       we passed an appropriation for the sum of 1.9 hundred thousand

       dollars, appropriated from the Capital Development Fund for the
17.
       purpose of the acquisition and the rehabilitation of a building
18.
       in Glen Ellyn, Illinois for use as the Deaf-Blind Service Center.
19.
       We are currently...we, the State, are currently occupying that
20.
       building. We have twenty youngsters there who are both deaf and
21.
       blind; and it is absolutely imperative that this appropriation be
22.
       passed. The Governor, because of a technical error in the legal...
23.
       a legal technical error, I should say, was forced to veto this out
24.
       of the Capital Development Appropriation which we passed last June.
25.
       We now have that legal matter cleared up. This money is absolutely
26.
       essential. There have been continuing negotiations between the
27.
       Governor's Office, the Capital Development Board and the West
28.
       Suburban Special Education Association that is actually the contracting
29.
       agent operating this school. I would urge the adoption of
30.
       Amendment No. 2.

11.
       as incorporated in this amendment is the cost for the purchase,
12.
       the acquisition of and the rehabilitation of this facility, as
13.
       it will be staffed and operable for about twenty to twenty-five
14.
       of these youngsters. They are currently occupying the premises.
15.
       There is also, I will tell you, a master plan that we talked about
16.
       back in 1973 when the bill originally passed, that we hope someday
17.
       to build a facility, a large building, to handle, what we hope will
18.
       be the hundred children that the census people or the school people
19.
       have identified as in need of this service. We have in this State,
20.
       approximately a hundred and forty to a hundred and fifty children
21.
       who suffer from this double affliction, who are both deaf and are
22.
       blind at the same time. They have, frankly, not received the kind
23.
       of service to which they are entitled. Ultimately the plan is, or
24.
       at least my plan is, and having discussed it with I.O.E., that we
25.
       would someday build a building to accommodate all these children.
26.
       What the ultimate actual cost will be, frankly, I don't know; but
27.
       I would expect that it would probably be somewhere in the neighbor-
28.
       hood of seven or eight million dollars. This amount of money will
29.
       do two things, it will acquire for us a permanent site, which con-
30.
       tains enough acreage, should this Assembly decide in years to come
31.
       that they wish to build a facility, it can be accommodated right
32.
       on this location. In the meantime, the location, frankly, is
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l.
       perfect for the use for which we are acquiring it.

       with the administration and have an ongoing discussion with them,

       at the current sales levels...interest rate levels that...that
      we have been forced to pay in recent years, where at the present
10.
       time when we appropriate one dollar from the Bond Fund, we will
11.
      be required to pay back two dollars and ten cents. So, every time
12.
      we appropriate a dollar, we...we have a State obligation that is
13.
      more than double at the present interest rates, and it's something,
14.
       I think, we'll have to address in the next Session when we get into
15.
      capital expenditures whether we want to obligate the State to that
16.
       extent. This particular project is, no doubt, a worthy one, and...

      and would not fall under that rubric.

       particular installation and I'm...I'm not challenging the concept

       at all. My question has to do with whether or not these children
 4.
       would not benefit more if they can be accommodated in the so-called
 5.
       mainstreaming. We have discovered, of course, that the deaf and
       frequently the blind do much better if they can be incorporated
 6.
       into the regular school system. At the same time there is ir-
 7.
 8.
       refutable evidence now that in place of the large State institutions
       the developmentally disabled and mentally handicapped do much
 9.
       better in smaller community installations. So, my question has to
10.
       do with whether there has been a thorough evaluation of the benefits
11.
       for the students in an institution where they are far removed from
12.
       their parents versus an attempt to incorporate these students into
13.
       a normal education program.

