PRESIDENT PHILIP:

The regular Session of the 90th General Assembly will please come to order. Will the Members please be at their desks? Will our guests in the galleries please rise? Our prayer today will be given by Pastor Bill Davis, Lakeside Christian Church, Springfield, Illinois. Pastor Davis.

PASTOR BILL DAVIS:

(Prayer by Pastor Bill Davis)

PRESIDENT PHILIP:

...rise for the Pledge of Allegiance. Senator Sieben.

SENATOR SIEBEN:

(Pledge of Allegiance, led by Senator Sieben)

PRESIDENT PHILIP:

May -- may I have your attention? As you know -- I hope you're all wearing blue shirts today. You're supposed to be wearing blue shirts today. If everybody would please come up to the Floor of the Senate, we're going to have our annual picture taken. Well, that's two of us, I guess, Bob. And we'll stand at recess for about thirty minutes until everybody gets up here -- till the picture is done.

(SENATE STANDS IN RECESS)

(SENATE RECONVENES)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Senate will come to order. We have a special guest of Senator Bill O'Daniel, and if you would give him your attention. Senator O'Daniel.

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

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Thank you, Madam President. Members of the Senate, this morning I want to introduce a -- some very special people from down in -- in -- in my district, in -- in Crawford County. We have a -- a very gracious and generous lady here that's made some substantial contributions to some of the school systems down in our -- our district. I'll introduce them, then I want to read a -- I'd like - if you'll bear with me - to read a proclamation that -- that I've put together for them. This -- this is Mrs. Parker, here. She's our honored guest. Superintendent Allen Price. This is Ms. Julie Nye, and Ms. Virginia Vaughn. Oh. She's down here. Okay. And I have Regional Superintendent Sam White and his wife, Karen, here with us this morning. I'd like to read this proclamation that I've put together for -- for Mrs. Parker. And they're from down in Crawford County. I know there's one Senator from the north that knows where Crawford County is. Senator O'Malley has a farm down in Crawford County. He may be the next one to give a sizable contribution down there to our school systems. Anyway, I'd like to read this proclamation. It's presented by myself to Mrs. Pauline Parker and her late husband, George Parker. Says:

Whereas, it gives me great pleasure, on behalf of my colleagues in the Illinois Senate, to recognize individuals in my district for their outstanding contributions; and

Whereas, Mrs. Pauline Parker and her late husband, George, have enriched the lives of countless individuals through their generous donations to the Oblong School District; and

Whereas, during the past eleven years, Mrs. -- the Parkers have donated nearly a hundred and forty thousand dollars to provide technology for the students of the Oblong School District; and

Whereas, the only stipulation the Parkers have placed on

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their gifts has been that the money be used to help finance the school's acquisition of technology and to help the students;

Whereas, through these -- generosity, the Parkers have helped countless young people obtain the skills they need to compete for jobs which require technology and prepare them to go on to institutions of higher learning; and

Whereas, the Parkers were inspired to make their generous donations while working for the Marathon Oil Company, where they recognized that many young people coming to work for Marathon were seriously deficient in basic technology training needed for entry-level employment with the company; and

Whereas, school officials believe this was the first time in the history of Oblong School District that individuals with no children in the school system or no other direct connections to the school system have made such a significant gift; and

Whereas, in recognition of their generosity, the Oblong School District has named a Business Lab, an Elementary School Computer Lab and a Graphic Arts Lab after the Parkers; and

Whereas, George Parker, unfortunately, did not live to see the dedication of the Parker Elementary School Computer Lab in 1995, having passed away shortly before the Lab was completed;

Whereas, the Parker's generous -- generosity also extends beyond the Oblong School District, as they have made generous contributions and donations to the Lincoln Trail College, to the Hutsonville, Palestine and Robinson School Districts; and

Whereas, the Parker's legacy has touched literally thousands of young people in Oblong and Crawford County, and the citizens of Oblong and -- and Crawford County hold a

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special place in their hearts for the Parkers; they're so --
therefore, be it

Resolved, that I'm proud and honored to have the -- on
behalf of the Illinois Senate, to recognize George and Pauline
Parker for their extraordinary contributions to the children
of Oblong and Crawford County; and be it further

Resolved, that this proclamation be presented to Mrs.
Pauline Parker, along with our best wishes for good health,
happiness and prosperity in all of her future endeavors.

