PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Koehler.

SENATOR KOEHLER:

This resolution designates the third full week of September of each year as "Mitochondrial Disease Awareness Week" in the State of Illinois and urges citizens of the State to observe the week with appropriate activities and programs. And this is brought to me, actually, by a friend of my district staff person whose

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family has -- they have a child with this disease. And I know that Senator Millner is also involved in this. I think the family is from, actually, his area. So, I'd appreciate support for this resolution.

SENATOR KOEHLER:

This resolution designates the date of May 1st, 2010, as "Proper Drug Disposal Day" throughout the State of Illinois and urges all citizens to recognize the need for proper adherence to medication and appropriate drug disposal across the State of Illinois. This is something we actually got from Senator Rutherford's area. They have done a program there with the high school on properly disposing unused prescription drugs. We have brought that to Peoria and it's -- it's really been very popular. It's a way of preventing these drugs from going down the toilet and affecting our water supply system. So, I'd appreciate support on this.

SENATOR LINK:

Madam Secretary, please read the resolution.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Collins.

SENATOR COLLINS:

Thank you, Madam President and Members of the Assembly. Senate Resolution 652 raises awareness for youth violence prevention and designates July 26th through August 1st, 2010, as "Ryan Harris: Hope for Children Week". Back in 1998, eleven-year-old child by the name of Ryan Harris was brutally beaten and assaulted and found dead in an Englewood park, which is in my district. The predator is now serving a life sentence. And this is just to designate the week that we protect and work against youth violence whenever it -- the perpetrators try to inflict harm on our children. So I'd ask for your support.

With leave of the Body, we will return to Senate Resolution 435. Senate Resolution 435. Senator Sandoval. He indicates he wish to proceed. Madam Secretary, please read the gentleman's resolution.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Resolution 435, offered by Senator Sandoval.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Sandoval.

SENATOR SANDOVAL:

...you -- thank you, Madam President, Members of the Illinois Senate. Senate Resolution 435 urges Congress and the President to enact H.R. 915, the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2009, into law without changes to Section 806 of the bill, which provides equal application of federal labor laws to employees performing the same task and job functions at different companies in the express carrier -- carrier industry. The proponents are UPS, Teamsters Council 25, AFL-CIO.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Resolution 435 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. Moving to Senate Joint Resolution 81. Senate Joint Resolution 81. Senate Joint Resolution 81. Senator Harmon. He indicates he wish to proceed. Madam Secretary, please read the resolution.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Joint Resolution 81, offered by Senator Harmon.

The Committee...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

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Senator Harmon.

SENATOR HARMON:

Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Park National Bank was a bank headquartered in Oak Park that had a -- a dramatic impact on the broader community, especially in Austin and on the west side of the City of Chicago. It was really the center of philanthropic giving to many community organizations on the west side and the western In October of last year, the bank was seized by the FDIC, one of many community banks in trouble in the current economy. What is particularly troubling about this seizure is that not only was the bank so integral to the community, but also, just that morning, Treasury Secretary Geithner came to Chicago and awarded the bank fifty million dollars for community grants. So, there clearly is a disconnect between Treasury and This resolution would call on the appropriate the FDIC. committees in Congress to continue to investigate the seizure of the bank by the FDIC and its broader implications for community banking. I ask for your Aye votes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Joint Resolution 81 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. Now on the order of Senate Joint Resolution 105 on the top of page 38. Senator Koehler. He indicates he wish to proceed. Madam Secretary, please read the gentleman's resolution.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Joint Resolution 105, offered by Senator Koehler.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Koehler.

SENATOR KOEHLER:

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. Senate Joint Resolution 105 urges the Department of Agriculture to implement an Internet-based geographic -- information system in order to help identify sensitive crops, foster meaningful communication between specialty growers and applicators, lessen the likelihood of pesticide drift in the agricultural community, and protect the interests of all parties involved in production of -- agriculture. The resolution directs the -- the Director of the Department of Agriculture to submit a report to the General Assembly regarding the process of implementation by December 31st of 2010. Let me just mention that this was the subject of a -- of a subcommittee hearing that we had earlier this year. There's a lot of concern in the rural areas about chemical drift from aerial spraying. This is a program that will in part be funded by the federal government and it's a good way to establish a base. If this doesn't work, then we're going to have to come back and think of something else. But I wholeheartedly ask for your support on this.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Joint Resolution -- I'm sorry. There is discussion. Senator John Jones, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR J. JONES:

Thank -- thank you, Madam President. To the resolution.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

To the resolution, Senator.

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SENATOR J. JONES:

I -- I just rise in -- in strong support of Senator Koehler's resolution here. I -- I want to commend him on -- on the work that he's put in -- in -- into this resolution and working with all the groups and organizations that's involved. I think it will work and -- and we hope that it does, but if it doesn't, then we'll come back and -- and try to do something differently. But I just wanted to commend the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Further discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Joint Resolution 105 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. Now on the order of Senate Joint Resolution 107. Senator Frerichs. He indicates he wish to proceed. Madam Secretary, please read the gentleman's resolution.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Joint Resolution 107, offered by Senator Frerichs.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Frerichs.

SENATOR FRERICHS:

Thank you very much, Madam President, Members of the Senate. Senate Joint Resolution 107 creates the Joint Task Force on Soil and Water Conservation Districts to study the history and purpose of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, the administration and organization of Soil and Water Conservation Districts, and the current and future funding of such districts, and any other topic regarding Soil and Water Conservation Districts that the Chair of the Task Force sees fit to study.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Joint Resolution 107 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. With leave of the Body, we will return to page 37. Senate Resolution 633. Senate Resolution 633. Senator Wilhelmi. He indicates he wish to proceed. Madam Secretary, please read the resolution.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Resolution 633, offered by Senator Wilhelmi.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Wilhelmi.

SENATOR WILHELMI:

Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This resolution would extend the deadline for the Re-Sellers' Task Force to submit its report. It also would allow that if the Governor is unable to fill three positions for this Task Force by a certain date, then we'd be able here in the Senate to have those positions filled thereafter. I'd be happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Now moving to page 38 with House Joint Resolution 56. Senator Garrett, on House Joint Resolution 56. She indicates she wish to proceed. Madam Secretary, please read the resolution.

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SECRETARY ROCK:

House Joint Resolution 56, offered by Senator Garrett.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Garrett.

SENATOR GARRETT:

Thank you, Madam President. House Joint Resolution 56 recommends that an Illinois Physician Workforce Institute be organized and operated as an independent, unbiased, and not-for-profit research organization whose purpose is to collect, aggregate, analyze, and distribute Illinois-specific physician workforce data to provide objective information for assisting health care, professional, and education organizations, policy makers, and the public on issues related to the supply, demand, distribution, use of physicians across the State. I'd be happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Joint Resolution 56 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. Senator Hendon in the Chair.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Terry Martin from the Illinois Channel seeks leave to videotape. Leave is granted? Leave is granted. Senate Resolution -- Senator Lightford, on Senate Resolution 643. Senator Lightford, do you wish to proceed? Madam Secretary, read the resolution.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Resolution 643, offered by Senator Lightford.
PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

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Is there any discussion? Senator Lightford. SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Resolution 643 urges President Obama and Congress to allocate two billion dollars of the next proposed economic stimulus to create an employment program throughout the year, with a particular emphasis on the summer, for seven hundred thousand youth, combining education and productive work in local neighborhoods. It's important that we put our young people to work during the summer and I hope you guys would agree.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

The question is, shall Senate Resolution 643 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, vote Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. Senate Resolution 651. Senator Lightford. Madam Secretary, please read the resolution. SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Resolution 651, offered by Senator Lightford.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Lightford.

SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Resolution 651 recognizes and congratulates members of the American Institute of Architect {sic} (Architects) for improving our communities in Illinois through architecture. The American Institute of Architects -- this week is Architect Week. It will be celebrated during the week of April 12th through April 18th of 2010. Architects are in the State Capitol today and I'm hoping that you guys will recognize them as making considerable contributions to our communities.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Resolution 651 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, vote Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. The Senate will stand at ease for a few minutes to allow the Committee on Assignments to meet. The members on the Committee on Assignments will please come to the President's Anteroom immediately. The Senate will stand at ease.

(SENATE STANDS AT EASE)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Lightford in the Chair.

(SENATE RECONVENES)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

The Senate will now come to order. Madam Secretary, Committee Reports.

SECRETARY ROCK:

But since the resolution may require the expenditure of public funds, I seek reconsideration so that we may adopt the resolution by a roll call vote, pursuant to Rule 6-11(b) {sic} (6-1(b)). And I want to thank Senator John Jones for bringing this to my attention so that we can do this in the correct way. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Having voted on the prevailing side, Senator Koehler moves to reconsider the vote by which Senate Joint Resolution 105 was adopted. Senator Righter, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Inquiry of the Chair, if I might, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Can -- can you or your trusted Parliamentarian help us with whether not it's appropriate under the Rules to reconsider a voice vote? Is there a specific provision in the Rules that we can point to that, or...?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Righter, a motion to reconsider is always in order on any action that we've already addressed. If you wouldn't

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mind taking a look at -- under Senate Rule 7-15(a). Senate Rule 7-15(a). Senator Silverstein, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR SILVERSTEIN:

Point of an announcement, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Please state your announcement.

SENATOR SILVERSTEIN:

Just announcement that the Senate Executive Committee will meet at 6:33 in Room 212.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. The Senate Executive Committee will convene in one hour in Room 212 - at 6:33. Senator Righter, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Think we're still on the -- we are still on the issue of Senator Koehler's motion to reconsider. In looking at the rule that you pointed me to, Madam President, a member who voted on the prevailing side of a -- excuse me, on the side of a record vote. There's no record of a voice vote. So I'm not sure how that could be a record vote. You don't have a record.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator -- Senator Righter, we would defer to Robert {sic} (Robert's) Rules of Order, which will, again, put us back in the position to reconsider a motion. Senator Sullivan, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR SULLIVAN:

For an announcement.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Please state your announcement, Senator.

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SENATOR SULLIVAN:

The Appropriations I Committee will meet in one hour, at the hour of 6:35, in Room 400.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Thank you, Madam President. Since we're still on the order of Senator Koehler's resolution, and -- and I -- I have no actual objection to the substantive action that Koehler's asking the Senate to undertake, but I do think it's important that we follow the rules. We go to Robert's Rules of Order when our rules are silent. On this particular issue, clearly the Rules are not silent. They say a record vote. You do not have a record of the vote on Senate Joint Resolution 105. So there may have been two or three people who indicated by their voices No. You don't really know that because you don't have a record and it requires a record vote in order to make a motion to reconsider. Having said that, Madam President, I'm not going to bother you again about that, but I -- I do think that we're being a little liberal with the interpretation of what is a pretty plainly written rule. Thank you, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. No bother, whatsoever, but we can proceed. Senator Koehler, this is only the motion to reconsider which is... All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 54 voting Aye, 0 voting Nay, 0 voting

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Present. The motion carries, and the question before the Senate is subscribed. The motion to reconsider carried; therefore, we will return to Senate Joint Resolution 105. Senator Koehler, indicates he wish to proceed. Madam Secretary, please read the resolution.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Joint Resolution 105, offered by Senator Koehler.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Koehler.

SENATOR KOEHLER:

Yes, thank you, Madam President, and thank you to the Senate for your indulgence on this. We just wanted to do this in the right way since there may be an expenditure of funds. But this is an important program. It's a voluntary program. It's helped -- it's -- it's paid in part by the U.S. federal government. But it would allow the Department of Agriculture to set up a Internet-based program in order to identify sensitive crops so that the pesticide applicators can be sure to avoid them. So, we've had good bipartisan support and I'd appreciate an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Senator John Jones, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR J. JONES:

Thank -- thank you, Madam President. Please vote Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Basically, Floor Amendment No. 2 was an initiative of the Department of Financial and Professional Regulation to bring Illinois in compliance with the Safe Act, which was passed last year. It's agreed-upon language with all the parties involved - the Illinois credit unions, Illinois Bankers Association, and the Department.

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate --This is an amendment with -- with the support of the Illinois Retail Merchants Association, the CLEAR Commission, the Cook County State's Attorneys, and the Bar Association. would allow for multiple retail thefts committed by the same person as part of a continuing course of conduct which -- may be prosecuted as such, as if it was a single crime. Also, we are increasing the felony thresholds for retail theft from one hundred and fifty to three hundred dollars and increases the felony thresholds for theft, financial crime, online theft by deception from three hundred to five hundred, which is an adjustment that hasn't been made in thirty-five years. Again, it's with the support of the Retail Merchants, the CLEAR Commission, State's Attorneys, and the Bar Association. Be happy to answer any questions and ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor,

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SENATOR TROTTER:

Thank you very much.

...on Amendment No. 1.

SENATOR TROTTER:

Yes, thank you very much, Madam President, Members of the Senate. Actually, Senate -- the Senate amendment, Floor Amendment No. 1, is a Haine amendment, and if he can present it, I'd appreciate it.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Absolutely, Senator. Senator Haine, on Floor Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 3064.

SENATOR HAINE:

Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Floor Amendment No. 1 removes a large homeowner association with a lake. It's in the middle of my district.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Trotter, for what purpose do you rise? SENATOR TROTTER:

Thank you very much, Madam President. First, to apologize to you and the Body. Senate -- Amendment No. 1 is my amendment. And Senator Haine has Amendment No. 2. The -- Amendment No. 1 lowers the required percentage of households necessary to approve the dredging and redepositing of dredged materials on common areas from fifty-one percent to thirty-three percent.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. Senator Haine, on Floor Amendment No. 1.

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SENATOR HAINE:

Thank you, Madam President. I believe that Floor Amendment No. 2, which I offered, embodies the language of Floor Amendment No. 1. So, if the Senator would withdraw No. 1, No. 2 becomes the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

On Floor Amendment No. 1, Senator Trotter, to Senate Bill 3064, is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Floor Amendment 2, offered by Senator Haine.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Now on the order of Amendment No. 2. Senator Haine.

