- of the Senate. House Bill 430 has some new language in it, that
- the Governor asked to be in there to clarify some errors in

      House Bill 438. We did talk about this, briefly, a couple
     of weeks ago, and there was a number of questions on the part
2.
      of many of us how this handled the matter of consumer credit.
3.
      For the purpose of this, and I think everybody in this Chamber
4.
      should understand, that we're talking about two different types
5.
      of loans transactions. And just for the sake of simplicity,
6.
      we will call one, consumer credit, and the other includes all
7.
      non-consumer items, like the bond market. The General Assembly
R.
      has always provided assurances to consumers that should they
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      want to prepay their loans, be it a revolving charge card,
10.
      be it prepayment of a house, car, boat, motorcycle, vacation
11.
      loan, that there would be no prepenalty...prepayment penalty
12.
      for that. In the other types of non-consumer loans, there has
13.
      always been prepayment penalty charges. When we lifted the
14.
      usury rates, in Illinois, through House Bill 438, we inadvertently
15.
      allowed language to read that not only would there be no prepayment
16.
      penalties on consumer loans, which is the way it should be,
17.
      but we inadvertently allowed for no prepayment penalty of the
18.
      non-consumer loans, such as the bond market. Let me say, loud and
19.
      clear, that the biggest problem any of us have had in this
20.
      matter, is whether or not we would still be providing security
21.
      for consumers. Senator Demuzio and I have spoken on this and
22.
      we are both in accord on what we are trying to accomplish. Like
23.
      Senator Demuzio, and I would presume, like fifty-seven other
24.
      Senators in this room, none of us wants to go back to our district...
25.
      and become known as the person who allowed for prepayment penalities
26.
      of consumer loans, and we are not about to do it now. This is
27.
      simply to clarify the language, taking that clause out of the
28.
      non-consumer type loans and I would be happy to try to answer
29.
      any questions.
30.
      PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

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SENATOR DEMUZIO:

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ı. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to ask the sponsor 2. a few guestions if I may. 3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS) 4. He indicates he will yield. SENATOR DEMUZIO: 5. Senator Thomas, in the old Statute, prior to the... House 6. Bill 438 becoming law, there...was there or was there not, a... 7. prepayment penalty provided for in the law on...on all consumer 8. 9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS) 10. Senator Thomas. 11. SENATOR THOMAS: 12. No, there were no...there were no specific...penalities 13. for prepayment, not in consumer loans. In fact, I might just 14. add, and I think some of you have seen the sheet, such as 15. revolving credit, installment loans, consumer finance, Finance 16. Act loans, consumer installment loans, retail charge agreements, 17. retail and motor vehicle, retail installment type loans, and 18. credit...under the Credit Union Act, in all of these areas, 19. the consumer has and still is, guaranteed no prepayment penalty. 20. SENATOR DEMUZIO: 21. Yes. Let me ask another question. With the enactment of 22. House Bill 438, is there now an explicit prohibition against 23. prepayment penalty for both mortgage as well as consumer loans, 24 in the law now? 25. SENATOR THOMAS: 26. Would you repeat that again, Senator. 27. 28. House Bill 438, the law, as it is today, is there, in fact, 29. a prepayment penalty on all consumer and non-consumer definition 30. that you used a few minutes ago, "commercial business" or et cetera. 31. Is there, in fact, a explicit prepayment prohibition in the 32.

law as it stands today and...with the enactment of House Bill 438?

           Well, I think that's the subject that is precisely in

       the Governor's...language. If I might, let me just point out

      to you, that we have raised the constitutional issue here as
19.
      to whether or not this bill ought to even be before us.
20.
      feel that the Governor has usurped his legislative power by
21.
       adding language to this bill that ought not to be there. He
22.
      has, in fact, changed the purpose and the original intent
23.
      of House Bill 430, and I think there will be an immediate
24.
      constitutional challenge in regard to this legislation, if we,
25.
       in fact, concur. And I would ask the President of the Senate,
26.
       if I may, on a...matter of parliamentary inquiry, is it...is
27.
       this motion properly before us? I am told, reliably, that
28.
       this is not the identical language that the Governor had
29.
       submitted to the Index Division, and the motion, in...in my judgment
30.
       is therefore, incorrect...and...and out of order.
31.
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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