Thank you, Mrs. Parker, and thank all of you for your attention.
Mrs. Parker would like to say a word or two.

MRS. PAULINE PARKER:

(Remarks by Mrs. Pauline Parker)

SENATOR O'DANIEL:

Thank all of you for your attention. Appreciate it very much.

Senator Hawkinson, Chair of the Committee on Judiciary, reports House Bill 1422 Do Pass.

They're both death resolutions, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Consent Calendar.

SECRETARY HARRY:

Senate Resolution 159, offered by Senator O'Malley.

It's substantive.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

We're going to go to the Supplemental Calendar No. 1. First on the call will be Senate Resolution 141. Senator Klemm? Mr.

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Secretary, read the resolution.

SECRETARY HARRY:

Senate Resolution 141, offered by Senator Klemm.

The Committee on Executive adopted one amendment. There were no Floor amendments, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Senator Klemm.

SENATOR KLEMM:

Thank you, Madam President. Excuse me, my microphone is falling over here. But -- bear with me, please. Senate Resolution 141 creates the Highway Improvement Task Force that we heard yesterday in the Executive Committee. It is a bipartisan task force looking at a number of projects, as far as transportation, highway construction, how we fund it, how we distribute the dollars - what we really do for highway and mass transportation in Illinois. As you know, there's been a request for tax increases. As you know, we're short for dollars for construction under our highway fund because of the absence of money from the federal government. This is a task force that would look into that, make its recommendations by December 1st. It's seven Members - three for the Minority, three for the Majority, with the Leaders appointing those positions, with the Chairperson by the President of the Senate. It was passed unanimously by the committee. I ask for your support. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Is there any discussion? Is there any discussion? Seeing none, Senator Klemm moves the adoption of Senate Resolution 141. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 53 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. Senate Resolution 141, having received the required constitutional vote, is adopted. Conference

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Committee Reports. House Bill 597. Senator Thomas Walsh. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

SECRETARY HARRY:

First Conference Committee Report on House Bill 597.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Senator Walsh.

SENATOR T. WALSH:

...you, Madam President. The First Conference Committee Report on House Bill 597 does five things. It clarifies and corrects two changes which occurred under House Bill 2211, a major rewrite of several lending laws which passed during the 1997 spring Session. It corrects a drafting error in House Bill 1283, which passed during the 1997 spring Session, in which it would extend to lenders who are not even escrowing property taxes, penalties for the delinquent property -- payment of property taxes. It removes the prohibition against using the word "housing" in a corporate name. It corrects a number of provisions contained in Senate Bill 406, which passed during the 1997 spring Session and which provided for the registration of check-printing companies and a process for verifying the accuracy of check-printing orders. And it creates the Financial Institutions Digital Signature Act to establish that electronic or computer-generated documents shall have the same force and effect as those recorded on paper and that digital signatures shall have the same force and effect as manual signatures. I don't know of any opposition.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Is there any discussion? Is there any discussion? Senator Cullerton.

SENATOR CULLERTON:

Will the sponsor yield?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

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Indicates he'll yield, Senator Cullerton.

SENATOR CULLERTON:

Senator, could you tell me a little bit more about the digital signature aspect of the legislation? Where did that come from? And if -- are there any other states that have it?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Senator Walsh.

SENATOR T. WALSH:

There are -- California has it. This is a -- a -- an initiative of the -- of the Harris Bank. There is an Attorney General task force that is looking at digital signatures, kind of across the board. What we have done here is that we have taken it -- and we are allowing FDIC-insured banks, savings and loans, anybody that's insured under the FDIC, to use digital signatures. It's -- it is a relatively new idea.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Senator Cullerton.

