1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

2. The Senate will come to order. Will all those in the
3. gallery please rise. We will have the opening prayer by the
4. Reverend Eugene A. Frost of the Cherry Hills Baptist Church,
5. Springfield, Illinois. Reverend Frost.

6. REVEREND FROST:

7. (Prayer given by Reverend Frost)

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

9. Thank you, Reverend. Reading of the Journal. Senator
10. Kenneth Hall. Senator Hall.

11. SENATOR HALL:

12. Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, I move that
13. reading and approval of the Journals of Tuesday, May 20th,
14. Wednesday, May 21st, Thursday, May 22nd, Friday, May 23rd
15. and Tuesday May 27th, in the year 1980 be postponed pending
16. arrival of the printed Journal.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

18. You've heard the motion. All in favor...say Aye.

19. The motion carries. We're going to stand at ease, just for a moment.
20. Mr. President, we have a special event, you want us to proceed?
21. Not yet, he wants to give just a little time for the rest of
22. the Senators to join us. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate,
23. about a month or so ago, I was awarded a...a citizenship award,
24. Outstanding Senator of my area and so forth, but at that
25. hearing. Senator Bruce, I'd like for you to come to the Podium
26. with me, please. At that night, where the award took place,
27. a young man by the name of David Overstreet was there. David
28. is the son of Jack Overstreet of Mt. Vernon, Senator Bruce's
29. district. It was held in my region, in my district, the
30. award given to me. Jack Overstreet...Jack, would you come
31. up with David and Cora, the young man's sister-in-law, they're
32. all of Mt. Vernon, Senator Bruce's district. Let me tell you
33. about David's background. He graduated from the eighth grade

1. just last evening. He is an honor roll student, perfect attendance,
2. student council, varsity football, basketball, baseball and track.
3. His goal, Ladies and Gentlemen, is to be in politics. He gave
4. a reading which I felt merited more attention. I asked him if
5. he would care to come to the Senate and give us that reading.
6. He graciously conceded to that and when I found out that he was
7. from Mt. Vernon, I asked my good and true friend, Senator Bruce,
8. to join me, on the Podium here, while young David made his
9. presentation to us. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, David
10. Overstreet of Mt. Vernon, Illinois. Would you welcome him, please.

11. DAVID OVERSTREET:

12. (Remarks given by David Overstreet)

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR JOHNS)

14. Ladies and Gentlemen...what do you think? At a time when
15. we're all kind of holding our younger generation, not in the
16. highest esteem, I felt that I should bring him forth for you
17. to hear. Thank you again. Now, I will return the Podium to...
18. Senator Rock, is he here? He's coming, here comes the chief.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. All right, if I can have your attention. I would ask that
21. the the Doorkeepers keep the doors closed during this short,
22. but important program. The Chair will yield to Senator Robert
23. Mitchler.

24. SENATOR MITCHLER:

25. Thank you, Mr. President. It is my honor today, to introduce
26. you to a very lovely lady. We've often had Miss Illinois and
27. Miss Teenage, but today we have Mrs. Illinois America, Deida Bourne
28. who with her husband, Colonel William Bourne, are from O'Fallon,
29. Illinois, at the air base. And she won competition up at
30. St. Charles at Pheasant Run. I might add that I was one of the
31. judges. And when you can see her, that...I think you will attribute
32. my selection. Mrs. Illinois America competed in the Mrs. America
33. contest and was voted Mrs. Congeniality and then went on to be

1. declared the third runner-up in the nationwide competition for
2. the 1980 Mrs. America Contest. And at this time, for your delight,
3. and I know her pleasure, I would like to present to the Illinois
4. State Senate, Mrs. Illinois America, 1980, Mrs. Deida Bourne of
5. O'Fallon.

6. MRS. DEIDA BOURNE:

7. (Remarks given by Deida Bourne)

8. SENATOR MITCHLER:

9. And the lucky fellow to be married to Mrs. Illinois
10. America, 1980, Colonel Bill Bourne. Senator Donnewald is
11. the Senator from the district in which our honored guest
12. resides. At this time, the President of the Senate has
13. allowed us to have a Memorial Day Program. Memorial Day is
14. a very sacred day and this Memorial Day Program in the Illinois
15. State Senate will be dedicated to the eight men who laid
16. down their lives and sacrificed in an attempted mission to
17. rescue the fifty hostages held by Iranian militants. Their
18. sacrifice typifies the sacrifices of men and women who have
19. laid down their lives that the United States of America remains
20. a symbol of freedom. At this time, I would like the Senate to
21. be in order and I would like to introduce some honored guests
22. that will serve as the reviewing committee for this Memorial
23. Day Program. Two distinguished guests from the Illinois House
24. of Representatives have come into our Chambers, Representative
25. Lawrence Diprima, who, as you well know, guides our Veteran's
26. legislation in the House. Representative Diprima, would you
27. please stand. We...we also have Representative Allen L. Schoeberlein,
28. would you please stand. And a distinguished Veteran of World War II,
29. from the Illinois House of Representatives, Representative Borchers,
30. would you please stand. ...Representative Borchers is displaying
31. his medals on his VFW overseas cap. On the Podium we are fortunate
32. to have Brigadier General Ralph Bush, Assistant Adjutant General
33. Air, Springfield, Illinois. Lieutenant Colonel Carl C...O'Johnson,