SENATOR HAINE:

Thank you, Madam President. It takes Floor Amendment No. 1's language, but adds the provision that it is not applicable to a situation where the homeowner association with a lake has more than four hundred members. That would remove the requirements of this bill from an -- a large area named Holiday Shores, which lies in Madison County, and there's over four hundred members of that association. They don't want to be in the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Senator Trotter, is there discussion on Amendment No. 2?

SENATOR TROTTER:

This is a friendly amendment and I do accept it.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Any further discussion? Senator Dillard, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR DILLARD:

Thank you. I'll -- I'll let the sponsor and Senator Haine put their bill in any form they want to. But I want to point out that what this amendment does is it lets larger homeowners' associations, who are more likely to have the money to do a dredging project for a homeowners' association, out of these restrictions. And, you know, I understand what's going on. Senator Haine wants to exempt out a project in his district, like I would, but all he's doing is -- is -- is taking care of a problem in his district and making probably what is already a -- a questionable bill even worse. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any further discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Kotowski.

SENATOR KOTOWSKI:

Thank you, Madam President. Madam President. Thank you, Madam President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Resolution 729 recognizes March 26th as "Purple Day", a day dedicated to raising epilepsy awareness around the world. This resolution also recognizes the Purple Day Organization and their efforts to inform and dispel myths about epilepsy and seizures in general. In the State of Illinois, there's about a hundred and thirty thousand people in our State who have epilepsy and about one in ten of our citizens who have seizures. As someone who has had epilepsy since the age of 13, I think it's very important that we continue to educate people and inform them of the challenges other people have who live with epilepsy and to make sure we prevent people from suffering as a result of this illness. I would simply ask for an Aye vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Thank you, Senator. Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Resolution 729 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the

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resolution is adopted. Senator Jacobs, on House Joint Resolution 89. He indicates he wish to proceed. Madam Secretary, please read the Resolution.

SECRETARY ROCK:

House Joint Resolution 89, offered by Senator Jacobs.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Senator Jacobs.

SENATOR JACOBS:

Thank you, Madam Chairman {sic}. House Joint Resolution 89 recognizes members of the United States Armed Forces, including our own Senator Bill Haine, who served bravely and fought for our country during the Vietnam War, and establishes March 30th as "Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day". I ask for your favorable consideration.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

Is there any discussion? Senator Haine, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR HAINE:

Just to express my -- my appreciation to the sponsor for this honor and I'll see him at Augie's on March 30. He can buy me a drink.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR LIGHTFORD)

So noted. Is there any further discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Joint Resolution 89 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the resolution is adopted. Senator Hendon in the Chair.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Ladies and Gentlemen, we're going to 3rd Readings. 2812. Senator Harmon. 2812. Senator Harmon. Madam Secretary, read

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the bill.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Bill 2812.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

I strongly recommend that you be prepared and ready. The pace will quicken. Senator Harmon, on 2812. Senator Harmon. SENATOR HARMON:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 2812 is an initiative of the Illinois EPA. It clarifies the clean air permitting process and the role of the Pollution Control Board. I believe, through our amendments, we have resolved all questions and objections to the bill and I ask for your Aye votes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2812 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 53 voting Aye, 3 voting Nay, none voting Present. Senate Bill 2812, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 2820. Senator Althoff. 2820. Out of the record. Senate Bill -- we're going to skip to page 20 -- let's try page 28. Page 27. 2925. Senator Frerichs. Sir. 2925, sir. Out of the record. I recommend you look at your Calendars. We're going to move right on past you. 2950. Senator Silverstein. 2950. Out of the record. Senate Bill 2970. Emil Jones. Emil... Out of

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the record. Senate Bill 2988. Senator Pankau. 2988. Out of the record. Senate Bill 2996. Senator Lightford. Senator Lightford. Out of the record. Senate Bill -- we're going to skip past President bills and go to page 29. 3151. Senator Link. 3151. Senator Link. Are you ready to go, sir? Out of the record. Senate Bill 3152. Senator Link. Madam Secretary, read the bill. Looking -- looking for Senate Bill 3152. 3152. Senator Terry Link is the sponsor. Senator Link seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 3152 to the Order of 2nd Reading for purpose of amendment. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 3152. Madam Secretary, have there been any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Floor Amendment 2, offered by Senator Link.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link, on Amendment 2.

SENATOR LINK:

Thank you, Mr. President. Floor Amendment 2 just -- corrects some -- clerical error.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor, say Aye. Opposed, say Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there -- been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate

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Bill 3152. Madam Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Bill 3152.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Link.

SENATOR LINK:

Thank you, Mr. President. This -- any county or municipality with a -- a TIF needs to hold a status hearing on the TIF ten years after creation; needs to detail in annual budget TIF generate {sic} revenue and expenditures; needs to submit reporting data on {sic} the State Comptroller in electronic form; require the Comptroller to post the submitted information on a website; and requires the Comptroller to also report on his website those municipalities that have not submitted the required information on the TIF to his office.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Any discussion? Senator Lauzen.

SENATOR LAUZEN:

Thank you, Mr. President. This passed out of Revenue unanimously, 6-0.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Question is, shall Senate Bill 3152 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. And the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Someone needs to -- the Presiding Officer, please. Take the record. On that question, there are 54 voting Aye, 2 voting Nay, 1 voting Present. Senate Bill 3152, having

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received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 3231. Senator Sandoval. 3231, sir. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3251. Senator Sandoval. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3266. Senator Lightford. Lightford. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3267. Senator Hunter. 3267. Senator Hunter. Senator Hunter. Out of the record. The Chair would appreciate -- Senator Hunter seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 3267 to the Order of 2nd Reading for the purpose of amendment. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 3267. Madam Secretary, have there been any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Floor Amendment 3, offered by Senator Hunter.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Hunter, to explain Floor Amendment No. 3. Senator Hunter.

SENATOR HUNTER:

Thank you, Mr. President. The amendment becomes the bill and I'll explain it on 3rd...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Hearing none, all those in favor, say Aye. Opposed, say Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate

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Bill 3267. Madam Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Bill 3267.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Hunter.

SENATOR HUNTER:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 3267 seeks to address the growing problem of financial exploitation by {sic} the elderly by fostering cooperation between the Department on Aging and banking institutions. This bill requires the Department of {sic} Aging to, one - it does two things - provide financial institutions with signage and other written materials concerning financial exploitation for the elderly and, two, it develops an online training program to be used by financial institution employees with direct consumer contact.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

There any discussion? Senator Burzynski. Sir? I mean Senator Syverson. I'm sorry. Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. Question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

She indicates she will yield. Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Senator, is this the legislation that we had in committee earlier today?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Hunter.

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SENATOR HUNTER:

It is.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

I thought this was going to be -- this is legislation that was going to be held and you were going to be working with the sponsor -- or with the -- with both parties on addressing that -- that language that the -- that the bankers had - between that "shall" and "may", is it?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Hunter.

