4. our guests in the gallery please rise. Prayer this afternoon

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Thank you, Rabbi. Will the members and our guests in the  
11. gallery please remain standing. Mr. Doorkeeper, please close the  
12. door. Senator Shapiro.

13. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

14. Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. It's  
15. extremely difficult to find the words that aptly describe the  
16. legislative activity of our colleague, Senator Mary Lou Kent. She  
17. was here in the Senate with us just a short time. But her long  
18. years of being a State Representative, to this point, had done  
19. her well. She was enthused about being in the Senate, and was  
20. out, just like she had been, when she was a State Representative,  
21. because her forte was to represent the people who put her in  
22. office, and to that end she did an excellent job. All of us, I  
23. know, will miss Mary Lou, she was a good Legislator, did the right  
24. things, knew what to do, and her replacement, whomever that may  
25. be, will have a difficult job filling her shoes. I would now  
26. like to ask the Senate, and the people in the gallery to spend  
27. one moment of silence for Mary Lou.

31. Thank you, Mr. President. I move that reading and approval

6. All right, you've heard the motion as put by Senator Johns.  
7. Any discussion? If not, all in favor signify by saying Aye. All  
8. opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries. So ordered.  
9. If I can have the attention of the members. This Chamber is  
10. honored today to have a distinguished visitor from a foreign  
11. country, one who is...is himself a member of the Assembly of  
12. that country. And the Chair will yield to Senators Nedza and  
13. Grotberg.

14. SENATOR NEDZA:

15. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
16. Senate. It is a personal pleasure for me, because of the fact  
17. that in the fall of last year Senators Grotberg, Moore, and myself  
18. had the pleasure of paying a visit to their illustrious country,  
19. and they were very gracious as hosts and as friends. During the  
20. short time that we were there, we had the opportunity to really  
21. learn of the wisdom of the East. And some of the points that they  
22. had, I say with due respect to our wonderful Nation, but we can  
23. learn from some of those things that they have had for many, many  
24. centuries. During the last legislative Session, this Body chose  
25. to pass a resolution in which the State of Illinois became a brother  
26. State of the Island of Taiwan. And I'm pleased to announce  
27. to you at this time, that the Legislative Body of the 6th Provisional  
28. Assembly in the third Session of its 8th Provisional Assembly on  
29. January the 20th, 1981, concurred with that resolution, so therefore  
30. we are now brother States. And we are most pleased to have with  
31. us the Deputy Speaker of the Taiwan Provisional Assembly, the  
32. Honorable Lun-Chou Wei, and to translate for him is his brother,  
33. who is a Professor at the University of Illinois, Lun-Shin Wei.

1. I now present to you, Mr. Lun-Chou Wei.

16. announcement that that brother State relationship is going to be  
17. meaningful to all of the people of Illinois. Mark the first week  
18. in May on your calendar. Thank you, very much, and thank you,  
19. Gentlemen.

8. Thank you, Mr. President. This resolution is to extend the

31. Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I

2. You've heard the request. Is leave granted? Leave is granted.

4. if I can have the attention of the membership. If you'll turn to  
5. page 3 on the Calendar, on the...on the Order of Consideration

22. SENATOR JOHNS:

23. Mr. President, I move for the adoption of that committee  
24. report.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. All right, Senator Johns has moved the adoption of the report  
27. on...of the Committee on Committees. Is there any discussion? If not,  
28. those in favor of the adoption of the motion will vote Aye. Those  
29. opposed will vote...Senator Walsh.

