SENATOR DUDYCYZ:

Yes, how will this affect the competition between the churches and the professional bingo operators?

Considering the small increase, I don't think it should affect them. It hardly goes to what it was originally and what it had been reduced to.

It redefines actually what a bee colony is to include the...the entire group of bees within that particular hive. The second thing it does, it allows a twenty-five dollar indemnification in case that colonies of bees have to be destroyed whether by...whether they are infested with disease or...or the African bees that we're beginning to see more of all the time. I will tell you that we do have a companion appropriation bill of twenty-five thousand dollars. I'm not sure that...that that appropriation bill will pass. If it does not pass, then this program would not be...there would not be the indemnity part of the program, but I'd be glad to answer any questions or move for its favorable passage.

SENATOR TOPINKA:

After all the amendments and all the discussion on this bill, what it does is...changes the authority for how the floodgates work at Hoffman Dam between the Villages of Lyons and Riverside. Currently, a mosquito abatement district is in charge of the floodgates and they have all they can do to handle their mosquitoes, they don't even want the authority and we would...like the Division of Waterways and IDOT to have that authority, and that's it.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Discussion? Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Is...is it fair to say that the Cook County Board has said this is fine, take it away from the mosquito abatement district or the forest preserve district or whomsoever does this now?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Topinka.

SENATOR TOPINKA:

All the people who were involved have...have signed off, including Army Corps of Engineers, Division of Waterways, the Forest Preserve District, the Metropolitan Sanitary District, anybody who could have even been remotely close to it has says it's no problem.

SENATOR ROCK:

That answers my question. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Davidson.

SENATOR DAVIDSON:

Mr. President and members of the Senate, this bill does a very simple thing, it says that those agencies, corrections and mental health, who have guests in their facilities that they will buy food stuff that's grown in the United States or here...particularly here in Illinois. If it's not available, something that is not being raised or is not raised at all in the United States is exempt. This bill has...with the amendment has support of Central Management Service, the different farm groups throughout the State and the AFL-CIO. I'd appreciate a favorable vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Last December we passed...an override of the Governor's veto for this legislation. Now what has happened is that there have been additional duties that each county treasurer has as a result of passed legislative action for your review. Both the county clerks and the circuit clerks are currently receiving an identical stipend and have been for the past three years, and so that's why that we felt that additional duties and to this legislation we'd provide parity among county officials. Mr. President, Senate Bill 62 amends the Prairie State 2000 Act to include those eligible for retraining benefits, those who are dislocated workers under the Federal Job Training Partnership Act. It was assumed previously that they were eligible but they weren't. By this Act, they will become eligible. I urge the passage of Senate Bill 62.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Discussion? Discussion? If not, the question is, shall Senate Bill 62 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 55, the Nays are 2, none voting Present. Senate Bill 62 having received the required constitutional majority is declared passed. On the Order of Senate Bills 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 94, Madam Secretary. Read the bill, please.

SECRETARY:

Senate Bill 94.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Watson.

SENATOR WATSON:

Yes, sir, thank you, Mr. President. This particular piece of legislation does exactly what it says in the Calendar, it prohibits law enforcement officers to stop or search



any vehicle without a warrant or a driver or...or any driver or passenger of that vehicle solely on the basis of a seat belt violation or suspected violation. As you may recall, and I have with me the copy of the transcript from November 28th, 1984, in which the original intent of the seat belt bill was pretty well spelled out in the debate on the Senate Floor, and I have that here, and the late Senator Chew responded to a question from Senator Marovitz and Senator...Marovitz stated, "Can a motorist be stopped exclusively because he does not wear his seat belt?" And the late Senator Chew answered, "No, sir." Well, unfortunately, that was not written into the law and all we're doing here is simply putting that particular provision and...and spelling out the original intent of the legislation into the Act, and I would be glad to answer any questions; otherwise, I would appreciate affirmative vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Discussion? Senator Netsch.

SENATOR NETSCH:

Question to the sponsor. I don't disagree with your interpretation, really, I think that was generally if not a...a constitutional literal intent at least the understanding on the part of a lot of people, but I thought I also remembered that we passed a bill or at least dealt with a bill last year that did approximately the same thing and I'm now vague as to what happened to it; in fact, I've forgotten what's happened to it. Could you enlighten me?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Watson.

SENATOR WATSON:

Yes, we did pass this particular piece of legislation out of the Senate; unfortunately, it was held in the House Rules Committee.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Geo-Karis.

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Well, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I think this is a very good bill because I get tired of hearing about some of these very overambitious policemen do nothing else but trying to hold people on seat...not wearing their seat belts. I move for a favorable passage.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Watson, do you wish to close? Question is, shall Senate Bill 94 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 57, the Nays are none, none voting Present. Senate Bill 94 having received the required constitutional majority is declared passed. Top of page 8, Senate Bill 130. Senate Bill 144. Senate Bill 161, Senator O'Daniel. On the Order of Senate Bills 3rd Reading, page 8, is Senate Bill 161, Mr...Madam Secretary, read the bill, please.

SECRETARY:

Senate Bill 161.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator O'Daniel.

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

Mr. President and members of the Senate, Senate Bill 161 changes the tarpaulin law from a moving violation to a...an equipment violation. In 1985 we passed this legislation and it was then a...a moving violation, but the State police and law enforcement and the Trucking Association felt that this should an equipment violation and so this...this legislation changes the law from a moving violation to an equipment violation.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Discussion? Senator Keats.

