PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Hunter.

SENATOR HUNTER:

Thank you -- thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. House Bill 2664 strengthens the State's existing diesel vehicle no idling law. The -- it

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increases the fines for excessive truck and bus engine idling. The legislation allows local governments, for the first time, to keep some of the proceeds and allocates a portion of the violation money to be used by the Illinois EPA for idling education. This is the Treasurer's bill. And I'm doing this bill also on -- for one of my aldermen of the -- 42nd Ward. Ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Senator Burzynski.

SENATOR BURZYNSKI:

Thank you, Mr. President. Since we're going to do a piece of legislation, it's only right that we should have some debate, some thoughtful consideration of this fine piece of legislation that the good Senator's bringing forward. I'd like to point out to the Body that this is identical to another bill that we had earlier this year that did not pass. It only had twenty-nine I would also like to point out to the Members of the votes. General Assembly, those in the Chamber today, that this bill is opposed by the Illinois Retail Merchants Association, Waste Management, National Solid Wastes Management Association, School Management, among others. And there are a lot of concerns relative to what excessive idling is. There are a lot of concerns relative to what this means for those buses that are dropping children off at various venues in the City of Chicago or wherever they might be and to what this might mean for the trucking industry as well. So I would just encourage the Members to give thoughtful consideration and to please vote No on this bill. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

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Is there further discussion or deliberation or comment? Seeing none, Senator Hunter, to close.

SENATOR HUNTER:

Thank you, Mr. President. For the record, I'd like to clarify what was indicated. The Illinois Truckers Industry Coalition is neutral on this bill. So is the Mid-West Truckers Association, the Illinois Truckers Association, the Pork Producers, the Farm Bureau, EPA, PIRG, IEPA. The proponents are the Respiratory Health Association of Chicago, the Treasurer's Office, one of my aldermen, Citizen's Action, and the Illinois Environmental Council. And I ask for a favorable vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

The question is, shall House Bill 2664 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. And the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 40 voting Aye, 13 voting Nay, and none voting Present. House Bill 2664, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Burzynski, sir, for what purpose do you seek recognition?

SENATOR BURZYNSKI:

Well, thank you, Mr. President. I realize that that bill did get forty votes, but the Chambers are pretty sparse this morning, so I request a verification.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

A verification is always in order. And a verification has been requested by Senator Burzynski. Madam Secretary, would you read all of the affirmative votes?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Thank you. And, you know, Mr. President, I love the deliberative nature of your tone today. It's very good.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

I don't. But if you do, wonderful. I'm enjoying this. Senator Burzynski.

SENATOR BURZYNSKI:

Thank you. Let -- let me go down the list on this excessive idling fines and bills for trucks and buses just to make sure everybody that's just now entering the Chamber understands the bill that we're dealing with. Would Senator Bond be here by any chance?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is Senator Bond in the Chamber? Senator Bond. Senator Bond. Senator Bond. Does Senator Burzynski question the presence of any other Member voting in the affirmative?

SENATOR BURZYNSKI:

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Senator Crotty.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

I'm sorry, sir.

SENATOR BURZYNSKI:

Senator Crotty.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Crotty. Senator Crotty. Senator Crotty. Strike her name, Madam Secretary. Continue, Senator Burzynski, if you wish.

SENATOR BURZYNSKI:

Thank you. Senator Demuzio.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Demuzio. Senator Demuzio. Is Senator Demuzio in the Chamber? Senator Demuzio. Hearing no response, Madam Secretary, strike Senator Demuzio's name from the record.

SENATOR BURZYNSKI:

Senator Frerichs.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Frerichs. Senator Michael Frerichs. The tall, lanky Senator Michael Frerichs is not in the Chamber. Madam Secretary -- wait -- there -- nope, wrong color. Madam Secretary, please strike Senator Frerichs' name from the roll call. Senator Burzynski.

SENATOR BURZYNSKI:

Thank you. And -- and, again, for those that are just entering the Chamber, I can't believe a lot of my downstate colleagues would want to vote for this excessive idling fines. Senator Lightford.

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Senator Lightford. Senator Kimberly A. Lightford. Senator Lightford. Senator Lightford. Last call. Senator Lightford is not responding. Please strike Senator Lightford's name from the record. Senator Burzynski.

Senator Althoff.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Althoff is on your side of the aisle, Senator. You want to strike your own member?

SENATOR BURZYNSKI:

SENATOR BURZYNSKI:

Absolutely.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Althoff. Senator Althoff. Is Senator Althoff in the Chamber? Senator Althoff. Madam Secretary, hearing no response, please strike Senator Althoff's name from the record. Senator Burzynski, any further Senators being -- presence being questioned?

SENATOR BURZYNSKI:

Yes, Senator Sandoval.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Sandoval. Senator Marty Sandoval. Is Senator Sandoval in the Chamber? Madam Secretary -- here comes Senator Sandoval? Senator Sandoval, not being present, please strike his name from the record. Senator Burzynski.

