So those Members who have items on the Calendar that they wish to move - now is the appropriate time. ...(machine cutoff)... All right. Ladies and Gentlemen, in order to facilitate the paperwork, we will start on Supplemental Calendar No. 1. Supplemental No. 1. Senator Topinka, you're first, with Senate Bill 168. Then we'll go through Supplemental No. 1. We'll go right down the list on Supplemental No. 1 and then head for the regular Calendar on Page 8, on the Order of Concurrence and then Non-Concurrence, and then we're out of here. ...(machine cutoff)...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

On the Order of Concurrence on the Supplemental Calendar, Page 2, is Senate Bill 168 -- she doesn't want to call it? All right. We will move on to the Order of Non-Concurrence. House Bill 440. Senator Hawkinson. Read the bill, please, Madam Secretary.

SECRETARY HAWKER:

Senate Amendments 1 and 2 to House Bill 440.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

Senator Hawkinson.

SENATOR HAWKINSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. I would move that the Senate refuse to recede from Senate Amendments No. 1 and 2 to House Bill 440, and ask that a conference committee be appointed.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

All right. Senator Hawkinson moves that the Senate refuse to recede from the adoption of Amendments 1 and 2 to House Bill 440.

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Those in favor will signify by saying Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it. The motion carries, and the Secretary shall so inform the House. On the Order of Non-Concurrence is House Bill 545. Senator Carroll. Read the bill, please, Madam Secretary.

SECRETARY HAWKER:

House -- Senate Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4 to House Bill 545.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

Senator Carroll.

SENATOR CARROLL:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I would move that the Senate do recede from House -- from Senate Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4. These are basically add-ons, compared to the House action. On the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Supreme Court, these were new programs that they had wanted that we had partially funded. I move that we recede from those amendments, and this would be final action.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

Discussion? Discussion? If not, the question is, shall the -- Senator Keats.

SENATOR KEATS:

Question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

Sponsor indicates he'll yield. Senator Keats.

SENATOR KEATS:

Did we just give the Supreme Court their budget carte blanche, no questions asked, stick it to the taxpayers as usual?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

Senator Carroll.

SENATOR CARROLL:

No. For once, Senator Keats, we did the opposite. We're taking out the restorations that this Senate added. We're taking out the money that this Chamber added, so we're not giving them

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what they want, carte blanche, as usual. The taxpayers are being protected.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

Further discussion? Senator Keats.

SENATOR KEATS:

God bless you, my son.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

Further discussion? Further discussion? If not, the question is, shall the Senate recede from Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4 to House Bill 545. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record, please, Madam Secretary. On that question, the Ayes are 56, the Nays are none, none voting Present, and the Senate recedes from Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4 to House Bill 545. The bill, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. On the Order of Non-Concurrence is House Bill 551. Senator Schaffer. Senator Schaffer. On the Order of Non-Concurrence is House Bill 584. Senator Rock. Read the bill, please, Madam Secretary.

SECRETARY HAWKER:

Senate Amendment No. 4 -- pardon me -- No. 2 to House Bill 584.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I consider Senate Amendments well thought out and I refuse to recede from Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 584 -- No. 2.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

Senator Rock moves that the Senate refuse to recede from the adoption of Senate Amendment 2 to House Bill 584. Those in favor, signify by saying Aye. Opposed, Nay. The motion carries, and the

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Secretary shall so inform the House. On the Order of Non-Concurrence is House Bill 592. Senator Rock. Read the bill, please, Madam Secretary.

SECRETARY HAWKER:

Senate Amendments 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 to House Bill 592.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

Senator Rock.

SENATOR ROCK:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I would ask that the Senate refuse to recede from Senate Amendments 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17 and 18 to House Bill 592.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LUFT)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Excuse me. We're -- can we have some order, please? I think it's more outside the Chamber than it is in -- Senator Berman.

SENATOR BERMAN:

Thank you. The amendment -- the bill as amended is in conformity with the request from the Illinois Department of Public Health that will bring Illinois School Asbestos Abatement Law in compliance with the federal statutes. It provides for the deposit of licensure fees and civil penalties into a fund which will be used for the administration of the Asbestos Abatement Program. The House amendment clarified the details regarding the Response Action Contractor Indemnification Act. Be glad to respond to any questions. Solicit your Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Discussion? Senator Fawell.

