SENATOR MITCHLER:

1.

Mr. President, and members of the Senate. Senate Bill 2. 1137 is a bill that passed this House by a vote of 46 to 4, 3. on May 22, 1979. It also passed the House with a large affirmative 4. vote. However, the Governor did see fit, in his wisdom, to veto 5. the bill totally. Now the bill provides that the Sales Tax 6. will not be charged on the tip or the gratuity that's placed on 7. the purchase of a meal when the gratuity is mandatory. 8. mandatory, tipping occurs at different clubs or when you have 9. banquets or when there are more than say ten in a group going 10. into a restaurant, and the tax is required to be computed on 11. the purchase of the meal and the gratuity. Now, Senate Bill 12. 1137, exempted, by Statute, the tax being placed on the meal 13. and the gratuity, the tax would only be placed on the meal. 14. Now, for example, let's take the Sangamo Club or one of the 15. clubs that have a mandatory gratuity of say fifteen percent. 16. They are required to take the Sales Tax and charge the customer 17. Sales Tax on both the purchase of the meal and the gratuity. 18. This would exempt the Sales Tax placed on the gratuity. If you 19. have a banquet, a fund-raiser or an event in your home town, a 20. testimonial dinner for one hundred, two hundred, three hundred 21. people or even more, for example the big affair last night, it 22. was charged so much per plate, plus a mandatory gratuity. 23. Sales Tax was charged on the gratuity. Senate Bill 1137, would 24. say that the Sales Tax should not be charged on the gratuity, 25. but on the meal only. I thought it was good legislation, I introduced 26. it, it has the support of the Illinois Hotel and Motel Association, 27. many of the people in your district. I think you are right when 28. you woted 46 to 4 to pass the bill on May 22nd of this year. I 29. would ask for a favorable vote in my motion to override the 30. Governor's Total Veto of Senate Bill 1137. 31.

PRESIDENT:

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Is there any discussion? Senator Grotberg.

SENATOR GROTBERG:

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2. Yes, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I think that perhaps a few of us in the Senate would understand more 3. what Senator Mitchler is about in this because I'm rising 4. in support of his motion to override. When you have a banquet 5. tab for nine dollars plus tax and tip for X number of people, 6. that tip in every restaurant of any size or any hotel is split 7. among the waitress, the chefs, the bartenders, there's a 8. whole bookkeeping function...internal bookkeeping that goes along 9. with it. Now, if we have to add Sales Tax on top of it, it becomes 10. an internal audit function that just drives the industry out of 11. its mind. The simplest thing is not to have the tax on the 12. service portion and to remove the burden of keeping track of 13. every penny of extra load factor that goes on top of a banquet 14. in this very depressed business that we're all in. So I rise 15. very much in support of the fact that a banquet check should be 16. for tax only on the merchandise on the meal itself, disregard 17. taxing the service, that's a questionable constitutional thing 18. to start with, let's clean up the Act, and go along with Senator 19. Mitchler on this override. 20.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

SENATOR REGNER:

Yes, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I,too, rise 24. in support of this motion to override. The interesting thing 25. about it is that we're asking for extra revenue for the State . 26. and it was not done by legislative process, it was regulation put 27. forth by the Department of Revenue. It was challenged by a 28. group up in my district a couple of years ago. I introduced a 29. similar bill, didn't pass it at this...that time, but I think 30. it's excellent legislation, and along with Senator Grotberg's 31. reasoning, I too, support this override motion. 32.

- l. Senator Savickas. 2. SENATOR SAVICKAS: Yes, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I too, 3. join with the other speakers in support of the override. Senate 4. Bill 1137, will guarantee that those employees who are 5. deserving of this service credit, or service charge or tip 6. 7. will receive it. I would urge our membership to support the full override of Senate Bill 1137. 8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD) 9. Senator Egan. 10. SENATOR EGAN: 11. Yes, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. Just to 12. remind you that this had a full hearing in the Revenue Committee. 13. It received a 46 to 4 to 1 vote on the Floor of the Senate, and 14. for reasons that are particular to the staff of the Department 15. of Revenue and to the Governor's own particular interests, they 16. have thwarted our effort. I urge your support. 17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD) 18. Is there further discussion? Senator Newhouse. 19. SENATOR NEWHOUSE: 20. Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in support of the 21. override of this Total Veto. There's one just...aspect of this 22. I think that everyone needs recognized. There are those of us 23. who deal with people who make a living off tips, and for the 24. past seven, eight, ten years you've probably kept that tip at 25. the same level, so the shoe shine that was once thirty-five 26. cents and is now seventy-five cents or double, the service on 27. that, the tip factor is probably exactly the same. The guy who 28. hikes my car, I was made cognizant of that the other day, 29.

- 6. Transportation. The Department of Transportation is totally
- 7. in favor of the bill, and I'd ask for a favorable vote on

further that his rationale that the bill could raise new taxes, 1. and could transfer the court related county functions to 2. township, nothing is further from the truth, because the built-3. in gauge in the bill itself does not permit the townships to 4. raise taxes. The bill went out of here a phenomenal vote 5. and it went out of the House with a bigger vote, and I would 6. ask for a favorable override on this.