SENATOR BURZYNSKI:

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Millner. Senator Millner. Another fine Republican, bright and intelligent gentleman. Senator Millner. My good friend Senator Millner is not responding. Seeing Senator Millner not being in the Chamber, the Secretary's instructed to strike his name from the affirmative roll call. Senator Burzynski. Do you question any further Members voting in the affirmative, Senator Burzynski? If not, we're going to move along and pick up the pace. Senator Burzynski. Senator Millner is now back in the Chamber. Senator Millner has just left out of the Chamber. Will our guests please rise? Young lady and your parents, welcome to the Illinois Senate. Welcome. Senator Schoenberg, for what purpose do you rise, sir?

SENATOR SCHOENBERG:

Mr. President, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

State your brief point, sir.

SENATOR SCHOENBERG:

Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, it is my great pleasure to be joined today by my Page, Zach Hennenfent. Zach is actually a constituent of Senator Duffy's in Barrington. He -- his -- in sixth grade at the Station Middle School in Barrington. His -- he's a spelling bee champion, a scholastic bowl team tournament winner; he's an honor student and he believes in community service. Sounds to me like we are grooming Senator Duffy's successor today. Please welcome him and his father, Greg, who's in the...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Welcome, Zach. Welcome to the Illinois Senate, Zach. Welcome. Okay, we're going to go to substantial Senate action right now. Supplemental Calendars have been distributed. Should be on your desks. Well, let's distribute those Supplemental Calendars right now. It's Friday. Senator Dillard, sir, for what purpose do you seek recognition of the Chair, sir?

SENATOR DILLARD:

Thank you. Point of parliamentary inquiry, if I may, Mr.

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President. I have, on behalf of our caucus, filed a -- a motion to discharge from further consideration from the Committee on Assignments Senate Floor Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 350, which is the Collins Reform Commission report. And I was curious if the new schedule or new -- or the new Calendar that is being distributed has that motion on it.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Dillard, the Presiding Officer, which is myself, has just received your motion. So, of course, it would not be on the Calendar that quick. We're going to move. Senator Viverito, for what purpose do you seek recognition, sir? Senator Viverito, do you seek recognition, sir? SENATOR VIVERITO:

Yes, personal privilege, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

State your point.

SENATOR VIVERITO:

I would like to -- everyone if you'd pay attention to me for just a moment. We have a very honorable person that's in this Body that's very distinguished today because he's having a birthday. And he just was bestowed with the doctor's degree. Our good friend, Ed Maloney.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Doctor Maloney, congratulations, sir. And while we're waiting for that Calendar to be distributed and Ed is standing up, let me just say what a great job he did in left field in the Senate/House softball game. I wanted to talk about it yesterday, but we had so much on the Calendar and so much to do. But everyone did a great job. I wanted to especially thank the

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newbies. We had some newbies who did a fantastic job, especially Senator Duffy. And Senator Hultgren made a catch over the back of his head. God only knows how he caught that ball. Senator Steans looked good in her -- her outfit. She didn't do anything on the softball -- field, but she looked good. Senator Hunter did great. Senator Hutchinson did great. And we beat the House once again, bipartisan cooperation. And I'm sure everyone knows "skinny legs" - I didn't name him that; they named them that - Kwame Raoul was the most valuable player. He gave his life for the team. Give him a big hand. Next year, we go for the three-peat. Senator Schoenberg, for what purpose do you seek recognition, sir?

SENATOR SCHOENBERG:

Thank you, Mr. President. I just want to add, not only did you do -- do such a wonderful job leading us to victory, but I think that we need baseball caps for next year, because Senator Steans was wearing a Chicago Public Radio hat. And that's not a baseball cap. That might be good for the jazz festival in Grant Park. That might be good for a night at Ravinia. That might be good for a boat ride along the Chicago River - but it's not a baseball hat, Mr. President. So, let's work on that.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

We'll make sure we have hats next year. The Supplemental Calendar having been distributed, we're now going to go to it. Supplemental Calendar No. 1 is Senate Bill 51. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, this is substantial Senate action. We need your attention and cooperation so we can do this in an expedient manner. Senator Schoenberg, on Senate Bill 51. SENATOR SCHOENBERG:

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Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I move that the Senate concur with House Amendments 1 and 2...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Just one moment, Senator Schoenberg. Madam Secretary, read the -- the -- we -- we have to read the motion first and then we'll come back to Senator Schoenberg. Madam Secretary, read the motion -- please read the motion.

SECRETARY ROCK:

I move to concur with the House in the adoption of their Amendment 1 and 2 to Senate Bill 51.

Senator Schoenberg.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Schoenberg.

