SENATOR VADALABENE:

So, please join together in this program of reverence and respect for both the living and the dead. Jones, assistant director of the Illinois Department of Veteran Affairs; the Honorable David V. Hardwick, director of the Illinois Department of Veteran Affairs; Colonel Carl O. Johnson, Jr., Public Affairs Officer to the Adjutant General; Command Sergeant Major Gordon Schrishahn; Captain John F. Ferguson, Naval Liaison to the Adjutant General, USNR; Richard M. Eslinger, the Assistant Adjutant General for Air;

Brigadier General William E. Doris, ILARNG, the Assistant Adjutant General for the Army and Lieutenant General Robert F. Coverdale, U. S. Air Force, retired, director of the Division of Aeronautics, Illinois Department of Transportation. Let's give them a good hand. Also with us today is the 114th Regiment, Illinois Volunteer Infantry, Headquarters Company of Springfield, Illinois, Captain John Satterlee, Sergeant William Barrows, Corporal Charles Carnoliff, Private Joseph Kissel, Private Michael Rhodes and Private Shawn McClain. Let's give them a good round of applause. And in the President's Gallery, along with Commander Henry White of the Combined Veterans' Association. Let's give them a good hand. We will now open our program with the Presentation of the Colors by the Color Guard of the 114th Regiment, the Illinois Volunteer Infantry, Headquarters Company, Springfield, Illinois, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to our Flag and the opening prayer. So, Senators and guests, please stand. Color Guard, advance and present the Colors. Hand salute. Ready, two. Senator Karpel will lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. Senator Karpel.

The Color Guard will post the Colors. Senators and guests, please be seated. General John A. Logan, a native of Murphysboro, Jackson County, Illinois, was a Major General in the Civil War. He was three times Commander in Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic as well as a United States Senator

and member of the House Representatives from Illinois. General Logan is credited with establishing this national holiday, originally called Decoration Day, but later changed to Memorial Day. Senator Emil Jones, Jr. will read General Logan's Order for the First Memorial Day. Senator Jones.

SENATOR JONES:

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Senator Joyce Holmberg will now read the poem "A Star in God's...Window," written by Reverend Eugene M. Denner, Almoner National of the Forty and Eight. Senator Holmberg.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

On Memorial Day, let's pay grateful tribute to those who lived and died so courageously for their country, and let...let us not forget Captain Fernando Rebus Dominci and Captain Paul Lawrence when their F1-11 bomber exploded off the coast of Libya last month because these two Air Force Captains join more than six hundred and fifty thousand other American men and women who have died in combat since 1776. It is truly a time to remember.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Bugler Steve Hall and drummer Joseph Richiusa of the 114th Regiment, Illinois Volunteer Infantry will play the...the "Battle Hymn of the Republic."

STEVE HALL AND JOSEPH RICHIUSA:

SENATOR VADALABENE:

William J. Aker is a ninety-four-year-old, self-taught poet. He was born and raised on a farm in Waterloo. Aker saw service in the Army, first in the Quartermaster Corps in Texas in the Border Patrol under General John J. Pershing in 1916 and 1917 and later in World War I as a...Warrant Officer in France. When Aker was a patient at the Geriatric Research Educational Clinical Center at the Hadsforth Veterans' Administration Medical Center in...Los Angeles, California, the nurses discovered his talent after he dedicated a poem to them called "A Salute to the Nurses." He was asked by the VA to write a commemorative poem for veterans everywhere on Memorial Day. Aker said he had just the thing and after flipping through a well-thumbed black scrapbook of his poetry, he...retrieved and updated a poem he had written in

1941 called "Memorial Day." Senator Smith, will you read the "Memorial Day" poem?

SENATOR SMITH:

SENATOR PHILIP:

Well, thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I'd like the record to indicate that Senator Keats is not here today because of the flu.

PRESIDENT:

The record will so indicate. If you'll turn to page...pages 16 and 17 on your Calendar, on the Order of Secretary's Desk Resolutions, we will handle the resolutions that the members wish to handle and then we will move immediately to Supplemental Calendar No. 1 for an emergency appropriation and that will conclude our business effectively. On the Order of Secretary's Desk Resolutions, Mr. Secretary, Senate Resolution 814.