SENATOR KEATS:

What effect does this have to make it...instead of a moving violation an equipment violation? 'Cause this is a big issue up in...up by the quarry pits in our area. I'm just wondering what effect this has.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator O'Daniel.

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

When it was a moving violation it went against the driver's driving record...your driving privileges and as a moving violation, it goes against the...the owner, the equipment. It was felt that the driver shouldn't be responsible for furnishing the tarpaulin or cover for these trucks, it should be the...the owner's responsibility.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY:

Yes, can you tell me what the fine is for a violation of that nature? How much...in other words, if it's not going to be a moving violation, how much are you actually going to charge to an owner of this...this truck?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator O'Daniel.

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

It's my understanding it doesn't change the cost at all. It's...it's fifty dollar fine plus court costs, same as the moving violation.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY:

I...I don't know, it seems like it is a problem up our way too that these tarpaulins...if they're not on there and I

suppose you've got a lot of support for this legislation, but it seems to me that you're weakening it or watering it down quite a bit by only a fifty dollar fine, that it may not be enough to...I think if anything, take it off, but raise up that fine and make it a substantial fine to stop these people from leaving these tarpaulins off...off of these trucks.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Welch.

SENATOR WELCH:

Thank you. I have a question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Indicates he will yield. Senator Welch.

SENATOR WELCH:

Senator O'Daniel, it's my understanding that in other areas of the law, such as if you drive a school bus with defective equipment, the driver of the bus is responsible and he's charged with his record as opposed to the owner of the school bus. What you're doing is getting away from that responsibility of the driver here and putting it on the owner of the truck. Is that correct?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator O'Daniel.

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

Yes, you know, the...the...the driver that's out here working for...for a wage shouldn't be responsible for...for the condition of this vehicle. That should be the owner's responsibility and all this is doing is changing it from the driver to the owner.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Welch.

SENATOR WELCH:

Well, what about the guy who's riding behind one of these trucks with the gravel and the gravel pops out and hits your windshield, it doesn't really matter to him who's respon-

sible, it doesn't seem to me, and that seems to be what this bill does is weaken the requirement that a truck have a tarpaulin over it to maintain the contents in the back of the truck bed.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Senator O'Daniel.

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

It doesn't weaken anything. It doesn't change the law. It just moves it from the owner...from the driver to the owner of the vehicle. It doesn't change the...the legislation at all.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Senator Welch.

SENATOR WELCH:

Well, I would beg to differ...with you on that. If you had the driver who is driving the truck not being responsible, he's not going to tell the owner that, hey, get me the tarpaulin...he may just figure that, you know, he's...he's there earning his wage, he does his job, that's not in his job description. That's a frequent complaint that we hear of employees is that it's not in my written job description, so I don't have to do it. If you have the check and balance of having the driver responsible as well, it would seem to me that the law would be enforced by an individual with less governmental interference.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

All right, further discussion? Senator Raica.

SENATOR RAICA:

Senator O'Daniel, is what we're saying that basically what the law says now is that the onus is on the driver of the vehicle to supply the, if anything, the tarpaulin for the...for the truck. What this does...the bill that you're putting in is it would put the onus on the owner of that vehicle; therefore, what we're saying is that the owner

should supply and maybe if he is fined he will supply that tarpaulin for that vehicle and there...take the responsibility of putting that tarpaulin on that vehicle off the driver which he does not own to begin with. Is that correct?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator O'Daniel.

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

Absolutely.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, further discussion? Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

Senator O'Daniel, a question. If we do not punish the driver with a movable offense, how do we punish the owner of the truck who should have provided the tarpaulin to begin with?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator O'Daniel.

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

You know, we've...we've passed laws now that prohibit spillage on the highway and require covers or tarpaulins on...on vehicles that haul certain material, and all this does is change the responsibility when the State Police or a law official stops the vehicle instead of it going against the driver's driving record, he will fine the owner of that vehicle.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

Having been in that position, driving a truck through college, I...I agree with the Senator.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Schaffer.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

Well, I come from the gravel pit capital of Illinois and

we got more gravel trucks in my area than I...I think any other part of the State, and I happen to have a truck with under...a van with under fifteen thousand miles on it that has a smashed windshield right now which I'm going to have to replace in the next couple of weeks from a gravel truck, and I'm going to surprise a few people, I'm going to support this bill and I'll tell you why. I don't know of any instance when any policeman has written a ticket for the driver for a stone falling off the back of his truck, and I'm sure it's happened but it hasn't happened on my turf and I've got more gravel trucks than anybody...around here. I don't think the police are willing to cut off someone's livelihood for something that they may or may not have any control over, but I do think they'll write tickets like crazy for trucks under the new scheme which is just a fifty dollar fine for the owner, and bear in mind, a lot of these trucks are owned by the same guy who's driving them. A lot of these guys are independent truckers and they own their truck and they drive it themselves or they have a relative drive it, so in some cases it is still the same person. The...the current law appears to me to be pretty much unenforceable. I think...I would agree with Senator Kelly, I believe...that maybe a hundred bucks or two hundred bucks will get their attention a lot more than fifty, but I have a feeling that if a...an owner of a truck after he's...cost him three or four hundred dollars, he'll have a little discussion with that truck driver about tarping. So, I think particularly if we give a little thought to kicking that fine up, I think we can make it work a lot better. I know it's complicated, but I'd sure like to see the money go in the fund to pay for windshields. I'd be willing to fill out the first form.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? All right, if not, Senator O'Daniel, may close.