            Yes, thank you, Mr. President. The answer to your question,

       the direct answer is yes, there has been; and as you will recall,
19.
       when this amendment to the School Code was passed, I think it was back in
20.
       19...well, it was in the early 70's, in any rate, it was about
21.
       1974, I believe, that we have...embarked on this program. That it
22.
      was...it was the judgment of the educational people in this State,
23.
       and certainly the medical people and, frankly, I was then convinced,
24.
       that for these youngsters who suffer from both afflictions, that
25.
       is both lack of hearing and lack of sight, that we had, frankly,
26.
      no serious program or educational opportunity that was being
27.
       afforded by this State. At that point in time there were about
28.
       four or five private institutions across the country, one in
29.
      Massachusetts, one in California, one in upper New York, one here
30.
       in Springfield, the Hope School, which made an attempt to deal
31.
       effectively with these youngsters and not just institutionalize
32.
       them; but really try, at least, to afford them the opportunity
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ı.
       for some education. So, the answer to your question is yes, there
 2.
       has been a significant and...and long standing evaluation, and it's
 3.
       currently going on. The fact of the matter is that there is no
 4.
       single school district in this State, Chicago included as big as
 5.
       it is, that has the facilities or the personnel to adequately deal
 6.
       with these youngsters. They simply, at this point in time, given
 7.
       the state of the art in things educational; they simply cannot be
       mainstreamed, and so we have to afford them a different opportunity.
 8.
       This is, I think, that opportunity. We had set up, at that time,
 9.
10.
       as you will recall, and advisory board which consisted in the main
       of parents of these children, and frankly, the results to date have
11.
       delighted these parents of these young Illinois residents, because
12.
       we are now the only State in the United States that is offering
13.
       this opportunity. This property in particular is absolutely superb
14.
       and it's perfect for our purposes, and I would, again, urge support
15.
       of Amendment No. 2.

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Mr. President, and members of the Senate. Amendment 2. No. 2 conveys 3.96 acres of land that is under jurisdiction of 3. the Department of...Conservation in property known as the 4. Glenn D.Palmer State Game Farm located in the City of Yorkville 5. in Kendall County. The 3.96 acres are to be transferred from 6. the Department of Conservation to the City of Yorkville. Now, 7. to give you a little history on this, on Illinois State Route 8. 47, there's a bridge that goes over the Fox River in Yorkville, 9. and that's going to be widened by the Department of Transportation 10. to four lanes. It'll cause necessity of eliminating on the south 11. side, the present library for the City of Yorkville. So, that's 12. what started all of this. So, in trying to locate a new location 13. for the library, the library district got together with the City 14. of Yorkville, and it was determined that they should construct a 15. community center, a new library, a parking lot, and some open 16. land on this 3.97 acres that is currently the State Game Farm. 17. Now, for that the Department of Conservation is...was interested 18. in transferring from Game Farm Road the pheasant pens on the 19. east side over to the west side, and on the east side of Game Farm 20. Road is where this property is located. It's right adjacent almost 21. butting up to the high school and grade school in the Yorkville 22. School District, a very wonderful place. There is some money 23. available through a...a grant to the city by a deceased individual 24. that action must be taken by December...the end of December of this 25. year. And that money they said they could use towards the construction 26. of this community center for the City of Yorkville as it's specified 27. in the will of the deceased person. That's the necessity of doing 28. this now, rather than letting it go over to next year to have it go 29. through committee and that. Now, the appraisal of this land was 30. done by the Land Acquisition Department of the Department of 31. Conservation by the Done Appraisal Service. Their main office 32. is in St. Louis, but they do have offices in St. Charles, Illinois 33.

ı. in Kane...or rather in Aurora, Illinois, 444 West Glena Blvd. And that private appraisal that I have right here, brought the 2. value of that land to sixty-five hundred dollars an acre. The 3. City of Yorkville in concert with the Department of Conservation 4. 5. is going to give thirty-eight thousand three hundred and fortyseven dollars worth of work and...they're going to build 6. and donate five pens to transfer the pheasants, construct water 7. main, and other things that are listed. If you'd like to see 8. the fact sheet, but it totals thirty-eight thousand three hundred 9. and forty-seven dollars which is greater than the actual 10. appraised amount of the land. It'll be a very good thing for the 11. community, and I would... I see no objection to it, it's been discussed 12. by the park...or rather the school district, by the City Officials 13. of Yorkville, by the library district, and they are all in accord, 14. and we certainly would appreciate the authority. The Department of 15. Conservation approves of this, and the Governor's Office has no 16. objection. Now, that's the great detail, the urgency is because 17. they have this money available that will be used towards the 18. construction of the community center if we can act on this immediately. 19. I'll be glad to answer any questions that you may have in excess of 20. my explanation. 21. PRESIDENT: 22. All right, Senator Mitchler has moved the adoption of Amendment 23. No. 2 to House Bill 3103. Any discussion? Senator Grotberg. 24. SENATOR GROTBERG: 25. Only to support Senator Mitchler whose district and mine, we 26. divide the City of Yorkville. I only think the reason that...the 27. one reason he did not give of the urgency of this one, and 28. Senator Bruce if you're listening, the...the will and device of 29. some three hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars from the lady 30. expires if it is not built in 1981. - 25. to lease the land. I simply call it to your attention that the
- department has behaved in what I think is a very irregular fashion.
- 27. I oppose the amendment on that basis not because this is not a good
- 28. idea. As I say though, if you do put both amendments on you will

