31. (Secretary reads title of bill)

32. 3rd reading of the bill.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

Senator Vadalabene.

1. SENATOR VADALABENE:

2. Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate.

3. Briefly, Senate Bill 461, again, is the Motor Vehicle Laws
4. Commission bill and it provides for quarterly registration
5. of newly acquired second division vehicles and repeals the
6. semi-annual reduction fees for second division vehicles under
7. apportionment. I would appreciate a favorable vote.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

9. Is there discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill 461
10. pass. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting
11. is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?
12. Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 31, the Nays
13. are 15, 1 Voting Present. Senate Bill 461 having received
14. the required constitutional majority is declared passed.

15. Senate Bill 463, Senator Weaver. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary,
16. please.

17. SECRETARY:

18. Senate Bill 463.

19. (Secretary reads title of bill)

20. 3rd reading of the bill.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator Weaver.

23. SENATOR WEAVER:

24. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. This does
25. exactly as the Calendar states. It increases the maximum
26. additional corporate tax rate for park districts from five cents
27. to twenty-five cents after successful referendum. It's a front
28. door referendum, if they want to increase the taxes. Appreciate
29. a favorable roll call.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Is there any discussion? If not, the question is shall Senate
32. Bill 463 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will
33. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have
all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 51,

11. SENATOR MERLO:
12. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. The bill
13. would remedy a situation where a condominium owner makes major
14. improvements or betterments in his apartment. Presently, owners
15. who have made costly improvements have been unable to secure
16. insurance coverment...coverage for these betterments through
17. their condominium association which, incidently, has the responsibility
18. of securing insurance for each and every unit in the complex.

28. are 53, the Nays are 1, none Voting Present. Senate Bill 467
29. having received a constitutional majority is declared passed.
30. 468. On the Order of Senate Bills, 3rd reading, Senate Bill 468.
31. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.
32. SECRETARY:
33. Senate Bill 468.
- (Secretary reads title of bill)

1. 3rd reading of the bill.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Daley.

4. SENATOR DALEY:

5. Mr. President and fellow Senators. This bill allows the
6. taxpayer to request on...have the Director of Revenue to place
7. on heavy income tax form whether or not you want to receive
8. a ten day notification when the Federal Government or
9. other State Governments request any information off your
10. income tax forms. Also, it allows the taxpayers to pick up
11. the reasonable cost as the Director states...so. And this is a
12. bill that's greatly needed. The Federal Government allows us...
13. did not allow us to look at their Federal income tax returns.
14. This would protect any type of returns that you are...you
15. are filed as an individual or as a corporation. I would ask
16. for a favorable roll call.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Is there any discussion? Senator McMillan.

19. SENATOR McMILLAN:

20. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I would rise in
21. opposition to Senate Bill 468. One of the provisions which enables
22. us to have a State income tax which is reasonably inexpensive
23. to run and makes it reasonably simple for us to deal with
24. because it's consistent with the Federal tax system is an
25. agreement which the State of Illinois has with the Federal
26. Government, a cooperative agreement in which we have access
27. to Federal IRS information and vice versa in order to provide
28. some leverage for honesty and in order...some leverage for
29. enforcement. As nearly as...as we can tell, this provision
30. which I know many taxpayers would like, is a provision which
31. would nullify our agreement with the IRS and therefore, nullify
32. the agreement with...which we have which gives us a greater
33. degree of enforcement of the income tax. I know that it's well
intended and we've discussed it in detail in committee but I do believe

1. it would endanger our agreement with the Federal Government which
2. does allow us to enforce our income tax.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Further discussion? Senator Knuppel.

5. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

6. I think this is good legislation. I think anyone is
7. entitled to know the confidence...the confidential nature
8. on income tax information belongs to the party the same as
9. confidential communications by client to an attorney or a
10. patient to a doctor. That confidentiality does not belong to
11. the State or Federal Government and we should never lose sight
12. of the fact that in this country the individual is still the most
13. important item in paying that tax and the protection of that
14. confidence is his and if it's to be violated, he should know about
15. it.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Is there any further discussion? Senator Daley may close
18. the debate.

19. SENATOR DALEY:

20. Mr. President and fellow Senators. First of all in regards
21. to Senator McMillan's comments, once you file your taxes, you cannot
22. change them. You, as a corporation or as an individual, you
23. cannot come down to Springfield and have someone change anything
24. that you have filed. If it's so, I'd like to know how we can do it.
25. It's against the law. Once you file your sales tax, your income
26. tax, anything that's filed in Springfield, you cannot change it
27. unless someone has some reason how they can do it, we all would like
28. to know. Secondly, we allow the taxpayer, it's not mandated
29. upon the taxpayer, the taxpayer must fill out a form to allow
30. the director to give a notice and secondly, in regards to the
31. contract we have with the Federal Government, this will not terminate
32. the contract. We've been through this with the Federal Government.
33. Again they tell us, if we do it, we mandate it. This is not
mandated. It's optional with the taxpayer. This is a good bill.

1. It protects the...your records that you file with the State.
2. The reason why we need it is because the IRS disseminates
3. all this information in the Federal bureaucracy. We have
4. seen it with the Watergate problem where the IRS gave
5. it to all the various commissions and individuals
6. in the Federal Government. This is to protect your records, your
7. State records and they're not Federal records.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. The question is shall Senate Bill 468 pass. Those in
10. favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is
11. open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take
12. the record. On that question the Ayes are 45, the Nays are
13. 7, none Voting Present. Senate Bill 468 having received a constitutional
14. majority is declared passed. 473, Senator Daley. On the Order
15. of Senate Bills 3rd reading, Senate Bill 473. Read the bill,
16. Mr. Secretary.