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

I would ask for a favorable roll call.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Question is, shall Senate Bill 161 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 50, the Nays are 3, none voting Present. Senate Bill 161 having received the required constitutional majority is declared passed. Senate bills 3rd reading is Senate Bill 183, Madam Secretary. Read the bill, please.

SECRETARY:

Senate Bill 183.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Rigney.

SENATOR RIGNEY:

Under current Illinois law, those who are deemed to be handicapped are allowed to use a crossbow in deer hunting. The only problem is the definition of that...it's those people who are either in wheelchairs or on crutches or amputees. What we're doing under this legislation is saying that those who are otherwise either disabled or diseased to where they cannot handle a conventional bow that they would then be able to use a crossbow in deer...in the deer hunting season. This bill is supported by the Department of Conservation.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Discussion? Senator Jerome Joyce.

SENATOR JEROME JOYCE.

Yes, Mr. President, thank you. This is a very difficult bill to oppose, but I just want to point out what we are



doing here and that is the people who are, as...as the Senator said, in wheelchairs or what have you would have access to a crossbow in the field to go out hunting. Now, I don't know how many of you have ever seen a crossbow, but it's a pretty lethal weapon. In Illinois we allow shotguns for deer hunting or bow hunting. Well, I would tell you that a crossbow is much more powerful than either a shotgun or a...a compound bow. I'm not sure that...that this makes much sense at all. If a person is...is disabled and can't get out into the woods or wherever to go hunting deer and he goes out there with a crossbow, that seems very dangerous in itself to me, but how a...explain to me how they'd ever get the deer out of there; you know, if you shoot one, how in the world are they going to haul it out of there? I think...that we're getting a little ridiculous in...in some of these...this type of legislation...you know, I...it's very dangerous and if you'd see one, you know, doesn't make any noise, it shoots a bolt, not an arrow. I think it's a very, very bad idea. I think we...you know, we ought to all...and I know it's tough to vote against it but I think we ought to do that.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIQ)

Further discussion? Senator Rigney may close.

SENATOR RIGNEY:

Well, first of all, keep in mind that there's probably about one hundred such licenses that are issued now in the entire State of Illinois. So, we're not talking about flooding the fields with people who will be using this kind of a weapon. Keep in mind also the argument this is a powerful weapon. I will grant you that at...at close range; however, testimony in the committee from the Department of Conservation clearly indicated that the overall range of the arrow is not that much greater than a conventional arrow, it's just that it travels at a high speed at a short distance. Let's keep in mind who we're talking about here. We're talking

about people who are in the twilight of their life. The man that I brought down to testify in the committee was a man who is suffering from MS and these are the type of people who we are going to give the opportunity, they've...you know, they're old deer hunters from years gone by, to enjoy this type of activity for at least a few more years. So, I think it's a fair bill and I think that's probably why our friends in the Conservation Department supported it. I ask your Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator...Senator Joyce, he was closing. Senator Joyce.

SENATOR JEROME JOYCE:

Well, I'm sorry to speak twice, but...in...in his closing remarks he said that the people in the twilight of their lives are...are...you know, that's the very reason that we probably should not be doing this. I mean, if they're...a younger person or something...but there's no way that they're going to go out there and...and you also mentioned that this crossbow doesn't go very far. Now I know you can crank up a crossbow where it'll go the...like a thirty-thirty rifle, so...you know, I...this is...this is much more dangerous than...than as we're being led to believe.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Well, I'm...I'm...I'm sorry, Senator Rigney, you may wish to close again, I...Senator Rigney.

SENATOR RIGNEY:

No, I think I've made my case on it. As I say, it'll be a very limited number of people that will be using this equipment and I think it's only fair that they have the chance to enjoy some hunting again in the twilight years of their life.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Question is, shall Senate Bill 183 pass. Those in favor

will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 29, the...Nays are 19, 3 voting Present. Senate Bill 183 having failed to receive the required constitutional majority is declared lost. Senator Rigney.

SENATOR RIGNEY:

...might want to give that one another shot, I'd put it on postponed.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

With a bow and arrow? All right,...sponsor has requested postponed consideration. Postponed consideration. Senate Bill 201. All right, Senate bills 3rd reading, middle of page 8, is Senate Bill 201. Madam Secretary, read the bill, please.

