But this young man, twenty-three years old, actually volunteered to go on the mission that he went on and -- and was killed on, because the person that he replaced, Casey replaced him so that he could take his test to become a U.S. citizen. That's the kind of young man that Casey Hills was. And so he volunteered to go on this mission and -- and lost his life so that other young soldier could become a U.S. citizen that was defending this country. So we owe an awful lot to our soldiers, men and women both, that are serving all over the world, but especially in Afghanistan and Irag right now. And so if we could just have a moment of silence for Casey Hills and his family, I'd deeply appreciate it.