17. SECRETARY:

18. Senate Bill 473.

19. (Secretary reads title of bill)

20. 3rd reading of the bill.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator Daley.

23. SENATOR DALEY:

24. Mr. President and fellow Senators. This is a Legislative
25. Reference Bureau bill in regards to changing terminology from the
26. old law to the new law that we passed a new Mental Health Code.
27. I'd ask for a favorable roll call.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Is there any discussion? If not, the question is shall Senate
30. Bill 473 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will
31. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
32. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question the
33. Ayes are 57, the Nays are none, none Voting Present. Senate Bill
473 having received a constitutional majority is declared passed.

1. 474, Senator Berman. On the Order of Senate Bills, 3rd reading,
2. Senate Bill 474. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

3. SECRETARY:

4. Senate Bill 474.

5. (Secretary reads title of bill)

6. 3rd reading of the bill.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Berman.

9. SENATOR BERMAN:

10. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen...Ladies
11. and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 474 is an attempt
12. to bring a greater degree of efficiency and objectivity
13. to the due process hearings that are involved in the Administrative
14. Procedures Act. As you all recall a couple of years ago,
15. we passed the Administrative Procedures Act that sets out
16. guidelines for hearings in agencies of the State where there is
17. a contest between the taxpayer or regulated person and the agency.
18. One of the provisions in the existing law allows the hearing
19. officer who hears these cases and is an employee of the agency to
20. discuss in an ex parte manner the findings of the...of the hearing
21. officer with other members of the agency. Now, the reason
22. for Senate Bill 474 is to strike that language and allow
23. the hearing officer to base his decision upon the evidence that's
24. been introduced in the record at the hearing. Otherwise, we're
25. just wasting our time in allowing the hearing officer to go through
26. a perfunctory procedure, then he goes back to the department
27. and does what the department wants rather than what the record
28. shows. This will cut down on appeals to the...through the
29. Administrative Review Act. It will give a greater substance
30. and judicial demeanor to the hearing officer. It will require them
31. to act more like judges than as errand boys for each of the agencies.
32. So, I would ask for a favorable vote on Senate Bill 474.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Is there any discussion? Senator Knuppel.

2. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

3. Well, I'm amazed 'cause to compare this to judges, I
4. don't know any judges that don't discuss their decision. Most
5. of your Federal judges have law clerks. We all know that the
6. Supreme Court...Supreme Court members of the United States
7. have law clerks who assist them in making these decisions.
8. I don't know any reason that a person who is uninformed
9. is a certain area shouldn't have available to him before
10. making decisions. Many times technical advice from engineers
11. or others. I...I think that it...that it would be hideous
12. and wrong to say that somebody could not refer to technical
13. assistance so that he comes up with the right decision.
14. We do have an Administrative Review Act which says that the
15. decision must be based on at least substantial evidence or it will
16. be reversed and deprived hearing officers. I think instead of
17. making more correct decisions, we will end up with more
18. incorrect decisions because the person does not have access
19. to that type of expertise that he ought to have and as I say,
20. I don't know any judge, any lawyer or anybody else that is worth
21. his salt who knows all there is to know. One time a county
22. commissioner, a farmer wanted to run for county commissioner
23. in my county and I went and tried to talk him into running.
24. He said, I don't know anything about county government. I'll
25. have to ask other people. I said as long as you will remember
26. that you'll probably make the best damn commissioner we ever had.
27. The trouble is those people, and we were talking about road
28. commissioners this morning, are people who don't listen to
29. other people. I think that it's good that they do. I think they
30. should have access to technical advice, legal advice and otherwise
31. in order to render correct decision, I think this is poor, in
32. fact, bad legislation.

33. PRESIDENT:

Further discussion? Senator Graham.

1. SENATOR GRAHAM:

2. Mr. President and members of the Senate. When this bill was
3. heard in Executive Committee, I think I should express the feeling
4. that was presented to us at that time. The opposition to the bill
5. was the Department of Revenue and Department of Administrative
6. Services. They felt that by setting up this ex parte communications
7. with the hearing examiner, and then communicating with the
8. agency that perhaps the...the person being involved on the other
9. side was not getting a fair shake. They're worried about this
10. type of legislation and they so indicated in the committee hearing.
11. And it emerged from the committee with a vote of 5 to 4.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Is there any further discussion? Senator Berman may close the
14. debate,

15. SENATOR BERMAN:

16. In response to Senator Knuppel, I think that he would be
17. rather disturbed if after he presented a case, the judge
18. communicated with his opponent outside of his presence.
19. Well, if they do it everyday, they're...they're contrary to the
20. law and contrary to the rules of ethics of the judicial...of the
21. judiciary. But that is exactly what is happening here. In
22. these agencies, taxpayers have a disagreement with...with an agency.
23. We have set up a procedure for hearings in these agencies before
24. hearing examiners. The department comes in and presents its
25. case, the taxpayer presents his case. If we do not pass this bill,
26. what has been happening is after all the proof is in, the hearing
27. examiner goes to the opposition, to the agency and gets directions,
28. not just advice or...or counsel, but directions as to how they
29. are to rule on that case. By eliminating that language and
30. let me quote exactly the language that's being...that's being
31. deleted by this bill, "however an agency member may communicate
32. with other members of the agency, and an agency member or hearing
33. examiner, may have the aid and advice or one or more personnel...
personal assistance." All of those people should be involved if they are