SECRETARY:

Senate Bill 201.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

This will permit the commercial sale of this drug to anesthesiologists and it has been approved by the DEA and the FDA and it will never be sold over the counter. I ask for your vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Well, discussion? Senator Marovitz.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Will the sponsor yield?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Sponsor indicates he will yield. Senator Marovitz.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Senator Dunn, I don't know why we have to do this by

legislation. Why can't DASA do this by rule making themselves? It would seem to me that the process of legislation will take at least till July 1, then the Governor's got to go on vacation, then the Governor's got to take a look at the bill, analyze the bill, it won't become effective until some time in August or September. DASA by rule making can do this a lot faster and if it's that important to do and that important a drug, they should be able to get this on the books perhaps within the next month and available to patients. Why do we need this legislatively?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

Apparently, because they refuse to do it that method.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Well, Senator Marovitz.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Well, that's a very poor excuse for legislation, I must tell you. The fact that one of our departments of State Government refuses to do something that they're supposed to do and empowered to do, maybe we ought to call DASA in on the carpet and tell them that they're going to do it. I don't think we ought to be passing legislation because some department of State Government refuses to assume their constitutional responsibilities. This is a bad idea. It sets a bad precedent. It's going to open up the door to a plethora of transfers just because DASA says they don't want to do it. I think it's a bad idea and I don't think we ought to be passing legislation like this.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

All right, further discussion? Senator Schaffer.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

This is another plethora bill. Who wants this bill? Where did it come from?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

Comes from Johnson and Johnson who is in my district,  
sir.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Schaffer.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

Fronting for the drug pushers, eh?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR DUNN:

Are you a buyer?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator DeAngelis.

SENATOR DeANGELIS:

Senator Dunn, I understand there's a lot of street value  
to this particular drug. Is that correct?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

I would have no knowledge about that.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator DeAngelis.

SENATOR DeANGELIS:

Well, Senator Sangmeister had great difficulty passing  
the same bill. Do you know why?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator...Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

No, why?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator DeAngelis.

SENATOR DeANGELIS:

I don't know why either. I just wanted to know if you got his permission to put this bill in again?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Topinka.

SENATOR TOPINKA:

Yes, if...if I might, I...I'm a joint sponsor of this and I regret that I'm just going to have to kind of withdraw my support, because it's come to my attention from my district that I've had at least three parents' groups who are extremely concerned by this as to how available it would make this...substance and they would prefer that it stay on the controlled list because, indeed, it does have a pronounced street value and I...sorry.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Davidson.

SENATOR DAVIDSON:

Will the sponsor yield?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Indicates he will yield. Senator Davidson.

SENATOR DAVIDSON:

...according to the analysis, it says you're going to have a quicker recovery in this...on this anesthesia. Is this Johnson and Johnson's propaganda or is this something that FDA has done?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

This has been used and approved in other jurisdictions and it's been approved by not only the DEA but the FDA.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Davidson.

SENATOR DAVIDSON:

But you didn't answer the question. Is Johnson and Johnson the one who did the original saying this is going to get

the quicker recovery and that you can have an outpatient surgery rather than have to do it in the hospital facility and is this administered by a local nurse or by an...anesthesia nurse?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

This is only administered by a qualified technician whether it be an anesthesiologist or...or the nurse who is duly authorized to administer it. It's only going to be used in hospitals. The comment about it having a street value I don't think is relevant because it's no more...I didn't...I understand that. It...it really isn't anymore available on the street than any other drug and the fact that it's changed from a Class I to a Class II...the only effect that has is it permits its sale commercially.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Netsch.

SENATOR NETSCH:

Thank you, Mr. President. I want to be clear about one thing because Senator Etheredge and I as members of the Department of Alcoholism and Advisory and...what do we call it now...and Substance Abuse Advisory Council usually sponsor the bills that reschedule some of the drugs. It was our recollection that we were to have introduced on behalf of DASA a bill that would reschedule Alfentanil. We can't find a sign of the bill in the...in the record at the moment, but I do need to know because this is quite critical, did DASA testify at the hearing and, if so, how did they testify?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

They gave their support to the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Netsch.

SENATOR NETSCH:

...just to be clear, they said that it was their intention to request the rescheduling?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

That's correct.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Geo-Karis.

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I think it's a great bill and like to be put on as a cosponsor with Senator Dunn.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, with leave of the Body, ...sponsor indicates he...he would welcome the support. Leave is granted. Senator...further discussion? Senator Watson.

SENATOR WATSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. What do the pharmacists think about this?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

I...I can't answer that question, I'm sorry.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Watson.

SENATOR WATSON:

As you know, I am a pharmacist and I'm quite concerned about our industry and...and our association and I'd appreciate it if you'd check into that for me and get back to me and let me know how they stand on this. Okay?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.



SENATOR TOM DUNN:

...will not be selling it. It...it will only...it's not commercially...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Dudycz.

SENATOR DUDYCYZ:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Dunn, has the Department of Law Enforcement been aware that you're trying to legalize this drug?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

Yes, they are.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dudycz.

SENATOR DUDYCYZ:

What are they physical properties of this drug?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

What do you mean by physical properties?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dudycz.

SENATOR DUDYCYZ:

What's in the...inside...chemicals?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

I don't know the chemical makeup or the formula.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dudycz.

SENATOR DUDYCYZ:

You're promoting a...a narcotic and you don't know what you're promoting?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

I think I know what I'm promoting but I am not a chemist.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dudycz.

SENATOR DUDYCYZ:

Can you tell us what you're promoting? If you know, we'd like to know also.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

Yes, this is a drug to assist people and it's to be used in the operating room by anesthesiologists.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

...Senator Dudycz.

SENATOR DUDYCYZ:

How does it assist people?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

It makes their recovery a lot easier according to the doctors who have used this.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dudycz.

SENATOR DUDYCYZ:

How?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

It's a quicker recovery with less complications.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Dudycz.