SECRETARY:

Senate Resolution 814 and there are no amendments.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Holmberg.

SENATOR HOLMBERG:

Senate Resolution 814, by this, the Senate requests the Wisconsin Legislature to increase the drinking age to the age of twenty-one in order to reduce the frequency of DUI's and accidents involving Illinois youths who cross the border to drink. This resolution's adoption today is needed to bring additional pressure to bear upon the Wisconsin Legislature to change the state's drinking age from nineteen to twenty-one. It is in the second week of a Special Session. It's been called back into...Special Session just to deal with this problem. The Governor of Wisconsin needs all the help he can get as he has faced defeat last week by trying to get a change in the law, and we would like to give him the support

that he needs at this very critical time to pass that particular bill this week. Although the Statewide number of alcohol related deaths in Illinois has decreased since 1980 when we restored the drinking age to twenty-one, in the six counties bordering...Wisconsin, they have increased by twenty-five percent. I think almost every Senator in this Legislature who...has a district bordering Wisconsin is on this particular resolution. We are also, by doing this and helping Wisconsin to change its law, helping the Illinois State Police to get back to doing the job they were hired to do. They've done a terrific job with DIU's, but it takes a tremendous work force to keep up the border patrol. The time is now. The lives of our young people are at stake. By passing this resolution today, the Illinois Senate will be sending our fellow legislators in Wisconsin the important message that we believe in life.

PRESIDENT:

Any discussion? Is there any discussion? If not, the question is, shall Senate Resolution 814 be adopted. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 50 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Resolution 814 having received the required constitutional majority is declared passed. On the Order of Secretary's Desk Resolutions, Mr. Secretary, is House Joint Resolution 175.

SECRETARY:

House Joint Resolution 175 and there are no amendments.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Newhouse.

SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

Thank you, Mr. President and Senators. House Joint Resolution 175 urges the governing board of Northeastern Illinois University to name the Center for Inner City Studies after

the late Ron Williams. As chairman of Higher Education, I had the opportunity to know Ron Williams very, very well. There are three reasons why I would suggest this amendment ought to pass. One is that he made a major institution out of Northeastern Illinois University. The second is that this institution, the Inner...Center for Inner City Studies under his leadership blossomed on the south side of the City of Chicago. But the third reason is the most important, and that is this, Ron Williams added a...added a...Ron Williams added a spiritual dimension to that institution that's unforgettable. Those of you who knew Ron know that he succumbed from a cancer of the brain. You also know, many of you, that almost until the day Ron died, with brief intermissions, he was at his post at Northeastern Illinois University providing the same kind of leadership that he provided over the years. It is this kind of spiritual dimension that adds to the university, and under those circumstances, I think it would be most appropriate to name this center after Ron Williams. I would ask for your favorable support.

PRESIDENT:

All right, Senator Newhouse has moved the adoption of House Joint Resolution 175. Discussion? Senator Carroll.

SENATOR CARROLL:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. With leave of the Body, I would like to be...I would request that I be added as a hyphenated cosponsor of this resolution, and let me say that having worked with Ron all the years that he was the president of this institution, the main campus being in my district, this was really and outstanding and quality guy. What he did throughout his life was something...is something that will always make that institution proud and, most importantly, the courage he...he displayed to all once he developed this brain cancer and his abilities to lead that body, both in terms of faculty and

student, in times of great pain to himself were really an inspiration that kept that institution going. As Senator Newhouse indicated, he was at his desk on a regular basis at a time when I'm sure it was not easy for him to be there, and I had many meetings with him during that time at his office, was with him just few days before he succumbed to this terrible illness and think it would be most fitting that we take that which he was most proud of, and that was the Center for Inner City Study, and have it named in his memory. I think that would do a tribute to the center, a tribute to the university and a tribute to the State of Illinois, and would urge support for the joint resolution.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Carroll seeks leave of the Body to be added as a hyphenated cosponsor of House Joint Resolution 175. Without objection, leave is granted. It's so ordered. Question now is the adoption of House Joint Resolution 175. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 50 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. House Joint Resolution 175 is adopted. All right, ladies and gentlemen, the final order of business will be the Supplemental Calendar. I ask you to turn your attention to Supplemental Calendar No. 1. Copies of the Conference Committee report have been distributed, the Secretary informs the Chair. With leave of the Body, we'll move to the Order of Senate Calendar Supplemental No. 1, Conference Committee report on Senate Bill 174, Mr. Secretary.