1. Administrative Officer of Public Relations for the Military
2. Department of Illinois, Camp Lincoln, Springfield, Illinois.
3. And of course, our special honored guest, Mrs. Illinois America,
4. 1980, Deida Bourne and Colonel William Bourne. At this time I
5. would ask that the members of the Senate and our guests in the
6. Chambers please rise as we have the presentation of the Colors.
7. Present the Colors. As we remain standing, at hand salute, Senator
8. Sam Vadalabene will lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance. Senator Vadalabene.
9. SENATOR VADALABENE:
10. Would you all join me.
11. (Senator Vadalabene leads Senate in Pledge of Allegiance)
12. SENATOR MITCHLER:
13. Order arms. A special Memorial Day Message will be delivered
14. by Senator Leonard Becker. You may all be seated, please. Senator
15. Becker.
16. SENATOR BECKER:
17. (Message given by Senator Becker)
18. SENATOR MITCHLER:
19. Senator Adeline Geo-Karis, who many of you may not know,
20. but was a Lieutenant Commander in the United States Navy, will
21. lead us as we all sing America, first verse. Senator Geo-Karis.
22. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:
23. Everybody join me.
24. (Senator Geo-Karis leads Senate in singing America)
25. SENATOR MITCHLER:
26. Thank you. You may be seated. One of the inspiring poems
27. that has lived with us for many years, is the poem, In Flanders
28. Field Where Poppies Grow. To recite that poem today, on this
29. Memorial Day Program, Senator Kenneth Hall. Senator Hall.
30. SENATOR HALL:
31. (Senator Hall recites poem)
32. SENATOR MITCHLER:
33. The Citizen's Creed is printed on your program. At this

1. time, if you would all rise and Senator David Shapiro will lead
2. us as we join in unison in reciting the Citizen's Creed. Senator
3. Shapiro.

4. SENATOR SHAPIRO:
5. (Senator Shapiro and Senate recite Citizen's Creed)

6. SENATOR MITCHLER:
7. Remain standing while the President of the Senate, Senator
8. Philip J. Rock, will offer the prayer.

9. SENATOR ROCK:
10. (Prayer given by Senator Rock)

11. SENATOR MITCHLER:
12. Please remain standing while Staff Sergeant Roger Eilts of
13. Headquarters Illinois Army National Guard, Springfield, will
14. sound taps. Hand salute.

15. STAFF SARGENT ROGER EILTS:
16. (Taps given by Staff Sergeant Roger Eilts)

17. SENATOR MITCHLER:
18. Remain standing now while we have a closing song
19. which we all join together in the singing of God Bless America,
20. lead by Senators James Donnewald and Senator Richard Walsh.

21. SENATOR DONNEWALD:
22. Let's all join.
23. (Senators Donnewald and Walsh lead Senate in singing
24. God Bless America)

25. SENATOR MITCHLER:
26. The Colors will be retired by the combined Color Guard
27. of the Headquarters Illinois Army National Guard, Camp Lincoln,
28. Springfield, the 183rd Tactical Fighter Group, Illinois
29. Air National Guard of Springfield, Illinois. Retire the Colors.
30. And salute. Ready... Thank you, you may be seated. That
31. concludes the Memorial Day Program this Wednesday, May 28, 1980,
32. in the Illinois State Senate.

8. Seated in the gallery behind us on the left, are the
9. students, the parents and teachers of Kennedy School in
10. Chicago Heights. I would like to have them stand and be
11. recognized.
12. PRESIDENT:
13. Will our guests please stand and be recognized. Welcome.
14. Senator Vadalabene, are you ready on... Committee Reports.
15. SECRETARY:
16. Senator Vadalabene, Chairman of the Committee on Executive
17. Appointments and Administration, to which was referred the
18. Governor's Message of May the 8th, 1980 and May the 15th, 1980,
19. reported the same back with the recommendation that the Senate
20. advise and consent to the following appointments.

1. SENATOR VADALABENE:

2. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. With respect to the...with
3. respect to the Governor's Messages of April 24th, May 8th and
4. May 15th, 1980, I will read the unsalaried appointments to
5. which the Committee on Executive Appointments and Administration
6. recommends that the Senate do advise and consent. And after

24. Advisory Council for a term expiring January 19, 1981, Jose'...

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator.

27. SENATOR VADALABENE:

28. Jose' A. Morales of Oak Park. And to be a member of the
29. Board of Banks and Trust Companies for a term expiring January
30. 1, 1983, W. James Armstrong of Kenilworth. And to be Chairman
31. and member of the St. Louis Metropolitan Area Airport Authority
32. for a term expiring January 21, 1985, William S. Badgley of
33. Belleville. And to be a member of the Dangerous Drugs Com-
34. mission for a term expiring January 17, 1983, Robin Lee Morgenstern

1. of Chicago. And to be a member of the Commission on Delinquency

9. granted. There appears to be no objection. Senator Vadalabene.

11. Mr. President, will you put the question as required by
12. our rules.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. The question is, does the Senate advise and consent to
15. the nominations just made. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those
16. opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who
17. wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?
18. Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 52, the Nays
19. are none, none Voting Present. A majority of the Senators
20. elected concurring by record vote, the Senate does advise and
21. consent to the nominations just made. Senator Vadalabene.