SENATOR HUNTER:

That was the recommendation of the Bankers Association, Senator. But, as it was indicated in committee, we've been working on this bill for more than three years and we just really cannot come to any resolution with the bankers at all.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Syverson, to the bill, sir.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Well, thank you. Well, this is an important piece of legislation and one that I thought was pretty clear in committee that this was going to be held and both parties were going to be working on it. This is legislation that has a dramatic and financial effect on banks, that everyone needs to understand what -- what it -- it does, in which it requires banks to now follow totally different education training programs than what they already have in place. Those training programs are -- have not even completely been established yet by the Department of --

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of {sic} Aging. The banking community is strongly opposed to this and wanted to work out some other amendments. So I -- I would urge a No vote until there's an agreement on this legislation. I understand what the sponsor is trying to do would give more protection from financial abuse, but this is going to create more problems for the banks and credit unions and, in the end, is going to, I think, cause more problems than -- than solutions. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Thank you, sir. Further discussion? Senator Crotty.

SENATOR CROTTY:

Thank you. I rise in strong support of this bill. Senator Hunter is right; we have been working on this for three years. It's been brought to my attention by quite a few of the senior organizations - one of 'em are AgeOptions, which takes in all of the south suburban area - this protects seniors from being exploited financially by -- whether it be a caregiver, a family member, and this is on the rise. And all this bill does is has the Department of {sic} Aging have materials available at the bank and it also offers training for tellers. I ask for a Aye vote. This is a very important bill for senior citizens. Thank you very much.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Hunter, to close.

SENATOR HUNTER:

In spite of what Senator Syverson indicated, the community banks did not slip anything today. The credit unions are in town. I sit on the board of a credit union. No one has said anything to me about it. This -- who cares about the banks? I

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mean, the banks are important, but they got billions of dollars in bailout. What about the seniors? Let's protect the seniors sometime. What about the people? I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Question is, shall Senate Bill 3267 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. And the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 33 voting Aye, 14 voting Nay, 1 voting Present. Senate Bill 3267, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. With leave of the Body -- Senator Althoff, I'm sorry. For what purpose do you seek recognition, ma'am? SENATOR ALTHOFF:

Thank -- thank you, Mr. President. Inadvertently, I pressed the No button on Senate Bill 3152 and it should have been a Yes. I'd like the record to reflect that. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

The record will so reflect. With leave of the Body, we're going to go back to Senator Lightford's bills. She did such a great job while in the Chair and we skipped over hers. Page 28 of your Calendar is Senate Bill 2996. Madam Secretary, read the bill. 2996.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Bill 2996.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Lightford.

SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

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Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 2996, as amended, makes various changes regarding bank regulation and pawnbroker regulations. This is a bill brought by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulations {sic} (Regulation). There is no opponents and it left the committee on a leave roll call. I'd be happy to answer questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2996 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. And the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Aye, none voting Nay, none voting Present. Senate Bill 2996, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. With leave of the Body, we're going to turn to -- ahead to your Calendar. Page 30 of your Calendar is Senate Bill 3266. Senator Lightford, on 3266. Senator Lightford seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 3266 to the Order of 2nd Reading for the purposes of an amendment. Hearing no objection, leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 3266. Madam Secretary, have there been any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Floor Amendment 1, offered by Senator Lightford.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Lightford, to explain Floor Amendment No. 1. SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the

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Senate. Senate Bill 3266 amends the Section of the School Code concerning bullying prevention and gang resistance education and training. The bill defines bullying and convenes a task force of fifteen members to review bullying causes and policies and it issues a report to the General Assembly by March 1st of 2011. I -- I want to bring to everyone's attention the importance of this task force. Bullying is a serious problem. It's a serious problem in our State. It leads to violence. We had four children last year commit suicide who were being bullied at the young age of ten, eleven and fifteen. We should not take this lightly. I'd appreciate an Aye vote. And the next time bullying comes back to this Floor, I would appreciate an Aye vote so that we can help deter violence in our schools.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor say Aye. Opposed, say Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 3266. Madam Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Bill 3266.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Lightford.

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SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 3266 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. And the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 51 voting Aye, 2 voting Nay, none voting Present. Senate Bill 3266, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 3320. Senator John Jones. 3320, sir. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3344. Senator Clayborne. Clayborne, 3344, sir. Madam Secretary -- Senator Clayborne seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 3344 to the Order of 2nd Reading for purpose of amendment. Hearing no objection, leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 3344. Madam Secretary, have there been any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

Floor Amendment 1, offered by Senator Clayborne.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Clayborne, to explain amendment.

SENATOR CLAYBORNE:

Thank you, Mr. -- Mr. -- Mr. President. Basically, what this does, this speeds up the permitting process for air and water. It's still a work in progress. There's a commitment to work with -- with AFSCME as well as IEPA to get this resolved. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

There any discussion? Seeing none, all those in favor will

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say Aye. Opposed, say Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Have there been any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ROCK:

No further amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 3344. Madam Secretary, read the bill. We just have a small glitch in the equipment and then we will read Senate Bill 3344. Madam Secretary, read the bill.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Bill 3344.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Clayborne.

SENATOR CLAYBORNE:

Thank you. This -- this requires EPA to create a permitting -- a permit expediting unit within six months of the passage of the bill for air and water construction. Also, within six months of the bill, IEPA must form and convene stakeholders group to create a priority list of suitable categories of sources eligible for general permits. Also, IEPA must adopt and expedite a process for NPDES. And also, the Illinois Pollution Control Board may adopt, by rule, construction or operating air permits for certain classes of facilities or equipment.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Senator Risinger.

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SENATOR RISINGER:

Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in support of this bill. If there ever was a bill that's pro-jobs, this is one of 'em. We need to speed this process up and to allow businesses to make their investment and to move forward and -- and to get that information as quickly as possible. So I urge an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Question is, shall Senate Bill 3344 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Aye, none voting Nay, none voting Present. Bill 3344, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 3346. Senator Steans. Out of the record. It's the intention of the Chair to get through as many bills as we can -- be -- by -- before committee at 6:30. Senate Bill 3348. Senator Steans. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3375. Senator Haine. 3375. Senator Haine, sir. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3378. Senator Haine. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3382. Senator Schoenberg. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3482. Senator Steans. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3489. Senator Steans. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3523. Senator Sandoval. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3558. Senator Sandoval. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3560. Senator Sandoval. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3619. Senator Syverson. Madam Secretary, read the gentleman's bill. SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Bill 3619.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

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3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Syverson. Are you ready, sir?

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Yep. This legislation...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. This legislation just extends the -- the industrial TIF program that's already been in place. Just extends the deadline.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 3619 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. And the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Aye, 1 voting Nay, none voting Present. Senate Bill 3619, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 3647. President Cullerton. Out of the record. Senate Bill 3702. Senator Noland. Madam Secretary, 3702, read the gentleman's bill.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senate Bill 3702.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Noland.