1. relevant in the hearing where they can be either cross examined,
2. where their expertise can be questioned by the taxpayer, other-
3. wise all we're doing is wasting our time. This bill will cut
4. down appeals through the Administrative Review Act, cut down
5. the amount of litigation. Everything should be out in the open
6. at the hearing. Let the hearing officer make the decision
7. based upon the record, not after the hearing has closed, discuss
8. the merits of the case with his supervisors or with his employers.
9. Let it be a straight up, due process type of procedure. Give the
10. taxpayer a break and give a vote for Senate Bill 474.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Question is shall Senate Bill 474 pass. Those in favor
13. will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open.
14. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the
15. record. Sponsor has requested that further consideration
16. of Senate Bill 474 be postponed. So ordered. 476, Senator Martin.
17. On the Order of Senate Bills, 3rd reading, Senate Bill 476.
18. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

19. ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. FERNANDES)

20. Senate Bill 476.

21. (Secretary reads title of bill)

22. 3rd reading of the bill.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Martin.

25. SENATOR MARTIN:

26. When the Uniform Disposition of Unclaimed Property Act was
27. passed, certificates of deposit were not in common usage.
28. Since more and more people are investing in this form,
29. this brings this whole category into the Act and makes sure that
30. the State will not move in on people until an appropriate time
31. has passed seven years after maturity. It has the support
32. of both the institutions that are involved, the department that
33. is involved, but most importantly, it will protect those people,
the consumers who invest in this and I ask your support.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Is there any discussion? Senator Wooten.

3. SENATOR WOOTEN:

4. Just to be sure, you said seven years. You mean fifteen
5. do you not?

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Martin.

8. SENATOR MARTIN:

9. After maturity, seven years.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Wooten.

12. SENATOR WOOTEN:

13. I was not sure that was the substance of Amendment No. 1.
14. See the amendment...my understanding is the amendment makes it
15. fifteen years from the date of maturity. Yeah, seven years is just
16. too short. You know, that's why I felt sure that the
17. amendment that was requested in committee was fifteen
18. for maturity.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Senator Martin.

21. SENATOR MARTIN:

22. I think perhaps I can clarify this for you. The
23. original bill read fifteen from the year of issuance and we
24. discovered that that did not afford enough protection. Seven
25. years from the date of maturity which was explained in committee,
26. gives the holder of such a certificate far more protection,
27. and that was why it was done, to give more protection to the holder
28. of the certificate and that is accurate.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Wooten.

31. SENATOR WOOTEN:

32. Well, I don't have a copy of the amendment. Our analysis
33. of the amendment says that if no action has been taken on
the certificates for a period of fifteen years from the date of maturity.

1. If you're telling me that's in error, then I want to change
2. the way I'm going to vote on the bill. But I don't have a copy
3. of the amendment.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Knuppel.

6. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

7. Well, I just feel totally and wholly for lo, these many
8. years we had a law in the State of Illinois that it...you had
9. to have disappeared for at least seven years to be presumed
10. dead and to say that immediately after that, if a person
11. disappeared two days before maturity, so to speak, I think
12. it's too harsh. I...I feel that if it were the way the
13. synopsis we have from our staff says, that it was fifteen
14. years from maturity, that I could buy that, but I still believe
15. that this is another way of taking money out of somebody's
16. pocket by the government and that it ought damn well to be sufficient
17. length of time for somebody...before somebody takes it out and
18. I can't buy seven years. I'm sorry, Senator, but if it were
19. fifteen, if that's what the amendment says, I can support that.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Further discussion? Senator Grotberg.

22. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

23. Question of the sponsor.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Indicates she will yield. Senator Grotberg.

26. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

27. What is the abandonment period now, Senator?

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Martin.

30. SENATOR MARTIN:

31. Well, that's the problem. In a way there really isn't one
32. and so as the joint sponsor of the bill will attest, the State
33. was moving in in areas and the consumer had no protection and so
the intent of this bill and the idea for it quite frankly, came

1. from Senator Shapiro, because it happened to him, was
2. to protect the consumer, so those who are opposed to it and
3. want fifteen, you know, amend it that way in the House
4. but right now the consumer is not protected.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Grotberg.

7. SENATOR GROTBORG:

8. I made careful note of the sponsorship of this bill,
9. Senator, I want you to know that, but I would ask you in your...in
10. your explanation, you said you're protecting the consumer and
11. I don't know that taking his money away after seven years is
12. a kind of a protection.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Further discussion? Senator DeAngelis.

15. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

16. Will the sponsor yield for a question?

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Indicates she will yield. Senator DeAngelis.

19. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

20. Senator Martin, what do you mean by show no interest in
21. or indicates no interest in it?

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Martin.

24. SENATOR MARTIN:

25. Well, I believe that is a fairly technical term and I...
26. I make no...I'm not an expert, but under existing law, people
27. have to show and...common withdraw, there has to be activity in
28. the account and one of the reasons people buy C.D.'s is so
29. they don't have to have any activity. They can just buy it and
30. leave it if they want to.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Senator DeAngelis.

33. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

Well, it's common procedure in most banks that any items

1. that are in certificate of deposit, if not renewed, would
2. automatically go into a passbook savings account. Now, in
3. sliding into that category, are you indicating there's
4. no interest?

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End of reel.

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1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Martin.

3. SENATOR MARTIN:

4. I didn't even understand the question.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator DeAngelis.

7. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

8. It is a customary procedure in most banks. That whenever
9. somebody's CD is not renewed that the money is put into a
10. passbook savings account. It slides into that account. It
11. goes from the higher level of interest to the normal rate of
12. savings account interest. Now, this can be done automatically.
13. In fact it is done automatically. Does this indicate that there's
14. no interest on the part of the holder?

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Martin.

17. SENATOR MARTIN:

18. I don't...I hear what you are saying, but I just don't
19. know anything about it.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator DeAngelis.

22. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

23. Well...I...I'm really interested in what interest is because
24. quite frequently people put money in an account in the name of
25. their children and just leave the money there for long periods
26. of time letting the interest accrue on it.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Further discussion? Senator Bruce.

29. SENATOR BRUCE:

30. I just...Amendment No. 1, Senator Martin, as I understand it,
31. that for determining the period of time that is...when the statute
32. is going to run is from the initial expiration without regard
33. to any automatic extensions, that is correct. Well if you add

1. a six year CD and...and or a seven year...sixty is what I...
2. and you showed no interest...this is a trustee, for example,
3. of a large bank. You put it for a...a ward or guardian, you
4. put it on deposit, you show no interest at all. Six years,
5. in a contract itself with a bank, it's renewable, you wait
6. around, it's renewed again. The first thing you know, it
7. is expired, seven years is gone and you've got a six year
8. note, six year CD. What...what do you do in a situation
9. like that where you have a seven year CD?

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Martin.

12. SENATOR MARTIN:

13. Trusts are exempt.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Bruce.

16. SENATOR BRUCE:

17. All trust instruments, any time you have...that doesn't seem
18. to make a great deal of sense. You...you're telling me that if
19. I go down and deposit and get an eight year certificate of deposit
20. and don't do anything, seven years from the date of expiration
21. the State of Illinois comes in and takes it. If I put it in
22. trust for my daughter and I do nothing and leave it there for
23. two hundred years and show no interest at all, it...it continues
24. to be in the ownership of me as trustee for my daughter. Now
25. that just seems to make not a great deal of sense.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Martin.

28. SENATOR MARTIN:

29. I'm not sure I'm telling you that, that's what the Depart-
30. ment of Financial Institutions says is so and the way they handle
31. the case. I'm not going to argue if that's fair or makes sense.
32. Government regulations...I don't know that making sense has
33. ever been necessarily a part of them, but that is the fact of the...

1. of the...the state of the art in Illinois.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Any further discussion? Senator Bloom.

4. SENATOR BLOOM:

5. Well I rise in support of this. As you know under present...
6. present Escheat Law, under the jurisdiction of Financial Institu-
7. tions, if there has been no activity in account or if various
8. property has not been claimed after seven years, I'm sure
9. you've gotten those print outs saying here's the last known
10. address of people who allegedly having property in your district,
11. it goes to the State. The amendment merely says, after the
12. maturity of the instrument, certificate of deposit, you got
13. seven years, just like the rest of the law. And it was designed
14. to address the problem where you had eight, nine, ten year CD's.
15. It's that simple and I'd urge all members on this side of the
16. aisle and on the other side of the aisle to support it. Thank
17. you.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Is there any further discussion? Senator Martin may close
20. the debate.

21. SENATOR MARTIN:

22. Well, it seemed like a reasonable idea to me. If you really
23. don't like it, I guess you vote against it and I think it sounds
24. good. I'd vote for it. Please do.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senate Bill...the question is shall Senate Bill 476 pass.
27. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay.
28. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
29. who wish? Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 28,
30. the Nays are 19, 5 Voting Present. Senate Bill 476 having
31. failed to receive a constitutional majority is declared lost.
32. 479, Senator Regner. On the Order of Senate Bills 3rd reading,
33. bottom of page 20, Senate Bill 479. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

1. SECRETARY:

2. Senate Bill 479.

3. (Secretary reads title of bill)

4. 3rd reading of the bill.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Regner.

7. SENATOR REGNER:

8. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate. This a bill
9. proposed by the Joint Committee Administrative Rules to implement
10. something the agency, the Department of Revenue, has been doing
11. by their own rules and regulations. What it does, it authorizes
12. the Department of Revenue to make daily tax collections at the
13. Illinois State Fair's, Art shows, flea markets, et cetera. When
14. the department believes there's a significant loss of revenue
15. because of a large number of out of state retailers. What
16. happens in many of these cases, people come in, set up shop
17. for one day or two days or a week even and leave the State prior
18. to filing their State Income...State Sales Tax Forms and con-
19. sequently the State does lose revenue by it. And ask a favorable
20. roll call.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Is there any discussion? Senator Donnewald.

23. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

24. Senator Regner, what's the yours or the department's best
25. estimate in...in revenue's assuming this bill does become law.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Regner.