SENATOR FAWELL:

Thank you very much. According to our analysis, this is a State Appellate and Defender budget. Are you -- am I in the wrong one, or are you? Oh, all right.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Further discussion? If not, the question is, shall the Senate concur with House Amendment 1 to Senate Bill 659. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 56, the Nays are none, none voting Present. The Senate does concur with House Amendment 1 to Senate Bill 659, and the bill, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Hudson, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR HUDSON:

Point of personal privilege, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

State your point.

SENATOR HUDSON:

In the gallery, in back of me and way over in the far corner to my left, we have Ann Turner, who is down here with some Girl Scouts today. She has six Girl Scouts. She is sitting in the gallery with her daughters, Marie and Allie, I believe, and would have you welcome them to the Senate Chamber.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Will our guests in the gallery please rise and be recognized by the Senate. Welcome to Springfield. Senate Bill 735. Senator Carroll. Senate Bill -- Page 11. Page 11 in your regular Calendar. 741. Senator Marovitz. Senate Bill 741, Mr. Secretary.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 741.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Marovitz.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Thank you very much, Mr. President and Members of the Senate.

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I would move that the House -- Senate do concur with House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 741. It just deleted a small section regarding the agent's records - that they would only be open at reasonable intervals and by an interested party - and I would ask for concurrence.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Marovitz.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Thank you very much, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. I would move that the Senate do concur with House Amendments No. 1 and 2 to Senate Bill 743. This is the result of an agreement between all the Bar Associations, the Mothers Against Drunk Driving, the Secretary of State's Office and the State's Attorney's Office, all of which have gotten together, had meetings, and reached an agreement on this bill. And the agreement is embodied in this amendment, and I would ask for its adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Discussion? If not, the question is, shall the Senate concur with House Amendments 1 and 2 to Senate Bill 743. Those in favor

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will vote Aye. Those opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 56, the Nays are none, none voting Present. The Senate does concur with Senate Bill -- with Senate -- with House Amendments 1 and 2 to Senate Bill 743. And the bill, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 744, Mr. Secretary.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

House Amendments 1 and 2 to Senate Bill 744.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Marovitz.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Thank you very much, Mr. President and Members of the Senate. I would move that the Senate do concur with House Amendment No. 1 and 2 to Senate Bill 744. The bill is an agreed bill that has been worked out between the Bar Associations and the Attorney General's Office, and simply simplifies and streamlines the Estate Tax procedures, and allows Illinois to pick up the generation-skipping tax credit allowed Illinois by the Federal Government, but heretofore not picked up. The bill is Revenue neutral. I know of absolutely no opposition, solicit - concurrence motion.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Discussion? Senator Netsch.

SENATOR NETSCH:

Thank you, Mr. President. I wonder if I might ask the sponsor a question. Senator Marovitz, would you explain how the generation-skipping matter works, and why this -- and why this would allow us to pick something up and not lose money in the process? I mean, now this is important, and I think we just ought to be certain about it.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Could we have some order please? Could we have some order please? Senator Marovitz.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

There is a Federal Tax Credit, as you know very well, Senator Netsch, that is allowed Illinois for -- under the Estate Tax procedures for what really this says, generation skipping. In order to pick up that tax credit for the State of Illinois we have to pass this legislation.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

I think that is not an explanation of the -- of the technical way in which all of this works, but I -- I think we have Senator Marovitz's assurance that in the -- at the least, this is not going to cost the State any revenue out of its tax base, and I think he forgot to mention this, but in time it might also actually enhance our revenue base somewhat from the Inheritance/Estate Tax.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Discussion? Senator Schuneman.

SENATOR SCHUNEMAN:

Thank you, Mr. President. Question of the sponsor. Senator, the -- the synopsis indicates that this repeals provisions concerning representation of corporations in small claims. Does that do that anymore, or is it -- all I want to know is if that's out.

That is totally out of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DEMUZIO)

Senator Jones.