SENATOR NOLAND:

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Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 3702 amends the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity Law of the Civil Administration {sic} (Administrative) Code of Illinois. Authorizes the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity to establish business ownership grants and loan program for unemployed individuals who have a credible business plan. Specified for -- the purposes of -- of which the grant funds may be used. It is effective January 1st, -- or, excuse me, 2011. Ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Is there any discussion? Senator McCarter.

SENATOR McCARTER:

Question -- well, to the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

To the bill, sir, my friend, Senator McCarter.

SENATOR McCARTER:

To the bill: Despite how quickly the bill is read, it doesn't make it that -- any -- that doesn't make it any better. You know, we had a long discussion sometime ago about a five -- what five-thousand dollars is going to do for someone to start a new business. And I think we concluded that it -- it really couldn't do much as well, if it wasn't included with any kind of a mentoring program, which already exists with the SCORE Program. This isn't really a good risk and not really going to benefit that many people. So I would encourage a No vote on the vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Further discussion? Senator Lightford.

SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

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Thank you, Mr. President. To the bill: Mr. President, five thousand dollars could do a significant support to an unemployed person. The legislation that the previous speaker spoke on was legislation that passed this General Assembly last but it was specifically targeted for Session, individuals who had been released from incarceration, and it was in an effort to reintegrate them back into society and help them on their way. I want to commend the sponsor for looking at that initiative and recognizing the high unemployment rate and also giving those an opportunity to become entrepreneurs and to have an opportunity to gain funding for their families. So I support Senator Noland's legislation. I -- I rise to acknowledge these differences because I don't want us to be misled by the previous speaker's comments.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Further discussion? Senator Lauzen.

SENATOR LAUZEN:

Thank you, Mr. President. To this bill: I -- I remember rising when we had a bill, a short while ago, that it was for ex-convicted people. And now we're going to suggest that we give away five thousand dollars to unemployed people, you know, on top of, or in addition to, unemployment benefits. I don't know whether a successful small business owner should be insulted that people think that it's so easy to do businesses. But the -- the idea of this bill -- first of all, five thousand dollars. I have to agree with Senator McCarter, who runs a couple of businesses himself, that it is so much harder to make payroll, to provide services. Five thousand dollars isn't going to do it. Eighty-five percent of the people who start in

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business go out of business within three years. And you know what the primary reason for going out of business is? Undercapitalization. You know, the dream without adequate capitalization. And I got to tell you, five thousand dollars isn't going to do it. Five thousand is a lot of money, but it is not enough money to launch a -- a business. And when I hear, with a credible business plan, I just -- sometimes I just wonder what we're thinking about to propose legislation like this. I - I suggest a No vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

The Presiding Officer would like to acknowledge the presence of the esteemed, brilliant, magnificent Speaker of the House. Speaker Mike Madigan has graced us with his presence. So let's acknowledge the illustrious Speaker of the House, my personal friend, Michael J. Madigan. Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Thank you, Mr. President. Will the sponsor yield, please?
PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

He indicates he will yield for a brief question, then we're going to stop after this bill and go to Executive. Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Senator Noland, what is the definition of unemployed in the bill?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Noland.

SENATOR NOLAND:

Well, thank you, Senator Righter. The bill itself -- I mean, the term "unemployed", I think speaks for itself. But

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what you should know is that the -- the program and the grants will be going to organizations and entities - okay? - that are assisting the unemployed with developing their credible business plans and for reentry into the work force.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Senator Noland, as I'm sure you're aware, there are people who work in seasonal occupations in this State and throughout the country who, for certain limited periods of time throughout the year, are unemployed. Is it your intention that this program would be available to those individuals?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Noland.

SENATOR NOLAND:

Those rules will be largely up to the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity. I don't see a problem with that if these people were seeking to transfer into perhaps another career or some other employment objective.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Senator Noland, it -- okay, given that, then do you have in mind any cap on the amount of money that an individual could make in their other employment and not be eligible for a low-interest or no-interest loan to start up their own business?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Noland, if a brief answer, I would appreciate it. Senator Noland.

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SENATOR NOLAND:

No, I do not, except to say that many of the other tax credits that we passed earlier in this Session would probably complement their efforts.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Righter, brief response would be appreciated by the Chair. Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Noland, would the individual be required to have submitted a business development plan or a business plan before being eligible for the loan?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Noland.

SENATOR NOLAND:

Yes, that's my intention.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Righter, to the bill, sir.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

One final question, if I might, Mr. President, and then to the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Certainly, sir. Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Is -- that's your intention. Is it in the bill?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Noland. Is it in the bill, sir, or is -- are you making it your legislative intent? Senator Noland.

SENATOR NOLAND:

Well, let me speak directly to his question, and the answer

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is, yes, it's in the bill. All right? And they have to apply for certification through the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Righter, to the bill, sir.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

If I -- if I might, Mr. President. Tell me where it's at in the bill, Senator Noland?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Noland, if we can get the exact location of it in the bill, I would certainly appreciate it so we won't belabor this point. Senator Noland.

SENATOR NOLAND:

Appreciate that. Thank you, Mr. President. It's a two page bill, Senator. Do you have it in front of you? Okay. All right, we're on line 16. 15 and 16. Let me start at 14. The Department shall provide grants to organizations and entities that work with unemployed individuals to facilitate the entry or reentry of those persons into the workforce. Organizations wishing to participate in the program must present an application to the Department in order to receive funds -- or funding.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Righter, to the bill, sir, please.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

Thank...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Righter.

SENATOR RIGHTER:

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Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you. Senate Bill 3702. I think Senator Noland answered my question. The answer is no. They have to file an application - not a business plan. That's not what the bill says. It says they got to file an application. It doesn't say what's unemployed. It doesn't say how long they have to be unemployed. I mean, could you get laid off and a week later get the five-thousand-dollar loan and then two weeks later be back at your job? Do you get to keep the money then? We don't know. We don't know the answers to any of these questions. I mean, it's fine to get up and say, Mr. President, that, you know, we want to help the unemployed. But you know what? Then let's do something. This bill doesn't do anything except say, you know what, it makes me feel better to say that I am going to give a grant out to some folks and get 'em some jobs. That is not the way to help people in this State. I would urge a No vote on what is a shell of a bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Kotowski was scheduled to be the last speaker on this bill. If -- and I don't want to actually acknowledge him, but I will go briefly to Senator Kotowski. Senator Bivins, I'm under instructions. It's 6:30. Senator Kotowski, Senator Bivins, and then Senator Noland. Senator Kotowski.

SENATOR KOTOWSKI:

Thank you for acknowledging me, Mr. President. Just a couple points to the bill. The -- I think what's important to remember about the legislation here is the challenges associated with securing revenue for start-up businesses in the State of Illinois. The banks, quite simply, are not willing to be in the

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business and want to be in the business of providing these loans, low-interest loans, that the State can provide. Also, we're not set up with these community development financial institutions to provide these working capital loans for start-up businesses. This is a -- an opportunity for a look at a -- look at a hole that currently exists and provide the support necessary to make sure there's funds available. Is five thousand dollars a tremendous amount of money? No. But the fact is, if it gets someone started, small businesses are the life blood of our economy in the State of Illinois and if it gets them moving in the right direction -- let's keep in mind that this is a loan. It's supposed to be paid back. It's a low-interest loan. Thank you. Just wanted to speak to that.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Thank you and thank you for understanding. Senator Bivins, quickly to the bill, sir. Briefly, if you could. Thank you. Senator Bivins.