SENATOR SCHOENBERG:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I move that the Senate concur with House Amendments No. 1 and 2 to Senate Bill 51. And I ask that -- and if -- if we succeed, as I expect we will, in sending this concurrence to the Governor's desk, that it will be signed into law. I've worked closely with members of the Collins Commission to refine this proposal so that we provide greater independence and insulate individuals who are involved in purchasing decisions from any external influences. We do that through the appointment by Executive Ethics Commission Chief Procurement Officers that are subject to approval of the Senate. We also include State purchasing officers, procurement compliance monitors and independent internal auditors to ensure that there is nothing that's unkosher about contracting for millions of dollars in

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goods and services. We have public hearings for sole source procurements, full disclosure of subcontractors and lobbyists who make any communication on behalf of anything relating to a bid for goods or services. We provide -- we significantly strengthen the Procurement Policy Board, which has been our independent watchdog for -- for State contracts and leases. have the toughest penalties, Mr. President, in the nation for violations of the Municipal Security {sic} (Securities) Rulemaking Board rules on -- on bonds and municipal securities and political activity - even tougher than the federal laws. prohibit long-term leases and set limitations on month-to-month holdover leases. We ban the -- we ban the development of specifications for an RFP and participating in that RFP, so the IPAM -- so the IPAM abuse would never occur again. I'd be happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion on the motion? Senator Radogno. SENATOR RADOGNO:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Chamber. These are good reforms and they are long overdue. They have included a number of provisions that have been introduced over the last five years, many by the Senate Republicans. And we are pleased to see them finally come to fruition, particularly some of the contracting reforms. There's a few other things that we wish we could have included, but I do think this is really a substantial reform effort. And I appreciate the work of Senator Schoenberg and encourage everyone to vote Aye on this.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

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Further discussion? President Cullerton. SENATOR CULLERTON:

Thank you, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. I would like to congratulate Senator Schoenberg on the work on this bill. Again, to talk about the process, this is a product of the -- initially the Collins Commission. This would be the second major reform that we would have passed this year. The -- the earlier being -- dealing with our pension funds. This is the product of a lot of work between the Governor's Office, the House, the Senate, both parties. And we have more to go. And I congratulate the people that worked on it. And point out, once again, that we are very, very committed to reform in this General Assembly. Encourage an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

This is final action. The question is, shall -- does the Senate concur in House Amendments No. 1 and 2 to Senate Bill 51. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 voting Aye, none voting Nay, none voting Present. The Senate concurs in House Amendments No. 1 and No. 2 to Senate Bill 51. And the bill, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 54. Senator Garrett. Madam Secretary, please read the motion.

SECRETARY ROCK:

I move to concur with the House in the adoption of their Amendment 1 to Senate Bill 54.

Signed by Senator Garrett.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

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Senator Garrett.

SENATOR GARRETT:

Yes. Thank you very much, Mr. President. This bill also has been back and forth over the last three years. Simply, what it does is, it opens the door of State government to make sure that when there's wrongdoing and any violation of the State Ethics Act by State employees that we will have a mechanism in place to identify, punish and publicize the incidents for all to see. I'd be happy to go through all of the parts of the bill, but...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, does the Senate concur in House Amendments {sic} No. 1 to Senate Bill 54. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, vote Nay. And the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 voting Aye, none voting Nay, none voting Present. The Senate concurs in House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 54. And the bill, having received the constitutional majority, is declared passed. Now we're going to go to the Order of 3rd Reading on your Senate Calendars. On page 37 is Senate Bill 1013. The sponsorship is now Senator Kotowski. Senator Kotowski seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 1013 -- 1013 to the Order of 2nd Reading for the purposes of an amendment. Hearing no objection, leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 1013. Madam Secretary, are there any amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

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Floor Amendment 1, offered by Senator Kotowski.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Kotowski, on your amendment, sir. Floor Amendment No. 1. Yes, sir. Senator Kotowski will be explaining Floor Amendment No. 1 and there will be another amendment that will follow Floor Amendment No. 1. Senator Kotowski, on Amendment No. 1.

SENATOR KOTOWSKI:

Thank you, Mr. President. Floor No. -- Floor Amendment No. 1 is a procedural amendment that shells the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor, say Aye. Opposed, say Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Floor Amendment 10, offered by Senator Kotowski.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Kotowski, on Amendment No. 10.

SENATOR KOTOWSKI:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Floor Amendment No. 10 retains Senate Bill 1013, as amended, and creates the Public Corruption (Profit) Forfeiture Act, modeled on the Narcotics Profit Forfeiture Act, which requires the forfeiture of the profits from bribery, kickbacks and extortion, together with all campaign contributions, upon conviction for bribery, kickbacks and extortion.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor,

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say Aye. Opposed, say Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 1013. Madam Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Bill 1013.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Kotowski.

SENATOR KOTOWSKI:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. The inspiration of this Act is -- the provisions of the Public Corruption Profit Forfeiture Act are modeled on those of the Narcotics Profit Forfeiture Act. Apart from the provisions relating to the forfeiture of campaign contributions, all of the provisions of the Public Corruption Profit Forfeiture Act are based on language and procedures which are well litigated and withstood repeated court challenges. What, essentially, instigates this is -- the triggering offenses are intimidation by a public official, bribery and kickbacks. This is an opportunity, through this legislation, to go after the assets of people who violated the public trust and committed acts of political corruption - more specifically, to go after their campaign funds, as well as to make sure we do a better job in

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confronting corruption and addressing pay-to-play politics in our State.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Any discussion? Senator Dillard. Senator Jacobs.

