PRESIDENT:

The Senate will please come to order. Will the members be at their desks and will our guests in the gallery please rise. Prayer this afternoon by the Reverend James S. Barge, Westminister Presbyterian Church, Springfield, Illinois. Reverend.

REVEREND BARGE:

(Prayer given by Reverend Barge)

PRESIDENT:

Thank you, Reverend. Reading of the Journal.

SECRETARY:

Wednesday, May the...21st, 1986.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I move that the Journal just read by the Secretary be approved unless some Senator has additions or corrections to offer.

PRESIDENT:

You've heard the motion as placed by Senator Vadalabene. Is there any discussion? If not, all in favor indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries and it's so ordered. Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALARENE:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I move that reading and approval of the Journals of Thursday, May 22nd; Friday, May 23rd; Wednesday, May 28th; Tuesday, June 3rd and Wednesday, June 4th, in the year of 1986, be postponed pending arrival of the printed Journals.

PRESIDENT:

You've heard the motion as placed by Senator Vadalabene. Is there any discussion? If not, all in favor indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion car-

ries and it's so ordered. Messages from the House.

SECRETARY:

A Message from the House by Mr. O'Brien, Clerk.

PRESIDENT:

SECRETARY:

Senator Netsch, chairman of Revenue Committee, reports out the following House bills:

PRESIDENT:

Senator Demuzio, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

Yes...thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I would move to suspend the...the...appropriate rules so that the bills that are being read into the record today ought to...can be heard in the respective committees. So I would move that the posting requirement be...be waived for those bills to...in order to...for them to be heard.

PRESIDENT:

All right. Senator Demuzio has moved that the appropriate rules...with respect to the posting requirement be waived so that the bills that were read in can be heard in committee this week. Any discussion? All right, without objection, leave is granted. It's so ordered. Senator Joyce, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR JEREMIAH JOYCE:

Thank you, Mr. President. I ask leave of the Body to be removed as one of the sponsors on House Bill 3032.

PRESIDENT:

All right. The gentleman seeks leave to remove his name from...as the sponsor of House Bill 3032. Without objection, leave is granted. If I can have your attention, UPI would...has asked leave to take some photographs. Without

objection, leave is granted. We have...gentlemen and ladies, if I can have your attention for only a moment, we won't be in very long because the committee schedule is pretty heavy this afternoon, but we do have with us some very special guests who have been declared winners in the State of Illinois Nutrition Poster Contest and I would ask Senators Lemke and Ralph Dunn and John Friedland to...Senator Lemke, you...wish to proceed? If we can have your attention, these young people you're about to meet are...are three of seventy-nine hundred youngsters from across the State who participated in a poster contest with respect to nutrition that was offered by the Department of Public Health and I will yield to Senator Lemke for the appropriate introduction.

SENATOR LEMKE:

I think that...you know, to start this ceremony, it'd be proper to start with the youngest of the group and I think Senator Friedland represents that area, would you like to present your...

SENATOR FRIEDLAND:

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I'm proud to introduce to you my constituent, Dana Simmick, of Lake in the Hills in the 33rd District, who won top honors in the category...Kindergarten through second grade. She's a first grader in the Lake in the Hills Elementary School and where she entered a contest. She won a special plaque, a...a Schwinn bicycle and a T-shirt, and the title of her work was "Always Eat a Balanced Meal and You'll See How Good You'll Feel" that won top honors and...thank you, very much.

SENATOR LEMKE:

I think the next category is between the third and fifth grade and that is from my district and I'd like to present to you, Jenny Lucas from Palos Hills, she's here with her father, Adrian and mother...mother, Rosanne and her two brothers, Christopher and Matt and her school teacher, Sue

Kinsulic. So...she won first place and she did a great job and one of the eight thousand participants. Would you like to say hello, Jenny?

JENNY LUCAS:

Hello, everyone.

SENATOR LENKE:

The next constituent is from Senator Ralph Dunn's area and I'll have Ralph present that student.