SENATOR BIVINS:

Very quickly. Thank you, Mr. President. Is there funding for this bill?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Noland.

SENATOR NOLAND:

As much of our legislation, it is subject to appropriation. Thank you, Senator.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Senator Bivins.

SENATOR BIVINS:

Thank you, Mr. President. I think the difference between

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this bill and the bill we passed last year, I believe there was federal funding for the -- the inmate program of the five thousand dollars, and I think that is a large difference, as -- as I understand it. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

This is final action. The question is -- I mean -- I mean, Senator Noland, to close.

SENATOR NOLAND:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'll make it brief. Just to clarify, once again, that these grants are to be used for the sole purpose of acquiring a business plan developed by a credible source. In order to receive these grants, qualified unemployed individuals must submit an application and provide fifty percent of the cost to develop their business plan themselves. Look, every -- every little bit helps. This is something that is extremely popular with the people that I have talked to -- to about this. I strongly urge an Aye vote. This is a proven method of stimulating local economies world wide. I strongly, once again, urge an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HENDON)

Question is, shall Senate Bill 3702 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 34 voting Aye, 20 voting Nay, none voting Present. Senate Bill 3702, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. The Committee on Appropriations I will meet immediately - right this instant. Go straight to committee in Room 400, immediately, as in right now. Go straight to

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committee. And Executive will meet in 212 immediately. Right now in 212. Executive will meet immediately in 212. Right now. Go straight to committee. Appropriations I will meet immediately in Room 400. The Senate will stand in recess to the call of the Chair. After committee meetings, the Senate will reconvene - don't forget that - to receive committee reports and for further Floor action. The Senate stands in recess.

(SENATE STANDS IN RECESS/SENATE RECONVENES)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

The Senate will come to order. The Members please be at their desk. All Members within the sound of my voice please return to the Senate gallery immediately. We will be going to 3rd Readings, final action. Madam Secretary, Committee Reports, please.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senator Trotter, Chairperson of the Committee on Appropriations I, reports Senate Amendment 2 to House Bill 859 recommended Do Adopt.

Senator Silverstein, Chairperson of the Committee on Executive, reports Motions to Concur with House Amendment 1 to Senate Bill 1578 and House Amendment 1 and 4 to Senate Bill 1946 recommend Do Adopt.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Thank you. Madam Secretary, have we received Messages from the House?

SECRETARY ROCK:

A Message from the House by Mr. Mahoney, Clerk.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

WICS requests permission to videotape the proceedings.

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Seeing no objection, leave is granted. Senate will come to order. Will the Members please be at their desk? Ladies and Gentlemen, I ask you to turn to Supplemental Calendar No. 2. It's been printed and currently being distributed to the Members. On Supplemental Calendar No. 2 comes Senate Bill 1946. Senator Cullerton, do you wish to proceed, sir? He indicates he wishes to proceed. Madam Secretary, read the gentleman's motion.

SECRETARY ROCK:

I move to concur with the House in the adoption of their Amendments 1 and 4 to Senate Bill 1946.

Signed by President Cullerton.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Thank you, Madam Secretary. President Cullerton, to the motion, sir.

SENATOR CULLERTON:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. I move to concur with House Amendments No. 1 and 4 on Senate Bill 1946. Senate Bill 1946 represents pension benefit reform for the public pension systems, other than those for the fire fighters and the police officers, which will be dealt with in a different bill. This applies only to new employees. Current employee benefits and retiree benefits would not be affected. And I think it's worthy to note that many people have said that we...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Excuse me, President -- Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen, this is a very serious matter. It's final passage. Could we please keep the conversations down and give the speaker

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some respect? Members please be in their seats. Staff, would you please go to the rear -- rear of the Chamber? President Cullerton, I'm sorry. Please proceed, sir. SENATOR CULLERTON:

Thank you. There's a question raised by some that -- that say that Illinois may reduce pension benefits for existing employees. We have done research on this. We believe it's very clear, based on case law and cases interpreting New York's verbatim provision, that we cannot do so; that the Illinois Constitution pension protection requirements kicks in when an employee enters State service and becomes a retirement system member. So this bill would apply to what we believe we can constitutionally apply it to - and that would be new employees. The provisions would allow for the minimum retirement age to be raised to sixty-seven with ten years of service. A reduced annuity would be available at age sixty-two with ten years of service. The final average salary will be calculated over an eight-year period, rather than a four-year period. The COLA would be reduced from a three percent annual compounded adjustment to a COLA based on the CPI increase up to three percent non-compounded. And there is a different provision that I'll address later for the General Assembly and the Judges. alternative formula would be limited to police officers, fire fighters and Corrections' security quards. The retirement age for the alternative formula would be increased to sixty with twenty years of service. Survivor annuities are set at sixtysixty point -- and two-thirds percent of the annuitant's level. And there are some return-to-work provisions, which would be strengthened by suspending the annuity of any retiree hired

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after the effective date who returns to full-time employment in a position covered under any other public pension system. Chicago Teachers' Pension Fund - amortization period would be extended an additional fifteen years and they would be authorized to pay normal costs for the next three years. There was a question raised in committee concerning the -- the -- the current -- the COLA provisions. COLA provisions in this bill will be at fifty percent CPI up to three percent simple after age sixty-seven. The General Assembly and the Judges - CPI is up to three percent compounded after age sixty-seven. reason for that is that the General Assembly and the Judges are the only system that's going to be reduced and -- and cut because the final average salary, which we now have at eightyfive percent for our systems, will be reduced to sixty percent. That's the only system where that's going to take place. was a question that was raised in committee. I certainly appreciated the testimony in committee of representatives of the unions. They have worked with us to try to come up with an agreement. I am very moved by their interest in trying to protect their future employees that may join their union. But, folks, and I even would say this - I agree with them - that really the reason why we have such a problem here in Illinois is that we had, for many years - and I was part of it, 'cause I was here - underfunded the employer portion of our five pension systems and it resulted in this big unfunded liability - the worst in the nation. And we have been paying a ramp-up that's cost us billions of dollars every year, instead of spending money on paying our bills on time. But we're here -- we are where we are. And it's over four billion dollars that we're