SENATOR JACOBS:

Mr. President, is there a reason why there's no analysis for the bill?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Jacobs, we'll make sure that you get an analysis. Is there any further discussion? Seeing none -- oh, Senator Jacobs.

SENATOR JACOBS:

Senator, could you -- could you describe for the -- for the future what "intimidation by a public official" actually means, so that we can all understand exactly what it is you're outlawing?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Kotowski.

SENATOR KOTOWSKI:

Thank you, Mr. -- thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator. Intimidation is -- while Illinois does not have a crime with the label of extortion, extortion is criminalized in Illinois as intimidation. Under the model legislation that Illinois adopted as the Criminal Code of 1961, when the person doing the extorting is a public official, subsection (a)(6) of intimidation provides an extended term of two to ten years for a Class 3 felony.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any further discussion? Seeing none, the question

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is -- all those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. And the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 58 voting Aye, none voting Nay, none voting Present. Senate Bill 1013, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Page 26 of your Calendar. Please turn your Calendar to page 26, is Senate Bill 744. Senator Link. Madam Secretary, read the bill on Senate Bill 744. Senator Link seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 744 to the Order of 2nd Reading for the purposes of an amendment. Hearing no objection, leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 744. Madam Secretary, are there any amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Floor Amendment 2, offered by Senator Link.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link, on Amendment No. 2. Quiet in the Chamber. Senator Link.

SENATOR LINK:

I would ask that we table Amendment No. 2.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Amendment No. 2 is -- has been tabled by the sponsor. Madam Secretary -- Madam Secretary, we're tabling Amendment No. 2. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Floor Amendment 3, offered by Senator Link.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link, on Amendment No. 3.

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SENATOR LINK:

I would ask that Amendment No. 3 be tabled also.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Amendment No. 3 is also tabled. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Floor Amendment 4, offered by Senator Link.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link, to describe Amendment No. 4.

SENATOR LINK:

I would ask to table -- Amendment No. 4 be tabled also, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Floor Amendment No. 4 is tabled. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Floor Amendment 5, offered by Senator Link.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link, on Amendment No. 5.

SENATOR LINK:

Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment No. 5 becomes the bill. I'll be more than happy to explain it on 3rd Reading.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, say Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Floor Amendment 6, offered by Senator Link.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link, on Amendment 6.

SENATOR LINK:

Amendment No. 6 is part of the cleanup on it. And I'll be more than happy to explain it on 3rd Reading.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, say Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Floor Amendment 7, offered by Senator Link.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link, on Amendment 7.

SENATOR LINK:

Amendment No. 7 is also a cleanup. And I'll be more than happy to explain it all on -- on 3rd Reading.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor, say Aye. Opposed, say Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 744. Madam Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Bill 744.

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(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link. Senator Link.

SENATOR LINK:

Thank you, Mr. President. This bill is a major -- major modification of the gaming industry in Illinois. It will help -- this is -- I -- I want to make this very clear. business type of approach. We -- we look at this - and I want to make it very clear - we look at an industry, when we're talking about thousands and thousands of jobs in the State of Illinois, that brings us billion dollars in tax revenue, we look at it very favorable. And I think what we should be doing is looking the same way with this type of industry. What we are looking at is an additional three casinos in the State of Illinois. One would be located in Rockford in Winnebago County, one in Park City in Lake County, and one in the City of Chicago. We would also be looking to allow slots at the race -- five racetracks in the State of Illinois to be owned by the nine existing riverboats. We would also allow the existing casinos to go from twelve hundred positions to two thousand positions and also to go land-based if they desire. This is basically the contents of this bill. I'll be more than happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Senator Dillard. Senator Dillard, sir.

SENATOR DILLARD:

Thank you, Mr. President. I know it's late on a Friday

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afternoon, but I do want Members who didn't serve on the Gaming Committee to be very clear what's in here. First, and above all, this would make Illinois, if it became law, the largest revenue-producing gaming state in America. More than Atlantic City, more than Nevada. This allows land-based casinos - a major, major policy change of the State of Illinois. It gives the City of Chicago a special status in the gaming industry and it allows them to take twice. They get the money as the operator and they get the fifty million dollars as the local governmental unit. So they take twice, while other riverboats only take once. We have a major, major structural budget deficit in Illinois, and maybe we want to talk about using that extra fifty million dollars, the supplemental fifty million to the City of Chicago, for other needs. I don't know, but we ought to discuss it and we ought to make it part of our budget Additionally, the -- there are eight hundred negotiations. positions that currently existing riverboats get in here for slots and those are no bid. No bid at all. We just give 'em eight hundred positions. So, I just want to point out -- I don't -- I think most of you all know where you are on gambling issues. But we just legalized slots in bars all over the --State of Illinois forty-eight hours ago. This is a gigantic expansion that would make Illinois, replacing Nevada, as the number one gaming-dependent State in America. I'm going to vote No, like I did in committee. It's a little early to do this. I think this bill needs refinements. There are portions of it I want. And I'm not opposed to a Chicago casino. But I just think we ought to, at a time when the State is dying for revenue, have some tougher negotiations about who's taking what

