12. Mr. President, I move to not concur in House Amendment  
13. No. 1.  
14. PRESIDENT:  
15. Senator Schaffer moves to non-concur in House Amendment  
16. No. 1 to Senate Bill 769. All those in favor signify by  
17. saying Aye. All those opposed. Motion carries, and the  
18. Secretary shall so inform the House. Senator Donnewald, for  
19. what purpose do you rise?  
20. SENATOR DONNEWALD:  
21. Yes, I guess they're finished with 1st Reading bills.  
22. I might ask at this time to re-refer a series of bills to  
23. different Committees. Senate Bill 184, 185, 189, 191 and

3. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
4. Senate. It gives me great pleasure to introduce to you  
5. today Joe Newton, who is the head Track and Cross Country  
6. Coach for York High School in the City of Milk and Honey...  
7. Elmhurst. In nineteen seventy-eight, they were not only  
8. the State Track Champions, but they were the national  
9. Champions. Joe has coached at York High School for some  
10. twenty-four years, and is the greatest Cross Country and  
11. Track coach in the State of Illinois. Joe, will you come  
12. up here and introduce your team.

13. JOE NEWTON:

14. Thank you very kindly. I'm going to introduce our  
15. Senior boys first. We brought seven Seniors and two Juniors  
16. down. These boys are nineteen seventy-eight Illinois State  
17. and National Champions. This is the fifth year in a row that  
18. they've won the National Championship. I'll introduce our  
19. Captain and our All-State runner first. That's Mr. Phil  
20. Williams. Phil, step forward right here. This is Phil Williams,  
21. our number one runner. He's a Senior. We had a second All-  
22. State runner. He's a Senior. His name is Rob Raggeson. Bob,  
23. step forward right here. Our next Senior is Mike Frega, right  
24. here. Our number three man, Mike Frega. Our next Senior is  
25. Mike Wagner. Step up front, Mike. Right here, Michael. Our  
26. next Senior is Jim Hedmond, our number five runner, Jim Hedmond,  
27. right here. Our next Senior, incidentally, is going into  
28. the Marine Corps in about a month. That's Steve Boyd. Step  
29. forward, Steve, right here. And our last Senior is Pete Schuyler,  
30. over on this far end. Pete, step forward. And then we have  
31. two Junior boys who we hope are going to return the Championship  
32. to York of Elmhurst in nineteen seventy-nine. The first one  
33. is Dave Haller. Henry, step forward. And last but certainly not

1. least, a Junior, Mike Newman, right here. Michael Newman.  
2. We thank you very much. It's a privilege and an honor for  
3. us to be here, men. Thank you very kindly...and ladies,  
4. excuse me.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Yes, Senator Newhouse, for what purpose do you rise?

7. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

8. Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Philip forgot to add  
9. that the Coach of the team is a former South Sider from the  
10. Old Neighborhood. The City of Chicago.

12. Maybe he can persuade Senator Philip to vote right.