SENATOR DUDYCYZ:

How quick?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Senator Dunn. Quick enough.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

Quicker than the previous method.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Further discussion? If not, Senator Dunn should certainly close. Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

This may...this is my first bill but it may be my last as a freshman.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Question is, shall Senate Bill 201 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? I'm sure Senator Dunn wants to remind everyone of his closing remarks. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Last call. Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 57, the Nays are none, none voting Present. Senate Bill 201 having received the required constitutional majority is declared passed. All right, on the Order of Senate Bills 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 229. Senator O'Daniel, are you ready to proceed? All right, middle of page 8, Senate Bill 229, Madam Secretary, please, read the bill.

SECRETARY:

Senate Bill 229.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Senator O'Daniel.

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 229 is a transfer of thirty-eight thousand dollars designated for trichinosis

to the...award for the destruction of livestock, the brucel-  
losis, and the bill reduces the appropriations for awards to  
the owners of livestock destroyed due to trichinosis from  
thirty-eight thousand dollars...thirty-eight thousand three  
hundred dollars to one dollar; and according to Doctor Doby  
of the department, the money for the destruction of livestock  
with trichinosis is not currently needed because all of the  
infected swine have been eradicated. The appropriation to  
awards for destruction of livestock is then increased by  
thirty-eight thousand dollars. Additionally, fifteen thou-  
sand dollars more is provided for the...to cover what is  
needed to finish...this physical year. There's several herds  
of...of cattle in...especially in southern Illinois that are  
still...have been quarantined for brucellosis and they lack  
fifteen thousand dollars having enough funds to eradicate  
these...these herds and...he says, hurry up, so, okay...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Discussion? Discussion? If...if not, the question is,  
shall Senate Bill 229 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye.  
Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all  
voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who  
wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 56,  
the Nays are none, none voting Present. Senate Bill 229 hav-  
ing received the required constitutional majority is declared  
passed. 241, Senator Welch. 270, Senator Etheredge. Senate  
bills 3rd reading is Senate Bill 270. Madam Secretary, read  
the bill, please.

SECRETARY:

Senate Bill 270.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Etheredge.

SENATOR ETHEREDGE:

HJR #1  
Amend. #1

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 270 would empower the IEPA to make grants to units of local government for...under the Build Illinois Program for the purpose of developing local water supplies. There are a number of us here who have projects that were funded last year through the Build Illinois Program...and through the IEPA, but these projects have been held up because there's been some question about the power of the EPA to make this...make these grants. So, what the bill does is to empower the agency to...to do this work that we want them to do. I'd be happy to respond to any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, discussion? Discussion? If not, the question is, shall Senate Bill 270 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 56, the Nays are none, none voting Present. Senate Bill 270 having received the required constitutional majority is declared passed. All right, with leave of the body, we will now go to page 9, Secretary's Desk Resolutions. Page 9, Secretary's Desk Resolutions is House Joint Resolution 1. There...I am told there's an amendment. House Joint Resolution 1 on the Order of Secretary's Desk...Madam Secretary.

SECRETARY:

Amendment No. 1 offered by Senators Karpel and Philip.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Well, thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. House Joint Resolution 1 was sent over by the Speaker in a overwhelming majority of the House members. It would set up a Select Joint Committee on the State Regulation

of Health Professions. As I'm sure everyone here is painfully aware, there are nine regulatory Acts which sunset on December 31 of this year which sunset, obviously...which regulation the General Assembly is called to reassess and that, frankly, is what this resolution would attempt to accomplish. It would set up a twenty-three member commission or committee or task force to...including public members, to take a look at the regulatory Acts concerning those nine professions and make recommendations in writing to the General Assembly. The dates have been changed to the twenty-ninth of May and September 30 with a view toward, obviously, getting everything handled prior to the sunset date in December. The amendment that has been offered, I will tell this membership, has been rejected by me in committee and I would, obviously, afford, as I said I would, the opportunity to the sponsor of the amendment to again present it, but I, in fact, will again oppose it and when...when it is explained, I will explain my reason for opposition.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, I think Senator Karpziel is ready. Senator Karpziel.

SENATOR KARPIEL:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President. When this original resolution was passed...passed in the 84th General Assembly, that was HJR 198, it had a bipartisan membership, three members appointed by the leadership, two members of the House...Speaker...two members by the minority leader, legislators and they each appointed a...a public member and the same thing in the Senate. It was a...a bipartisan committee in other words and it was even. Now, we are reinstituting the same committee for the same reason because they did not report on time, as Senator Rock has said; however, this resolution has now become a very partisan committee, and the Speaker will be...there'll be twenty-three members; five

House members, two public members appointed by the Speaker, three House members and one public member appointed by the minority leader of the House, five members...Senate members appointed and two public members appointed by the President of the Senate and three by the minority leader. As you can see, Representative Madigan, when he passed this resolution out of the House, has made it a partisan committee. Now I don't know why he did that. He obviously has some agenda or something in mind, but whatever the reason, I don't think that this kind of a resolution should be put into the political process. These Acts which are going to be considered by this committee are very serious Acts; the Medical Practice Act, the Illinois Nursing Act, the Physicians' Assistants' Practice Act, the Pharmacy Practice Act, a whole slew of these Acts are going to be reviewed by this committee which is now under this resolution would be a vastly partisan committee, and I want to know...I would like to know why all of a sudden we need so many more Democrats on the committee than Republicans. If it...you know, if this is a committee that we're going to try to do some good for the medical...all the Medical Practice Acts and we're going to try to do good for the State of Illinois, I fail to see why we need so many more Democrats than we do Republicans. Now maybe the Speaker knows why, but I don't know and I would...I would very much appreciate a Yes vote on this amendment.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