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out of this bill. So I'm going to vote No. But I just wanted to warn people, this is a huge, huge jump forward, as we made that vote the other day, to send Illinois down the State of the land of gambling.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

The Chair understands the importance of this bill. The Chair would also appreciate succinct discussion on this bill. Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. To the bill: First of all, I want to say thank you to Senator Link for the hours of work that he has done on this legislation, working with an awful lot of organizations to try to get support and build consensus, which is very difficult to do when you're dealing with so many sources. Is this bill perfect? No. Is there a likelihood that there's going to be more in additional changes as this bill works its way through the House? I think that answer is -- is But, clearly, we understand that other states have declared war on Illinois. All you have to do is look at the map of the five surrounding states and you'll see the number of facilities that have been built on the Illinois border so they can attract Illinois taxpayers, Illinois families to leave Illinois and go to our surrounding states. Along the Wisconsin border - that represents the areas that Senator Link and myself represent - the plan is to build massive Indian casinos. would be devastating to northern Illinois. The issue isn't about expanding gaming. Gaming is here. The issue -- this is an opportunity for Illinois to, number one, defend itself, but, number two, also create a tourism spot for Illinois, especially

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when it comes to Chicago. To the issue of land-based: It's interesting, years ago, when the legislation was first passed, the goal was to say let's put it on the water so these facilities wouldn't look large and massive. Well, the reality is, land-based makes it less - thank you - land-based makes it -- less noticeable. These days, the land-based facilities are usually built inside a hotel. So, for those people who are concerned that it's a -- becomes a big eyesore and a standout in a community, actually what happens, it becomes really more of a -- a setting in a -- in a -- a tourism -- in a tourism area of a community. The last thing I want to talk about is the fact of -- of jobs and revenue. Illinois still has not recovered from the last recession. We need jobs. And this is not just about the jobs that come with gaming; it's about all the ancillary business that comes with it. Not just the construction. But most of these are the -- the domino effect, that if a -- a casino is built, along with it become -- comes other options, other revenue-producing hotels and entertainment facilities. So, from a job standpoint, it's significant. And for the State of Illinois that's looking desperately for revenue, this is a way to generate significant revenue, with much of this money being paid for by out-of-state individuals as opposed to Illinois taxpayers. Again...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Could you wrap it up, Senator Syverson? There are six additional speakers that the Presiding Officer is going to recognize and only those six. Could you wrap it up, Senator Syverson?

SENATOR SYVERSON:

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Yes, I will. Thank you, Mr. President. So, I want to just wrap it up by saying, yes, there -- I think there needs to be some -- some improvements made and I think there will be some more work done on these, but this is crucial to Illinois' economy and to those areas that are suffering the greatest that this legislation really affects. And I want to thank Senator Link for his leadership on this and the fact that he was able to bring so many parties together to make this happen. Thank you. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

<u>Chicago Tribune</u> seeks leave to take photographs. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Maloney.

SENATOR MALONEY:

Thank you, Mr. President. Question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

He indicates he will yield. Senator Maloney.

SENATOR MALONEY:

Senator Link, in the last time we did this - I believe it was last year we passed a -- a huge gaming bill - there was extremely detailed data available as to which particular groups were in favor of this - labor groups, various municipalities. In our analysis, we don't have that. I -- I just don't know if labor is in favor of this, if the City of Chicago is in favor of this. I don't -- unless they slipped it. I wasn't in the Gaming Committee. But, if you could give me an...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link.

SENATOR LINK:

City of Chicago came in and they did not slip it, but they had their lobbyist come in there and spoke. And they said that

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they would like to see this bill in its entirety continue on and become law.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link, he asked you about organized labor. I -could you answer that follow-up question for Senator Maloney,
please? Senator Link.

SENATOR LINK:

As far as the other groups, we have got consensus of all the tracks, all the boats, all the people that have come in there. We have opened this process up to everybody. We know of no opposition from anyone other than one track that is opposed to this.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Maloney.

SENATOR MALONEY:

Okay, and -- and one final question: Could you again explain the rationale for the location choices for the -- for the -- for the new boats?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link.

SENATOR LINK:

Well, first of all, I wanted to make sure that there was transparity {sic} in this bill, that everyone knows what's going on, because we have lost a lot of money with the -- the way the Gaming Board handled the last couple bidding processes. So what we did is we named these two locations -- three locations - the City of Chicago, which is long overdue; the other two locations was for stopping the influx into Wisconsin, which we were losing. And the idea of slots going to the track would take

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care of the south suburbs, because you will have over three thousand slots going into the south suburbs and the Chicago boat when it comes on the line.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Meeks.