22. SENATOR VADALABENE:

23. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. With respect to the
24. Governor's Messages of April 24, May 8th, and May 15, 1980, I

15. PRESIDENT:

16. You've heard the request. Is there any discussion?

17. Senator Regner.

18. SENATOR REGNER:

19. Yes, a question of the...Senator Vadalabene.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Indicates he'll yield, Senator Regner.

22. SENATOR REGNER:

23. Senator Vadalabene, are members of the Human Rights Com-
24. mission included in this list you just read? Because I have
25. some questions on some of them.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Vadalabene.

28. SENATOR VADALABENE:

29. Yes, they're included in this list.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Senator Regner.

32. SENATOR REGNER:

33. I would...ask that they be eliminated from this hearing

1. and run on a separate roll call.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. All right. There is objection. Senator Vadalabene,
4. will you reread the names, just...skipping the Human Rights
5. Commission for the moment. We'll take them as a separate
6. group.

7. SENATOR VADALABENE:

8. Okay. To be First Deputy Commissioner of Banks and Trust
9. Companies for a term expiring October 18, 1982, John E. Treston
10. of Springfield. And to be a member of the Illinois Commerce
11. Commission for a term expiring January 21, 1985, Andrew C.
12. Barrett of Chicago.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. All right. Senator Vadalabene seeks leave of the Body
15. to consider those two appointments on this roll call. Is
16. leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Vadalabene.

17. SENATOR VADALABENE:

18. Yes, I now move...will you put the question as required
19. by our rules.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. All right. The question is, does the Senate advise and
22. consent to the nominations just made. Those in favor will vote
23. Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have
24. all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
25. who wish? Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 57,
26. the Nays are none, none Voting Present. A majority of the
27. Senators elected concurring by record vote, the Senate does
28. advise and consent to the nominations just made. Senator
29. Johns, for what purpose do you arise?

30. SENATOR JOHNS:

31. Mr. President, I have leave of the principal sponsor
32. of the House of House Bill 2994 to be shown as the principal
33. sponsor of that bill in the Senate and I'd like for Senator

1. Maitland...

2. PRESIDENT:

3. We're still...we're still in Executive Session, here.

4. SENATOR JOHNS:

5. Oh, I'm sorry, Sir, I thought he was through.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Vadalabene.

8. SENATOR VADALABENE:

9. Yes, now, we'll go to the members of the Illinois Human

10. Rights Commission for the terms indicated, and Senator Regner,

11. do you want those one at a time or...do them all? Okay.

12. Manuel Barbosa of Elgin, Chairman, Rebecca Sive-Tomashefsky,

13. Wallace W. Heil of Taylorville, Arnold P. Jones of Chicago,

14. Alfred C. Whitley of Chicago, Howard R. Veal, Sr. of Springfield

15. and Marion N. Baruch of Chicago...and Lillian A. Mitchell of

16. Carlyle. Mr. President, having read the salaried appointments,

17. I now request a roll call.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Any discussion? Senator Chew.

20. SENATOR CHEW:

21. ...Mr. President...this...Gentlemen, this boy from...Hyde

22. Park came over here to my desk and he put my flashing light

23. on and I want the Senate to censor him and then Senator Rhoads

24. came up and tried to get a Yes button on.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. I'll be darned. Senator Regner.

27. SENATOR REGNER:

28. And now, I'm supposed to be serious. I have some question

29. about several of the members. According to the information I

30. have, a Mr. Howard Veal has some charges pending against him

31. regarding that FEPC. Miss Rebecca Tomashefsky, who's supposed

32. to be the Independent on the Board, has voted in every Democrat

33. Primary since '72. Miss Joan Sheive, who's on the...well, she

1. wasn't on this list, I'm sorry. And the other...another
2. Republican questionable, as far as I'm concerned, had voted
3. Democrat in '68, hadn't voted again or picked up a Primary
4. Ballot until 1980. I think the Committee or the Human Rights
5. Commission, as established, is one of the questionable things
6. we had last week or the week before, we had quite a lengthy
7. debate on their appropriation, their method of doing it and now I
8. see the structure of this Board. And I think it's just absolutely
9. wrong that the Governor should do something like this, especially
10. when you're supposed to have an Independent and they're no more
11. an Independent than the man on the moon. The reason I did not
12. ask for them on separate roll calls, I think we should tube
13. the whole thing and let the Governor start all over again with
14. his appointments to this Commission because it could be, and
15. probably will be, a very, very, important Commission, especially
16. regarding business and harrassment of business in this State.
17. And I'd urge a No vote.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Further discussion? Senator Knuppel.

20. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

21. Well, the fact that the woman's voted in the Democratic
22. Primary since 1972...certainly shouldn't reflect on her intelligence.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Further discussion? Senator Vadalabene.

25. SENATOR VADALABENE:

26. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. Having read the salaried
27. appointments, I now seek leave to consider these appointments
28. on one roll call, unless some Senator has any further objection.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. All right, you're heard the request of Senator Vadalabene.
31. Is there any objection to considering these nominees on one roll
32. call? Leave is granted. Senator Vadalabene.

