2. The hour of nine having arrived the Senate will please come
3. to order. Will the members please be at their desks. Will our
4. guests in the gallery please rise. Our prayer this morning
5. by the Reverend Rudolph Shoultz, Union Baptist Church, Spring-
6. field. Reverend.

7. REVEREND RUDOLPH SHOULTZ:

8. (Prayer given by Reverend Rudolph Shoultz)

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Thank you, Reverend. Reading of the Journal. Senator
11. Johns.

12. SENATOR JOHNS:

13. Thank you, Mr. President. I move that reading and approval
14. of the Journals of Wednesday, June the 17th; Thursday, June the
15. 18th; Friday, June the 19th; Monday, June the 22nd; Tuesday,
16. June the 23rd; Wednesday, June the 24th; Thursday, June the
17. 25th, Friday, June the 26th; Saturday, June the 27th; Sunday,
18. June the 28th and Monday, June the 29th in the year of 1981
19. be postponed pending arrival of the printed Journals.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. You've heard the motion as placed by Senator Johns. Any
22. discussion? If not, all in favor signify by saying Aye. All
23. opposed. The Ayes have it. Motion carries. So ordered.
24. Messages from the House.

25. SECRETARY:

26. A Message from the House by Mr. Leone, Clerk.

27. Mr. President - I am directed to inform the Senate
28. the House of Representatives refused to concur with the Senate
29. in the adoption of their amendments to bills with the following
30. titles:

31. House Bill 28 with Senate Amendment 1; House Bill 46
32. with Senate Amendment 1 and 2; House Bill 439 with Senate
33. Amendments 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9; House Bill 654 with

1. Senate Amendment 2; House Bill 852 with Senate Amendments 1, 3,
2. 4, and 5; House Bill 1041 with Senate Amendment 1; House Bill
3. 1630 with Senate Amendment 1 and 2; House Bill 1632 with Senate
4. Amendment 1 and House Bill 1789 with Senate Amendment 3.

5. A Message from the House by Mr. Leone, Clerk.

6. Mr. President - I am directed to inform the Senate the
7. House of Representatives concurred with the Senate in the passage
8. of bills with the following titles, together with the following
9. amendments...House amendments:

10. Senate Bill 381 with House Amendments 2 and 4; Senate
11. Bill 517 with House Amendments 4, 5, 6, and 7; Senate Bill 671
12. with House Amendments 1, 2, 3, and 4; Senate...Senate Bill 956
13. with House Amendment 1; Senate Bill 1157 with House Amendments
14. 1 and 4; Senate Bill 1228 with House Amendment 2.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Senator Bruce, for what purpose do you arise?

17. SENATOR BRUCE:

18. Yeah,...Senator Rock, you filed a motion on those bills
19. on Consideration Postponed, while we're at a lull, we've never
20. gotten to that and our Calendar keeps printing and I know this
21. will be the last Calendar we print this Session, but I'd like
22. to take up that motion, with your leave, and...and so we don't
23. have to keep printing two pages of the Calendar.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. That's in order. Read the motion, Mr. Secretary.

26. SECRETARY:

27. I...I move to recommit the following bills on the Order of
28. Consideration Postponed to the last committee which considered
29. them as follows:

30. House Bills 36, Judiciary II; 67, Transportation; 69,
31. Revenue; 161, Executive; 183, Insurance and Licensed Activities;
32. 429, Appropriations II; 497, Elementary and Secondary Education;

5. Local Government and Senate Bill 855, Revenue; Senate Joint
6. Resolution 18, Executive; Senate Joint Resolution 46, Executive.
7. Signed, Senators Rock and...Weaver.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Bruce.

10. SENATOR BRUCE:

11. Yes, this...this is just the...a motion dealing with all
12. of the House Bills that are on Consideration Postponed, rereferring
13. those bills to the committees from whence they came and I would
14. move for the suspension of the rules and immediate consideration
15. of the motion.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. You've heard the motion. Any discussion? If not, all in
18. favor signify by saying Aye. All Opposed. The Ayes have it.
19. The motion carries. The rules are suspended. Senator Bruce
20. now moves the adoption of the Motion in Writing with respect to
21. the rereferral of the bills on Consideration Postponed. All in
22. favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it.
23. The motion carries. And it's so ordered. Yours is not in there,
24. George. Senator...Senator Sangmeister.

25. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

26. I want to clarify something, because I think our rules are
27. different than the House. On a Conference Committee Report, when
28. it comes back, has the sponsor lost control of that bill? Can
29. any member on the...Conference Committee Report move that that
30. Conference Committee Report be adopted or is it still under the
31. control of the sponsor? I think, over in the House they've got
32. a rule that anybody that's on the Conference Committee...can
33. move to...adopt that Conference Committee Report. And I was

1. just wondering, what is our Senate rule on that?

2. PRESIDENT:

3. My understanding is, yes, that...once it has gone to
4. conference, any member of the majority...of that Conference Com-
5. mittee...can move it.

6. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

7. The Senate as well?

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Yes, Sir. Yes, Senator Geo-Karis.

10. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

11. Well, by the same token though,...if a sponsor wants to
12. Table the bill, they have the right to do that. Right? I mean,
13. suppose a conference report comes out...I mean, I'll just give
14. you a hypothetical now, that...it is the manner that...

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Well, when...when we get to that,...and it's not a hypo-
17. thetical, then I'll surely rule. Otherwise, we can have a
18. discussion here all day on what...what may or may not happen.
19. Senator Joyce.

20. SENATOR JEREMIAH JOYCE:

21. Inquiry of the Chair.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Yes.

24. SENATOR JEREMIAH JOYCE:

25. Speaking of discussions all day, are we going to go to
26. Secretary's Desk, Resolutions?

27. PRESIDENT:

28. I didn't know...well...yes, at some point. Do you...do you
29. have anything on there you want to go to?

30. SENATOR JEREMIAH JOYCE:

31. Yes, I...yes, I'd would like to...go to Secretary Desk...
32. Secretary's Desk, Resolutions, Senate Resolution 138.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Alright. Is there...Senator Joyce has requested leave of
2. the Body to move to the Order of Secretary's Desk, Resolutions.
3. Any discussion? Alright. With leave of the Body, we'll move
4. to page 4 on the Calendar. Senator Demuzio.

5. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

6. Yesterday,...Mr. President, I don't know if you were here
7. or not when we had a discussion about the...bills that are on
8. the...Concurrence Calendar, and I posed the question to...the Chair
9. that if...assuming there were two amendments on a bill and the
10. sponsor wanted to concur in one amendment and nonconcur in another,
11. and that action had been taken by this Body in that...either the
12. affirmative or the...the negative, and then the sponsor asked
13. the...the bill to be left on the Concurrence Calendar. I was
14. informed that that could not happen and that the Secretary would
15. have to inform the House of the...of the action. However,
16. yesterday...Senator Mahar had a bill that he concurred with in
17. several amendments...three amendments and...the...and...moved
18. to nonconcur in the fourth amendment and was...was not...was
19. rejected by the Senate,...requested that the bill be left on
20. the Concurrence Calendar and the Chair allowed that bill to
21. remain on the Calendar. Well, then that seems to be contrary
22. to...

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Well, again, we're...we're dealing with a hypothetical.
25. I...I, in fact, was off the Floor for a great part of yester-
26. day. Senator Bruce.

27. SENATOR BRUCE:

28. As I remember, the motion was to nonconcur and the motion
29. did not pass and so the...the Senate, in fact, did not take
30. action on that amendment. Had the sponsormoved to concur and
31. lost, that would have been action and we would inform the House,
32. but there...there was no motion to do that and so, having had
33. no action taken on the amendment, it...it must stay on our

1. Calendar. It's not a choice of the sponsor, it's...it's there
2. because we haven't disposed of it.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Alright. We are...leave has been granted to move to the
5. Order of Secretary's Desk, Resolutions. Senator Jeremiah Joyce
6. wishes to take up Senate Resolution 138. On the Order of Secre-
7. tary's Desk, Resolutions is Senate Resolution 138. Senator
8. Joyce.

9. SENATOR JEREMIAH JOYCE:

10. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Body. Senate
11. Resolution 138 addresses itself to the...efforts to maintain and
12. preserve the last farm in the City of Chicago, located in the
13. southwest corner of the City of Chicago at 111th and Pulaski.
14. There are a number of people, elected officials, in the south-
15. west side of the City of Chicago who are involved in this
16. effort, including the...Alderman of the 19th Ward, the Alder-
17. man of the 18th Ward, the Alderman of the 14th Ward, the Alder-
18. man of the 23rd Ward, most of the elected officials in the area,
19. a large number of people in the community and there are dis-
20. cussions taking place. And this resolution merely seeks to
21. lend some assistance to that effort and I ask for its adoption.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Any discussion? Senator Ozinga.

24. SENATOR OZINGA:

25. I would like to join the Senator with reference to this
26. little corner nook of the world, shall I say. This lies right
27. ...adjoining my own district and the people that have been on
28. there all along for the...over the years are distant relatives.
29. So, that...I would like permission from the sponsor to be joined
30. as a cosponsor of this resolution and...

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Alright. Senator Ozinga asks leave to be shown as a co-
33. sponsor of Senate Resolution 138. Is leave granted? Leave is

1. granted. Senator Joyce has moved the adoption of Senate
2. Resolution 138. Is there any discussion? If not, all in favor
3. signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. Senate
4. Resolution 138 is adopted. Any other member? Senator DeAngelis.
5. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

6. Senate...Resolution 11...Senate Joint Resolution 11.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. On the Order of Secretary's Desk, Resolutions is Senate
9. Joint Resolution 11, the middle of page 5. Senate Joint
10. Resolution 11, Senator DeAngelis.

11. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

12. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. During
13. the course of the investigation of the Chicago Board of Education,
14. we repeatedly asked those people that were involved if they
15. felt that the system was managable. No one ever gave us an
16. affirmative reply. Some of them did not give us a negative
17. reply, although some did indicate they did not think it was
18. managable. Since we have come back, several people have intro-
19. duced legislation to break-up the Chicago Board. I do not know
20. whether that would be correct or not. But, what this resolution
21. calls for is a study to determine if that board should be
22. regionalized or decentralized and I think it would be more
23. appropriate, before taking action, to determine whether we
24. should do that, rather than take some of the legislation that's
25. been introduced on its face and take that hasty action. I move
26. for the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 11.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator DeAngelis has moved the adoption of Senate Joint
29. Resolution 11. Any discussion? Senator Savickas. Alright.
30. A roll call will be required. It does call for the expenditure
31. of money. Those in favor of the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution
32. 11 will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is
33. open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have

1. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the
2. Ayes are 45, the Nays are none, none Voting Present. The
3. Senate does adopt Senate...Senate Joint Resolution 11 having
4. received the required constitutional majority is declared
5. adopted. Senator Johns, for what purpose do you arise?
6. SENATOR JOHNS:

7. Are we going to handle any other resolutions?

8. PRESIDENT:

9. If any member has one they wish to handle, this is a good
10. time.

11. SENATOR JOHNS:

12. I...I think Frank Savickas was to be recognized first and
13. may I be recognized next, please.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Yes. Senator Savickas.

16. SENATOR SAVICKAS:

17. Yes,...Mr. President and members of the Senate, I have...
18. Senate Resolution 147, which directs the State Board of Education
19. to conduct a study of the courses, subjects, or programs required
20. by law. These are the mandated programs that are taught in
21. Illinois elementary and secondary schools and to list...each
22. of them and the cost of each State-wide, and the cost by the
23. school districts and I would just ask your favorable consideration.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Alright. Senator Savickas has moved the adoption of Senate
26. Resolution 147. Is there any discussion? Those in favor of
27. Senate Resolution...yes, Sir. Senator Davidson.

28. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

29. I'm sorry, I was distracted, but I think we're having a
30. duplication of...of situation because the School Problems
31. Commission has already scheduled public hearings on the de-
32. mandating...and mandate...propositions for the entire different
33. parts of the laws of the State and I think we may have a

1. duplication of an effort, Senator Savickas.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Savickas.

4. SENATOR SAVICKAS:

5. Well, Senator, I don't...I don't...I don't think so. All
6. this does is to ask them to list the cost of these programs.
7. It's not...asking them to remove them or do...just to show us
8. what the costs are. It has nothing to do with removing the
9. programs, getting rid of them, eliminating them...just asks
10. to give us what the costs are.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Keats.

13. SENATOR KEATS:

14. Thank you, Mr. President. I was just going to support
15. Senator Savickas. Actually, they're talking apples and oranges.
16. The...School Problems Commission is...is discussing demanding.
17. We already know in advance what they're going to come with. I
18. mean, anyone who's worked with it...and in terms of finding out
19. the costs, this might be a good idea in terms of the State Board
20. of Education. They'd probably get lost in a closet, but, at
21. least, they could come up with the cost figures and I think
22. Senator Savickas has got a good idea and maybe we'd actually
23. finally find out just how much money we're wasting through
24. political pressure groups.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Alright. Senator Savickas has moved the adoption of Senate
27. Resolution 147. Any further discussion? If not, all in favor
28. signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. Senate
29. Resolution 147 is adopted. Senator Johns.

30. SENATOR JOHNS:

31. If I can have the attention of the members on...on the
32. Floor, please, take a look at Senate Resolution 162 and, if
33. you will, you'll find that that particular resolution tries

1. to resolve a problem...

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Alright. Wait a minute. Senate Resolution 162, the middle
4. of page 4. Senator Johns.

5. SENATOR JOHNS:

6. Thank you, Mr. President. It is exactly as is says. It
7. resolves that it is the sense of the Senate that the hardship
8. cause for the needy and elderly citizens of Illinois by the
9. mismanagement of the Electronic Data Systems Federal Corporation
10. claims must stop. It directs the Illinois delegation to
11. Congress to encourage the Department of Health and Human Services
12. to cancel the contract. That particular agency is located in
13. my home town, has been investigated by Congress and fined one
14. million two hundred thousand dollars for the mismanagement and
15. the abuse of the system helping the elderly and the needy. I
16. certainly encourage you to vote in favor of this resolution.
17. It...it entails no money, no expenditures, just an idea.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Alright. Senator Johns has moved the adoption of Senate
20. Resolution 162. Any discussion? If not, all in favor signify
21. by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The amendment
22. is...I mean, the resolution is declared adopted. Senator De-
23. Angelis.

24. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

25. Thank you, Mr. President. I don't know if this is appropriate
26. or not, but I would like to discharge the Executive Committee
27. from further consideration...or from consideration of Senate...
28. Resolution 288. I'll...I'll explain the resolution. It's not
29. on the Calendar, I know that.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. It's not yet been read in. As soon as we read it in, you
32. can make the appropriate motion. Resolutions.

33. SECRETARY:

1. Senate Resolution 279, congratulatory, offered by Senators
2. ...Senator Kent and all Senators.

3. Senate Resolution 280, it's congratulatory, offered by
4. Senator Dawson.

5. Senate Resolution 281, it's congratulatory, offered by
6. Senators Nimrod, Vadalabene, and all Senators.

7. Senate Resolution 282, it's congratulatory, by the same
8. sponsors.

9. Senate Resolution 283, it's...congratulatory, by the same
10. sponsors.

11. Senate Resolution 284, it's congratulatory, by the same
12. sponsors.

13. Senate Resolution 285, offered by Senator Rock, Nash, and
14. all Senators, it's a death resolution.

15. Senate Resolution 286, offered by Senators Nash, Geo-Karis,
16. Rock, and all Senators, and it's a death resolution.

17. Senate...Senate Resolution 287, offered by Senator Demuzio,
18. and it's congratulatory.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Consent Calendar.

21. SECRETARY:

22. Senate Resolution 288...288, offered by Senator Dawson.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Executive.

25. SECRETARY:

26. Senate Resolution 289, offered by Senators DeAngelis and
27. D'Arco.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

29. Senator DeAngelis, for what purpose do you arise now?

30. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

31. Mr. President, I move to discharge the Executive Committee
32. from consideration of Senate Resolution 289 and move for its...

33. Mr. President, I move for immediate consideration of Senate

1. Resolution 289.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

3. Senator, that would take a roll call vote.

4. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

5. I'd like to explain it first.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Senator DeAngelis moves to suspend the rules for immediate
8. consideration of Senate Resolution 289. All those in favor
9. will vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The Ayes have it.
10. Immediate consideration...we're on Senate Resolution...now...
11. 289. Senator DeAngelis.

12. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

13. Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Resolution 289 is a
14. resolution that would create a special committee on worker's
15. comp. to look at the open ratings bill that was introduced
16. early in the Session. For those of you who may not know,
17. Senate Bill 664 was held...Frank, can I get some attention?
18. Senate Bill...

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Senators, could we have your attention? Could we break-
21. up those conferences? Senator Hall, Senator Degnan, Carroll,
22. Senator Dawson, could we breakup these conferences? Senator
23. DeAngelis.

24. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

25. Senate...Senate Bill 664 was held in committee. I made
26. a commitment when it was held in committee that I would not
27. attempt to discharge the bill, that I would, in fact, put it
28. on summer study. Since the time the bill was introduced,
29. considerable notoriety has been given to the insurance industry's
30. roll in excessive charges on worker's comp. insurance. This
31. study commission will, in fact, hear those...hear the...points
32. of view of all the affected interest groups and it will be
33. reporting back this fall. I would urge its favorable adoption.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Channel 2 News is seeking permission to...videotape in
3. the gallery. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. On this
4. question, Senator D'Arco.

5. SENATOR D'ARCO:

6. Thank you, Mr. President. I also rise in support of the
7. resolution, being a cosponsor of it. Judge Murray recently
8. ordered the...insurance companies to rebate premiums from
9. employers that were in excess of what he thought was reasonable,
10. and there's no doubt that we need this resolution to investigate
11. the workmen's comp. situation, as far as the type of rating that
12. should be in the law concerning workmen's comp. premiums. And
13. I ask all Senators to support this resolution.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

15. Is there any further discussion? If not,...we will have
16. to have a roll call vote on this. This creates a...committee
17. and money will be expended. A roll call vote will be required
18. on this resolution. On the adoption of Senate Resolution 289,
19. those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay.
20. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
21. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 49,
22. the Nays are none, none Voting Present. Senate Resolution 289
23. having received a majority vote is adopted. Senator Coffey.

24. SENATOR COFFEY:

25. Yes, Mr. President, I would like to go to Senate Resolution
26. 84, if I could, please.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Senator Coffey on Senate Resolution 84.

29. SENATOR COFFEY:

30. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate, Senate
31. Resolution 84 is a request that the Director of Revenue and...
32. Agriculture and Institute of Natural Resources jointly studied
33. the quality, quantity and production costs of gasoline sold in

1. Illinois. I would like to ask a favorable roll call to have
2. this to be done.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

4. Senator Coffey moves the adoption of Senate Resolution 84.
5. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The
6. Ayes have it. Senate Resolution 84 is adopted. Senator Netsch.

7. SENATOR NETSCH:

8. Thank you, Mr. President. I have two resolutions, if I
9. might, House Joint Resolution 37, which has already been favorably
10. reported by the Executive Committee. ...may I proceed with it?

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Yes, Senator Netsch on House Joint Resolution 37.

13. SENATOR NETSCH:

14. Thank you. House Joint Resolution 37, correct. What it
15. does is to urge the...Department of Revenue to...or the admin-
16. istration to name the new Department of Revenue building in
17. Springfield after Willard Ice. In other words, that it be
18. designated the Willard Ice Building. If we had never under-
19. taken to name buildings after individuals, then, I think,
20. Willard Ice would have been the first to suggest that we not
21. start the practice, but we are, in fact, naming State buildings
22. in Springfield after individuals and I think there is probably
23. no one in the General Assembly or the Executive Branch or any-
24. other part of State Government who does not recognize that
25. Willard Ice was the Department of Revenue for a long period of
26. time. It is the most fitting name for that building and a most
27. fitting tribute to him. I would move the adoption of House Joint
28. Resolution 37.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

30. Is there any discussion? Senator Netsch moves the adoption
31. of House Joint Resolution No. 37. Those in favor indicate by
32. saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. House Joint
33. Resolution 37 is adopted. Senator Netsch on House...

1. SENATOR NETSCH:

2. Senate Joint Resolution...

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

4. ...on Senate Joint Resolution 35.

5. SENATOR NETSCH:

6. ...35. Slightly more controversial, perhaps. It...let
7. me read the...the resolution clause of it, because...so that
8. there's no misunderstanding about what it does, "resolved by
9. the Senate of the General Assembly, the House of Representatives
10. concurring, that the Illinois General Assembly urge the Congress
11. of the United States to undertake an examination of the
12. feasibility and desirability of placing a warning label on all
13. alcoholic beverage bottles sold in interstate commerce." It is
14. a request that Congress consider adopting a warning label for
15. alcohol, similar to that which now is on every package of
16. cigarettes sold. It does not mandate Congress. It does not
17. do anything except urge Congress to consider it. I would like
18. to say that this is not a product of...those who are teetotalers
19. or otherwise, although I would hope that they would join in
20. too. But a recognition of what is a fact, that alcohol is at
21. least as much of a drug as...subject to abuse as is tobacco and
22. that it ought to be treated in the same manner.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Is there any discussion? Senator Rock.

25. SENATOR ROCK:

26. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
27. Senate. I rise in opposition to this joint resolution for a
28. couple of reasons. One, it seems to me, that at this point, for
29. us to be memorializing Congress to do or not do something simply
30. is...an act...for little or no purpose, but more importantly,
31. this legislation...has already been considered by the Congress.
32. Congressman Russo and others...Congressman Metcalf, as I recall,
33. ...considered this as members of the Subcommittee of the Committee

1. on Commerce. And I...I just don't know why we're doing this
2. and I would urge a No vote.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

4. Is there further discussion? Senator Schaffer.

5. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

6. Well, President Rock, I suspect that the...the Congress,
7. like the Legislature, occasionally...continues to consider
8. something and over a period of years...sometimes they finally
9. get the job done. I don't think there are many people in
10. this Body that would really argue that...alcohol is, in fact,
11. as dangerous as tobacco and...as one who has been rather deeply
12. involved in some of the...alcohol programs and detoxification
13. programs in the State, I think one of the things that comes
14. through to me is, I don't think the average citizen realizes
15. the impact of this problem. Like everything else, in moderation,
16. alcohol is a perfectly acceptable...form of...entertainment or
17. whatever you want to call it, but I don't think that...anyone
18. can argue that there's a great deal of harm done and I don't
19. think it would hurt one lick...to see a warning, particularly
20. aimed at...the younger people of this country, and I think it's
21. perfectly responsible of this Body to...admonish Congress in
22. that direction.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Netsch moves
25. the adoption of House...or Senate Joint Resolution 35. Those in
26. favor signify by saying Aye. Those opposed. Senator Netsch
27. seeks a roll call. Those in favor of adopting Senate Joint
28. Resolution 35 will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The
29. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who
30. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,
31. the Ayes are 21, the Nays are 23. Senate Joint Resolution 35
32. having failed to receive a majority vote is declared lost. Senator
33. Berning, for what purpose do you arise?

2. Well, thank you, Mr. President. And one thing, I was
3. wondering if my light is really lit.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. It's on, Senator.

6. SENATOR BERNING:

7. Well, it...it...it's been on...it's been on for some time
8. and I...I had merely asked...or was wanting to ask that Senate
9. Resolution 180 be called.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Senator, you're right in line. We took the lights as
12. they popped up on the board and took the requests. Senate...
13. Senator Berning...well, on Senate Joint...on Senate Resolution
14. 180, Senator Berning.

15. SENATOR BERNING:

16. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. This resolution has been
17. amended in committee. It does not address itself to any money.
18. There is no request for compensation or reimbursement. It is
19. simply...an amendment critical of the Department of Mental
20. Health. I think they deserve a bit of criticism and I would
21. move for the adoption, Mr. President.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Senator Berning, our first order would be for the adoption
24. of the committee amendment to bring the resolution in...in line
25. with...what we thought it was as it left committee. Senator

27. Amendment No. 1 to Senate Resolution 180. Those in favor indicate
28. by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. Amendment No. 1
29. is adopted. Now, Senator Berning moves for the adoption of Senate
30. Resolution 180. All those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those
31. opposed. The Ayes have it. Senate Resolution 180 is adopted.
32. Senator...Senator Rock.

33. SENATOR ROCK:

1. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
2. Senate. On that order, on the Order of Secretary's Desk,
3. Resolutions is House Joint Resolution 44, which I would like
4. to consider at this time.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

6. Senator Rock on House Joint Resolution 44.

7. SENATOR ROCK:

8. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
9. Senate. House Joint Resolution 44 was sponsored in the House
10. by Representatives Madigan and Ryan and what it says, essentially,
11. is that this Legislature, hereby, proclaims its support for the
12. goals of the Chicago World's Fair 1992 Corporation and the
13. establishment of a 1992 World's Fair in the City of Chicago.
14. And we call upon the United States Secretary of Commerce and
15. the Illinois Congressional Delegation to recommend that the
16. World's Fair be held in Chicago in 1992 to the Bureau of
17. International Expositions...and to the Department of...United
18. States Department of Commerce. There is a group that has been
19. formed, I am told, that calls itself the Chicago World's Fair
20. 1992 Corporation. It is a not-for-profit corporation consisting
21. of the leaders of commerce and industry in our city and they
22. are making every effort...legitimate effort to bring to Chicago
23. in 1992 a World's Fair. And all this says is that we support
24. that effort and urge our Illinois Congressmen to do the same
25. thing. I know of no objection and I would move the adoption
26. of House Joint Resolution 44.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Well, Senator, there's someone that's signaling...Senator
29. Netsch.

30. SENATOR NETSCH:

31. Thank you, Mr. President. I certainly do not object to
32. the concept of having a World's Fair in Chicago in 1992.
33. Indeed, I would strongly support it, but I would like to point

1. out one thing and particularly call attention of the Chicago
2. Legislators to this. There is, in fact, a hearing this Thursday
3. before the...a...the Chicago Park District Board or at least
4. a subcommittee, thereof, on the proposition, from the very group
5. that Senator Rock referred to, to use the Chicago parks for
6. the site of the 1992 World's Fair, if, indeed, it is approved.
7. That is fine with one major exception. Grant Park, for which
8. the people in Chicago have fought for years and years to keep
9. free, open and clear, should not be used as a site for buildings
10. or other...structures that might develop a permanency of their
11. own. Any other part of the park system, if you want to consider
12. using it, fine, but remember that parks are for people to use
13. and enjoy permanently and we should not sacrifice our park
14. system generally. But most particularly, there are many people
15. in Chicago who would fight to the death the use of Grant Park
16. for a site for the fair. I would strongly urge that that be
17. taken into consideration.

25. SENATOR BUZBEE:

26. I'm a hyphenated cosponsor with Senator Vadalabene on 232
27. and...I would like to move to...concur in the...House amendment.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

29. The question is, shall the Senate concur in House Amend-
30. ment No. 1. Is there any discussion? If not,...Senator Weaver.

31. SENATOR WEAVER:

32. Senator Buzbee, that just takes out the IBA rentals?

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. Senator Buzbee.

2. SENATOR BUZBEE:

3. I'm sorry, yeah, I...I should have explained that, Senator
4. Weaver. Yes. The...the House amendment does just reduce the
5. ...IBA rental funds...like it...like the House did on all of
6. the other...no...

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

8. Senator Keats.

9. SENATOR BUZBEE:

10. ...no, I...wait a minute...I'm sorry. Yeah. I'm sorry,
11. Senator Weaver. There were no IBA funds...rental funds to take
12. out on the SIU Budget, so, what they did was, they transferred
13. twenty-five thousand dollars GRF to Contractual Services from
14. Travel and it's my understanding that the House, in their wisdom,
15. did not want the SIU Budget to go to the Governor's Desk before
16. the rest, so they put this amendment on because there was no
17. IBA money to take out, in this one instance. So, they made a

22. SENATOR KEATS:

23. A question. Does this include any funds for building the

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

26. Senator Buzbee.

27. SENATOR BUZBEE:

28. No, this is the Operational Budget, Senator. There's never
29. any building funds in an operational budget.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Senator Rhoads, do you wish to speak on this? If there's
32. no further discussion, the question is, shall the Senate concur
33. in House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 232. Those in favor will

1. vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have
2. all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

22. Senator Carroll.

23. SENATOR CARROLL:

24. Thank you, Mr. President. I would move that we do concur
25. with House Amendment No. 1. This does reduce the IBA rentals
26. for the Board of Governors System. I would move that we do concur.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Is there any discussion? Senator Totten.