28. SENATOR REGNER:

29. Senator Donnewald, I did ask the department and they did
30. not have an estimate they said at this time because they just
31. weren't sure how much was being lost at the various fairs and
32. that. So I don't have a number.

33. PRESIDENT:

34. Senator Donnewald.

1. SENATOR DONNEWALD:
2. Well, the reason I asked, I...I would hope that this
3. replaces a good portion of Revenue so that we can redivert
4. back to the Motor Fuel Tax Fund.
5. PRESIDENT:
6. Any further discussion? Senator Grotberg.
7. SENATOR GROTBORG:
8. Question of the sponsor.
9. PRESIDENT:
10. Senator Grotberg.
11. SENATOR GROTBORG:
12. Similar events means our local flea market, the Lion's
13. Club Street Sale, the Geneva Swedish Days, is that correct?
14. And every public event that has made America such a great
15. place to live, right?
16. PRESIDENT:
17. Senator Regner.
18. SENATOR REGNER:
19. That's great and it's right.
20. PRESIDENT:
21. Any further discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill
22. 479 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will
23. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have
24. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question the
25. Ayes are 50, the Nays are 2, none Voting Present. Senate Bill
26. 479 having received a constitutional majority is declared
27. passed. 481, Senator Regner. On the Order of Senate Bills 3rd
28. reading, top of page 21, Senate Bill 481. Read the bill, Mr.
29. Secretary.
30. SECRETARY:
31. Senate Bill 481.
32. (Secretary reads title of bill)
33. 3rd reading of the bill.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. We have only thirty minutes to go, let's...you can make
3. it thirty-five if you really want to. Senator Regner.

4. SENATOR REGNER:

5. Did you read the bill?

6. PRESIDENT:

7. The bill has been read, yes sir.

8. SENATOR REGNER:

9. Mr. President and members, again this is a proposal...from
10. the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules. It's regarding
11. the Department of Law Enforcement and what it does, it specifies
12. in...clearly specifies an individuals right to access in review
13. of his criminal record. The information specifically allows
14. the Department of Law Enforcement to release information to
15. other agencies when required by another State Statute. This
16. is something they asked for by their own departmental rule
17. and it was decided by the joint committee that it should be
18. statutory authority rather than just agency rules.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Is there any discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill
21. 481 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will
22. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
23. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question
24. the Ayes are 38, Nays are 9, none Voting Present. Senate Bill
25. 481, having received a constitutional majority is declared passed.
26. 482, Senator Regner. On the Order of Senate Bills 3rd reading,
27. Senate Bill 482. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Senate Bill 482.

30. (Secretary reads title of bill)

31. 3rd reading of the bill.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator Regner.

1. SENATOR REGNER:

2. Mr. President, members, this also is a bill proposed by
3. the Joint Committee Administrative Rules. The legislation
4. clarifies the statutory language regarding the scope of
5. coverage of the special records privacy provisions of the
6. Department of Children and Family Services. And it specifically
7. excludes from coverage persons who apply for services and
8. persons subject to licensing by the department. The depart-
9. ment did have some problems with the bill as originally presented.
10. They did propose an amendment which was adopted and it took away
11. their objection. And I ask for a favorable roll call.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Is there any discussion? Senator Hall.

14. SENATOR HALL:

15. Will the sponsor yield to a question?

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Indicates he will yield, Senator Hall.

18. SENATOR HALL:

19. Senator, there are certain records you say that will be
20. excluded from confidentiality. Could you tell me just what
21. you have reference to there, when you say certain records,
22. what will that be?

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Regner.

25. SENATOR REGNER:

26. Senator Hall, this reading from the bill says this section
27. does not apply to department's fiscal records. Other records
28. of a purely administrative nature. Records concerning persons
29. applying for but not receiving department services or any forms,
30. documents or other records...concerning persons or a facility
31. subject to licensing by the department.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator Hall.

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1. SENATOR HALL:

2. I just wanted to find out what he...

3. PRESIDENT:

4. All right. Any further discussion? If not, the question...

5. Senator Bruce. Senator Bruce.

6. SENATOR BRUCE:

7. Just reading this over very quickly, Senator, I'm trying
8. to figure out exactly where a...a court proceeding in which
9. the...the Juvènile Court Act is involved in which the Depart-
10. ment of Children and Family Services becomes interested also
11. in neglected and dependent children where there's a court
12. hearing and some of those documents are not privileged...are
13. privileged. I'm not sure that this doesn't open up that
14. whole case work.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Regner.

17. SENATOR REGNER:

18. Senator Bruce, without...or what I suggest we do, I'll
19. take it out of the record and I will get an answer from the
20. department because they are doing this by departmental rule
21. right now. So, we'll...pull it out of the record, Mr. President.
22. We'll get the records from the department.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Take it out of the record, Mr. Secretary. 491, Senator
25. Davidson. On the Order of Senate Bills 3rd reading, Senate
26. Bill 491. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Senate Bill 491.

29. (Secretary reads title of bill)

30. 3rd reading of the bill.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Senator Davidson.

33. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

1. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate. 491 came
2. out of the public hearings of the School Problems Commission
3. of school districts who asked for an option to be able to
4. change their starting date on a birthday back to September 1st.
5. The evidence presented by them and by the two clinical psychologist's
6. who've done the research from Illinois State University
7. of the learning difficulties for students from birthdays
8. that entered between September 1 and December 1 following
9. through school was very substantial. I objected to a mandatory
10. date, asked for optional because many school districts should
11. have that right to make the decision on their own because
12. it also impacts on their School Aid Formula. There was, at the
13. request of the School Board Association an amendatory amendment
14. put on to make the effective date July 1, 1980 so it would
15. not be effective in the middle of a school year. Came out
16. of committee of Elementary, Secondary Ed, 11 to nothing.
17. Appreciate a favorable roll call.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Is there any discussion? Yes, I...I see the lights, that's
20. all I'm asking. Senator McMillan.

21. SENATOR McMILLAN:

22. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I hate to object
23. to my...with my seatmate and I have a sneaking suspicion that
24. he likes this bill because his birthday was on August 6th and
25. I...August 31st, and I happen to dislike it because mine was
26. after the 1st of September. But I well remember two years
27. ago when the bill came in to make this mandatory, it came in
28. slowly and quietly out of the blue with no objection and then
29. when we finally realized what we were doing, we defeated it
30. quite handily. I think the bill has a number of problems
31. connected with it because what you're doing is allowing some
32. schools to say that...that kids can't start to school in the
33. first grade if their birthday comes after the 1st of September.

1. I can see several problems, usually I would leave things up
2. to the local schools, but I think this could cause problems.
3. For instance, a student could start in the first grade in one
4. Illinois school, move to another community in October and he
5. suddenly wouldn't be eligible to go...go to school there.
6. Number two, we've had all kinds of...of talk and rhetoric in
7. this Body about the drinking age and what we're really doing
8. is providing a law which ultimately will put a...a large
9. number of older kids into the school system and if you're
10. concerned about drinking in the schools, this is going to
11. get them much closer to the 19 year age. We have a lot of
12. students that are very able to start school if their birthday
13. happens to come right after the 1st of...of September. And
14. this would allow some school systems to prohibit that, this
15. would allow some school systems from time to time, if they
16. happen to be in a tight financial crunch to eliminate one
17. section of 1st graders, which they could do arbitrarily one year or
18. not. I...I really think that in...that this is the kind of
19. a law that ought to...that ought to apply state-wide and I
20. really think that a couple of clinical psychologists recommen-
21. dation that we suddenly allow the prohibition of students to
22. start to school at age 6 just because they don't become six
23. till the 1st of December. It is not a wise change.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Further discussion? Senator Rhoads.

26. SENATOR RHOADS:

27. Question of the sponsor, if he will yield.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Indicates he will yield. Senator Rhoads.

30. SENATOR RHOADS:

31. Senator Davidson, this allows the local board the option
32. of rolling back from December 1 to September 1, is that correct?

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Davidson.

2. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

3. That's correct.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Rhoads.

6. SENATOR RHOADS:

7. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I'd
8. like to rise in support of this bill. I think it's a long
9. overdue reform that is needed. For Senator McMillan's infor-
10. mation, my birthday was December 3rd, I was trapped. But in
11. Cook County, in particular, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,
12. we have a differential between parochial schools and public
13. schools, such that those students who are allowed to enter
14. the first grade at the parochial schools made do so at an
15. earlier time. Some parents who feel very strongly about this
16. have even entered their children in first grade in a parochial
17. school only to transfer them in the second year. I think this
18. is a...a very necessary bill, a good bill and urge its adoption.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Further discussion? Senator Knuppel.

21. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

22. Well, if I understand the bill as explained, it leaves
23. it optional. It...it doesn't set September the 1st and that's
24. wherein lies the tragedy. If it was a fixed time with the
25. mobile society we have that would be all right. But what
26. happens is in one school district they could fix it up until
27. January the 1st, I assume, maybe even later than that. And
28. in another school district, they can move it back till September
29. the 1st. And I say God pity the rest of the class if you've
30. got a bright youngster that's held back. Now, I've experienced
31. this in my own family and I'm going to vote No because...because
32. of that reason. I had a...a daughter that was denied access to
33. the school because she was born in December, we moved from one

1. district to another and she was a year behind the rest of the
2. kids and she clobbered the hell out of them. And it certainly
3. isn't much fun, it certainly isn't much fun for a youngster
4. who was born on the 29th day of August to be running up against
5. a kid that's a year older that was born the year before on the
6. 1st day of...of September and leave the school board decide
7. on some...how they feel or which side of their back side they
8. scratched that morning. I think that...that we ought to be
9. somewhat consistent in it and I agree with...with Senator
10. McMillan.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Further discussion? Senator Buzbee.

13. SENATOR BUZBEE:

14. Mr. President and fellow Senators. This is a situation
15. that we're going to make a change now in a...in a procedure
16. that has been going on for a number of years. In my own case,
17. my birthday is November the 30th and I was five years old when
18. I started to school. A lot of us, I'm sure, fell into that
19. sort of category, we turned six shortly thereafter. I agree
20. with whoever the speaker was that said because a couple of
21. clinical psychologists come in and say this is bad. Have you
22. ever...observed any of the clinical psychologist's children. Some
23. of them are not exactly wonders to behold, I can assure you.
24. Another thing that bothers me is a more immediate problem
25. and I guess I ought to declare my conflict right now. I have
26. a daughter who is five in kindergarten and I've been kidding
27. her about being held back in kindergarten this year. Her
28. birthday's not until September the 25th. If we...if we pass
29. this bill, does that mean she can't start the first grade
30. this year if my school board decides to do that. And I'm
31. going to be...I...I just can't understand why we need to make
32. this change now. The system has been going on for a number
33. of years. It's been successful. There are no doubt some