33. SENATOR VADALABENE:

1. Will you put the question as required by our rules.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. The question is, does the Senate advise and consent to
4. the nominations just made. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those
5. opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who
6. wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take
7. the record. On that question the Ayes are 45, the Nays are 1,
8. 1 Voting Present. A majority of the Senators elected, concurring
9. by record vote, the Senate does advise and consent to the nominations
10. just made. Senator Vadalabene.

11. SENATOR VADALABENE:

12. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I now move that the Senate
13. arise from Executive Session.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. You've heard the motion. All in favor signify by saying
16. Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The Senate does now arise.
17. Senator Chew, for what purpose do you arise?

18. SENATOR CHEW:

19. Mr. President and members of the Senate, the Committee
20. on Transportation was scheduled for 9:00 a. m. tomorrow.
21. Some members that have bills in the Committee has requested
22. of the Chair to cancel that meeting and reschedule it. I'd
23. like to have leave from the Senate to so carry out.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. You've heard Senator Chew's request. Is leave granted?
26. Leave is granted. Senator Nash, for what purpose do you arise?

27. SENATOR NASH:

28. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen...Mr. President and
29. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I ask leave by request of
30. the House sponsor of House Bill 2612, to be shown as Nash-D'Arco,
31. hyphenated cosponsors.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. House Bill 2612, twenty-six, twelve. You've heard Senator

1. Nash's request. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator
2. DeAngelis, for what purpose do you arise?

3. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

4. Thank you, Mr. President. I ask leave of the Body to be
5. shown as chief sponsor of House Bill 3441 replacing Senator
6. Grotberg, whose permission I have to replace.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. 34...House Bill 3441, Senator DeAngelis seeks leave of
9. the Body to be shown as the chief sponsor. Is leave granted?
10. Leave is granted. Senator Maitland, for what purpose do you
11. arise?

12. SENATOR MAITLAND:

13. Thank you, Mr. President. I ask leave of the Body that
14. on House Bill 3196, at the request of the House sponsor, that
15. the sponsorship be changed from Maitland to Egan-Maitland.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. 3196. Senator Maitland seeks leave of the Body to have
18. Senator Egan-Maitland shown as the sponsor. Is leave granted?
19. Leave is granted. All right. Committee Reports.

20. SECRETARY:

21. Senator Netsch, Chairman of Reorganization of State Govern-
22. ment, recommends that the Senate not disapprove Executive Order
23. No. 3.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Netsch.

26. SENATOR NETSCH:

27. Thank you, Mr. President. On April the 1st, the Governor
28. had filed Executive Reorganization Order No. 3 for this...Legislative
29. Session. It creates a Department of Nuclear Safety, which is
30. basically as the Executive Order was submitted to us, a transfer
31. of the Nuclear Safety Division and the Division of Radiological
32. Health of the Department of Public Health to the newly created
33. agency and also the transfer of...that part of the Boiler Safety

1. Division of the State Fire Marshal's Office, which is charged
2. with the responsibility for checking nuclear...pressure vessels
3. used in nuclear power plants. The committee has held two hearings,
4. including one this morning at which it adopted a report which is
5. now on your desk and the committee has recommended that the Senate
6. not disapprove Executive Order No. 3. As you know, under the
7. Constitutional Provision which gives the Governor executive
8. reorganization powers, his proposals, when submitted to the
9. General Assembly, become effective in accordance with their
10. terms if they are not disapproved by either House within a
11. sixty day period. That is the reason for the negative form of
12. the motion that I am now putting. If you will look at the report
13. which is on your desk, I think you will see that summarizing it
14. briefly, we do not disagree at all, that is the members of the
15. committee, with the concept that there should be a Department
16. of Nuclear Safety. This is one of the principal nuclear States
17. in the United States because of the presence of seven active
18. nuclear power plants, six under construction and some very
19. important and controversial issues with respect to waste, nuclear
20. waste. So that the...the idea that there should be a separate
21. department which focuses responsibility on this extremely
22. important issue, is quite acceptable, I think, to all of the
23. members of the committee. Our concern, really, is not with
24. what the new department does, but what it would not do. There
25. are a number of other functions, extremely important functions
26. in State government, which deal directly or indirectly, with
27. nuclear safety and which were not transferred to the newly proposed
28. department. There was a suggestion that there would be a general
29. coordination or a general liason with those other...functions, but
30. it was not an actual granting of authority to the new department.
31. That was our principal point of concern. In other words, we felt
32. that the newly formed department was something of a...of a shell,
33. if you will, designed to suggest that we are, indeed, taking care

1. of the Nuclear Safety Program...problem, but without really the
2. kind of power of coordination and oversight and active, aggressive,
3. programing that we all felt was quite essential. So, that we are
4. not objecting to the fact that there is a department and that is
5. our reason for suggesting that the Executive Order be permitted
6. to take effect, but we strongly urge that when the implementing
7. legislation come to this House, that it receive a very strong
8. and quick approval from the Senate. That implementing legislation
9. has now been introduced in the House by the Committee on...Reorganization
10. of the House. It has been worked on a bipartisan basis and apparently
11. with strong approval...I shouldn't say strong approval, with at
12. least the approval of the Governor's Office. It accomplishes
13. what we feel the Executive Order should have accomplished in the
14. first place and that is greatly to strengthen the coordination
15. oversight and actual authority of the newly formed Department of
16. Nuclear Safety. So, with the admonition that we are somewhat
17. less than happy with what is here, because it is something of
18. a...a framework, shell, if you will, we are strongly supportive
19. of the concept that a...a stronger Department of Nuclear Safety
20. to take its place along with other State agencies. It is
21. on that basis that the committee has recommended and now makes
22. the motion or I make the motion, really, on behalf of the
23. committee, that the Senate do not disapprove Executive Order
24. No. 3.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. All right. You've heard the motion as put by Senator
3. Netsch. Any discussion? Senator Rhoads.