29. SENATOR TOTTEN:

30. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
31. Senate. The sponsor yield for a question?

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. He indicates he will.

1. SENATOR TOTTEN:

2. Senator Carroll, how much is this below or above the Governor's
3. latest recommendations?

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Senator Carroll.

6. SENATOR CARROLL:

7. Since I didn't talk to the Governor this morning, I don't
8. know what his latest recommendation is, Senator Totten. It is
9. below the Governor's budget, however.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Senator Totten. Is there further discussion? If not, the
12. question is shall...Senate concur in House Amendment No. 1 to
13. Senate Bill 234. Those in favor indicate by voting Aye. Those
14. opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
15. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,
16. the Ayes are 49, the Nays are 1...none Voting Present. Senate...
17. the Senate does concur in House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill
18. 234, and the bill having received the required constitutional
19. majority is declared passed. Senator Buzbee.

20. SENATOR BUZBEE:

21. Thank you. I thought the membership might be interested
22. to know, we've been hearing an awful lot of discussion here,
23. recently, about how much money the State has, and you'll recall
24. that the Governor in his budget projection as of...March, said
25. we were going to end this fiscal year with two hundred and twenty
26. million dollar balance. The Comptroller's office just now informed
27. me that they've closed out this fiscal year, as of right now, at
28. a hundred and ninety-seven million dollars. So, we're...we're
29. pretty close.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Senate Bill 237, Senator...Senator Weaver.

32. SENATOR WEAVER:

33. I was just going to ask Senator Buzbee about the lapse

1. period and what do you expect there?
2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
3. Senator Buzbee.
4. SENATOR BUZBEE:
5. Well, Doctor Mandeville says that doesn't...that doesn't
6. count anymore, we don't have to worry about that. So...so...we
7. don't have to worry about that anymore.
8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
9. Senator Grotberg.
10. SENATOR GROTBORG:
11. A...am I the sponsor of 237?
12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
13. No, Senator, but you sought recognition.
14. SENATOR GROTBORG:
15. Oh, only on 237 after we get to it. Sorry.
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
17. Senate Bill 237, Senator DeAngelis. Mr. Secretary.
18. SECRETARY:
19. Senate Bill 237 with House Amendments 1 and 2.
20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
21. Senator DeAngelis. Senator DeAngelis.
22. SENATOR DeANGLEIS:
23. Thank you, Mr. President. I move to concur with...House
24. Amendment No. 2 of Senate Bill 237, which adds three million
25. dollars to the Illinois State Scholarship Commission.
26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
27. Is there any discussion? Senator Buzbee.
28. SENATOR BUZBEE:
29. Well, in the first place, Senator DeAngelis, there are
30. two amendments. And you...ignored No. 1.
31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
32. Senator DeAngelis.
33. SENATOR DeANGLEIS:

1. I'm sorry, I...I move to concur with House Amendment No. 1
2. and No. 2. House Amendment No. 1 is a small reduction. House
3. Amendment No. 2 is a large increase.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Senator Buzbee.

6. SENATOR BUZBEE:

7. Well, I would request the Senator to...to split those
8. because...we concur with No. 1, but not with No. 2 and if
9. we'll split them, well, I'll...I'll argue No. 2 when we
10. get to it.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Senator...DeAngelis moves to concur with Senate Amendment
13. No. 1. So, the question is...House Amendment No. 1. Is there
14. any discussion on House Amendment No. 1? If there is none, the
15. question is shall the Senate concur in House Amendment No. 1
16. to Senate Bill 237. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those
17. opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who
18. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that
19. question the Ayes are 52, the Nays are none, and the Senate
20. does concur in House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 237. On
21. House Amendment No. 2, Senator DeAngelis.

22. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

23. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. As I indicated, House
24. Amendment No.2 is a...an appropriation of three million dollars,
25. General Revenue Fund, to the Illinois State Scholarship. It's
26. an add-on. It...it increases the amount above the Governor's
27. budget by about five million dollars.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

29. Is there any discussion? Senator Buzbee.

30. SENATOR BUZBEE:

31. Well, we have fought this battle once before in this
32. Body, this Session. This is additional money to the Illinois
33. State Scholarship Commission for awards that they granted when

1. they didn't have the money to...to...to back them up. They are
2. learning, but they haven't completely learned yet. And we have...
3. as I indicated earlier, we fought this once before, Senator
4. DeAngelis lost once before, now the House has added it back.
5. We were in a similar position yesterday, with the Veteran's
6. Scholarships. And I suggest that it's not a good idea to add this
7. three million dollars above the Governor's budget. In meeting
8. with Doctor Mandeville yesterday, we are at some disagreement,
9. but fairly well agreed that, at this point, we are about twenty-
10. five million dollars over Governor No. II. This would be an
11. additional three to five million dollars above Governor No. II.
12. And I would submit that we ought to reject this amendment and
13. let the Scholarship Commission continue to get their house
14. in order and do a better job last year than they did this.
15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

16. Is there further discussion? Senator Maitland.

17. SENATOR MAITLAND:

18. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
19. Senate. I rise in support of the motion to concur with House
20. Amendment No. 2. Unfortunately, the losers here, are the students
21. in the public sector. When we see the private sector getting
22. nearly two-thirds of the money from the Scholarship Commission,
23. we've got a very serious problem. I...the universities, which
24. we fund, eat this deficiency, or the letters will go out a
25. hundred dollars a shot, and the students, who are receiving
26. the smallest amount of money from the Scholarship Commission,
27. will have their grant, quite frankly, reduced in...in the amount
28. of...of a hundred dollars. But, Senator Buzbee is true, the
29. Scholarship Commission is at fault and we've got to resolve
30. that problem. Presently, the problem that we have before us,
31. is with the students and I believe this is a good motion.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. Senator Grotberg.

1. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

2. Thank you, Mr. President and fellow members. I rise in
3. opposition to the motion to concur in House Amendment No. 2,
4. for all of the same reasons that...were offered by Senator
5. Buzbee, plus, we...we have been working diligently to take
6. millions and millions and millions of dollars out of the Public
7. Aid Medicaid budget. The hospitals are going to eat, I believe,
8. a hundred and six million dollars before the sun sets tonight
9. or before it rises tomorrow morning. I don't think that three
10. million dollars is too bad to spread over the thousands upon
11. thousands of students and university systems of the State of
12. Illinois and let the Scholarship Commission worry about it,
13. because they were going to roll this back and they will have
14. a bigger need next year and they would...somebody always pays,
15. they just wanted to pay early and there's no reason why we
16. should concur in this and I move that we reject it.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Senator Gitz.

19. SENATOR GITZ:

20. Very briefly, Mr. President and members of the Senate.
21. I rise in support of Senator DeAngelis' motion to concur.
22. And let us be very clear. I don't happen to have a lot of university
23. students in my district, but I did take the time to start
24. looking at what these cuts mean. You know that all the universities
25. are raising their tuition, we know that the Scholarship Commissions'
26. new needs criteria actually increases the amount of personal
27. contribution, parental contribution, the income levels, to the
28. point where people are seriously being hampered in their access
29. to higher education. Now, there are problems with the administra-
30. tion of the Scholarship Commission, I think we all agree on that,
31. but for the life of me, it does not make sense, in the name of
32. teaching someone a lesson, as Senator Buzbee seems so intent
33. on doing, that he's going to take it out on the students of

1. this State. Now, I am in favor of paying the old obligations
2. and not allowing us to go further in that course of action
3. in the future. But I think that this is some of the best money
4. that we could ever spend. And to Senator Grotberg, I am for
5. going in to the Public Aid budget, let's make those cuts there.
6. But let's be careful where we need to put money. And I think that,
7. clearly, this kind of money will be absolutely essential if you
8. want any of your community college students who are going to
9. a universtiy to have any access to higher education and to
10. benefit from these programs. I think this is some of the best
11. money that we could ever appropriate and ratify.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. We'll...Senators, the following Senators have sought recognition
14. on this; Keats, Totten, Newhouse and Buzbee, for the second time.
15. Senator Keats.

16. SENATOR KEATS:

17. Thank you, Mr. President. As you're well aware, I'm
18. not a great fan of the Scholarship Commission, although, I
19. want to say, under their new director their management has
20. moved up. They are still the worst run State agency, but they're
21. coming up fast on Public Aid. But there is one thing they've
22. been doing that has irritated me, no end, we only have, really,
23. two entitlement scholarship programs. One is run by our veterans,
24. whatever...Department of Veterans Affairs, the other is the
25. National Guard Scholarship Act. And for the umpteenth year
26. in a row, they have refused to meet the entitlement concept
27. of the National Guard Scholarship Act, and one way they managed
28. to hold their budget down is by not funding an entitlement
29. program under the Scholarship Commission. I, for one, feel
30. that that type of mismanagement is unacceptable, and for that
31. reason, am supporting Senator Buzbee and Senator Grotberg
32. in saying, they've cleaned up their house a little, but they
33. got a long way to go.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Senator Totten.

3. SENATOR TOTTEN:

4. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
5. Senate. I rise in support of Senator Buzbee's motion to defeat
6. the concurrence here. How many times does this General Assembly
7. have to be addressed by the Scholarship Commission, when they
8. go ahead and do things we told them they couldn't do the year
9. before? It's...it's not the students in this case, it's the
10. taxpayers who are being hurt. And when this commission, continually
11. comes before this General Assembly and does things for which
12. we have not appropriated money, for which we have told them,
13. time and time again, that they ought not to be doing, it's
14. about time that we said, no. Senator Grotberg was right, this
15. cost can be borne, partially by the students and partially
16. by the universities, and in fact, a lot of them are prepared
17. to do so. This is the time when we ought to call a halt to
18. the Scholarship Commission's complete, complete, disregard
19. for the wishes of this General Assembly, and tell them, no.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

21. Senator Newhouse.

22. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

23. Thank you, Mr. President, Senators. I think that most
24. of you will remember last year when we had these Scholarship
25. Commission Bills before us, that I made a plea for the
26. Commission and said to you that...I would not come back
27. before this Body and ask for a supplementary...appropriation
28. and I won't. However, I'll tell you this, I've gotten a...just
29. a brand new concept of how difficult the job of the Scholarship
30. Commission is. And I think we can expect that there are
31. going to be some serious problems in trying to do for youngsters
32. in this State what ought to be done. I think they have a much
33. better operation now, than they had a year ago. And I expect

1. it to continue to improve. I expect, also, it will never be
2. perfect. There's been a pattern during this Session, however,
3. of looking out for the rich kids and dunking the poor kids, and
4. I think that's unfortunate. I don't see where youngsters need
5. to pay the price for whatever we think about the Scholarship
6. Commission. It seems to me if we look at the future of this
7. State, we don't have enough brains to go around, and we darn
8. well better be concentrating on trying to get some youngsters
9. trained to run this State in the future. It is for these
10. reasons that I support the amendment...or rather the...the
11. motion and hope that it passes. Thank you.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Is there further discussion? Senator Buzbee, for the
14. second time.

15. SENATOR BUZBEE:

16. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. Senator Newhouse is absolutely
17. right. There was an ironclad deal made last year that the
18. Scholarship Commission would not be here...for...in front
19. of us for a supplemental, and of course, they have broken their
20. word. They are here in front of us for a supplemental. Now,
21. it's only ten forty-five in the morning, Senator Gitz. Senator
22. Gitz, I hope you're on the Floor, if not, I hope you're within
23. ...hearing distance of...of my voice. It's only ten forty-five
24. in the morning, it's a little early to start name calling, but
25. if you want to start it, it's fine with me. I'll tell you what,
26. Senator Gitz, I have more college students in my district than
27. anybody in this Senate, except Senator Weaver, and I know who's
28. going to get affected by it, it's going to be some of the
29. college students in my district. And there's nobody in this
30. Chamber that's anymore supportive of that university or of
31. those college students, but the fact of the matter is, we can't
32. afford it. The Scholarship Commission knew we couldn't afford
33. it, and I'm not out to punish the students through the Scholarship

1. Commission. But the time has come to say, no. And I suggest
2. to you that that's what we ought to say this morning with a
3. big red button.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator DeAngelis
6. may close debate.

7. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

8. Thank you, Mr. President. Let me clear the record on
9. a couple of points. First of all, this request is not being
10. made, Senator Buzbee...this request is not being made by the
11. Scholarship Commission. This request is being made by the
12. Board of Higher Ed. The Scholarship Commission has not taken
13. a position in support of this amendment. I have done this
14. unilaterally. Secondly, in regards to the supplemental approp.,
15. Senator Buzbee, let me correct you again. If you recall, on
16. House Bill 364, I opposed..in fact, I had Representative
17. Hoffman sit on that bill till they took the supplemental approp.
18. off of it in the House. That was the word we lived by. This
19. is an appropriation, and I guess I'm cutting fine hairs on
20. this, for 1982, all right. And I might be accused of maybe
21. being a little surreptitious, but I want to tell you that we
22. lived by the word of not seeking a supplemental approp.
23. And, Senator Keats, if you find fault with the Scholarship
24. Commission and the National Guard or Veterans, find fault
25. with the General Assembly. Those aren't line items, they cannot
26. go through the monetary award funds for those. And if we don't
27. appropriate enough for those items, those are Statutorily
28. thrust entitlements, when the money runs out, the money runs
29. out, you can't take it someplace else. So, I want to make
30. clear the record. The Scholarship Commission is not pushing
31. us, all right, I'm doing it on my own. Thank you.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. Well, the question is, shall the Senate concur in House

1. Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 237. Those in favor will vote
2. Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all
3. voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who
4. wish? Take the record. On that question the Ayes are 34, the
5. Nays are 20, none Voting Present. The Senate does concur in
6. House Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 237, and the bill having
7. received the required constitutional majority is declared
8. passed. Senate Bill 238, Senator Weaver.