15. maximum total the first year cost, I'll give you a little back-

16. ground first before we go onto any other discussion, the cost

18. of this year, this fiscal year there will be a fiscal impact of

1.3 million dollars. The reason for my request to override the

20. Governor's Veto is I feel that Senate Bill 1518 would accelerate

21. the growth of alcohol fuel industry in the State of Illinois. Morè

22. people would want to use this product with that incentive. The

23. price of gasohol would fall to about the price of unleaded gasoline.

24. It would reduce our dependence on foreign oil. It would also reduce

25. the exports...it would also reduce the export of dollars and jobs

26. to the OPEC countries and reduce inflation. It could create jobs

and industrial growth. It would create new marketing for grain,

even spoiled grain. It would also provide. ... provide a tax relief

29. for the people of the State of Illinois. I would be glad to answer

any questions you might have pertaining to this bill.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

32. Discussion? Senator McMillan.

33. SENATOR MCMILLAN:

ı. Mr...Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I...I a rise 2. reluctantly in order to disagree very slightly with my colleague, 3. but I do rise in opposition to the override of the veto. I think most of us had a chance to look at this issue at depth last spring. 4. The issues have really not changed a great deal. I am a strong 5. advocate of the use of gasohol. But I do not believe such a reduction 6. in the Sales... Tax will markedly increase the demand for gasohol. The 7. experience in Iowa over a period in which they've had such, doesn't 8. indicate that it's increased it, because it's increased a great deal 9. over a two or three year period without any change in the Gas Tax 10. situation. I really don't believe it's a wise step to further 11. mess up the Sales Tax system which we have in this State. Most 12. of us realize that in taking steps to alter it for the Sales Tax 13. on food and medicine for the various things we've done with regard 14. to...to business and for transportation uses, we've generally had 15. a good intent but it makes it a system in which the retailer has 16. difficulty doing his job, the consumer gets totally confused about 17. what the tax is and what it is not, and it becomes very very costly 18. for us administer. So, I would oppose the override of the veto. 19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 20. Further discussion? Senator Knuppel. 21. SENATOR KNUPPEL: 22. Mr. President, and members of the Body. It's a very good 23. example of what's happened to our country that we aren't willing 24. to pay the price or make the sacrifice to develop new and alternative 25. sources of energy. Now, I say...there's three or four really big 26. issues facing this country; one of them is, self-reliance on steel, 27. self-reliance in the energy field, we've got to strengthen our 28. industry, our automotive industry, and we have to have the courage 29. to take these steps. Certainly they cost something, but it's cheaper 30. now than it may be later, and we all know what the oil companies 31. have done to us over the last seven years by running the price 32. of gasoline from about forty cents up to where it's now competitive.

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It could be one hell of a lot worse, and I predict if we don't

      do something to develop alternate sources of energy by 1985 we'll

      be paying about three dollars and eighty-five cents a gallon for
      gasoline. We should vote Aye to encourage this industry in any way

      that we can. It may not be economically the best thing to do, but

      we help our poor, we help our poor industries too. It means the
6.
      development of an alternative source of energy that we should be
7.
      encouraging, and I encourage every one of you to vote Aye on this

      legislation.