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going to have to pay this year. And that's why we're trying to address this concern and it's something we have to do. Governor's Office has indicated to me that they are about -- we are about to be reevaluated for our -- our bond rating. And we are about to issue bonds for our capital construction package, and if we don't show that we're trying to address our structural deficit, the rating agencies would likely downgrade us. that's why we want to do this now. It's very important to send this signal. It's very important to save the money, the billions of dollars that we won't have to pay into the system in the future. And as I indicated in committee, Senator Radogno and I have met and talked about this issue. We have some proposed changes. This is a bill that was drafted in the House. It's not a bill that we can amend. So we would suggest that we will be amending it and sending an amendment -- a trailer bill back over to the House. We've already found some items of agreement, which we will work on. We will include in that discussion of the Chicago Teachers' Pension Fund amortization period. As most of you may know, we have a different system for the suburban and downstate teachers. We pay their employer contribution. This year, it's going to be 2.1 billion dollars. Next year, it's going up another hundred million. Whereas, in Chicago, for the Chicago Teachers' Pension System, we pay ten million, not 2.1 billion. And so they're not getting as much money into their system as the suburban and downstate teachers do. And as a result, they're in a -- a -- a true financial crisis for this year. If our budget doesn't come up with more money and we pass the Governor's budget, there'll be another three hundred million dollars cut from the Chicago Teachers --

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Chicago Board of Education's budget. So that's why the House put this relief in. We are still paying the normal cost, but recalibrating when we begin the ramp-up. At the same time, we're reducing the benefits of those Chicago school teachers, just like the downstate teachers, and there will, of course, be a corresponding savings to the fund. So, with that, I'll be happy to answer any questions and urge an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Thank you. Thank you, President Cullerton. The Chair apologizes for the late delay on the Supplemental Calendar, but I believe every Member does have one. Continuing on discussion. Is there any discussion? Senator Radogno, for what purpose you seek recognition, ma'am?

SENATOR RADOGNO:

Thank you, Mr. President. To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

To the bill, Leader.

SENATOR RADOGNO:

I have to say that I am somewhat surprised that we're here this evening voting on this, but also pleasantly surprised. This is obviously an issue that we've needed to tackle for a long, long time. We've had a lot of discussion about the need for pension reform. We had a Deficit Reduction Committee last year. That was one of the recommendations. We had a Pension Reform Commission, which recognized the need to make changes, although they weren't able to come to a conclusion on that. I actually introduced a bill a number of weeks ago, Senate Bill 2825, that is very similar to what we're discussing tonight. So there has been a lot of discussion about the need to modernize

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the pension system and I am grateful for the fact that we are here doing this tonight and hopefully in a bipartisan fashion. This bill is not window dressing. It is substantial reform. This is really going to be different for employees going However, I believe firmly that we will not have forward. difficulty attracting people to State employment, attracting teachers. I think that what we'll be doing is bringing the benefits in line with the private sector, which I think is quite important. This is not a perfect bill. There are a few things, in particular the underfunding of the Chicago Teachers' Pension, and President Cullerton has indicated a willingness to revisit how we provide some relief for the Chicago public schools this year, but still make that -- make sure that that system is It's important that we do that because the -- to the extent that their system is underfunded, it impacts their entire budgetary picture and then, of course, they come back to Springfield and need help. So we need to be sure that they are funding that system in an adequate way. But, yes, there are reforms for Chicago teachers as well. I think there are some other things, again, the Senate President and I have talked about that may need to be revisited - some of the pieces with respect to age. And I think we'll all be open to hearing more about people's suggestions as we go forward. But I think substantially this bill will go forward and it's the kind of reform that we need. And we need it really for two reasons. One is the sustainability of the pension system that we have. We all know we cannot continue to have a system where people are able to retire, sometimes as early as age fifty, and live until eighty-five. We just can't do it. We need to make these

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reforms to make sure the people that are currently in the system have a system that can actually fund the benefits that they are entitled to. So it's important for that reason. But it's also, I think, important for the equity issue for the people that are paying the bill. Taxpayers subsidize public pensions, and in many, many instances, the private sector doesn't have any pension that is even remotely close to what's available to public employees. And so it's critical that the folks paying the bill have some sense that their interests are taken into account as well. So I urge an Aye vote and I congratulate everyone who votes Aye. I anticipate we'll have a lot of Aye votes. This is something that has been sorely needed for a long time. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Thank you. Senator Lauzen, are you seeking recognition, sir?

SENATOR LAUZEN:

Thank you very much. Yes, to the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Bill, sir.

SENATOR LAUZEN:

Thank you so much. Senator Cullerton and Senator Radogno, I just wanted to thank you very much for the work that you've done on this bill and bringing all of us together. If this were just a prudent thing to do, it would be very much to your credit to propose this and pass this at any time, especially tonight. However, it is absolutely necessary for the solvency of our State to address the staggering deficit that the pension plans are -- are putting and the strain that it's putting on the

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State. Our pensions really are bankrupt by two classic definitions of bankruptcy. One, the liabilities exceed -- the unfunded liabilities exceed the assets, and according to the generally -- or, excuse me, the Government {sic} (Governmental) Accounting Standards Board, we can't pay it back. consider a seventy-six-billion-dollar deficit and Government Accounting Standard Board say that you have to pay it back over thirty years, and there's twelve payments in a year, three hundred and sixty payments, it means about two hundred million dollars every thirty days. So we can't pay that back. In fact, when our constituents who are teachers call with any concerns that they might have, we can share with them that according to a study that was done for the Teacher Retirement Fund, the checks will stop flowing - if we do nothing, or if we -- if we don't vote Yes tonight - the -- the checks stop in 2023, according to this independent consultant. That's just thirteen years from now. So we can either wring our hands, or we can point at each other come 2023, or we can do something tonight and be smart about this. So I congratulate every person who is going to put a Yes vote on this bill and I appreciate the work that the leadership has done to bring this forward. But...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Senator Lauzen.

SENATOR LAUZEN:

One -- one other thought that I would like to share with the Body is that -- you know, that this does a very good job of setting in place people who are hired in the future and for all of their term of service and when their pensions are. We do have a problem that will continue to be an overhang on us, for

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folks who are currently in the system, that seventy-eight billion dollars, trying to bring that down. I -- I -- I hate to rain on any kind of parade; I think this is a wonderful thing - but that still is work that we have to attend to. But I -- I enthusiastically recommend an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Thank you very much. Further discussion? Senator Risinger, for what purpose do you rise, sir?

SENATOR RISINGER:

Thank you, Mr. President. Will the sponsor yield for a question?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Sponsor indicates he'll yield for a question, sir. Senator Risinger.

SENATOR RISINGER:

Yeah, Senator Cullerton, if a teacher retires in the -- in the Teacher Retirement System, many of those go back and substitute teach. I think, in the bill, it says that they will continue to be able to do that and not have to forgo their pension while that's taking place.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

President Cullerton.

SENATOR CULLERTON:

Yes, that's correct, because they would not be considered full-time.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Senator Risinger.

SENATOR RISINGER:

Also, State employees that retire in the State Employee

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Retirement System, many of those are called back for seventy-five days. I think those are also considered temporary assignments. Would those also be able to be called back and work in those seventy-five days without forgoing their pensions at that time?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

President Cullerton.

SENATOR CULLERTON:

Senator, each system has its own definition of full-time. I'm not familiar with all of the different definitions, but if it -- if that definition you described is not full-time, then they -- they would -- they would still be allowed to keep their pension. Would not be suspended.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Senator Risinger.