9. SECRETARY:

10. Senate Bill 238...

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Senator Weaver. Mr. Secretary.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Senate Bill 238 with House Amendment 4.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

16. Senator Weaver.

17. SENATOR WEAVER:

18. Thank you, Mr. President. This deletes a million, nine
19. thousand dollars from the appropriation. It's a dual appropriation.
20. These surveys have been appropriated through the Institute of
21. Natural Resources. I'd move that we concur in House Amendment No. 1
22. to Senate Bill 238.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Is there any discussion? If not, the question is shall
25. the Senate concur in House Amendment No. 4 to Senate Bill 238.
26. Those in favor indicate by voting Aye. Those opposed vote
27. Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have
28. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes
29. are 52, the Nays are none, none Voting Present. The Senate does
30. concur in House Amendment No. 4 to Senate Bill 238, and the bill
31. having received the required constitutional majority is declared
32. passed. Senate Bill 271, Senator Carroll. Mr. Secretary.

33. SECRETARY:

1. Senate Bill 271 with House Amendments 1 and 4.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

3. Senator Carroll.

4. SENATOR CARROLL:

5. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
6. Senate. I move we nonconcur with House Amendments No. 1 and 4.
7. This would be another bill on the commissions, we've already
8. taken care of it and it's...the House is acting on it. I would
9. move we nonconcur.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Senator Carroll moves to nonconcur in House Amendment
12. No. 1 and 4 to Senate Bill 271. Those in favor indicate by
13. saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries
14. and the Secretary shall so inform the House. Senate Bill 315,
15. Senator Etheredge. Mr. Secretary.

16. SECRETARY:

17. Senate...Senate Bill 315 with House Amendments 3 and 5.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

19. Senator Etheredge.

20. SENATOR ETHEREDGE:

21. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. There
22. are two House Amendments on this bill. No. 3 appropriates an
23. additional ten thousand dollars in the Grant line items. House
24. Amendment No. 5 deletes twelve thousand, five hundred dollars
25. from the contractual services line item for a net change of
26. a reduction of two thousand, five hundred dollars in the appropriation
27. for this commission. I might just point out that the...total
28. budget, as it stands right now, for this commission, is four
29. tenths of one percent...under the Governor's II budget. I would
30. move to concur.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. Is there any discussion? Senator D'Arco.

33. SENATOR D'ARCO:

1. Thank you, Mr. President. As I understand this...concurrence
2. motion, which includes House Amendment 3...House Amendment 3,
3. that ten thousand dollars that is line itemed in that amendment
4. is for the community committee on the southwest side of the...
5. Cook...Cook County, as I believe. And it is for the Hedgwich
6. Community Committee, is that correct, Senator? And, what I am
7. trying to point out as a commissioner on the...delinquency
8. commission, which I served as a commissioner, the problem is
9. that you have already existing, in the 30th Legislative District,
10. three community committees that the commission is presently
11. funding. You have the Mexican Community Committee, the South
12. Chicago Community Council and the Trumble Park Community Committee,
13. all of which are in the 30th Legislative District. Now you're
14. going to put back in another community committee, which is
15. Hedgwich, which would make it four community committees being
16. served by this State commission in one concentrated area of
17. ...of the city. And that really is an overconcentration of
18. funds to this particular area. And we...you know, that...that's
19. why, when the bill left the Senate, that particular line item
20. was not included in the appropriation, because it...it amounted
21. to too much money being concentrated in one area. And I know
22. that, in fact, the...the Senator from that area...is, you know,
23. also feels that it is an overconcentration of funds. And I
24. would have to rise and oppose the concurrence motion, being
25. a commissioner on the commission, and fighting for the life of
26. this commission, when Executive Order No. 1 was presented, and
27. all of the good members on the commission, who supported our
28. fight for Executive Order No. 1, not to include the commission,
29. also feel the same way I feel about this, that there's just
30. too much money going to that particular area.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. Channel 25 from Peoria would like permission to do some
33. filming. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Carroll.

1. SENATOR CARROLL:

2. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
3. Senate. I also rise in opposition to the concurrence motion.
4. Not being as knowledgeable as Senator D'Arco in the commission
5. and its efforts, my reason is similar to what we've done in
6. the rest of the budget. There are...this commission has approved
7. funding of grants for twenty-nine community agencies, which
8. meets their budgeted amount. There were twenty-four other
9. agencies who came in for money and they were denied grants
10. for, "lack of comparative merit." These twenty-four other
11. agencies are then put in a priority list, Hedgwich is not
12. first on that unfunded list, but is, in fact, fourth. I don't
13. know which ones you're skipping over trying to pick them up,
14. but it's like the capital priority list, higher ed institutions,
15. the schools and all the other priority lists that we've always
16. gone with. There's only so much money available, you fund those
17. that are available, then you have your secondary list and this
18. is not even first up on that list, so you're bypassing others,
19. and I think it would be a very inappropriate act for us to,
20. now, grant someone who's on the nonfunded list and fourth down
21. on that list, monies that we just don't have and I would urge
22. that we nonconcur.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Etheredge may
25. close.

26. SENATOR ETHEREDGE:

27. Well, I would simply ask for a...an Aye vote on the motion
28. to concur.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

30. The question is shall the Senate concur in House Amendment
31. No. 3 and 5 to Senate Bill 315. Those in favor will vote Aye.
32. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Will you vote me
33. No, Senator. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?

1. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,
2. the Ayes are 21, the Nays are 31. The Senate does not concur
3. in House Amendments No. 3 and 5 to Senate Bill 315. And the
4. Secretary shall so inform the House...Bill 328, Senator
5. Nimrod. Mr. Secretary.

6. SECRETARY:

7. Senate Bill 328 with House Amendment 1.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

9. Senator Nimrod.

10. SENATOR NIMROD:

11. Yes, I would move to concur with House Amendment No. 1.
12. This calls for an increase of five thousand dollars of the
13. total ~~thirty-three~~ thousand, four ninety-one
14. reduction made by the Senate in Personal Services and it's
15. related to line items.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. Is there any discussion? Senate...Senator Carroll.

18. SENATOR CARROLL:

19. We would also urge concurrence.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

21. The question is shall the Senate concur in House Amendment
22. No. 1 to Senate Bill 328. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those
23. opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
24. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,
25. the Ayes are 43, the Nays are 5, none Voting Present. The Senate
26. does concur in House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 328, and
27. the bill having received the required constitutional majority
28. is declared passed. Senate Bill 339, Senator Grotberg. Mr.
29. Secretary.

30. SECRETARY:

31. Senate Bill 339 with House Amendments 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. Senator Grotberg.

SENATOR GROTEBERG:

S.B. 344
House Amendments
1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 12

1. Thank you, Mr. President. I move to nonconcur in House
2. Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4 and 5.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

4. Senator Grothberg moves to nonconcur in House Amendments
5. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 to Senate Bill 339. Those in favor indicate
6. by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion
7. carries and the Secretary shall so inform the House. Senate
8. Bill 334...Senate...344, Senator Schaffer. Senate Bill 345...
9. Senate Bill 345, Senator Schaffer. Senate Bill 512, Senator
10. Philip. Senate Bill 543, Senator Chew. All right, here's
11. Senator Schaffer. Let's...get that. On Senate Bill 344,
12. Senator Schaffer. Mr. Secretary.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Senate Bill 344 with House Amendments 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6,
15. 7, 8, 9 and 12.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. Senator Schaffer.

18. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

19. I think we have agreement to cover this with two motions...
20. two motions, I guess I should say. I would like to move to
21. concur, and Senator Carroll can listen carefully, in Amendments
22. 2, 3, 5, 6, 7, 9 and 12, and after we do that, I would move to
23. nonconcur in the rest. I think we're on target.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Is there any discussion? Senator Carroll.

26. SENATOR CARROLL:

27. Yes, Mr. President, these are the reappropriations. We would
28. agree with the motion of Senator Schaffer to concur in 2, 3,
29. 5, 6, 7, 9 and 12.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. If there's no further discussion, the question is shall
32. the Senate concur in House Amendments 2, 3, 5, 6, 7, 9 and 12 to

1. Senate Bill 344. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed
2. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have
3. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the
4. Ayes are 42, the Nays are 12 and 1 Voting Present. And the Senate
5. does concur in House Amendments 2, 3, 5, 6, 7, 9 and 12 to
6. Senate Bill 344. Senator Schaffer.

7. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

8. Mr. President, I would then move to nonconcur in Amendments
9. 1, 4 and 8.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Senator Schaffer moves to nonconcur in Amendments...in
12. House Amendments 1, 4 and 8 to Senate Bill 344. All those in
13. favor say Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion
14. carries and the Secretary shall so inform the House. On Senate
15. Bill 345, Mr. Secretary.

16. SECRETARY:

17. Senate...Senate Bill 345 with House Amendments 1, 3, 4, 6, 7,
18. 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22 and 23.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Senator Schaffer.

21. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

22. Mr. President, I think we can do this in two motions, also,
23. if the staff on the other side is alert. I would like to move
24. to concur in Senate...in the Amendment No. 6, 7, 8, 15, 18 and
25. 22.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

27. Is there any discussion? Senator Carroll.

28. SENATOR CARROLL:

29. We would agree with the motion on...to concur on...on
30. 6, 7, 8, 15, 18 and 22. These were projects necessary within
31. the Governor's allocated amounts.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. Is there further discussion? Senator Rhoads.

1. SENATOR RHOADS:

2. Yes, question of the sponsor. Senator Schaffer, as always
3. happens this time of year, we have to place great reliance and
4. faith in our Minority Spokesman, and so forth, but it's not
5. completely blind faith. Would you be willing just to give a...
6. a brief explanation of what you're doing and why you're doing
7. it. I know we're pressed for time and you're familiar with
8. the issues and we're not, but I am on the committee and I'd
9. just like to know.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Senator Schaffer.

12. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

13. I'd like to...yeah. Senator Rhoads, frankly, this thing
14. came over as a Christmas tree and we are...we have met and
15. we have kind of mutually agreed...on several of the things
16. that seemed to have varying degrees of merit. I think, perhaps,
17. there's a couple of items that Senator Carroll feel...feels
18. have a great deal more merit than I do, and there's some...a
19. couple that I think have a lot more merit than he does, but
20. what we're trying to do is prune the Christmas tree down as
21. thin as we can, knowing full well that it's going to go into
22. a Conference Committee. And since, I think, we're agreeing
23. on about...to concur in about four out of about twenty-eight,
24. you know, if you want I'll go through them.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

26. Senator Rhoads.

27. SENATOR RHOADS:

28. Just, so long as...as you and the appropriations chairman
29. on the other side, give us an adequate explanation on final
30. action, that's all I'm asking for.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. Is there further discussion? If not, the question is shall
33. the Senate concur in House Amendments 6, 7, 8, 15, 18 and 22 to

1. Senate Bill 345. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed
2. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have
3. all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record.
4. On that question the Ayes are 45, the Nays are 11, none Voting
5. Present. The Senate does concur in House Amendments 6, 7, 8,
6. 15, 18 and 22 to Senate Bill 345. Senator Schaffer.

7. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

8. Mr. President, I would then move to nonconcur in Amendments
9. 1, 3, 4, 8, 9...oh, pardon me, disregard 8; 9, 10, 11, 12, 13,
10. 14, 16, 17, 19, 20, 21 and 23.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Senator Schaffer moves to nonconcur in House Amendments
13. 1, 3, 4, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 16, 17, 19, 20, 21 and 23 to
14. Senate Bill 345. All those in favor indicate by saying Aye.
15. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries and the
16. Secretary shall so inform the House. Senator Philip on the
17. Floor? No. Senate Bill 543, Senator Chew. Mr. Secretary.

18. SECRETARY:

19. Senate Bill 543 with House Amendment 1.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

21. Senator Chew.

22. SENATOR CHEW:

23. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I would ask leave
24. to accept House Amendment No. 1, which was originally on 1395.
25. And, 1395 was never called for passage. So, I would concur to
26. House Amendment No. 1.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Is there any discussion? Senator Walsh.

29. SENATOR WALSH:

30. A...well, Senator Chew, I wonder if you could give a...a
31. somewhat...better description of the...the House Amendment. I
32. don't remember the...the bill to which you referred.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. Senator Chew.

2. SENATOR CHEW:

3. Yes, Sir. The amendment that was placed on the bill in
4. the House, Senator, permits a three foot extension to the front
5. and a four foot extension to the rear...

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Senator, excuse me. Could we have some order. Could
8. we break up these conferences. Senator Chew is trying to
9. explain House Amendment No. 1 to Senator Walsh. Gentlemen,
10. Senator DeAngelis, Senator Joyce...Senator Berning, would
11. you take your conference off the Floor. Senator Walsh.

12. SENATOR WALSH:

13. I'm sorry, Charlie, you have to start from the beginning,
14. I...I didn't hear anything.

15. SENATOR CHEW:

16. House Amendment No. 1, Senator, provides that, when a
17. vehicle has obtained a permit from the Department of Transportation
18. and paid the appropriate fee, that vehicle can have a three
19. foot overhang extension in the front and a four foot overhang
20. in the rear, and this pertains to the motor carriers that transport
21. automobiles from one destination to another. The amendment was
22. originally on House Bill 1395, which was never called for passage.
23. Representative Wolf was the House sponsor of this bill. The
24. Department of Transportation supports the amendment and the
25. bill. The Motor Vehicle Laws also supports it and the Auto
26. Transport Industry supports the bill, with the amendment.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Senator Walsh. Is there further discussion? If not...
29. Senator Coffey.

30. SENATOR COFFEY:

31. Question of the sponsor.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. He indicates he'll yield.

1. SENATOR COFFEY:

2. Senator Chew, this didn't change the...the weight or
3. the overall length, did it not, just the extension?

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Senator Chew.

6. SENATOR CHEW:

7. Not at all. It's the same thing as we passed it out
8. in the committee and fashioned it in the commission.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

10. If there's no further discussion, the question is, shall
11. the Senate concur in House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 543.
12. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The
13. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who
14. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that
15. question, the Ayes are 25, the Nays are 23 and 2 Voting Present.
16. The Senate does not concur in House Amendment No. 1. And
17. the Secretary shall so inform the House. Senate Bill 731,
18. Senator Chew. Mr. Secretary.

19. SECRETARY:

20. Senate Bill 731 with House Amendments 1 and 2.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

22. Senator Chew.

23. SENATOR CHEW:

24. Again, Mr. President, the House placed an amendment on it
25. and this deals with the Motorcycle Training Act. We passed out
26. 131 here and the House incorporated the other portion of the bill.
27. The fee part of the original structure, the Senate passed it
28. here. The other portion of the bill was adopted by Amendment
29. No. 1 in the House. I'd be glad to answer any questions or...
30. ask for a...a favorable roll call...to concur in the amendment.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. Is there further discussion? If not, the question is shall
33. the Senate concur in House Amendment No. 1 and 2 to Senate Bill
34. 731. Those in favor indicate by voting Aye. Those opposed

1. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
2. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take
3. the record. On that question, the Ayes are 44, the Nays are
4. 3, none Voting Present. The Senate does concur in House Amend-
5. ments 1 and 2 to Senate Bill...731, and the bill having received
6. the constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate Bill
7. 888, Senator Davidson. Mr. Secretary.

8. SECRETARY:

9. Senate Bill 888 with House Amendment No. 1.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Senator Davidson.

12. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

13. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I move to concur
14. in House Amendment No. 1 to 888. The amendment...puts the
15. special agents, which were the IBI from December 31st, '68,
16. through October 1st, '75, 'cause they were not part of the
17. State Police Pension Plan under the alternate formula, which
18. now can be used and this allow...I think there's sixty...approximately
19. sixty people involved in this. I'd move to concur.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

21. Is there discussion? Senator D'Arco.

22. SENATOR D'ARCO:

23. Well, thank you, Mr. President. It's my understanding
24. that these special agents were receiving...Social Security
25. at the time..during that period of time, and that you're going
26. to try to put them under the State Police Pension System and
27. give them service credit time, wherein, they were receiving
28. Social Security during that same period of time and the contribution
29. rate is going to be based on the contribution for that same
30. period of time and not at today's contribution rate, which
31. would be a lot higher. Now...I don't know what this is going
32. to cost the State, but I'm sure we can get an actuary, and
33. I'm sure Senator Berning can address this himself, as far as

1. the fiscal impact to the State of Illinois is, but it's going
2. to be quite substantial, as I understand it.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

4. Senator Davidson.

5. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

6. All it's going to do is allow the alternate form of
7. participation, which other State employees have that opportunity.
8. The State Police, now, are not part of the Social Security
9. System. Those people, who are involved, who are now State
10. policemen, gives them an opportunity to buy that time in.
11. The cost estimated is sixty thousand dollars annually.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Senator Berning.

14. SENATOR BERNING:

15. Yes, from as near as we can tell, sixty thousand annually,
16. out of the General Revenue, is correct. That's part of the...
17. reason to examine this carefully. The other, is that, here
18. again, we are going backwards. People who were accommodated
19. when the IBI was...abolished in 1975, now here is an effort
20. to go back and give them credit from 1968 to 1975. The concept,
21. I suggest, is one we ought to reject, Mr. President.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Davidson
24. may close.

25. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

26. Appreciate a favorable vote.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. The question is, shall.. the Senate concur in House
29. Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 888. Those in favor will vote
30. Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all
31. voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
32. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are
33. 4, the Nays are 43 and 2 Voting Present. The Senate does not

4. SECRETARY:

5. Senate Bill 889 with House Amendment No. 1.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Senator Davidson.

8. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

9. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I move to concur
10. in House Amendment to 889. The amendment was put on by Senator...
11. by Representative McBroom. It says, such deductions and coinsurance
12. provisions shall not be increased over the level, as in the plan
13. in effect immediately, before July 1, 1981. In essence, what
14. it says, most of you have been hearing lots of conversation,
15. have got a mailing from the Department of Personnel, there's
16. been a change in deductions proposed for the new contract,
17. when it went out for bid...in...effective, starting tomorrow.
18. And Representative McBroom put on this amendment, saying that
19. there cannot be an increase in the...deductibility and coinsurance
20. provisions. I move to concur.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

22. Is there any discussion? Senator D'Arco.

23. SENATOR D'ARCO:

24. Well, Mr. President...this will cost the State of Illinois
25. an astronomical amount of money. Because by limiting the amount
26. of deductions in...in the coinsurance provision the employee must
27. pay, the State is going to have to pick up the excess. And we
28. aren't talking about sixty-thousand dollars like the last
29. bill, we're talking about seven or eight million dollars...in
30. State monies that would have to be increased to pay for our
31. group...group health insurance for the State employees. There's
32. no way this bill should be concurred in.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. Is there further discussion? Senator Bruce.

2. SENATOR BRUCE:

3. Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate.

4. I rise in support of this concurrence. As Senator Davidson
5. has expressed, the State Employees Group Insurance Advisory
6. Commission voted, on a very narrow vote, 6 to 4, to approve
7. these new deductibles and new copayment provisions. Senator
8. Davidson and I, as your representatives on that commission,
9. voted No. The two House members voted No, but we didn't
10. have the horses, they beat us 6 to 4. Now, Representative
11. McBroom put this bill in to say that the benefits for all
12. of us here and all State employees should not be reduced
13. by the State of Illinois by increasing copayments and the
14. deductibles. That's all this bill does. Now, that means
15. it's going to cost the State of Illinois approximately eight
16. million dollars more in premium costs, but I really think
17. that we ought to concur in this amendment and the bill ought
18. to go down to the Governor's Desk. We're...he, obviously, has
19. not been persuaded, I think, to sign the bill as yet, but I
20. think that it makes a great deal of sense that the insurance
21. program which we have for one hundred and thirty-one thousand
22. people throughout the State of Illinois, it's one of the largest
23. group plans in the State of Illinois, ought not to be reduced
24. in the significant way that it was. It not only affects us,
25. in the House and the Senate and our families, but it affects
26. about seventy some thousand State employees and about forty
27. some thousand retirees across the State of Illinois and I
28. would certainly solicit your support for concurrence in this
29. amendment.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Is there further discussion? Senator Berning.

32. SENATOR BERNING:

33. Well, that was a very nice...soft sell on the part of

1. Senator Bruce, but the hard cold fact of the matter is, Ladies
2. and Gentlemen of the Senate, that this is going to cost your
3. fellow citizens and my fellow citizens, our taxpayers, 8.6
4. million dollars and I just do not believe we can afford it.
5. And I would urge a No vote.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Senator Schaffer.

8. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

9. Well, you know, it's...it's tough sometimes to speak
10. against things that, you know, are going to help people, in
11. fact, this is one of those things that we fall in the area
12. and if this bill passes, I guess we all benefit or we continue
13. to keep the benefits we have. The simple fact is, that we've
14. tried to hold the line on the cost to the taxpayer and if
15. this bill goes through, we...we are, in fact, adding seven
16. to eight million dollars this year and every year thereafter.
17. Now, I guess you could argue that the Governor will probably
18. veto the bill, but I always have felt that we shouldn't depend
19. on the Governor to be our first and last line of defense for
20. the taxpayers. I think some of us have got to rise above, if
21. you will, self-interest and vote No. It's tough, sometimes, but
22. you got to draw the line.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Senator Grötberg.

25. SENATOR GROTERBERG:

26. Well, just trying to be helpful, Mr. President. We non-
27. concurred on the...Department of Personnel Budget authorization...
28. appropriation, specifically, to get rid of the eight million
29. dollar amendment, but more than that, as I understand, the
30. original bill has a little copayment factor in...again, we
31. just...the...the next bill that you see on Public Aid, substantively,
32. will have copayments for people with no money at all. I don't
33. think there's too much of a sharing of the burden for those

1. of us who at least employed, to have that concept in our
2. insurance plan and...I would suggest a red light on this bill.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

4. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Davidson...
5. oh, Senator Buzbee.

6. SENATOR BUZBEE:

7. Well, you know, I've had correspondence and phone calls,
8. and so forth, from State employees also in my district, and
9. I'm one of those, who quite frankly, is...is very perturbed at
10. the reduction in the State benefits that have been worked out
11. this time with Blue Cross. If you read that list, which I did,
12. of all of the items that are going to have to be surgery performed
13. as an outpatient, I didn't understand too many of them. One
14. of them, I did understand, was removal of a digit, so that
15. means if I'm going to have my thumb removed, I got to do it as
16. an outpatient. I don't know that I'll particularly like that
17. and I'm hoping that...that we can get some sort of relief from
18. that sort of mickey mouse. But for us to pass a Statute and
19. put it in the law, that we can never reduce the group insurance
20. benefits from one year to the next, is going way too far. Any
21. kind of...of group insurance contract, that's negotiated,between
22. a large organization and an insurance company, the benefits
23. may vary from contract time to contract time. And for us to
24. make it the law of the State of Illinois, that those folks
25. who do the negotiating cannot ever reduce the benefits, my
26. goodness sakes alive, Blue Cross-Blue Shield is probably standing
27. in the hallway right now, wringing their hands in glee. This
28. is a...this is a windfall, for them or for any other insurance
29. company that we ever negotiate with. And it seems to me, if
30. we make it the law, we take that ability to negotiate away from
31. our negotiators, they don't have any thing left to negotiate.
32. So, it seems to me that we ought to be voting No on this one,
33. even though we all have a vested interest and even though we've

1. been receiving a lot of...of pressure from State employee
2. constituents about their proposed reduction in benefits.
3. We've got to work to get those benefits back and that's not
4. even addressing the cost factor, the eight million dollars that's
5. been talked about. We, just awhile ago, went twenty-eight million
6. over the Governor's Budget II, this is going to be another
7. eight million, it'll put us up to thirty-six if we do this.
8. Those of you who want to...who consider yourselves fiscal
9. conservatives, or who have a feel for negotiations, ought to
10. vote No.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. If there's no further discussion, Senator Davidson may
13. close. The question is, shall the Senate concur in House
14. Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 889. Those in favor will
15. vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have
16. all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
17. who wish? Take the record. On that question the Ayes are
18. 14, the Nays are 38, 2 Voting Present. The Senate does not
19. concur in House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 889 and the
20. Secretary shall so inform the House. Senate Bill 955.
21. Senator Davidson. Mr. Secretary.

22. SECRETARY:

23. Senate Bill 955 with House Amendments 1, 2 and 9.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Senator Davidson.

26. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

27. Mr...Mr. President, with the track record I just made on
28. the last two bills, I move to nonconcur with House Amendment 1,
29. 2 and 9 to Senate Bill 955.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Senator Davidson moves to nonconcur in House Amendments
32. No. 1, 2 and 9 to Senate Bill 955. Is there any discussion?
33. Senator Berman.

1. SENATOR BERMAN:

2. Question of the sponsor. I thought these amendments were
3. okay, why aren't we going with them?

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Senator Davidson.

6. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

7. It has nothing to do with these amendments, there's
8. a bilingual certification, something that's got hung-up and
9. the request was to...we have to nonconcur to be able to get
10. it in to the Conference Committee to take care of the bilingual...
11. certification of teachers.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Senator Berman.

14. SENATOR BERMAN:

15. Well, that's the first I've heard about it. Why don't you
16. move to concur in 1 and...okay, forget it.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Well, the question is...on Senator Davidson's motion to
19. nonconcur in House Amendments 1, 2 and 9 to Senate Bill 955.
20. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The
21. Ayes have it, the motion carries and the Secretary shall so
22. inform the House. Senate Bill 1044, Senator Berning. Mr. Secretary.

23. SECRETARY:

24. Senate Bill 1044 with House Amendment 1.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

26. Senator Berning. Take it out of the record. Senate Bill
27. 1124, Senator Joyce. Mr. Secretary.

28. SECRETARY:

29. Senate Bill 1124 with House Amendment 1.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Senator Joyce.

32. SENATOR JEROME JOYCE:

33. Yes, I would move to concur, it's a clean-up amendment.

34. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. Is there any discussion? If not, the question is shall
2. the Senate concur in House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill
3. 1124. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
4. the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
5. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that
6. question, the Ayes are 51, the Nays are 1, none Voting Present. And

13. Senator Rock.

14. SENATOR ROCK:

18. came to us and wanted to be specifically included. The House
19. has rejected that and I think there's just...this bill is too

23. Senator Rhoads.

24. SENATOR RHOADS:

25. I...I agree with Senator Rock on the this one and would urge

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Further discussion? The question is, shall the Senate
29. recede from Senate Amendment No. 3 to House Bill 985. Those in
30. favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have
31. all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record.
32. On that question, the Ayes are 49, the Nays are 3, none Voting
33. Present. And the Senate does recede from Senate Amendment No. 3

1. to House Bill 985, and the bill having received the required
2. constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate Bill 991,

4. SENATOR DEGNAN:

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. Senator Degnan moves that the Senate refuse to recede from
9. Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 985 and that a Committee of
10. Conference be appointed. Those in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay.
11. The Ayes have it. The Secretary shall so inform the House.
12. 1019...if I might have the...alright. 1019 is on the Calendar
13. in error. The House sent the wrong message and it is not on
14. the Calendar properly. And is there leave to return to 945?
15. Senator Schaffer indicates he's gotten the deal worked out.
16. Senator Schaffer on House Bill 945 with Amendments 1, 2, 3, 4,

18. For what purpose does Senator Hall arise?

19. SENATOR HALL:

20. Well, in your...when you referred to Senator Degnan's bill,
21. you...you referred to it as 985. I was trying to get your
22. attention. You didn't say 991, you said 985.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. Alright. The Chair was in error. The motion of Senator
25. Degnan was on 991. The question is, shall the Senate refuse
26. to recede from Senate Amendment No. 1. On that, all in favor
27. say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. The Senate refuses
28. to recede to Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 991. If I
29. might have the attention of the Body,...if I might have your
30. attention, please, we are about...to distribute a new Concurrence
31. and Nonconcurrence. It will be on pink paper and if the Secretary

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

13. The motion is, that the Senate refuse to recede from the
14. amendments as listed. Is there discussion? And that a Committee
15. of Conference be appointed. On the motion to refuse to recede,
16. all in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. The
17. Secretary shall so inform the House. To all amendments. House
18. Bill 1030, Senator Rupp. Senator Rupp is recognized.

19. SENATOR RUPP:

20. Thank you, Mr. President. I move to recede on Amendment No.
21. 1...Senate Amendment No. 1, which had added a reasonable fee
22. provision for the services provided. It seems that the fees...
23. and then the reasonable is the question. I do ask that we
24. move...and...have an approval to move to recede from this amend-
25. ment.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

27. The motion is to recede from Senate Amendment No. 1. Is
28. there discussion? Senator Rhoads.

29. SENATOR RHOADS:

30. Yes, a question of the sponsor. Senator Rupp, as I under-
31. stand it, these would be lab fees...that the department wanted
32. and, by receding, this would be final action. Would you have...
33. do you feel strongly about it or do you think we could get this

1. into a Conference Committee to try to restore those lab fees?

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

3. Senator Rupp.

4. SENATOR RUPP:

5. Strongly.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

7. Further discussion? Senator Buzbee.

8. SENATOR BUZBEE:

9. Well, this is another one of those bills where the implication
10. of this is that we're going to be increasing the...Governor's...
11. Budget...because the Department of Public Health...operates three
12. laboratories in this State. One of them is in Chicago, one of
13. them is in Springfield and one of them is in Carbondale. I
14. don't know about the other two laboratories, but the laboratory
15. in Carbondale is heavily used. We fought a few years ago to
16. keep it open. Now, the department has gotten down to the point
17. of saying, we have to have some sort of a fee charged for all of
18. those clinics and doctors and so forth that send their specimens
19. to our public laboratory. If we take the action that Senator
20. Rupp asked us to take, it's going to mean an increased expenditure
21. out of the General Revenue Fund. It's just that simple. I
22. think the Governor had the right idea in asking for a small
23. reasonable fee to be charged for all of those laboratory procedures
24. that are done by the public health laboratories; and I'm not quite
25. sure why we're getting this kind of opposition. I was just told,
26. by the way, that the Governor called all of the institutions of
27. higher education last night and said that if his rollback bills
28. were not passed in the House, that he was going to veto every
29. higher education bill and...and the elementary and secondary
30. funding bill. So, that means...well, now don't get too excited,
31. ...Senator Rhoads,...just don't get too excited, I know, I...
32. I'm making the point that we're continuing today to increase
33. the budget. We are now twenty-eight million over Governor 2.

1. This will add, I don't know how much, but it will be a sub-
2. stantial amount, if we take the precision that Senator Rupp
3. asks us to take and recede from this amendment. I submit to
4. you it's not a good idea and that we ought to stay with the
5. Governor.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

7. Further discussion? Senator Simms.

8. SENATOR SIMMS:

9. Would the...sponsor yield for a question and then I'd like
10. to comment on...Senator Rupp, what you're...by receding, what...
11. would you explain what the affect of this we'll have?

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

13. Senator Rupp.

14. SENATOR RUPP:

15. Yes, it will put the...thank you, Mr. President. What will
16. happen is that under the present set-up we did years ago, provide
17. laboratory facilities to the State Health Department for the
18. purpose of providing a service to the local...governmental units.
19. That's what has been happening. They have been using it. It
20. is an excellent thing. Now, there was a proposal for a reason-
21. able fee type thing and I did not object to that, however, I
22. think the thing has gotten warped around into some other items
23. and it is not turning out to be a reasonable type fee. I don't
24. know that this is adding anything to the budget. I think that's
25. already in there. These labs were put in for providing service.
26. I think they should continue to do so.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Alright. The...the...Chair...may we have some order, please?
29. The following Senators have sought recognition: Senators Berning,
30. Grotberg, Hall, and Davidson. Senator Simms had not concluded
31. though.

32. SENATOR SIMMS:

33. Well,...in speaking,...I would have to disagree with...Senator

1. Rupp...respectfully, and I have a great deal of respect for his
2. judgment, but these...services that are provided...have some
3. great...importance downstate, particularly, that...in addition to
4. the units of local government, they also serve very vital functions
5. in serving the coroner's offices and all of downstate Illinois.
6. And, frankly, they do an excellent job in providing very fast...
7. statistical analysis on cases dealing with...that which comes
8. under the jurisdiction, and I have a great fear that...if...the
9. House...the Senate follows the motion by Senator Rupp, that...
10. this interruption of service and...the cost potentiality in
11. the other direction to private laboratories is going to be
12. exorbitant and,...for this reason, I would...be opposed to his
13. motion.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

15. Further discussion? Senator...Senator Berning.

16. SENATOR BERNING:

17. A question of the sponsor.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Indicates he will yield. Senator Berning.

20. SENATOR BERNING:

21. Glancing quickly at the analysis,...it would appear, and
22. I'm asking, then, for your comment,...it would appear that this
23. becomes a user fee and that it...would be justified from the
24. standpoint that those who use it would be paying for it, rather
25. than the General Revenue Fund. Is that not the case?

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

27. Senator Rupp.

28. SENATOR RUPP:

29. That...you're exactly right, but I think what we're talking
30. about here, we all realize these services are vital. This was
31. established to provide them, and, now, since you feel and are
32. raising all these questions, let me ask you this, if we are
33. imposing these particular fees on local government, don't you

1. think we are also, in effect, mandating by this that they pay
2. a fee. If they are required to pay a fee by our action, are we
3. not responsible, then, to reimburse them?

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

5. Senator Berning. Further discussion? Senator...Senator
6. Grotberg.

7. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

8. Well, thank you, Mr. President. I rise...not too reluctantly
9. against my good friend, Senator Rupp's motion. The Department
10. of Public Health and its budget that is on the Governor's Desk
11. includes the fees involved in this bill. Now, the...in this
12. Senate amendment. Also, I think for those of you who have great
13. fear, those fees will be promulgated and will be...have to be
14. okayed by the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules. So,
15. the Legislature will get a little wack at...that's unreasonable
16. ...a lot of...we've been so unreasonable on some...let's be
17. unreasonable once again and not concur.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Alright. Further discussion? Senator Davidson.

20. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

21. Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate, I rise in
22. opposition to the motion to recede from the amendment for two
23. reasons. The only way we're going to come to an equitable
24. solution is not to recede, get it into a Conference Committee,
25. for either by regulation we can give them the authority or we
26. can put a reasonable fee on the toxicology report, which all the
27. different coroners are going to want. And when they go into a
28. coroner's jury, they're going to want a State lab report, not
29. Joe Blow, pathologist from wherever, if they're going to use it.
30. I urge you to vote not to recede so we can get this in Conference
31. Committee, so we can establish a reasonable fee in funding for...
32. to keep the labs that are necessary, without the necessary fee
33. on water and et cetera, and put it where there is a service fee

1. by the users to make-up that three hundred thousand we're talking
2. about.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

4. Senator Hall.

5. SENATOR HALL:

6. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
7. Senate. Will the sponsor yield for a question? Senator Rupp,
8. I have...the east side health district in my area. If they
9. send something up to be run by the State lab, is...is there
10. additional charge back to them or what?

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

12. Senator Rupp.

13. SENATOR RUPP:

14. Thank you, Mr. President. At the present time, no. If
15. we accept this...if we recede, then that will continue the
16. practice that there will not be a fee. What they're attempting
17. to do, is to put it into conference to get a...a...a fee schedule
18. set. Your outfits and every other local coroner and...every
19. other local governmental unit will now have to start paying for
20. these services.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

22. Further discussion? Senator Rupp may close.

23. SENATOR RUPP:

24. Just a...a favorable roll call. Thank you.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

26. The question is, shall the Senate recede from Senate Amend-
27. ment No. 1 to House Bill 1030. Those in favor vote Aye. Those
28. opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
29. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the
30. record. On that question, the Ayes are 10, the Nays are 43.
31. The Senate refuses to recede from the adoption of Senate Amendment
32. No. 1 and the Secretary shall so inform the House. 1049, Senator
33. Berman, with Senate Amendment No. 2. Is Senator Berman on the Floor?

1. Senator Berman. 1049, Senator, with Senate Amendment No. 2.

2. SENATOR BERMAN:

3. I move that the Senate not...refuse to recede from...Senate
4. Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 1049.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

6. Senator Berman moves that the Senate refuse to recede from
7. Senate Amendment No. 2 and that a Committee of Conference be
8. appointed. On the motion, discussion? All in favor say Aye.
9. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it, and the Secretary shall so
10. inform the House. House Bill 1135, Senator Taylor.

11. SENATOR TAYLOR:

12. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I
13. move that the House refuse to recede from...Amendment No. 1 to
14. House Bill 1135 and request a Conference Committee.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

16. Senator Taylor moves that the Senate refuse to recede from
17. Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1135 and that a Committee
18. of Conference be appointed. On that motion, discussion? All in
19. favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it, and the Secretary
20. shall so inform the House. House Bill 1168, Senator Marovitz.
21. Senator Marovitz with Senate Amendment No. 2.

22. SENATOR MAROVITZ:

23. Thank you, very much, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen
24. of the Senate. This...amendment is the...the infamous High-rise
25. Fire Commission. We have been successful in putting the fire
26. out someplace else and I would...I would move that the Senate
27. recede from Senate Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 1168.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

29. Senator Marovitz moves that the Senate refuse to recede
30. from Senate Amendment No. 2 to...

31. SENATOR MAROVITZ:

32. No, no, no, no, no, no, no, no. I would move that the
33. Senate do recede...

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. Alright.

3. SENATOR MAROVITZ:

4. ...from Senate Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 1168.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

6. The motion is to recede, discussion? Discussion? Senator
7. Keats.

8. SENATOR KEATS:

9. A question.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. Senator Keats.

12. SENATOR KEATS:

13. Does this still...1168, just to be completely sure,...nothing
14. against your...that particular High-rise Fire Commission and all that
15. sort of stuff. ...is this the one that includes, and I cannot
16. find it here,...a little bit of pork barrell money to send guys
17. on trips to...Europe this summer with a special Events Commission
18. and fools around with that membership so even more guys can take
19. those trips than present? Is that this same bill?

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

21. Senator Marovitz.

22. SENATOR MAROVITZ:

23. I wouldn't want anything to do with anything like that,
24. Roger. This has nothing to do with anything like that, but there
25. is another vehicle around here. You'll have to check four
26. thousand bills...this has nothing to do with it...nothing,
27. absolutely.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

29. Senator Keats.

30. SENATOR MAROVITZ:

31. This just has to do with voting on board of directors.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. Senator Keats. Further discussion? The question is,

1. shall the Senate recede from Senate Amendment No. 2 to House
2. Bill 1168. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
3. The voting is open. Senator Gitz. Have all voted who wish?
4. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,
5. the Ayes are 54, the Nays are none, none Voting Present. The Senate
6. does recede from Senate Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 1168,
7. and the bill having received the required constitutional
8. majority is declared passed. House Bill 1189, Senator Schaffer.
9. Senator Schaffer is recognized on Senate Amendment No. 1.

10. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

11. Mr....Mr. President, I think we have this worked out. I
12. think we can get a quick conference. I just...move to refuse
13. to recede and request a Conference Committee.

2. Discussion? On this, Senator Nedza. Discussion? Senator

14. The motion is to recede...the motion is to recede. Dis-
15. cussion? Senator Bowers.

17. Well, Mr. President, it took me about an hour and a half
18. of debate to get that amendment on, I'd like to have at least
19. a little discussion to take it off. And I suppose...I suppose
20. there may be thirty people that are out here, like to do that,
21. but in any event...this is the amendment that...that...provides
22. that any road that you're going to take into consideration, if
23. you're going to use it as...as part of the circumference to
24. provide for unilateral...annexation, any road that you use in
25. that respect has to be...totally adjacent to a municipality.
26. I thought it was an awful good amendment when it went on and
27. I think we ought to keep it there.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

29. I wonder if we could clear the conference area right
30. behind Senator Nedza's desk. If we can clear that center
31. aisle, Mr. Secretary...Sergeant-at-Arms, we'd have a chance
32. for Senator Nedza to hear his own bill being discussed. Senator
33. Nedza.

1. SENATOR NEDZA:

2. Thank you, Mr. President. There were three amendments
3. to the bill, Senate Bill...Amendment 1, 2, and 3 and unfortunately
4. Senate Amendment No. 4 to the bill was not in concert to
5. the three preceding amendments and the House, in their wisdom,
6. chose not...

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. Senator Nedza...Senator Nedza, for one moment. For what
9. purpose does Senator Walsh arise?

10. SENATOR WALSH:

11. If Senator Nedza is closing, I...I would just like to
12. address myself to the...to the bill. Is he responding to a
13. question or closing?

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

15. He was responding to a question...

16. SENATOR WALSH:

17. Fine.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. ...and then...no, the debate...he was not closing. He
20. was just responding. Senator Nedza.

21. SENATOR NEDZA:

22. Thank you, Mr. President. In effect, the...the amend-
23. ment that Senator Bowers is addressing himself to...the
24. language in the amendment is not in concert with the three
25. previous amendments and, therefore, I would...say that...
26. with all the time that Senator Bowers had to put the amend-
27. ment on, unfortunately, Senator Bowers, it's...just...the
28. wording in it is not concurrent with the other amendments.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

30. Further discussion? Senator Walsh.

31. SENATOR WALSH:

32. Well, Mr. President and members of the Senate,...the
33. members will recall this is the...is the bill that would

1. permit...the Village of Melrose Park, and only the Village
2. of Melrose Park, to annex the...the Maywood Park Race Track
3. and the...the language...in the bill, without this amendment,
4. would provide...just that. I'm,...frankly,...you know,
5. pleased that my colleagues from the City of Chicago are
6. interested in the real estate located in my district,...
7. but I would hope that...the members from the other part of
8. the State might...leave this matter to those of us within
9. the district and...see if we can resolve the problem that
10. ...that apparently exists. Senator Bowers' amendment is
11. in...in good order. It just provides, as he indicated,
12. that if you're going to use a highway for purposes of...
13. establishing a boundary for unilateral annexation, that
14. that highway should be...adjacent to a municipality. This
15. is an extraordinary procedure that's being requested. Uni-
16. lateral annexation, that's without the consent of either
17. the property owners or the people who reside in the area.
18. It's furthermore, in this particular instance, an extra-
19. ordinary procedure because it's designed to accomplish the
20. annexation of one particular piece of real estate, namely
21. the...race track known as Maywood Park, which is located
22. in my district. I might also point out that...the three
23. ...three municipalities, which are adjacent to this piece
24. of real estate, are wholly within my district. So,...I
25. admit there's a problem, but I think it's a problem that
26. we should...be permitted to work out and I would urge...
27. a No vote.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

29. Further discussion? Senator D'Arco.

30. SENATOR D'ARCO:

31. ...President, there were some errors made in the...the
32. statements by Senator Walsh. And one is, that Melrose Park
33. would be the only municipality who can annex Maywood Race

1. Track. Under the bill that Senator Nedza presented, without
2. Senator Bowers' amendment, any of the adjoining municipalities
3. would have the right to annex Maywood Race Track. So, to
4. single out Melrose Park and say that would be the only
5. municipality, is incorrect. Secondly, Senator Bowers' amend-
6. ment, the effect of which is to say that no municipality
7. would be able to annex, because what it really says is that
8. any highway that is adjacent to one or more municipalities.
9. Well, 1st Avenue is not adjacent to any municipality. It
10. is adjacent to the unincorporated area that the municipality
11. could annex. Therefore, the effect of the amendment is to
12. say that no municipality would be allowed to annex this un-
13. incorporated area and that's what he's trying to do, defeat
14. the bill. I would definitely support this motion to recede
15. from House Bill 1263.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

17. Further discussion? Further discussion? Senator Walsh.

18. SENATOR WALSH:

19. Just...my name was used in debate...Mr. President, just
20. briefly in response. Number one, of course, anybody can
21. annex...any contiguous municipality can annex with the consent
22. of the property owner or in the absence of any...of any...
23. people residing in the...in the absence of anybody residing
24. on the property or if anyone resides there with the consent
25. of the...of the...residents. You know, this is unilateral
26. annexation that we're talking about. Number two, in order to
27. accomplish the goal, apparently, of...of Senator D'Arco, we
28. need merely increase the size of the track to be annexed. It's
29. sixty acres now. Let's just increase it to a hundred acres or
30. a hundred and twenty acres or whatever. Then there would be
31. absolutely no question about who might annex or who might not
32. annex and if they want to have a race, let them have a race.
33. But...my understanding of this thing the way in which it is

1. now phrased, it's just...giving an opportunity to one municipality
2. in my district. That's my understanding, but in any event,
3. ...the Villages of River Grove and River Forest have
4. indicated opposition. Give us an opportunity to settle our
5. own problems and kindly vote No.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

7. Further discussion? Further discussion? Senator Nedza
8. may close.

9. SENATOR NEDZA:

10. Thank you, Mr. President. In response to...all inquiry,
11. all I may say is that in our capacity as members of this
12. Body I think we constantly address ourselves to situations
13. that reflect in everybody's district, so I...I would...say
14. that's a mute statement to make, Senator, and I would ask
15. for an Aye vote.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE).

17. The question is, shall the Senate recede from Senate
18. Amendment No. 4 to House Bill 1263. Those in favor vote
19. Aye. Those opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all
20. voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
21. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On
22. that question, the Ayes are 30, the Nays are 21, 1 Voting
23. Present. The Senate does recede from...Senate Amendment No.
24. 4 to House Bill 12...from House Bill 1263 and the bill having
25. received the required constitutional majority is declared
26. passed. Senator Walsh.

27. SENATOR WALSH:

28. To request a verification of the affirmative vote.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

30. Will the members please be in their seats. Senator
31. Walsh has requested a verification of those who voted in the
32. affirmative. Will the Secretary please call the roll.

33. SECRETARY:

1. The following voted in the affirmative: Berman, Bruce,
2. Buzbee, Carroll, Chew, Collins, D'Arco, Dawson, DeAngelis,
3. Demuzio, Donnewald, Egan, Friedland, Gitz, Hall, Johns, Jerome

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. Senator Walsh, do you question the presence of any
9. member?

10. SENATOR WALSH:

11. Is Senator Berman on the Floor?

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

13. Is Senator Berman on the Floor? Senator Berman. Yes.

14. SENATOR WALSH:

15. Is Senator Keats on the Floor?

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

17. Is Senator Keats on the Floor? Senator Keats. Strike
18. his name. Alright. Any...any further...on a verified roll
19. call, there are...alright. Any further...Senator...Senator
20. D'Arco it...it won't accomplish anything to verify the
21. negatives. It is not an adoption of an amendment where the
22. majority is in question. It's a question of building to 30
23. and we are at the point where if you verified off every
24. negative we only have 29 affirmative votes. So, we usually
25. do that when...when the effect would...would be to change
26. the majority required. Alright. On a verified roll call,

1. Discussion? Discussion? Senator Lemke moves that the
2. Senate refuse to recede from Senate Amendment No. 2 to House
3. Bill 1391 and that a Committee of Conference be appointed.
4. Those in favor of the motion say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes
5. have it. The Secretary shall so inform the House. House Bill
6. 1409, Senator Chew, with Senate Amendment No. 1. Senator Chew.
7. SENATOR CHEW:

8. Mr. President, Senate Amendment No. 1 was embodied in

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. ...we have leave to go out of the order of business...to go back
24. to House Bill 761 for Senator Bruce...House Bill 761 and House
25. Bill 795? Leave is granted. On the Order of House Bill 761,
26. Senator Bruce.

27. SENATOR BRUCE:

28. According to my...appropriations staff members and...
29. everyone who runs the appropriations process, I've been told
30. by my handlers that we are to recede from Senate Amendment No. 1,
31. which has been taken off all the other bills in the...the House,
32. evidently. It deals with some sort of...reduction that we did
33. over here, and now, they've all taken them off over in the

1. House. I have no other knowledge in that, and I...a shake of

7. What is Senate Amendment No. 1?

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

9. Senator Carroll will answer that.

10. SENATOR CARROLL:

11. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
12. Senate. This is in part. We had reduced the...Treasurer's
13. Office...part of which was a result of a new function that had
14. not substantively passed. It has now, I am advised, so done,
15. and they need this Bod to...something with agricultural fundings.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. Is there further discussion? Senator Grotberg.

18. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

19. Well, Senator Carroll has...or Senator Bruce represented

1. and none Voting Present, and the Senate recedes from Amendment...
2. Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 761, and the bill having
3. received the required constitutional majority is declared
4. passed. On House Bill 795, Senator Bruce.

5. SENATOR BRUCE:

6. The motion is that we would refuse to recede.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

8. Is there any discussion? Senator Bruce moves that the
9. Senate refuse to recede from the adoption of Amendment No. 1
10. to Senate Bill 795 and that a Conference Committee be appointed.
11. All those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The
12. Ayes have it. The...motion carries, and the Secretary shall so
13. inform the House. House Bill 1421, Senator Taylor. Senator
14. Taylor.

15. SENATOR TAYLOR:

16. Thank you, Mr. President. I move that the...that the
17. Senate refuse to...to recede from...Amendment No. 1 to House
18. Bill 1421 and request a Conference Committee.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Senator Taylor moves that the Senate refuse to recede from
21. the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1421 and that a
22. Conference Committee be appointed. All those in favor indicate
23. by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion
24. carries, and the Secretary shall so inform the House. House
25. Bill 1447, Senator DeAngelis. Senator DeAngelis.

26. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

27. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I move to recede from Senate
28. Amendments 2 and 3.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

30. Is there any discussion? Senator Berman.

31. SENATOR BERMAN:

32. Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in opposition to the...
33. was the motion on 3 and 4 or just on 3?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. Senator DeAngelis.

2. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

3. It's on 3 and 4, Senator Berman.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

5. Senator Berman.

6. SENATOR BERMAN:

7. I would ask to divide the question. I have no problem with
8. receding on 3. I have a serious problem in receding on 4.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. Senator Berman has moved to divide the question. Senator
11. DeAngelis, do you have any objection? Hearing no objection,
12. the question will be divided. On...we will take them up in
13. order. Senator DeAngelis, do you wish...on Amendment No. 3?

14. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

15. I'm sorry.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

17. Alright. We have now divided the question. We will have
18. Amendments 3 and 4 considered separately. Do you wish to take
19. up No. 3 first or No. 4 first? Senator DeAngelis.

20. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

21. Well, it doesn't matter to me, but I would like to see
22. that we recede from both of them.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. Alright. Senator DeAngelis has moved that the Senate recede

16. Leave is granted. Now, Senator Dawson moves for the adoption
17. of House Joint Resolution No. 46. All in favor, indicate by
18. saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. House Joint
19. Resolution 46 is adopted. On the Order of Resolutions,
20. Secretary's Desk. Mr. Secretary, Senate Resolution 143.

21. SECRETARY:

22. Senate Resolution 143, sponsored by Senators Taylor and
23. Geo-Karis.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Senator Taylor.

26. SENATOR TAYLOR:

27. Mr. President and members of the Senate, House Resolution...
28. Senate Resolution 143 is the resolution dealing with the...game
29. crime and allowing the Legislative Investigating Commission to
30. investigate those crimes and those things that cause any crime
31. in the State of Illinois. I feel like the Investigating Commission
32. is the proper place for any investigation, so that is a standing
33. Committee. And I move for the adoption of...Senate Resolution 143.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Is there any discussion? If not, Senator...Senator Simms.

3. SENATOR SIMMS:

4. Would the sponsor yield? Senator Taylor, what...I'm sorry,
5. I didn't hear the complete thrust to Senate Resolution...is this
6. an investigation? Investigation of what?

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

8. Senator Taylor.

9. SENATOR TAYLOR:

10. Game crime throughout the State of Illinois.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Is there any further discussion? If not, Senator Taylor
13. moves the adoption of Senate Resolution 143. Those in favor
14. indicate by saying Aye. We're going to have to have a roll
15. call on here, because it's directing to the Legislative Inves-
16. tating Commission. All those in favor of adopting Senate Res-
17. olution 143 will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The
18. voting is open. Would you vote me Aye? Have all voted who
19. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that
20. question, the Ayes are 54, the Nays are none, none Voting Present.
21. Senate Resolution 143 having received the constitutional majority
22. is declared passed. Senator Demuzio.

23. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

24. Yes, Mr. President, I filed a resolution this morning. It's
25. congratulatory, it went to the Consent Calendar. I don't know
26. if I'm the only...Senator in the same posture, but it is con-
27. gratulatory and...I wouldn't want today to go by without...missing
28. it. I don't know if anybody else has filed any, and...if there
29. are no objections from the Body,...I make a motion to...suspend
30. the rules for the immediate...

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. ...no...the Secretary would like to type up about...about
33. eight or ten of them, and if you'll wait about ten minutes, he'll

1. get the whole...the whole...

2. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

3. Yes. That's okay. I just...I didn't know if I was the only
4. member in the same posture or not. As long as the Chair will
5. assure me that...they will get back to it.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. The Secretary indicates in about fifteen minutes he's going
8. to have the supplemental...

9. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

10. But I have the...but I have the Chair's assurance that we
11. will get back to it today.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. You have the Chair's assurance. On your Senate Calendar
14. Supplemental No. 1, for Concurrence on the Secretary's Desk
15. on the backside, we have...House Bill 654, Senator Johns. Is
16. there leave to go to that order of business? Leave is granted.
17. Senator Johns.

18. SENATOR JOHNS:

19. Mr. President, I refuse to recede from Senate Amendment
20. No. 2 to House Bill 654.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

22. Senator Johns moves to recede...moves that the...Senator
23. Johns moves that the Senate refuse to recede from...from Senate
24. Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 654, and that a Conference Committee
25. be appointed. All those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Senator
26. Maitland. Could we have a little order, please? Senator Maitland.

27. SENATOR MAITLAND:

28. Yeah,...Mr....Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
29. Senate, I would rise in opposition to that motion for the same
30. reason I rose...rose last year...rose last year...rose last
31. evening on...on another bill. I think that's...if this bill wants
32. to go to Conference Committee, I'd choose not to see it go to
33. Conference Committee.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Is there any discussion? Any further discussion? Senator
3. Johns,...what's...what's your...do you...do you want a...do
4. you want a motion out to...refuse to recede from the adoption
5. of the amendment? Senator Maitland...has...moved that that
6. motion be defeated. Or, Senator Maitland, are you speaking on
7. the motion?

8. SENATOR MAITLAND:

9. Well, Mr. President, I don't believe I moved. I think the
10. motion was already made. I'm just simply objecting to the...
11. the motion...and would urge a No vote.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Alright. Senator Johns moves that the Senate refuse to
14. recede from the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 654
15. and that a Conference Committee be appointed. All those in
16. favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it.
17. A roll call has been requested. Senator Berman.

18. SENATOR BERMAN:

19. I had my light on, Mr. President, before we went to that
20. order. I'd like to speak on the motion.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

22. You may speak on the motion.

23. SENATOR BERMAN:

24. Alright. I...

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

26. A roll call has been requested. Will the...will the Senators
27. be in their seats? A roll call has been requested. There is
28. discussion on the motion to recede from House...from Senate Amend-
29. ment No. 2 to House Bill 654. Senator Berman.