30. SENATOR WALSH:

31. I'm sorry, Mr. President, I had my light on, apparently you  
32. didn't see it. Most of what has to be said on this subject, I  
33. guess was said last week. But I...I do think that it's important

1. to note for the record that once again the...the Democrat Party  
2. is insisting on a...on a top-heavy ratio in committees by this  
3. ...by this committee report of 7 to 4 on most...on just about  
4. all of the committees, and certainly all the major committees.  
5. I was hopeful that...that the Leadership on the other side of  
6. the aisle would...would have second thoughts, and maybe see  
7. the reasonableness of our position that the ratio be something  
8. less than that, 6 to 4 or...or really 5 to 4, which would more  
9. accurately represent the...the breakdown in the membership of  
10. the Senate. But absent any...any change of heart by the Leadership,  
11. I...I thought then, possibly, some of the members on the other side  
12. of the aisle, who fashion themselves as having some independent  
13. strain, some...some recognition for what is fair and equitable  
14. might not vote to approve this committee report. There are those  
15. on that side of the aisle who have felt the brunt of the Machine  
16. politics, who have seen...who have felt the heavy hand, who have  
17. had the lead foot stamp on them, and I thought possibly they  
18. would see what it's like to be the underdog and to see that  
19. possibly fairness and equity should prevail. But I...apparently  
20. those people who...who have been in that position have jumped in  
21. the boot and are now part of the lead boot, and if they don't see  
22. the error of their ways, I hope they recognize that they're going  
23. to put us in a very difficult position two years from now when  
24. most certainly the Republicans will control the Senate of the  
25. State of Illinois. I urge a No vote.

28. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

29. It's not on that point, but I would like to, if I may...

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Oh, just discuss whatever you want.

32. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

33. Well, I...Senator Rock, that's the nicest thing you've said



1. to me all day. Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
2. Senate. It was nice to see your beaming personality...way.  
3. I'd like to be added as an immediate joint co-sponsor to Senate Bill  
4. 104 of Senator Jeremiah Joyce, whose...permission I've obtained.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. You've heard the request. Is leave granted? Leave is granted.  
7. Further discussion? Senator Egan.

8. SENATOR EGAN:

9. Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I would  
10. like to ask, if I may, Senator Walsh, for those of us who have  
11. an independent bent, if there's any consideration attendant with  
12. that...with that offer?

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Any further discussion? If not, Senator Johns has moved

32. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.

1. There have been some questions that are being asked about the  
2. schedule. The Assignment of Bills Committee Report will be read  
3. and thus each of the committees will be assigned bills for their  
4. hearing and ultimate disposition. And the proposal that Senator  
5. Shapiro and I spoke about this morning, would call for us to  
6. return on Wednesday, March the 18th, and immediately begin  
7. committee hearings. And I wish to alert both the sponsors of  
8. the bills, and everybody will receive a copy of the assignment  
9. reports so you will know where your bills have been assigned.  
10. I would urge the sponsors to contact the committee chairmen and  
11. urge the committee chairmen, for those committees particularly  
12. that will meet next week, that is March 18th and 19th, to post  
13. bills for hearing, so that we can...the process can begin. We  
14. will, I hope, next week have worked out, in consultation with  
15. Senator Shapiro, some deadlines. The House Speaker has informed  
16. me that the House probably will not have any deadlines for movement  
17. of bills from one House to the other. I think, hopefully, he will  
18. reconsider that position, but at any rate, I think it's in our  
19. best interest that some deadlines be established. And we will  
20. do that, I hope, next week. In the meantime, I would ask the  
21. Pages to distribute these schedules for the committee hearings,  
22. and that will take us to the week of May 1st. Now there is only...  
23. there is but one caveat, that the week of April 6th, the House  
24. does not intend to be in Session at all, I am told, the week  
25. of April 6th. It seems to me, depending on the committee load  
26. we will...we may well have to be here. Now, I'm fully aware that  
27. there are local elections throughout this State on April the 7th,  
28. but it's quite possible, and we will again make that determination  
29. next week, that perhaps...perhaps you ought to pencil it in. It  
30. may well be necessary for us to be here on April the 8th and April  
31. the 9th in order to handle the committee loads. Some of the  
32. committees, frankly, there are a number of...a lot of bills that  
33. have to be handled. In the meantime, at the close of business today,

1. after the assignment of bills, and after the introduction of the  
2. new bills, we will adjourn until Wednesday, March the 18th at the  
3. hour of noon. I would ask the committee chairmen and the Minority  
4. Spokesmen to solicit the sponsors to post their bills for next  
5. week, and ask the committee chairmen to please get the notices  
6. out in accordance with the applicable rules.