Well, Senator, if you'd point out the differences, we could

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1. make a judgment on it. SENATOR DEMUZIO: 2. It's my understanding, that in filing with the Index 3. Division, that there are certain paragraphs and certain 4. language that the Governor did not repeat, that is repeated 5. in Senator Thomas' motion. Specifically, the Sections on 6. page 4 of the motion lines 2, 2-A and 2-B, are those that 7. have...were not in the Governor's Message when he filed them 8. with the Index Division. 9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS) 10. Senator Rock. 11. SENATOR ROCK: 12. Thank you, Mr. President. Just to...to add to the discussion, 13. if it's possible. In the past, the question of whether or not 14. it was possible for the house of origin to, in effect, amend 15. the Amendatory Veto, has, in fact, been discussed, was, in fact, 16. done on at least two occasions that I'm aware of. The second 17. House has no other option but to react to what the first House 18. has done. So, if, in fact, the House of Representatives saw 19. fit by constitutional majority vote to amend, in some respect, 20. the specific recommendations as filed by the Governor, we can 21. do nothing more or less than react to what the House did and 22. suggest that we do the same thing. We have done that in the 23. past, in fact. 24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS) 25. Senator Demuzio, the Chair, after conferringwill rule that 26. the motion is in order, and reading from the 1970 Constitution, 27. states that such a bill shall be presented again to the Governor 28. and if he certifies that such acceptance conforms to his specific 29. recommendations, the bill shall become law. So, he does have 30. the final act on certification. Senator Demuzio. 31.

Well, let me just suggest to you that since you have made

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

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your ruling, that this bill is riddled with so many inaccuracies ı. and so many constitutional questions, that I doubt very seriously, 2. that even if this bill is, in fact, concurred with, it will 3. be even operational for the operation of government, for the 4. bond houses or for any of the financial institutions in the 5. State of Illinois. Let me just summarize and say, for all practical 6. purposes, that what we are doing...doing here with all...all of 7. the legal mumbo jumbo is that simply, in the prior Statute, 8. there was no...prohibition against prepayment penalities with 9. the exception of mortgage rates when the rate exceeded eight 10. percent. House Bill 438 in...in addition to taking the interest 11. rate ceilings completely off, where they made an error, apparently. 12. in drafting that was not caught, they have...effectively eliminated 13. prepayment penalities on all consumer loans or commercial loans 14. or business loans and mortgage loans. In effect, what the Governor 15. has...suggested to us in House Bill 430, if we accept his language 16. for change, is to put it back into the same posture, the law, 17. that it was prior to 438 becoming law, and therefore, we are 18. reimposing..reimposing, by virture of remaining silent on the 19. issue, a prepayment penalty clause and that's the subject of 20. the debate. That's the subject of the interpretation. There's 21. interpretations on both sides and that's precisely what it 22. amounts to. We can vote this thing up or down, go back home and 23. explain it anyway you want to, but that's precisely the way that 24. we see it. And I would urge that we not concur with the Governor's 25. amendatory language, as a matter of fact, there's a bill in the 26. House that was amended, just last night...Senate Bill 143, that 27. the bond counsel and the Governor's office had suggested they 28. make an amendment to. They took it off the 2nd reading in the 29. Spring Calendar in the House last night and amended it, and now, 30. it happens to be all messed up, and now, they got to bring it 31. back this afternoon and put new language into it. And this whole 32.

