He then taught and lectured at the University of Sidney prior to joining the Australian Department of External Affairs where he has enjoyed a thirty-year career of distinguished foreign service. He has represented his country very ably in Bonn, German; in London, in Manila, in Jakarta, Indonesia. In 1972, Mr. Dalrymple was appointed the Australian Ambassador to Israel and subsequently in March of 1981 was appointed the Ambassador to Indonesia. He now enjoys his government's appointment as the Ambassador to the United States of America since June of 1985. He happily married and the father of two children. I am told by a reliable source he is quite a golfer and he has come to, I'm sure, welcome us all and invite us all to his great country of Australia. He is accompanied by the Consul General, Mr. Terry McCarthy. Please welcome Mr. Terry McCarthy and his Excellency, the Ambassador F. Rawdon Dalrymple.

AMBASSADOR F. RAWDON DALRYMPLE:

(Remarks made by the Ambassador of Australia)

PRESIDENT:

Senator Topinka, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR TOPINKA:

Mr. President, would this be the appropriate time to change my primary sponsorship of Senate Bill 476 to Senator Barkhausen and I then would become a hyphenated joint sponsor?

PRESIDENT:

This is an...an appropriate time. We will take some

announcements. Committees are scheduled to meet at two o'clock. I'm sure the committee chairs would like to announce that and there are some other announcements and other pieces of housekeeping business; otherwise, yes, the lady seeks leave...Madam Secretary, you want to clear the board...lady seeks leave to be removed as the chief sponsor of Senate Bill 476 and asked that Senator Barkhausen be shown as the chief sponsor and she as the cosponsor on Senate Bill 476. If there is no objection...without objection, leave is granted. Senator Karpel, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR KARPIEL:

...thank you, Mr. President. I would just like leave to be added as a cosponsor on Senate Bill 990.

PRESIDENT:

All right, the lady seeks leave to be added as a cosponsor on Senate Bill 990. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Newhouse, for what purpose do you arise, sir?

SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

Thank you, Mr. President. I seek leave to be added as hyphenated cosponsor to Senate Bill 1186. I have the sponsor's permission.

PRESIDENT:

All right, gentleman seeks leave to be added as the hyphenated cosponsor on Senate Bill 1186. Without objection, leave is granted. All right, the board is lit up like a Christmas tree, so if you'll just be patient, we'll get through it all. Senator Macdonald, for what purpose do you seek recognition?

SENATOR MACDONALD:

Mr. President, I would like to be added as a hyphenated cosponsor of Senate Bill 990.

PRESIDENT:

All right, the lady seeks leave to be added as the hyphenated cosponsor of Senate Bill 990. Without objection,

leave is granted. Senator Dudycz, for what purpose do you seek recognition?

SENATOR DUDYCZ:

Thank you, Mr. President. To be added as a cosponsor of...Senate Bill 152.

PRESIDENT:

152. The gentleman seeks leave of the Body to be added as a cosponsor on Senate Bill 152. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Kelly, for what purpose do you arise, sir?

SENATOR KELLY:

Thank you, Mr. President. Seems like we're on the same bill, Senate Bill 990. I'd like to request the same permission.

PRESIDENT:

Senate Bill 990, the train is rolling. Gentleman seeks leave to be added as a cosponsor on Senate Bill 990. Without objection, leave...leave is granted. Senator Severns, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR SEVERNS:

...yes, Mr. President, I'd like to seek leave of the Body to be added as a cosponsor on Senate Bill 4 and a...

PRESIDENT:

Lady...lady seeks leave of the Body to be added as a cosponsor on Senate Bill 4. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Severns.

SENATOR SEVERNS:

And a hyphenated cosponsor on Senate Bill 834.

PRESIDENT:

The lady seeks leave to be added as a cosponsor on Senate Bill 834...hyphenated cosponsor on 834. Without objection, leave is granted. Chair would like to recognize the fact that a former member of this Body is visiting the Democratic side of the aisle, and he's always welcome on our side,

checkbook in hand, please recognize former Senator Donald Totten. Senator Marovitz, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Thank you, very much, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I have a duplicate bill and I'd like...with Senator Hawkinson, and I'd like...leave to be added as a hyphenated cosponsor to Senate Bill 116 and I will not move my bill.

PRESIDENT:

All right, gentleman seeks leave to be added as the hyphenated cosponsor on Senate Bill 116. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Smith, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR SMITH:

...thank you, Mr. President and...and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I move to waive the six-day posting period so that Senate Bill 1210 can be heard in the Senate Public Health, Welfare and Corrections Committee on Thursday, April 30th.

PRESIDENT:

All right, the lady seeks leave to...to suspend the rules for the...and waive the posting notice for the purpose of hearing Senate Bill 1210 this Thursday in the Committee on Public Health. Without objection, leave is granted. It's so ordered. Senator Lechowicz, for what purpose do you seek recognition?

SENATOR LECHOWICZ:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to have leave of the Body to be placed as a cosponsor on Senate Bill 990.

PRESIDENT:

All right, the gentleman seeks leave to be added as a cosponsor on Senate Bill 990. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Carroll, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR CARROLL:

Not, Mr. President, for a like request but rather to

announce...that the Appropriations I Committee that met until the hour of oneish today stood in Recess. The hour to reconvene will be at five o'clock on Wednesday but in Room 400. It's my understanding that the committee that's in there at two o'clock expects to be done by five so that Appropriations I will reconvene with those bills that had already been posted at the hour of five o'clock tomorrow in Room 500...in Room 400. Thank you.