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on alcohol fules, and in that, in discussing that...what Iowa

      has done, and this information came from the Iowa Department
3.
      of Commerce and the Iowa Department...or the Iowa Development
      Commission put this together, and all the studies that we have
4.
      shown in Iowa regardless of what people say, that is...that
5.
      Iowa is discouraged with what their program is, I would like to
6.
      give a few facts. One of those which would answer your guestion,
7.
      would be that when Iowa, in July 1st, 1979, when Iowa passed their first
8.
      gasohol incentive legislation, their percentage of sales of gasohol
9.
      sales there was 4.2 percent. August 1st, 1980, gasohol sales with
10.
      the incentive legislation, the ten cent reduction that they had
11.
      at that time, and presently their sales went up to 11.5 percent.
12.
      So, that incentive has shown that type of increase, this is put
13.
      together by the department through the Governor Ray in Iowa, and
14.
      shows these facts. Now, since then there's been some...and I think
15.
      was mentioned here earlier, they discussed, well Iowa has changed their
16.
      plans. Well, to a certain extent Iowa did change their legislation,
17.
      and just passed legislation which will take effect April 23rd, 1980,
18.
      which will change how their legislation affects the incentive on
19.
      gasohol. Presently ..presently today, they have ten cents of
20.
      gasohol incentive, ten cents a gallon which you do not pay on gasohol.

      The impact of that bill created some fifty million dollars loss to
22.
      the State, and not necessarily just to the state, but to the
23.
      Department of Transportation which created a problem for their
24.
      department. Of that amount of money, they decided to come back
25.
      and change it, where it would affect their Revenue Fund, they
26.
      did come back and change...they did come back with...with legislation
27.
      which I said was passed April...or will be effective April 23rd, 1980,
28.
      which says basically, there will be a five cent per gallon incentive
29.
      on alcohol. There's ten cents on all other fuels in the State
30.
      of Iowa, and there's only five cent Sales Tax on gasohol. There

      is still a five percent incentive in that state.

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Thank you, Mr. President. Few...few years ago, not too long,

      Senator Geo-Karis first introduced gasohol to the State of Illinois,

      when she was Chairman of the Illinois Energy Resource Commission,

      of which I've been a member since its inception. Senator Knuppel,
6.
      Representative Joe Lucco, Representative Dan Pierce, all have

      supported gasohol, and this last spring, if I'm not mistaken,

      Senator Buzbee, who is the current Chairman of the IERC supported

      Senate Bill 1518. Ladies and Gentlemen.what we fail to realize
10.
      that every dollar that we pay to OPEC goes to OPEC and never
11.
      comes home unless they purchase our own land with the profits they

      make. But every dollar that we expend here in Illinois for a

      product derived and produced in Illinois has a spinoff of four to
14.
      five dollars, in alied services connected with that dollar that's
15.
      flowing in the mainstream of our economy. I've been in the

      gasoline business for some twenty odd years, and I know that right

      now maybe, gasohol is not just as competitive as it could be, but
18.
      when you look at a fifty dollar a barrel cost of oil that's coming,

      when you look at gasoline that will cost two dollars a gallon, and

      been using gasohol in both of my cars for the last ten months,

      I've had the least amount of motor trouble, it's cost efficient,

       I get more mileage, it's less pollusive and believe me it's much
18.
      better, I don't even smell it. I certainly urge the override of

       this veto as much as I regret to disagree my Governor, but...and

       I will say that he has encouraged the use of gasohol in all the

       State fleet and even lately came out with an edict on it. I

      heartily support the bill.

And after reading your Veto Message, I 7. agree you didn't know anything about it. And if you just listen 8. a few minutes maybe you could be enlightened a little bit. And just to make a few comments what the Iowa Governor 14. thinks of what's going on in his state now that Archer Daniels 15. Midlen is putting a plant in his area, in the State of Iowa other 16. than the State of Illinois. I'd just like to give you a few cost 17. factors, you think this million three this year, and 2.2 million dollars 18. going to cost your budget too much, just look at a few things that 19. we're going to be losing out on here today. The total capital 20. investment on that plant is two hundred and forty-eight million dollars. 21. The plant would employ one hundred workers. There's seventy...to 22. eighty million bushels of corn that would be processed. The 23. City of Des Moines, the plant will more than double Des Moines' 24. corn industrial tax base of a hundred and eighty-eight million 25. dollars. The plant would provide 3.5 million in taxes for the 26. city annually. The plant would provide up to four million for 27. Des Moines' school districts, up to two million for the county. 28. Transportation costs, savings from the plant...be considerable. The 29. ...the export and other corn by-products used and high protein for 30. animal feeds could have a favorable balance...balance of payments 31. of approximately four hundred million dollars. Now, this is...this 32. is just part of the reason there should be some incentives. And 33.