All right, Senator Karpiel has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1. Is there discussion? Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I rise in opposition to Amendment No. 1 and, Senator Karpiel, I'll give you a very straightforward and honest answer. "Fool me once, shame on you; fool me twice, shame on me." You are quite correct. We did pass House

Joint Resolution 198, equal division. It was sponsored by the Speaker of the House, sent here, passed here unanimously. You know what happened? Tell me what happened to that committee, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Karpel.

SENATOR KARPIEL:

Well, I don't know what happened to the committee, but I...am I...was that a rhetorical question or am I supposed to answer?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

You just gave me your answer. You don't know what happened to it. I will tell you what happened to it. The Speaker and I made our appointments and the other side did not and, hence, there was no quorum. Now it seems to me that the people of this State have vested in the Democrats the majority responsibility to keep this process moving, and so we are saying, okay, we're going to try it again but to make sure that we have a quorum we better get a majority appointment and that's all we're doing. There's no sinister motivation here. It is simply a question that when that was passed the first time, there were no appointments forthcoming from the other side, there was never a quorum and so the group never met. All we want to do is make sure they meet and address the matter properly according to our responsibility, and I would urge opposition to this amendment.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, further discussion? Senator Philip.

SENATOR PHILIP:

Yeah, Senator Rock, I...we would be happy to appoint our members if you want to accept our...our amendment, and quite frankly, when is the medical profession partisan? We have



the Select Joint Committee which we created here is completely bipartisan and I think it has worked very well and is run very well, and I don't see any reason whatsoever why this shouldn't be bipartisan. I don't think it's a Republican or a Democrat issue...the medical profession, and I see no good reason...I'll be happy to appoint my members...you put the amendment on and I'll appoint them within a week without any problem whatsoever.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Kustra...Senator Kustra.

SENATOR KUSTRA:

Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. A few years ago I served on a committee called the Sunset Committee. It was one of those commissions that was deemed by a handful of legislative leadership to no longer be necessary in the Illinois General Assembly, and I find it interesting that here we're coming back again first with 198 and now this one in an attempt to create again what we abolished a few years ago. I always did think the Sunset Committee was a good idea and that there was a place for it. I think there's a place for this committee. That Sunset Committee was composed of an even number of Democrats and Republicans from both Chambers and the leadership of that committee switched every two years. I don't see any reason why we can't adopt now the same kind of committee structure that we had then since apparently we've realized our mistake and see the need for such a creation now.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Netsch.

SENATOR NETSCH:

I agree with the people on that side and I'm going to vote with Senator Rock, and let me tell you why, that...that sounds like an obvious...he says it's the first time in history I've ever voted with him but...let me tell you a couple

of things; one is that it should be bipartisan, it shouldn't...it should be really nonpartisan, it shouldn't have any partisanship at all, but there are two problems, one of which is that the...the fault really was in the failure to appoint members on the part of...I think both Representative Daniels and Senator Philip last time and so those of us who had been appointed sat there and were never able to meet; and I think that did create some ill will, perhaps that is what stuck in the craw of Speaker Madigan, who knows what sticks in his craw, but in any event, he is adamant, I mean, there is no way we are ever going to get this committee unless it is...a partisan balanced one in favor of the Democrats, and to be perfectly honest, I don't think it makes the slightest bit of difference, as...having served on both the Sunset Commission and the Joint Utility Commission which was part of the same process on...on an earlier version of this, I honestly do not think it's going to make any difference one way or the other, because the...the lines for licensing are just simply not that clear cut and they do not divide neatly along partisan lines. So, I think what is much more important is that we get this doggone thing moving so that we can have some report back to us before June 30th and are able to take some action.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Schuneman.

SENATOR SCHUNEMAN:

Well, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I think there are a couple of points that ought to be made here, one is in...in reaction, Senator Netsch, to your comment that the Speaker is adamant. You know, more and more the Speaker is adamant, and we sit here like silly geese and...and go along with him. The Speaker has another agenda and it has to do with this bill and we should not allow him to dictate to this Senate. There's a lot more involved here

than the bipartisanship of this commission. As far as what happened last year, you will recall that the...that the major issue of that Session had to do with tort reform and the Medical Practice Acts do not expire until this year, and those two issues perhaps were joined last year and I suspect that they're joined again this year, but we're dealing with something very important, the medical practice in the State of Illinois that affects all of our people whether they're Republican and...or Democrat, we should not allow the Speaker to win by using strong-arm tactics. I don't think, Senator Rock, that this is in...in your style and I somewhat sympathize with the position you're put in sometimes, but I don't think we, Senator...Netsch, those of us who believe in bipartisan approaches ought to allow the Speaker to dictate to us.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, further discussion? Senator Geo-Karis for a first time.