SENATOR RISINGER:

To the bill, Mr. President. I think this is a good bill. Long overdue. I think it's something that we needed to address. And I congratulate you on bringing it forward and I hope that everybody in this Body can vote for it. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Thank you, Senator. Further discussion? Senator Luechtefeld, for what purpose you seek recognition, sir? SENATOR LUECHTEFELD:

Thank you, Mr. President and Members of the -- of the -- of the Senate. A question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Sponsor indicates he'll yield for a question, sir. Senator Luechtefeld.

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SENATOR LUECHTEFELD:

First of all, I don't know whether you all noticed this or not, but there has to be something wrong with this bill. Senator Lauzen and Senator Cullerton on the same side - that is impossible. A -- a question to the sponsor, and -- and of course, the first one, Senator, I -- maybe you've mentioned this, but there's a certain percent paid in by teachers and -- and -- and -- and in -- into different pension funds. Will that be diminished at all or will they continue to pay -- put in the same percent that they have been putting in?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

President Cullerton.

SENATOR CULLERTON:

The same amount.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Senator Luechtefeld.

SENATOR LUECHTEFELD:

So, they're going to be putting in exactly what they've been putting in for years and -- and the -- the -- and the -- the benefits they're getting are -- are definitely diminished.

Am -- am I right about that?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

President Cullerton.

SENATOR CULLERTON:

Well, there's a -- there's a few exceptions to people paying in as much. There's -- there's a Social Security cap of pensionable income at a hundred six thousand dollars. That'll affect judges and a number of other employees that make more than that. They will not have to pay in as much as they are

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now. They'll be paying in up to that amount. But I think your question was concerning teachers and they pay in the same amount.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Senator Luechtefeld.

SENATOR LUECHTEFELD:

So -- so they will be paying the same percent in, knowing that the -- the -- the benefits are diminished dramatically?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

That was asked and answered twice.

SENATOR LUECHTEFELD:

He -- there seems to be...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

President Cullerton.

SENATOR CULLERTON:

I -- I guess maybe I can ask you to restate the question. Are you talking about current employees? Are you talking about the new employees that this affects?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Senator Luechtefeld.

SENATOR LUECHTEFELD:

Current employees pay in -- in -- in a certain percentage. Future employees will pay that same percentage, is what you're saying? All right. The second thing is, you know, you have -- I heard you say in committee that you are going to follow this with a trailer bill to clean up certain things, such as maybe the fact that the judges and legislators -- the COLA is a little different. And you will follow that with a trailer bill, is that right?

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

President Cullerton.

SENATOR CULLERTON:

What I was -- what I said in the committee is I'd explain why the House put it in here. They -- they -- they do have a different COLA for the judges and the General Assembly because we are the only ones that are taking a cut in the maximum salary that we can get. We now have the ability to get eighty-five percent of our -- our salary, as do the judges. This is being dramatically lowered to sixty percent. So that's why there was a distinction between the COLA formula. Now, again, that's open to discussion and we will negotiate in a bipartisan way any trailer bill. And, of course, we don't have an assurance that the House will concur with us, but that's one of the items that we can discuss. But I wanted to give you the rationale for the distinction.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Senator Luechtefeld.

SENATOR LUECHTEFELD:

To the bill: I -- you know, I think we -- we -- we must not overstate what we've done here. You know, we -- we're not really solving the pension problem. The pension's still going to be there. The -- the problem is still going to be there. Thirty years from now, we will see savings from that. Now, again, I -- I definitely believe we need to do something in -- with regard to the pensions. No question about it. But this is not necessarily going to solve -- the -- the -- the thing I think that we have to take, as a General Assembly, some blame for, and -- and -- and -- and I'm not real sure we want to do

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that, is the biggest reason that the pension is -- is in trouble is the fact that we have not put the money into it. We saw fit to put that money in other areas. A number of years that has And -- and that has happened in Republican and Democratic administrations. But now we're basically saying we didn't do our job maybe correctly and -- and we're now going to ask -- we're going to -- we're going to really make drastic changes in the benefits of the future. So, you know, again, I think we have to take some of that blame and I'm not real sure that we have -- we've stated that. Again, it is something I think that we need to -- that we need to do. There's no doubt there are -- there are problems. Some of it is the perks that were added. But the biggest issue has to do with the fact that we, year after year, put money someplace else rather than -rather than actually trying to put it in the Pension Fund. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Thank you. Further discussion? Further discussion? Senator Althoff, are you seeking recognition, ma'am? SENATOR ALTHOFF:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President. Just a point of clarification. It was mentioned that the police and fire pension reforms are not included in this legislation. I would just like the Body to know that, under the direction and guidance of Senator Link and myself, those negotiations are ongoing. We've been meeting for three weeks. We anticipate that we'll come to a great collaboration. Through collaboration and cooperation, we too will bring forward wonderful reforms. And hopefully, we will see step one of that when we return from

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break. So, just wanted to clarify. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Thank you, Senator Althoff. Our final person seeking recognition on this matter, Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY:

Thank you, Mr. President. To the bill: To paraphrase...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

To the bill, sir. Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY:

To paraphrase Vice President Biden, this is a really big deal. I want to -- I want to commend the President for his work on this and his -- his courage in carrying this and working with us in a bipartisan fashion. You know, last week, we had Section 25 reform to try and stem the flow of red ink, with Senator Trotter. This week we have pension reform that is really meaningful reform. Obviously, some of us on this side of the aisle, when the campaign finance bill came up, didn't really feel that it was meaningful. I don't think anybody can credibly question that what's being done here in this Chamber today is a fundamental change to government. We are lifting a one-hundredbillion-dollar weight off of the shoulders of the people of this State going forward with the legislation that's going to move out of here tonight. That is a credit to all involved. Again, it has been our pleasure to be involved in this in a bipartisan fashion. The legislation Senator Radogno referenced earlier, a lot of the ideas in the bill she filed have been incorporated into this bill. And, Mr. President, it is to your credit that you were willing to do that. This is a great bill. great thing for the future of the people of this State and I

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strongly encourage an Aye vote tonight, for a brighter future for Illinois.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

Thank you, Senator. Okay, Ladies and Gentlemen, the question is, shall the Senate concur in House Amendments No. 1 and No. 4 to Senate Bill 1946. All those in favor will vote Aye. All those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Madam Secretary, take the record. On that question, there are 48 Ayes, 6 voting Nay, 3 voting Present. Having received the required constitutional majority, the Senate does concur in House Amendment No. 1 and No. 4 to Senate Bill 1946, and the bill is declared passed. Ladies and Gentlemen, there being no further business to come before the Senate, the Senate will stand adjourned until the hour of 6 a.m. Oh, I'm sorry, there's a correction. Correction. Excuse me, a correction. Correction. The Senate will stand at ease for one moment while the Committee on Assignments meets. So I'd ask all members of the Committee on Assignments to please report to the President's Anteroom immediately. And the Senate will stand at ease for just a moment.

(SENATE STANDS AT EASE/SENATE RECONVENES)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DeLEO)

The Senate will come to order. Madam Secretary, Committee Reports, please.

SECRETARY ROCK:

Senator Clayborne, Chairman of the Committee on