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Governor, while we go on and the other states that are not satisfied

      with it, fifteen states, fifteen states had this type of leg-
      islation last year, since that time there's twenty-six states,
3.
      and there are several states pending. Now, I want to send him
4.

      down a map so that he can see what states around us is addressing
      this program. Illinois being one of the largest producers of

      corn, and one of the largest producers of alcohol, and yet it's
7.
      all going to other states. One state in the United States has
8.
     passed legislation saying they won't buy alcohol from any state
9.
      that doesn't have an incentive. You know, when this bill passed
10.
     out of the Senate before we had 54 votes. I don't know how many
11.
     members are here on the Floor today, but I would hope that...that

      the members that are here would...would look at this...this bill

     real seriously. We have support by the Illinois manufacturers,

      the Illinois corn producers, the Illinois Alcohol Fuel Association,

     and some others. I think this bill is good for the people of the

Senate Bill 3. 1750 addresses a problem that I think is...is very serious and critical to this particular bill. Last year, a year ago, we passed 4. legislation to increase rates on...to establish a permanent flat 5. fee of seventy-five dollars for...or a hundred and fifty dollar 6. fee for vehicles traveling for conservation purposes throughout 7. the State. I put a bill in which would establish a new permit 8. flat fee of seventy-five dollars for seventy-five mile radius 9. for soil conservation vehicles exceeding the dimensions permitted 10. within the necessary permit. This fee shall be limited...limited 11. continuous...to continuous operations good for...not to continuous 12. operations but only good for ninetv days. I think this is a good 13. bill it...it's an advantage to municipalities as well as agricultureal 14. communities, and I would be glad to answer any guestions. I would 15. ask for a favorable roll call. 16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 17. Is there discussion? Is there discussion? The question is, 18. shall Senate Bill 1... Senator Berning. 19. SENATOR BERNING:

- I'm not sure that the sponsor can answer the question that 21. is raised in my mind over the statement in the Veto Message, 22. namely to allow special options for one group might encourage other 23. special groups to seek similar options. Senator, this always is 24. a concern of most of us. Once we set a precedent it is difficult 25. to take an adverse position the next time we are confronted. 26. is your response to this? 27.

It was an area that was overlooked by them at the 7. time when the rates were increased. And what we're trying to do 8. is move that down, not move it down less than it's ever been in the 9. past just...just since that legislation was passed. It was...it 10. was overlooked, those people are being punished by that on the... 11. on the short distance transportation situation, and this just 12. addresses that part. It corrects it from the original bill. It's 13. still five hundred percent higher than it was prior to the legislation 14. last year. 15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 16. Further discussion? Senator McMillan. 17. SENATOR MCMILLAN: 18. I...I apologize if I didn't hear completely what Senator 19. Coffey said, but I think the main...the main point is contrary 20. to the...the assertion made in the Veto Message this isn't providing 21. for a special exemption, what it really is doing is...is providing 22. a correction for really a gross error that was made when the whole 23. structure was rewritten. 24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 25. Further discussion? Senator Davidson. 26. SENATOR DAVIDSON: 27. Yes, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I rise in 28. support of this override, and it's exactly as Senator McMillan has 29. said. When we worked out of the Motor Vehicle Commission two years 30. ago to work out a change in license plates and fees and a way to 31. expedite so those people who did need overweight and oversize 32.

permits could get them on...by telephone through a setup. They went up

- 1. the fees by, in some cases almost a thousand percent, everybody
- 2. agreed to that, but in this no one looked at this item which

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      to appropriate all monies that are spent. In the past many times