SENATOR JONES:

We're going to start at the top again, on Page 2, on the Supplemental Calendar. This is Supplemental No. 1. On the Order of Secretary's Desk, Concurrence. Senator Topinka has indicated she wishes to concur - that is final action. On the Order of Secretary's Desk, Concurrence is Senate Bill 168, Mr. Secretary.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

House Amendments 4 and 5 to Senate Bill 168.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Topinka.

SENATOR TOPINKA:

Yes. The two amendments taken in toto revise the original bill, and allow -- which allow political committees to conduct raffles under the same provisions that charitable organizations conduct raffles. And what, ultimately, these amendments do - where they differ from the charitable section is - is that they provide that all licensing for political raffles will be done by the State Board of Elections; there will be no license fee; political committees may conduct an unlimited number of raffles as long as the number is specified; and that gross receipts from raffles must be reported to the State Board of Elections immediately, and records of such receipts must be kept for three years.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. Senator Topinka has moved concurrence in House Amendments 4 and 5 to Senate Bill 168. Discussion? Senator Lechowicz.

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SENATOR LECHOWICZ:

Thank you, Mr. President. Will the sponsor yield to a question?

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Indicates she will yield, Senator Lechowicz.

SENATOR LECHOWICZ:

Now is this strictly for raffles? Is this Las Vegas Nights, and what other type of gambling -- is available to political organizations?

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Topinka.

SENATOR TOPINKA:

It's my understanding that this is limited to raffles.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Lechowicz.

SENATOR LECHOWICZ:

Raffles and chances, or just raffles? Now is it -- could I -- if I'd like to, could I -- offer an automobile as a raffle prize, and then pay off the automobile and keep the proceeds, and not account for the proceeds? Is that correct?

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Topinka.

SENATOR TOPINKA:

I think you would have to account for the proceeds, according to what would be the Breslin-Countryman amendment from the House.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Lechowicz.

SENATOR LECHOWICZ:

What type of accounting is that?

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Topinka.

SENATOR TOPINKA:

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I don't understand the question.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Lechowicz.

SENATOR LECHOWICZ:

My question is, if I raffled an automobile, pay off the automobile and give it as a prize, and there's a twenty-five thousand dollar amount left in the kitty, does the political organization have to account where that money goes to?

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Topinka.

SENATOR TOPINKA:

I would think so, and I think they would have to do that with the State Board of Elections.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Lechowicz.

SENATOR LECHOWICZ:

Is that -- is that a yes, or a no?

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Topinka.

SENATOR TOPINKA:

I'm giving you the best answer I have.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Lechowicz.

SENATOR LECHOWICZ:

Well. Mr. President, I realize that there are probably some political organizations in this State that raise money by raffles. But unless there was some sort of -- constraint as far as the type of prizes that are available, and without being a 501(c)3 Charitable Organization, I think it's an unfair way of, one, raising money in -- competition to charity. And two, if I don't have to account for the money from the raffle, I think it's totally wrong, and I'd be opposed to the bill.

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PRESIDENT ROCK:

Further discussion? Senator Berman.

SENATOR BERMAN:

Question of the sponsor.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Indicates she will yield. Senator Berman.

SENATOR BERMAN:

According to our analysis, Senator Topinka, there is a restriction or limitation regarding State officials and employees. Does that include Members of the General Assembly?

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Topinka.

SENATOR TOPINKA:

I don't think so.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Berman.

SENATOR BERMAN:

Well, I'd like a --

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Topinka.

SENATOR TOPINKA:

No, it does not apply to elected officials.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Berman? All right. Any further discussion? Further discussion? Senator Topinka, you wish to close?

SENATOR TOPINKA:

Well, this -- since this deal tracks just the general way that we continue to run raffles in the State, I don't know that we would have a problem in accounting for any monies which would come through. This basically reflects what was done in the past, before the Attorney General decided that political committees or individual candidates could do this. It brings it back. I think

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it's been very looked over, and I would seek your favorable vote.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. The question is, shall the Senate concur in House Amendments 4 and 5 to Senate Bill 168. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. All voted who wish? All voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 36 Ayes, 14 Nays, 2 voting Present. Senate does concur in House Amendments 4 and 5 to Senate Bill 168. And the bill, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. 5-5-1. Senator Schaffer. On the Order of Secretary's Desk, Non-Concurrence, is House Bill 551, Mr. Secretary.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 551.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. By the way, WAND-TV has requested permission to videotape. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Schaffer.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

Mr. President, I move that we refuse to recede from Senate Amendment No. 1, and request a conference committee.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. Senator Schaffer has moved that the Senate refuse to recede from the adoption of Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 551, and that a conference committee be appointed. All in favor, indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motions carries, and the Secretary shall so inform the House. Page 3, 838. Senator Madigan. Mr. Secretary, please.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 838.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Madigan.