SENATOR DUNN:

Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I'd like to present to present to you...a young man from Columbia, Illinois from the 58th District, Daren Otten, O-t-t-e-n, he and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Otten, are here from Columbia. Daren was a sixth grade winner of a poster contest of the national...the Statewide poster contest and won a bicycle and T-shirt and all the accolades that go with it...Daren, say hi.

DAREN OTTEN:

Hello.

SENATOR DUNN:

Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT:

Senator D'Arco, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR D'ARCO:

Thank you, Mr. President. I request permission to...be removed as principal sponsor of House Bill 3044 and that Senator Lechowicz be designated the principal sponsor of that bill.

PRESIDENT:

All right. The gentleman seeks leave to remove himself as the chief sponsor of House Bill 3044 and be replaced by Senator Lechowicz. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Macdonald, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR MACDONALD:

It has been cleared with the sponsors and I would like to be added as a hyphenated cosponsor of House Bill 3520.

PRESIDENT:

3520, the lady seeks leave to be added as the cosponsor. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Mahar, for what purpose do you arise, sir?

SENATOR MAHAR:

Mr. President, a point of personal privilege.

PRESIDENT:

State your point, sir.

SENATOR MAHAR:

I have some constituents from my district here today from Orland Township, they're representing the Orland Township Youth Commission. They're here for tonight's Governor's Home Town Awards and they're looking forward to a first place award, and I would ask that they be recognized by the Senate and they're seated in the gallery directly behind me.

PRESIDENT:

Will our guests in the gallery please rise and be recognized. Welcome to Springfield. Senator DeAngelis, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR DeANGELIS:

Thank you, Mr. President. Like to...like to have leave of the Body to be shown as a hyphenated sponsor on House Bill 3-3-2-8, 3328.

PRESIDENT:

The gentleman seeks leave to be shown as the hyphenated sponsor on House Bill 3328. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Schaffer, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

Mr. President, two purposes; one to be listed as the lead sponsor on House Bill 2733 and to be listed as a hyphenated cosponsor on House Bill 1332.

PRESIDENT:

All right. The gentleman seeks leave to be shown as the chief sponsor...lead sponsor on House Bill 2733 and a hyphenated cosponsor on House Bill 1332. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Karpiel, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR KARPIEL:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to be added as a cosponsor on House Bill 3520, I've checked with the sponsor.

PRESIDENT:

All right. The lady seeks leave to be added as a cosponsor on House Bill 3520. Without objection, leave is granted. (Machine cutoff)...Lechowicz, for what purpose do you arise, sir?

SENATOR LECHOWICZ:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I'd like to have leave of the Body to have Senator Sam Vadalabene listed as the principal sponsor on House Bill 5-2-3...

PRESIDENT:

All right. The gentleman...

SENATOR LECHOWICZ:

...523.

PRESIDENT:

...the gentleman seeks leave to have Senator Vadalabene shown as the principal sponsor on House Bill 523. Without objection, leave is granted. All right, resolutions, Mr. Secretary.

SECRETARY:

Senate Joint Resolution 169 offered by Senators Kelly and DeAngelis, it's congratulatory.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Kelly, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR KELLY:

Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I

would like to make a motion to suspend the appropriate rules for the immediate consideration of Senate Joint Resolution 169 which Senator DeAngelis and I are jointly sponsoring. It's a congratulatory resolution for a teacher who has served thirty-seven years and...retiring teacher in Lansing School District in our district, and we'd like to have it moved to the House as expeditiously as possible.

PRESIDENT:

All right. The gentleman has...seeks leave to suspend the rules for the purpose of the immediate consideration and adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 169. All in favor of the motion to suspend indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The rules are suspended. Senators Kelly and DeAngelis now move the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 169. All in favor of the resolution indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The resolution is adopted. Resolutions, Mr. Secretary.

SECRETARY:

Senate Resolution 1011, by Senator Lemke, it's congratulatory.

1012, by Senator Geo-Karis, congratulatory.