SENATOR MEEKS:

Thank you so much, Mr. Chairman {sic}. To the bill: hope that we all can pay special attention to what we're getting ready to do here again in the Illinois Senate. Since I've been a Member - Mr. Chairman, I can't hear myself - since I've been a Member of the Illinois Senate, I think we've passed four gaming bills. I agree with Senator Dillard: Illinois is now the home of gambling. I've heard and -- I -- I listened at all of the speakers speak and I've heard people congratulating individuals for working hard on their gaming proposals. I've heard people congratulating individuals that we now will have video poker machines in all the restaurants and all the bars. I've heard people congratulating individuals that we'll now have the ability to access the Illinois Lottery in our own living room. I can't wait. But I haven't heard since I've been here -- I haven't heard since I've been here in seven years, anybody being able to stand up and to congratulate somebody for working hard on school funding reform and for being able to get school funding passed. Yet, every year, we run on it. We tell the people of the State of Illinois, "If you vote for us, we're going to fix your schools." But what do we do and what have we done this year? We've given them gaming, more boats, more slots, video poker - which is the crack of all gaming - and now we stand here and we are ready to vote on some additional gaming

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and some additional votes {sic} (boats). We have in Illinois a Gaming Board, and I thought, maybe I'm mistaken - I don't know everything there is to know about this process - but I thought the Gaming Board decided where boats go. I thought the Gaming Board decided that based on the economic condition of certain neighborhoods, that's where they will locate. I -- I didn't -- I -- I -- that whole process was skipped. And so we're just writing now into legislation where boats should go. It's too much. It's time to stop. We have to look and get a hold of ourselves and see what we're doing here in the Illinois Senate. We are allowing our country, we are allowing our State to go down the tube. And somebody, I hope, would have enough conscience to give this vote a red light, because enough is enough. Video poker, gaming enough is enough. I like Terry Link, but I hate all of these gaming ideas.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Further discussion? President John Cullerton. President Cullerton.

SENATOR CULLERTON:

Yes. Thank you, Mr. Speaker {sic}, Members of the Senate. I just wanted to mention and point out that, in the past, we've had a capital bill here in the Senate. We attempted to pass that and fund that with a -- a bunch of gaming, and we actually passed -- passed that a couple of years ago. The problem was that we were trying to reach a magic number of a billion dollars and the gaming bill itself became an unpassable and unreachable goal. So, we asked Senator Link this year to not have to worry about the burden of funding a capital bill, but rather talk to all the interest groups to see if he could reach a consensus.

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Now, I'm not a gambler myself. I don't like gambling. I would like -- as many of you may know, even the video gaming was not my favorite part of our capital bill. But it turns out, in a year like this, when we need money, nobody wants to vote for a tax increase and they say "What about gaming? What about gaming?" Well, this is a responsible gaming bill. It is an increase in gaming, but the interest groups, who rarely get together, have come together on this one. So, I think, we should seriously consider this as an alternative to some of the cuts or taxes that we may have to consider as an alternative in this worst economic crisis of my generation. This is unfortunately one of those times and this is an alternative which I think we should take seriously. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

On another matter, Mr. President. President Cullerton. SENATOR CULLERTON:

Oh, yes. And if we finish our legislative business in the next few minutes or so with a few more bills, we will then be able to cancel Session tomorrow. So, we will not have to be in Session tomorrow. We'll come back at noon on Tuesday, because I think we can get our legislative business completed this afternoon.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

That in mind, Senator Frerichs.

SENATOR FRERICHS:

Mr. President, question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

He indicates he will yield for a question or two. Senator Frerichs.

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SENATOR FRERICHS:

I'll -- I'll try and be quick. I haven't had time to read the entire bill. I understand that there are some spots designated in here. Are there any locations south of Interstate 80 in your bill?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link.

SENATOR LINK:

No.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Frerichs.

SENATOR FRERICHS:

It's my understanding -- I want to thank Reverend Meeks --Reverend Senator Meeks for his discussion about the original intent of this bill was to help disadvantaged communities. If you look at a map of Illinois, you look at gambling locations, you have some around the Chicago area, you have a lot along rivers on the western side of this State, nothing on the eastern side of the State. We have a community, Danville, Illinois, which is economically disadvantaged, right on the border, would be a community that would benefit from this, would draw about sixty percent of its revenues from the State of Indiana. think the best kind of money we can raise for the State are Hoosier dollars, rather than dollars from the State of Illinois. I would like to see it included in a -- in a bill expansion -the State of Illinois. I hate to outright request a -- a red vote for Senator Link on a week when he's already had his red light bill go down with so many red votes. But, unfortunately, I can't support this bill in its current form.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Further discussion? Senator John Jones.

SENATOR J. JONES:

Thank -- thank you, Mr. President. Just a -- just a couple of comments and then I have a legislative intent that I would like to ask Senator Link. And as I look at this piece of legislation, you know, I -- I do have some concerns with it because the tenth license, there's still two percent goes to Chicago State University and -- and that -- it's about nine million a year, and then there's two percent that goes to Cook County, which that's another nine million dollars a year. is about sixty-seven million that goes to the horseracing industry and -- and that's good. And then there's about fifty million that goes to the City of Chicago for a year. So for the legislative intent, though, Senator Link, there's -- there's questions out there that the quarter horsemen will receive two hundred and fifty thousand dollars a year and there's -- there's a question of whether that's from -- from each one of the -- the electronic gaming facilities or just one. So my -- my question to you is: I see in the bill that some funds are dedicated to quarter horse purses. Can you tell me how much will go into those funds and those purses?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link.