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support of it after several discussions with them. Senator Geo-Karis. 4. SENATOR GEO-KARIS: 5. Will the sponsor yield for a question? I can't seem... 6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 7. ... Indicates he will yield. Senator Geo-Karis. SENATOR GEO-KARIS: 8. Senator Johns, I can't seem to find...how much is involved 9. ...in this...your amendment? 10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 11. Senator Johns. 12. SENATOR JOHNS: 13. Senator, I went through it initially earlier in my 14. comments, it's six hundred thousand. 15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 16. Senator Geo-Karis. 17. SENATOR GEO-KARIS: 18. I'd like to speak in favor of his motion because ethacoal is a 19. process that would save us an awful lot of ground 20. being polluted through the scrubber system. The...the 21. initial scrubber system, I can tell you, for instance in 22. Morris, Illinois, and I've talked to people from the utilities 23. companies, they need about fifteen hundred...acres to get rid 24. of the...the...refuse from the scrubber systems and that 25. goes into the ground and that will affect our water systems. 26. Senator Nimrod. 5. SENATOR NIMROD: Senator Johns it's come to my attention, if I recall, 6. we had made a...General Revenue appropriation of some twenty-7. five thousand dollars for research on ethacoal. Are you...are 8. you aware of that and...if you are, what's happened to that 9. report? 10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 11. All right. Senator Johns. 12. SENATOR JOHNS: 13. Mr. President and Senator Nimrod, if you would look 14. back into the research, it was Senator Johns who first moved 15. that twenty-five thousand dollars for ethacoal research, about 16. a year or two ago. And they've utilized that money and now 17. they're drawing down on their own university resources of 18. twenty some odd thousand dollars a year out of their own 19. engineering department in research along these lines and 20. said, they're begging us for more money all the time 21. and so this is the field that I think that they should seek to 22. follow and so I supported this amendment and I gladly accepted 23. its obligation on this side of the aisle. 24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 25. Senator Nimrod. 26. SENATOR NIMROD: 27. Well, Senator Johns, I'm one who supports ethacoal and 28. its development, however, I think that this request is premature. 29. What we have not done, is we have not even looked at the research 30. report and the additional money that the university is spending 31. to see whether or not a demonstration plant is feasible. And 32.

I think that if we're going to request additional money, we

- ought to be requesting money so that we can determine not l. 2. to put it into a construction of a building or a...a plant, we ought to be putting it into...in fact, we haven't even 3. determined whether or not the chemical process will or will 4. not work. So here we are already going ahead with a...or 5. technological process whether it's going to work or not. Here 6. we are going ahead appropriating money for buildings on...to 7. a university that hasn't really stood it up and said they want 8. the project. I'm sure they'll be glad to accept it, if we 9. give it to them, but I think we're just a little bit premature 10. in what we're doing and if we really want to develop ethacoal 11. I think we ought to look at the feasibility study, get that 12. research report back here and find out what is the best way 13. to go ahead and whether or not that technology can go ahead 14. and proceed. This...this seems to me that this particular 15. bill in...in the case of the Governor has vetoed it 16. properly because we're really doing something with the money 17. before we even know whether or not a system works. And 18. I think that becomes rather, in this case, irresponsible. 19. And I would like to see ethacoal be successful. And I think that 20. the ultimate answer in Illinois is to make all of...of the alcohols 21. out of coal. And I think this would set us back and do us a 22. disservice and I would hold off on that project. 23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 24. Senator Buzbee. 25. SENATOR BUZBEE: 26. I have been following this project...rather closely for 27.
- quite some time because of the fact that, first of all the university is in the town where I live, and secondly because of my intense interest in...in alternative methods of, first of all using coal and...and promoting the use of Illinois coal in particular and...and alternative methods of coming up with energy sources. As Senator Nimrod pointed out, I think there

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      are some...there is some potential...for...for ethacoll
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      processes in the future. A lot of research remains to be
 3.
      done and that research is going on at Southern Illinois
4.
      University with the initial stimulus coming from the
5.
      twenty-five thousand dollars, which Senator Johns did add
      a year or so ago for their research effort. I have, however,
6.
      that research needs to continue on before we get to the

      point of building a pilot project. I have here a letter
      which was delivered to me this morning from the University

      Chancellor's Office, saying that this amendment which would

      give SIUC six hundred thousand dollars for planning, design,

      ...facility. Ethacoal is a process wherein ethyl alcohol

      and coal are mixed producing solid liquid and gaseous

      products. The process may in the long run be part of a solution

      to the problem of high sulfur in Illinois coal. The university

      received twenty-five thousand dollars from the State for research
17.
      in the process and when these funds were depleted, reallocated
18.
      internal resources to continue the research. In fact, SIUC
19.
      is now spending more than two million dollars a year in an
20.
      attempt to solve the high sulfur problem, research on ethacoal
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      is a part of this effort. However, we believe that no one yet
22.
      knows enough about the ethacoal process to spend wisely six
23.
      hundred thousand dollars on a demonstration facility. We need
24.
      an additional one hundred and twenty-three thousand two hundred
25.
      dollars for basic research and we are actively seeking it from
26.
      Federal sources. If that effort is not successful, we will