1013, by Senator Keats, it's congratulatory.

1014 and 15, by Senator Mahar, they are congratulatory.

And Senate Resolutions 1016...1017, 1018, 1019, 1020, 1021, 1022, 1023, 1024, 1025, 1026, 1027, 1028, 1029, 1030, 1031, 1032, 1033, 1035, all by Senator Jones and they are congratulatory.

1034 was the last one in that group.

1035, by Senator Smith is congratulatory.

1036, by Senator Smith is congratulatory.

PRESIDENT:

Consent Calendar. If I can your attention, a gentleman from the Chicago Tribune...or the Chicago Tribune staff photographer wishes to take photographs also. Without objec-

tion, leave is granted. Resolutions, Mr. Secretary.

SECRETARY:

Senate Resolution 1037, by Senator Sangmeister.

PRESIDENT:

Executive.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right. Message from the House.

SECRETARY:

A Message from the House by Mr. O'Brien, Clerk.

Mr. President - I'm directed to inform the Senate the House of Representatives concurred with the Senate in the adoption of the following joint resolutions to-wit:

Senate Joint Resolution 168, together with the following amendment, House Amendment No. 1.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Can we have some order, please. Can we have some order, please. Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. As I'm sure everyone is aware, the House adjourned...instead of till Tuesday they adjourned until Thursday of this week. So Amendment No. 1 merely changed the adjournment resolution and I would move that the Senate concur with House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Joint Resolution 168.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, discussion? If not, Senator Rock has moved that the Senate concur with Amendment No. 1 to Senate Joint Resolution 168. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Amendment No. 1, the Senate does concur. All right, Senator Luft, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR LUFT:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'd ask leave to add Senator

O'Daniel as a hyphenated sponsor to two bills. Those bills being House Bill 2819 and 2873.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

2873, was the last one?

SENATOR LUFT:

That's right.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right. Senator Luft has moved that Senator O'Daniel join him as a hyphenated cosponsor of Senate...of House Bills 2819 and 2873. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. So ordered. All right, leave of the Body, we'll go to House bills 1st reading...House bills 1st reading, Mr. Secretary.

SECRETARY:

House Bill 2685, Senator Philip is the Senate sponsor.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

House Bill 3522, Senator Geo-Karis.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

1st reading of the bills.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Rules. Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Thank you, Mr. President. I think the...the report read by the Secretary, I think, we, inadvertently missed House Bill 3175. With leave of the Body, we'll make the appropriate change. The committee schedule, as I'm sure everyone is painfully aware, is pretty heavy both this afternoon and tomorrow morning. So I would move at this time that the Senate stand adjourned until Wednesday. We will reconvene...because of the heavy committee schedule on Wednesday morning, we will reconvene tomorrow at the hour of one o'clock, one o'clock tomorrow.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

(Machine cutoff)...Carroll, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR CARROLL:

If I might, Mr. President, for purposes of an announcement. As to the Appropriations I Committee, inasmuch as the hour is now two-fifteen, if everybody could please be there in attendance at two-thirty, we will start promptly at two-thirty, that gives you all a few minutes to get back to your office and get down there. So Appropriations I will convene at two-thirty sharp. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right...all right, committee reports.

SECRETARY:

House Bill 3175 was discharged from Rules and was assigned to the Committee on Higher Education.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right...Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Thank you, Mr. President. Also, I would like to inform the members and have the record reflect that, again, Senator Chew is not with us due to illness.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, further business to come before the Senate? This afternoon, Senator Carroll has made his announcement relevant to the Appropriations Committee. The Insurance Committee is also scheduled for two o'clock according to the Calendar. Senator Jones, you have an announcement?

SENATOR JONES:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President. The Insurance Committee will meet promptly at two-thirty or two-thirty-five, you get there, we have some very important bills. So we'll try to get you out of there early.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further business to come before the Senate? If not, Senator Rock moves that the Senate stand adjourned until Wednesday, June the 11th, at the hour of one o'clock. The