SENATOR CULLERTON:

Maybe you don't know this, but how does it work? I mean, does it allow for someone to have -- on a computer to have a -- some kind of a -- of a code or a signature, like a fingerprint, that you can therefore communicate over -- over the computers without actually having -- having someone in person? Does this apply just to banks? Does it apply to everyday activities? Can people sign wills and -- the same way that they would do this in person?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Senator Walsh.

SENATOR T. WALSH:

Senator, as I said, it's only federally insured financial institutions. And the way that it -- the way that it works is, yes, there'll be a -- you'll -- you'll get a number or -- you know, and you will have -- you will have a code and they -- they

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-- the way they -- they explained it to me is that the likelihood of anybody getting your code number is, you know, very, very slim, and... Again, these are -- these are federally insured financial institutions. If there was ever the chance that somebody could break into your account and you were to lose money, the bank would be the one responsible for the funds.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Is there any further discussion? Further discussion? Seeing none, Senator Walsh, to close. On that question, shall -- the question is, shall the Senate adopt Conference Committee Report, House Bill 597. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have -- have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 54 Ayes, no Nays, 1 voting Present. The Senate does adopt the Conference Committee Report on House Bill 597. And the bill, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Now we're going to go to page 6 on the regular Calendar. It'll be Motions in Writing to Accept Special {sic} (Specific) Recommendations for Change. Senator Hendon, for what purpose do you seek recognition?
SENATOR HENDON:

Thank you, Madam President. Just a point of personal privilege. Are we going to have a resolution for Harry Caray today? Because I think we should. He passed yesterday. Okay. We're working on one? Today? Or when we come back? Okay. All right. Thank you...(microphone cutoff)...President. I just wanted...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

WAND-TV has requested permission to videotape. Any objection? Hearing no objection, it is so ordered. Senator Radogno, on Senate Bill 9? Motions in Writing. Mr. Secretary, read the motion, please.

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SECRETARY HARRY:

I move to accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to Senate Bill 9, in the manner and form as follows:

Amendment to Senate Bill 9

in Acceptance of the Governor's Recommendations

The motion filed by Senator Radogno.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Senator Radogno.

SENATOR RADOGNO:

Yes. I move that we accept special {sic} (specific) recommendations of the Governor on Senate Bill 9. Those recommendations are technical changes that clarify the sentencing provisions in the bill. They clarify the provisions that relate to repeat offenders and the -- and make sure that the provisions apply to second and third violations - not just the second and third violations, but all violations, unless the felony provisions have been triggered.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Is there any discussion? Senator Cullerton.

SENATOR CULLERTON:

What's the crime we're talking about in this bill?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Senator Radogno.

SENATOR RADOGNO:

This was the bill regarding Internet harassment, making that an offense - basically taking the obscene telephone legislation and bringing it into the computer age.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Further discussion? Further discussion? Seeing none, Senator Radogno has moved to accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to Senate Bill 9. All those in favor will vote Aye. All opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. ...all voted who

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wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 54 Ayes, no Nays, none voting Present. On that -- or, the specific recommendations of the Governor as to Senate Bill 9, having received the required constitutional majority, is adopted. Senator Radogno, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR RADOGNO:

I would like the record to reflect that on the last vote, my switch apparently was not working, as it wasn't reflected on the boards, and I would have voted in favor of that. Thanks.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

That will so reflect. Mr. Secretary, have there been any motions filed?

SECRETARY HARRY:

Yes, Madam President. Senator Shaw has filed a motion with respect to House Bill 1268.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Mr. Secretary, the Chair requests that these motions be printed on the Calendar. So ordered. Resolutions Consent Calendar. We'll now proceed to the Order of Resolutions Consent Calendar. With the leave of the Body, all those that were read in today will be added to the -- the Calendar. Mr. Secretary, have there been any objections filed to any resolution?