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SENATOR MADIGAN:

Thank you, Mr. President. I would move that the Senate refuse to recede from Senate Amendment No. 1, and request that a conference committee be appointed.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. Senator Madigan has moved that the Senate refuse to recede from the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 838, and that a conference committee be appointed. All in favor, indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries, and the Secretary shall so inform the House. Senator Demuzio, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

On a point of personal privilege, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

State your point, please.

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

There's a group of boys and girls from the -- Near Northwest Civic Youth Center in Chicago, and the Chicago area project, who are visiting the State Capitol as part of their leadership training program. They're with us today in the gallery. I'd like to have our guests rise and be recognized by the Senate.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Will our guests please rise and be recognized. Welcome to Springfield. 841. Senator Raica. Mr. Secretary, please.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

Senate Amendments 1 and 2 to House Bill 841.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Raica.

SENATOR RAICA:

Thank you, Mr. President. I move that the Senate do recede from House Amendments 1 and 2 on House Bill 8-4-1.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

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All right. The Gentleman is moving that the Senate recede from Amendments 1 and 2. This is final action, Ladies and Gentlemen. Any discussion? Discussion? If not, the question is, shall the Senate recede from Senate Amendments 1 and 2 to House Bill 841. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. The Senate does recede from Amendments 1 and 2 to House Bill 841, and the bill, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. 843. Senator Weaver. Mr. Secretary, please.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

Senate Amendments 1, 2, 5, 6 and 7 to House Bill 843.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Weaver.

SENATOR WEAVER:

Mr. President, I would move that the Senate refuse to recede from Senate Amendments 1, 2, 5, 6 and 7 to House Bill 843.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. Senator Weaver has moved that the Senate refuse to recede from the adoption of Senate Amendments 1, 2, 5, 6 and 7, House Bill 843, and that a conference committee be appointed. All in favor, indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries, and the Secretary shall so inform the House. 8-4-4. Senator Watson. Mr. Secretary, please.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 844.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Watson.

SENATOR WATSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. I move that we do recede from Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 844. This is the budget for

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the Abandoned Mines Reclamations Council, and I move for its adoption.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. The Gentleman has moved that the Senate recede from Senate Amendment No. 1. Again, this is final action. Any discussion? Discussion? If not, the question is, shall the Senate recede from Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 844. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? All voted who wish? All voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 Ayes, no Nays, 1 voting Present. The Senate does recede from Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 844, and the bill, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. 845. Senator Donahue. Mr. Secretary, please.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

Senate Amendments 1, 2, 3, 4, 6 and 7 to House Bill 845.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Donahue.

SENATOR DONAHUE:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I would refuse to recede from the Senate Amendments 1, 2, 3, 4, 6 and 7.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. Senator Donahue has moved that the Senate refuse to recede from the adoption of Senate -- Senate Amendments 1, 2, 3, 4, 6 and 7 to House Bill 845, and that a conference committee be appointed. All in favor, indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries. The Secretary shall so inform the House. 846. Senator Etheredge. 849. Senator Weaver. Mr. Secretary, please.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

Senate Amendments 1 -- 1, 2, 3 and 4 to House Bill 849.

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PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Weaver.

SENATOR WEAVER:

Thank you, Mr. President. I would move that the Senate refuse to recede from House -- Senate Amendments on 849.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. Senator Weaver has moved that the Senate refuse to recede from Senate Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4 to House Bill 849, and that a conference committee be appointed. All in favor, indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries, and the Secretary shall so inform the House. 850. Senator Schaffer. Mr. Secretary, please, House Bill 850.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

Senate Amendments 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36 and 37 to House Bill 850.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Schaffer.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

Mr. President. This is the budget for the Department of Commerce and Community Affairs and it would seem to fly in the face of tradition that we would not have a conference committee on this subject. So, I will refuse to recede from Amendments 1 through 37, so that another fine legislative tradition can continue.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. Senator Schaffer has moved that the Senate refuse to recede from the adoption of Senate Amendments 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36 and 37 to House Bill 850, and that a conference committee be appointed. Discussion? If not, all in favor indicate by saying Aye. All

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opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries and the Secretary shall so inform the House. Senator Schaffer. 1847. Mr. Secretary, please.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1847.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Schaffer.

