Senator Grotberg. 4. SENATOR GROTBERG: 5. Thank you, Mr. President. A question of the sponsor. 6. 7. PRESIDENT: Indicates he will yield, Senator Grotberg. 8. 9. Senator Egan, I do not have the extention amendment before me, 10. but you mentioned April 1st, has it been amended back to April 1st, 11. is the Calendar incorrect? 12. PRESIDENT: 13. Senator Egan. 14. SENATOR EGAN: 15. Yes, that was mistakenly put in the bill originally, December 16. and we moved it back to April. That was the agreement. 17. PRESIDENT: 18. Further discussion? Senator McMillan. 19. SENATOR McMILLAN: 20. Mr. President, and members of the Senate. As far as I'm concerned 21. my objections are not...not minor but they may not be all that 22. significant. I think before you vote on this bill, you should 23 understand what you're doing. There are two procedures now, one 24. called the accelerated procedure, and the other the estimation 25. procedure which allow counties that have taxing districts that 26. overlap into the next county to speed up their process of extending 27. taxes. This bill provides a third option, that option allows 28. for an estimation and if they extend too much or too little they 29.

reconcile that the following year, rather than reconcile that

with the second billing of the current year. Now, that appears

to be something that would work very smoothly, but part of the

problem is, if they happen to raise too little and have to sock

l. an extra burden on the tax extension for the next year, especially 2. if you have communities that are growing where there are new houses or new apartment buildings or new industry coming on the 3. tax rolls, they're going to be socked with an extra tax which was 4. really the liability of Property Tax owners the year before. Or 5. if the property changes hand...hands, and if the lawyers have not 6. gotten an extra fee for writing the contract just so, then there 7. will be people in the second year who own property who are going 8. to have taxpaying responsibilities who...who frankly weren't even 9. there the year before when the liability was really created. So, 10. I understand what this attempts to do, but very frankly, it will 11. create a monster for certain counties particularly where they 12. happen to be expanding either with housing or construction or 13. otherwise. And I really think it is something that you may find 14. that the...both the assessing officials and the County Clerk, 15. and the County Treasurer, and the taxpayers in your areas will 16. not be happy when this is implemented. 17. 18. Further discussion? Senator Schaffer. 19. SENATOR SCHAFFER: 20. Well, I think that Senator McMillan's points have validity, but 21. I nonetheless rise in support of this bill and this amendment. 22. We have in my area, my home county has had what we commonly call 23. assessment wars and has found itself months and months behind 24. schedule, and unfortunately we have a lot of overlaping 25. And we have, because of our inability to get our act together, we 26. have caused literally millions of dollars in interest for tax 27. anticipation warrants because massive taxing districts that have 28. parts of McHenry County have been unable to put together their 29. tax bills. I don't think it's a perfect solution, but I do think 30. it's a step in the right direction, and I urge support of everyone 31. here. And I think that's what it's going to take. 32.

           Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. Yesterday
8.
      we passed out a synopsis of the amendment to this bill. There are
 9.
      some seventeen provisions, most of which are technical. We did
10.
      not pass out the amendment itself because it ran to a hundred and
11.
      twenty-five pages and I asked that that rule be suspended. The
12.
      first of the provisions takes care of a problem in the City of
13.
      Bloomington for establishing a...signature requirements because
14.
      of their new redistricting. The second provision is also technical,
15.
      dealing with new party petitions municipalities with wards and
16.
      counties, and county board districts. The third deals with the
17.
      municipal election schedule, again it is technical. The fourth
18.
      is the consolidated primary for township and municipal Primaries held on
19.
      the same day, that is a technical. On the fifth provision, it
20.
      has some substance to it, we have changed the date of the local
21.
      caucus in order to...advanced it by one week in the month of January
22.
      to the second Tuesday. The sixth provision deals with the odd
23.
      year local elections and provides a mechanism for in person
24.
      absentee voting in the offices of municipal and Township Clerks,
25.
      and also shortens up the time period for...before the election
26.
      in which a person can vote in person. The seventh provision is
27.
      technical, dealing with multi-township Assessors. Eighth provision
28.
      is technical. The ninth is substantive, it deals with...it
29.
      exempts a backdoor referenda from the statutory limit of three
30.
      referendum per election for each unit of local government. Now,
31.
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that's intended to preclude the backdoor referenda from being

delayed due to filling up the ballot. The tenth provision deal...

32.

- 1. is technical dealing with local referenda petitions and the
- 2. objection period. The eleventh provision gives...extends
- 3. poll watcher credentials to the precinct registration day activities.
- 4. The twelfth deals with the local election ballot form. The
- 5. thirteenth is technical, dealing with the township nominating
- 6. petitions, it's a jurisdictional dispute there. The fourteenth
- 7. deals with mandatory training of election judges. The fifteenth
- 8. provision deals with the date of the ballot placement lotteries,
- 9. again technical. The sixteenth is the biannual canvas requirements,
- 10. a technical correction. And the last, the seventeenth, deals with
- 11. the City of Cicero, exclusively, and that is also a technical
- 12. correction. I'll be happy to answer any questions that I can.
- 13. For the most part we've read over this several times with staff
- 14. and others. I don't see any land mines in it, and I do think
- 15. it needs to be implemented for our consolidation of election
- 16. schedule which actually already is in effect, it went into effect
- 17. on the first day of this month.