1. problems with it. If we change this, it's going to create a
2. new set of problems, an entirely new set of problems. I see
3. no reason to...to make a change now. I'm going to take the
4. good conservative stance and go with...with the status quo.
5. PRESIDENT:

6. Any further discussion? Senator Davidson may close the
7. debate.

8. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

9. First to answer your question, no it won't keep her from
10. school 'cause it doesn't take effect until July 1, 1980. So
11. she will already be in school. Secondly, the request was
12. optional because the request from the two school districts
13. who came in and made the request who traveled several hundred
14. miles, one from Rockford and one from Rock Island to attend
15. a meeting in Bloomington to be a test...a witness to the
16. need for this. I suggested to them that I didn't want to
17. make it mandatory, because of the impact on each school
18. district. Let each school district make it's own. Now,
19. the mandatory used to be mandatory September 1 for those of
20. you who are older than I and my age because I got in on the
21. wire by August 31st 'cause it used to be a September 1 cutoff.
22. And they can continue if the school district wants to continue
23. December 1, November 30th or October 1. But they cannot...they
24. cannot take it past December 1, the statute is a mandatory cutoff
25. December 1 now. So if you're born December the 2nd you're
26. out of luck. This gives the school board an opportunity. Now
27. maybe you don't agree with the clinical psychologist's and the
28. only reason they...that was thrown in because the school boards
29. who came down and made the request, cited the case history of
30. students for a number of years who had started to school at the
31. late birthday and their learning difficulties followed them
32. throughout life. Now, if you want to saddle yourself with
33. that, go ahead and vote No. If you want to give...if all of
34. you who say you're for local government want let...let go...excuse

1. me, the local elected officials make the decision, that's what
2. this bill's all about. The local board has the option to change
3. any place from December 1 back to September 1 anywhere...in between
4. that they choose. And if it doesn't affect their financial aid
5. or they think it's for the best interest of the child to change
6. it, then vote Aye. This had a unanimous vote out of the School
7. Problems Commission. Had a unanimous vote out of Elementary
8. Ed here in the Senate. It's had a lot of hearing, it's here
9. because school districts request it. I urge a favorable vote.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. The question is shall Senate Bill 491 pass. Those in favor
12. will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is
13. open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?
14. Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 19, the Nays
15. are 26, 2 Voting Present. Senate Bill 491 having failed to
16. receive a constitutional majority is declared lost. 493,
17. Senator Regner. On the Order of Senate Bills 3rd reading,
18. Senate Bill 493. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

19. SECRETARY:

20. Senate Bill 493.

21. (Secretary reads title of bill)

22. 3rd reading of the bill.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Regner.

25. SENATOR REGNER:

26. Mr. President and members of the Senate. This bill implements
27. a constitutional provision and what it does, it limits the amount
28. of bonded indebtedness payable from ad valorem property tax
29. receipts for, that home rule municipalities may incur without
30. referendum. Limits to three percent of assessed valuation of
31. taxable property from municipalities with population of five
32. hundred thousand or more. One percent for municipalities with
33. population of more than twenty-five thousand and less than five

1. hundred thousand and one-half of one percent from municipalities
2. with a population of twenty-five thousand or less. The intent
3. of the bill, of course, is to protect the taxpayers. We've
4. had many proposals, a lot of talk in the last two years about
5. legislation, both constitutional amendments and statutory legis-
6. lation to limit the taxes that our people will be...will be...
7. put upon them. I think they, as I said, this is a taxpayers
8. proposal. I think the taxpayers will like it, that they don't
9. have to have the continual fear that government will expand
10. without their approval. And I'd urge a favorable roll call.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Is there any discussion? Senator Savickas.

13. SENATOR SAVICKAS:

14. Yes, Mr. President, members of the Senate. Senator Regner's
15. proposal is laudable in its concern for the taxpayers. But
16. we have one problem that I could see immediately and that's
17. since the Personal Property Tax has been removed as a basis
18. for your assessed valuations, that...that limits that our municipal-
19. ities have incurred at this point may exceed the percentages
20. that he has indicated in his bill. I know, Chicago alone, is
21. facing this problem, not only in the city, but in its local
22. governmental agencies, in the park districts, in the forest
23. preserve districts where they have contracted work on the
24. assumption of issuance of bonds that now with the removal of
25. the Personal Property Tax as a base, they cannot, cannot, issue
26. bonds unless they raise their...tax base or raise their rate.
27. This bill will compound that problem. It may be laudable and
28. it may a coming idea, but at this point when the supreme court
29. invalidated the use of the Personal Property Tax as a base,
30. this will throw not only Chicago, but I think every municipality
31. that we have in the State of Illinois into a...confusion and a
32. confrontation with their present indebtedness. I would ask that
33. you look at this bill. I think we should defeat it at this

1. point or put in in some interim study committee for study and
2. to have these rates readjusted for further consideration. At
3. this point, I think municipalities with heavy concentration
4. of personal property would be hit the hardest and the imposition
5. of this debt ceiling might put some of them in a position
6. where their debt limits are already in excess of what this bill
7. proposes. I would urge its defeat.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Further discussion? Senator Rhoads.