PRESIDENT:

All right,...Appropriations I at five o'clock tomorrow in Room 400...400 tomorrow. Senator Savickas, for what purpose do you seek recognition?

SENATOR SAVICKAS:

Mr. President, for the purpose of waiving the posting notice so that Senate Bill 1209 which was not posted can be heard in Energy and Environment on its next meeting.

PRESIDENT:

All right, the gentleman seeks leave to have Senate Bill 1209...to have the posting notice waived for the purpose of hearing it in the Committee on Energy which meets Friday, May 1st. Without objection, leave is granted. It's so ordered. Senator Luft, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR LUFT:

Thank you, Mr. President. I wish to add Senator Zito as a hyphenated sponsor to Senate Bill 1438, Senate Bill 1439, Senate Bill 1440.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Zito has got me all choked up, I'm sorry about that. All right, gentleman seeks leave to show Senator Zito as the cosponsor on 1438, 39 and 1440. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Jacobs, for what purpose do you arise, sir?

SENATOR JACOBS:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to be added as a co-

sponsor, with leave of the Body, of Senate Bill 834.

PRESIDENT:

All right, gentleman seeks leave of the Body to be added as a cosponsor on Senate Bill 834. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Holmberg, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR HOLMBERG:

Mr. President, a point of personal privilege. In the...

PRESIDENT:

All right, state your point, Senator Holmberg.

SENATOR HOLMBERG:

In the gallery above you, in the President's Gallery, we have the eighth graders from St. Peter's School in Rockford, Illinois.

PRESIDENT:

Will our guests in the gallery please rise and be recognized. Welcome to Springfield. Senator Hall, for what purpose do you arise, sir?

SENATOR HALL:

Point of personal privilege, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT:

State your...state your point, sir.

SENATOR HALL:

Mr. President, I have the honor to present to you and the rest of the members of this august Body the gifted students from District 189 which comprises East St. Louis and the other areas. They are accompanied here today by Doctor Edna Allen, director of Gifted Children; Doctor...Gifted Program, Doctor Frank Blackshire of SIU-East St. Louis campus, Miss Jackie Rogers, teacher of SIU campus; Miss Irene Romla, staff of SIU and Miss Janet Hill, teacher assistant at SIU. Would you please rise and be recognized by the Senate.

PRESIDENT:

Will our guests please rise and be recognized. Welcome to Springfield. Senator Smith, for what purpose do you

arise, ma'am?

SENATOR SMITH:

...Mr. President, I'd like to...leave of the Body and be added as a hyphenated sponsor to Senate Bill 1210.

PRESIDENT:

All right, the lady seeks leave of the Body to be added as the hyphenated sponsor on Senate Bill 1210. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Marovitz, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Mr. President, would this be the proper time for a committee announcement?

PRESIDENT:

Yes, it is. Yes, sir.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Okay. I would...

PRESIDENT:

Senator Marovitz.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

...I would hope everybody would listen to this announcement. Any bills on the subject matter of tort reform, product liability, medical malpractice will be heard in the Judiciary Committee one week from today at three-thirty in Room 212. Those bills that have been posted for today will be held and heard next week at...at three-thirty. Judiciary Committee will meet immediately after adjournment. We've got a lot of work to do and I would hope everybody would be prompt.

PRESIDENT:

All right. Senator O'Daniel, for what purpose do you arise, sir?

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

Mr. President and members of the Senate, Agriculture and Conservation meeting...Committee will meet in Room 400

immediately after adjournment.

PRESIDENT:

All right, Ag. and Conservation in 400 immediately after adjournment. Judiciary in 212 immediately after adjournment. Any further business? Further announcements? Senator Davidson.

SENATOR DAVIDSON:

Two things. Mr. President, I'd like to be added as a cosponsor to Senate Bill 990...like to make an announcement.

PRESIDENT:

All right, gentleman...gentleman seeks leave to be added as a cosponsor to Senate Bill 990. Without objection, leave is granted. Further announcements? Senator Davidson.

SENATOR DAVIDSON:

Mr. President and members of the Senate, I'd like to draw your attention to the card that's on everyone's desk plus the apple that's courtesy of the Governor's Council on Health and Fitness. We are tomorrow with the help of health organizations throughout the State giving you an opportunity to do the Legislators Fitness Day tomorrow morning starting at 7:30 a.m. I invite all of you to participate to see what kind of physical shape you're in so you can take the corrective action. I do want to recommend to you, if you want the blood analysis...and please listen...if you want the blood analysis done, you must have no food or no drink for twelve hours preceding the taking of the test, so we're going to start at seven-thirty in the morning. Whenever you're going to go, please don't take any food or water after that time this evening if you want the blood test. It's not necessary to participate, but if you want it, it's there for free. Thank you.

PRESIDENT:

All right, any further business? Madam Secretary, committee reports.

SECRETARY:

Senator Jones, chairman of the Committee on Insurance, Pensions and Licensed Activities, reports Senate Bills Noed. 697, 922, 1249, 1421 and 1507 Do Pass.

And Senate Bills Noed. 4, 702, 905, 906, 1146 and...and 1282 Do Pass as Amended.

PRESIDENT:

All right, any further business to come before the Senate? Any further announcements? Further business to come before the Senate? Don't forget committees are meeting immediately upon adjournment, Higher Ed., Judiciary and Agriculture and Conservation. If there's no further business, Senator Vadalabene moves that the Senate stand adjourned until Wednesday, tomorrow, at the hour of one o'clock. We will reconvene tomorrow here at one o'clock in the afternoon, we'll continue on with Senate bills 2nd reading that don't have amendments. Senate stands adjourned.