- 15. date of the change. The other reason is, that the current date
- 16. conflicts with the first day for filing for the caucus nomination
- 17. papers. So, there is...there is a...a dual reason for advancing
- 18. it to the second Tuesday. And I...I don't know of anyone, you
- 19. know, any organized group, such as Municipal League, or township
- 20. officials that...they're objecting to this, I believe they've all
- 21. been informed about it.

      have to be open at all times but as a practical matter usually

      they are because of the fact that they have to call to the

Senator Regner, you made an explanation but no motion. 14. SENATOR REGNER: 15. Well, Senator Buzbee wants to make a motion to concur. I 16. want to move...I'm going to debate it, and suggest we non-concur... 17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 18. All right, Senator... 19. - 31. but just for the last time. This is a 5.3 million dollar sup-
- 32. plemental appropriation for the Illinois State Scholarship Commission.
- And what...what it'll do, will enable the State Scholarship

- 1. Commission to process applications for the second semester no
- 2. later than February 15th for those students who do not either
- 3. receive anything in the first half who are coming in the second
- 4. semester, and second and third quarter. I urge its concurrence.
- 5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
- 6. Is there discussion? Senator Regner.
- 7. SENATOR REGNER:
- 8. Well, I'm going to urge a No vote on the concurrence motion.
- 9. I did...did tell Senator DeAngelis I'd let him make the motion.
- 10. But, you know, here we go again, the Scholarship Commission con-
- 11. 'tinually spends over and above what we give them in the original
- 12. appropriation. Now, we passed the bill out of here, I did vote
- 13. No on it the other day, it's in the House right now, and I think

- 15. of all, I'm opposed to the whole concept of additional monies

- Thank you, Mr. President, and Senators. I'll be brief.
- This...the new director of this agency has shown every evidence
- 25. he's going to cooperate with this Legislature. We've talked for

In this we allocate to an agency 15. to administer, now they have to design that so it can be spread 16. around in the proper manner. Now, they can't keep coming back 17. and saying we need more, we need more. For example, each of 18. us gets two General Assembly Scholarships, and we award them, 19. and then we get letters from somebody that we probably would have 20. liked to awarded over those that we awarded to but they came in 21. afterwards. Well, we don't come back and say hey, we need a 22. couple of extra General Assembly Scholarships cause somebody 23. else didn't get in ahead of the other one. Now, there's only 24. so much money for these scholarships, and I know that we'd like 25. to give everybody one. We're not obligated to give any scholarships. 26. And I think that the General Assembly and the taxpayers and the 27. people of the State of Illinois are very generous in giving these 28. scholarships, and appropriating the money. But as Senator Regner 29.

Senator Maitland. 10. SENATOR MAITLAND: 11. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the 12. Senate. I guess I've been as critical of this agency as anyone 13. in this Chamber, have told them so, and have spoken in front 14. of this Chamber in that regard. I think the appropriation before 15. us today is somewhat of a compromise from one we had several 16. days ago. - 32. lead the charge against them next spring. But for now I think
- 33. we need to...appropriate this money to get a number of young people

- Senator Grotberg.
- 4. SENATOR GROTBERG:
- 5. Thank you, Mr. President. I believe somebody should really
- 6. address what the problem is. We've all heard, as members of the
- 7. Appropriation Committee, we've taken the heat from this, what we
- 8. call a crazy commission. They are improving, I agree with Senator
- 9. Newhouse, but the main thrust is that come January there are
- 10. going to be kids on the street again, out of school, the teachers
- 11. will be out of work, on unemployment comp. I know one school is
- 12. going to have to put out thirty pink slips in their Christmas
- paycheck for that January class that will not come in because
- they depend so heavily upon this. This is really a better bet
- than Public Aid money, because they're learning something. You

Now, the reason I'm a little sensitive 20. to this particular bill, Senator, as I told you yesterday, 21. back in June the Index Division on the original part of your 22. bill, had assured me that they had the million-two in their 23. budget for the...mailing of the pamphlets. Now, we come 24. back with an additional five hundred and fifty thousand that 25. there's been no committee hearing on, whatsoever, that our 26. Appropriations Committees Maven't apparently been involved 27. with whatsoever. I'd just like to have some...with all sincerity, 28. some idea as to what the money is going to be spent on. 29. Well, then, the second division vehicles that travel in 16. the State of Illinois then do not have to have an Illinois 17. 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- second division motor vehicles. And that's what we're talking l. 2. about, trucks. What this bill does, is so that we don't have 3. the problem. The Illinois State Police were arresting Indiana domicile trucks and truckers which had no requirement to have 4. a safety sticker on them in...here in Illinois. The other parts, 5. which come under the Federal part apply. What this bill does, 6. it says if you are an Illinois domiciled trucker, you have to 7. continue the safety inspection as it should be. But it will 8. remove the hassle that we're having from a number of interstate 9. motor vehicle people being arrested when they're not domiciled 10. in Illinois and the state where they are domiciled has removed 11. that safety inspection. That's what it does, it's trying to 12. remove a problem on movement of freight through Illinois by 13. people who are domiciled in Indiana and I'd urge a Yes vote on 14. the concurrence on the Conference Committee Report. This came 15. out of the Motor Vehicle Laws responsibility where ... from a 16. hearing which came about which we started on in July. 17. PRESIDENT: 18. Further discussion? Senator Vadalabene. 19. SENATOR VADALABENE: 20. Yeah, just briefly because Senator Coffey and Senator Davidson 21. did express the support of this legislation. I too, happen to 22. be a member of the Motor Vehicle Laws Commission of which this 23. is a product and urge all my colleagues to support it. 24.