10. SENATOR RHOADS:

11. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. Just in
12. response briefly to Senator Savickas. Senator, I think you're
13. missing a golden opportunity here and that is if Senator Egan's
14. bill passes and we amend this bill over in the House to provide
15. that our replacement will be the base, the base will be seven
16. hundred million rather than four hundred and fifty million. I
17. ...I think you're just missing a tremendous opportunity here
18. to help out the City of Chicago. I...I just can't understand
19. your attitude.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Further discussion? Senator Egan.

22. SENATOR EGAN:

23. Yes, thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate. I...I
24. find all kinds of difficulties with this bill. It...it really,
25. you know, the Constitutional Convention and all of the...the...the
26. people that were there intended to restrict the ad valorem indebted-
27. ness and what they've, on short term debts, not on long time debts,
28. this...this does not follow the...the desire of the Constitutional
29. Convention. It's as restrictive as it could be and it doesn't
30. even attend to those indebtednesses as of July of 1971, let alone
31. the ones that are currently being...currently arising. I think
32. it's...we can have a lot of fun with this, fellows, we can laugh
33. about it, but let me tell you what you're doing here is very serious.

1. And I don't think that...I don't think you're being responsible.
2. There's...there are even technical problems with the bill. And
3. you know what they are as well as I do. I think it's a dangerous
4. thing to do. Have all the fun you want, I'm just telling you
5. that you're not acting responsible.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Any further discussion? Senator Carroll.

8. SENATOR CARROLL:

9. I also rise in opposition to it. I think some of the members
10. should be aware that many of their municipalities back home
11. are well over what would now become the ratio even though they
12. were lawful at the time that these ratios were not in existence.
13. In other words today they would be valid, were this
14. bill to become law, they would become invalid. I think Decatur,
15. Highland Park, Quincy, Rockford, Flora, South Holland, Rosemont,
16. Stone Park, Watseka, Wheeling and many, many others, just to
17. mention a few, would be well within the illegalities provided
18. by this act. I think members who represent those areas should
19. take note and act accordingly.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Further discussion? Senator Regner may close the debate.

22. SENATOR REGNER:

23. Just very shortly, one thing I would like to point out.
24. Indebtedness outstanding and the effective date of the constitu-
25. tion or thereafter...or there for approved by referenda or assumed
26. from another unit of Local Government is not included in the
27. ...in the limits set forth by the Constitution or this particular
28. proposal. The choice is very simply, Ladies and Gentlemen, it's
29. a very simple choice. Are we going to do something for the tax-
30. payers this Session or are we not. I haven't seen anything that
31. effectively proposes to do anything to set any limits on any
32. kind of debt or spending. This bill does. Senator Savickas, you
33. made a comment that possibly the rates set forth are wrong. They

1. may well be, but the...bill does have to go to the House.
2. They'll be consideration for the next seven weeks. As to
3. what happens on the Corporate..Personal Property Tax and if
4. there are any changes necessary, I'm sure we'll be ready to
5. make them. And I ask for a favorable roll call.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. The question is shall Senate Bill 493 pass. Those in
8. favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting
9. is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?
10. Take the record. On that...sponsor has requested that further
11. consideration be postponed. So ordered. That, I think, Senator,
12. is a lovely note on which to conclude the afternoon proceedings.
13. We do have a couple of other items. Senator Coffey has a bill.
14. With leave of the Body we will go to the Order of House Bills
15. on 2nd reading and move that bill to passage stage. It is of
16. an emergency nature. With leave of the Body, we'll be on the Order
17. of House Bills 2nd reading. On the Order of House Bills 2nd
18. reading, House Bill 1081. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

19. SECRETARY:

20. House...House Bill 1081.

21. (Secretary reads title of bill)

22. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Any amendments from the Floor?

25. SECRETARY:

26. No Floor amendments.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. 3rd reading. Senator Newhouse, for what purpose do you arise?

29. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

30. Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, Senate Bill 870,
31. which we passed over the other day. There's an amendment and I'd
32. like to...amend that bill on 2nd and move it on to 3rd please.
33. Well, we...we have about forty-five amendments pending. We

1. will get to that order tomorrow. Senator Graham. Okay. We
2. have done, I think, yeoman's work today, 66 bills were addressed
3. in one fashion or another, so we're down under 700 I assume.
4. I have an announcement that the press corps has asked me to
5. make. The tickets for the Legislative Correspondents Association
6. Annual Gridiron Dinner and Show and sale now from the press corps.
7. The show is next Tuesday night, May 22nd at the Forum XXX. Tickets
8. it says it says here usually go fast so get orders in as soon
9. as possible. All are invited. Any further announcements or
10. further business to come before the Senate? I will remind you
11. that for the past two days we have attempted to start at noon and
12. have, in fact, started 3rd reading at 1:15. So tomorrow on
13. Wednesday, May 16, we will start at the hour of 1:00 o'clock.
14. Senator Philip.

15. SENATOR PHILIP:

16. Thank you, Mr. President. Purpose of an announcement.
17. Remind the membership we have a practice softball game tomorrow
18. night at 6:00 o'clock. The Senate versus our staff.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Any further announcements? If not, Senator Donnewald moves
21. that the Senate stand adjourned until Wednesday, May 16, at the
22. hour of 1:00 o'clock p. m. I would urge the membership to please
23. be present, we will start immediately. The Senate stands adjourned .

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