SENATOR LINK:

It is the legislative intent to have all the tracks give two hundred and fifty thousand in an aggregated amount, not individually, to the quarter horsemen.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

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Senator Holmes.

SENATOR HOLMES:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to speak on the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

To the bill, ma'am.

SENATOR HOLMES:

I was going to say -- many of you know that I have casinos in my district and therefore I tend to vote very much in favor of what is good for our boats. And I just want to say -- and that's because I've got fifteen hundred people in my district employed by those boats. I just want to say that we've sat here for how many years talking about gaming bills and we always pit the casinos against the racetracks. It is so nice to finally see a bill that has the approval of both sides. So I want to thank the sponsor for working so hard to get the tracks and the boats on the same side of this issue, because I think that is a great, great achievement. And I also want to say, let's not be hypocritical here. Gambling has been a factor in Illinois for decades. Is it a problem for some? Yes. Is drinking a problem for some? Yes. But nobody's sitting here advocating that we close down all the bars. Let's not forget the millions of dollars we as a State take in because of gaming. And in this tough, tough economic time, we in Illinois do need that money. On top of that, we also need to create jobs, and expanding gaming will do that for us. So, I want to say, I urge a strong And when you talk about where these casinos are Aye vote. located, as a State, being that we take fifty percent off the top, it benefits all the residents of Illinois. And I urge an Aye vote.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Final speaker. Senator Jacobs.

SENATOR JACOBS:

I just want to begin by thanking Senator Meeks for his work on school reform. He's really worked hard. I appreciate it. I think it's a admirable thing you're trying to do. It's tough to convince voters that you will lower their property taxes and raise their income taxes. That's a tough thing to do. It's the right thing to do, but it's a tough thing to do. It would just seem to me in these times of debit and these times of the need for tax revenue, and Governor Quinn calling for a huge massive income tax increase, that this kind of bill makes sense. Question of the sponsor. Mr. Sponsor, how much money will this generate to the State of Illinois for needed programs?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link.

SENATOR LINK:

In the first year, it's estimated approximately a hundred million dollars. When everything is online, approximately five hundred million dollars. And if economic {sic} turns to the way they were, it could approximately do a billion dollars for the State of Illinois.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Jacobs.

SENATOR JACOBS:

Isn't it true, Senator, that currently the State of Illinois generates about a billion dollars in gaming revenue that we spend in this building everyday?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

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Senator Link.

SENATOR LINK:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Jacobs.

SENATOR JACOBS:

I want to tell folks what I saw in Rock Island. I'm one of those "home of a riverboat" town and people said it was going to be the worst thing that ever happened. Eighteen years later - I want to tell you what happened - this -- the town has -- has turned around. The gaming has proved to be a powerful economic It's helped tourism. It's helped us on employment. They're among our largest employers today. Charity - these folks are very active in my community, giving charity where And I recently saw a study that, in charity is needed. moderation, seniors are helped on a health benefit by using -by going to a casino and getting out of the house and moving and enjoying themselves. I want to say this too, Zeke Giorgio {sic} (Giorgi) was the original sponsor of this bill in the House and the Illinois Lottery. And I went around the State with Zeke Giorgio {sic} and my father when they passed the original gaming bill. And Zeke Giorgio {sic} deserves a riverboat. He deserves a riverboat. My friends in Rockford are facing 14.5-percent unemployment. We better do something to help those folks. And I just want to close by saying that folks that want us to spend money need to understand that sometimes we raise it in a way that you don't like. It's not perfect, but, I'll tell you what, you go raise six billion dollars to make up the income tax and then ask your friends if they'd better {sic} go to a casino.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link, to close.

SENATOR LINK:

Thank you, Mr. President. I want to answer a few of the questions before I go into my closing. Number one, when we passed this bill, I wasn't here; but when they passed the original bill, they named all ten locations where these bills -these boats were going. And all ten communities -- or the original amount of communities at that time were designated. It wasn't a board making the decision. The regular amount - and I -- I -- I don't want to say ten, because it wasn't originally - but the original boats were designated at locations. When we allowed the Board to make this decision on the tenth license, I got to tell you, they didn't do too good of a job, because the State has lost over a billion dollars in revenue. Let me make that very clear again, over a billion dollars in revenue in taxes. And, Senator Meeks, we could have educated a lot of children with that billion dollars that we lost because of that Board and their decision. We talk about ethics and we talk about transparity {sic} in this Chamber in the last few days. This bill is transparity {sic} if ever was any, because we're spelling out everything in this bill. We're spelling out location. We're spelling out everything that's happening in this bill. The operators of these casinos will still have to go through a vetting process. They still have to go to the Gaming Board to be vetted. They still have to pass their litmus test. Everybody has to go through that, but we will know the locations. As far as my colleague asking the question why these locations and not theirs, these cities meet

