That kind of ... 22. conduct in a Senate committee is reprehensible, it is unjustified, 23. it demeans the dignity of the Senate, the chairman of that 24. committee owes an apology, not only to the sponsor of the 25. bill, but to every single member of that committee and to every 26. single member of the Senate. Now, it must not be tolerated, be 27. it in the Labor and Commerce Committee, the Elections Committee, 28. the Revenue Committee or any other committee. It's insulting 29. enough to have a proportional representation lopsided seven 30. to four, that's insulting enough. But to then use that and 31. abuse that kind of power the way it has been abused by some 32.