4. SENATOR RHOADS:

5. A question of the maker of the motion.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Indicates she will yield. Senator Rhoads.

8. SENATOR RHOADS:

9. Senator Netsch, I...we've been through in the last three
10. and a half years, been through this routine several times, and
11. ...and we've done it both ways. The motion has been made in
12. the negative and we have a bunch of red lights, and one time
13. we did it in the positive. But I'm a little bit reluctant to
14. support your motion. I know you're going to vote No on your
15. motion, I may vote green on it. Let...let me ask you this
16. question. In the report it says that the Department of
17. Nuclear Safety is also given authority to go...to coordinate
18. programs regulating transportation of nuclear materials which
19. now exist and will continue to...to exist within the Department
20. of Transportation and Law Enforcement. Now, Senator, my concern
21. is here that I...I don't want to see something done by the back door
22. that was not accomplished through the front door of a...of a
23. legislative mandate by this General Assembly. Specifically, in
24. order that the legislative intent and the record be clear, it
25. is your understanding that nothing will be coordinated or no
26. program will be instituted regulating the transportation of
27. nuclear waste that does not now exist in...in statutory laws.
28. Is that correct?

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Netsch.

31. SENATOR NETSCH:

32. That is...that is correct, Senator Rhoads, insofar as the
33. Executive Order itself is concerned. And both by our own law,

1. as well as by the operation of the constitutional provision.
2. The Governor cannot make new substantive law other than the
3. location of functions and activities pursuant to the exercise of
4. this power. So, there will, in fact, be no change in the
5. what I would call the substantive law, in that respect. I
6. should point out, however, that the implementing legislation
7. that has now been introduced and passed out to the Floor by
8. the House Committee on Government Reorganization, will make
9. some change in the substantive law. And I would be happy
10. to go through that with you, but that is part of the leg-
11. islative package, that is not part of the Executive Order.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Rhoads.

14. SENATOR RHOADS:

15. Well, Senator, maybe I don't understand the legal effect
16. of an Executive Order, but what is it that...referring again
17. to the second...last sentence of the second paragraph. What
18. is it that gives authority to the Department of Nuclear Safety
19. to coordinate these programs? Is it...is it statutory law, or
20. is it this Executive Order, and if it is this Executive Order
21. what specific language grants the authority?

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Netsch.

24. SENATOR NETSCH:

25. Thank you, I was looking for the particular language. In
26. the Executive Order, Senator Rhoads, I believe that the only
27. language which refers to that at all, is...I don't know what
28. copy of the Executive Order you have. In my...in the official
29. copy, it's at the top of page 2. It says, the department will
30. also coordinate programs relating to the transport of radiological
31. materials. Now, if you will notice, that is all part of, in a
32. sense, the...the preface to the Executive Order. That is it is
33. a statement of what the department...the new department ought

1. to be doing, but there is nothing in...that I have been able
2. to find in the text of the provisions that are transferred
3. specifically to that department which relates to transport at
4. all.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Rhoads.

7. SENATOR RHOADS:

8. Well, Senator, I...I've just been told by staff here, that
9. this Executive Order would have the effective law, the effective
10. Statute until such time as...as a Statute were enacted. Now,
11. is...is there anything implicit, in your opinion, as the...as
12. the maker of this motion, to approve the Executive Order? Is
13. there anything implicit in that language at the top of page
14. 2, which would grant this department the power to prohibit nuclear
15. material from coming into the State of Illinois?

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Netsch.

18. SENATOR NETSCH:

19. Absolutely not.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Further discussion? Senator Nimrod.

22. SENATOR NIMROD:

23. Yes, a question, Mr. President, of the sponsor?

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Indicates she will yield.

26. SENATOR NIMROD:

27. Senator, in that one section where we're transferring to
28. the Nuclear Safety Committee here, the Boiler Safety Division's
29. responsibilities. Does that mean that the State Fire Marshal
30. will still have the responsibility of supervising inspection of
31. boiler systems, and then we will have this committee as inspecting
32. only radiological boilers?

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Netsch.

2. SENATOR NETSCH:

3. That is my understanding, Senator Nimrod. That is we are
4. not in any way...I shouldn't say we, this is not my Executive
5. Order, I want it clearly understood. I am simply presenting
6. as Chairman of the committee, the report of the committee. But
7. as I understand the Governor's Executive Order, the Boiler
8. Safety Division, will continue to exist in the State Fire
9. Marshal's Office. The only thing that is to be transferred is
10. as of this morning, we are told...I'm looking for the number...
11. I believe it is two employees who have some experience with
12. inspecting pressure vessels that are part of nuclear steam
13. generating plants. That is the only aspect of that office
14. that will be transferred to the new department.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Nimrod.