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the requirement, just as every other city. We could have ten locations new in this city -- of cities that are in need of these types of facilities and these types of shot in the arm. Yes, it's been a lot of work trying to get everybody on board, but we're not helping just a small segment. We're helping the agricultural industry. We're helping the horseracing people. We're helping the horsemen. We're helping a lot of people in the State of Illinois. What this will create is a number of jobs in the State of Illinois. This will help a lot of people. When this is talked about that we will have more gaming than Atlantic City, well, it's not going to be in one location; it's all throughout the State of Illinois. And it's helping a lot of those cities. As my colleague said, go to these cities that these boats are in right now and ask 'em if they want to give it up. If they'd like to, say, "Well, we'll take it away from you and we'll give it to somewhere else", and try and take it away from 'em. They won't give it up right now, because they know what good it's done for them. They know what tax dollars it's brought in to them. Ladies and Gentlemen, we're talking about a business. We're talking about something that's helping people in this State. As my one colleague said, there's people with problems. We know that. But if we close down gaming - and when I'm talking about gaming, it's just not slots - we got to close down racetracks, we got to close down bingo, we got to close down raffles, we got to close down the lottery, we got to close down everything if we're going to close it down in this State. But guess what? Those problemed people will still find a place where to go to. What we need to do is help those people. And in this bill, there's more money going into it to help the

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problemed people that need it. What we need to do now is not put a heavier tax burden on the citizens of State of Illinois. This is a choice if people want to go to this. But it'll generate a lot of tax dollars for the people of the State of Illinois. It's a good business decision. I would ask for a -- a whole lot of green lights in this. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

This is final action. The question is, shall Senate Bill 744 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. And the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 28 voting Aye, 28 voting Nay, 1 voting Present. Senate Bill 744, having not received the required constitutional majority, is declared failed. Senator Link.

SENATOR LINK:

I would ask that it be put -- on Postponed Consideration. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link requests this bill be placed on Postponed Consideration. The bill will be placed on Postponed Consideration. Turn to page 56 of your Calendar. Top of page 56 is Senate Bill -- House Bill - 3rd Reading - 2688. Senator Clayborne. House Bill 2688. Senator Clayborne seeks leave of the Body to return House Bill 2688 to the Order of 2nd Reading for the purposes of an amendment. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill -- House Bill 2688. Madam Secretary, are there any amendments approved for consideration?

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Floor Amendment 2, offered by Senator Clayborne.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Clayborne.

SENATOR CLAYBORNE:

Thank you. This just changes the -- it's a pilot program and we changed the date that you have to apply a year from the date that it becomes effective.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, say Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is House Bill 2688. Madam Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ROCK:

House Bill 2688.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Clayborne.

SENATOR CLAYBORNE:

Yes, thank you -- thank you, Mr. President. House Bill 2688 allows for the permitting and limited testing of gasification conversion technologies on a pilot scale basis if they use municipal waste, chicken litter, distillery -- distillers grain, or switchgrass and convert them into a

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synthetic gas for use as a fuel to generate electricity.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 57 voting Aye, none voting Nay, none voting Present. Senate Bill -- House Bill 2688, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. While we have a brief moment, I -- I hope you all enjoy your weekend and your holiday. Of course, if you're on the highway, drive carefully. SENATOR RAOUL:

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? All in favor of the resolution will say Aye. Leave -- say, no. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. Senate Resolution 190. Senator Clayborne. 190, sir. Out of the record. Senate Resolution 48. Senator Steans. Senator Steans, Resolution 48. Out of the record. We're going to House Bills 3rd Reading. House Bill 3641. Senator Bomke. Madam Secretary -- Senator Bomke seeks leave of the Body to return House Bill 3641 to the Order of 2nd Reading for an amendment. Hearing no objection, leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is House Bill 3641 for Senator Bomke. Madam Secretary, are there any amendments approved for consideration?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Bomke.

SENATOR BOMKE:

Thank you, Mr. President. Floor Amendment 2 is a technical amendment.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

There any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, say Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

SECRETARY ROCK:

House Bill 3641.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Bomke.

SENATOR BOMKE:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. House Bill 3641 will establish a Children's Healthcare Partnership Pilot Program in Sangamon County to fund the provisions of various health care services by a single provider. It is subject to a federal waiver. And the technical amendment removed all opposition.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none -- Senator Hunter.

SENATOR HUNTER:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to commend the sponsor for working diligently with all of your opposition persons in order to make this bill a reality. So I'd like to congratulate you.

SENATOR RADOGNO:

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Senator, is -- am I correct in understanding that with the federal waiver that this will be cost-neutral, so this pilot program will not cost the State any money?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Bomke.

SENATOR BOMKE:

That is correct, Senator Radogno.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

This is final action. The question is, shall House Bill 3641 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?