thing has been conducted surreptitiously, this is really a fraud

on the...the voters and the taxpayers of this State. This ı. Amendatory Veto ought to be clearly rejected, we'll deal 2. with a clean bill in the next Session of the General Assembly ٦. to take care of the bond problem, which is a legitimate problem. Thank you. 5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS) 6. Senator Bloom. 7. SENATOR BLOOM: 8. Thank you, Mr. President. I enjoy listening to Senator 9. Demuzio use the editorial, we. Basically, it does reimpose 10. prepayment penalties in the area of bonds and commercial loans 11. and that is it. In terms of mortgages...there is no prepayment 12. penalty. This thing passed overwhelmingly, most of the opposition 13. remarks were directed against another bill. And I see no reason 14. why we shouldn't accept the language and get on with our business. 15. Thank you. I'd urge an ... Aye vote. 16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS) 17. Senator Geo-Karis. 18. SENATOR GEO-KARIS: 19. Mr. President and Ladies...Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. 20. I...I hate...to disagree with my colleague on the other side, 21. because I'm quoting right now from the language that was added 22. to House Bill 430 in the amendment...in the Amendatory Veto. 23. says, "whenever the rate of interest exceeds eight percent per 24. annum in any written contract, agreement or bond...providing 25. for the installment purchases of residential...real estate or 26. any...on any other loans secured by a mortgage on residential 27. real estate, it shall be unlawful to provide for a prepayment 28. penalty or other charge for prepayment." So, this bill is good, 29. it will help...the consumers and I speak in favor of it. 30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS) 31. Senator Netsch.

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SENATOR NETSCH:

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Thank you, Mr. President. It seems to me that the appropriate
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      vote is a No vote, for, if not substantive reasons, at least,
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      procedural reasons, in this case. I cannot tell, at this stage,
3.
      what it does with respect to prepayment on consumer loans. Perhaps
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5.
      the sponsor of the motion is correct, that it does not affect them,
      perhaps Senator Demuzio is correct. What I do find extremely
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      offensive, if not to say constitutionally impermissible, is that
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      a bill, which really did not have to do with this subject matter, is
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      being used to correct a defect in another bill, which had to do
 9.
      with a hotly controversial subject matter, and it was done, obviously,
10.
      because the Governor and those who wanted the...the content of
11.
      438 did not want that bill to be returned to the General Assembly,
12.
      in the event that it might not get through both Houses again.
13.
      And so, the...this bill, 430, is being used to correct the defect
14.
      there. That not only is, it seems to me an abuse of the legislative
15.
      process, but I would strongly suggest that it is probably an
16.
      abuse of the Amendatory Veto. As the one who,...and, you know, don't
17.
      start throwing things at me, colleagues, who was most responsible for the fact
18.
      that there is an Amendatory Veto in the 1970 Constitution.
19.
      not unconscious of its history and purpose. It is not an...I'd
20.
      ask...I'm on...Senator Demuzio, I'm on your side, would you please
21.
      not interrupt me...If...but whatever that area of uncertainty
22.
      about how the Amendatory Veto can be used, on the one end, it
23.
      cannot be used totally to rewrite a bill, on the other end, it
24.

Act, which all of you agreed was something that we needed in 18. the State of Illinois to finally put all of our post conviction 19. proceedings under one Statute, so any lawyer practicing in this 20. area knew where they were at and what the procedures would be. 21. The Governor has vetoed the bill, and I think was certainly 22. without merit. I'd like to talk to his Veto Message. He states 23. that if this bill becomes law, it permits convictions to be set 24. aside on grounds which the U.S. Supreme Court found too insubstan-25. tial for post conviction relief. I would say to you, as we said 26. when we debated the bill, that there is no new...substantive law 27. in this bill...or no substantive rights, new ones. He also says 28. it changes the standard for appointment of counsel, at govern-29. ment expense, from indigency to unable to obtain adequate 30. representation. I would say to you, that's a pretty picky reason. 31. to veto a bill. It says it fails to impose a meaningful Statute of

limitations to assure finality of judgement. There's none now,

32.

1. so, I don't see where that makes any difference. He says it diminishes the high standard that must be met to obtain relief 2. on the basis of newly discovered evidenct, and I say to you 3. that that is not true. And the last reason he gave was that 4. it purports to regulate, by law, a number of procedural areas 5. exclusively within the province of the Supreme Court rule, 6. and that's the old-age argument that we have here, is this 7. legislative prerogative or is it judicial. And I say it is 8. certainly legislative. This bill will once and for all end the 9. confusion of multiplicity of post conviction remedies. 10. habeas corpus is included in the proceeding. As I stated before, 11. there are no substantive rights, that are provided for in this 12. bill, it is procedural act only. Counsel would be appointed 13. in cases where counsel is required to be appointed under the law. 14. And above all, this bill provides for the dismissal of frivolous 15. partitions. This is good law.