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Well, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I can hardly believe my ears that Senator Rock would just bow down and lay down for the Speaker of the House. I just can't believe it. This is the first time...it's the first time I've seen any indication of it and I would be crushed to think he would really do that. I think that we ought to keep in mind that if...we want to do a job, let's do a job and do it right; if there's going to be any blame, let it be shared bipartisanlike and I...I really feel that this amendment should pass because I know deep in your heart, Senator Rock, you know I'm right.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, further discussion? All right, Senator Rock, for a second time. Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Well, I meant what I said, frankly, that when 198 passed everybody was of goodwill and cheer and we said, we're going to get this job done, and then, for some reason, there were no appointments forthcoming from the other side. Now I blame that, frankly, on our friends in the medical society. I think they double delt us and I was a little miffed and am a little miffed. With the assurance that Senator Philip has now given me, I'll accept the damn amendment, let's move it and pass it out of here and we'll send it back to the Speaker, but I want those appointments pursuant to your word, my friend.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator...Senator Karpziel may close.

SENATOR KARPIEL:

Well, I just want to thank Senator Rock and...for his gracious...agreement on the adoption of this amendment.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Karpziel has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Joint Resolution 1. Those in favor will indicate by saying Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. All right, now on the...all right, Senator Rock, you're requesting a roll call on House Joint Resolution 1 as amended. All right. Senator Keats, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR KEATS:

To speak on this.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Well, we've...we've adopted Amendment No. 1. Well, wait till we get it into the record and we'll be delighted to come back and ask you. All right, House Joint Resolution 1 as amended. Is there discussion? Senator Keats.

SENATOR KEATS:

Phil, you should have held your ground. Forget...forget the amendment. For a minute let's all back off and...forget

the amendment. What this resolution says is the Legislature is incompetent to do its own job. The committee chairman of public health, you are incompetent, you can't do what your committee is supposed to do. We know the House is incompetent and can't do what they're supposed to do. They got forty committees. I don't blame Madigan, he can't even find what committee it goes in. The committee chairman doesn't know. But what this resolution does, think about it, it concedes, we, the Legislature, are inept, cannot function, cannot do our job and are incapable of doing the oversight function that we're supposed to do and since we can't do it, we're now going to hand it off to somebody else and say, that's okay, we're incompetent, we admit it, we're no better than the Congress and we'll let somebody else do our job for us. I think that's ludicrous.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, is there further discussion? Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

(Machine cutoff)...of order. I just want to defend Senator Karpis's amendment. It certainly doesn't do what Senator Keats just said it did.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Philip.

SENATOR PHILIP:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Once again, Senator Rock has been a statesman and a complete statesman and I think all the members on this side ought to support him. I don't know what goes on in the House, I'm not responsible for them. I know they got so many committees, they got committees falling all over each other; and I can remember last year on...on the so-called tort reform, we had hearings in the Senate, we had an opportunity to amend those bills, they went over to the House of Representatives and all of those meetings were held in the

Speaker's Office. There was not one public meeting and committee, wasn't any debate on the Floor of...of the House and we got it stuck down our throat once again, and, you know, I'm getting tired of getting it stuffed down my throat all the time from the other House, so let's see a lot of green votes up here.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? Senator Rock, you wish to close?  
Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Thank you, I would ask for a roll call. It will require the expenditure of some State funds.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Question is, shall House Joint Resolution 1 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The vote...voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 53, the Nays are 2, none voting Present. House Joint Resolution 1 is adopted. (Machine cutoff)...on the Order of Secretary's Desk Resolutions is Senate Joint Resolution 10, Madam Secretary. Madam Secretary, Senate...

SECRETARY:

There are no amendments on this resolution.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

All right, Senator Jerome Joyce.

SENATOR JEROME JOYCE:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Joint Resolution 10 deals with the construction of a chem-nuclear compactor for low-level nuclear waste in the Village of Channahon in Will County. What happened was chem-nuclear came to that area, started the construction of a compactor for low-level nuclear waste. They did not consult the village officials, they did not consult the county officials, they did not consult the

State officials and everyone is quite up in arms there and what this resolution does is to ask that those...that construction be halted until the safety, legality and zoning approval and licensing questions are resolved, and I would ask for your favorable adoption of this amendment if there are no questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEWUZZIO)

All right, Senator Joyce has moved the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 10. Discussion? Senator Macdonald...Senator...

SENATOR MACDONALD:

Yes, Mr. President, can you tell us is there any...any limitation, Senator Joyce, on...on the delay or...or what...what are we talking about here for...

PRESIDENT:

Senator Joyce.

SENATOR MACDONALD:

...to delay purposes.

SENATOR JEROME JOYCE:

Delay purpose is...is until the safety concerns of those residents...is it residents...are addressed. That's...that's what it's all about. It is in court in Will County right now. The State's attorney is taking it to court on zoning violations. You know, no one was...was notified at all and I think this is...this is really a backward step in...in dealing with nuclear waste. When we formed the Kentucky and Illinois Compact, I thought we had come a long ways toward that end, that we will have hearings, people will know what is going on in their community regarding nuclear waste, and this is a...a backward step and nuclear waste can be brought in from anywhere in the...I guess in the world right now. We are about to become an agreement State and then we could regulate our destiny and they...they were in such a hurry to get this done before we became an agreement State so we

wouldn't have any say about it, and I think that's something that's sticking in everyone's craw.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Macdonald.