SENATOR SCHAFFER:

Mr. President, I move to refuse to recede from Senate Amendment No. 1, and request a conference committee.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

...(machine cutoff)... All right. Senator Schaffer has moved that the Senate refuse to recede from Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 1847, and that a conference committee be appointed. All in favor, indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries. The Secretary shall so inform the House. All right. Any other Member have a bill on the Calendar they wish to move at this point? Senator Marovitz.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Yes, Mr. President. On the Order of Non-Concurrence, Page 12 on the -- on the Calendar. House Bill 519.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. With leave of the Body, we'll move to the regular Calendar, Page 12 on the Order of Secretary's Desk, Non-Concurrence is House Bill 519. Mr. Secretary.

ACTING SECRETARY: (MR. HARRY)

Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 519.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Senator Marovitz.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

Thank you very much, Mr. President. I would move that the Senate non-concur with...

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PRESIDENT ROCK:

No. Refuse to recede.

SENATOR MAROVITZ:

...Excuse me. I am sorry. Refuse to recede from Senate Amendment No. 1.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. Senator Marovitz has moved the Senate refuse to recede from the adoption of Senate Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 519, that a conference committee be appointed. All in favor, indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries, and the Secretary shall so inform the House. Further business to come before the Senate? Senator Mahar, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR MAHAR:

Mr. President, if it's not too late, can I move to concur with Senate Bill 1017?

PRESIDENT ROCK:

It's too late. ...(machine cutoff)... Messages from the House.

SECRETARY HAWKER:

A Message from the House by Mr. O'Brien, Clerk.

Mr. President - I am directed to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives has refused to recede from their Amendment No. -- Amendment No. 1 and 2 to a bill of the following title, to wit:

Senate Bill 97.

I am further directed to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives requests a First Committee of Conference to consider the differences of the two houses in regard to the amendments to the bill. The action was taken by the House June 27, 1989.

I have like messages on Senate Bill -- Senate Bills 243, 505,

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525, 667, 819, 922 and 1179.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. Senator Demuzio moves that the Senate accede to the request of the House for those conference committees. They are all agreed to, I am told. All in favor, indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it, and the motion carries. Senator Geo-Karis, for what purpose do you arise, ma'am?

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, there will be a Republican Caucus in Senator James "Pate" Philip's office immediately after the finish of this Session.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

All right. Further business to come before the Senate? Senator Kustra.

SENATOR KUSTRA:

Thank -- thank you, Mr. President. Earlier...

PRESIDENT ROCK:

If we can have your attention, we've only got about one more minute of business, Ladies and Gentlemen. Just give us your attention for a minute.

SENATOR KUSTRA:

Thank you, Mr. President. Earlier this Session, there was the Sixteenth Annual Legislative Tennis Tourney, and some of our Members participated. The results are in after weeks of scoring. And I see Senator Berman over there laughing - he came in second this year, as opposed to first. He was a finalist, though. His partner was former Senate staffer, Steve Schneider. Another Senate staff person, Darell Widen, came in third with Illinois Bell's Jack Suter. And of course, the top winner - the number one place this year - and that's the reason why I am announcing this, 'cause usually, of course, my seatmate, Senator Watson, makes this announcement. And for all of you who have beaten Senator Watson -

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and of course, that's most of us - this comes as great news, because next year we can all get into this tourney. The world division winner, Frank Watson. I have some trophies here that I'm supposed to give out to you guys. If you'll step this way, Senator Berman.

PRESIDENT ROCK:

Congratulations to Senators Berman and Watson. There will not be a roll call on this -- for obvious reasons. All right. Any further business? Senator Geo-Karis has requested that all the Republicans go to Senator Philip's Office, along with Senator Brookins and some others, I suppose.