17. SENATOR NIMROD:

18. The reason I was asking that, in addition to the fact that
19. there were some requests for personnel by the Fire Marshal's ap-
20. propriation this year. This question was left open and I hope
21. that this might clarify what they were trying to do. But the
22. second area that I would just like to discuss with you for a
23. minute, is that what we're saying is that the powers of the
24. EPA pertained...this area are now being transferred to this...
25. this committee?

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator Netsch.

28. SENATOR NETSCH:

29. Yes. Although that is somewhat meaningless because under
30. existing law there are no powers that are recognized due to
31. Federal Preemption Doctrine, I...as I understand it, that is
32. being litigated right now. If subsequently there were powers
33. confirmed under, I believe it's Section 25A, those would then

1. be part of the transfer of authority to the new department.
2. That is set out, incidentally in the report that is on
3. your desk, Senator Nimrod.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Senator Nimrod.

6. SENATOR NIMROD:

7. My only concern was, that the standards that these...
8. EPA was able to...which had authority to set under the Pollution
9. Control Board, that is that those powers pertaining to atomic
10. radiation are the only ones which are listed in this, and that is
11. a very specific assigned duty. Is that what we're saying in here?

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Netsch.

14. SENATOR NETSCH:

15. Yes, I think what you are asking is, are other pollution
16. control duties and responsibilities of the existing Environmental
17. Agency...State Environmental Agencies transferred to the new
18. department, and the answer to that is, no.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Further discussion? Senator Joyce.

21. SENATOR JEROME JOYCE:

22. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I have a question for the
23. sponsor.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Indicates she will yield. Senator Joyce.

26. SENATOR JEROME JOYCE:

27. It seems to me, Senator Netsch, that...is this just another
28. layer of bureaucracy that is going to try and streamline the
29. process of...of issuing permits and so forth for the industry,
30. but yet we have to go through the Emergency Services and Disaster
31. Agency and so forth for the public or the General Assembly to
32. find out what's going on?

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Netsch.

2. SENATOR NETSCH:

3. There were about six questions buried in that one question,
4. I think, Senator Joyce. I think the basic question you were
5. asking is, will this agency be a...a licensing regulatory agency.
6. And the answer to that I think is at the moment, it essentially
7. is not. The implementing legislation may change that. For
8. example, the Illinois Commerce Commission Authority is not
9. touched at all by...by the Executive Order. There is a suggestion
10. that it might be revised somewhat in the implimenting legislation
11. which is still in the House, and you will, of course, have a
12. chance to address that when that legislation is before you, But
13. at the moment, that...it is really only a transfer almost in
14. intact of the two divisions in the Department of Public
15. Health, and a part of the Boiler Safety Division, plus the
16. power of the EPA under Section 25A, which does not even
17. exist at the moment, into this new department. And that's all
18. it is right now. At some point, hopefully, it will be not...
19. and I would somewhat concede, that I think at the moment, it
20. is something of a...of an extra layer, or perhaps it's just
21. simply a substitution of one layer for another. I think the
22. ...the thought is, if it turns out the way it ought to turn out,
23. that it would then become the one agency in the State that would
24. develop, in fact, and see that it was enforced throughout other
25. agencies of the State, a nuclear policy for the State. That is
26. not here at the moment, hopefully it would be sometime.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Joyce.

29. SENATOR JEROME JOYCE:

30. Yes, well just a comment. It seems to me that this is
31. ...is an attempt to muddy up the waters and...and to...to cover
32. up our ineptitude in this area. We still don't have
33. a disaster evacuation plan, and...and many other things that

1. we're...we're way behind on in this State, and I've just...
2. it's probably all right. I hope it becomes...bring some good
3. to it, but I just can't see that it will.

4. PRESIDENT:

5. Any further discussion? Senator Netsch, do you wish to
6. close?

7. SENATOR NETSCH:

8. Yes. I think would close by taking my cue from Senator
9. Joyce. I think those of us who heard the testimony would agree
10. that the creation of this department in itself does nothing,
11. and perhaps is somewhat misleading because it suggests there is
12. a nuclear policy...nuclear safety policy for the State, as a
13. result of the creation of this department and all of us know
14. that is not true. On the other hand, all we are being asked
15. to do today, really, is to allow this mechanism to begin to
16. take its place so that it can, hopefully become the focus of
17. an honest to gosh nuclear safety policy, and maybe even a
18. nuclear energy policy for the State of Illinois. In that sense
19. it seems to me that we are better off with it, than we are
20. without it, and I think that is essentially the reason why
21. the committee has recommended that we not disapprove Executive
22. Order No. 3.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Yes, Senator Bowers, for what purpose do you arise?

25. SENATOR BOWERS:

26. A point of parliamentary inquiry.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Yes, Sir.

29. SENATOR BOWERS:

30. As I understand the Act, it provides that unless we
31. disapprove, the Order goes into effect automatically. Isn't
32. that correct?