SENATOR MACDONALD:

Yes, is it...is it not true that there are safety devices that are already in the Federal requirements...to...to site these various locations?

PRESIDENT:

Senator Joyce.

SENATOR JEROME JOYCE:

Well, chem-nuclear says it met Federal regulations but they didn't talk to anyone in that community, they didn't let anyone know what was going on in there and, Senator, I doubt that you'd want one of those facilities to go into your community without any knowledge at all of what was happening, and they're putting it in a...in an old truck terminal and that's where...that's where it's being put.

PRESIDENT:

Further discussion? Any further discussion? If not, the question is the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 10. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 53 Ayes, 1 Nay, 1 voting Present. Senate Joint Resolution 10 having received the required constitutional majority is declared passed. On the Order of Secretary's Desk Resolutions is Senate Joint Resolution 16, Madam Secretary. Senator Marovitz on Senate Joint Resolution 16.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Thank you, very much, Mr. President and members of the Senate. Senate Joint Resolution 16 creates the Lake Michigan Task Force to conduct a comprehensive study of the problems associated with Lake Michigan, the use of Lake Michigan and



the management of Lake Michigan and to make recommendations...resolution of those problems. As you know, Lake Michigan is one of our greatest assets. There are an awful lot of problems affecting not only the areas along the lake from Senator Geo-Karis' and Senator Darkhausen's district to Senator Newhouse's district and all along the lake but also regarding diversions downstate. There are a lot of committees that have been appointed, commissions that have been appointed, but the State needs to be involved, we're going to be involved regarding dollars and cents, we have to be involved regarding planning involving other states, compacts with other states, downstate needs to be...involved regarding diversions and I think it's important to have a task force like this where the State is intricately and intimately involved with every aspect of the decision making process and I solicit your Aye vote.

PRESIDENT:

Any discussion? Any discussion? Senator Macdonald.

SENATOR MACDONALD:

Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in support of this particular resolution and I would just like to make a comment and say that it's very interesting, I served on the Water Resource Commission for a number of years and...and, frankly, the overkill of some of our sunset legislation which abolished that particular commission was a point in case. The Water Resource Commission did a great deal of work regarding not only the Lake Michigan shoreline and those kinds of water problems but the problems that faced the entire State of Illinois. So, here we are a few years down the road, again, seeing the necessity for us to establish a public legislative committee and I think, indeed, it is needed. It's very much needed at this point and time and I stand to strongly support this resolution.

PRESIDENT:

Further discussion? Senator Demuzio.

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

Well, Senator Macdonald, I...I certainly share your...your...your points and I...and I pointed out to Senator Marovitz earlier that...you know, this concerns us all downstate, particularly those of us that have districts that the respective waterways flow through that could be used as a...additional diversion of Lake Michigan water, so I would hope, Senator Marovitz, in the creation of this task force that there is consideration given to the respective members of both sides of the aisle that this may have a...a serious effect on all of us that...that live downstate and that this task force isn't weighted heavily in one direction other than another, and with that, I will support it.

PRESIDENT:

Further discussion? Senator Davidson.

SENATOR DAVIDSON:

Well, Mr. President, to follow up on a point that Senator Demuzio made, as he and I both share districts that are highly affected by the Illinois River and its tributaries not only in relation to the farming and manufacture but also for the transportation of products both raw and finished, and in the committee there was a lot of discussion about this in relation to the leadership of the House and the Senate, both Republican and Democrat, that consideration be given to members of the Legislature and...but, more importantly, public members who are affected by this for the downstate area and with that understanding that was given in committee, I am glad to support this bill, but I did want to get that statement in the record. Thank you.

PRESIDENT:

Further discussion? Senator Keats.

SENATOR KEATS:

I'm just looking everywhere to figure out what this

commission will do and nowhere can I find a...a synopsis of the...of the membership. I'm not worried about the bipartisan thing, but those of us who...who for many years worried about things like coastal zone management and State and Federal Government overriding local property rights, et cetera, I just want to know who's going to be a member or where the membership is going to come from, how's it going to function? That's what I'm concerned with, the technical side of it.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Marovitz.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Okay, the membership is composed of...Senator Rock and Senator Madigan have five appointments, three legislative and two public; Senator Philip and Senator...and...and Representative Daniels have four; two public, two legislative. The chairman is appointed jointly by Senator Rock and Representative...and Speaker Madigan. A...a public member will be the chairman and they will be appointed by...and...and he or she will be appointed by Senator Rock and...and Speaker Madigan...a public member not a...not a legislative chairman.

PRESIDENT:

Further discussion? Any further discussion? Senator Marovitz, you wish to close?

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Just solicit your Aye vote for this very important issue...on this very important issue.

PRESIDENT:

Question is the adoption of Senate Joint Resolution 16. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Joint Resolution 16 having received the required constitu-

tional majority is declared adopted. The hour of two has arrived and we have a number of committees that are meeting. Senator Joyce, any announcements?

SENATOR JEROME JOYCE:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President. The Executive Committee will meet promptly and we will meet till four-twenty this afternoon. We will meet from right now till four-twenty.

PRESIDENT:

Am I on? There you go. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. There is a malicious rumor floating around this Senate today that it's Laura Kent Donahue's birthday. PRESIDENT:
