1. The Senate will please come to order. Will the members
2. please be at their seats and will our guests in the gallery
3. please rise. Our prayer this afternoon will be by the Reverend
4. Eugene Weitzel, the Director of Chaplains at St. John's
5. Hospital, Springfield, Illinois. Father.

6. REVEREND EUGENE WEITZEL:

7. (Prayer given by Father Eugene Weitzel)

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Buzbee, for what purpose do you arise before the
10. reading of the Journal?

11. SENATOR BUZBEE:

12. Mr. President, I just wanted to introduce a very important
13. group of guests in the gallery today. Seated behind the...the
14. gallery on...on the left side is the Randolph County Democratic
15. Women's Organization. I'd like for them to stand and be recogniz-
16. ed.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Will our guests in the gallery please stand and be recogniz-
19. ed. Welcome to Springfield. Reading of the Journal.

20. SECRETARY:

21. Wednesday, June the 17th; Thursday, June the 18th; Friday,
22. June the 19th; Monday, June the 22nd; Tuesday, June the 23rd;
23. Wednesday, June the 24th; Thursday, June the 25th; Friday, June

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Johns.

29. SENATOR JOHNS:

30. Thank you, President Rock. I move that the Journals just
31. read by the Secretary be approved unless some Senator has
32. additions or corrections to offer.

33. PRESIDENT:

34. You've heard the motion as placed by Senator Johns. Any

1. discussion? If not, all in favor signify by saying Aye. All  
2. opposed. The Ayes have it. So ordered. With leave of the  
3. Body WCIA-TV, Channel 3 and Channel 20 have requested permission  
4. to film. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Ozinga,  
5. for what purpose do you arise?

6. SENATOR OZINGA:

7. A matter of personal privilege, Mr. President.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Will the members please be in their seats. Will those  
10. not entitled to the Floor, please vacate. Senator Ozinga.

11. SENATOR OZINGA:

12. Mr. President and members of the Body. As you all know,  
13. a week ago today, I had an invitation to you all, previous to  
14. that, to attend a dinner theatre party. For all of you that  
15. did attend, we all had a wonderful time. For those that missed,  
16. we know that you missed a real, good, non-political, bi-partisan  
17. ...party. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Body, I want you all to  
18. know that I sincerely appreciate, I think the most that I've  
19. ever received from any political Body was given to me that  
20. night for my anniversary, the twenty-fifth anniversary and I  
21. want you all to know that I sincerely appreciate each and every  
22. thought that was behind the gift of this beautiful watch with  
23. its pendant. So, come over and take a peek at it, take a look  
24. at it. I don't know whether I'll let you hold it because some-  
25. body is liable to walk off...but it's beautifully...engraved with  
26. the State Seal, et cetera, and words just don't give me enough  
27. to express my appreciation to each and every one of your...for  
28. your kind thoughts. Thank you.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Ozinga, you're welcome. Senator Ozinga.

31. SENATOR OZINGA:

32. Now, Mr. President, I would rise on a matter of extreme  
33. importance to the Republican side of the aisle. As Caucus

1. Chairman for the Republican side of the aisle, I called a  
2. caucus meeting of all of the Republican Senators on September 1st,  
3. 1981 at one o'clock at the Sangamo Club for the selection of a  
4. Republican leader, and at that time, after having been duly  
5. organized and assembled, the Republican Senate members has  
6. selected as their Minority Leader and I don't like that word,  
7. Minority, but as their leader to serve for the remainder of  
8. the 82nd General Assembly, and I seek leave to Journalize the  
9. fact a letter to that effect that was entered whereby we  
10. informed the membership, leadership, et cetera and I would  
11. move that the same be Journalized. A Republican caucus was  
12. held and conducted by the Dean of the Senate, Senator Frank M.  
13. Ozinga, Caucus Chairman, on September 1st, 1981 to select  
14. the Senate Minority Leader of the Illinois State Senate.  
15. Please be informed that by a unanimous vote the Republican  
16. Senators elected Senator James "Pate" Philip, as the  
17. Republican Minority Leader of the Illinois State Senate to  
18. fill the vacancy created by the death of the late Senator  
19. David C. Shapiro. With that, Mr. President, it is my  
20. privilege to ask for the unanimous consent of the Body and  
21. on behalf of the Republican members of the Senate, that Senator  
22. James "Pate" Philip of Elmhurst be declared Minority Leader of  
23. the Senate for the 82nd General Assembly.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Is there leave to Journalize the letter from the Caucus  
26. Chairman? Leave is granted. So ordered. Do we have unanimous  
27. consent to formally recognize Senator James "Pate" Philip as  
28. the Minority Leader for the balance of the 82nd General Assembly?  
29. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Congratulations, Senator  
30. Philip. Senator Philip.

31. SENATOR PHILIP:

32. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
33. Senate. I certainly want to thank my fellow Republican Senators

1. for choosing me as their leader. I'm looking forward to  
2. working with them and, hopefully, increasing our numbers  
3. from twenty-nine to thirty-one, thirty-two or thirty-three,  
4. or perhaps more. I also want to thank my wife and family who  
5. have to put up with politics and campaigning and telephone  
6. calls. It's always a strain on the family. You don't really  
7. know, till you're there at home and...and are exposed to it.  
8. But, at this time, I'd like to introduce my wife, Nancy, who's  
9. behind me in the gallery; my mother-in-law, Mrs. Britts; my  
10. brother, Art; my sister-in-law, Joan. If they would...please  
11. rise and be recognized...

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Please rise...

14. SENATOR PHILIP:

15. ...I would appreciate it. Also up there with my family,  
16. are some of my friends from DuPage County who have encouraged  
17. me, supported me, have not only knocked on doors, donated  
18. money and put up with some of my bad judgements, occasionally.  
19. But they are here...down here to wish me well and I wish that  
20. they would please stand. They're not all from DuPage County.  
21. I think I...I do have a guy from Kane County, an old friend,  
22. and somebody from McHenry County, Judge Lindberg is up there  
23. with his wife and we go way, way, way back. And if they would  
24. please rise and be recognized, I certainly would appreciate it.  
25. And, Mr. President, so far the most difficult task that I have  
26. is picking my leadership. Very honestly, we have a lot of  
27. talented people on our side. A lot of people deserve it, and  
28. very honestly, we don't have enough leaderships position. And  
29. I have been talking and working with people, and I've finally  
30. come to some conclusions and I wish I could put more people in  
31. leadership, quite frankly, but there just isn't room. So, at  
32. this point, I would like to announce my leadership. To take  
33. Doctor Shapiro's place, Senator Grotberg from Kane County. To

1. take Senator Walsh's place, from Cook County, Senator DeAngelis.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Philip asks leave that those leadership appoint-  
4. ments be Journalized and formally sent to the respective offices.  
5. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Congratulations to Senators  
6. Grotberg and DeAngelis. Senator Philip.

7. SENATOR PHILIP:

8. Yes, I might mention this, the rest of the leadership is  
9. staying exactly where they are. At this point also, Mr. President,  
10. if I'm in order, I would like to introduce the newest Senator  
11. to enter our side of the aisle replacing Doctor Shapiro, from  
12. the 37th District, Senator Schuneman, as you know, has served  
13. in the lower House. He has been chosen by his political leaders  
14. and he is here to take Doctor Shapiro's place. At this point,  
15. I would like to introduce him to the full Senate.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Schuneman, welcome. Senator Schuneman.

18. SENATOR SCHUNEMAN:

19. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. It's indeed  
20. a pleasure for me to become a member of this Body. I regret the  
21. circumstances that bring about my appointment here. Dave Shapiro  
22. was a...a good friend of mine, a long time political associate  
23. and someone who was loved and respected in my community and in  
24. my district. I'll do the very best I can to live up to the  
25. same high standards that...that he established here and I look  
26. forward to working with those of you who are members of this  
27. Body. Just very briefly, I would like to also introduce to you, my  
28. wife, Dorothy, who's in the gallery and I'd like her to stand  
29. and be recognized.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Welcome. (Machine cutoff) will yield. Senator Geo-Karis,  
32. for what purpose do you arise?

33. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

1. A point of personal privilege. I would...Mr. President  
2. and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I would like to  
3. introduce an old friend of mine of long years standing that  
4. bears a very distinguished name from your county, Evelyn  
5. Adamowski Nurocki, who's sitting up there in the gallery. I  
6. would like to have her welcomed by the Senate.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Will our guest please stand and be recognized. Welcome.  
9. At this time the Chair will yield to Senator Simms from  
10. Rockford for the purpose of an introduction of a distinguished  
11. guest. Senator Simms.

12. SENATOR SIMMS:

13. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
14. Senate. It's my privilege to introduce to the Senate today, Mr.  
15. Lance Dreyer of Rockford, Illinois, who two weeks ago, in Cairo,  
16. Egypt, was the winner of the Mr. Universe Contest. So, I'd like  
17. to present Mr. Universe.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. (Machine cutoff)

20. LANCE DREYER:

21. (Remarks by Mr. Universe, Lance Dreyer)

22. PRESIDENT:

23. I'd like to introduce my new bodyguard. If anybody wants  
24. to storm the Podium...get ready. The cameras are rolling, we've  
25. yet to hear from Senator Vadalabene. Senator Vadalabene.

26. SENATOR VADALABENE:

27. Senator Rock, as a point of personal privilege. Does that  
28. mean that that's an addition, or am I fired?

29. PRESIDENT:

30. No, Sir. Senator Vadalabene, you are not fired. That's  
31. just an addition to. Senator Philip.

32. SENATOR PHILIP:

33. Thank you, President Rock. I'd like to have the records

1. show that Senator Nimrod is in Korea receiving a...accommodation  
2. from the Korean Government and he won't be back until October 3rd.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. The record will so indicate. A Message from the Governor.

5. SECRETARY:

6. A Message from the Governor from John Washburn, Director  
7. of Legislative Affairs.

8. Mr. President - I am directed...the Governor directs  
9. me to lay before the Senate the following message:

10. To the Honorable members of the Senate, the 82nd General  
11. Assembly. I have nominated and appointed the following named  
12. persons to the offices enumerated below and respectfully ask  
13. concurrence in and confirmation of these appointments by your  
14. Honorable Body.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Committee on Executive Appointments. Resolutions.

17. SECRETARY:

18. Senate Resolution 301 offered by Senators Nega, Rock and  
19. all Senators.

20. Senate Resolution 302 offered by Senators Joyce, Nega and  
21. all Senators.

22. Senate Resolution 303 offered by Senators...Senator Fried-  
23. land and all Senators.

24. Senate Resolution 304 offered by Senator Berning.

25. Senate Resolution 305 offered by Senator Egan.

26. Senate Resolution 306 offered by Senator Egan.

27. Those are all congratulatory. And Senate Resolution 307 offered  
28. by Senator Demuzio and all Senators and it's a death resolution.

29. Mr. John Watson.

30. PRESIDENT:

31. Since we are scheduled, at least, not to return until the  
32. 14th of October, is there leave to consider these resolutions  
33. immediately for the purpose of their consideration and adoption?

1. Leave is granted. Senator Bruce moves the...the rules are  
2. suspended. Senator Bruce moves the adoption of Senate Resolutions  
3. 301, 302, 303, 304, 305, 306 and 307. All in favor signify by  
4. saying Aye. All opposed? The Ayes have it. The resolutions  
5. are adopted. All right. Resolutions. Resolutions.

6. SECRETARY:

7. Senate Joint Resolution No. 59 offered by Senator Bruce.  
8. (Secretary reads S.J.R. No. 59)

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Senator Bruce.

11. SENATOR BRUCE:

12. This is the Adjournment Resolution which will adjourn  
13. us today and bring us back on the fourteenth at noon, and I  
14. would move for the suspension of the rules and the immediate  
15. consideration and adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 59.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Bruce has moved to suspend the rules for the  
18. immediate consideration and adoption of the Adjournment  
19. Resolution. All in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed?  
20. The Ayes have it. The rules are suspended. Senator Bruce now  
21. moves the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 59. All in favor  
22. signify by saying Aye. All opposed? The Ayes have it. The  
23. resolution is adopted. Senator Grotberg, for what purpose do  
24. you arise?

25. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

26. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate.  
27. Everybody's been introduced but my guests for today and they  
28. didn't even come down here for politics, they came down to see  
29. how government works. To show you how disinterested they are,  
30. they sat on the Democrat side and feel very much at home over  
31. there, as more and more of my friends seem to be doing lately.  
32. May I present...may I present Kathleen and Gus Enzenbacher and  
33. Ernie and Jean Connors from St. Charles, Illinois, in the front  
row on the Democrat side.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Welcome to Springfield. We've one further congratulatory  
3. resolution. Resolutions, Mr. Secretary.

4. SECRETARY:

5. Senate Resolution 308 offered by Senator Simms and it's  
6. congratulatory.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Simms moves to suspend the rules for the purpose  
9. of the immediate consideration and adoption of Senate Resolution  
10. 308. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Simms now moves  
11. the adoption of Senate...Senate Resolution 308. All in favor  
12. signify by saying Aye. All opposed? The Ayes have it. The  
13. resolution is adopted. All right. Resolutions.

14. SECRETARY:

15. Senate Joint Resolution 60 offered by Senator Buzbee.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Executive. Senator Hall, for what purpose do you arise?

18. SENATOR HALL:

19. Point of personal privilege.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Yes, Sir, state your point.

22. SENATOR HALL:

23. In the President's Gallery, we're honored today to have  
24. Reverend Nicholson, who's pastor of True Light Baptist Church  
25. in the land of milk and honey, East St. Louis, Illinois, with  
26. two of his members. Would he please stand...the three of them,  
27. and be recognized by the Senate.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Will our guests please stand and be recognized. Welcome  
30. to Springfield. Senator Bruce, for what purpose do you arise?

31. SENATOR BRUCE:

32. To make a motion, Mr. President...

33. PRESIDENT:

That is in order, Senator Bruce.

1. SENATOR BRUCE:

2. ...In the past week, the Governor has presented us a  
3. hundred and nineteen Veto Messages and in the past, we have  
4. dispensed with the reading of those and just having Journalized,  
5. so I would now move that we dispense with the reading of the  
6. Governor's Veto Messages, that they be entered upon the Journal  
7. and a copy of each Message be placed upon the desk of each  
8. member.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. All right. You've heard the motion. Is there any  
11. discussion? If not, all in favor signify by saying Aye.  
12. All opposed? The Ayes have it. The motion carries. So  
13. ordered. The messages will be Journalized. Introduction of  
14. bills.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. If I can have your attention, there have been a hundred  
14. and nineteen Messages filed by the Governor, either vetoing or  
15. reducing or item vetoing or amendatorily vetoing. Any member  
16. wishing to file a motion, if...if they will file them with  
17. the Secretary or the Assistant Secretary prior to the thirteenth  
18. day of October, they will then appear on the Calendar on the  
19. fourteenth day of October. That's not to say you have to call  
20. it, but the motion will appear. So that everybody will know  
21. what's filed when we return on the fourteenth. Any business...  
22. any further business to come before the Senate? If not, Senator  
23. Bruce moves that, pursuant to the Adjournment Resolution, the  
24. Senate stand adjourned until October the fourteenth, at the  
25. hour of noon. The Senate stands adjourned.

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