SECRETARY:

Conference Committee report on Senate Bill 174 with House Amendment No. 1.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. The effects of Conference Committee report is that it deletes the title and everything after the enacting clause and then provides for the following FY '86 supplementaries. In order to recoup some Federal funds we have until June the 2nd. If we do not get this bill out here today that we will pass the deadline and we would lose a total of fifty-four million three hundred and sixty thousand dollars in the Road Fund. Along with that, that there's been a language change in several of the items that have been suggested by the Governor. As you see on each of your desks you have...in Sections 1 through 12, and I would ask for your most favorable support for this resolution.

PRESIDENT:

All right, Senator...

SENATOR HALL:

I mean, Conference Committee.

PRESIDENT:

...Senator Hall has moved the adoption of the Conference Committee report on Senate Bill 174. Discussion? If not, the question is, shall the Senate adopt the Conference Committee report on Senate Bill 174. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 50 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. The Senate does adopt the Conference Committee report on Senate Bill 174 and the bill having received the required constitutional majority is declared passed. Senator Carroll, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR CARROLL:

Thank you, Mr. President. For purposes of a motion to move three bills amongst the Appropriations' Committee, if I

could. That House Bill 2988 having been assigned to Appropriations I be rereferred to Appropriations II, and that House Bill 3001 and 3002 that had been assigned to Appropriations II...that the Appropriations II Committee be discharged and they be rereferred to Appropriations I.

PRESIDENT:

All right, Senator Carroll has moved that House Bill 2988 be rereferred from Appropriations I to Appropriation II. All in favor of the motion indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries. It's so ordered. Senator Carroll further moves that House Bills 3001 and 3002 be rereferred from Appropriations II to Appropriations I. All in favor of the motion indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries. It's so ordered. Senator Watson, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR WATSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. A point of personal privilege.

PRESIDENT:

State your point, sir.

SENATOR WATSON:

I'd like to make an announcement, if I might. I guess I'm athletic director this year. Next week we will start practice for the Annual House-Senate Softball Game and the following week we're going to have a game with the lobbyists and so we want to get ourselves prepared for that, and any...so bring your equipment next week and get prepared for the lobbyists on the 12th of...of June. And, also, next Wednesday evening we have our annual tennis tournament provided for by Bob Walters and the Southwestern Illinois Industrial Association and those interested in playing in the annual tennis tournament next Wednesday night need to see myself or Art Berman. Thank you.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Berman has indicated he's ready. Senator

Schuneman, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR SCHUNEMAN:

On a point of personal privilege, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT:

State...state your point, sir.

SENATOR SCHUNEMAN:

Last Saturday in...in DeKalb at Northern Illinois University a...a dedication ceremony was held at which time the College of Law Library at Northern Illinois University was dedicated to the memory of our late Senator, David Shapiro. Several members of the Senate were in attendance, and for those of you who were not aware that this was going to happen, I wanted you to become aware of it and to tell you that the...law library at that school is...is a fine library. It is, I think, a very fitting tribute to our former colleague and friend, Dave Shapiro, and I think that he would have been very proud and pleased at this action by the board at Northern and the Governor who took part in the ceremony.

PRESIDENT:

Thank you. Senator Poshard, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR POSHARD:

Thank you, Mr. President. I would like Senators O'Daniel, Dunn, Demuzio, Rupp and Luft be included as hyphenated cosponsors on House Bill 3096.

PRESIDENT:

Gentleman seeks leave to add the aforementioned as cosponsors of House Bill 3096. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Vadalabene, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I would like to have leave to be shown as a hyphenated sponsor of House Bill 3480.

PRESIDENT:

3480. The gentleman seeks leave to be added as the hyphenated cosponsor of House Bill 3480. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Weaver, for what purpose do you arise, sir?

SENATOR WEAVER:

Thank you. Mr. President. I'd just like to bring to the Senate's attention that on Monday of this week our esteemed Minority Leader had another birthday. If he were on the Floor, I'm sure we could give him a good hand.

PRESIDENT:

We can give him a hand anyway. Happy Birthday, Senator Philip. Senator Marovitz, for what purpose do you seek recognition?

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Ask leave to be added as a hyphenated sponsor to House Bill 2917.

PRESIDENT:

2917? 2-9-1-7, the gentleman seeks leave to be added as the hyphenated cosponsor. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Demuzio, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

Yes, on House Bill 3036 it should read Demuzio-Jerome Joyce. With leave of the Body, I'd like to make that change.

PRESIDENT:

3036, show Senator Demuzio-Senator Joyce as the sponsors. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Fawell, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR FAWELL:

Would you please put Senator Fawell on as a hyphenated cosponsor with me on...on Senate Bill 3513 at his request?

PRESIDENT:

Hold it now, that...that's a little difficult. You want Senator Vadalabene? Where is he? No...whom do you wish to be a cosponsor?

SENATOR FAWELL:

I'm adding Senator Fawell on...Senator Philip on. Been a long weekend. Senator Philip on as a hyphenated cosponsor with me on House Bill 3513.

PRESIDENT:

3513, the lady seeks leave to add Senator Philip and maybe Senator Vadalabene, but you got to talk to him...hold it, Sam, don't...don't... you know...as a hyphenated cosponsor...without objection, leave is granted. Senator Geo-Karis, for what purpose do arise?

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Well, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I would like to be added as a cosponsor to House Bill 2917, if I may.

PRESIDENT:

2917, the lady seeks leave to be added as a cosponsor. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Resolutions, Mr. Secretary.

SECRETARY:

...975, a congratulatory resolution by Senator Dudycz and all Senators.

976, a congratulatory resolution by Senator Topinka.

And 977, a death resolution by Senator Marovitz.

PRESIDENT:

Consent Calendar.

SECRETARY:

978, by Senators Jerome Joyce and Senator Donahue.

PRESIDENT:

Executive. All right, Mr. Secretary, have any objections been filed to the Resolutions Consent Calendar?

SECRETARY:

No objections have been filed, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT:

All right, Senator Vadalabene then would move the adop-

tion of the Resolutions Consent Calendar. That is Senate Resolution 962, 63, 64, 65, 66, 967, 68, 69, 70, 971, House Joint Resolution 204 and 205, and Senate Resolutions 972, 73, 75 76 and 977. All in favor of the adoption of the Resolutions Consent Calendar indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The resolutions are adopted. Further business to come before the Senate? Any announcements? Senator Watson.

SENATOR WATSON:

Just one other, Mr. President. The suggestion has been made that we try to schedule the campfire girls for our softball game next week and so we're going to be working on that very closely. Okay?

PRESIDENT:

Senator DeAngelis has got his jogging shoes on, I see he...he's ready or will be ready. Senator DeAngelis.

SENATOR DeANGELIS:

Thank you, Mr. President. This week we also...we also observed the birthday of another one of our colleagues who has taken his birthday in such a distressful way that he...he is hiding out because he doesn't want us to acknowledge it. In addition to that, I understand that he is undergoing some cosmetic surgery over the weekend. Senator Pate Philip, probably the youngest looking forty-year-old guy I ever saw.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Philip celebrates a birthday almost as often as Harry Cary, every week. Any further business? Further announcements to come before the Senate? If not, Senator Vadalabene moves that pursuant to the adjournment resolution the Senate stand adjourned until Tuesday, June 3rd, at the hour of noon. Next Tuesday at noon. Rules Committee will meet at eleven. Senate stands adjourned. Have a good weekend, everybody.