       include a request for one hundred and twenty-three thousand,

       two hundred dollars in our FY-82 operating budget. We do not

       support the effort to override the Governor's Veto of the

       ethacoal amendment. That's from the University Chancellor's
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       Office at Southern Illinois University. I think there has

       been an attitude among a lot of members of this General
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l. Assembly that a lot of the universities in this State continually 2. have their hand out asking for...for money. Here's a case 3. where the university says you're trying to give us money that 4. we don't want. Please don't give it to us, let us do our research. 5. If we're...if we don't come up with the Federal dollars to finish 6. the research we will ask for that small portion, that one hundred 7. and twenty-three thousand, in the FY-'82 request. But in the 8. meantime, we don't want the money to build the facility on our 9. campus, we're not ready for that yet. I rise in opposition...to 10. this override attempt. 11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) Senator Knuppel. 12. 13. SENATOR KNUPPEL: I just want to say two things. First of all I want to answer 14. Senator Sommer when he asked Senator Johns how...how we'd ever 15. believe the Governor might change his mind and I'd remind him 16. that wise men change their mind many, many times, fools never, 17. and I thought he had a wise Governor, that's one. Two, I'll 18. tell you...you know we've been sitting here, I don't care how 19. this bill goes, I'm going to be out of here in a couple of 20. months. The ground breaking ceremony two weeks 10. ago in East Alton in Senator Vadalabene's district...pardon 11. me, Senator Demuzio's district, it's very, very, close...it's 12. right...right on the line. The State of Illinois has committed 13. eighteen million dollars to that project. Fortunately, we 14. found a major corporation, not an Illinois corporation, but 15. a major corporation, Allis Chalmers, that more than doubled their 16. initial commitment and they're putting eighty-five million 17. dollars into it. But the State of Illinois, through our 18. Coal Development Bond Fund, has committed eighteen million 19. dollars to that. I'm very proud of that, it's the first 20. major project that we're going to see in Illinois in that 21. process. I was just now told by the gentleman from the 22. Institute of Natural Resources, they just got a call from 23. Washington, just received the call, and the Senate-House 24. Conference Committee...is going to write their conference 25. report...recommending the funding of both the Noble County, 26. Ohio and the Perry County, Illinois projects. If that 27. happens, that's going to be major, major bucks that comes 28. into the State of Illinois for another coal gasification 29. type project. I just wanted to say that that kind of ... again 30. the university does not want the money on this project, doesn't 31. think they can spend it wisely at this point and would much 32.

prefer to let them go at a little bit slower effort as far as

1. getting their research accomplished before they start to build something without really knowing exactly what their...what 2. they need to build. 3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 4. Further discussion? Senator Johns may close. 5. SENATOR JOHNS: 6. Yeah, I think Senator Buzbee, had you listened closely 7. when I made that slip about Illinois not having put money 8. into it, I corrected that within the very few further words 9. to say that, yes they had. Because I'm much aware, as you 10. know, 'cause I vote on that sort of thing with you and 11. others and I wanted you to know that if you read the tape 12. and listen to it, you'll find that I corrected that statement 13. about Illinois. But the Federal Government, as you well know, 14. did...put nothing into that, in fact, they refused to. So, 15. let's talk about the situation. Is the university today 16. bargaining off coal and the research for maybe salary increases 17. or other appropriations. They told me it 28. would be six months before they're ready to use this money. 29. What's six months in the future of coal. As John Knuppel 30. knows, we've battered our damn heads against the wall for so long 31. in this State to get anybody to recognize the tremendous 32. needs that we have on coal and where are we today. if we're off the ground at all, as far as I'm concerned.

The reason we did that was because the university systems in this 31. State have been falling behind in their pay scales for several years, falling behind first of all other comparable universities 32. in other states and secondly, falling behind other State 33.

      employees in their pay scales. We made the addition, the Governor

      saw fit to cut back to his recommended level of monies for salary
 3.
      increases. Now there's been a tremendous amount of machinations

      going on ever since then as to what's going to happen.

      he was committed to some catch up money for some time in the

      future, however, he did not specify what amount of catch up

They are...be 2. treated much, much better, even without this override than 3. any others are so I see no reason for the override and I'd 4. urge the defeat of the motion. 5. PRESIDENT: 6. Further discussion? Senator Rhoads. 7. SENATOR RHOADS: 8. Just briefly, Mr. President.