33. PRESIDENT:

1. That is correct.

2. SENATOR BOWERS:

3. Then, if I understand the motion, it is to not disapprove.
4. Why are we doing anything, I guess is the question, if it's not
5. a motion to disapprove?

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Well, Senator Netsch.

8. SENATOR NETSCH:

9. We could do that, Senator Bowers. I think that the...the
10. point of making the motion and taking a vote on it, is that
11. we not get in the habit of just sort of sitting back and letting
12. everything go by default. It was not, maybe, a unanimous
13. decision of the Senate, but a widely held decision that we
14. ought to face up to each of the proposed Executive Orders and
15. do something, either in effect, approve it, or disapprove it.
16. That is the reason for putting the motion and requesting the
17. vote.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Bowers.

20. SENATOR BOWERS:

21. One more question, Mr. President. What is the posture of
22. the Order, if this motion fails? If this motion does not...and
23. how many votes does it require? And what happens if it fails?

24. PRESIDENT:

25. If...if this motion does not prevail...the motion is that
26. the Senate not disapprove. The motion fails, the Senate, in fact,
27. disapproves.

28. SENATOR BOWERS:

29. There doesn't need to be an affirmative vote to disapprove,
30. is that the point?

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Yes, you would...I mean the...we would...there would be
33. then a subsequent motion to it, it seems to me.

1. SENATOR BOWERS:

2. And what are...what are the number of votes required
3. on this motion?

4. PRESIDENT:

5. I would...the Chair would suggest as it has in the past,
6. that a constitutional majority is required, 30 affirmative or
7. negative votes.

8. SENATOR BOWERS:

9. Well, I...I don't want to quarrel with the Chair, but it
10. seems to me that to require 30 votes to do nothing, is...is a
11. little bit presumptuous, and I...I really feel that we're
12. getting ourselves into a parliamentary bind by even going into
13. this kind of a procedure and I would suggest that if we don't
14. want to disapprove, let's go to the next order of business.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Further discussion? Senator Rhoads.

17. SENATOR RHOADS:

18. I'm sorry, Mr. President. I also had an inquiry of the
19. Chair similar to Senator Bowers. As I understand, June 30th
20. is the deadline here for action one way or another on the
21. Executive Order. Is there a reason action has to be taken by
22. the Senate today or before the substantive legislation comes before
23. us? Whoever can answer the question?

24. PRESIDENT:

25. I thought...it's sixty calendar days under the Constitution,
26. Senator Netsch.

27. SENATOR NETSCH:

28. June 30th is not the last day, Senator Rhoads. It was
29. officially received on April 1, 1980, and we have sixty days
30. from April 1, within which to act. That's either...I've
31. forgotten what the exact date is, it's either June 1st or
32. June 2nd.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Rhoads.

2. SENATOR RHOADS:

3. Mr. President. I apologize for speaking to the motion
4. after the sponsor had closed, then. But it...it just seems to
5. me that this is the first time that I've seen a copy of this,
6. Senator Netsch. And I don't think that we ought to be acting
7. on it prior to the substantive legislation because...because
8. this order will have the impact of law until such legislation
9. is adopted. It does deserve, I think, some further study, and
10. I would urge an affirmative vote that we do disapprove.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. All right. The motion is that the Senate not disapprove
13. Executive Order No. 3. An affirmative vote indicates approval.
14. Those in favor of the motion will vote Aye. Those opposed
15. will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
16. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,
17. the Ayes are 37, the Nays are 6. 5 Voting Present. The motion
18. carries. Further motions?

19. SECRETARY:

20. A Motion in Writing. I move that all Senate Bills on
21. the Senate Calendar on the Order of 2nd reading, 3rd reading,
22. and Consideration Postponed be rereferred to the standing
23. Senate committees which last considered them. Signed, Senator
24. Donnewald.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Donnewald.

27. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

28. Yes, Mr. President. This is a standard procedure at this
29. point in time. We are in the Session to clean up the Calendar
30. and save a little printing expense. I move for the adoption.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. All right, you've heard the motion as put by Senator
33. Donnewald. All in favor...Senator Johns. All in favor

1. signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The
2. motion carries. Further motions?

3. SECRETARY:

4. A Motion in Writing. I move that all motions pending on
5. the Senate Calendar relating to Senate Bills be Tabled. Signed,
6. Senator Donnewald.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Donnewald.

9. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

10. Yes, this...this motion goes along with what I had said earlier
11. to clean up the Calendar, motions pending in the Senate
12. Calendar relating to Senate bills, be Tabled. I so move.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. You've heard the motion. All in favor signify by saying
15. Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries.
16. So ordered. Senator Johns, for what purpose do you arise?

17. SENATOR JOHNS:

18. Mr. President. I don't know if I'm in order or not,
19. but I'd like to take House Joint Resolution 85, I'd like the
20. motion to discharge from Executive Committee to be placed on the
21. Calendar on 2nd...on the Order of Secretary's Desk. I filed
22. that the 15th of this month, and it's important to me, and to
23. the energy crisis. I'd like to have that permission.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Your request is in order. On the Order of Motions in
26. Writing, there's a motion, Mr. Secretary, with respect to House
27. Joint Resolution 85. Read the motion, Mr. Secretary.

28. SECRETARY:

29. A Motion in Writing. Excuse me. I move that the Committee
30. on Executive be discharged from further consideration of House
31. Joint Resolution 85, and it be placed on the Calendar on the
32. Order of Secretary's Desk. Signed, Senator Johns.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Johns.

2. SENATOR JOHNS:

3. Yes, Mr. President. This is Representative Ralph Dunn's joint

4. resolution. I'm the sponsor here. It's a means of eliminating

5. part of the energy crisis. I would implore you to give me this

6. permission to discharge committee.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. All right, any discussion? Senator McMillan.

9. SENATOR MCMILLAN:

10. No.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Savickas.

13. SENATOR SAVICKAS:

14. Not on this.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. All right, you've heard the motion. Senator Johns has

17. moved to discharge the Committee on Executive from further

18. consideration of House Joint Resolution 85 and ask that that

19. be placed on the Calendar on the Order of the Secretary's

20. Desk. All in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed.

21. The Ayes have it. So ordered. Yes, Senator Savickas, for

22. what purpose do you arise?

23. SENATOR SAVICKAS:

24. While we're at a lull here, I would like the record to

25. show that Senator Daley is participating today in a seminar

26. of the Children's Adolescent Forum that's held at the University

27. of Chicago.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. The record will so indicate. Senator Philip.

30. SENATOR PHILIP:

31. Thank you, Mr. President. A point of personal privilege.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. State your point.

1. SENATOR PHILIP:

2. I want to remind the membership we have a practice softball
3. game tonight at Lincoln Park, Diamond No. 4 at about five to
4. five fifteen. We're only going to play for about a half hour
5. to forty-five minutes. So, I hope that everybody shows up.
6. As you know, our game with the lower House is June 4th. So,
7. this may be their last chance to practice.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator McMillan.

10. SENATOR MCMILLAN:

11. Senator Lemke is the Senate sponsor of House Bill 1136.
12. He has agreed and I would ask leave of the Body for that to
13. read Lemke-McMillan. House Bill 1136.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. House Bill 1136. You've heard the Senator's request.
16. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Martin.

17. SENATOR MARTIN:

18. Yes, as principal sponsor of House Bill 2892, I would ask
19. leave to have the bill read Martin-Egan.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. 2892?

22. SENATOR MARTIN:

23. Yes, please.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. You've heard the request, that Senator Egan be joined as
26. a hyphenated co-sponsor. Is leave granted? Leave is granted.
27. Senator DeAngelis.

28. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

29. Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Lemke is chief sponsor
30. of House Bill 2913. I would like to be shown as hyphenated
31. sponsor with him.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. 2913. Senator DeAngelis seeks leave of the Body to be

1. shown as the hyphenated co-sponsor. Is leave granted? Leave
2. is granted. So ordered. Senator Johns.

3. SENATOR JOHNS:

4. Thank you, again, Mr. President. I have talked with
5. Senator John Maitland. Representative Rea wanted me to handle
6. House Bill 2994. But Representative Rea and myself also
7. desire that Senator John Maitland be a hyphenated sponsor
8. with me on that bill, and I would like leave of the Body to
9. do so, Sir.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. 2924?

12. SENATOR JOHNS:

13. 292...2994.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. 2994. Senator Johns seeks leave of the Body to have the
16. sponsorship reflect Senator Johns and Senator Maitland. Is
17. leave granted? Leave is granted. So ordered. Resolutions.

18. SECRETARY:

19. Senate Resolution 522, offered by Senators Davidson and
20. Mitchler, and all Senators, and it's congratulatory resolution.

21. 523, offered by Senators Moore, Jerome Joyce, and all
22. Senators, and it's congratulatory.

23. 524, offered by Senators Berning and Geo-Karis, and all
24. Senators, and it's congratulatory.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Consent Calendar. Senator Buzbee, for what purpose do you
27. arise?

28. SENATOR BUZBEE:

29. A purpose of an...or rather to ask to suspend the Six Day
30. Posting Notice in order to hear House Bill 2905, in Senate Ap-
31. propriations II tomorrow morning.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. All right. You've heard the request. Is leave granted?

1. Leave is granted. So ordered. All right, if you'll turn to
2. page 8 on the Calendar, on the Order of Secretary's Desk
3. there are a couple of appropriation bills that have come back
4. from the House with an amendment. On the Order of Secretary's
5. Desk on the Order of Concurrence, is Senate Bill 1655. Senator
6. Regner.

7. SENATOR REGNER:

8. Yes, Mr. President, and members. This as...originally went
9. out of the Senate was a...a transfer bill of forty thousand
10. ...between lines and appropriation of a million two for
11. the operation of auto equipment. The amendment put on in the
12. House provides two hundred and four thousand three hundred and
13. eighty-one dollar supplemental appropriation to the Department
14. of Administrative Services who holds deed to the property
15. known as the Illinois Soldiers and Sailers Childrens School
16. for the operation of their facility for the remainder of Fiscal
17. Year 1980. This property has been declared surplus and is
18. there for the responsibility of Department of Administrative Services to
19. either find a new use by the State or sell it according to
20. Statute. Due to the statutory responsibility, appropriation
21. for operation of this facility is made to the Department, and
22. I move we do concur in House Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill
23. 1655.