30. SENATOR BERMAN:

31. I rise in opposition to the motion made by my good friend and
32. colleague, Senator Johns. My concern, quite honestly, is that
33. this is going to be used as a vehicle for a new School Aid Formula

1. that will come in sometime in the next seven hours. We have
2. already passed a School Aid Formula that has met with the approval
3. of a majority of people in the Senate and in the House. It's on
4. the Governor's Desk and I am...apprehensive. If Senator Johns
5. assured me that this is not a School Aid Formula vehicle, I
6. would withdraw my opposition, but...without hearing...something
7. to that affect, I would, also, rise in opposition to the motion
8. to refuse to recede.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

10. Is there further discussion? Senator Bruce.

11. SENATOR BRUCE:

12. Well, thank you, Mr....President and members of the Senate.
13. I don't know...Senator Maitland has...been here a few years.and...
14. and so have I, but I don't know...last night was the first time.
15. that the incident occurred where a Senator, who was a sponsor
16. of a bill, asked this Body to refuse to recede...to refuse to
17. recede and we had to go through a roll call and a verification.
18. Now, whatever Senator Johns does with this bill, it is within his
19. power to do it and is...within this Body's power to reject it
20. or not and for you, as a Senator, to inject yourself into what
21. Senator Johns wants to do with this bill just goes beyond a
22. little bit of parliamentary procedure. Now, Senator Maitland,
23. you have the right to make that motion and you, certainly, have
24. the right to a roll call, but I want to tell you that Senator
25. Johns has refused to recede to...to the...the House has not
26. accepted our amendment and all he is saying is he refused to
27. take...to strip off that Senate amendment, adopted by a majority
28. of this Body, and it seems reasonable to me to honor that request.
29. Only two instances has that occurred...to date, that we've had
30. a roll call in this Session, and I cannot recall last Session
31. at all. And it happens to deal on School Aid Formula and School
32. Code bills, and I know that you and Senator Berman and all the
33. members of the School Problems Commission, including Senator

1. Davidson, are damned excited that some of us are still working
2. on the School Aid Formula. Well, I'm going to be continuing
3. to work on it today and tomorrow when we're still here, and
4. all Senator Johns wants to do is to take this bill and have it
5. to work on, and you're denying a Senator the right to go into
6. Conference Committee. Senator Berman stood up here just two or
7. three hours ago and said, they want to accept it, I don't want
8. to. I want to be able to negotiate back and forth and get to
9. the middle ground. That's what Senator Berman said on his
10. bill, but when Senator Johns wants to get the middle ground,
11. when he wants to go to Conference Committee, we start jumping
12. up, asking for roll calls, verification. This bill...it only
13. requires a majority of those voting on the issue. This isn't
14. passage and yet, you want to deny the Senate sponsor, who has
15. this bill, the right to do that. It's outrageous that you
16. would do that again and again, simply because you fear, and
17. you and the members of the School Problems Commission fear that
18. someone will come up with a better School Aid Formula. Now,
19. whatever we come up with...School Aid Formula is going
20. to be debated, talked about and voted on by this Body.
21. Senator Johns' motion is to refuse to recede to an amendment
22. that was adopted by this Body by 30 votes and the House has
23. refused to accept it. And that's all he says. We ought to
24. stand by that amendment, we ought to go into Conference Committee.
25. Ask for your favorable support of Senator Johns' motion.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

27. Senator Davidson.

28. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

29. Well, Mr. President and members...will you sit down, please?
30. Mr. President and Senators, I hadn't planned on speaking on this,
31. but since Senator Bruce brought my name up into the debate,...and
32. I want to tell you, Senator Bruce, you don't speak for me and
33. neither does Senator Berman or Senator Maitland or anybody else.

1. I was in support of Senator Johns' motion to do what he damned
2. well pleases with this bill, it's his bill, but if you want to
3. get up and make a tirade and accuse me of something that I'm
4. not guilty of, I'm sure as hell going to help lead the charge
5. to dig him a grave. Now, it's his bill, he has a right to ask
6. for it, and I'm going to support him this time, but if I hear
7. another...outcry like that, when I haven't been guilty of any-
8. thing, I'm going to be a committee of one to lead a charge on
9. a lot of people. If you're going to start charging people,
10. be sure I'm guilty, and I don't mind being accused of what I'm
11. guilty for, but don't accuse me of something I haven't done
12. until I've done it, and I'll let you have it right between the
13. eyes out front, the same way I always play.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

15. The United Press International...requests permission to
16. take still photographs. Is leave granted? Leave...and AP, also,
17. requests it. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator
18. Maitland.

19. SENATOR MAITLAND:

20. Thank you...thank you, Mr. President. Senator Bruce, of
21. all people, you, to tell me and...call foul. Some of the things
22. that you've done the last two or three days on the Floor of
23. this Chamber, you know, I don't like that at all...I don't
24. appreciate that at all. I did not move, in any way, shape,
25. or form, that's not my posture now, I can't even move to do
26. anything. You suggested that I moved on this motion. Whether
27. you know it or not, Senator Johns moved, I'm simply talking
28. in opposition to that motion. That's something I have a perfect
29. right to do, and let's...let's bring a little history into this
30. thing, both bills that we've debated the last two days on this
31. very issue, you assured the Elementary and Secondary Education Committee
32. that you were putting those amendments on there in good faith,
33. and, in fact, you did not. Both amendments were duplicative.

1. We know, and I said this on final passage stage, that those bills
2. are going to go over to the House, and exactly what happened did
3. happen, they were coming back for vehicles. I have a perfect
4. right to stand-up in opposition to that motion. Secondly, the
5. School Problems Commission worked darn hard. We got a compromise
6. from Senator Berman, he didn't like it very well. We took seven
7. million dollars away from his school district Title I for one
8. year. So we've already hurt that district to a degree. I
9. admit elementary districts, perhaps, are disadvantaged to a
10. degree now and something needs to be worked out, but to continue
11. to screw up this formula in the final days of the Session, is
12. not in good faith, I don't believe, and there are many unit
13. districts that are being hurt by the amendment that you attempt
14. to put on this bill. I...I refer you to Senator...to Senator
15. Hall and others who are in districts who are going to be hurt
16. by this formula. I think we've worked damn hard on this formula
17. and, it's a good bill and shouldn't be screwed up in the final
18. days of the Session, and I urge a...a vote in opposition to
19. Senator Johns' motion.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

21. Is there any further discussion? Senator Johns.

22. SENATOR JOHNS:

23. Yes, first, at no time have you ever contacted me, Senator
24. Maitland, about your idea on this; second, I've acted in good
25. faith at everytime on all of my legislation, and you do have
26. the right to challenge what you're doing, but I don't think
27. we've been using that as a habit around here, it's just occurring
28. just recently; third, it is my prerogative, it is my privilege
29. to try to make my bill better. There's no assurance that the
30. bill that you and others have placed upon the Governor's Desk
31. is the ultimate, is the utopia, in School Aid Formula. I have
32. the right to at least consider new avenues, new ideas, new figures,
33. and a new formula. That's what I'm asking for. I'm not saying.

1. it'll be better. If it's not better, then we have the right
2. to turn it down. Senator Nash, could you move over just a
3. little bit? Thank you, Sir. You didn't know you were in
4. the line of questioning and debate. But all I'm asking here
5. is what I've...I've always asked for. I've never denied any-
6. one else what I'm seeking here today. Never, have you ever
7. heard me attempt to deny anyone the right to control their bill
8. and to put it in the best shape possible. That's all I'm
9. asking for today, and I ask the leave of this Body, and I ask
10. a favorable vote to...in my proposal to refuse to recede from
11. the House's action. I still maintain that posture.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Alright. Senator Johns moves that the Senate refuse to
14. recede from the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 654.
15. and that a Conference Committee be appointed. All those in
16. favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting
17. is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?
18. Have all voted who wish? Take...take the record. On that
19. question, the Ayes are 21, the Nays are 29, none Voting Present.
20. The motion having failed to receive a majority vote is declared
21. lost. Senator DeAngelis.

22. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

23. Just an inquiry of the Chair. What happens to that bill
24. now?

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

26. It still stays on the Calendar. It doesn't move. Senator...
27. Senators, it'll be the intention of the Chair to go through...our
28. ...Supplemental Calendar 1, both the front and the back, and...
29. have our Conference Committees appointed, and then break for
30. some supper. We...we have on the Secretary's Desk on the Order
31. of Nonconcurrency on the rear of Supplemental No. 1 on the Senate
32. Calendar, House Bill 852 with Senator Bloom. Senator Bloom.
33. House Bill 1632, Senator Maitland. House Bill...1789, Senator

1. Newhouse. Senator Newhouse, on...House Bill 1789, do you wish...
2. to nonconcur? Senator...Senator Newhouse.

3. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

4. Mr. President, I refuse to recede...to the House action on
5. Senate...on House Bill...1759 and...ask for a Conference Com-
6. mittee.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

8. Senator Newhouse moves that the Senate refuse to recede from
9. the adoption of Amendment No. 3 to House Bill 1789 and that a
10. Conference Committee be appointed. All those in favor say Aye.
11. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries, and the
12. Secretary shall so inform the House. Senator DeAngelis.

13. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

14. Senator Newhouse, is the amendment that exempts...the...
15. municipals? What...

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. Senator Newhouse.

18. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

19. ...I would stand in opposition to that...

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

21. We've already...taken the vote and it's been carried, Senator.

22. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

23. Well, Senator Savickas, my light was on when the bill was
24. called.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

26. On the Order of House Bill 46...on...Secretary's Desk, Non-
27. concurrence...the Calendar had been printed in error. Senator...
28. Walsh brought to our attention that there were two amendments
29. offered on House Bill 46, Amendments 1 and 2. The Senate receded
30. in Amendment No. 2. Senate...Amendment No. 1 was not considered,
31. so, is there leave to bring House Bill 46 back to the Order of
32. Secretary's Desk, Nonconcurrence for the purpose of action on
33. Amendment No. 1? Leave is granted. Senator Walsh.

1. SENATOR WALSH:

2. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. We
3. receded from Amendment No. 2, which was the amendment relating
4. to...preemptory challenges, the amendment offered by...Senator
5. Etheredge in the Senate. Senate Amendment No. 1 is...an amend-
6. ment which provides for the words, "or other person"...relating
7. to the...provision for the payment...or the placing a bond and
8. what bond money might be used to...defray the attorney's fees.
9. This is an amendment which was suggested in committee. I have
10. discussed it with Senators Sangmeister and Bowers, and they both
11. feel that the bill would be in good form without that amendment.
12. So, since it is unnecessary,...I would move that...the Senate
13. recede from Senate Amendment No. 1, and, then, that way we can
14. avoid a Conference Committee, which would be...really of no
15. avail.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. The question is,...is there any discussion? If not, the
18. question is, shall the Senate recede from Amendment No. 1 to
19. House Bill 46. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed
20. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have
21. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the
22. Ayes are 55, the Nays are none, none Voting Present. The Senate
23. recedes from Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 46, and the bill having
24. received the required constitutional majority is declared passed.
25. Are there any other bills that the Senators wish to move, to
26. either concur or nonconcur or recede or not recede? Senator
27. Mahar.

28. SENATOR MAHAR:

29. Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 330 is on the Calendar
30. that...for Concurrence. I'd like to...move on that. Supplemental
31. Calendar No. 1, Mr. President.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. Senator Mahar,...we have a question on it, and it's been

1. requested to hold this for a minute. If there's no other busi-
2. ness,...Senator Bruce.

3. SENATOR BRUCE:

4. Yes.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

6. Senator Bruce.

7. SENATOR BRUCE:

8. We...we have cleared up both the Calendar and Supplemental
9. Calendar, if any other Senator has a bill on either one of those
10. Calendars they would like to move, now would be the time to
11. move it, but if not,...I would move that the Senate stand in
12. recess until the hour of seven. And...there are several Conference
13. Committees. I hope that the members don't use all of that time
14. just for dinner, but we can work on several of the Conference
15. Committees and perhaps we can start banging those out at seven
16. o'clock, but...unless there's objection by any Senator who has
17. a bill on one of those...either the Calendar or the Supplemental
18. Calendar, I would move that we stand in recess until the hour
19. of seven.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

21. You've heard the motion. The Senate will stand in recess
22. till...Senator...Senator Bruce. Senator...Bruce.

23. SENATOR BRUCE:

24. I...I just wonder...Senator Weaver, I wonder if we could
25. just stand at...at ease. We have some paper work that would
26. be coming in between now and seven, which we would be perfunc-
27. torily reading in from time to time, but the Senate would...
28. we won't really convene any actual business till seven. We
29. will just stand at ease, subject to the call of the Chair. We
30. have some messages coming back to the House we'd like to read
31. in and keep moving. So, I would move that we stand in recess,
32. subject to the call of the Chair.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. You've heard the motion. Is leave granted? Leave is
2. granted. The Senate stands in recess, subject to the call of
3. the Chair, and that will not be before seven o'clock.

4. RECESS

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

7. The Senate will come to order. Messages from the House.

21. ...First Committee of Conference, the Speaker has appointed
22. the members on the part of the House. Senator Netsch is the
23. Senate sponsor of Senate Bill 116.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

25. Senator Netsch moves to accede to the request of the House
26. that a Committee of Conference be appointed. On the motion,
27. all in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. The
28. Senate accedes to the request of the House.

29. SECRETARY:

30. A like Message on Senate Bill 137 with House Amendment No.
31. 2, they request a First Conference, the Speaker has appointed
32. the members on the part of the...House. Senator Nega.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

1. Senator Nega moves to accede to the request of the House.

2. Is there leave? Leave is granted.

3. SECRETARY:

4. A like Message on Senate Bill 308 with House Amendments 2,
5. 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 and they request a First Conference, and
6. the Speaker has appointed the members on the part of the House.

7. Senator Maitland.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

9. Senator Maitland asks leave to accede to the request of
10. the House that a Committee of Conference be appointed. Is there
11. leave? Leave is granted.

12. SECRETARY:

13. A like Message on Senate Bill 309 with House Amendments 2,
14. 3, 4, and 5 requesting a First Conference, and the Speaker has
15. appointed the members on the part of the House. Senator
16. Schaffer is the Senate sponsor.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

18. Senator Schaffer asks leave to accede to the request of
19. the House. Is there leave? Leave is granted.

20. SECRETARY:

21. A like Message on Senate Bill 319 with House Amendments 1
22. and 3. Senator Rhoads is the Senate sponsor.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. Senator Rhoads asks leave of the Senate to accede to the
25. request of the House. Is there leave? Leave is granted.

26. SECRETARY:

27. A like Message on Senate Bill 332 with House Amendments 1,
28. 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8. Senator Grotberg is the Senate sponsor.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

30. Senator Grotberg asks leave of the Senate to accede to the
31. request of the House that a Committee of Conference be appointed.
32. Is there leave? Leave is granted.

33. SECRETARY:

1. A like Message on Senate Bill 565 on House Amendment 1.
2. Senator Hall is the Senate sponsor.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

4. Senator Hall asks leave of the Senate to accede to the re-
5. quest of the House. Is there leave? Leave is granted.

6. SECRETARY:

7. A like Message on Senate Bill 650, House Amendment 1. Senator
8. Egan is the Senate sponsor.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. Senator Egan asks leave of the Senate to accede to the re-
11. quest of the House. Is there leave? Leave is granted.

12. SECRETARY:

13. A like Message on Senate Bill 654, House Amendment 1. Senator
14. Degnan is the Senate sponsor.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

16. Senator Degnan asks leave of the Senate to accede to the
17. request of the House. Is there leave? Leave is granted.

18. SECRETARY:

19. A like Message on Senate Bill 714 with House Amendment 1.
20. Senator Jeremiah Joyce is the Senate sponsor.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

22. Senator Jeremiah Joyce asks leave of the Senate to accede
23. to the request of the House. Is there leave? Leave is granted.

24. SECRETARY:
